

# FAA Orders Air Traffic Limits At Big Terminals To Ease Congestion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government for the first time has issued restrictions aimed at easing the mounting problem of air traffic congestion.

The restrictions at five airports in Washington, New York, and Chicago become effective April 27, a date set because airlines normally change their schedules about then.

The Federal Aviation Agency,

selling the hourly limits in a new rule issued Monday night. Indicated its action was a stop-gap measure and that the answer to congestion lies in building more airports.

An FAA spokesman said the limits, expected to draw bitter criticism from small plane operators, were the first ever set directly because of congestion.

He said the government limited flights at Washington's National Airport two years ago because ground facilities, such as restaurants and rest rooms, were overtaxed.

Major airlines gave somewhat reluctant support to the restrictions after their proposal earlier this year following massive air strikes in July. An FAA official said the big carriers felt they needed some curbs for their own good.

The Department of Transportation, parent agency of the FAA, said it again will propose legislation to provide for the needed expansion. It proposed a plan last year, but opposition was still and Congress did not act.

The new limitation, proposed Sept. 4, would hold landings and takeoffs to 135 an hour at O'Hare Airport in Chicago, 80 at Kennedy International in New York and 60 at New York's LaGuardia, Newark Airport and Washington National.

O'Hare has had as many as 82 more flights in an hour, Kennedy 48 more.

Small planes would be barred entirely from Kennedy Airport between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m. daily, a peak period. And they would be given only a few landings and takeoffs at other hours.

But the FAA dropped another provision the small-plane operators said would have discriminated against them. It would have required two pilots and a minimum air speed of 150 knots for all planes in the area of the five airports in bad-weather conditions.

And the limitation system, to be operated by the FAA, will allow more flights when possible, "without significant additional delay."

The government began working on the flight limitations plan after massive cloudb and long delays in the airways system last summer.

Worst of the cloudb first occurred when traffic controllers, saying they were overwhelmed, slowed to a level they said conformed strictly to FAA rules. More controllers now are being added by the FAA.

## Orbiting Telescope Eyes Stars

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — America's astronomical observatory, most complete scientific spacecraft yet developed, rockets into orbit early Wednesday in the first of a double-header launching this week.

A European space research organization's first interplanetary satellite is to blast off from nearby launch pad 17 today to paint the sky in a multicolored study of earth's magnetic field.

Perched atop a powerful Atlas-Centaur rocket, the U.S. craft will give astronomers their first look at the heavens from a point outside the atmosphere because of the disturbing influence of earth's atmosphere.

Packed aboard the spacecraft are 11 telescopes designed to photograph "young" stars which are extremely hot and radiate an ultraviolet light filtered-out by the atmosphere. Information from these stars may provide scientific clues to the origin of the universe and our own solar system.

The European satellite, named Hera for highly eccentric orbit satellite, is to ride atop a Delta rocket into a lofty orbit that will carry it 138,000 miles above earth, equivalent to two-thirds the distance to the moon.

Among eight experiments is one which requires Hera to release another capsule in orbit about two months after launch. The capsule, containing a mixture of barium and copper oxide chemicals, is to be blown up by a signal from earth to release a cloud of barium ions in earth's magnetic field.

## U.S. Reports Reds Violate Bomb Halt In 455 Incidents

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command said today that reconnaissance has disclosed 455 indications of North Vietnamese activity in the demilitarized zone since the bombing halt on Nov. 1 and in at least 122 of the incidents American planes, artillery or warships fired on the enemy forces.

Previously the U.S. Command had reported American firing into the DMZ on 30 occasions since the bombing halt, only 10 of which the command had called "significant" incidents of enemy activity. Today a U.S. spokesman disclosed that American forces had fired into the southern half of the zone 117 times and into the northern of North Vietnam half five times.

"The reason we did not report the others is that the results were not significant," the spokesman said. "In some cases the target was obscured and we could not get an accurate assessment of the results. Bad weather precluded an assessment. You might call some of it harassing and interdiction fire, like cutting a road where activity had been spotted."

While the majority of the 455 "indications of enemy activity or presence in the demilitarized zone" were labeled insignificant by U.S. Headquarters, the total

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## Alaskan Airliner Crash Kills 39

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A twin-engine propeller airliner crashed into a frozen lake in barren southwest Alaska Monday, killing all 39 persons aboard.

Residents of an Eskimo village near the crash site reported by short wave radio they saw an explosion near the tail of the Wien Consolidated Airlines plane before it spiraled to earth. Wind gusting to 55 miles per hour and 11 below zero temperature hampered efforts to recover the bodies and start an investigation into the crash. Teams of workers from the Air Force, FAA, National Transportation

Safety Board—the FBI hoped to reach the scene by helicopter or small plane today.

George Fay of the Federal Aviation Administration in Anchorage confirmed that the reports indicated either an explosion or that the craft was trailing smoke before it hit the frozen ground and careened into the ice of Spots Lake.

The FAA said there was no indication of what caused the crash.

The plane was bound from Anchorage, 150 miles northeast, in several small towns on a regularly scheduled flight.

An Air Force helicopter reached the site Monday afternoon, but its commander, Maj. Norman E. Kemhoo, of Fortymont, said fierce winds forced him to take off after 15 minutes of the search. He said there were no survivors and that Force medics checked the bodies they could find.

"Dead were 38 passengers and the crew, Capt. David Stanley, Capt. Jerry Svengard and stewardess Susan Amar, all of Anchorage. The plane was making a southwestern Alaska swing to Ilamna, Big Mountain, King Salmon and Dillingham.

"The plane was just a hulk," Kemhoo said. "I couldn't tell which end was up, and I couldn't tell that it was an airplane."

Bodies were scattered over the area, he said. Eskimo villagers said they would stay with the wreckage to keep animals away.

The board of directors of Wien Consolidated was discussing the airline's safety record at a meeting in Seattle when it got word of the crash. It was the first fatal accident on the line, formed last April in a merger of Wien Airlines and Northern Consolidated.

RAV Peterson, board chairman of Wien said neither of the lines had a fatal accident before the merger. Wien Consolidated has been flying six F27s on intra-Alaska schedules.

The crash site was in frozen marshland surrounded by mountains, the highest reaching about 7,500 feet.

Bill Valley news director of KTVA and KBYR, Anchorage, flew to Ilamna and reported the plane was from the bush that spoke of the explosion.

"The reports came from the vicinity of Pedro Bay, he said.

Officer Stroberg is currently in Boise where he is attending a three-day narcotics school.

## 'Cal Tech' President Joins Staff

NEW YORK (AP) — President-elect Richard M. Nixon announced today his appointment of physicist Lee A. DuBridge, president of the California Institute of Technology, to be his policymaking science adviser.

Nixon told reporters that he believed a number of scientists and intellectuals "take a rather dim view of the political operation" and expressed hope that the 67-year-old DuBridge would help bridge that gap.

DuBridge, who had planned to resign his university post soon — he has been president of Cal Tech since 1946 — said, for his own part, that he would try to encourage and increase federally sponsored basic research, which he said is in a downward trend.

The president-elect said DuBridge, whom he has known for 22 years, has been able to advance his retirement date and will be immediately working full time for the incoming administration.

He said his new science adviser would go to Washington almost at once to confer with Dr. Donald F. Hornig, who holds the advisory post in the Johnson administration.

DuBridge told newsmen that "certainly my first interest" would be in expanding basic science, which, he noted, lays the foundation for application in every day life.

He also expressed surprise about any move to sharply cut back on the space program.

"I think it important for the United States to meet its commitments" in space, that "science and technology cannot be cut off and on like a faucet," DuBridge said.

Nixon also announced the formation of two task forces that will report to him with policy recommendations by inauguration day. A task force on science will be headed by Dr. H. Guyford, Stever, president of Carnegie-Mellon University, Pittsburgh. A space task force will be directed by Dr. Charles Townes, a Nobel Prize winner in physics, from the University of California at Berkeley.

Over the years, DuBridge has been a member of many federal advisory bodies but never served full time in government.

## Pilot Finds Stolen Plane Hard To Fly

NEW YORK (AP) — A lone pilot in a stolen plane took off from New Jersey today, tried unsuccessfully four times to land at Kennedy Airport and then flew south over the Atlantic until he ran out of fuel and ditched in the fog-shrouded sea about 50 miles off Norfolk, Va.

The flyer was rescued an hour later by a Coast Guard amphibious helicopter that had pursued him through his long solitary voyage in the single-engine plane. The man was said to be in "reasonably good" condition. The plane sank.

The Coast Guard said the man had been identified as John D. Hemphill, 32, of Brioktown, N.J. A car registered to Hemphill was found at the Lambertwood, N.J., airport from which the plane was taken.

State Police said Hemphill's wife told her she had an argument with her husband Monday evening. Police said the car had blood on the front seat, and that Hemphill had been treated for a head injury at a local hospital Monday night.

The Coast Guard said the apparently inexperienced flyer was given instructions on how to set the plane down in the sea by Capt. Vance K. Randle, pilot of rescue aircraft and a veteran of 20 years of flying.

The helicopter was taking the man to the Elizabeth City, N.C. Coast Guard Air station where an agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was to take him in custody.

Coast County Aviation, owner of the Piper Cherokee, 140 and operator of the airport, told

police the plane—with a full tank or five hours of fuel—was taken sometime before 1 a.m. The first word from the pilot came in a radio communication to a New Jersey airport at 1:24 a.m. The flyer contacted Kennedy Airport tower and said: "I'm riding a stolen plane. I'm lost. I need help."

Kennedy controllers ordered commercial flights to halt operations and then tried to talk the man into a landing on Runway 22-Left.

"It was absolutely crazy," one Port Authority policeman recalled later. "He came in low, swooped down to 50-100 feet and then he zoomed away again."

## Saigon Will Offer 3-Point Peace Plan

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnam's delegation to the Paris peace talks will take along a three-point plan, informed government sources said today.

"The ridiculous, very ridiculous," said a spokesman in Paris for the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front when told the plan's third point called for the NLF and the Viet Cong to rally to the Saigon government.

The other points are:

1. A de-escalation of the fighting, particularly reduction of attacks on South Vietnam's cities and a halt to incidents in the demilitarized zone.
2. A "cease-fire and guaranteed withdrawal of North Vietnamese forces, accompanied by a phased cutback in American strength."
3. An advance party for South Vietnamese President Nguyen Cao Ky began arriving Monday on procedures toward the opening of the expanded conference.

Nguyen Thieu Nhon, Ky's special assistant for legislative relations, was the first arrival. South Vietnamese officials said Ky's spokesman, Dang Duc Khoi, is due Wednesday.

Ky is expected this weekend. He will supervise the Saigon government's negotiating team, but South Vietnamese sources said Saigon's group at the conference table will be headed by Pham Dong Lam, Vietnam's chief observer in Paris when the United States and North Vietnam were doing the talking from May to October.

Lam returned to Saigon last month for his father's funeral and is expected back Friday.

With the South Vietnamese delegation expected in full strength by the end of the week, U.S. and North Vietnamese negotiators held their first meeting Monday on procedures toward the opening of the conference next week.

The newspaper said the official announcement will be made "within a few days."

Barry Lockley, Volpe's press secretary, said "We absolutely have no comment on this story whatsoever."

Volpe campaigned for Nixon and was mentioned as a possible vice presidential candidate.

Control Commission. U.S. officials contend that North Vietnam is accepting the bombing halt, tacitly acknowledging an understanding to keep the DMZ free of military activity and to refrain from indiscriminate attacks on major South Vietnamese cities.

North Vietnam claims the bombing halt was unconditional and that U.S. reconnaissance flights over the DMZ and North Vietnam are illegal.

The U.S. headquarters also announced that American forces will observe the 24-hour Christmas cease-fire proclaimed by Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger last January.

Nguyen Van Thieu, but as in the past, American troops will take any defensive measures necessary to protect themselves. Last Christmas the U.S. Command accused the Viet Cong of violating the 24-hour truce 30 times.

Thieu's office announced there would be no cease-fire for New Year's or for the Tet festival of the lunar new year in February, presumably because the Viet Cong launched a major offensive shortly after the Tet cease-fire last January.

A Viet Cong representative in Cambodia said last week that he understood the Viet Cong would order a cease-fire for Christmas, New Year's Day and Tet.

### LBJ Enacts Astronaut Pact

WASHINGTON (AP)—A treaty providing for the rescue and recovery of astronauts who land outside their own country was formally proclaimed as in effect by President Johnson today.

The agreement, signed last April, provides that the United States and the Soviet Union, has since been signed by more than 75 countries.

Each signing country agrees to begin prompt rescue efforts and to return home any astronauts in its territory through accident or emergency, and to render what help it can in case of an ocean landing.

In addition to providing help for astronauts, the agreement contains provisions for return of objects launched into space.

## Samuelson Plans Conference With GOP Leaders Of Session

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Don W. Samuelson said today he will confer with Republican legislative leaders regarding the program he will submit to the 1969 Idaho Legislature, but will not contact the Democrats in advance.

"This is our administration and our program," Samuelson said at a news conference. "I'll talk to members of my own party about the program."

Samuelson said he would meet with the Republican legislators at a "coffee hour" Thursday morning, prior to the convening at 1 p.m. of an organizational session of the legislature.

Republicans are in the majority in both the House and Senate.

The governor confirmed reports that Republican leadership problems apparently are pretty well decided except for party affiliation. The senator majority leader in the Senate, A number have indicated an interest in that job.

Leadership positions which Samuelson said he understood have been decided upon are Rep. William J. Lanigan, 27, as assistant majority leader in the House; Sen. James Ellsworth of Leaders as president pro tem of the Senate; majority leaders Phil Burt of Wilder in the Senate and Terry Crapo of Idaho Falls in the House, and Assistant Majority Leader in the House of Moscow in the House.

Samuelson said he is undecided about his recommendation on court reorganization. He vetoed a proposal enacted by the 1967 Legislature and said he still opposes that plan. He said he may have some suggestions intended to upgrade the quality of the lower courts.

The governor said the major task of the 1969 session will involve changes in laws covering the investment of state funds. The constitutional amendment, broadening the potential investment area was approved in the Nov. 5 election.

Samuelson said he conferred Monday with Wayne York, executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association. He said he got the impression that if local spending—both state and local—for the schools is increased by \$19 million for the biennium the IEA will be satisfied with the state's effort.

Samuelson said he likely will appoint within a day or two a new attorney general, replacing Melvin Illert, who became a justice of the State Supreme Court in January. The governor said he will insist his appointee agree to be a candidate for election as attorney general in 1970.

Samuelson said he hopes to appoint by Dec. 15 a successor to Louise Stoddick, secretary of commerce and development, who resigned to become administrative assistant to Congress.

Faculty and staff joined in

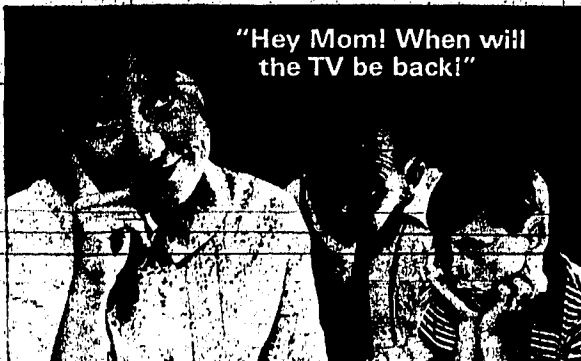

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# New Pressures Sharpen Berlin Fears

WASHINGTON — While Russia is trying to cool the burning anxieties aroused by its march into Czechoslovakia, the Kremlin's East German allies are intensifying economic pressure on beleaguered Berlin. That is the somber picture brought back by U.S. lawmakers

who met with European counterparts in Brussels last month. They attended an annual meeting of NATO legislators to discuss the status of the North Atlantic Alliance.

New concern about Berlin, long the focal point of cold-war tensions, were widely expressed by European parliamentarians, according to U.S. participants in the conference. The new apprehensions involve a new set of Communist tactics.

European legislators are now predicting that the East German Communists will seek to avoid direct confrontations with the Allied powers in Berlin. The Berlin government and civilian Berliners are now the target, according to these reports.

At the moment, attention is centered on France and West Germany. The franc took a severe beating during the riots and work stoppages of last spring, and the shock waves are still reverberating.

The dilemma for the United States and other free world nations in all this is that if the franc is threatened to the point of devaluation, it could result in a round of similar revaluations by other currencies, including the pound sterling.

In comparison, the Deutsche Mark has been gaining favor increasingly in money markets because of Bonn's excellent balance of payments record. The contrast between France, a nation which has turned dramatically from a gold purchasing

Unpalatable though it may be, remembering De Gaulle's deliberate attempts to undermine both the dollar and the pound, it is now in the best interests of all free world currencies to help correct serious imbalances, such as that now afflicting the franc.

Nations with handsome surpluses in their international accounts, such as West Germany, can be most helpful by increasing foreign investments and turning to a larger extent in free world defenses.

However, the coolness by both President Johnson and President-elect Nixon toward tax reform contrasts with reviving Congressional interest in the subject. Besides the usual liberal demand for tax reform, it may be pushed by Capitol Hill's two top tax writers: Rep. Wilbur Mills of Arkansas, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Rep. John Byrnes of Wisconsin, the Committee's senior Republican.

A foothold: A tax reformer—liberal Democratic Rep. Sam Gibbons of Florida—now has a slight edge over a fellow Florida conservative, Rep. Don Fuqua, for a Ways and Means vacancy.

Influential figures in the foreign-affairs community, including some senior State Department officials, are waging an intense campaign for Wall Street financier Douglas Dillon to be Secretary of State.

Specifically, there is growing Congressional interest in a proposal originated by Robert F. Kennedy endorsed by the Democratic national platform and believed to be contained in the Treasury draft now gathering dust at the White House; a minimum tax scheme to make sure everybody, even the oil millionaires, pay at least a little bit of Federal tax.

Although Dillon probably would have been Nixon's Secretary of State had he been elected in 1960, Nixon and other Republicans never have completely forgiven Dillon for serving as President Kennedy's Secretary of the Treasury. Not even Dillon's diligent and rather expensive return to the Republican fold in support of Nixon this year has erased the hurt.

**CHAIR.** Not too comfortable, not too uncomfortable. Set your lower back firmly against the chair's back.

Prereading like this may be the best time-saver you will ever learn.

When or when not to pre-read is the first thing to learn. When you read for style appreciation (Dickens, Frost, Shakespeare), forget prereading. When you read for information or opinions, preread.

The title page, table of contents and opening and closing paragraphs of the chapters will answer some questions. However, if this little prereading has raised as many questions as answers, splendid! Now you'll look for answers.

Self-quizzing is the natural follow-up of prereading; and the final step before thorough reading.

This is how questioning works. From your prereading of the title page you ask: What is the precise subject and what angle is to be treated here? How is this particular author qualified to deal with it?

You have preread the table of contents—the author's outline of his book. You saw the whole and all its parts there. You have also preread at least



the beginning and the end of his preface, which is his declaration of purpose. Such questions as these will have to be answered in your thorough reading.

What is the order of the book's development? What sections are stressed more than others? Why? Does the author prove as much as his preface says he'll prove?

Your prereading gave you many answers, but it is most effective when it raises as many right questions as possible. In chapters where prereading gave you little or no help, here's a good way to frame the questions.

Turn topic sentences in these troublesome areas into questions of "how" or "why."

The main thing is to write down the questions that come to your mind in clear form. Prereading is your road map; questioning is the steering wheel. You will get the right answers from your attentive prereading; you will get answers from your flip reading that are as many as questions as the questions you raise.

There is this further advantage in proper questioning: You have completed a summary of your work in question form. Turn these questions into answers and summarizing becomes a very simple matter.

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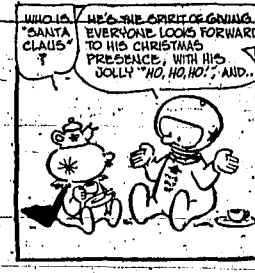

# New Rules Suggested For Solons

By ALLEN M. BAILEY

BOISE (AP)—Several legislative rules changes, including reorganizing committees and committees, were suggested Monday by Robert D. Barbour, Jr., director of the Citizens Committee on the State Legislature.

Other changes he said would save time and money were performance committees in legislative notes with certain bills to explain their financial impact, pre-filing of bills and definite rules for committee hearings.

Barbour said usually the larger a committee is, the less work will be done. The legislature committees have from 11 to 15 members, with one of 17 members which he termed far too large to efficiently conduct discussion of proposed new laws.

There are 14 standing committees in the House and 15 in the Senate, which he said are unwieldy as some legislatures, but with a little bit of consolidation, it could be the best thing in the country," he said.

He said House committees should be consolidated into ten and Senate committees into seven, and adjusted so any member need only serve on one committee.

That would leave 3-5 members on Senate committees and 3-8 on House committees.

Pre-filing of bills before the beginning of the session, so they can be introduced at once on the first day of the session, would enable committees to work on a substantial number of bills, instead of waiting through the initial trickle, he said.

Fiscal notes should be distributed to the legislators, Barbour said, along with copies of bills affecting revenue or expenditures, so lawmakers can find out how much the measures would cost.

Barbour said standing committees of the first regular session of each legislature should be made permanent—that is, they should continue to meet and study proposed legislation between the first and second sessions.

House interior committees, often different from committees handling similar matters during the session, study such matters as taxes, forest fires and government reorganization between sessions.

# CAA Budget For Salaries Is Reported

Al Morgan, South Central Community Action Agency director, has released figures for the monthly budgeting of salaries.

A total of \$4,613 is spent monthly for the 13 people employed by the agency, Morgan pointed out, that eight of these people receive the minimum federal wage of \$1.60 per hour.

Those receiving the minimum wage are the aides and secretaries of the neighborhood centers in Twin Falls and Burley and the outreach aide in Twin Falls.

The director of the Neighborhood Youth Corps program receives \$365 per month. This includes the responsibility for the program bookkeeping and coordination. Salaries of \$500 a month have been budgeted for the two Neighborhood Center directors. These people are responsible for the coordination of all activities at their respective centers.

The Community Action Agency director, who controls total coordination, receives \$800 per month and the director's secretary is paid \$100 per month.

Mr. Morgan said that eight people out of the 13 employed by the agency are from the low income group, and several of these people are the sole support of their family.

He also said there is no type of group insurance or retirement benefits involved in the program. No overtime is paid to the employees and Mr. Morgan estimates that many of the people spend several extra hours each day.

# Tribunal Endorses Sentence

BOISE (AP)—The involuntary manslaughter conviction of Lavar Chaffin of Blackfoot, Idaho, was upheld Monday by the Idaho Supreme Court in one of three unanimous decisions handed down.

The action was brought by the last of the Krupps, Arndt von Bohlen and Halbach, the 30-year-old son of the late Alfred Krupp. His attorney, Frank Josef Hinzert, said the book presented "in a polemic and false way, and at times also indecent and undignified way."

# Officials Ponder Strategy When Paris Parley Resumes

By LEWIS GULICK  
 PARIS (AP) — U.S. diplomats expect a double-track negotiation when the Vietnam peace conference resumes in Paris.

One of the tracks would deal primarily with the military situation and ways to scale down the fighting. The United States would be deeply involved in this bargaining which could produce limited agreements at an early stage.

The other track would involve political affairs in South Vietnam, would be handled mainly by the Vietnamese and would probably move at a slow pace for months.

This is assuming that:

1. The Communists agree to deal with some military items separately rather than insisting on wrapping everything into one package.
2. The expanded parley does not blow up early when the rival Viet-nam m.e.s. start hurling charges at each other face to face.

The delegation from the Saigon government is expected here this week, and the broadened talks are expected to start shortly thereafter.

The new round is to include negotiators from the United States and North Vietnam who began meeting last May, and from the South Vietnam government and the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

President Johnson set a precedent for steps to reduce the level of combat with his order Oct. 31 halting the bombing of North Vietnam. He led this to North Vietnam's not "abandoning" the demilitarized zone between the two Vietnams and a curb on shelling of South Vietnam's cities.

U.S. negotiators believe that despite a flurry of charges and countercharges, Communist violations of Johnson's terms have not been on a large enough scale to warrant resumption of the bombing.

The U.S. delegation has kept under wraps so far just what specific combat reductions may be proposed to the Communists early in the conference. One possibility that has been mentioned is observance of the 1962 Geneva agreement which was supposed to guarantee the independence and neutrality of Laos.

Washington accuses Hanoi of violating that accord by wholesale movement of men and supplies through Laos into South Vietnam. U.S. planes bomb the route, known as the Ho Chi Minh Trail, around the clock. One U.S. proposal at Paris might be designed to stem such infiltration.

Another possibility is a proposal to hold down hostilities in specific localities or regions of North Vietnam. This would fall short of a general cease-fire.

which U.S. officials do not consider practical until much later in the negotiating process.

The chief U.S. negotiator, W. Averell Harriman, said Sunday he hoped for fairly speedy progress on some items once the conference resumes but "a long-term settlement may take quite a while."

Harriman, who flew to the United States for a brief visit said he would be joined by President-elect Richard M. Nixon and give him any information he can if Nixon wants to see him. But Harriman said he assumes that after Nixon is inaugurated the new President will finance him with his own man and "there is no reason why a new team cannot take over without any substantial loss."

In New York, persons who have seen Nixon in the past week said he wants the maximum possible continuity in the U.S. negotiating position, and this was taken as an indication he might ask either Harriman or his chief deputy, Cyrus R. Vance, to stay on in Paris.

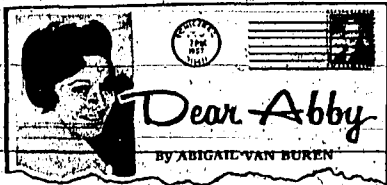

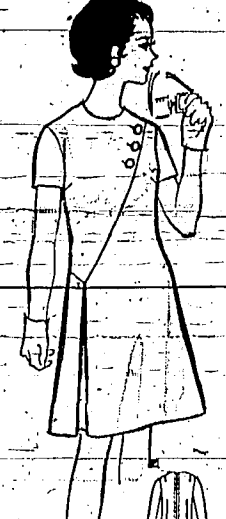
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DEAR MAD: No, she should have left another kind of bone for your family to pick with you.

South's one-club opening was not an artificial club although it looks like one. The game was match point duplicate and South was looking for a top score. We don't like to show success for this type of bid but he did make it and he did get his top score.

Instead of the jack, he didn't have anything to lose. He expected to run off six diamonds and five hearts and would come down to one card in his hand at the finish. If he played his jack of spades, West would know that the last card would be the king. Now West would assume that his partner held the jack.

Sure enough, this is just what happened. South took his ace and queen of diamonds, entered dummy with the queen of hearts, discarded his three clubs and the four of spades on the rest of dummy's diamonds. Van off his remaining hearts and made the 13th trick because West hung onto the ace of clubs as his last card.

It turned out to be a real top score. Other South players opened one heart. Some played if there, others got a no-trump response from North and, raised to two or three, only to wind up with a total of five to seven tricks depending on how the defense went.
