Pounding Storm Kills 8

A severe northeaster churned across New England today after battering the mid-Atlantic states with heavy snow, rain and near hurricane force winds in all regions of the area.

The blistering storm, New England's third northeaster in six days, roared toward Nova Scotia, leaving in its wake a path of death and destruction. Winds as high as 81 miles per hour were clocked atop New Hampshire's 6,288-foot Mt. Washington.

At least eight storm-related deaths were reported in New England and several more fatalities were attributed to the weather-further south.

Southern New England was drenched by wave after wave of gale-driven rain and as much as a foot of new snow fell in the north.

Gale-driven seas crashing over a seawall caused damage at Kennebunk Beach, Maine. Breakers 20 to 30 feet high tossed boulders and other debris onto King's Highway and onto the lawns of summer cottages.

The winds also threatened the lives of thousands of small doves, a species of auk, which were blown ashore on Cape Cod. Naturalists said the birds live in salt water and can't survive ashore.

The cruise ship Oceanic encountered rough seas and high winds as it headed back to New York after a boiler room fire forced the captain to turn the Bahamas-bound vessel back. All 1,400 passengers were safe.

The storm, spawned in the Gulf of Mexico, roared up the coast from the Carolinas Monday night to lash the shore areas with wind and rain which turned to snow further inland.

Power lines were downed, commuters delayed, bridges closed, streets flooded, schools closed, ferries stranded, boats swamped, trees felled, windows shattered and umbrellas broken.

Hundreds of families in coastal homes in New Jersey, Long

Fire Rips Through Paris Co.; Other Stores Damaged

Store owners and insurance adjusters were busy Wednesday inspecting merchandise after numerous shops along the 100 block of Main Avenue North were filled with smoke from a fire in the central-furnace room beneath the shops.

Store owners were reluctant to estimate damage from the smoke, several of the shops were clothing stores that had just received shipments for Christmas and were heavily stocked with clothing.

Heavy damage was evident in most of the shops, which included L'Harrison's Furniture Co., Anne's Casuals, The Paris, The Sweetbriar and Williams Shoe Store.

All these stores were closed with the exception of Williams Shoes, Ron Williams, manager of the business, said damage was not bad enough to close the store. Charles Stuhlbarg, manager of L'Harrison's, said the store would be closed the rest of the week.

Other businessmen were uncertain as to how long they would be closed. This will depend on the action of the insurance adjusters.

According to Twin Falls Fire Chief L. Z. (Zek) Bartlett, the fire department received the fire call about 6:55 p.m.

Two firemen were trapped for several minutes in the basement furnace room where the fire started, and frantic efforts were made to free the two men, Don Whittaker and Glenn Houk. They had gone through a small opening in the floor of the Paris Co., down into the furnace room, and because of the heavy smoke and darkness were unable to find their way back to the opening. When they found the opening they were unable to get back through it.

Water was forced through the opening onto the two men until the hole was enlarged sufficiently for them to get out. One of the men, Glenn Houk, received a small cut above the left eye. Chief Bartlett said the fire apparently started when the gas furnace overheated. He said the fire started in the floor above the furnace. There were heavy flames in the basement until water was forced through the opening where the two men had entered.

Another opening several more feet down the alley, an entrance to the basement, was found and water-hoses were rushed into the basement.

Because of the central heating furnace, which provides heat for four of the businesses, smoke quickly spread throughout the buildings and also into the other shops affected by the smoke.

Contacted at the Paris Co., Earl Faulkner, owner of the firm, declined to give any estimates of damage in his store, which was stocked with women's clothing for the Christmas season. He said that the insurance adjusters and the owner of the building were meeting Wednesday morning to decide what action would be taken.

Mr. Faulkner is stationed at a guard, Paul Armstrong, in the building for the night, as fans were placed at the front and back entrance of the store to force the smoke out.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Cohen, owners of Anne's Casuals, another women's clothing firm, said the store had just received Christmas shipments of clothing and said the smoke had impregnated the entire stock. They were determined to give any estimates of damage and were awaiting their insurance adjusters.

Personnel at the Sweetbriar refused any comment on smoke damage. They are awaiting See FIRE, Pg. 2, Col. 4

Gunmen Slay Negro Rights-Group Chief

BOSTON (AP)—Five Negro men burst into the headquarters of a civil rights group today, shot the Negro founder and two other men dead, then escaped, police said.

Two others, wounded, were hospitalized. All the victims and the assailants were Negro, officials said.

One victim was identified as Guido St. Laurent, the blind founder and executive director of the New England Grass Roots Organization (NEGRO). St. Laurent was characterized by the others as "a responsible militant."

St. Laurent's guide dog, a black Beigan Shepherd, remained at the victim's side as the others killed tentatively brick building on Blue Hill Avenue in the Roxbury section, a predominantly Negro area.

The others killed tentatively were identified as Cornell Eaton of Boston and Ronald King Jr. Fred Rose, 41, the black self-

Nixon To Overhaul White House Staff

NEW YORK (AP) — President Johnson, the highest ranking White House staffer, carried the thorough overhaul of the White House staff and will abolish such time-honored posts as press secretary and appointments secretary, aides announced today.

Word of the "restructuring" of the White House inner circle was disclosed by H. R. "Bob" Hartman, 42-year-old Los Angeles advertising executive who was named today as one of Nixon's White House assistants.

Hartman said the White House hierarchy in the Nixon administration probably will include no more than three or four assistants at the highest level. He said these appointees would not more or less be chiefs of staff to the president.

On the next rung down the ladder there will be a number of special assistants who will handle such matters as press relations and presidential appointments.

Also president of J. Walter Thompson Co., Hartman will involve himself primarily with general administrative matters, including management of the White House staff. He will have supervision over presidential appointments—in other words, the daily schedule—but the details will be carried out by a subordination.

Nixon also has appointed Bryce N. Harlow as a presidential assistant.

Earl Harolden received Tuesday that he was naming Harlow, 62, to be one of several presidential assistants. Harlow, an Inland Empire government man since World War II, will specialize in "management of legislation and Congressional affairs."

John H. Daly Dies At 55 Of Illness

John H. Daly, 521 Poplar Ave., prominent Twin Falls attorney and member of the law firm of Perry, Robertson, Daly and Larson, died early Wednesday in the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City following a long illness.

Mr. Daly was born Aug. 20, 1913, in Heltinger, N. D., and moved to Bull at the age of 3 with his parents, the late J. J. and Mrs. A. M. Daly. He attended Bull High School and the University of Idaho, receiving his law degree in 1939.

He was attended the University of Washington and served as a special attorney for the anti-trust division of the Department of Justice in Seattle from 1941 until 1942.

Mr. Daly served in the Navy in the Pacific from 1942 through 1945 and held the rank of Lieutenant. In 1946 he joined R. P. Perry as a law partner in Twin Falls, and had practiced law here since that time.

Bishops Strive To Avert Split Over 'Pill' Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — A panel of Roman Catholic bishops worked today seeking common ground to avert a sharp split over whether Catholics can use contraceptives despite a Vatican ban.

The seven-man committee went into session Tuesday night and met for 10 straight hours without producing a statement for final presentation to the full conference.

The original approach reportedly was toward a liberal attitude which would allow married couples to practice birth control if they conscientiously felt it necessary, but one source said the draft would still brand contraception as a sin.

The bishops in France, Canada, Belgium and a few other countries have already permitted a degree of conscience for married couples.

Numerous written suggestions for changes were given to the panel after a first draft was handed out to the bishops Monday. The seven-man committee went into session Tuesday night and met for 10 straight hours without producing a statement for final presentation to the full conference.

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U. S. Guns Answer Attack By Reds

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Army and Marine artillery fired into the demilitarized zone Tuesday for the second time in three days after North Vietnamese gunners were reported to have fired on a South Vietnamese post from inside the zone. Later that day, four special assistants at \$30,000 a year, and plans to change some titles while so doing.

U.S. Defense Secretary Clark M. Clifford said Tuesday the shelling Sunday were considered "a matter of seriousness" by the U.S. government but that so far they did not constitute a pattern.

Military spokesmen also reported rocket, mortar and artillery attacks on four American bases in South Vietnam's Central Highlands and on two provincial capitals to the east and west of Saigon.

Ground action was light. One U.S. infantry Division patrolled the highlands six miles from the Cambodian border, was followed by a ground attack by an enemy force of unknown size hurling hand grenades and firing small arms. U.S. headquarters said the American infantrymen killed a total of 21 wounded in the ground attack. Three Communist soldiers broke through the U.S. lines but were downed, a spokesman said.

A South Vietnamese spokesman said two children were killed and 25 soldiers wounded in the shelling of the two provincial capitals. One policeman was killed and five policemen and three South Vietnamese army soldiers wounded.

Meanwhile, five U.S. Navy Swift boats attacked a Viet Cong stronghold in the Boeua Lon river system at the southern tip of Vietnam. They were supported by U.S. Army helicopter gunships, South Vietnamese planes and guns of other Navy and Coast Guard ships.

Leo Collier Murder Case Ruling Made

Leo Collier, 47, accused of first degree murder in the Sept. 2 shotgun slaying of his wife, has been ordered bound over to the district court.

The decision was reached Tuesday by Twin Falls County Probate Court Judge Richard Reed, Judge Reed made the decision on the basis of briefs submitted by the defense attorney.

Mr. Collier's wife, Aileen, 43, died at the couple's home at 1943 Oriole Ave. after she was shot twice. Mr. Collier was also shot in the upper chest. He spent a short time in the hospital and was accused of murder on his release from the hospital.

He will be arraigned in Fifth District Court in the near future on the first degree murder charge. He is being held in the Twin Falls County jail.

Zoning Panel In T.F. Hits Mobile Subdivision Plans

The Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission voted Tuesday to recommend the city council not approve the rezoning to accommodate B.R.O.S. Corp.

The corporation has made application for a zoning change for mobile subdivision in the area north of Lawndale Drive and south of Poliole Road. The property is now zoned residential-low density and the corporation asked the zoning be changed to commercial-general to allow for the trailer court.

Property owners of the area attended the meeting to protest the zoning change. They pointed out that the change would decrease the value of their property considerably.

After disapproving the zoning change, the commission did say that some provision should be established to allow such a mobile home operation within the city limits.

The commission members said their mobile home subdivision would cater to the elderly people. The long-range plans would include a mobile home and other recreation facilities.

Reed Coulam, secretary of the commission, stressed that the commission acts only in an advisory capacity to the city council. The official action on the rezoning will be left in the hands of the council.

The commission also discussed the application for changing the name of Kimberly Road to Main Avenue East. A petition bearing signatures from 45 households and businesses was presented asking the name change. The matter was tabled for further discussion and a decision was made.

Train Victim At Gooding Is Identified

GOODING — Gooding County sheriff's officers have identified the man who was killed Tuesday morning when struck by a freight train as he was walking on the tracks at the railway yard at Gooding.
The man, James P. Stowers, 21, whose last known address was Salt Lake City, was killed about 10:30 a.m. when he failed to hear warning whistles from the approaching freight train.
Officers said the tragedy occurred after he got off another train on which he and his partner, Edward Harland, 20, Wilder, had been riding. Mr. Stowers told his friend he was going to go to the back of the train and get inside an empty freight car.
Officers said he was walking against the wind and was beside the tracks when he was struck at the time he was struck. They assume he did not hear the train.

In eastern Tennessee, two 19-year-old boys died of exposure after being lost for 30 hours while on a hunting trip near Great Smoky Mountain National Park. A third youth in the party managed to walk to safety. Snow accumulation of up to a foot was reported in the Tennessee Smokies and up to 15 inches in West Virginia's eastern mountains. Tuesday, 10 inches at State College, Pa., 14 inches in Flat Rock, N.C., and 13 inches in Frostburg, Md. Atlanta, Ga., and Washington received a dusting of white. On Wallops Island off the Virginia coast one wind gust was clocked at 100 miles an hour and the wind blew steadily at 60 m.p.h. At sea the winds whipped up 35 foot waves leaving several small vessels in distress.
A fishing boat off Morehead City, N.C., was swamped leaving one man drowned, another missing. Two others swam ashore.
A barge with more than a million gallons of oil was driven aground by the storm at Rehoboth Beach, Del., and threatened to break up and pollute the beach and water. The U.S. Coast Guard said later-leaking oil was confined to a 300-yard area.
Tides running 7 1/2 feet above normal broke through a retaining wall in Monmouth County, N.J., forcing 300 persons to evacuate their homes. Most returned by night.

Fletcher May Aid Nixon

Ghetto 'Hot Line' Urged

SEATTLE (AP) — Arthur A. Fletcher, advisor on civil rights to President-elect Richard M. Nixon, Tuesday proposed a "hot line" from the White House to the ghetto to expedite neighborhood development.

The Negro city councilman from Pasco, who lost his Republican bid for election as Washington lieutenant governor in the "general" election, said Nixon now must "get the neighborhood development concept rolling across the nation."

Fletcher, seen as a possible pick by Nixon to help with the new administration's approach to the ghetto problem, said it's time to "bridge this whole gap" between legislation, the ghetto and getting things done.

Fletcher was the chief architect of a model self-help program in Pasco which gained national attention when he was invited to explain the concept before the Republican National Convention in Florida last August.

Fletcher is an advocate of "power politics to implement action programs," including enlisting private industry and foundations as a key development force.

Fletcher said he is leaving Pasco and resigning his council position soon to live in the Seattle area "close to the center of economic and government power." But he said his job either with state government or with Nixon—neither of which has been officially offered—is not firm up.

"The role I would like to play is the guy who can organize people and utilize power of legislation to get things rolling," Fletcher said in a telephone interview from his Pasco home.

Fletcher, 43, is a former shoe-shine boy, ice man, and professional football player with the Los Angeles Rams—and Baltimore Colts who calls himself a "product of the ghetto." He has been an employee relations specialist at the Hanford atomic energy facility near Pasco.

He was narrowly defeated in the election by incumbent Democratic LL Gov. John A. Chersberg, former University of Washington football coach.

Burley Residents Raising Money To Buy Artificial Leg For Mrs. Helen Hinshaw

BURLEY — Cassia County residents are digging into their pocketbooks to raise \$450 to pay for an artificial leg for Mrs. Helen Hinshaw. Funds may be deposited at Cassia National Bank in the special fund for Mrs. Hinshaw.

Mrs. Hinshaw stated, "I would like to just stand on my own two feet and not be a burden to anyone." Since September 1967, she has been forced to be dependent on others.

A diabetic condition which Mrs. Hinshaw did not realize she had, caused her right foot to become infected. Doctors were unable to save her foot and it was amputated in May at Valley Memorial Hospital, Twin Falls. Since that time Mrs. Hinshaw has been confined to a wheelchair because she has not been able to raise enough money to buy an artificial leg.

Her income is just enough to buy the medication which she must take, which includes medicine for a heart murmur, another to keep her body from swelling and the insulin for her diabetes.

Mrs. Hinshaw had four children, but all died during their infancy. Mrs. Hinshaw is living with a sister, Mrs. Juanita Ralphs, and family, as she cannot live alone.

It is hoped to have Mrs. Hinshaw walking by Christmas. George Warrell, chief of police, and Wayne Watson, of Wayne's Exchange, have contacted the Ed-Well Artificial Limb Co., Salt Lake City, for information. The type of artificial leg Mrs. Hinshaw will need will cost about \$363.37 and she would have to stay in Salt Lake City for at least a week learning to walk with a new leg.

"With an artificial leg and able to walk again, I could move back into my own little house and take in ironing and do baby sitting for others and again support myself," stated Mrs. Hinshaw.

Tuesday morning the Burley Kiwanis Club during their monthly board meeting voted to donate \$25 to the fund for Mrs. Hinshaw for her artificial leg, and the check was presented to Cassia National Bank before

noon for deposit.

Presently the fund is at \$225, just at the half way mark of the goal.

When Mrs. Hinshaw was told what the community was doing she replied, "I don't want to be a burden to anyone, but if I could get a leg I would learn to walk again and if I fell down a thousand times, I would get up and try again."

Single Vote Denies Plea For Inmate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Morton Sobell has failed by a single vote to win a Supreme Court hearing of his plea to be freed from prison, where he is serving time for espionage.

Sobell was convicted in 1951 along with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, who were executed. The trio was convicted of turning over U.S. atomic secrets to the Soviet Union.

Sobell is due to be released from Lewisburg, Pa., federal prison Aug. 24, 1969. He wanted the court to consider time spent in jail before the trial as part of his sentence, thus permitting him to be freed immediately.

Four votes were necessary for him to win a Supreme Court hearing, but only Justices William O. Douglas, John M. Harlan and William J. Brennan Jr. voted for the hearing.

Watts-Area Home Built In 96 Hours

LOS ANGELES (AP) — What hackers call the first home built under a new federal home-ownership program has been erected in Watts—in 96 hours.

The Rev. George Scott Jr. of the sponsoring Community Pride Inc. dedicated the modern, three-bedroom prefabricated house Tuesday, saying, "Three years ago, Watts burned itself into history with a rampage that endured for 96 hours. Now, that time period is being used as both a recognition and a hopeful intimation of better times to come in the south central Los Angeles area."

Nearly three dozen died in the 1965 rioting in the predominantly Negro area.

The home came complete with carpeting, appliances, carpet and brass and trees for the front and back yard.

Under the 1968 Federal Housing and Urban Development Act the home and property can be bought for \$15,000 with no money down, at 1 per cent interest.

Lake Will Flood 'Birthplace' Of Europe

By TOM CULLEN

BEGRADJE, Yugoslavia (NEA)—Lepenski Vir may be the cradle of Europe. But unless the dollar-poor Yugoslavians can come up with some cash quickly, it will take somebody like Jacques Costeau to find out for sure.

Lepenski Vir has been around in one form or another, for 8,000 years, but it may soon disappear beneath the waters of the Danube. Archeologists have less than a year left to complete their excavations of the Stone Age ruins before the site is due to be flooded by a 42-mile-long artificial lake, a by-product of the \$360-million Iron Gates hydro-electrical dam.

The situation at Lepenski Vir is much the same as the one that once prevailed at Abu Simbel when that Egyptian temple was threatened by the waters of Aswan-Dam—two things are different, however. For one, the civilized world rushed to the rescue of Abu Simbel. Secondly, those in-

position to know say that Lepenski Vir is far more important than the Egyptian site.

Yugoslavia approached UNESCO and the Smithsonian Institute for financial help, but with no luck. Both claim to have used up their funds saving Abu Simbel.

Altogether, 25 archeological sites dating from prehistoric times will be drowned. The loss will be incalculable, according to the experts.

While looking for Roman ruins, Professor Dragoslav Stojovic of Belgrade University uncovered 41 houses of a hitherto unknown design arranged in horseshoe fashion beside the Danube.

Stojovic has fixed the date of the Lepenski Vir settlement as 6000 B.C. and believes that it may well be the birthplace of European civilization.

Inside the trapezoid-shaped house, the 39-year-old professor found sophisticated sculptures which may shed new light on the origins of European art. Carved from river boulders, some

have purely abstract designs, others are sculpted to represent the human head.

"The heads could pass for Henry Moore sculptures, and yet they're the earliest of their kind that have been found in Europe," Stojovic says. "They predate any other realistic human sculpture by at least 2,000 years."

Lepenski Vir may force the experts to revise their views concerning the development of European civilization. Until now it was believed that the breakthrough into civilization, when man lived in towns, grew crops, decorated pottery, took place in the Middle East, Jordan, Palestine, Iran

these were thought to be the cradles of civilization, with the Anatolian region of Turkey later playing an important role in transmitting it to the West.

The new Yugoslav find does not contradict this theory, but Professor Stojovic believes that the Lepenski Vir culture may have developed independently, later combined with the ele-

ments moving westward from Anatolia.

The experts are puzzled concerning the facial distortions which the artists gave their stone heads, with the eyes wide and staring, the mouths pulled down into painful grimaces.

Some claim that this is the work of people who lived in fear of being overtaken by some terrible calamity. Others maintain that the faces are carved to resemble fish, and that they were intended as offerings to the river gods.

The answer may never be known for the archeologists have just five working months, starting next April to complete their work at the site before it is inundated. Other nearby sites, including a promising mound which lies above Lepenski Vir, and which has not been excavated, might still be saved by the erection of a coffer dam.

But this would run into big money which Yugoslavia cannot afford. In the absence of international cooperation, the 8,000-year-old settlement appears

Lady Bird To Begin Last Trip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lady Bird Johnson will make her final trip around the nation as first lady later this month to get acquainted with the America behind the headlines.

Her preliminary plans have the "farewell journey," as it was described by the White House, starting Nov. 22 in Washington at a ceremony for immigrants being sworn in as citizens.

Foreign journalists and other companions will join the First Lady on a four-day, 6,000-mile trip to New Orleans; Cape Kennedy, Fla.; Denver, Colo., and then to Eureka, Calif., for dedication of the Redwood National Park.

"It will be a wonderful way to get acquainted with the America behind the headlines—and to introduce some foreign friends to our country," said Mrs. Johnson in a statement today.

The First Lady, a vigorous supporter of national beautification projects, has made about 40 trips during her five years in the White House, covering 100,000 miles and 125 cities and towns.

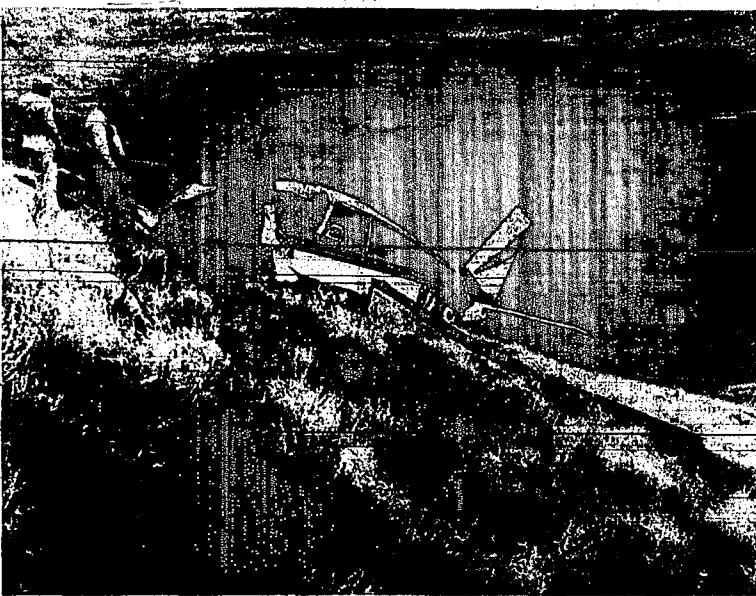
At this trip's first stop—New Orleans—Mrs. Johnson will attend the opening of a repertory theater and visit Xavier University of Louisiana, a participant in the Teacher Corps program.

She and her party will then meet with astronauts in Cape Kennedy.

She's to dedicate a new neighborhood health center in Denver and visit an existing center. She'll attend a premiere of an Office of Economic Opportunity film describing new federal health programs.

The Denver visit will also include a stop at Larimer's Square, which the White House calls an outstanding example of private community renewal.

The trip will wind up with a full day in Redwood National Park, a 58,000-acre preserve created by the 96th Congress.

Biology Teacher Cheers Court Ruling Overturning Disputed Evolution Law

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The woman who challenged Arkansas' "monkey law" says teachers will now be able to present the theory of evolution "with an open mind and clear conscience."

The U.S. Supreme Court struck down the law on Tuesday, saying the prohibition against the teaching of evolution in Arkansas public schools is an establishment of religion by the state and unconstitutional.

Mrs. Susan Epperson, a native of Clarksville, Ark., filed suit against the law when she was a biology teacher in Little Rock Central High School in 1968.

Arkansas school officials said teachers had been ignoring the law for years.

"The 1928 law provided a fine of up to \$500 and loss of job on conviction. It was inspired by the landmark Tennessee 'monkey trial' in 1925 at which teacher John Thomas Scopes was convicted of teaching evolution."

State Education Commissioner Arch W. Ford said he expected the decision and added it "might have some psychological meaning on teachers, but I don't think it has too much practical meaning. I think it's good the law has been struck down."

He was 24 when Clarence Darrow defended him and William Jennings Bryan prosecuted the case at Dayton, Tenn., in a clash of religion vs. science.

The commissioner said textbooks used in the state contain Charles Darwin's theory of evolution.

In the high court's unanimous decision, Justice Abe Fortas said "There is and can be no doubt that the first amendment does not permit the state to require that teaching and learning must be confined to the principles or prohibitions of any religious sect or dogma."

Fortas said Mrs. Epperson faced "a literal dilemma" when she was confronted by a new biology textbook, containing a chapter on Darwin, in September 1968 because "She was supposed to use the new textbook for classroom instruction and presumably to teach the statutorily condemned chapter; but to do so would be a criminal offense and subject her to dismissal."

At Shreveport, La., Scopes, now 68, said the decision came 42 years too late.

'Prominent' Men Live Longer Careers Deemed Beneficial

DETROIT (AP) — Men who become prominent in their careers tend to outlive the average man, a statistical study suggests.

Scientists and clergymen come off best in this particular longevity measurement.

"Men of letters" rank lowest on this same totem pole, but still ahead of average.

In this subgrouping, "correspondents and editors" seem to be outlived by their readers by a large margin.

The longevity study was described Wednesday to the American Public Health Association by Jules V. Quint and Bianca R. Cody, statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., New York City.

Using the 1959-61 edition of "Who's Who in America" they selected a sample of 6,329 distinguished professional and business men.

They checked how many had died and when during the next 12 years, and compared this with death rates among white men in the general population who had been of the same ages back in 1950.

Overall, they said, the mortality of "Who's Who" men who were over age 45 in 1950 was 30 per cent less than that of the general population.

The greatest difference was found between ages 50 and 59. "This contradicts the belief in some quarters that the mercuriousness with which men drive themselves during their forties to outstanding positions in their careers is reflected in broken health when they are in their fifties," they said.

They found these differences:

- Physicians and surgeons: 22 per cent under the general population and 10 per cent above sample.
- Church officials and clergymen: 38 per cent under the general population and 13 per cent under the sample.
- Scientists: 46 per cent under the general population and 21 per cent under the sample.
- Causes of death were not available for analysis, the report said, nor were theories offered as to why prominent persons might live longer.

Power Outage Triggers University 'Panty Raid'

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Most people were sleeping when the lights went out in Logan, Utah, students on the Utah State University campus were plenty alert however.

The power outage in the city lasted 11 hours, from late Monday night to about 10 a.m. Tuesday. But lights were off only two hours at USU before auxiliary power units were put into use.

The outage resulted when two poles in the single 44,000 volt power artery to the city snapped in Logan Canyon, Utah Power and Light Co. officials said.

Apparently only one student ever made it inside.

But Brenda Flinders, head resident of Merrill Hall, said the boy retreated when the girls began screaming.

The only reported damage during the raid included a few broken light fixtures, and some holes shot with a pellet gun in windows of a campus cafeteria.

About 600-800 men rushed out of their dormitories moments after the power failure and made a dash for the girls' quarters, shouting "we want panties, we want panties."

They were greeted by locked doors and females who threw underwear from the safety of their windows.

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Raft River Stake Quarterly Confab At Malta Hears Talk By Jay Neilson

MALTA — "Let us take an inventory of ourselves and be thankful for life itself and our good health," Jay Neilson, member of the stake presidency, told the Raft River Stake quarterly conference Sunday morning at the Malta LDS stake house.

"For freedom and free agency, for the gospel, for our families and for an abundance of food, we should also be thankful," he continued. "How can we express our thanks for our blessings?" he asked. "Genuine happiness comes from serving others in kindness," he said. "Be prayerful, serve your God and your fellowmen."

Dr. Walter Peterson, Burley physician, discussed the subject, "Drugs, Addiction and Venereal Diseases."

Drugs are a two-edged sword, he said. "They can be helpful or harmful."

He explained that LSD which has no medicinal use, is the most potent of all drugs. It is very harmful when taken. Marijuana is not so potent and easily available, also has no medicinal use, he said, but is likewise dangerous to use.

Young people today are exposed to drugs by pushers who are sponsored by "big business," the doctor said.

He also spoke of the dangers of alcohol and diet pills which are very dangerous and habit forming.

"Venereal diseases are rising rapidly in the United States," he explained, "despite the use of penicillin and sulfa drugs." He further explained the origin and prevention of these ills.

Other speakers were Gino Nedd, Blaine Wight, LaVell Darrington and Edwin H. Paskett. Congregational singing was directed by Mrs. Olen Ward with Mrs. Brent Udy as organist.

Special musical numbers were an organ solo by Vaughn Barrett and a solo by Don Emery with Janis Clark as accompanist.

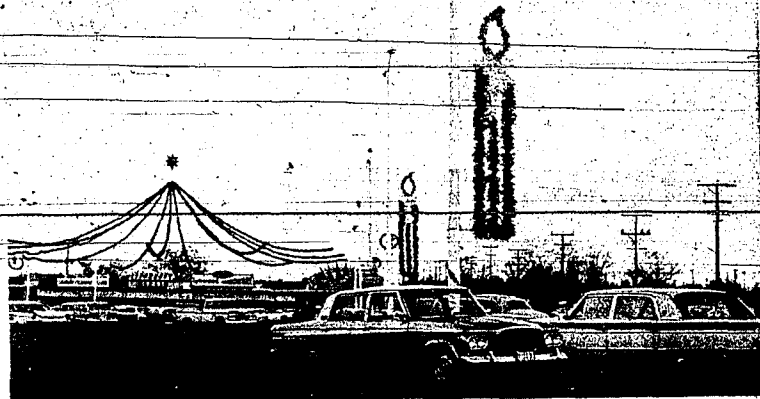

Students Vex Czechs In Power Struggle

PRAGUE (AP) — Czechoslovakia's Communist leaders worked desperately today to keep young demonstrators off the streets while they wage a power struggle behind closed doors.

The leaders used a combination of threats and pleas in an attempt to head off students' and workers' plans for demonstrations against any more concessions to the Soviet occupiers.

Party chief Alexander Dubcek met with student leaders and warned them not to demonstrate next Sunday. He told them force would be used to stop them if they marched.

Dubcek's reform leadership faces a crucial power struggle with old guard Communists at a meeting beginning Thursday of the 160-member party central committee. The Dubcek group fears that more demonstration

will result in Soviet intervention to return the old guard to power.

The 21-member party Presidium issued a statement condemning those who "organized" demonstrations Oct. 28 and Nov. 7 when youths chanted "Russians go home" and burned Soviet flags.

Student groups made a personal appeal to Dubcek to authorize a demonstration Sunday to commemorate students executed by the Nazis and express opposition to the "occupation of any country by foreign armies."

Informants said Dubcek refused authorization and that Deputy Premier Gustav Husak charged the earlier demonstrations were instigated by "counter-revolutionaries."

Such a counter-revolutionary charge was used by the Soviet Union and forces of the Warsaw Pact allies to justify the Aug. 20 invasion.

The student groups did not indicate immediately whether they would call off their demonstration.

There were reports the old guard Communists, who want to completely reverse Dubcek's post-January reforms, might even try to oust the party boss at Thursday's Central Committee session.

On the other side, there is a Central Committee group that

wants no more retreat from the Moscow agreement legalizing reform policy. Frantisek Vods, the definite stay of occupation, a member of Parliament troops, said, "There is bound to be a vote against the Oct. 10 battle."

Utah Forwards 76-Foot Spruce

HEBER CITY, Utah (AP) — A 76-foot Engelmann spruce is on its way to Washington, D.C., where it will serve as the nation's Christmas tree.

The 115-year-old tree was cut Tuesday from a 7,000-foot elevation area of the Uinta National Forest east of Salt Lake City.

The elderly tree will be baled until it stands, decorated, in the Ellipse Gardens near the White House.

Slings were placed on the tree prior to cutting. A crane lifted the tree onto a specially constructed 65-foot trailer. A willow solution was sprayed over the tree for needle retention and it was transported to the railroad siding at Heber City.

The tree was gently placed on a flatcar. Thursday and Friday the tree will be wrapped with burlap, giving it the appearance of a giant mummy, and the burlap will be sealed to prevent loss of moisture. The tree will arrive in Washington Nov. 20, and President Johnson will light it Dec. 18 during the annual pageant of peace.

Queen Presents Wreath At Tomb

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II Tuesday presented a wreath at the monument to Bernardo O'Higgins, the father of Chile's independence.

O'Higgins died in 1842. His Irish-born father, Ambrosio O'Higgins, had been governor of Chile under the Spanish crown.

Thousands lined downtown streets to get a glimpse of the British queen and her husband, Prince Philip, as the royal couple proceeded in a horse-drawn carriage.

Sub Medic Snips Own Appendix

MOSCOW (AP)—A Soviet naval doctor on submarine duty in the Pacific decided to remove his own appendix when he realized the sub could not make port in time, Tass has reported. The Soviet news agency said the doctor-patient, Capt. Alexei Shapovalov, has fully recovered.

The Defense Ministry newspaper, Krasnaya Zvezda (Red Star) gave this account of the 2 1/2-hour operation. Shapovalov was assisted by a senior lieutenant and two sailors who handed him instruments and clamps as he needed them and stanchied the blood.

The doctor declined the use of a mirror and instead bent his head forward to see the incision. He probed blindly for the inflamed appendix, and when he thought he had found it asked the lieutenant to describe it for him.

The doctor used novocaine as a local anesthetic and several times had to rest during the operation. "Perspiration beaded his forehead," Krasnaya Zvezda reported.

The chief of the surgical department of the Soviet military medical faculty, Lt. Col. I. Derbin, said, "Such an operation is very rare. From medical literature we know of only five or six such cases and no previous case in the world in a submarine."

Negro Teens Seek Arrest In Protest

SWANQUARTER, N.C. (AP)—Negro teenagers who have been boycotting classes for six weeks have added the chant, "We Want to be Arrested!" to their protest of a Hyde County school integration plan.

An effort to provoke mass arrests Tuesday resulted in the booking of 47 teen-agers on charges of obstructing traffic. Other demonstrators regrouped at the county courthouse at dusk to shout, "We'll be back tomorrow!"

The North Carolina highway patrol boosted its force from 10 to 20 after a demonstration Monday during which police arrested only five or six teen-agers from the school superintendent's office in the courthouse.

A 17-year-old girl who fell from a second-story office of the courthouse during Monday's demonstration remained hospitalized with a pelvic injury. No smoke bombs or tear gas were used by officers during Tuesday's demonstration.

Of the 10 girls released on their own recognizance for court appearances.

Smoke Forces Inmates To Flee San Diego Cells

A dozen prisoners and nine jail employees were treated at a hospital for smoke inhalation. None was reported in serious condition. The fire apparently started when an acetylene torch ignited glue being used by workmen to install padding in the cell, firemen said.

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
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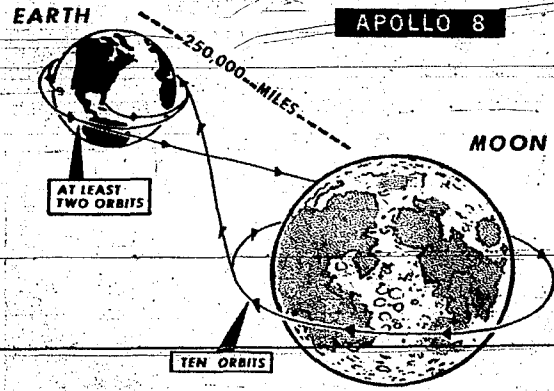

Plethora Of Chinese Rail 'Experts' Puzzles Tanzanians Planning Route

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (AP) — Tanzanians are beginning to wonder how many Red Chinese "rail experts" it will take to survey the 1,000-mile route for a railroad between this East African republic and neighboring Zambia.

Twice a month the liner Yaohua brings more Chinese, all designated "engineer-surveyor" for the Tanzania-Zambia rail link. So far more than 600 have arrived for a preliminary engineering survey.

If they are what they claim to be, each man will have less than two miles to survey—making the Tan-Zam line the most heavily surveyed railroad in the world. Peking has offered to finance and construct it at an estimated cost of \$240 million.

Flying red banners and the thoughts of Mao Tse-tung on large banners, the Yaohua has become a regular caller at Dar es Salaam. Large groups of Chinese shoppers and sightseers are a common sight, but Tanzanian police and the Chinese togetherness discourage approaches by inquisitive locals.

It is not known whether the "engineer-surveyors" have requested isolation, or whether the Tanzanian government wants it that way. But every time the Yaohua docks, Tanzanian police keep newsmen away, whisk the reds to their assigned quarters and place a heavy guard around the building.

One contingent of Chinese was housed at Dar es Salaam University during the college vacation. Police and "philanthropes" patrolled the grounds, keeping the Chinese and unauthorized Tanzanians apart.

Dirksen Says Nixon To Get Warren Letter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen says the letter of resignation of Chief Justice Earl Warren submitted to President Johnson holds over and could be accepted by Richard M. Nixon after he takes office.

"While the offer to retire was made to President Johnson, there is nothing to prevent the new president from acting on it," Dirksen said in an interview.

This view of the letter, submitted last June, addressed only to "My Dear Mr. President," is contrary to that held by Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and others who supported Johnson's unsuccessful nomination of Abe Fortas to succeed Warren.

"Of course," Dirksen added, "the chief justice has the option to retire at any time he chooses, even before the new president takes office."

Dirksen also said that despite the fact Nixon and Warren have been at political loggerheads since the days both were GOP figures in California, he has every expectation that Warren will administer the oath of office to Nixon Jan. 20. There has been no discussion of the matter between Warren and Nixon, other sources said.

Warren has been silent about his future plans since the Senate shelved the Fortas nomination Oct. 2.

Pontiff Hints Czech Reds Grow In Favor

WATKIN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI hinted today that despite the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia relations between the Vatican and the Prague government are again improving.

He dropped the hint at his weekly general audience, where he told a group of Czechoslovakians in the crowd of several thousand that developments in their country were being watched with great interest. He added: "We see with pleasure the start of a little more liberty and freedom of movement for the Catholic Church."

The remark was the firmest indication yet that the Vatican was optimistic that the Soviet occupation of Czechoslovakia had not doomed prospects for negotiations between the Holy See and the Czech government.

REHOBOTH BEACH, Del. (AP) — A grounded barge was the focus of salvage claims today, as leakage from its cargo of oil threatened to pollute the Delaware Bay resort community.

Ownership of the barge may be subject to the final interpretation of maritime law.

Two partners in a local motel and restaurant tied a line to the stranded barge Tuesday evening, claiming salvage rights.

word "abandonment" may be the final factor.

The Hess Huster, owned by Hess Oil Co., of Woodbridge, N.J., was enroute from Reading, N.J., to Delmar, N.J., Tuesday when a tow line snapped. It tossed and turned in the turbulent waters and wound up on a jetty some 150 yards from the boardwalk of this summer playground.

Two crewmen were safely rescued prior to the grounding. They were Ray Kossler, 45, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Toby Briseld of Iselin, N.J.

The vessel was carrying 1,085,000 gallons of oil, and for a while, officials feared the black liquid would pollute the entire Delaware Bay area.

The U.S. Coast Guard station at Cape May, N.J., said the oil was confined to a 300-yard area and would likely remain so.

A workman capped a damaged vent pipe today and the oil leak was stopped.

Dave Emmert, and his partner, Dave Herman, waded out to put a line on the barge and claim ownership. Upon return, the oil-smeared Herman said he had attached a line to the vent pipe and another to the anchor line.

"As long as I've got a line on the shore it's a valid claim," he said. "Once a person leaves a boat, it's up for open salvagers."

"All I want to do is sell it to one of those tugs and let them worry about it."

He was referring to four or five tugs standing at shore during the early morning hours, waiting to salvage the barge themselves.

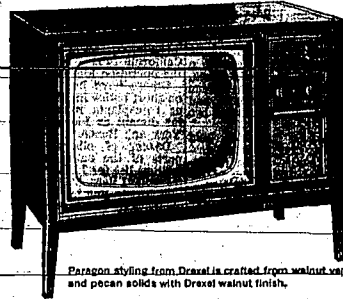

Hanoi's 'Fight-Talk' Tactic Stirs U.S. Vow To Retaliate

By JOHN T. WHEELER

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnam has made no secret of its fight-talk strategy but the U.S. Command says two can play that game and the allies can play it better and tougher than the enemy.

Hanoi propaganda says the strategy is to fight until North Vietnam wins concessions at the Paris peace talks; fight some

more for more concessions and use this pattern again and again until U.S. troops are forced to leave and the Saigon government crumbles.

Senior U.S. officers say the allies can play this game better and in the end it will be the North Vietnamese who must make concessions at Paris.

Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, U.S. commander in Vietnam, already is setting up his chessboard of war for a major allied offensive northwest, north and northeast of Saigon. His orders to his commanders are to apply pressure to the enemy on every front, seek out his battalions and destroy them, rout the Viet Cong infrastructure and destroy it and smash supply routes.

U.S. hopes for the offensive in the arc north of Saigon to sweep the big enemy units out of War Zone C and adjoining areas to the east and force them to seek refuge in Cambodia.

There is a strong cynicism within the U.S. Command over the possibility of any early negotiated settlement in Paris.

Tourist Rise Envisioned In Gem State

BOISE (AP) — A big winter tourist season was forecast for Idaho by an aviation official Tuesday at an airline roundtable in Boise sponsored by the State Department of Aeronautics.

Don Cooper, an executive in the Idaho district of Air West, said "We're looking for the biggest winter tourist season in Idaho that we've ever seen."

The biggest increase in traffic is expected to be to Sun Valley in South-Central Idaho mountains, he said. To accommodate it, he said, Air West has put pods on the underside of its mini-liners flying to Halley, for skis, to triple the planes' capacity.

Cooper said his firm also plans to operate six non-stop bus trips daily from Twin Falls to Sun Valley and return to connect with prop-jet flights into Twin Falls.

He said Air West had not had operational problems in Idaho since the newly-created merger of smaller airlines has had in some other areas.

The manager of Boise's municipal airport, Don Duval, told the group that the city's new airport terminal will be complete in about a month. The completion will also include surface of the parking area around the new terminal, built with a \$1.5 million bond issue.

British Inventor Dies In London

LONDON (AP) — Chdr. Sir Dornford Burney, inventor of a major anti-airplane weapon in World War I and builder of the British airship R100, has died in the Bahamas, friends reported today. He was 79.

Burney joined the Royal Navy at 15 and as a World War I lieutenant invented the explosive parachute, a device with a charge of TNT which was towed through the water and exploded on hitting a submarine. The British government awarded him more than \$1 million for this and other naval inventions.

He was a member of Parliament for seven years after World War I and in 1920 was in charge of designing and building the R100, at that time the largest and fastest airship in the world.

Burney performed secret work for the British government during World War II and later secured big work prospecting concessions in Northern Rhodesia.

Q. About six months ago I invested \$10,000 in American and Bunker-Ramo Corp. I am up 10 and will not need the money for another six years. I am even better off than I was when I put the money in. I would like your opinion on the prospects of these two issues.—B.

A. Although both stocks are speculative they have above average long-term potential, and should be held.

Home Agent Gives Advice On Selecting Striped Fabric

SHOSHONE — Lively stripes in clothing may play tricks on the eye, the county home economist — agent — cautions. Select carefully, she advises, if you want to be sure striped fabrics are becoming to your figure. The first problem involves direction of stripes. Should they be horizontal, vertical or diagonal? Don't jump to the conclusion that crosswise stripes make you seem shorter or that lengthwise stripes make you seem taller. The opposite may be true. The actual effect is determined by the way you see the stripes. If they are horizontal, the eyes may jump from one to the next line like climbing a ladder. In that case, height, not width, seems increased. By the same token, if your eyes stop at a horizontal strip and go across the figure, width seems to increase and the figure appears shorter.

Or your eyes may follow the length of the stripe and add height. What you see is determined by width of the stripes, distance between them and their color. Dimensions of your figure are important, too. The same striped fabric may do one thing to your figure and something else to a figure of different proportions. The longer and narrower the silhouette, the higher the "ladder" when crosswise stripes are used. The shorter and wider the silhouette, the more lines are likely to draw the eyes across the figure if the stripes are vertical. The more nearly vertical diagonal stripes are, the more slimming they are likely to be. Diagonal stripes can be seamed in the center front so that V's are formed. If the V's are upright, the lines make your shoulders appear wider. Inverted V's have a narrowing effect. To tell how a striped fabric will look on you, drape a length

Antique Boom Invades Attics In England

LONDON (AP)—The attics of England are fast losing their treasure troves as more and more Britons climb aboard the antique boom.

The discovery that old furniture, paintings and silver can be more profitable than the stock market—and a lot less risky—has been building up for some years as Britain staggered through one financial crisis after another. But devaluation of the pound last November put a rocket-blast behind it.

Britons scrambled to turn banknotes into tangible assets which no treasury chief could touch.

Now there's hardly a country house in the land that hasn't been raked over to see if Aunt Agatha's Victorian landscapes can be made to yield a dividend, or if there's a first edition of "Alice in Wonderland" lurking at the back of the bookcase.

When the mass-circulation Sunday newspaper "The People" invited its readers recently to send in particulars of paintings they would like valued by Sotheby's, the Bond Street dealers, the paper expected some 3,000 replies. It got 35,000 and is still trying to sort them out.

So heavy is the demand from the new breed of art investor that there seems a real danger that supply of genuine antiques—articles made before 1830—will run low.

As a result, the artifacts of the day before yesterday are gathering value, especially since U. S. Customs rules they could be shipped in duty-free.

Victoriana now can command high prices, but even the discards of the 1920s and 1930s find a ready market in the camp junk shops of Chelsea and Fulham. Meanwhile, in the real antique business, vast sums of money are changing hands across the Atlantic and the Channel.

"All the best things I've sold recently have gone abroad," one dealer told another in the Edwardian Pullman car that serves as coffee bar in Kensington's Antique Hypermarket—one of many multiple-stall marts springing up in central London at the rate of two a month.

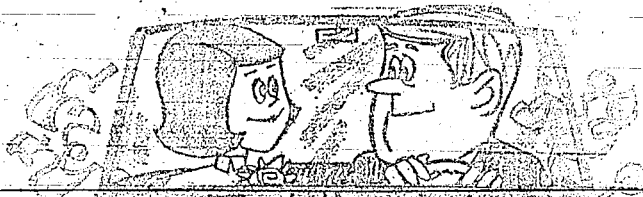
His friend gloomily agreed the "good stuff" was flowing out of the country in such quantities that he was finding it difficult to replenish his stock—a view that is contested by big-name dealers like Sotheby's and Christies, both of which racked up record seasons.

Such experts say the export of antiques is a two-way traffic. British dealers scour the world to recoup valuable pieces: a set of Chippendale chairs or Georgian silver might cross and recross the Atlantic several times in a generation, each time increasing in value.

The antiques frenzy has had some fascinating side effects. A prosperous London investment broker now finds it more profitable to advise clients on the purchase of works of art than on stocks and bonds.

Thieves are studying glossy publications like "The Connoisseur" and "Country Life"—and using such flimsies in their raids that they will take the Queen Anne coffee pot and leave the Victorian spoons.
