De Gaulle, Aides Confer In Crisis; Speculation Ebbs

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle conferred with Premier Maurice Couve de Murville and Finance Minister Francois-Xavier Ortoli on the European financial crisis today amid signs that the speculative frenzy was subsiding.

European money markets opened with heavy pressure on the British pound but on an otherwise quiet note following Couve de Murville's confident but vaguely phrased announcement that the Western industrial nations would not permit the French franc to collapse.

In a nationwide television interview Monday night, Couve de Murville partly blamed France's unbalanced budget for economic problems and announced austerity measures including a credit squeeze and cuts in subsidies to railroads and other public utilities.

Taxes Planned

BONN, Germany (AP) — Leaving the mark at its present value, the government announced tonight plans to clamp on immediate taxation measures to curb exports and ease imports to help the German balance of payments situation.

The chief government spokesman, Günter Diehl, said Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger had decided against revaluation of the mark after urgent consultations with his top advisers. Couve de Murville said nothing specific about how he intended to stop speculative pressure on the franc. Some financial experts said they were not convinced by his confidence in the absence of concrete measures to maintain monetary stability. There was still complete se-

crecy over decisions which may have been taken at the weekend meeting in Basel, Switzerland, of the governors of the leading central banks.

Continuing uncertainty over the central banks' counterattack may have done more than the preliminary speech to dampen last week's speculative fever.

On French money markets, the franc was again quoted at its official floor of 4940 francs to the dollar this morning, while the German mark remained slightly above the official ceiling of 125.290. The pound dropped one point to 11.8460, the lowest level for six months.

Swiss money markets opened even showed a fractional improvement by noon. However, Swiss banks were still limiting purchases of French currency bills. Frankfurt money dealers said the situation was unchanged from Monday, with continuing pressure on dollars, pounds and French francs caused by speculation that the German mark would be revalued.

Samuelson Asks Effort To Finish New Prison As Fast As Possible; Corrections Board Ousts Warden

BOISE (AP) — Orvil E. Stiles, warden of the Idaho State Penitentiary, was dismissed today by the State Board of Corrections. Operation of the prison has been subject to criticism in recent weeks because of a high rate of escapes, with about 30 inmates walking away this year. The board declined formal comment on the dismissal of Stiles.

Flu Vaccine Begins Trip To Help

WEST POINT, Pa. (AP) — The first government approved batch of Hong Kong influenza vaccine today began the fast trip to hospitals, pharmacies, and doctors' offices all across America. Officials are hopeful of checking a possible Asian flu epidemic.

Merck Sharp & Dohme, one of six drug firms working round-the-clock since September to produce the vaccine, announced approval of its first lot, 100,000 doses at its suburban Philadelphia plant here by the Federal Division of Biological Standards of the National Institutes of Health.

Other manufacturers expect to make shipments in a week or two.

Four Uninjured In Hailey Plane Crash

HAILEY — Four passengers walked away from a light plane owned and piloted by a Seattle optometrist, which crashed and burned during takeoff from the Hailey Airport Monday afternoon.

One passenger, Charles Hill, Bellevue, Wash., was treated for a gash on his head. Witnesses said that as the Beechcraft Baron on two-engine plane neared the end of the mile-long runway at about 90 feet altitude, one engine failed.

The plane veered to the left, crossed a power pole, crossed Highway 95 and knocked down a telephone pole before crashing to the ground on the Don Crane ranch.

The craft spun around so that it came to rest facing west. The Hailey fire department was called, but the fuselage was badly burned, witnesses reported. Both engines were knocked from the plane. It was snowing at the time of the crash, but the pilots had checked weather conditions with airport officials. He had come to Hailey to assist with an eye clinic.

Youth's Body Is Found In Snake River

RUPTERT — The body of a Rupert youth was recovered from the icy Snake River about 2 p.m. Monday by volunteer searchers, Sheriff Tom Johnson reports.

Officers said six boats manned by volunteers searched the search for Frank Laughing, 17, who disappeared in the river Sunday afternoon while he and two companions were attempting to wade across from the Casela side as a shortcut to their home on the Mindoka County side.

The body was found about 30 feet from where the victim's brother, Stanley Laughing, and Jimmy McCray, told officers he had disappeared. The other two boys decided to turn back about half way across the river when they realized the water was becoming deeper and swifter. Mr. Laughing was born Aug. 15, 1951, in Fort Defiance, Ariz., and was a student and a farm laborer. His family resides in Sawmill, Ariz., coming here to work during the harvest season. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Laughing, Rupert; four brothers, Tom Laughing Jr., Stanley Laughing, Richard Laughing and Stenson Laughing, all Rupert; two sisters, Sadie Laughing and Susan Laughing, and one half-sister, Mary Frances Brown, all Rupert.

Red Rocket Attack Pounds U.S. Base

SAIGON (AP) — At least 30 rounds of heavy rockets smashed into U.S. military installations near Da Nang late today in the second such attack in three days.

One of the rockets triggered a brilliant pillar of flame when it struck what may have been a South Vietnamese army ordnance depot. Otherwise there were no reports of damage or casualties elsewhere in the military area, which includes the U.S. Marine headquarters and a naval base.

South Vietnamese headquarters also reported three provincial capitals and six district towns were shelled by the enemy during the night. A spokesman said these attacks, plus two terrorist incidents, killed 29 South Vietnamese soldiers and 40 civilians. Wounded were 72 civilians and one soldier.

One battle was South of Da Nang, where the Vietnamese area commander says the enemy command has started its winter offensive in the north. The other was 15 miles south west of Saigon, where a South Vietnamese force is trying to capture a Viet Cong stronghold near the Cambodian border.

On the political front, the Saigon government appeared moving slowly toward a decision to send a delegation to the Paris peace talks. Some sources close to the government indicated President Nguyen Van Thieu has decided he has to end this

New Delay Is Apparent For Vietnam Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The expanded Vietnam peace talks face postponement for the third straight week Wednesday although the United States and South Vietnam are reported to be making a face-saving move that will end the deadlock on ailed representation.

Official sources making this statement said the talks, which began Monday, were optimistic that Saigon would soon announce its decision to send a delegation to the Paris talks in a short time. But there was no expectation that the stalled negotiations with Hanoi and the National Liberation Front could begin on schedule this week.

Vice President Nguyen Can, the former prime minister, was considered here to be the most likely choice for the South Vietnamese delegation.

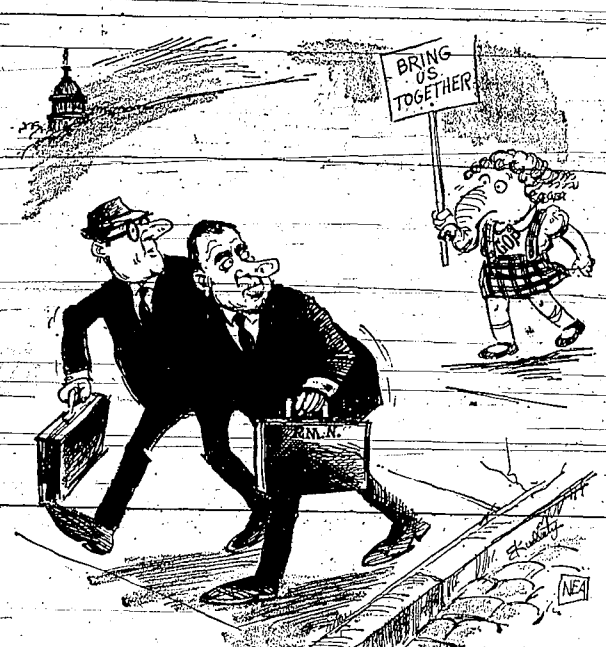

WASHINGTON — Occasionally, there is good news from the Cold War front. One example has been offered exclusively to this space, the story of how the United States espionage community knew almost as much as the Russians about Zand 5, the Soviet unmanned spacecraft which circled the moon last September...

Some of this intelligence was the product of electronic eavesdropping on official Soviet communications. But most of it came from human agents, one of them installed in the super-secret bureaucracy of the Russian space program...

The events leading up to the man's "disappearance" had all the elements of a spy thriller on the Late Late Show. What is known of his story begins with a meeting between the agent and his contact, a neutral diplomat in a Moscow subway train in late August...

As the train rattled its way under Moscow's streets, the spy filled in the diplomat on his situation. He was, he said, "under duress" and had been accepted by a member of the space program's security force as he left his office building...

The security man said he had obtained information about the spy's activities and named two items the agent had stolen from official records. The agent decided he had no choice but to accept the policeman's invitation to "drive out into the country for a little talk..."

Family Doctor

The week of November 17-23 has been designated "National Family Health Week" by presidential proclamation.

Peace-Keeper?

WASHINGTON (NEA) — It is already clear that Nixon as president will be no warhawk in world affairs. In Vietnam he is on record as favoring a peace in which members of the Viet Cong could vote and participate in government, providing they gave up the use of force and agreed to accept democratic processes.

Nixon has said: "Other nations must recognize that the role of the United States as world policeman is likely to be limited in the future." In every instance where an Asian nation comes under attack or is threatened, we must not automatically assume the burden of defense as we did in Korea and Vietnam.

Nixon wants, as president, to have a series of personal meetings with the top men of the Communist government in China. Washington — Moscow talks are held there are areas, as the Middle East, where the United States and Soviet Union are headed toward a confrontation that would explode into nuclear war.

Nixon is known to believe the United States must meet forces with the Arab world. He believes some way must be opened to talk to Nasser in Egypt. He thinks that while those talks are going on, the United States must develop influence with moderate Arabs.

Nixon favors a Middle East development program in which a series of nuclear desalting plants would supply arid Arab countries with fresh water. He estimates these nuclear plants could add 1,500 square miles of arable land and large amounts of cheap electricity, stimulating high productivity agriculture and new industry, raising Arab living standards and providing jobs for Arab refugees.

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U.S. Will Avoid Missile Conclave

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States is expected to sidestep mounting appeals in the United Nations for immediate talks between Washington and Moscow on limiting nuclear missile systems.

U.S. disarmament negotiator William Foster is scheduled to meet with the Soviet position on the arms question today in the General Assembly's main political committee. But U.S. officials predicted he would say little, if anything, about big-power arms negotiations.

The sources said there has been no change in the U.S. stand that the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia and the new Russian policy for Eastern Europe had dealt a severe setback to any U.S.-Soviet detente.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk said recently that the administration is deeply concerned over the "new Soviet doctrine" which Moscow made itself arbiter of the actions of East-European countries.

Rusk told newsmen that Soviet policy has damaged "a good many efforts that were being made to resolve particular problems in the general field of East-West relations."

U.S. sources said it was not known here whether the State Department has discussed the idea of U.S. Soviet arms talks with representatives of President-elect Richard M. Nixon.

There has been continuing contact between the State Department and Nixon's administration and Nixon's representatives, and it is known the government's stand on the overall arms issue has received bipartisan support.

Soviet Ambassador Jacob Malik told the committee last week that the Kremlin was still willing to start talks immediately on nuclear disarmament, but he appeared to have little hope of signing them before Nixon takes office.

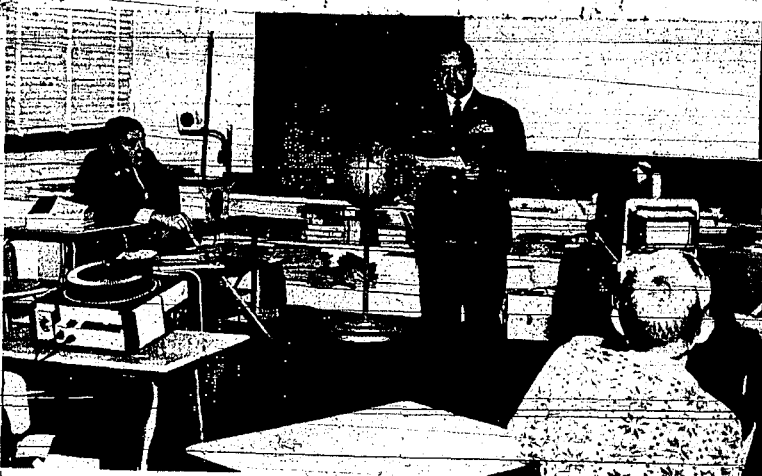

BOISE (AP) — A recent decision by the State Land Board to sell 1,700-acre tract on Payette-Lake is being assailed by an irresponsible State Sen. Arl Manley, D-Coeur d'Alene, said Monday.

The board had decided to sell to the highest bidder the Payette-Lake tract on the north shore of Payette Lake. The sale was requested by a group of Idaho businessmen who want to develop the land.

Utah Prison Puts New Lid On Security After Escape

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — Two men, convicted of killing a policeman, are still at-large following a weekend escape at the State Prison, where two guards have been fired and security is being tightened.

Changes in security procedures have been recommended by the State Board of Corrections.

Gov. Clavin L. Rasmussen said he still has confidence in Warden John W. Turner and Ernest D. Wright, corrections division director, "as adequate prison authorities."

Still at large are Michael Patrick Jones, 22, of Berkeley, Calif., serving a life sentence for the 1963 slaying of an Ogden, Utah, policeman, and Frank Lopez, 26, of Rock Springs, Wyo., convicted of grand larceny.

Jones, Lopez and seven others at the prison's high-security facility escaped through the vents.

Among the escapees were William Walters of Fresno, Calif., convicted of slaying a prison guard in 1966; Myron D. Lance and Walter B. Kelbach, both sentenced to be executed for a Christmas shooting spree two years ago in which six persons were killed.

The Board of Corrections fired Sgts. C. F. Bair, 47, employed at the prison six years, and Sanford M. Healey, 60, employed 15 years. Lt. John Johnston was given a 30-day suspension and will be transferred to another assignment.

The escape Friday night was not discovered until noon Saturday.

Fight 'Cooled'

Oregon Nets \$80 Million Japan Pact

TOKYO (AP) — The Oregon trade mission has an \$80 million contract to bring home an agreement signed Monday to supply wood chips to a Japanese newsprint plant for 10 years.

Kenneth W. Ford, president of Roseburg Lumber Co. of Roseburg, Ore., signed the contract to supply chips to Oji Paper Co. spokesman for the 31-man Oregon mission, Fritz Timmens, said.

Yamashita - Shinjion Steamship Co. Ltd. of Japan is building a vessel, to be in service in 1969, to carry the chips from the Oregon port of Coos Bay.

Gov. Tom McCall visited Oji's plant in Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost main island, Sunday and said plant officials told him they needed a continuous supply of chips to carry out expansion that would make the plant the world's largest producer of newsprint.

Oji says the plant now ranks behind MacMillan, Bloedel and Powell River Ltd. of Canada and Northern Co. of the United States in newsprint production.

So far, Timmens said, the mission has encountered no signs the Japanese will relax new U.S. restrictions limiting export of timber from federally owned lands.

U. S. Educator Seeks 'Active' Community Aid

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Educators alone "cannot" make the school succeed with every youngster, says the chief educator.

U.S. Education Commissioner Harold Howe — said educators need the active involvement of the community, "something they have been able to get in more fortunate areas, but have largely failed to achieve among the poor and among those who are discriminated against."

He told the annual meeting of the Council of Chief State School Officers Monday, bringing these people into the power structure of education would create controversy, but it would be controversy worth having, for out of it could come progress.

Howe noted the Office of Education "has requested school officials at the state and local levels to provide for such participation in the conduct of federally sponsored programs."

He said many representatives of the poor "honestly believe that we cannot, or will not change the schools to serve their children. That is why they are seeking either to control the schools or to set up alternative institutions."

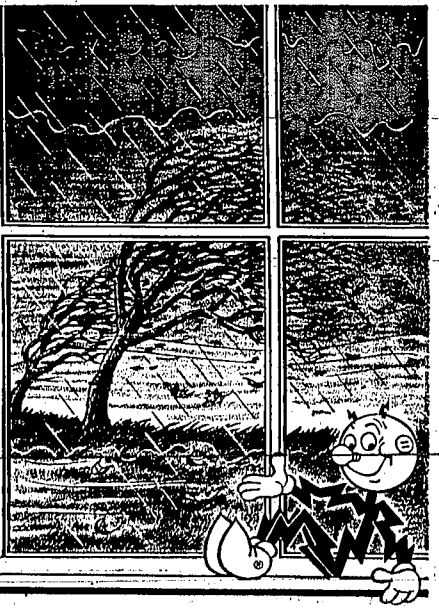

School Chief Says Trustees Can Set Policy

BOISE (AP) — The final decision on courses offered in Idaho public schools including sex education rests with the local school boards, D. F. Engking, superintendent of public instruction, said Monday.

He said in a statement the Department of Education has received a number of inquiries as a result of a family living conference held in Boise Saturday under sponsorship of the Idaho Education Association. The subject of sex education in public schools was among those discussed.

"The state Board of Education by law has the authority to recommend minimum courses of study," Engking said. "However, the law does not give the board the power to limit what can be taught in a public school. This is up to the local trustees."

He said a committee appointed by the state board is studying a new series of health studies.

Some 260 persons attended the state board conference. The principal speaker was Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall of Oregon State University.

Reds Spurn Offer To Buy Information On Captive

PARIS (AP) — An American offering \$1 million for information about Hugh Francis Redmond sits in a hotel room here and waits for the Red Chinese to call.

The money was raised by public subscription to buy Redmond's release. But since July 4, 1957 the Red Chinese have cut off all news about him.

"We're now at the point where the money is for buying information," said Friedman, "is he dead or alive? How can we find out? His 72-year-old mother is literally tortured by not knowing."

Redmond, 48, also of Yonkers, was arrested in Shanghai in 1951 and sentenced to life imprisonment in 1954 on charges of maintaining contact with U.S. intelligence agents in Hong Kong.

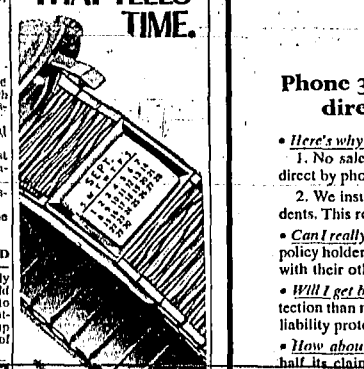

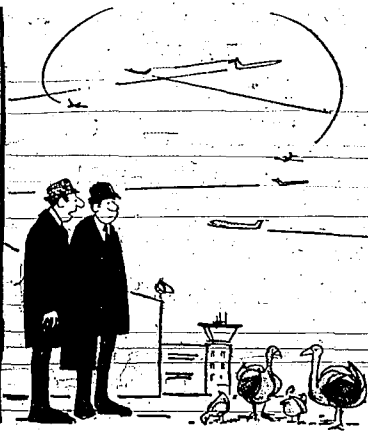

Parking, Road Improvements Completed At Mormon Reservoir Near Fairfield

FAIRFIELD — Construction work for this fall has been about completed by the Fish and Game Department at Mormon Reservoir. Three big car and trailer parking areas have been leveled and covered with gravel fill. Many more units can be parked on the enlarged pads. Last year some sagebrush was cleared for parking. Some sanitary facilities and garbage cans were placed on the site. The new plans call for the fencing off of the points to prevent trailer parking which has caused a refuse problem. All campers and trailers in the future are to be parked in the newly constructed areas where more sanitary facilities and garbage disposal equipment will be placed, according to Don Saxman, local conservation officer. Access to the points can be done by walking as the present roads have been destroyed or eliminated by the construction program. The county waterways committee has constructed concrete additions to the boat ramps and all boats are to be launched at the dam. The boat trailer parking space has been enlarged and the cattle guard placed on the road leading to the site. The Pacific Power Co. has run lines to the parking areas and it is expected that electricity will be available this coming season. Trespassing on private land and littering of private land has been a problem at this popular fishing resort. It is hoped that with the new construction and improvements that the public will abide by the rules that will be posted on signs.

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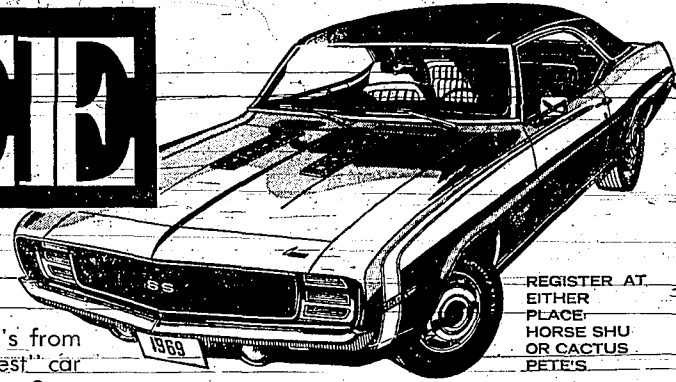

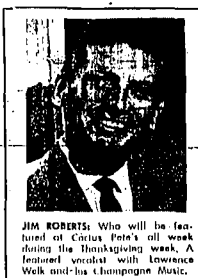

JEROME — Christmas has all year in the HOPE (Help Other People Everywhere) center, now a community service center.

It is located at 325 West Main in a vacant service station which was generously donated for use by a local professional man. All the items at the HOPE center are donated by generous, concerned citizens of the Magic Valley.

Some small charges are made for items received to help cover the cost of utilities and other expenses and for postage. If the need is immediate, and the person is unable to pay, the need is still met, and a donation can be made later or the recipient may do mending, washing or ironing.

The center is open each afternoon except Sunday from 1 to 4:30 p.m. It is operated by volunteers who aid visitors of HOPE in the areas of clothing, repairing and mending of clothes, ironing and mending of clothes, repair toys or whatever needs to be done. Everyone is welcome to help, including those who need a helping hand.

The seed that grew into HOPE was conceived when interested citizens became aware and wanted to do something about the needs of the adults and children at the local labor camp.

Through cooperation with the city council, the children were permitted to swim without charge at the local swimming pool. Swimming lessons were provided for the children. Household items were collected and distributed, and music, singing and ice cream and cake were provided for evenings of entertainment.

As time went on, more people became involved and aware of needs in our local area around the world. Thus, HOPE, through love and willingness to be involved by many people, became a reality.

HOPE officers were elected with Mrs. E. Stockton as president, Mrs. Marvin Moorhead, vice president, Mrs. Genevieve W. Winters, secretary, and Mrs. James Stolt, secretary.

The organization helps anyone who is in need and cooperates with churches, civic organizations and any city, county, state or federal government that asks for their help. HOPE is completely non-denominational and in no way connected with any government agency except in its concern for helping people.

The first opportunity to help came when a local family was completely burned out. Clothing and household items were needed and the community responded. Families in Jerome, Hazelton, Eden, Wendell, Hagerman, Dahi, Gooding and Twin Falls have found much needed clothing at a small fee or at no cost.

Some families have also received temporary supply of emergency food, transportation for elderly and ill have been provided, and emergency baby-sitting has been provided. Breading and household items such as heating stoves and washing machines have been supplied in special cases.

Harvest time brought the Spanish American families back to the Labor Camp where housing is provided, but there were no curtains for the windows. HOPE again came to the aid, and from donated curtains and material, helpers are making curtains for 200 windows which will be hung in the spring.

There are many other needs that HOPE will endeavor to fill. One of the most important needs for the migrant is education. All efforts are made to enroll the children in public school and provide extra tutoring, where needed.

In the area of child and adult education for the migrant, many avenues are being investigated. One of the most exciting possibilities has arisen, when a very exceptional man, who is presently teaching at Mater-Cleri-Seminary in Colbert, Wash., and has spent 10 years in China, offered his services as a teacher for the migrants.

The only salary he requested was a bed, table, food, and an orange crate for his books. This is still in the dreaming stage but the man said, "anything the mind can conceive is possible."

Besides helping local families, several other projects have been completed. Recently Mrs. Marlene Brown took several boxes of household items to the Ruerst, in late October, a truck load of warm clothing and a few household items was taken to the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

"Happy Holidays in Vietnam" became the over-enthusiastic project. Personal items for the troops, even such as razor blades, stationery, books and pre-sweetened koolaid, all kinds of clothing for refugees, children, sewing supplies and small tools to be used in rebuilding their homes were collected through the schools and local merchants.

These things were sent to one of our own service units in Vietnam and will be distributed to the war-torn areas, men and to refugees in hospitals and orphanages.

Toys and dolls were brought to the HOPE open house and are still being brought in. These will be used at Christmas. Mrs. Jake Reichard is the doll doctor and actively repairs any old toys, or new toys, or needs new clothes. Jake Reichard is the repairman and is busy repairing toys for the merry Christmas for everyone.

HOPE has prepared a number of boxes of clothing and blankets in cooperation with the HOPE open house and will be held at the Ida Gem Dairy auditorium. The proceeds will be used to fill Christmas baskets. The public is invited and a small admission will be charged.

The area of being involved are not material but they are heart warming. There is need not only in Magic Valley but throughout the world, and through HOPE in Jerome and the concern of many wonderful people in Magic Valley these needs are being met.

Wendell School Sells Paperbacks

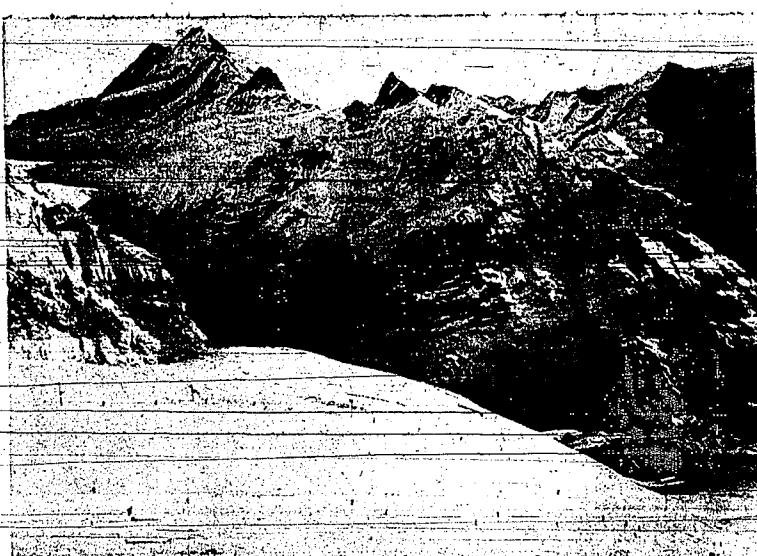

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Court Endorses Death Sentence

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The California Supreme Court in ruling that the death penalty is constitutional, opened the door to new penalty trials for almost all the 85 men and one woman now awaiting the San Quentin gas chamber.

The convictions stand. But the court also ruled Monday that justices in two cases on appeal will have to decide, once again, whether death or life imprisonment should be imposed as punishment.

By extension, the principle applies to most of the other 84 cases, said Steve Raston, West Coast director of the legal defense fund of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People which filed the appeals more than a year ago.

At San Quentin, Associate Warden James W. L. Park said the decision did not seem unexpected to the 83 men on death row.

"Their reaction is restrained until they see the actual decision and find out what it means for each one of them," Park said.

Park said one condemned man is not on death row before a court and a condemned woman is in the state women's prison at Corona. The 86th candidate for the gas chamber is due to be formally sentenced Friday.

The State Supreme Court's 4-3 decision was written by Justice Louis H. Burke, who ruled that capital punishment has been employed throughout history and cannot be challenged as cruel or unusual under either federal or state constitutions.

"I think it is the law," said Gov. Ronald Reagan. "I concur with it as a proper decision."

Reagan favors the death penalty as a deterrent to crime.

Former Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who fought for years to abolish the death penalty, agreed partly with the decision.

"Capital punishment should be abolished," he said. "But not by the courts. This is a matter for the legislature."

The two new penalty trials ordered by the state high court are for Robert Page Anderson, 32, convicted of a San Diego

Panel Vote Speeds Watts Rebuilding

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The multimillion-dollar neighborhood say City officials. After 550 families are moved to temporary lodging to make way for construction, they will be offered apartments for home loans to move back when it's finished.

In a 6-1 decision the court held that jurors opposing the death penalty were excluded in the original trials. The ruling follows the recent U.S. Supreme Court's Witherspoon decision banning the automatic exclusion of jurors opposing capital punishment.
