## 4-Party Vietnam Talks Expected To Bog Down

PARIS (AP) — Four-party Vietnam peace talks with a Saigon delegation participating are expected to begin the week of Dec. 8. U.S. diplomats say the talks on the other side of the procedural battle to be hammered out at the conference itself, not before, the source said.

South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu announced Wednesday he will end his month-long boycott of the talks to show the good will of the Republic of Vietnam and test the good faith of Hanoi.

But he stressed that the Saigon group still would not recognize the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front as a separate negotiating entity. "We will regard and treat all the persons on the other side of the procedural battle as a single side, that of Hanoi," he said.

An NLF spokesman said his delegation will attend the conference of the four on the basis of equality with the other parties. The NLF, supported by Hanoi, claims the Saigon regime is a U.S. "puppet," and therefore the Viet Cong are "authentic representatives of the population of South Vietnam."

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## While Some GI's Eat Turkey, Fighting Reported Near Border

SAIGON (AP) — While thousands of U.S. troops celebrated Thanksgiving, the heaviest fighting in 2 1/2 months was reported along the Cambodian border today.

Military spokesmen said 255 enemy soldiers were killed in five days of fighting along the border on Wednesday and today.

Intelligence reports estimate 15,000 to 20,000 enemy troops along 100-mile stretch of border. The late reports of heavy fighting in the area appeared earlier to be a quiet Thanksgiving Day with GI's sitting down to plates of hot turkey.

Three of the fights near the Cambodian border raged in Tay Ninh Province where the enemy launched offensives in mid-October and again in mid-September. The two others were farther north along the border near the key district town of Loc Binh.

## Thanksgiving Is Time For Families, Stuffed Turkeys And Prayers

Thanksgiving Day, an American tradition older than the nation, is once again a time for families and reunions, sports, picnics and stuffed turkeys.

It is the day the nation goes home to dinner and Americans from Maine to California planned to sit down with their relatives and share the traditional feast and all the trimmings.

President Johnson gathered his family and some friends at his Texas ranch to observe the day with church-going and a turkey dinner. Among the family were his baby grandson and

new granddaughter. But like many other American families some of the men were absent. Many of the President's sons-in-law, Almarin I.C. Patrick, J. Nugent and Marine Maj. Charles S. Smith were having their turkey in Vietnam.

President-elect Richard M. Nixon and his family join the family of alling former President Dwight D. Eisenhower for dinner at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington. Eisenhower is recuperating from a series of heart attacks.

In Vietnam, the 530,000 U.S. troops had their turkey amid hopes that the next Thanksgiving will be celebrated at home.

In a message to his troops, Gen. Creighton W. Parham, 3rd, said they should give thanks that as free men they have been privileged to give a measure of their own lives in the service of their country.

The first American Thanksgiving was celebrated by the Plymouth, Mass., colonists in 1621, less than a year after they arrived in the new land seeking freedom from worship as they pleased.

The first winter killed nearly half their number but hopes were rekindled the following summer when the harvest was good.

## Pinch Felt

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle's drive-in-theater austerity program apparently has hit the French government's social whisky, vodka and caviar reception attended by the general.

Government officials had to make do with champagne, cognac and wine and a caviar dinner at a reception given for members of the French parliament by Jacques Chaban-Delmas, minister of the National Assembly.

## \$301,700 Low Bid Submitted For Hospital Remodeling Work

The apparent low bidder for the modernization project at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital is Reynolds Construction Co., Inc. of Twin Falls, Idaho.

County Commission Chairman Heber Loughmiller said the bid was for \$301,700. The bids were received Tuesday night by the hospital board.

The plan calls for completion of electrical wiring to enable future installation of a condensing units in patient rooms, expansion of the present operating area and addition of vacuum systems and patient room. Also to be included will be a fire alarm system and provision for a security room.

Fire alarm systems are now required in hospital construction or modernization. Among other items to be included in the project will be a new lighting arrangement in patient rooms and a security room.

## French Leaders Think Moves To Save Franc Will Increase Cost Of Living

PARIS (AP) — French government leaders believe the new franc stabilization package will raise the cost of living by 2 to 3 percent, but some businessmen say it may be as high as 5 percent.

The Gaullist-controlled Chamber of Deputies Tuesday approved President Charles de Gaulle's monetary program by a vote of 391 to 101.

The bill adjusts exchange rates and changes to favor exports and imports. It also provides for a new franc to be issued in 1970.

The lower house, the Senate, also will vote on the measure but its power can be overridden by the National Assembly, where the Gaullists and their allies hold a 353 to 486 vote.

## CSI To Ask Library Grant Of \$330,000

Application for a \$330,000 grant to construct a material resources center (library) at the College of Southern Idaho will be made Monday in Boise by Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president.

Dr. Taylor said that a supplemental application may be made at a future date. The application when filed will be submitted to the Higher Education Facilities fund which will be available to Idaho in 1969.

The funds will be from Title I, HEW act. Dr. Taylor said. Application will be made to the HEW committee in Boise.

Dr. Taylor said that the \$330,000 grant will be for the construction of a new building for the library and the CSI tower and will be the main surrounding the tower.

## Another Blast Thunders In Mine

MANNINGTON, W. Va., (AP) — Another explosion thundered through the deep coal mine today where 78 men have been trapped for more than a week.

Flames and smoke spewed from one of the big mine's entrances. Company spokesmen termed the 28th one-blast a "major explosion." It was the 15th in a series of blasts since the first blast trapped the men early on Nov. 20. The other 21 men on the shift with them escaped.

The explosion this morning was another setback in the long rescue mission to reach the 78 men who there has been no contact since they were entombed. Fear of explosions has prevented more search teams from probing into the mine where an intense fire deep in its pits rages uncontrolled.

The eruption today was at the Mahan shaft where the last blast occurred on Tuesday afternoon. Company spokesmen said at that time it did not surprise them since the Mahan and Llewellyn shafts—site of the first explosion—were "like two big smokestacks with the fire between them."

The blast today made any Thanksgiving plans for those who are waiting word of husbands and fathers even more gloomy.

## Albion College Receives Grant

MAGIC VALLEY CHRISTIAN COLLEGE, Albion—Magic Valley Christian College has received \$2,000 through the General Electric Foundation's Corporate Alumnus program, according to a Foundation report. The Albion school was one of 751 schools benefiting from the Corporate Alumnus Program in 1967, when 8,574 General Electric employees contributed \$1,017,002 to institutions of higher learning.

The Foundation matched \$540,950 of this amount, bringing total support for colleges and universities by the Corporate Alumnus Program for 1967 to \$1,557,952.

The program provides that individual General Electric employee contributions of up to \$2,000 per year to colleges and universities will be matched by the G. E. Foundation on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Any employee who has been with the company at least a year may contribute to any two- or four-year school, public or private, including graduate and professional institutions, and need not have attended the school to which he makes a gift.

The General Electric Foundation pioneered the program in 1955 and since that time 500 schools have received a total of more than \$10,096,614 in gifts and matching grants.

During those same years, more than 430 other companies and foundations have established similar gift-matching programs to aid educational institutions.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has rejected a Soviet protest against a new North Atlantic Treaty Organization command charged with air surveillance of the Mediterranean Sea, where the number of Russian warships has increased sizably.

# Famed Ex-Convict To Speak In T.F.

Not too long ago a man published a book that took America by storm. "My Shadow Ran Fast" was a bestseller in any man's language, and it could well become the "bible" for the treatment of convicts throughout the country.

Bill Sands, who wrote the book, knows what he is talking about. He served time in San Quentin and once shared a cell with Cary Chessman, a rapist who was put to death eight years ago.

Mr. Sands admits he would have killed someone if he hadn't changed the direction of his life.

The change in direction has been of benefit to many prisoners and ex-convicts throughout America.

On Dec. 12, Mr. Sands will come to Twin Falls. His trip is being sponsored by the Twin Falls Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs, and seats at the College of Southern Idaho fine arts center are going fast.

Students from 18 area high schools have been invited to attend the talk, and indications are people from throughout the state, and even from nearby states, will also attend.

Mr. Sands is an adventurer, an author and has been described as one of the most interesting speakers of this age. Time and Newsweek magazines have carried articles about Mr. Sands' efforts to help the ex-convict on the road to rehabilitation.

Through his efforts, only 10 per cent of 5,000 ex-convicts have been returned to prison. The national average is between 60 and 80 per cent.

Mr. Sands calls his effort the Seventh Step. It calls for help from all levels of society. From the businessman and the professional man to the presidents of community clubs.

His talks are also aimed at keeping the juvenile out of prison. Vernon Riddle and William Langley, presidents of the Twin Falls Kiwanis and Rotary re-

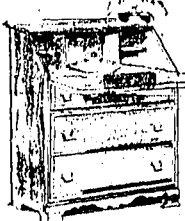

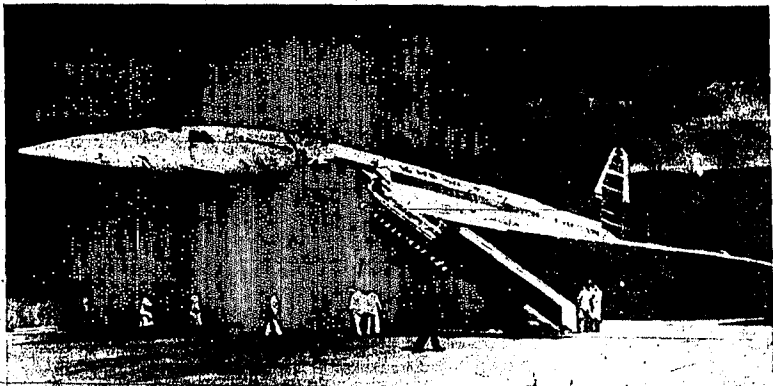

## Idahoans Celebrate Holiday

Idahoans celebrated Thanksgiving Day today, with most businesses and all government offices closed.

Tables for roast turkey and television fare of football games awaited those staying home, while in Southwest Idaho skiers could travel to Brundage Mountain or Bogus Basin to begin the winter sports season.

Students in public schools and colleges began their four-day vacation and will have a chance to begin their Christmas shopping before returning to classes.

Most stores and government offices planned to be open for business Friday, but in some cases state employees could take the day off as part of their regular annual leave.

State Police Supt. L. Clark Hand and Gov. Don W. Samuelson urged Idahoans to drive with care during the week-end and to drive with their car lights on to show they realized the need for safety.

Last year, three persons were killed in Thanksgiving Day traffic accidents in Idaho.

Samuelson, in proclaiming the holiday, quoted an 1893 Lewiston Tribune editorial which said all persons should give thanks not because it is Thanksgiving Day, but because "We should never allow a day to pass without seriously contemplating the good that the Maker has surrounded us with."

The governor termed the "glowing and memorable tribute" of 75 years ago "entirely fitting" for the 1968 Thanksgiving.

Samuelson planned to spend today with his family in Boise. He planned a Saturday trip to Gooding, where Sun Valley Airlines planned to formally inaugurate service at the Gooding airport.

## Borman, Lovell, Anders Practice Daily For Ambitious Space Flight

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Every weekday, astronauts Frank Borman, James A. Lovell Jr. and William A. Anders slip into a spacecraft simulator and spend six hours practicing for man's most ambitious space flight yet.

On Dec. 21, they are to ride the force of a Saturn 5 rocket on a six-day journey that will take them into orbit around the moon on Christmas Eve and part of Christmas Day and return to Earth.

When they're not in the simulator, the astronauts are discussing the flight with members of the launch team and reviewing a very demanding flight plan.

On most weekends, Air Force Col. Borman, Navy Capt. Lovell and Air Force Maj. Anders fly to the manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Tex., to tussle with flight controllers, experts and specialists on lunar geology and geography.

"We started training for this particular mission in August," Borman said, "and we haven't been pursuing it rather heavily since then."

ever since. One thing that is different from any of the other missions we've had is the fact that we're doing a lot of specialized training.

"Bill Anders is really the systems man, and Jim Lovell knows the navigation and guidance equipment, and I guess I don't do anything but kibitz," joked Borman, who will command Apollo 8.

"We usually get up about 6:15 a.m. and get out to the simulator by 8," he explained. "Many nights we don't end up until 11 or 12."

In the simulator, they are to rehearse every phase of the mission. Stereoscopic maps of the moon, constructed from pictures taken by the unmanned lunar orbiter satellites, are projected outside their windows so they'll have a sense of what it will be like as they orbit the moon for 20 hours at an altitude of 69 miles.

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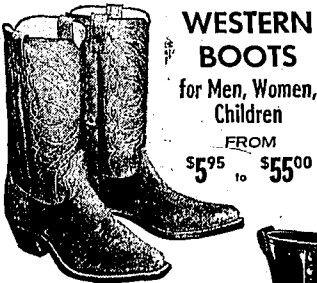
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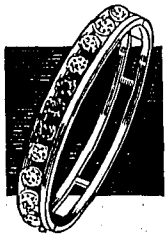

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# Sato Wins Election In Japan

**TOKYO (AP)** — Eisaku Sato won a third term as Japan's prime minister Wednesday after pledging to gain the early return of Okinawa and the other Ryukyu Islands from the United States.

He told a news conference after the election he plans to form a new "action cabinet," possibly over the weekend.

In beating back his strongest opposition since taking office in 1964, Sato won 295 votes—21 more than he needed—to retain the presidency of his conservative Liberal Democratic party and with it the premiership.

His nearest rivals in the voting at a party convention were former Foreign Minister Takeo Miki, with 177 votes, and former party Secretary-General Shigesaburo Maco, who received 95. One of the 454 votes cast went to former Foreign Minister Aichi-ro Fujiyama and two were invalid.

Japanese business leaders expressed their pleasure at Sato's re-election and urged him to unify the party for new assaults on problems of national security, student unrest and the rising cost of living.

Leftist opposition leaders immediately charged that Sato would join U.S. President-elect Richard M. Nixon in turning Japan into an anti-Communist base in Asia.

Socialist Secretary-General Saburo Eda predicted Sato would be forced out before his term ends because of collaboration with Nixon, and Democratic Socialist Party Chairman Eichi Nishimura warned the prime minister not to yield to pressure from Nixon.

A Communist party spokesman asserted that Sato would reduce Japan to a position inferior to the United States while strengthening Tokyo's military alliance with Washington.

There were no nominating speeches or demonstrations in the Hibya Public Hall in downtown Tokyo, no hippies outside and almost no applause. Voting was by secret ballot on stage in front of the delegates and spectators.

About 50 radical students assembled to march half a mile to the convention site but were dispersed by police before the march began.

The students want the U.S.-Japan security treaty scrapped.

What is seen here as American reluctance to pursue the Vietnam war is considered by some Formosan circles as an indication that the United States might be less interested in defending Quemoy in the future than it was in the past.

These fears are not being erased by Washington's eagerness to cut back military aid.

# When Does The Work Begin?

## Amendment Perplexes Legislators

**BOISE (AP)** — Legislative leaders, state officials and legal experts were in general agreement Wednesday that the 1969 Idaho Legislature will begin its regular session Jan. 13. They said the constitutional amendment requiring annual sessions of the legislature, which was approved by voters in the Nov. 5 general election, was effective upon approval.

The state Board of Canvassing last Monday, certified the results of the voting. It says the legislature will meet each year on the second Monday of January. In 1969 this is Jan. 13.

There was no question as to when the 1969 legislature will meet for its organizing session. A law enacted in 1967 specified the lawmakers would meet on the first Thursday in December, or Dec. 5 this year.

Legislative leaders already have advised lawmakers by letter that the session will convene at 1 p.m. The afternoon start was decided upon so that lawmakers would not need to be in Boise the night before.

Party caucuses probably will be held shortly after the 1 p.m. convening. The House already has decided on that course and the Senate is expected to follow, although the amendment might call for caucuses during the morning. Prior to adoption of the amendment the constitution specified that the legislature meet in odd-numbered years on the first Monday after Jan. 1.

When the amendment substituting annual sessions was drafted during the 1967 legislature, the authors had the situation in mind. To avoid a recurrence they fixed the second Monday in January for the start.

Left unchanged in the constitution is a provision that terms of elected state officials begin on the first Monday in January. Thus, new Supreme Court justices elected this year will begin their terms in office on Jan. 1, even though the legislature doesn't meet until one week later.

There have been instances in the past, too, when the legislature met a week after inauguration of state officials. That occurred when Jan. 1 came on a Monday — and officials were inaugurated that day, although the legislature didn't meet until a week later.

# Embattled Quemoy Garrison Continues Preparing For War With Communists

By PETER ARNETT

**QUEMOY ISLAND, Nationalist China (AP)** — The muffled burst of an artillery shell from mainland China, by official count the 300,000th to explode over the offshore islands in 10 years, echoed across the rock-strewn ridges flanking a field where a plow girl in stretch pants neatly turned the furrows.

She seemed more interested in avoiding a tall gun emplacement recently erected in the field. Soldiers were sloshing green and brown paint on the concrete and pulling a wide black net over the top to camouflage the anti-aircraft guns.

The plow girl carefully traced a half-moon furrow around the pillow, then headed homeward past an adjoining strip of land planted with sharp rocks and wooden stakes intended as bad news for enemy paratroopers.

A working party of dusty soldiers, picks and shovels over their shoulders, marched down a ridge between cottage-sized boulders after a long day ended, but tomorrow these soldiers and legions more would be back to continue the construction of tunnels, forts and bunkers. The pace of activity has gone on unabated for 20 years. This vigilance springs from the fact that the coast of Communist China arcs around three sides of Quemoy. Shells that whip in now are filled with propaganda leaflets, but Quemoyans know that the estimated 500 enemy guns within range could easily load real ammunition.

And the China across the water is militant, as the 60,000 Quemoy garrison has discovered on half a dozen bastions.

Quemoy looks as vulnerable a bastion as any in history, and as one American military officer commented, the Chinese know the fate of many bastions.

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## Educator Resigns Top Post

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Blaming pressures from trustees, faculty, militant students and "political forces," Robert R. Smith abruptly ended his six-month term as president of embattled San Francisco State College.

Gov. Ronald Reagan and other trustees of California's 19-campus college system unanimously accepted Smith's resignation Tuesday and named Prof. S.I. Hayakawa, internationally known semanticist, as acting president.

Reagan, college leaders and Hayakawa expressed doubts that the overnight change in presidents would be enough to pacify protesting students and bring the campus back to normal soon.

"Hayakawa will go out faster than Smith," Prof. Nathan Hare, Negro coordinator of the San Francisco State black studies program, said in San Francisco.

"I can say without hesitation," Reagan said, Smith's resignation "was not requested."

Black and ethnic studies programs and other demands from campus minority group students have been the focal point of demonstrations, a student strike and intermittent violence that kept San Francisco State's classes closed for most of the past three weeks.

The campus has 18,000 students and about 1,100 faculty members.

One demand calls for reinstatement of Black Panther George Murray, a part-time English instructor suspended by the college system's Chancellor Glen S. Dumke, early this month. Murray is being investigated by campus officials for reported remarks in speeches, such as urging Negro students to carry guns on campus.

Smith also cited desperate limitations in financial resources as one reason for his request to return to work as an education professor.

Smith said one reason for his resignation was "inability to reconcile effectively the conflicts between the trustees and chancellor, the faculty groups on campus, the militant student groups and political forces of the state."

Smith had agreed to discussion of the issues during campus-wide convocations which succeeded classes, although trustees had ordered normal campus routine resumed following a shutdown Nov. 13-20.

Hayakawa ordered the convocations ended Tuesday night. But he said he didn't know if classes would resume as planned Monday.

## European Spies Stir Alarm

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is considering moving its nuclear weapons Westward in Western Europe to new hiding places for fear spies have pinpointed their present location for the Soviet Union.

Officials say they can't be sure how much Russia knows, but they became concerned after a top German officer was found shot to death and a Turkish diplomat was arrested.

It's feared the Soviets may possess technical data on sophisticated nuclear weapons and North Atlantic Treaty Organization war plans.

Interrogation of Nihat Imre, Turkish senior administrative official at supreme headquarters of the allied powers in Brussels, is hoped to reveal how much Russia knows. He is being questioned in Ankara, Turkey.

Imre was arrested Oct. 6 and charged with espionage. Three days later German Rear Admiral Hermann Luedke was found shot to death in a hunting area. He had just retired as NATO deputy chief of logistics and supply planning.

"Luedke could have had access to physical inventories, location of bases," said a senior U.S. official.

The United States has about 7,200 tactical nuclear weapons stored in Europe including battlefield missiles, artillery and fighter-bomber ammunition. Warheads are stored separately

NEW YORK (AP) — Vice President-elect Spiro T. Agnew met Wednesday with the president-elect, Richard M. Nixon, and reported he is exhilarated by his new role and will—contrary to an earlier announcement—have a staff of his own.

Agnew spent more than an hour with Nixon and also talked to the president-elect's key aides at transition headquarters in the Pierre Hotel.

It was the first Nixon-Agnew meeting since Nov. 9 when the president-elect announced Agnew would be given office space in the White House but would share the presidential staff rather than have one of his own.

Agnew, referring to what he described as certain misconceptions, said today:

"I will have all the staff that Vice President Humphrey and other vice presidents have had including an administrative assistant." In addition, he said, he would be able to call on Nixon's staff for assistance.

Asked if he was satisfied with his role so far in the incoming administration the Maryland governor said, "I am exhilarated rather than disappointed" in what he described as the enlarged duties that Nixon will assign him.

"Since Nov. 9, he reported, he has talked to Nixon by telephone at least every other day and has been carrying out a series of assignments mainly in the area of recruiting talent for the new administration.

## Indian Children Given Schooling

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. (AP) — The Bureau of Indian Affairs opened 34 kindergartens on Indian reservations this fall for the first time in history. Seventeen of them are on the Navajo Reservation, the nation's largest.

The kindergarten program emphasizes participation by parents. Mothers are urged to ride school buses daily with their children and then take part in the classroom, dining room and playground activities.

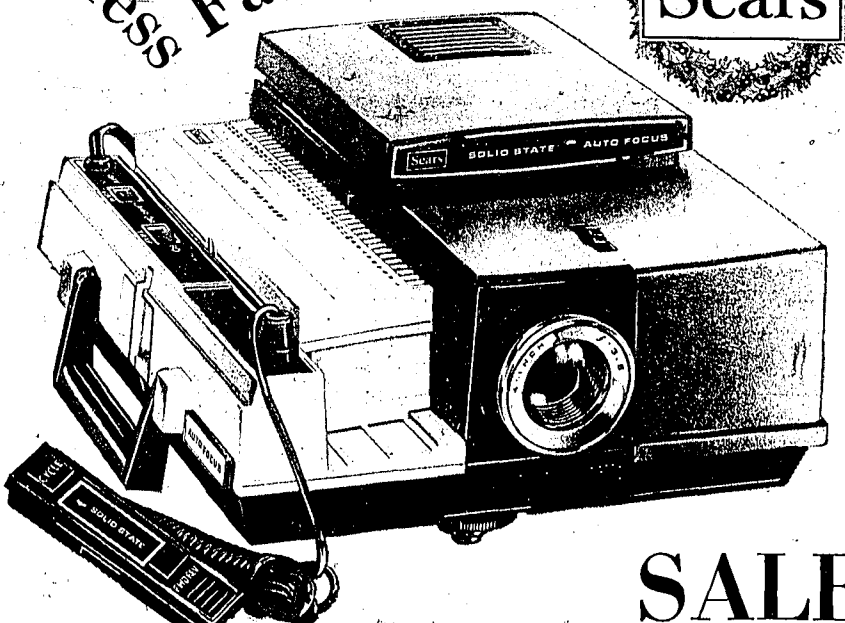
Each kindergarten has one teacher and a teacher's aide. Most of the aides are Navajos who are training for work as regular teachers.

# Hotel Guests Yawn As President Walks By

NEW YORK (UPI)—The woman is walking out of the Pierre as the man is walking in. The woman stops and watches as the man, hidden by photographers and cops, hurries through the hotel lobby.

"Who's that?" the woman wonders. "Richard Nixon," a friend answers.

"Oh, really?" the woman nods, buttoning the top of her fur-collared coat. She turns a way, touches the back of her hair gently and tugs at her neck as she sues gloves. "Well," she asks, "shall we go to lunch?"

The woman's cool appreciation of the sight of the President-elect of the United States is surprisingly common here in the elegance of Fifth Avenue's Hotel Pierre, site of Nixon's pre-White House headquarters.

So what if the world's most currently scrutinized and potentially important personality is on his way to the 39th floor at a cost of \$15 million, rises 42

berly and expensively. As the future President walks to his elevator, there is little excitement. A man in a camel's hair coat sleeps through the event on a Louis XIV chair. A tall lady is preoccupied with kissing a white poodle on its ears.

Even a bellman is unimpressed. He remains at his post, refusing to peek around a corner at the next recipient of the world's most generous office.

"Well," the bellman explains, peering out of his uniform, "you have to remember that everybody at the Pierre is used to seeing important people."

The rug in the lobby tells it all. Patrons do not sink down in them, but are supported an inch and a half above marble floors.

"The rugs are pure wool," says one hotel guest. "I suppose they cost about \$30-\$40 a square yard. I've never seen anything like them in hotels. There are some nice carpets at the Hilton in London, but nothing like this."

Park in the high-rent district. Rooms at the inn begin at \$70 a night. Some suites are nearly \$5,000 a month. A party of four can easily spend \$75 in one of three restaurants. The valet charges \$3 to press a suit. Shave, haircut and shine go for \$7.50.

Even tipping is expensive. An executive salesman from the Midwest complains that 50 cents is the minimum gratuity. "Anything less in a place like this," he says, "and I feel like I've got a hole in my pants."

Many of the guests at the Pierre are world travelers.

Many are versed in varied subjects, including politics. But few would rather talk about the texture and price of broadloom than the proximity of a new president.

They sit in the lobby, these guests, chattering in many languages, dressed in diamonds and vicuña, waiting for calls or companions. Aloof dignity.

"Oh," says a man from Atlanta, "it's interesting to see all the police and the reporters and the Republican notables, but I'm in town on business and I have

no time to be rubbernecking at celebrities.

"Well," says one of the hotel's permanent guests, "I think it's a treat that the new President is staying here, but I just hope it doesn't cause any trouble or, well, you know, a ny trouble."

"To tell the truth," says a porter filling water pitchers, "I never was much for Nixon and I'm really more interested in the rumor that Aristotle Onassis is coming to town and maybe Jackie will stay in his suite."

## Building Code Violation Gets Action From Area Councilmen

## Solons Shun Gun Controls For Idahoans

BOISE (AP) — Unless the members of the 1969 Idaho Legislature change their minds they are unlikely even to consider any form of state gun-control legislation.

A survey by the Associated Press shows that of those responding, about 89 per cent are opposed to any type of control.

Some of those who said they would support state controls said they would do so only to avoid federal controls.

One of these was Rep. Harold W. Reid, D-Craigmont, who said he would support only enough state control "to keep the federal government from setting requirements."

"I feel the states should be the ones to determine whether or not gun control is necessary," said Rep. John O. Sessions, R-Driggs. "At the present time I feel gun control in Idaho is not necessary."

He said he is "opposed to federal registration of all firearms."

Recent assassinations and street rioting have made gun control a subject for national discussion. Some Idaho legislators said they might support controls at some time in the future—but not now.

One of the few who voted support for gun control legislation now asked that he not be identified by name because "so many are so naive on gun control." He said he favors registration of all firearms.

## Methodist Bishop Backs 'Pill' Use

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Methodist bishop gave his backing Wednesday to birth control—a subject of controversy within the Roman Catholic church.

Bishop John Wesley Lord of Washington said the Methodist church believes "that planned parenthood practiced with respect for human life fulfills rather than violates the will of God."

Bishop Lord said he was offering a Protestant view on the birth control controversy because of the dispute raging in the Catholic church.

Bishop Lord suggested in a formal statement that it may be unwise to have children without having made adequate preparation.

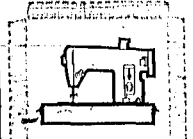

**Miners Live On Edge Of Tragedy**

### Tiny Spark Spells Disaster

BY CARL KOVAC

**MANNINGTON, W. Va.** — (HEA) — A continuous mining machine bites away at the face of a coal seam deep below ground. Suddenly its steel teeth crunch down on a "sulphur ball" imbedded in the vein of Sparks fly, exploding an undetected concentration of methane gas which in turn ignites coal dust permeating the air. Fire is instantly an inferno in tomb.

Maybe this is what caused the blast — the first of many — that trapped 74 miners in the twin shafts of this Appalachian soft coal mine. No one knows for sure, yet. Maybe they never will.

All that is known is that methane, a natural gas, and oxygen combined in the right proportion and the mixture was somehow touched off. The mystery is how.

"Anything can do it," says Paul Tate, 48, a 28-year veteran in the mines around these parts. "It could have been a spark from a cigarette, a short circuit in the continuous miner or a sulphur ball. It only takes a little spark."

A sulphur ball, Tate explains, is a compressed mass of sulfur as hard as flint" buried in a coal seam. When the continuous miner, a reptilian machine that chews out coal with its head, encounters a short circuit in the conveyor-belt body to a collection point, bites down on one, "it's sparks fly and the methane gas is ignited. If there's gas around that's all she wrote," says Tate.

"You have to have the right mixture of methane in the air and an explosion," Paul Henke, 34, points out. "If there's an excess of methane in the air and it ignites, it will pop out (burn) rapidly) like a flash bulb. Usually, they're just small pops but they can knock a man down and burn him. It's like a car engine in a cave. Gasoline by itself will burn, but when it's mixed with air, the fumes explode."

Of all the occupational dangers facing miners — floods, cave-ins, maiming by machinery — explosions are most feared. A flood or cave-in may trap a shift of miners, maybe drowning or crushing one or two, but there is a good chance that the survivors will escape or be rescued.

An explosion on the other hand, races through a tunnel like a cloud of powder through a mine shaft. The blast not only blows the miner off his feet, but the blast or scoured by the flash, cause rapid suffocation as the intense heat from the burning coal dust and coal seams picks up precious oxygen. Shoring is blasted away and corridors cave in. Sometimes the blast opens a nearby flooded tunnel, adding to the danger.

## Controversial Plan To Control Rats Still Lacks Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A year after a chastised Congress authorized \$40 million for rat control, not a single dollar has been spent.

The Public Health Service hopes it will soon get Bureau of the Budget approval to start shipping perhaps \$35 million to some of the 47 units of local government which have applied for rat money.

But even if approval comes, the money won't directly exterminate a single rat. Instead it will finance projects designed to teach slum dwellers how to store garbage, get rid of rat harborage and so forth.

"There's not enough money to get rid of the rat population of the whole country," said a Public Health Service spokesman. "This is a means of instructing local residents."

All 47 applicants won't get financing. "There's only enough to give to the best of the lot," said a spokesman. "We've already pretty much rank ordered the applications." The agency, however, says who is in line for the grants, but Baltimore and Philadelphia—confident they will get money—have already begun to publicize their plans.

Residents of rat-infested neighborhoods would be employed under some proposals. Most projects would work through neighborhood groups and normally city health departments would be heavily involved.

The congressional rat controversy popped into the public eye July 20, 1967, when the House narrowly rejected a \$40 million, two-year plan submitted by the Johnson administration to eradicate rats in slums.

Derisive comments of some House members opposed to the bill drew angry replies from President Johnson and administration officials. Rep. James A. Haley, D-Fla., suggested, "Why not just buy some cats and turn them loose on the street."

On Nov. 27, 1967, Congress gave final approval to a compromise \$38 million health aid bill to which had been added \$60 million to fight rats.

But while the authorization bill passed, Congress never voted the \$20 million to run the fiscal 1968 portion of the program. It did finally approve \$20 million for use in fiscal 1969, the budget year that began last July 1. Use of even this much has

been held up pending Budget Bureau decisions on how much spending money government agencies actually will get in light of Congress' edict that over-all federal outlays be slashed \$6 billion.

The Public Health Service now expects about \$15 million to be available for the rat program.

### Priest Given Prison Term In Tax Case

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A Catholic priest who authorities say led a double life has been sentenced to two years in prison for failing to file federal tax returns on more than \$11,000 income.

The Rev. Robert Daniel Nikliborc was sentenced Tuesday by U.S. Dist. Judge William P. Gray, but the judge said sentencing might be reduced after the priest undergoes a 90-day psychiatric examination.

Gray also granted the clergyman a stay of execution until Jan. 6 so Father Nikliborc can attend the opening of a new boy's home near Beaumont.

The priest is director of Boys Town of the Desert, an orphanage near Banning, Calif. The government said he also was known as Robert Drew Rand, a rich electronics executive who lived in a \$75,000 home in near-by Palm Springs.

The 37-year-old priest pleaded guilty to not filing tax returns in 1963-65, but denied misappropriating any funds connected with the orphanage, where he also is finance director.

Nikliborc said he didn't think he had to file returns for the years in question, but said he now realizes he should have.

U.S. Atty. Matt Byrne said the priest had twice signed deeds as a married man, once for the Palm Springs home he bought as Robert Rand from singer Tony Martin; that he ran hundreds of thousands of dollars through four secret bank accounts, and derived personal income from a building fund of the boys' home.

## Survey Of Idaho Legislators Shows Support Of Court Reforms

By EARLE L. JESTER

BOISE (AP) — A big majority of the men and women who will make up Idaho's 1969 Legislature indicate they are in favor of some form of court reorganization.

A considerable majority indicates they would support a plan similar to that which was approved by the 1967 session, but vetoed by Gov. Don W. Samuelson.

Sixty-three per cent of the legislators responding to an Associated Press survey said they favor reorganization similar to the 1967 plan. Twenty-six per cent said they oppose that plan, one said "maybe" he would support it and the remainder expressed no opinion.

But of the 26 per cent voicing opposition to the 1967 plan, half said they would support some form of court reorganization. One legislator said he would have to see the proposals first.

Rep. Ralph Litton, D-St. Anthony, said the legislature "should move slowly; I prefer election to appointment generally."

Dr. John A. Edwards, Republican representative from Council Bluffs, who said he opposes the 1967 version but supports court reorganization, suggested "restrictive qualifications for lower court judges."

The plan approved in 1967 provided for a two-level system, state, supreme and district courts. The probate, justice of the peace and city courts would be eliminated as such but appointed magistrates performing the functions of those courts would serve under the district courts.

At present supreme court justices and district court judges are elected on nonpartisan ballots and the 1967 Court Reorganization Plan would make no change in that. Probate judges now are elected on partisan ballots, with one for each county.

Justices of the peace are appointed by county commissioners and city judges are named by city councils.

Samuelson vetoed the 1967 legislation saying it would be too costly for the state and would reduce voters' control over lower court jurists. But the governor said he favors some form of court reorganization and he says

he will have proposals for the legislators.

The Idaho Judicial Council, headed by the state's chief justice, also is considering court reorganization and it, too, expects to make suggestions to the governor and the legislature.

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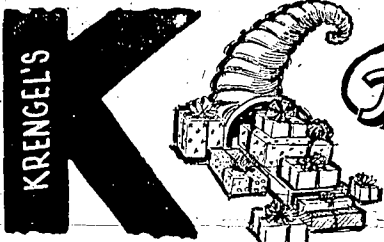
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# College Of Southern Idaho Will Begin Four-Game Hoop Swing Through Wyoming, Utah Friday Night

# Family Endures Dismal Holiday

KNOTTSVILLE, W. Va. (AP) — When Juanita Mayle makes pumpkin pies for her family's Thanksgiving dinner she makes 15 at a time. She's not making any today.

Juanita's husband, Hartwell Mayle, 51, is one of 75 miners trapped since last Wednesday in the burning Mountaineer Coal Co. No. 9 mine.

She is among those who believe he will be found alive.

"I've been with him ever since he's been down there," she said, her brown eyes reddened by tears. "And you know what? He's worried about us. That's the kind of man he is."

Mr. and Mrs. Mayle have 16 children.

Their ages range from the 16-year-old youngest to the 80-year-old oldest.

"I have such a wonderful family," she said, smiling. "We're lucky to be as well off as we are."

The Mayles moved to their 56-acre Taylor County farm four years ago when "we didn't know the difference between a cucumber and a pepper," she said. They learned fast enough and now raise chickens, pigs and corn.

Since the explosion, a friend started a drive to keep the Mayles in groceries but it takes a lot to feed 16 children.

"I make four gallons of vegetable soup and it's gone in a day," she said, adding that the family also goes through six pounds of spaghetti at one sitting and two turkeys at another.

Her life hasn't been the same since the explosion.

"I've been raised in a mining camp and I know about all this," she said. "I sleep on the couch each night in case the telephone rings to say he's out of the mine."

"What really hurts is the kids. The other day I came back from said, managing a faint smile. "We're lucky to be as well off as we are."

"I just know he'll come out of that mine," she said, glancing around the room at her children. "Someone's eyes will be opened when he does and they'll see I've been right all along."

"When he first got trapped down there, the twins wouldn't eat until he got back. But I convinced them he's coming back and they're eating okay now."

"I've had too many things happen to me—too many things," she said sadly. "He's come back."

She looked again at her 16 children, some of whom were playing outside.

"We have a wonderful, close family," she said. "That means more to me than anything else. I just thank God for what I've got and pray my husband will come back to us."

# Agency Launches Program Of Legal Aid For Slums

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has launched its second major program in providing legal aid for poor people with such problems as divorce, eviction or bill collections.

Officials said the new program primarily will benefit rural welfare recipients but will supplement programs already available to the poor in cities.

The program was authorized by Congress in 1967. HEW Secretary Wilbur J. Cohen said Tuesday it has taken this long to work out details.

Cohen said it would not be possible to estimate cost until states begin applying for funds.

Just last week Cohen announced new regulations to take full effect next July 1, doing away with investigations of most welfare applicants and substituting instead a simple declaration of need.

# Russians To Train Boys, 10

MOSCOW (AP) — Military training in the Soviet Union now starts at the age of 10.

Schoolboys throughout the country are organized into squads, detachments and battalions. Under adult commanders they practice drill, firing, the use of gas masks, other military skills and rendering medical aid.

The program introduced by the Kremlin leadership is being widened this year. Marshal Ivan Bagramyan, the World War II hero who has charge, this month ordered Pioneer units which have taken part before to do so in 1968-69.

Soviet children from 10 to 15 belong to the Pioneer organization, which provides group activities and Communist indoctrination.

Older boys get more sophisticated military training the last two years before being drafted at 18. The Kremlin decreed this in 1967, also reducing the draft age one year.

The defense minister, Marshal Andrei Grechko, explained that the Soviet Union was "taking all steps necessary to strengthen its defenses" and the schoolboy soldier program after World War II.

The boys' training units, even for the youngest, have their political commissars alongside the military commanders, just as in the Soviet armed forces. They also have their military newspapers and political information classes.

From the start boys are told how they should think and feel with patriotic feelings.

One of their tasks as "young army-men" the term used here, is to visit sights associated with the heroes of communism in the Revolution and World War II. They are also introduced to servicemen and veterans, who tell them about great deeds done for the motherland.

On military holidays, of which there are many, the boys' units are inspected as they drill and march. Each has its own bugler and drummer. The "young army-men" wear their red Pioneer scarfs in lieu of a uniform, and the officers have insignia of stars like those of the regular branches of the service.

Competitions are held on the road, in the field and in the gymnasium to pick out the detachments which excel in military-like exercises. A final in June produces the winner for the country. This unit receives a big medal proclaiming "victor" to attach to its banner.

# Briton Seeks To Interest Country In Historic Ship

By GLENN GOODEY

BRISTOL, England (AP) — How do you make the descendants of Drake and Nelson care enough about their naval history to lay 500,000 pounds (\$1.2 million) on the line to bring home a 125-year-old rusting chunk of it from the other side of the world?

That's the problem facing Robert Badley, 56-year-old British stockbroker.

He heads a group of British businessmen who feel that the steamship Great Britain, which has been gathering barnacles in Sparrow Cove in the Falkland Islands since 1843, has an away from home far too long.

Badley's second problem is that a group of Americans want the ship to end her days in the Pacific. If Badley fails to get the Great Britain home, she may well end up as a museum in San Francisco.

In her day the Great Britain was quite a ship, the pride of Britain's merchant fleet and forerunner of modern ships.

Designed by the British engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel—builder of railways, bridges, tunnels and pioneer of steam navigation—the Great Britain was the largest ship of her day, the first all-iron ocean-going ship and the first deep-sea vessel to be driven by screw propulsion.

She was launched at Bristol in 1843 by Prince Albert, the prince consort, when Queen Victoria had been on the throne just six years.

She was 322 feet long with a beam of 50 feet and was called the "monster of the deep" for the "monstrous" size of her hull. She had six masts and 1,700 square yards of canvas.

Her maiden voyage to New York in 1845 was accomplished in a record 15 days.

In 1846 she ran aground on the Irish coast and the rest of the ship almost bankrupted the owners. But her ability to withstand the pounding salt combined even the most skeptical that iron was the material for future shipbuilding. Almost immediately the British Admiralty decreed that all British warships should be built on the same lines, discarding the conventional wooden-hulled men of war.

Naval historians say that this decision assured Britain of world naval supremacy for the rest of the century.

The Great Britain was used mainly in the Australian passenger and cargo trade. During more than four decades of active work she underwent numerous modifications. When the elements caught up with her, she was sold as a three-masted fully rigged ship without engines.

She was disabled by a Cape Horn storm in 1888 and towed into Sparrow Cove to begin her long years of ignominious retirement.

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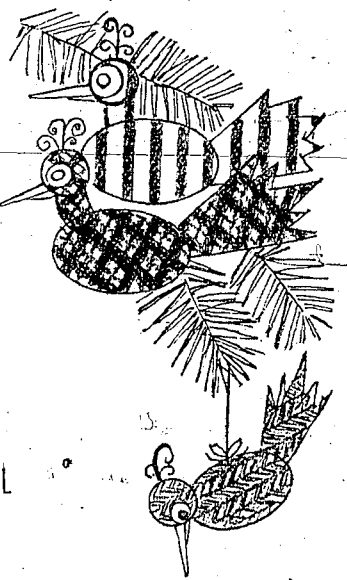
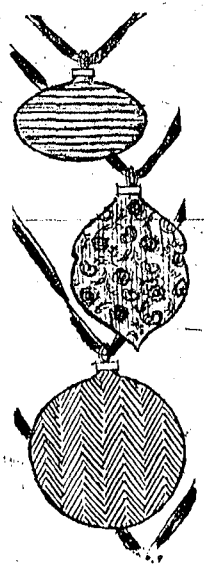

Lamb slaughter is down and is expected to continue below a year ago for the rest of 1968. The 1968 lamb crop was smaller than it was last year. Prices are higher.

**Attention-Getting Behavior Assists With Advertising**

Outside the plush building where the detergent company is headquartered, a small group of attractive well-dressed young women draped in signs that read "Down with Ajax" and "Colgate Is a Sex Offender" huddle together, rehearsing the latest, dramatic, on-the-spot picketing behavior.

"The White Knight Is a Dirty Old Man," they repeat in sing-song fashion.

"That's the purpose of dramatic chants and songs," Miss Kennedy comments, "to get the attention of the public. That's why every bit of bizarre, attention-getting behavior helps. If you can watch weird behavior on television why not indulge in it yourself?"

Other picketing innovations during the four days of demonstrations include more improvised songs—guerrilla theater, and a Flush-In—a huge toilet bowl into which all the company's products were poured. But no matter how zappy and swinging the picketing is, at no time do any day's demonstrations last more than five or six hours at most.

"Why should we be masochistic?" asks Miss Kennedy. "We picket at our convenience. With this type of picketing we march just long enough to embarrass the company. If that doesn't work, as it didn't in this case, we must escalate our campaign."

Despite the new fun and games approach to an established union weapon, Miss Kennedy doesn't believe that the picket line is the scene every middle-class American woman should try to make.

Who shouldn't picket? Anyone who fits into the following classifications: someone who because of their career, conflict of interest or image they must present to the public, can't afford to picket; those who are insecure and desperately want to conform and win their neighbors' seat of approval and those who are easily embarrassed.

Picketing embarrassing? "Even though I'm not easily embarrassed I always get embarrassed the first few minutes until we get our signs on and get organized," admits the four-year protest veteran. "These people however, can make up the back-up forces, those who run stencils, cook food for the marchers, etc."

In her placard and leaflet cluttered midtown office-apartment—she maintains another apartment in Harlem—which she shares with a younger husband. "I made her an instant partner; that's the only way I could repay her for her work. . . . Miss Kennedy recalled the first time she was personally involved in picketing as a form of social protest.

"Actually it wasn't so long ago that I used to think pickets were crazy," she comments. "Then about four years ago, awhile after my husband's death, (she's the widow of Charles Dye, a science-fiction writer) I was angry at the war in Vietnam and I joined a picket line to protest the complicity in Wall Street. Since then I've come to realize that picketing is the cheapest, quickest and for the amount of effort expended, often the most effective way of fighting oppression."

This belief has led to many picket lines, some of which she organized, to speeches to other groups and to the Media World Shop—their avocation which among other projects is currently conducting a campaign for

or as exciting as those conducted by middle-class women. "It's easy to see why. The middle-class women aren't as angry or as miserable. They still have a sense of humor."

A sense of humor is something that Florence Keggedy has definitely maintained.

"I'd love to see someone open an employment bureau for pickets," she suggests, with a twinkle in her eye.

"Pickets could be hired at \$2 an hour. That way if you were mad at your boyfriend you could hire five pickets and march in front of his building. It would be a ball!"

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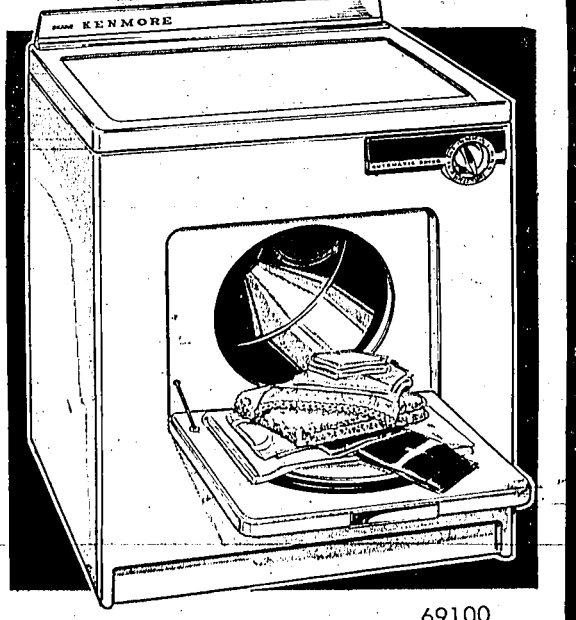
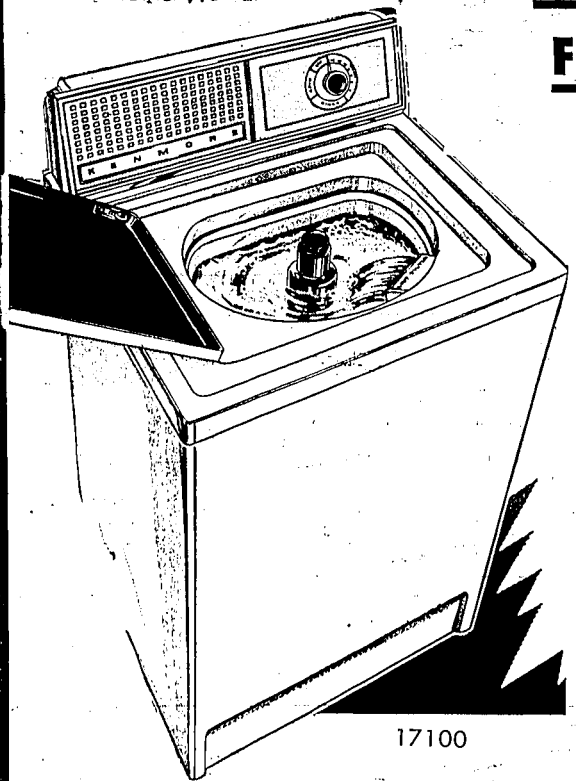

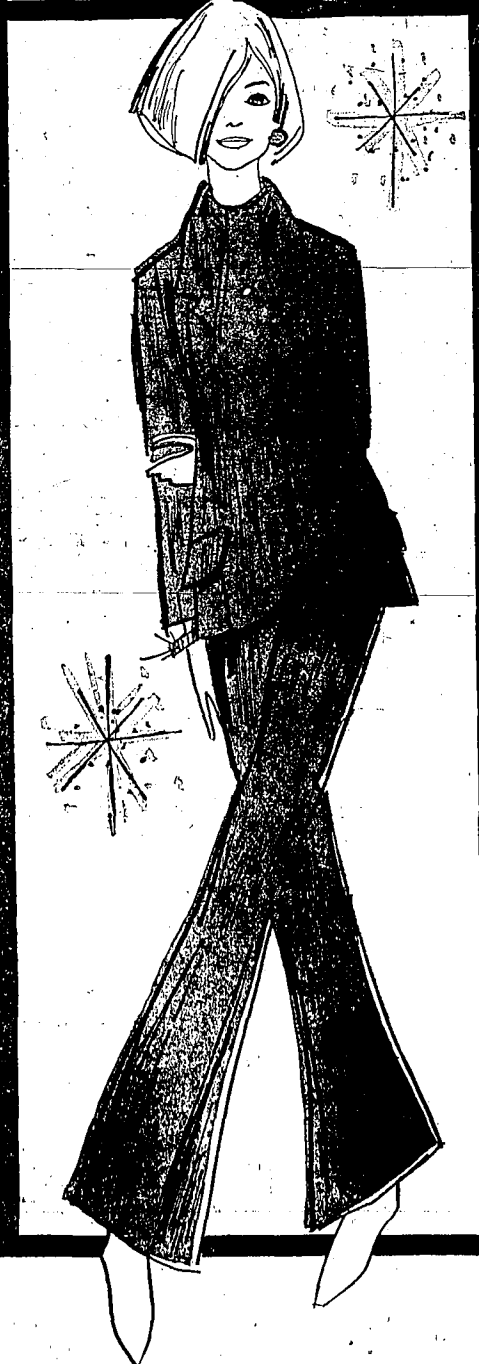

## 'Airport' Author Attains Success After Long Effort

ST. HELENA, Calif. (NEA)—we have the same ideas generally look Arthur Hailey half a lifetime and half a world to become one of our time's most successful authors. He has reached that point and seems content.

The man who wrote "Airport," 1968's biggest-selling novel, has found his private Eden. He has lived here, in this Napa Valley grape-growing town, for four years.

"I want to die here," he says. "I can stand on the balcony of my handsome home and look out over a vineyard vista that offers an ever-changing landscape. In certain seasons, it is green, then all paints it gold and orange, then the grape growers plow mustard into their fields and it turns yellow."

He bought it impulsively, without the prior knowledge or consent of his lovely wife, Sheila. He says that didn't worry him. "I wouldn't think," he says, "of buying a suit or a shirt or a pair of socks without her, but in the area of big things triumph, 'Airport'."

"I think every writer has one good book in him," Hailey says. "I think 'Airport' was mine."

His publisher, Doubleday, and the expectant public await his next novel eagerly, but it will be a long wait.

Hailey is a meticulous workman, a quality reflected in his office. He works in a spacious room, kept neat as a well-groomed pin. Nothing is out of place. His desk is uncluttered. A bookshelf wall behind him contains books in rows like little soldiers. His notes, every night, are locked in a fire-proof safe. And he works as he lives, finding security in systematized comfort in method.

He is now working on a novel about the automobile industry. He estimates that it takes him three years to write his kind of book. The first year is devoted to research. He interviews hundreds of people; for his current work, he has talked to everyone from Henry Ford to assembly line workers.

His voluminous notes are transcribed by his secretary, Ruth Hunter. Ultimately, when he has done all his research, he begins to plot his story and flesh out his characters. Then he starts to write, and religiously turns out 600 words a day, five days a week. He is a slow writer, he says, and the creative act is difficult.

He has only the vaguest idea as yet as to the actual plot of his new book. He does know, however, that it will not bear a one-word title, like "Hotel" or "Airport." Hailey didn't even want to call "Airport" that; his working title was "The Surly Bonds of Earth," but nobody else liked it.

At three years per book, Hailey feels he has time left for four books.

"I'm 48 now," he says. "If I can do four more, I'll be 60 then. And I doubt I'd want to work much after that."

At the moment, three of the four are scheduled — first, the automobile industry story, then the one about a university, then a book built around international finance. He has "six or seven" ideas for the remaining one.

His only problem now is that his research takes him away from home so much. Maybe that last book should be about the grape-growing industry.

## Lucinda Falls For Dale In A Gigantic 2,800-Foot Way

PARKMAN, Ohio (NEA)—The first time she met him, Lucinda Sharp fell for Dale Gates—2,800 feet, to be exact.

That was back on Oct. 1, 1966 the day Lucinda, then a senior Spanish major at Hiram College, logged her first parachute jump. Gates was her pilot and jump master. Today they are married and own and operate the Cleveland Sport Parachute Center in this small community 37 miles east of Cleveland.

In fact, she and Dale didn't get to really know each other until after she broke her leg in a bad landing about six weeks later. "I wanted to stay active in the school while my leg mended, so I came up regularly from Hiram to help with chute packing and other chores," she recalls.

She was blossomed like a 24-foot canopy Para-Commander and three months ago they were married. It was only natural, Lucinda says. "He pilots and acts as jump master for the school and he'd jump if you gave him 28 handkerchiefs tied together, as long as he had a reserve chute. He's made over 400 jumps and has a D (expert) parachute license."

Sky diving is also Lucinda's big hang-up. She has 178 jumps in her log book, the highest from 12,300 feet during which she fell free for 60 seconds before popping her canopy. She holds a C license, which means she is a qualified jump master. She expects to earn her D license by Christmas.

Sky diving, Lucinda believes, is the greatest cure-all since aspirin. "It's a wonderful way to relieve tension. It sharpens your reactions because it demands complete mental concentration, and it's a great way to keep in shape," she says, adding that "a jump in the cold morning

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## Top Teacher Lacks Credits For License

PORTLAND (AP)—A lack of methodology courses keeps Portland's teacher of the year for 1967 from getting an unrestricted teaching certificate from Oregon.

Alda Monroe, a teacher at Woodlawn elementary school, said that in the four years she has been in Oregon she has been trying to qualify for an unrestricted certificate.

The State Department of Education suggested a few methodology courses might solve the problem but she's taken 42 credit hours at Portland State College without meeting the requirements.

But she doesn't know what courses she lacks. "And it has become so confused at this point that I don't know if they know."

Mrs. Monroe was picked by the Portland Association of Teachers from the 3,700 teachers in the city.

She handles incorrigible students who can't be handled by other teachers.

"I don't know all the approaches she uses," said Woodlawn Principal Robert Selby, "but she's got it—whatever it is."

Mrs. Monroe says she tries to be honest, interested and keep a sense of humor with the students.

"First you react in a warm and human manner to the things you want them to do more of, and don't react to the things you want them to quit doing," she said.

"If you are genuinely interested in them, and demand from them what they are to do, in nearly all cases they react to this and do it. And you have to love doing it—or they'll get you in 15 minutes," she said.

Mrs. Monroe has a restricted teaching certificate which will expire if she doesn't make satisfactory progress toward acquiring an unrestricted certificate.

## Students Strew Litter Outdoors

NEW YORK (AP)—Schoolyards and playgrounds are the favorite haunts of academic litterbugs, according to a survey by Keep America Beautiful, Inc.

The national litter-prevention organization polled more than 1,000 elementary school principals across the country on their litter problems. Well over half of those who replied indicated that elementary school children seem to concentrate their littering out of doors. School washrooms, classrooms, lunchrooms and hallways, while reported by some as problem areas, appear to be less susceptible to the ravages of youthful litterbugs.

The survey also revealed that seven of ten elementary schools have anti-litter programs for their students and that in most cases these programs are considered effective.

## 'Science-Fiction' Radar Equipment Tracks High-Speed Planes, Missiles

ELY, Nev. (NEA)—This is science fiction come to life. You leave Nevada's third largest city, where the hotel will cheerfully treize your freshly-killed deer while you can dinner and drive 15 miles west, up into the Schell Creek Range.

Turn off Highway 50 on a dirt road that climbs the mountain. You need four-wheel drive and, frequently, chains on all four wheels to make it through the snow. You can see for miles in all directions, and there's nothing but other mountains.

You make a final hairpin turn, your car struggling and gasping for air. The snow blows horizontally from the north. Winds here, atop Robertson Summit, 9,240 feet above sea level, are often clocked at well over 100 miles per hour.

The top of the summit has been leveled off. Other cars and trucks are parked in a smooth area. And there is a low, squat building, topped with strange-looking devices.

Outside, you are in outer nowhere; a million miles beyond left field. Inside, there is a collection of sparkling, flashing, humming, clattering scientific devices, as up to date as tomorrow.

This is the newest radar station of NASA's Flight Research Center. It is, they boast, the most accurate radar in the free world—maybe in the entire

world, but they can't be sure what Russia has.

It cost \$2.7 million to install. It can track a target of one square meter—22 inches in radius—as high as 250 nautical miles. An object with a 400-watt beacon can be followed precisely for 32,000 nautical miles.

To those limits, it can pinpoint those objects within 100 feet, and let the observers know how fast it is going, within a velocity of 10 feet per second.

The prime function of the new radar is to assist NASA in checking the new airplanes tested out of Edwards Air Force Base. It is being used in providing accurate figures on NASA tests the X-15, the B-70, the F-111 (the test-vehicle for future variable sweep-wing airplanes), the F-101, the F-8 and will be used for future NADA programs like the boron-filament tail program and the hypersonic research planes.

NASA officials say that instruments in the planes themselves are often inaccurate. The altimeter in the X-15's cockpit, for example, can be as much as 10,000 feet off. They have always used ground radar to tell them where their planes are and how fast they are going, but the new radar does it much better.

Technically, this one is called HAIR—for High Accuracy Instrumentation radar—and it was built and installed by RCA's Missile and Surface Radar Division. RCA's engineers are justifi-

ably proud of their baby, for other reasons besides its accuracy. It is also much more compact—and hence less expensive to build and maintain—than previous radar installations. All of the equipment is housed in a single console, as opposed to earlier models which had 27 racks of electronic devices to make them work.

The Ely radar is part of what NASA calls its High Range—a stretch of desolate countryside stretching for 500 miles from Wendover, Utah, to Edwards Air Force Base. This area is dotted with dry lake beds—emergency landing sites for NASA's planes—and the test flights zip down this High Range.

## Judges Veto Grand Jury At Seattle

SEATTLE (AP)—King County Superior Court judges decided Tuesday against calling a grand jury to consider reports of crime and vice in the county.

Nineteen of the county's 22 judges voted to submit to Gov. Dan Evans a report received during two months of intermittent private hearings, rather than call a grand jury.

Evans, who can request that the state attorney general make a thorough investigation, said he would review the findings before deciding what action to take.

Presiding Judge Frank James read a statement putting forth the views of the 19 judges. It said:

"In our opinion the information submitted does not justify the calling of a grand jury. If there exists any basis for such a call, it would be apparent only after a thorough investigation."

"Judges have no authority to make investigations in a situation of this kind. Under our state law the power to make such an investigation is given the attorney general upon written request of the governor."

James said the material was "insufficient" in quality and quantity to justify a grand jury session.

The judges' decision was the result of published reports early in the fall that King County Pros. Charles O. Carroll met privately with a leading figure in the pinball machine business, Carroll said he had done nothing wrong.

## Los Angeles Deemed 'Worst' For Moral Crimes In Nation

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Los Angeles—not Washington—has the highest rate of forcible rapes among the nation's large cities, says the District of Columbia Public Health Department. It ranks Washington 13th.

This is not to say that women and girls are safe from sexual assaults in Washington, concluded a report released Tuesday, "but that they are safer than in many large cities. The report, by Dr. Charles R. Heyman and two associates, said there have been "many re-

cent statements in the press that Washington has the highest rate. It said figures adapted from FBI reports for 1967 showed 51.1 forcible rapes per 100,000 population for Los Angeles and these rates for other cities: Baltimore, 48.2; St. Louis, 47; Detroit, 43; Chicago, 39; Pittsburgh, 31.7; New Orleans, 30.7; Buffalo, N.Y., 29.8; San Francisco, 24.1; New York, 23.7; Cincinnati, 23.6; Philadelphia, 21.9; Washington, 21.6; Seattle, 20.1; Boston, 19.1; San Antonio, Tex., 17.7; Cleveland, 16.9; Dallas, 16.4; Houston, 13.5; San Diego, 9.8, and Milwaukee, 6.7.

## 'Overlord' Of Crime Caught With 8 Others

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A man described by the FBI as an "overlord of crime" and eight others were arrested Tuesday on charges of engaging in illegal Cosa Nostra operations in western New York and Ontario, Canada.

The FBI said much of the activity—including gambling, bookmaking, and loan-shark operations—was directed out of a small funeral home in nearby Niagara Falls.

Sicafno Magaddino, 77, identified by the FBI as the head of the Cosa Nostra in western New York, was ordered by the FBI to appear for arraignment on charges of interstate racketeering.

He was permitted to spend the night in his home in nearby Lewiston because of his age and chronic heart condition.

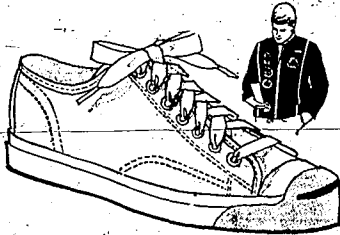

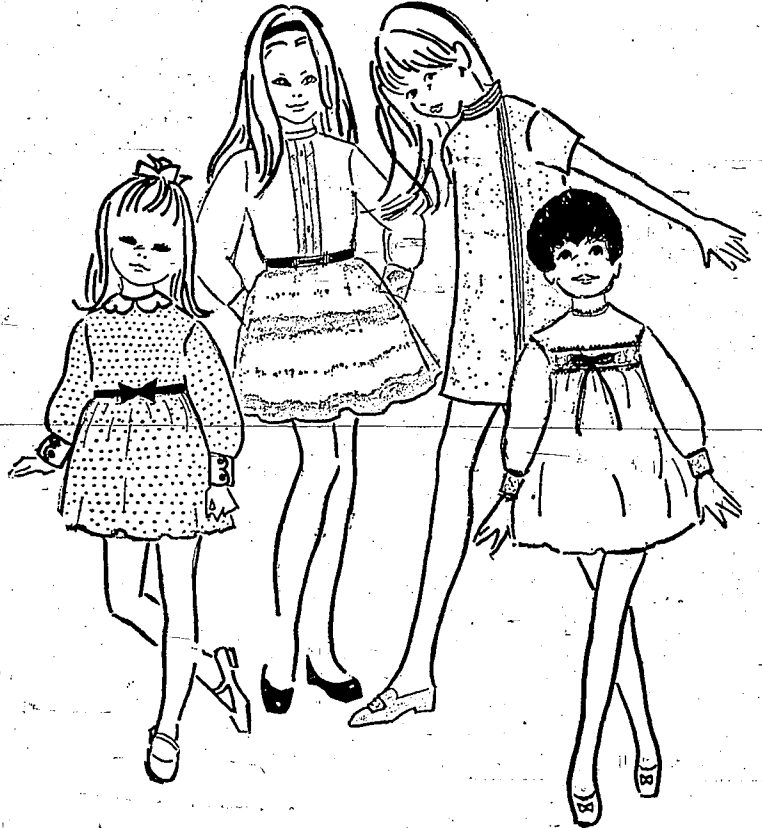

## Youth Vows To Support 3 Brothers

LODI, N. J. (AP) — A 16-year-old boy vowed Tuesday to keep his three orphaned brothers together after a fire destroyed their trailer home.

"They are my brothers and they are going to stay with me," Bruce Westbrook said about the plight of his brothers, Keith, 13, Brian, 12 and James, 10.

Their father, Robert Westbrook, died last month. Their mother died in 1963.

"I knew what I had to do to keep the family together," said Bruce, who hopes someday to be a doctor.

He wants to find an apartment here for himself and his brothers and their grandmother, Mrs. Mary Broderick.

However, it is not certain that the law will permit the youngsters to live with his brothers under such an arrangement and the situation is now under investigation by authorities. One of the questions is how much income Bruce can provide. No amount was disclosed.

Mrs. Broderick, 76, of New York City, traveled daily to her home to cook and clean the trailer since Westbrook died.

But how there is no trailer—it was destroyed by fire Monday.

Monday night, after the fire, the younger boys slept at the home of police officer Dominic Callari, a family friend who offered them a permanent home.

Bruce has some resources to bank on in the job of keeping the family together.

There is income from social security, their father's life insurance and money from the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The father was half-Indian.

Bruce attends Don Bosco Parochial School in Ramsey and was elected president of its Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) Sunday.

## Miners' Kin Face Bleak Thanksgiving

MANNINGTON, W. Va. (AP) — The families of 78 miners trapped for a week in a burning coal mine face a sad Thanksgiving.

"What have these people got to feast about?" asked Mrs. Robert Friend of Parkersburg, whose brother is among the trapped miners.

"You know how most of these families will spend Thanksgiving," said one miner. "They'll be right there in the church praying—like they have all along."

Last Wednesday at 5:40 a.m. the first explosion boomed through Mountaineer Coal Co. No. 9 mine. Just as the 89 men on the midnight shift were about to quit, twenty-one ran to safety or were pulled from the smoldering pits.

There has been no contact, none at all, with any of the other men despite around-the-clock rescue efforts. And another explosion—the 14th in seven days—hit the mine Tuesday just after Consolidation Coal Co. President John Carcoran vowed that the search would continue as long as there was even a remote possibility of finding the men alive.

## Living Costs Set New Peak For October

WASHINGTON (AP) — Living costs jumped six-tenths of one per cent in October for the eighth monthly rise in eight years and increasing 1968's sharpest rate of price hikes in 17 years, the government said today.

Clothing and transportation costs were up nine-tenths of one per cent each, food and housing up four-tenths each and medical care rose seven-tenths, said the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Asst. Commissioner Arnold Chase of the bureau said the overall rise in living costs in 1968 "could very well be around 4.5 per cent for the year," highest since the 5.0 per cent rise in wage controls were imposed.

But Chase said the rate of increase is expected to taper off and that the government sees no need for similar controls now.

The October increase brought the consumer price index to 122.0. This means it cost \$12.29 last month for every \$10 worth of typical family purchases in the 1967-69 period on which the index is based.

The bureau also reported that the sharp rise in prices combined with a small reduction in the average work week, reduced the average purchasing power of the nation's approximately 45 million rank and file workers.

The average gross paycheck last month was \$10.07, down 20 cents from September. After taxes, purchasing power of the average paycheck was about the same as a year ago for single workers, and about 12 per cent higher for workers with three dependents.

## Rehabilitation Project Proves Disappointment As Plans Fail

NEW YORK (AP) — An "instant rehabilitation" project designed to transform tenement dwellings into prefabricated dream apartments almost overnight has proved to be less than a dream come true.

Sixteen months after the initial project—a five-story building on Manhattan's East Fifth Street—was completed in 48 empty adjacent apartment buildings.

"After analyzing the results we decided that it should take more than 48 hours," she said. "It's too short a period of time because one, there's a question of the space workers have to work in and, two, to omit the overtime that has to be paid."

"There is also the question of annoyance to the neighborhood," she said. "We did this one building, but multiply it by 100 and it can be pretty difficult."

"You don't expect your first experiment to prove everything has to be done in the exact same way," she said. "It's one step in a process."

She said HDA plans to rehabilitate two buildings on 107th Street next month, and possibly 100 more by the first of the year.

On 107th Street, different materials will be used, especially to correct the floor deterioration problem in the previous construction, and to make the building core lighter, she said.

The project also will not be "instant" this time, she said. It will take about 20 working days to renew the two buildings.

## Pentagon 'Punishment' Jolts Hardened Veterans

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The military establishment is thinking about awarding a new type of state-wide medal to these days—the Pentagon Purple Heart.

It would be given to the hundreds of service personnel who are becoming foot casualties by traipsing up and down the endlessly long corridors in the gigantic armad forces headquarters.

The Purple Heart, of course, is only a big, but the problem is not — not at least to those half-dozen or more soldiers who report to the Pentagon podiatrist each week with aching feet miseries.

"They come in mostly with foot bruises," says Maj. Richard Graham, the buildings foot doctor, "either on the balls of the foot or on the heels. They are usually not crippled but they are often in some pain."

The foot patients — many of whom are veteran infantry ground pounders who have survived whole wars without so much as blisters — are the victims of what one resident medic has labeled the Pentagon Syndrome.

The soldiers, returning from Vietnam or other field duty, are used to heavy soled boots and soft, earthy terrain. When they assume Pentagon duty, however, they change from boots to dress shoes and the trouble begins.

"The change," says Maj. Graham, "is sometimes too much. The Pentagon is not easy on a

man's feet. I've never measured it myself, but I'm sure most people here walk several miles during the course of every day."

Such forced marches begin at the building's parking lots, which in many instances are up to a mile away. And once inside, the foot strain gets even worse. Security and expediency often dictates face-to-face business transactions and therefore staffers pace the corridors much of the time.

These corridors, says Maj. Graham, have no spring at all. If they are not the solid bunker-type concrete then they are worse, made of marble.

The podiatrist says that very little can be done to offer much relief of feet that are already sore. But he says he always suggests preventive maintenance for the future. He prescribes foot exercises in all types of shoes and, better yet, a change of regulation to spongy, civilian-type crepe soles.

The only other thing the major can think of doing is to carpet all of the Pentagon floors. But he doesn't think he'll make such a suggestion soon. There are more than 17 miles of floor in the building.

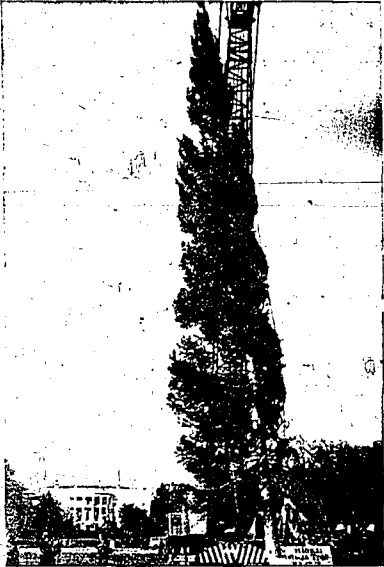

### Time For Living

The number of articles on small business appearing in this column recently have brought some interesting correspondence on the subject. I'm still picking up the bouquets and the brickbats, looking over the hints and criticisms, for future use.

But most of this can wait. Discussions of small business are always appropriate. They can be dropped and continued at intervals. And my policy is to do just that with most of the topics that ought to be covered from health to hobbies.

Today I want to apply that method to another kind of money-making operation—namely, the part-time job. Ian Kent of Chicago reminds me that I haven't touched upon this vital subject for quite a while. He writes: "Small business is okay for the few with the wherewithal, the know-how, and the opportunity. But what about the many who merely want a chance to add shelds to the family budget every week?"

What, indeed? I couldn't agree more. After all, the polls show most retirees are interested in second jobs because they need the added income. Those who forget employment on retiring are usually the ones who are either well off or unable to work.

Moreover, the part-time occupation is tailored to our requirements. For one thing, it's less rigorous than full time. For another, it permits a man or woman to remain active with a minimum loss of retirement benefits.

As I've said before, and will say again — it bears repeating because the impact is so significant for us — jobs for retirees do exist. Not only that, there is a growing conviction among businessmen, if my mail is any criterion, that retirees often make the best employees.

This conviction is partly due to the activities of government agencies and retirement programs, both of which are pushing the case for the older worker. But

basically the conviction seems to derive from experience. Bosses have simply found that retirees can do a job for them.

What kind of job? There's a whole array of them with openings for virtually every kind of skill, and room for the unskilled as well.

Let's consider two fairly common jobs, one for the men and one for the ladies.

A man might deliver handbills. Much advertising is done through printed matter delivered house-to-house, and this shouldn't be too tough for anyone in reasonably good health.

A woman could take to market research by way of her telephone. This might mean, to mention one example out of dozens, calling certain numbers to get opinions about the way an item appeals to the public.

Those are unskilled jobs in the sense that most people are competent to handle them. From there, the job scale rises through the semi-skilled to the level of real technical ability where professional training is a must for the job.

Of course, the unskilled don't necessarily have to stop where they are. Plenty of training courses are available to them—lectures, seminars, home study, and so on. By picking and choosing, you can almost certainly find the help you need to go forward in the employment field.

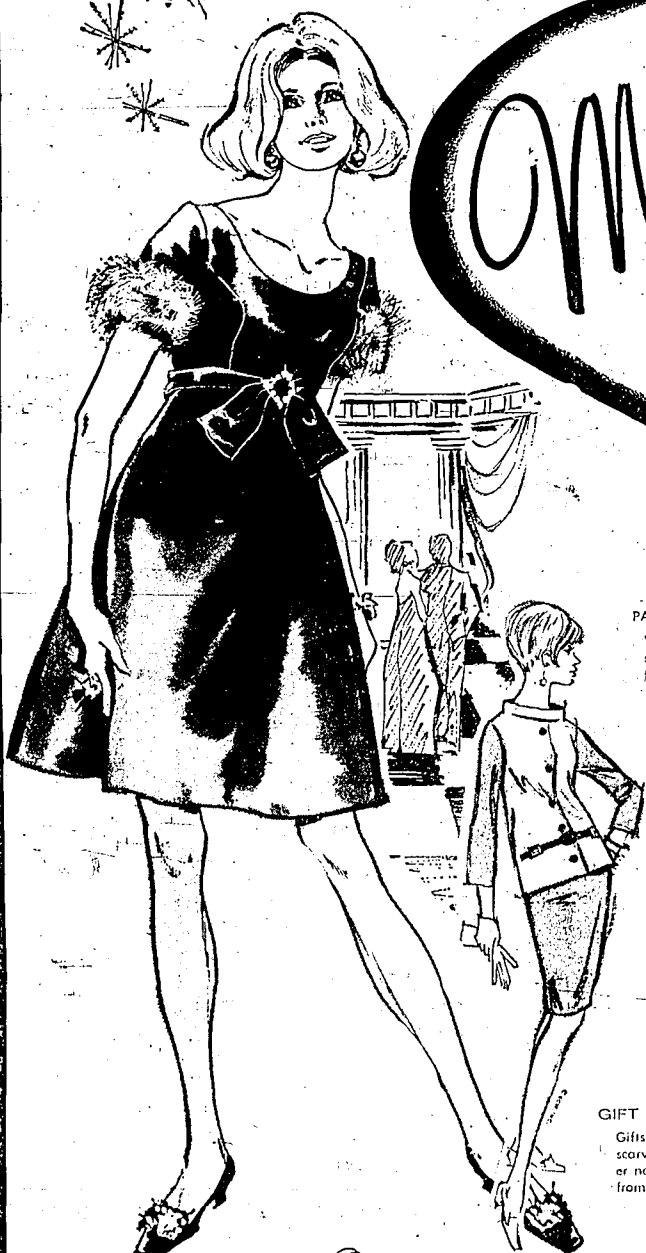
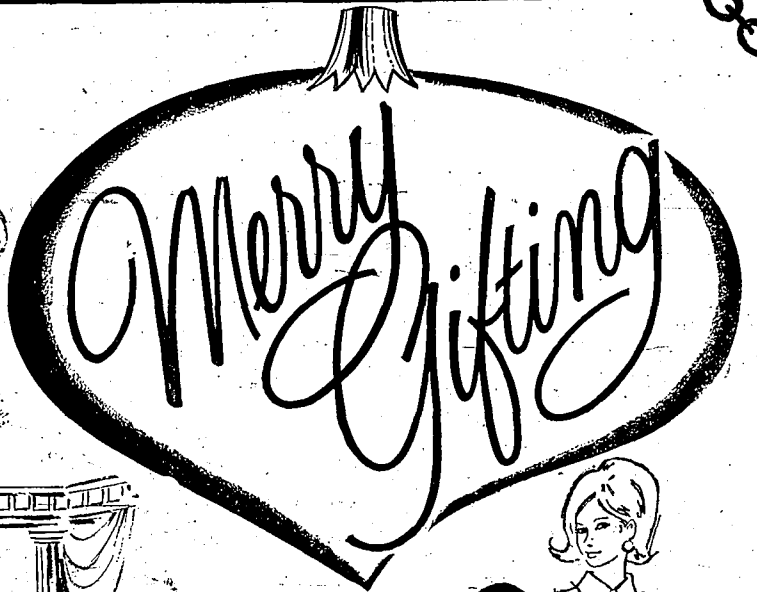
Your library probably has a few public books that describe the field, and explain how to exploit it. If these prove too general for your individual case, as they may do since employment varies from place to place, then it's time to consult the local authorities. Agencies, business, and employers know what's going on. They know the seasonal changes. They're useful people to talk to.

There's no magic formula for finding a part-time job. But there's definitely a formula, and whether or not it works depends largely on how skillfully you employ it.

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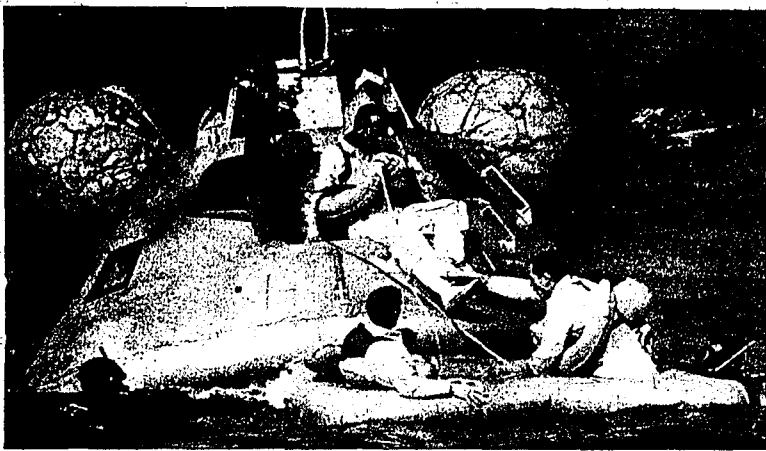

## Astrologer Correctly Predicts Role Of Negro Woman As U.S. Leader

NEW YORK (NEA) — When Shirley Chisholm was 4 years old, an astrologer predicted she would one day become a leader of her people.

The prediction was a long shot for a couple of reasons. The girl was poor and the girl was black and that combination in this country has too often produced cleaning women and names on the welfare rolls.

But in this case, the astrologer was correct. Next January, the now 43-year-old Shirley Chisholm will assume a totally unique leadership—the first Negro woman ever elected to the U.S. House of Representatives.

She will lead 160,000 of her people—the black, white and Puerto Rican area of Brooklyn known as Bedford-Stuyvesant. They picked her (by a 16,000-vote margin) over nationally prominent civil rights leader James Farmer.

"I guess my hearing Farmer was a surprise to some," says the new congresswoman. "But not to me. I've been hearing the odds all of my life."

Born in the West Indies (she still retains the clipped island speech), Shirley Chisholm migrated to the United States with seamstress mother and unskilled father. The family was, she says, always broke. And being broke and black in a New York slum almost ruled out any promise for the young immigrant.

"I remember," she says, "when we used to get our clothing from the Welfare Department and I'd get a baggy old dress to wear. All the kids in school would look at me. I'd never forget their slurs. I'd go home, rip off the clothing and vow never to return to school again."

But she did return—to beat the odds. She became a devoted student, displayed an IQ of 150, constantly led her class, stand-ins and went on to collect four college degrees and several top positions in the field of education.

She also collected a husband (a civil service private investigator) and a handful of social theories that, unmistakably, are aimed at releasing the black woman from her "stereotyped and subservient" image.

"I hope," says Mrs. Chisholm, "that my election will prove something to the country. That is that black women are going to become a strong force for change here. And with God's help I propose to help lead that change."

### 'Longest Loaf' Tallies 66 Feet

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) — The local baker in the small town of Kihikihik claims a world record for the longest loaf of bread.

It is the second New Zealand baker in three months to make such a claim.

John T. Gould's masterpiece was turned out of his oven at five feet 1 inch.

The record attempt was made to raise funds for the local Imbrogno society. The loaf was purchased for 20 New Zealand dollars (\$22.40 U.S.), then cut into pieces and sold for a total of 63 New Zealand dollars (\$70.68 U.S.) for the society.

For the record, the loaf contained: 7 pounds of yeast, 70 pounds of flour; 2 pounds of salt, 4 pounds of gluten, 21 pounds of fat. It was baked in nine-foot sections—each taking half an hour.

WELFARE PANEL NAMED NEW DELEGATE (AP) — Parliament has approved appointment of a parliamentary committee to watch over the welfare of India's 70 million untouchables. The practice of untouchability, keeping the so-called scheduled castes apart from normal human relationships, long been outlawed but still exists, M.P.s pointed out in debate.

Most certainly, Mrs. Chisholm proposed to lead vigorously. She is a slightly built, broadly beaming woman, but she has a reputation as a fist pounder. More than once she has scoured the ears of proponents of opposing viewpoints.

"Yes, I'm militant and I'm outspoken," she says. "and I have no intention of going to Congress and just sitting quietly and observing. I intend to speak out immediately in order to focus attention on the nation's problems."

The nation's most imposing problem, as the new legislator sees it, is poverty — and that means civil rights and that means rights for black women as well as black men. For too

long, she says, the black woman has been forced to be both mom and pop in the Negro family structure.

"Realize this," says Mrs. Chisholm. "Some 70 per cent of Negro welfare families in the aid to dependent children category are headed by women. Their men left long ago and the women are stuck with no mobility at all.

"Now the men didn't leave because they were irresponsible. They left because, maybe, they were ashamed at not being able to find work or because they realized the family would collect more welfare money with them out of the way.

"But the women are still alone. They have children to feed and clothe. They can't work

because there is nobody to babysit. And so they must continually be subjected to the harassment and embarrassment of welfare."

The solution, says Mrs. Chisholm, is work. Guaranteed work.

She advocates a massive federal day care program which will release welfare mothers to available jobs. She calls for while new federal training programs which will prepare unskilled workers for today's vacant jobs.

In short, Mrs. Chisholm is asking that black women be unshackled from "circumstances of near slavery." That they be allowed to get out of the welfare lines and into jobs, politics or whatever else their ambitions suggest.

History indicates that the new legislator's goal is an ambitious one. The odds are not favorable. But then they never have been for Shirley Chisholm.

## Change Of Direction Is Planned

The Twin Falls office of the Idaho Department of Employment may soon undertake a change in direction in its services, reported Bill Parenteau, assistant manager of the office.

Members of the staff are now compiling data to see what areas of the bureau's services should be emphasized, he said.

"There are several agencies in the city that duplicate work. We are attempting to coordinate the activities of the various public service agencies in the area in order to avoid duplication," stated Mr. Parenteau.

"A number of people served at the employment office are those who are out of work six or seven times a year. In many cases these same people receive help from the county commissioners, Salvation Army, DPA, and others," he said.

"The Department of Employment wants to utilize its staff to the best advantage and also to promote better cooperation between the various agencies that deal with the same problems," he stated.

"We are now undertaking a study to see what can be done in these and other areas. We hope to have some concrete proposals within the next two weeks," he added.

## Bandits Jeer

LYON, France (AP) — Four armed bandits swept into the casino at suburban Charbonniers-les-Bains today and grabbed \$27,400 from gamblers and the casino cash box.

Their faces masked by helmets used by skiers, the gunmen forced gamblers and croupiers to lie on the gaming tables while they scooped up the money.

As they left, one of the bandits shouted: "We have the money, Messieurs. Les jeux sont faits! (The bets are down)." That is the last call of the croupier before the draw at baccarat.

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## Austria Stays Neutral Despite Intrigues

VIENNA — (NEA) — The trail of suicides, arrests and defections that Soviet spies have left behind them in West Germany has led directly to Austria's doorstep, much to the consternation of the Austrian government.

To date, four Austrians have been arrested as Soviet spies, including a civil servant, Dr. Franz Soronics, of the government's press service. Other arrests are expected, and they will put severe strain on Austria's neutrality.

The tip-off that Eastern bloc spies were operating both in West Germany and Austria is said to have come from an angry Czech officer, who fled to Vienna after the invasion of Czechoslovakia. Allegedly, the officer turned over a list of spies working in Austria to the Austrian government. Later the defector left for Bonn, where he is said to have told all to the West German authorities.

Adding color to this story is the fact that all seven suicides linked with espionage in Germany occurred not less than five weeks after the Czech invasion.

Meanwhile, as a result of the spy disclosures in Austria, this tiny republic is feeling more isolated and vulnerable than ever. Part of its isolation is due to the fact that it has common borders with such Eastern bloc neighbors as Hungary and Czechoslovakia.

At the Federal Defense Ministry one of the top advisers spoke to me candidly about the problems posed by Austria's proximity and her neutrality. He is Johann Ellinger, a former army captain, who has had much to do with contingency planning.

"By terms of the State Treaty pledging neutrality, we are not allowed to have guided missiles or rockets of any kind," Ellinger explains. "Added to this hand-

icap, we have only about 150 combat aircraft and too few anti-aircraft guns.

The Austrian government is buying Swedish SAAB-105 jet fighters, but these will not come into service until 1971.

Austria has a standing army of 55,000, including civilian personnel, plus a *not* other 350,000 males who have had military training. But the call-up period of nine months is too short and should be doubled, Ellinger feels.

"About all Austria has of strategic value to an invader is the air space overhead and a vital stretch, of the Danube," the ex-army captain declares. "As for the Austrian army, about all it could do in case of invasion would be to fight a delaying action, but this it could do very effectively."

"On the flat, open spaces it could delay armored columns by blowing up bridges and roads, erecting barriers, cutting communications, confusing and demoralizing the enemy.

"In the mountains, a relatively small force of Austrians could operate even more effectively. It would take weeks to repair the mountain roads it destroyed, and meanwhile sharpshooters could slow up the enemy's advance."

In the Czech crisis, Austria's problem as a neutral nation was to keep any fighting from spilling over its borders, and to disarm the combatants in case it did.

"We now know," says Ellinger, "that Austria was never threatened, but at the time there were some 70,000 Warsaw Pact troops concentrated in the center where Austria, West Germany and Czechoslovakia meet, and later there was a dangerous build-up of troops along the Hungarian border."

"Moreover, wild rumors were circulating that Russia might attempt to force a passage through Austria in order to invade Yugoslavia, though we at the Defense Ministry discounted such reports.

Before leaving to take a karate lesson, Ellinger could not resist reminding me that the only nation ever to violate Austria's air space was the United States. "This occurred in 1958, when trouble broke out in Lebanon, and American troops were flown from West Germany to Beirut."

He grinned and added, "We hope that it won't happen again."

## U.S. To Seek Safety In Used Cars

WASHINGTON (AP)—A first step toward federal safety standards for used cars and other vehicles—similar to standards already being imposed for new cars—has been announced by the Federal Highway Administration.

The agency acknowledged Tuesday the move raises "a host of technical, economic and social issues." It said such standards probably would be enforced through state motor vehicle inspection programs.

Federal Highway Administrator Lowell K. Bridwell invited public comment on proposed guidelines for setting safety standards for such equipment as brakes, steering and suspension systems, lights, and windshield wipers.

No tentative date was given for starting the proposed standards, provided for under the Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1966, which also authorized setting of the federal safety standards for new cars.

## Consultants Offer 'Rare' Safety Tips

NEW DELHI (AP)—An Indian business consultant firm issued printed brochures offering safety tips to the public. Some of the suggestions were:

- "Put your hand to stop the traffic, but be kind.
- "Be honest, but safe.
- "Don't allow toys lying here and there on the floor. Someone may strike them and hurt, if not more.
- "Handle machinery with care. Secure your limbs well.
- "Think well of your interest. In strike or in work."

NEW YORK (AP) — Daniel Massey, the son of actor Raymond Massey and current portraying Noel Coward in the film, "Star," has an image problem.

First, he was always identified as the son of actor Raymond Massey. Never just Daniel Massey, actor.

But, Daniel Massey did make it on his own, particularly on the British stage and also in appearances in English movies and television.

Now, he is costarring in his first Hollywood-made film, "Star," with Julie Andrews.

In the musical biography of Gertrude Lawrence, he portrays Noel Coward and plays it so well that he's afraid of his new image—a "Noel Coward-type, witty, urbane, warm."

"I don't want to always be the guy with the flower in the buttonhole and the cigarette shooting out of the mouth," says London-born Massey.

"I want to put myself between them, the audience and the screen."

Massey was appearing with Sir Ralph Richardson and Margaret Rutherford in "The Rivals" on the London stage when he was sent the script for "Star."

"I practically talked myself

out of it," he recalls. "Who, me? As Noel Coward?"

Coward—a close family friend of the Masseys—in fact, young Massey's godfather—said nothing about the possibility of his position playing the part, except, "Get your bloody hair cut," Massey recalls. "But there was never another peep out of him."

Coward, a personal friend of Miss Lawrence, as well as a playwright, songwriter and actor, was at the London opening and was "very, very kind," Massey remembers.

But the Coward role is past now and no matter how successful—critics generally praised his aging more than the film in the musical biography of Gertrude Lawrence, he portrays Noel Coward and plays it so well that he's afraid of his new image—a "Noel Coward-type, witty, urbane, warm."

"There's no reason," he says of the actor who has reached some sort of success, "that you have to play the tune that put you there."

Massey seeks variety in his acting roles. He talks with experience of trying different parts, new parts, daring parts.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union faces almost certain defeat in its attempt to get North Korea an unconditional invitation to join the U.N. debate on the Korean question.

The General Assembly's main political committee is expected to approve instead a rival proposal by the United States and 11 other countries to invite the Communist regime if it "unequivocally accepts" the competence of the United Nations to deal with the Korean question.

The United States has accused the Soviet Union of applying the same "off limits" policy in Korea that it did to Czechoslovakia.

In previous years the United States has always won approval for its proposal that both Koreas be invited to the debate if they accept U.N. authority on Korea.

South Korea has always agreed to the stipulation that the North Korea has always rejected. Communist regime if it "unequivocally accepts" the competence of the United Nations to deal with the Korean question.

GANVIE, Dahomey (AP) — Centuries ago thousands fled the kingdom of Abomey—a monarchy founded on the bloody rites of voodoo and thriving on the booming slave trade of West Africa—and found refuge here around the quiet shores of Lake Nokoue.

Today 40,000 villagers live on the lake and off its produce, the staple, Africa's greatest food fish.

The capital of this community of primitive lake dwellers is Ganvie, a miniature Venice of Africa, located about 35 miles north of Dahomey's commercial center, Cotonou, on the southern coast of the hump of Africa.

Here 11,000 fishermen and their families still live in simple bamboo huts perched above the lake on wooden stilts much like their European counterparts of ages gone by.

There is a small post office, seldom used, which shakes precariously under the weight of more than four pairs of feet. This is Ganvie's main link to Cotonou. A general store serves customers as they paddle up to the counter in their dugout canoes. It sells cigarettes, chewing gum, nuts and candy.

A bar, main attraction for the occasional tourist, offers beer at 40 cents a bottle (a domestic brew), whiskey and soda at 60 cents a three and a plentiful supply of fresh peanuts. An unexpected gasoline-motor refrigerator whirs in the back-ground. Tapping water underneath the bamboo floor gives clients a floating sensation. The "pub" sways gently with the tide.

Dahomey is still voodoo country.

From there to there as you paddle through the waterways small fetish temples rise out of the water to block the way. Here voodoo sacrifices of chicken blood mixed with flour and other secret ingredients are safely kept in sacred ponds surrounded by pieces of broken mirrors, glass and beads.

Stories still circulate of young maidens of Ganvie who "disappear" at night and are taken to nearby Ghana in slavery to worship in the cult of the crocodile.

Parents whose daughters become "Daughters of the Crocodile" mourn little over such events—their community status is raised considerably for having been the ones "honored."

In the center of Ganvie the women of the community meet twice weekly to market their goods in an impromptu "market place" of dozens of stalls brought alongside one another.

Confusion reigns as deals are made, broken, renegotiated and settled. Children scramble over the adjoining canoes, threatening to capsize the entire enterprise.

The scene is of a quaint village, happy in its isolation and self-sufficient. But all is not well in Ganvie.

The fresh water lake, once rich in salt plant life and consequently fish—on which the village's traditional economy is entirely dependent—has been invaded by the sea.

Ever since a sand bar protecting the lake from the saline water in the Cotonou Channel eroded in 1901, following the construction of Port Cotonou, life has never been the same.

With the salt water has come the notorious teredo, the scourge of the wooden railroad that once sailed the seas. The teredo is a small which bore into wood and leaves nothing in its path standing canoes, threatening to capsize the entire enterprise.

The advent of the teredo, says 20-year-old Robin Welcomme of London, a United Nations fisheries expert in Cotonou, has been disastrous for the lake dwellers.

Akadias, the sophisticated fish traps which consist of an artificial "forest" of branches surrounded by a bamboo wall, sometimes two and a half quadrants miles in size, have been hit hardest.

The teredo has attacked the "forest," a breeding ground for

the fish, as well as the bamboo piles and, even more disquieting, the wood pilings that support the thousands of homes here.

Welcomme says the parasitic snails have imposed a heavy rise in the cost of living.

The villagers' teak canoes, imported from Nigeria, are being eaten away at a cost of \$10 to \$120 a canoe, in a country where the annual per capita income is \$70 to \$75. The pilings under the bamboo dwellings are being whittled away so fast they must be replaced every seven years, when at one time they lasted more than 20 years.

Worst of all, the fishing business has suffered.

Welcomme estimates that the lake used to produce 18,000 metric tons of fish a year. This, he says, has been reduced to about 12,000 metric tons—representing a loss of approximately \$16,000 per year.

The obvious answer is to build a dam across the Cotonou Channel and cut off the sea. But Dahomey, a poor land with few resources and capital at its disposal, can ill afford the investment.

It will be several years, Welcomme estimates, before anything is done to ease the plight of the fishermen of Ganvie.

Meanwhile the villagers go about their daily lives, willing to promote a tourist trade which never seems to get off its feet.

## Happy Natives Greet Marines Returning To Pacific Island Where 5,800 Died In War

EDITOR'S NOTE: William H. Hipple, new western director of public relations for American Airlines, was The Associated Press war correspondent on the beach at Tarawa atoll in the Western Pacific Ocean when the Marines landed 25 years ago. He returned to Tarawa this week to commemorate the anniversary.

TARAWA, Gilbert Islands (AP) — Exactly 25 years later we came ashore to this lonely atoll astride the Equator in the middle Pacific where 5,800 men had died for their beliefs in four days of vicious fighting.

This time we were met by happy, dancing Gilbertese natives in grass skirts and flowered print clothing and piled with freshly cut coconuts filled with sweet cool milk. White chief British officials welcomed us with handshakes and bows.

A few of these people were the same. Our party of five, who had been on the original invasion, was led by Gen. David M. Shoup, former commandant of the U.S. Marines and Medal of Honor winner for his heroic leadership on this island.

Gen. Shoup came out of retirement for eight days to represent the United States at formal ceremonies commemorating the 25th anniversary of the assault of Marine and naval forces against this Japanese-held fortress.

The plaque which Gen. Shoup dedicated at the end of the pier on Betio, the tiny one-half square mile island of this atoll where the assault took place, says, "This was the first American assault against a fortified atoll—the testing ground for Marine amphibious doctrine and techniques that paved the way for the island campaigns that followed and saved thousands of American lives along the road to victory in the Pacific."

Of course, it could not tell the full story of the 1943 U.S. Marines killed and 2,392 wounded, and 4,690 Japanese dead.

British, Australian, New Zealand and Gilbert and Ellice Island officials participated, with Gen. Shoup and U.S. Vice Consul Peter Mohr from Fiji in the dedication of the monument. Honor guards from the U.S. destroyer escort Minotaur, the native constabulary of the Gilbert Islands and delegations of local girls and Boy Scouts, schools and native organizations stood in a line. Crowded on the pier were some 5,000 Gilbertese, solemn and ebullient in their native dress.

Virtually unnoticed in the crowd was Capt. Uno Surenaga of the Japanese trading ship *"Fiji Maru,"* by chance the vessel had arrived at Betio the day before—the first Japanese ship to visit here in 25 years. Capt. Surenaga was invited to the ceremony, where he stood, unsmiling and at attention.
