## Support Given State Plan For Rerouting Highway 30-In T. F.

The majority of the people testifying at the public hearing on the rerouting of downtown Twin Falls traffic favored Plan 1 presented by the state highway department.

Approximately 50 people attended the hearing Tuesday night at the American Legion Hall, Wayne Summers, Boise, secretary of the State Highway Board, directed the hearing in an orderly fashion, which he divided into three sections—information, question and answer and views from the audience.

Attending from the State Highway Department were Phil Marsh, Planning Sessions, Norm Crossley and Dean Thayer. Mr. Fialda conducted the information session. He showed all five of the plans drawn up by the department and pointed out the benefits and drawbacks of each. In conclusion, he said the State Highway Department believed that Plan 1 was the most feasible and would be easiest to implement, since it is of the essence.

Plan 1 features one-way traf-

fic along Second Avenue East and Second Avenue North and Second Avenue West to Second Avenue South. This change would mean two-way traffic along Main Avenue. There would be one-way traffic on the first block of Main Avenue from both Five Points West and Five Points East. The present one-way traffic in the last two blocks of Washington Street to Five Points West would be changed to two-way traffic. This change would make a more satisfactory route for truck drivers. The engineers acknowledged that there would have to be some changes in the traffic signals.

All of the State Highway Department employees participated in answering questions during the question and answer period. Nine people testified during the views portion of the hearing. All but one spoke in favor of the proposed Plan 1. The statements were kept brief and to the point.

Howard Allen, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, was first to speak in favor of the rerouting. He

## Samuelson Speaks At Jerome Farm Bureau Banquet

# Governor's Heartaches: Prison, Traffic Deaths

JEROME—Gov. Don Samuelson told the Jerome County Farm Bureau members Tuesday night that he has two "heartaches" in office—the state prison situation and traffic fatalities.

Gov. Samuelson said through investigation by his office and others, the state prison farm situation was found to be in a deplorable state.

"For instance," he said, "there is little less than 600 acres farmed under the prison setup and it was found that for repairs of farm equipment, \$60,000 was spent annually for parts."

"On the Eagle Island Farm near Eagle, there is a canning plant where food is investigated on the farm. In the investigation, over 25,000 gallons of canned food were found stored in several areas of the farm. Most of this stored food was practically everywhere.

"What is deplorable about this is that with all this food stored around the farm, more food was being canned. And only about 20,000 gallons of food could be consumed on the farm annually. There was enough food stored for the next five years if it was edible."

These were just a few of the many ways in which the tax-

payer's money was being dumped down the drain, Gov. Samuelson told those attending the annual Jerome County Farm Bureau Banquet.

"The state also raises hogs on the prison farm, and in findings through audit records, it cost the state \$2 per hundredweight more than it would have cost if the pork was purchased in the grocery store."

"In cleaning up this mess," Gov. Samuelson stated, "we need over \$30,000 worth of junk that was on the prison farm."

Gov. Samuelson also talked briefly on the new women's prison near Boise. He said the new prison cost the taxpayers \$750,000 and it stood empty the

first two years after it was constructed.

"We can send women prisoners to Nevada and have them kept there cheaper than we can here in Idaho. The women's prison in Nevada also is a new one, costing \$450,000 and is similar to the one in Idaho. Idaho's is designed to hold 55 women and Nevada's will hold 50."

Gov. Samuelson's plan is to have all of the state prison facilities in one location, instead of scattered as it is now. He said when completed the new state prison site, south of Gowen Field, will cost about \$5 million. After all the prison facilities were moved to the new site, the old sites will be cleaned up and sold as real estate. Money from

most of the funds spent on the new site, Gov. Samuelson told the other areas in which he is attempting to save taxpayers' money in running a more economical state government.

He said that in past years it had been the policy of personnel in most of the state agencies to use state cars on personal business and for going to and from work.

"Now the cars are left parked and are used only on state business. Auditors have found that this in itself will be a minimum saving of at least \$50,000 annually."

"Apparently most all state agencies had their own printing presses, because some 30 off-

print printing presses have been sold and there is now a central printing office."

The other heartache of Gov. Samuelson is traffic fatalities. He said the answer to this problem is to put more highway patrolmen on the highways. "Statistics show that with more patrolmen on highways, the trend is less accidents. We hope to do this if the Legislature will allow it as we have tried about everything else within our power."

Gov. Samuelson said if 50 more patrolmen are put on the highways in Idaho, there would be 30 patrolmen less than the neighboring states.

## Humphrey Refuses U. N. Envoy Post

NEW YORK (AP)—President-elect Richard M. Nixon will confer here Thursday with W. Averell Harriman, an aide announced today. The aide said earlier that Nixon had rejected the possibility of being named ambassador to the United Nations, which he had replaced Harriman as chief American negotiator at the Vietnam Peace talks in Paris.

This was announced after the name Nixon spokesman, Ronald Ziegler, told newsmen that Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey rejected a firm offer from Nixon to be U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

Nixon himself announced the appointment of Dr. Paul W. McCracken of the University of Michigan to be the next chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers.

The president-elect, putting in a busy day at his Hotel Pierre headquarters, conferred later with Chairman Wilbur Mills, D-

Ark., of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee.

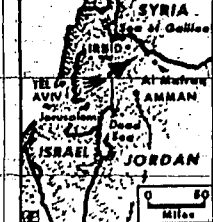
Mills, the most influential man in Congress on tax matters, said he looked "with a degree of skepticism" on any idea to vote tax credits—a device Nixon reportedly espoused as a means of dealing with many of the nation's social ills.

While declaring that such credits are fundamentally undesirable from the standpoint of tax policy, Mills conceded that benefits derived in specific cases might make them warranted.

As for another Nixon proposal—to build automatic cost of living increases into the Social Security program—Mills said he "firmly" opposed to that, and doubts his view would be "susceptible of compromise."

It is generally acknowledged that no tax legislation gets enacted if Mills stands with the opposition.

Ziegler said the President-elect last month asked Humphrey to be his man at the United Nations. Humphrey, Ziegler said, declined, saying he wanted to return to his native Minnesota.

# Israeli Jets Attack Arabs

## Raiders Lose One Aircraft To Gunfire

TEL AVIV (AP)—Israeli warplanes attacked Iraqi artillery installations in Jordan today and one jet did not return from the 90-minute raid, the Israeli Army announced.

It was the third Israeli air attack on Jordanian territory this week and the first in which any Israeli losses were reported.

The pilot of the French-made Super Mystere fighter-bomber parachuted into Jordan "but we managed to get him out," an Israeli spokesman reported.

He said the Iraqi artillery emplacements attacked were east and west of the Jordanian town of Irbid.

The air strike started at noon and the army said it ended at 1:30 p.m.

Radio Amman reported the Israeli planes raided the city of Al-Majraq and two villages in the Irbid area, Tathib and Samalia. The radio, quoting a Jordanian army spokesman, said anti-aircraft batteries fired on the planes.

Air force sirens wailed in Amman, Jordan's capital.

At Majraq, the site of a large air base, is 30 miles northeast of Amman and an equal distance southeast of Irbid.

Jordan's Cabinet announced cancellation of a party of ministers and deputies that had been scheduled for this evening.

The Israeli spokesman, in telling of the raids on the Iraqi artillery bases, said they had taken part recently in bombardments of Jordanian territory.

"These bases opened fire without reason and took part in heavy attacks on settlements in the Jordan and Hejaz valleys on Dec. 2 and 3," he said.

On Sunday, after almost a month of Arab sabotage raids into Israel, an Israeli army commando unit deep into Jordan to blow up two bridges.

A fierce artillery duel erupted across the cease-fire line at the same night, and Israeli jets attacked the gun positions. Another duel and plane strike followed early Tuesday, and Jordan reported 14 civilians were killed and 18 wounded in the bombing of the small settlement of Kaf Assad. Israel said Iraqi batteries were a target in that attack.

Artillery duels on previous nights have been across the Jordan and Bekaa valleys, but the Israelis reported another duel farther south today and said it lasted only about 10 minutes.

## 400 Reds Ambush U. S. Unit

SAIGON (AP)—An estimated 400 North Vietnamese troops lay in wait in thick jungle, attacked 150 probing U.S. air cavalrymen near the Cambodian border north of Saigon Tuesday and killed or wounded more than half of them.

Twenty-five of the American troops were killed and 52 wounded. It was the heaviest casualty toll suffered by the elite 1st Air Cavalry Division in a single battle this year.

North Vietnamese casualties were not known, but one Air Cav officer said: "We brought in a half of a lot of stuff—artillery, rockets and bombs—and they took a heavy beating, but we don't know."

The officer said rockets fired by the Air Cav helicopter gunships within 40 yards of the beleaguered American troops apparently touched off a fierce grass fire that may have been responsible for some of the American casualties. He said at least two bodies were burned, so badly identified was difficulty, but the men may have been dead before the fire.

The 18,000-man air cavalry division has been operating north of Saigon for more than a month, seeking 15,000 to 20,000 North Vietnamese troops that are reported deployed along a 100-mile stretch of the Cambodian border. They constitute a potential threat to Saigon, and an Air Cav officer said today the division has killed at least 1,135 enemy troops in the area since Oct. 31.

The Air Cav unit that took such a battering Tuesday made a helicopter landing in the middle of the morning in a jungle clearing 50 miles north of Saigon and 15 miles from the Cambodian border. There was no enemy fire on the assault helicopter. See VIETNAM, Pg. 2, Col. 4

## Hijacker Lets Plane Refuel At Florida

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A perplexing hijacker impatiently allowed an airplane to refuel Tuesday before flying to Havana.

Waving a hand gun and a grenade wrapped in an arm bandage, the hijacker talked about his life in the United States during a one-hour, 21-minute refueling stop in Key West.

He said he had worked in the Miami area for a while and he had been "fired from all his jobs," said Irene Guntin, one of four Cuban-born stewardesses aboard the National Airlines jet. "I can't continue living in this country," she retorted. "I want you to let me kill you," she quoted him as saying.

Miss Guntin and other members of the crew—including one nonworking stewardess listed officially as one of 28 passengers—returned to Miami late Tuesday night.

The other passengers were to be bused to Varadero, Cuba, for a flight to Florida today aboard a charter aircraft. Cuban authorities, following a pattern developed since the hijacking began, refused to allow them to leave the Havana airport aboard the big jet.

Breckenridge, L. A. Frazier, president; S. H. Graves, James S. Kinney, Jack W. Ramsey, Guy Shearer and Harold J. Stearley.

Tuesday's meeting was recessed until Jan. 15, 1969.

## T. F. County And City Officials Discuss Agreement On Joint Control Of Airport

An agreement aimed at giving control of the Twin Falls Airport to both the county commission and the city council was discussed Tuesday.

Public hearings on the agreement have been scheduled. The county commission will hold its hearing at 11 a.m. next Tuesday. The city council will have its hearing Dec. 16 at 7:30 p.m.

The first hearing at the county house and the second hearing will be at the city hall.

Presently the airport is owned and operated by the city.

The joint-service agreement, which has received tentative approval of both units of government, calls for joint operation and control of the airport by the county and the city.

In Tuesday's meeting, city and county officials discussed formation of a county airport advisory board consisting of five members. The members of the board are to be named by agreement through the city council and the county commission.

The term of each member shall be four years. However, the first board will have two members appointed for four-year terms; two members for two-year terms; and one member for a one-year term.

One city council member and one county commissioner shall serve as ex-officio members of the airport advisory board.

The board is to plan the operations of the airport; make recommendations for the annual budget; and make recommendations on employment at the airport.

According to the agreement, all personnel presently employed at the airport will keep their jobs. All real property now owned by the city at the airport will remain in city hands.

The agreement, if approved by both units of government, will be for five years.

The meeting Tuesday was at the Holiday Inn.

## 'Reign Of Terror' Police Arrest 32 In College Riot

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Police made 32 arrests during clashes with student strikers Tuesday at San Francisco State College. Acting President S. I. Hayakawa described the strikers' tactics as a "reign of terror" and said they continued to be met with more police crackdowns.

About 300 of the school's 18,000 students appeared to be the ones who threw rocks, mud, broken bricks, glass, pine cones and boards.

At least nine persons, including five policemen, were injured in the campus' most violent day since the Black Students-Union called the strike nearly four weeks ago.

The two-day total of arrests was 42 and 14 students have been suspended from school.

"Police are more tense, there will be more force," said Hayakawa.

Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan praised Hayakawa's firm tactics and Democratic Mayor Joseph Alioto promised the city police strength to deal with the demonstrators, whose pressure for minority group demands has disrupted the campus for most of the past months.

# CSI Accrediting Study Is Slated At Nevada Meet

Whether or not the College of Southern Idaho will receive full membership in the Northwest Regional Accrediting Association will be resolved when the association meets next week in Reno, Nev., according to Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president. The meeting, which begins Sunday, is the 52nd annual convention by the association.

Dr. Taylor said, "we (CSI) will appear Sunday before the higher commission."

The college received a panel of evaluators toured the college and reviewed its programs. Monday, the results of the interrogation and the team's evaluation will be reviewed and Wednesday morning during a general association session, the decision will be announced.

CSI has been a candidate for membership in the association for several years, and has be-

come eligible for full membership only since moving into its own facilities.

Among advantages of membership is that credits students obtain at the college are fully accepted by the association and are transferable to any higher education institution.

# Post Office Makes List For States

The Post Office Department has compiled a list of two-letter abbreviations for states to be used by mailing machines in zip-coding mail.

These abbreviations are for the use of punchcard machines that address bulk mail, often advertising, explained Fred Sanger, Twin Falls postmaster.

The system adopts a two-letter abbreviation for each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia, he said.

Less than half of these are in the familiar forms: N.Y., Pa., Ky. State names shortened into the new form appear in all capital letters without periods. For example, NY, PA, and KY, are written in the new form, stated Mr. Sanger.

Punchcard machines can print a limited number of characters per line of type, he said. This system aids the electronic and computerized machines that address a percentage of the mail handled by the Post Office Department.

The paychecks received by all postal employees in the Twin Falls office are machine processed and usually reach here without being touched by human hands, he said.

"Let me stress," added Mr. Sanger, "this system of state abbreviation is for machine use only. Much of the mail we process is hand-addressed in script form. The post office clerks often have a difficult time deciphering state abbreviations as they are now commonly used. It is often impossible to tell the difference between Col. for Colorado and Cal. for California when they are hand-written. Imagine our trouble trying to decide whether to send a letter to the Phoenix in Arizona or in Oregon if all we had to go by was a scribbled OR for AR."

The new shortened form will greatly aid the sending of machine mail "but we'd prefer the general public to continue using the old accepted abbreviations," he added.

# First Community Concert Presents Ella Lee, Soprano

Ella Lee, soprano, presented the first concert of the Community Concert series on Tuesday evening at the Fine Arts Center of the College of Southern Idaho.

She opened her program with a group of Hayden and Handel arias which provided ample opportunity for the display of her vocal flexibility, impeccable diction, and sure sense of musicianship. Her phrasing was stylistically correct and she negotiated the runs with seeming effortlessness.

The second group, from the "Liederkreis" of Robert Schumann, was done with the special artistry which is required in order to project the subtleties of German Lieder.

Her special forte, however,

was in the operatic arias of Puccini, Strauss and Verdi. "A queen regalia" was sung with more delicacy than is usual for this aria, but it was effective nonetheless. "Es gibt ein Reich" was also less dramatic than usual, but the beautiful phrasing and clear vocal line amply conveyed the plight of the deserted Ariadne. The high spot of the aria selections was the "Eranani, involami." It had brilliance and power and sheer beauty.

The four "Cyprey Songs" of Dvorak were beautifully sung. The mood of each of the songs was different, and Miss Lee's voice reflected these moods with such accuracy that they would have been apparent in any language.

At the beginning of the concert, Miss Lee had given a very gracious introduction of her accompanist, Jonathan Dudley. Mr. Dudley was indeed a fine accompanist. He worked in duet with Miss Lee, supporting in just the appropriate fashion and never overwhelming the vocal line.

A comment must be made about Miss Lee's stage presence and personal charm. They were both very great. These factors, added to a beautiful voice, made the concert an outstanding one indeed.

The next concert event at the Fine Arts Center will be on Dec. 11 when the College of Southern Idaho Lyceum Committee presents Helen Lalrd. This concert will be at 8 p.m. and tickets will be available at that time.

Report: The Schwartz Doctrine

WASHINGTON — Three days after the House of Representatives passed a week-long military aid to Greece, a middle-school Pentagon civilian put on paper the hitherto unwritten doctrine of Washington's permissive attitude toward right-wing military dictatorships.

Indeed, some students of foreign policy view the Schwartz doctrine as a corollary of the doctrine laid down in Warsaw by Soviet party chief Leonid Brezhnev. Just as the Brezhnev doctrine asserts Moscow's authority to intervene in the internal affairs of what the Kremlin grandly calls the socialist commonwealth, the Schwartz doctrine makes clear the U.S. will not interfere with extra-constitutional, totalitarian rule by Western governments.

# Pope Defends 'Teachings,' Lashes Dissenting Priests

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today lashed out at dissenting priests and bishops and declared that the Roman Catholic Church defends its teachings "at any cost."

In a voice breaking with emotion, the Pope denounced the "resistance" of some of those who said are duty-bound to defend Church teachings—an obvious reference to parish priests and members of the hierarchy opposing him on the issue of birth control, papal authority, priestly celibacy and revised catechisms.

"When it comes to his own teaching," the Pope told his weekly general audience, "the church is intransigent and dogmatic at any cost."

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The ultimate aim of the U.S. program is an acceptable peace document signed by the main contenders in the Middle East conflict, the diplomats said.

And when Rulal took out the wedding license, he also applied for a permit to carry a pistol.

The American plan foresees as a starting point Israel's withdrawal from the Sinai peninsula and Egypt's termination of its 20-year-old state of war with the Jewish nation.

Informants gave this outline of the American plan:

1. Withdrawal of Israeli forces from the Sinai desert. This would leave the status of Israeli-occupied Jerusalem and other former Arab areas unsettled.

2. An end to the state of war between Egypt and Israel. Israeli relations with other Arab neighbors, particularly Jordan and Syria, would be settled later.

3. A settlement of the future of Arab refugees in Israeli-occupied territory. On this issue Jerusalem is believed to have offered international talks.

4. Egyptian acceptance of the principle of free Israeli navigation through such international waterways as the Suez Canal and the Tiran Strait.

5. Replacing Israeli troops with United Nations soldiers in Sharm-El-Sheikh, the desert fortress guarding the Tiran Strait. The ouster of a U.N. garrison from this outpost by President Gamal Abdel Nasser in mid-1966 was a key factor that led to the six-day war.

6. An East-West agreement to restrict arms supplies to the Middle East contenders.

7. Signatures of the two main parties on a peace treaty. Nasser's government has refused to contemplate a peace treaty with Israel.

The informants said Secretary of State Dean Rusk presumably discussed the plan with the Israeli and Egyptian foreign ministers, Abba Eban and Mahmoud Riad, at meetings in New York Nov. 3.

The Americans have been trying to rally support for the plan from several major powers, including the Soviet Union, India and Britain, the informants said.

Israel reaction was not reported. But based on past Israeli pronouncements, the Jerusalem government likely would be cool to any proposition beginning with a surrender of the occupied territory.

Egypt was said to be skeptical. The American leaders advised friendly governments they find it difficult to reconcile the U.S. peace program with President Johnson's decision last month to sell the Israeli Phantom jet fighter planes.

The informants said the American proposal probably was discussed by Nasser aides and Robert Anderson who visited Cairo last month on a mission for President Johnson. They added the plan also might be discussed when former Gov. William French Buckley, another high-level Nixon emissary, visits key Middle East capitals soon.

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# Justice Black Denies Demonstrators The 'Right To Tramp Streets'

By H. L. SCHWARTZ III

WASHINGTON (AP) — Justice Hugo Black said Tuesday that traditionally shrouds the Supreme Court, says nothing gives demonstrators the right to "tramp" streets—such as those of Chicago—or assemble on private or government property.

The Constitution doesn't say that any man shall have a right to say anything, he wishes any-

where he wants to go," the court's senior justice said Tuesday night in an unprecedented hour-long national television interview.

Rocking gently before a desk in the study of his suburban Virginia home, the 82-year-old Black frequently used dry wit and an often grim to reason a philosophy that appears little changed after 31 years on the court.

Never far from his hand during the edited result of eight hours of questioning was a well-thumbed paperback copy of the Constitution which Black said he carries always in his pocket.

He referred to it often—but just as often quoted from memory—in his touching on the makeup of court disorders that surrounded the Democratic National Convention in Chicago and

major decisions, including a regret about the phrasing of the 1954 school desegregation ruling.

Black was asked to apply his oft-stated beliefs on free speech and assembly to the bloody August clashes between police and antiwar protesters at the Democratic convention. He made it clear his answer applied to both private and government property.

The Constitution, Black said, "does not say people shall have a right to assemble to express views on other people's property. It just doesn't say it. It says they have a right to assemble if they're peaceable. But it doesn't say how far you can go in using other people's property."

He said he knows of nothing that "gives people the right to tramp up and down the streets by the thousands."

Black, however, took note of

the fact a case arising from the Chicago disorders could come before the court.

"I don't want to say what my view would be, because I don't know what the evidence would show," Black said.

Black touched on several cases in which he took part. But perhaps his most startling comment came on the school desegregation decision of 1954.

He said that the phrase "with all deliberate speed" possibly

should not have been included because, he said, the wording has been used to delay integration.

The Black interview was billed by the Columbia Broadcasting System as having no precedent on television. Black, however, over the years has been one of the court's most candid members and once went so far in an article as to say most liberal decisions are unconstitutional.

## Cattlemen Oppose Imports

BOISE (AP) — Changes in U.S. meat import laws and a "last-ditch" fight to save the range cattle industry were urged in resolutions Tuesday by the Idaho Cattlemen's Association.

Members of the association elected Marvin Wittman of Cullucan as president before ending their annual meeting.

One resolution protested a public land grazing fee increase, urging western communities to "unite in a last-ditch fight to save the range cattle industry."

It termed the fee hike a "kind of bureaucratic action that cannot be tolerated" and one which flaunts a study now underway by the Public Land Law Review Commission.

The cattlemen also resolved to seek help from Idaho's congressional delegates to restrict range closure power of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. The resolution said there was proof range damage occurs during a long period and cannot be repaired by an abrupt closure during the grazing season.

Meat import law changes were also urged. Quarterly, rather than annual, regulation was asked in the resolution which charged that spot inspection of imported meat was grossly inadequate.

Another resolution asked for the legislature to ask Congress to give states control over mandatory meat inspection programs, saying cattlemen felt the Department of Agriculture inspection service should be an advisory agent.

## Idahoans Told To Pay \$123,000 In Court Ruling

BOISE (AP) — A LaPorte County couple; Gary and Helen Oerlich, was ordered in U.S. District Court Monday to pay Glens Falls Insurance Co. \$123,000.

The judgment was the result of a failure by the couple to fulfill a general contract of indemnity.

## Elderly Idahoan Dies In Wreck Near Rexburg

REXBURG, Idaho (AP) — Mrs. Stanley Anderson, 71, Rexburg, was fatally injured when a car driven by her husband was struck broadside by another car two miles south of Rexburg on U.S. 191.

Officers said the other car was driven by Leonard Paschal of Idaho Falls.

The death Tuesday raised Idaho 1968 traffic fatality toll to 275, one short of last year's all-time record for traffic deaths.

## College Board May End Dispute

CALDWELL, Idaho (AP) — The student arbitration board at the College of Idaho will meet this week to settle a dispute between the student senate and the editor of the student newspaper, The Coyote.

Kathy King, the editor, refused Monday to resign after the senate asked her to do so by a two-thirds vote.

College President Warren Knox recently prohibited the Coyote from any off-campus distribution because of an article it printed containing obscene words.

She said the questionable words had been entirely blacked out. The article was from the Collegiate Press Service of Washington, D.C., and described problems of school papers that printed "four-letter words."

## GOP Governors Vow To Help Nixon By Enforcing State Laws On Crime

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — Republican governors are volunteering to take off President-elect Richard M. Nixon's hands the enforcement of law and order pledges he made during his campaign.

Gov. Claude Kirk of Florida, one of the early arrivals for the Republican Governors Conference opening here Thursday, said the state executives expect to take the lead themselves in combating lawlessness and disorders.

Kirk, who assembled a private police force to combat organized crime in Florida after his election, told an airport news conference Tuesday he believes the restoration of order is primarily a local problem.

"I expect President-elect Nixon to take the leadership in the fight against crime and violence," he said. "I think he will recommend strengthening the safe-streets act and will implement the program to elevate police standards. But in the end, law enforcement is primarily a local problem and we governors

intend to do our best to help the new President restore law and order."

Asked if he didn't think Nixon would be following the course already laid down by President Johnson, Kirk replied that "this has always been a nonpartisan issue. The Republicans have always supported law enforcement bills."

Gov. Spiro T. Agnew of Maryland, the vice-president-elect, arrived in an Air Force plane after stopping off in San Francisco to look in briefly on a meeting of the executive committee of the National Governors Conference. Agnew has been designated by Nixon as the liaison man with governors of both parties, a job filled by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey for the Johnson administration.

Agnew told reporters in a brief airport interview that despite Johnson's efforts to maintain contact with the governors there still existed a problem of communications between them and the White House. He said he hopes to clear this up.

"I find some governors unhappy about the implementation of existing federal programs," Agnew said. He declined to elaborate. But the supposition was the state executives were complaining about cutbacks in the federal highway program spending and about the administration of the anti-poverty program.

Agnew declined to speculate on a possible Nixon Cabinet appointments. However, he said he thought that any government in these times in the end would "turn out to be a coalition of sorts."

Nixon has indicated he will not announce any major Cabinet appointments until he returns to New York after a California trip. He will speak at a hospital fund-raising dinner in Los Angeles on Thursday sponsored by James Francis Cardinal McHugh and then go on to the GOP governors conference.

### Only 16 Mailing Days Left Before Christmas

Residents of the Twin Falls area were reminded Wednesday by Postmaster Fred Sanger that there are only 16 mailing days before Christmas.

"While that may seem a long time away for some people, it is almost too close for those of us in the Postal Service," Mr. Sanger said. He urged everyone to mail as early as possible.

"If all holiday mail were to hit the postal system during the last week or 10 days it would be impossible to make all deliveries on time. It is especially important that gift parcels destined for distant states be mailed this week to insure delivery before Christmas," he added.

Mr. Sanger has these suggestions for mailers in preparation of their holiday mailings. Use correct addresses of all correspondents to the greatest extent possible, and include ZIP code numbers as a part of the address. ZIP code is required in the address of parcels, and if it is not furnished it must be looked up before a parcel is acceptable for mailing.

Prepare a gift list and shop early to take advantage of full stocks in stores. Be sure to have enough shipping materials on hand.

Wrap packages well, use sturdy shipping cartons and provide

adequate packing to cushion material. A parcel may be dispatched in a mail sack at the bottom of a truck or railroad car with boxed encyclopedias or tractor parts or sacks of magazines riding on top of it.

"Include a piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person to whom you are sending the parcel. In that way your gift will not end up in a dead parcel office in case the wrapping paper comes loose or is torn off."

Mr. Sanger said it is very important that people understand greeting cards cannot be mailed at a rate one cent less than the first class rate as has been possible other years. This year the third class rate is six cents for articles up to two ounces in weight. For that reason mailers should take advantage of the better service of first class mail. Their cards may be sealed, a message enclosed, forwarded if necessary, and undeliverable cards will be returned if the sender's return address is shown on the envelope.

Use of the six-cent Christmas stamp will also brighten up holiday mailings and make them more appropriate for the season, Mr. Sanger noted.

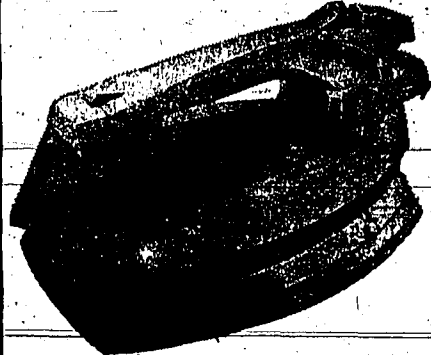

### New Patriotism Infuses Canadians With Hope Of Prosperous Future

OTTAWA, Ont. (NEA)—If you can imagine the identity crisis that usually envelops a first cousin to a superstar, you have some idea of what Canada has lived under for the past 101 years.

"I go to other countries and say that I am a Canadian," growled a diplomat in Ottawa, and they say, "Oh yes, an American."

But picture the poor relation suddenly discovering it has muscle and talent of its own, and watching the giant next door being torn and tarnished by an unpopular war and inner conflict, and you can begin to understand the transformation from Canada the cousin to Canada the cool.

Expo did it, most say. And here the glittering success of Montreal's big show turned on Canadians like nothing they had ever done before.

But Expo was not the mother, merely a valuable wet nurse to an infant soul—Regionalism and provincial ties still keep her, but for the first time many Canadians are beginning to think of themselves not as Manitobans, British Columbians or maritimers, but as Canadians.

"I think maybe it started with the flag debates," said Alan Donnelly, an aide to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau.

The issue was Canadian identity, dragged into the open real-

ly for the first time—for 101 weeks in the summer of 1967. A century after confederation, was Canada a British subject, an American copycat, or a separate and individualistic nation? Assuming it was a bit of the former and more of the latter and reluctantly something of that in between, should it flag be that pale copy of the Union Jack or the new one of purely Canadian design. The maple leaf won out, as perhaps a new Canada did as well.

Canadians began looking around. British Columbia, they realized, has all the scenery Colorado could provide. Prince Edward Island is a garden spot of coastal quaintness. Quebec and the French-Canadians, for all the controversy over their status in the Federation, constitute after all a colorful and distinctive culture.

They became aware of their cities—beautiful Vancouver, bustling Winnipeg, prosperous Toronto, colorful Quebec. Montreal with its rapid transit system—rubber-tired-trains that whistle high arched station stops, compared to the iron monstrosities that glumly through the guts of Chicago and New York.

The States, Canadians realized, had no monopoly on modernness. Toronto's conclave city hall is a bold stroke of creative architecture, and if the skirts on its ill-dressed women were any shorter they would be a vestmental travesty.

In Ottawa, where a man named MacKenzie King served as prime minister for nearly 20 years and few Americans even recognize the name, a ship, a bachelor ex-professor named Trudeau swooped into office and Canada and the rest of the world sat up and took notice.

But with maturity comes responsibility, with growth comes growing pains. Canada the cool step became Canada the complicated.

Ottawa extended its influence in welfare programs and public works and the government went broke. Higher taxes are in order. In a nation where a recent Gallup Poll showed the high cost of living is now the top worry of its citizenry.

Its cities are growing, but so are their problems. The same dirty brown haze that enshrouds Cleveland and Los Angeles often hangs over Toronto and Mon-

tréal. and Winnipeg on a busy weekday morning its beginning to smog-like downtown Gary, Indiana.

Canada wants to grow, but it lacks money and people. There are 22 million of the latter in the nation that is second only to Russia in total land area. American capital investment is still a necessity and not the Anti-American issue it once was, but Canadians can still get uptight when American owners of Canadian companies influence trade policies with certain foreign countries.

Canada does not have a serious racial problem. Protestors and demonstrators? Canada has them, too. And along with awareness and self-discovery came the call for greater participation in world affairs. The young want the young nation to exert more influence in such matters as Vietnam and the United Nations. Somehow they have found the Trudeau government almost personally responsible for the tragedy of Biafra.

"We are the problems of a nation coming of age. But beyond all, they are Canadian problems and a far cry from the 'problem' of Canadian identity that hung over the country for so long.

"You know, it's been a long time since I've even heard of a discussion a month ago about what or who Canadians are," said W. A. Wilson, columnist in Parliament for the

### Thanksgiving Day Traffic Claims 764

Traffic deaths killed a record 764 persons over the long Thanksgiving Day weekend and prompted the National Safety Council Monday to alter its view of the turkey day holiday period.

The toll which passed the record count of 748 over the same holiday period in 1968 compared with 530 deaths on a weekend of equal length but without a holiday.

The 102-hour mark was the highest of any holiday period on record.

For years the National Safety Council has refrained from making an estimate of Thanksgiving Day holiday deaths as it does for Christmas, New Years, Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day. It viewed home holiday that generated no unusual traffic volume.

The council said Monday, however, that since 1965 its records indicate that five holidays each have cost more than 850 lives and of those five two were Thanksgiving holidays.

"The more we survey such figures," Howard Pyle, council president, said, "the more it appears that Thanksgiving demands fully as much emphasis as is given to the other major holidays during the year."

# Techniques Of Fast, Top Reading Can Be Taught But Good Vocabulary Needed

By THE READING LABORATORY, INC.

You can master all the techniques for faster and better reading, but without a decent vocabulary you're in trouble.

The language you use in everyday conversation with your friends is probably adequate. But do you feel like a wallflower in conversation with older people because your active vocabulary is limited or inaccurate? The best way to enlarge and improve it is to improve your reading vocabulary. There are four simple steps.

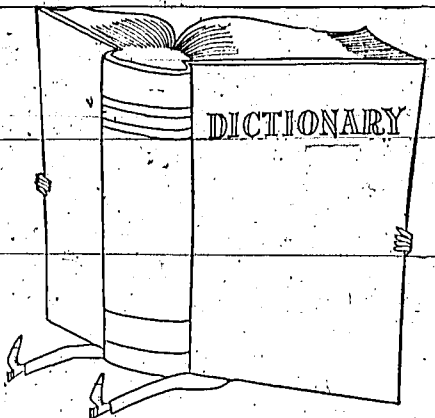
**— LEARN FROM CONTEXT.** Try this sentence for vocabulary size. "No matter where I go my little sister turns up, leading me to conclude that she shares ubiquity with the Deity. If we write 'ubiquity' all in itself, you might have trouble. Look at it in its context, and see how it is used. There's only one meaning that word can have there—being everywhere at the same time. Don't go to the dictionary until you've made an educated guess. That means, do go to the dictionary, and remember that old saying: "Use a word three times, and it's yours."

**— LEARN FROM LISTENING.** Maybe it was the same wise man who said, "Knowledge enters through a closed mouth," and, "Choose at least one friend who is smarter than you." When people you know use words you've never heard or are unsure of, wait for the proper moment, then ask them the exact meaning. They'll be flattered; you'll be informed.

**— LEARN FROM WHAT YOU ALREADY KNOW.** In Grade school they taught you prefixes and suffixes. Make full use of them. SUBmarine, ANTElope, PERimeter, POLYgon, EXtricate. If you forget what these prefixes mean, try to derive their meaning from your knowledge of the entire word. Then, when you encounter a strange word with one of these prefixes or a suffix, you have additional knowledge to bring to the context.

**— LEARN FROM THE DICTIONARY.** Here's how to use the dictionary:

1. Get the EXACT meaning.
2. Look for examples of how



the word has been used.

3. Look for different shades of meaning, colloquial usage.
4. If you look up a verb, don't leave the page till you check out its noun, adjective, adverb.
5. Check the correct pronunciation of the word. Where does the accent fall?
6. Note the derivation of the word. Did it come from Latin, Greek, Old English or Sanskrit?
7. Look for synonyms and antonyms.
8. Examine the spelling closely. Some words can be correctly spelled in more than one way. Most can't.

The next point, different kinds of reading require a different pace. Let's say you're given an assignment tonight in the appreciation of two poems by Robert Frost. Will you precede it, write down searching questions, skip and skim your way through it? Certainly not. Frost wrote to be enjoyed; he wrote to delight you, to stir your emotions, not to give you facts.

But now your English literature assignment is finished and you can curl up with that mysterious novel your friend loaned you. Your purpose in reading is altogether different; you're not looking for self-enrichment, you

just want to relax. Just the clues and the story are all you want, and you're eager to see how the book ends. Speed makes sense, but don't skip and skim to the extent that you miss all the clues and spoil the fun.

After breakfast tomorrow you pick up the paper. Usually all you want is information. What has happened around the world, in your home town, at just night's sporting events? This you can do in about 15 minutes because your purpose calls for top speed. You want instant information instantly.

But when you read the newspaper thoroughly, your purpose is different in many ways. You will read for information AND to evaluate. You'll read critically, opinionative writing alertly; you will be on the lookout for poor reasoning, for invalid premises when you read political comment. You will analyze, bringing your whole reading background to judge the content of each development because you want more, and it will take you more time.

These are the four reasons for reading:

1. For information — and here you read at top speed, making use of all the steps.
2. For relaxation — and here you read fast but not so fast as for information.
3. For self-enrichment — and here you read more slowly, because you don't want to miss
4. For critical evaluation — and here you read more slowly, because you don't want to miss

# Crewman's Dad Treks To Russia

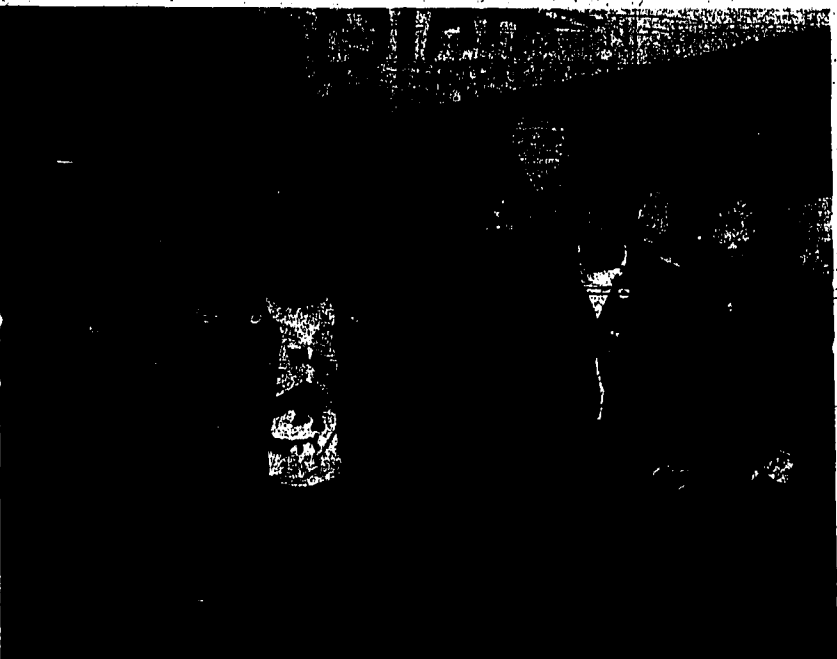
NEW YORK (AP) — The father of a crewman on the intelligence ship USS Pueblo captured by North Korea is en route to Moscow to seek Soviet aid in gaining his son's release.

Robert Ayling and three fellow Virginians left by plane Monday night for the Russian capital.

Meanwhile, a move to petition congressmen and obtain the freedom of all 82 men aboard the vessel is being sponsored by the National Committee for Responsible Patriotism.

Ayling's son, Charles, 22, was a communications technician on the Pueblo when it was seized last Jan. 23.

Hugh Cline, a law partner of Ayling, told newsmen at Kennedy Airport: "We are hoping for a humanitarian gesture from the Russians."

### 'Democratic' British Duke Rents Castle To Tourists

NEW YORK (AP) — Americans panic over protocol, slammer over titles, curtsy clumsily and ridicule royalty as an anachronism.

Yet they appear to yearn for a touch of it in their own democratic lives.

Or so it seems to England's 13th Duke of Bedford, who despite his purple lineage, is so democratic that any man can make the Lord's castle his home for the night—for a fee.

The towering aristocrat and his auburn-haired duchess discovered America's hunger for royal trappings a year ago when they made a three-month-lecture tour here.

"They are not quite sure how to react, really," her ladyship said, recalling her surprise when a bewildered American gentleman curtsied low in the receiving line.

At any rate the duke and his lively French-born wife recently completed a second go-around of the States, doing their bit to fill the royalty gap.

They were armed with slides of Woburn Abbey, the 3000-acre ducal estate which they transformed into a Disneyland of tours, kiddy rides, flea-circuses and picnic grounds in an effort to keep up with the taxes. And they are filled with tales of friendly ghosts in residence as well as reminiscences of a noble

life, all of which lend spice to their lecture tours. According to the duke, "Royalty is an escape into fantasy."

Slipping his hornrimmed glasses on over his graying sideburns, he warned to the subject of how Americans had made their own sort of royalty out of movie stars, and the "beauty family"—and how—indeed—they had lost themselves from time to time in the imaginative world of Disney in order to enjoy vicariously a fabled existence.

"The beautiful clothes, the glamorous trappings may have been hired," said the duke mulling over the similarities between Hollywood royalty and his own kind. "But it all makes a lovely dream and dreams are very nice. Vicarious living doesn't hurt a thing. Royalty is all pretty harmless, really."

At least it is in England where the dukes and the viscounts and the barons have been able to keep their heads, if not their bank books.

"We've survived," says the duke, more commonly known as John Russell, "because we've been able to change with the times. Nearly every one of us works today."

His work was laid out for him when his father, an eccentric peacekenik vaguely related to Bertrand Russell, died leaving him all \$14 million in death taxes, a palace, needing \$3 million in repairs and \$100,000 a month for maintenance. Although other bluebloods had paved the way a shilling or so from guests examining their lordly estates, the duke and his third wife, Nicole, commercialized theirs with the showmanship of a P. T. Barnum.

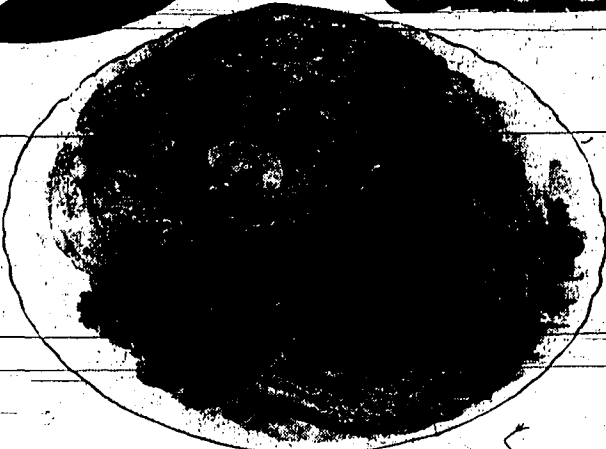

# Harriman, LBJ Ponder Problem Of Giving Nixon Control

**By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER AP Special Correspondent**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Arrangements for turning over U.S. peace talks to the incoming Nixon administration are expected to be a major topic when Ambassador Averell Harriman confers with President Johnson on strategy for the coming weeks.

Harriman, who returned from Paris Monday, said in advance of today's conference with Johnson that he does not expect to remain as chief negotiator under Richard M. Nixon.

He said he thought the new president would be advised to name his own team.

As Johnson and Harriman confer the major problem before the United States and North Vietnam is to get the peace

talks going again in an expanded new phase after a lapse of a month.

Some U.S. officials think it possible that the new start may be made next week, following the expected arrival in Paris of the full delegation from South Vietnam.

A delegation from the rebel National Liberation Front (NLF) of South Vietnam reached Paris several weeks ago, but the Saigon government has delayed its participation pending settlement of detailed arrangements governing its status and that of the NLF.

While neither the President nor Harriman has signaled what the major U.S. objective would be in the remaining weeks of the Johnson regime, some officials expect that the main emphasis may be a new effort to curtail the war.

When President Johnson ended all bombing and other attacks on North Vietnam Oct. 31, he said he acted on an understanding with North Vietnam that the Demilitarized Zone separating North and South would be respected.

Since then, there have been U.S. charges of scores of viola-

tions by Communist forces and North Vietnamese—accusations of air strikes and ground operations by U.S. troops in the area.

Authorities here continue to play down speculation about trying to arrange a cease-fire, saying that the kind of guerrilla war being fought by the Communists in the South does not provide a basis for an effective cease-fire agreement.

However, they do consider a cease-fire arrangement as practical if it is made the first step of a plan for withdrawal of all foreign forces from South Vietnam. The United States, there-

fore, could make an early proposal for a troop withdrawal agreement with North Vietnam which could embrace a cease-fire arrangement.

According to the U.S. view of the new phase of the Paris talks, the meetings are to be between two sides—with the U.S. and South Vietnam on one side and North Vietnam and the NLF on the other.

As North Vietnamese and NLF claim, however, that the talks are to be four-party discussions which, in their view, would give the NLF equal status with the Saigon delegation.

Wrangling over this issue could bring up the opening works of the new phase to such a degree that very little may be accomplished before President-elect Richard Nixon takes office.

Harriman said on arrival that he found no evidence that either North Vietnam or South Vietnam was deliberately trying to delay the talks until the Nixon Administration is in power.

**Rusk Believes U. S. Is 'Moving'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk said today that the troubles the United States had this year do not mean "the difficulties of movement, not of stagnation."

Acknowledging that 1968 was a "year of turmoil in the United States," Rusk said that everything that happened proved that "this nation is on the move in the field of human rights."

Rusk made these remarks at a State Department ceremony attended by members of President Johnson's Commission for the Observance of Human Rights Year.

Ambassador Averell Harriman, chief U.S. negotiator at the Paris peace talks and chairman of the commission, opened the session with the remark that this was "probably the last time" that he was speaking at the State Department.

Harriman praised Rusk as a man who, "the longer he serves, the more we admire him."

Harriman also paid tribute to President Johnson, who, he said, "has helped to lead the human rights in the legislative and practical sense of the word than any of his predecessors."

## Bliss Woman Enjoys Working With Flowers And Weeds

**BLISS** — Just as proper accessories add to the clothing you are wearing, so flowers used attractively add to your home or room.

Flowers can set the mood for any occasion and reveal the hostess' personality. The occasion for which a floral arrangement is to be used should be carefully considered when it comes to selecting the container, the type of arrangement and where the arrangement will be placed.

While Mrs. Jim Faulkner, representing the Bliss Flower Club, prefers fresh flowers to the artificial kind, she does enjoy working with and arranging either one and has several arrangements in her own home. Many of the artificial flowers are very attractive and they make it possible to have beautiful arrangements in the home throughout the year, especially during late fall and winter months.

Mrs. Faulkner does not limit her arrangements to blossoms alone. She also uses foliage, drift wood, dried pods, fruit, figurines and a great deal of imagination and enthusiasm in her creations.

"Enthusiasm is very important," Mrs. Faulkner stressed. "My flowers are not always quality flowers, but anyone can make up for that with a little enthusiasm and effort."

One of Mrs. Faulkner's rules in decorating with flowers is to have only one arrangement that can be viewed from one place at a time.

She also considers the occasion for which she wants the arrangement — whether it is a table centerpiece for a dinner, the coffee table, mantel or kitchen. Knowing this a person can then select a suitable container.

Containers need not be elaborate and expensive. Most of us have items in the home all the time that can be used effectively — sometimes just as they are or by adding a little paint. We can make them blend in with a certain color scheme or stand out boldly for a dramatic effect.

"Flowers are pretty in themselves," Mrs. Faulkner cautioned, "and should not be overdone. I like to keep my arrangements simple and I prefer a lesser number of blossoms than too many."

Floral arrangements should be kept simple on the most part. Bright colors, textures and elegance of the flowers. Mrs. Faulkner uses the odd number of blossoms theory in her arrangements and believes in stopping before the bouquet is overwhelming.

complete, incorporating lighting or lighting may be added. If you are creative the possibilities are limitless. The door can be covered with bright metallic paper as a background for a cut-out Christmas tree, a cluster of bells or other decorations.

Even if there are light bulbs incorporated in the decorations, extra light may be added by using spot or flood bulbs directed onto the door. Use a shielded holder if possible. Do not flash the light as it causes discomfort when approaching or leaving the door, particularly if there are steps — this can be dangerous, especially in icy conditions. If vision is hampered, lights can also be placed around the doorway and porch pillars. Evergreens at each side of the door can be garlanded with strings of lights in the colors of one's choice.

Tall electric lighted candles flanking the entrance can complement an ornament of the door itself. Some candles are available ready-made, complete with wiring. Or they can be made of mailing tubes or plastic.

Don't overlook your window. Light in the window is a traditional symbol of the season. Most window treatments can be enjoyed from both indoors and outdoors, as when the family tree is placed near the window, or a lighted wreath is hung in the window, or there are electric-lighted candles on the window sill. The exterior of a window can be outlined with strings of lights, and lights can be scattered among the plants in a window box.

A broad expanse of lawn is an ideal setting for a Christmas scene. It might be keyed to a religious theme. Or it might be Santa and his reindeer, a group of angels or a Noah's Ark scene. Simulated candy canes, wreaths on striped poles, along the driveway will add a gay note when floodlighted. Decorations can also be wrapped around the post lantern.

One way to achieve unusual effective outdoor lighting is with the use of a projector floodlight or spotlight bulb. Even when outdoor strings of lights are utilized, accent lighting — made possible by a projector bulb — is a color addition. Display the color and detail of a design on which time, thought and effort have been lavished, will disappear when the winter sun goes down.

A reflector bulb can be used indoors behind a revolving color wheel to cast a succession of color patterns on the Christmas tree or other decorations or in a holder to spotlight the tree.

Charming indoor decorations can be one hundred per cent homemade, starting with such simple materials as embroidery hoops, beads, frames, vases, foam plastic, balsa, balsa, greens and sheets of plastic and foil.

All it takes is some imagination, and when accented with light, original designs make delightful conversation pieces.

### Wig Business Is Popular

SHOSHONE — "Shopping for a wig" is a popular activity for many women. "If you are, you have plenty of company," states a wig specialist through the local county home extension agent. An estimated five million women in the United States own one or more wigs and hair pieces. The wig business is big. Which wig to buy presents questions for individuals. The first point is to deal with reputable salon or beauty shop, compare wigs from several shops before deciding.

Wigs made of human hair, usually from the orient are generally considered softer, more natural looking, and more easily styled. However, quality differs according to source and skill. Price is not a reliable indicator.

Synthetics are considered acceptable for some hair pieces, but they do not hold a "set" as well as the "elastic" quality of human hair.

A good European hand-tied wig will cost more than a Korean hand-tied product. This is because there is less European hair.

Most beauty shops suggest having human-hair wigs cleaned professionally.

Synthetics are easily washed at home. Hair spray can be used on a wig to maintain it, but specialist say not to use lacquer. A hair conditioner spray is needed periodically to maintain luster and sheen.

A wig can be repaired. Elastic can be replaced. Webbing can be mended and hair added if bald spots develop.

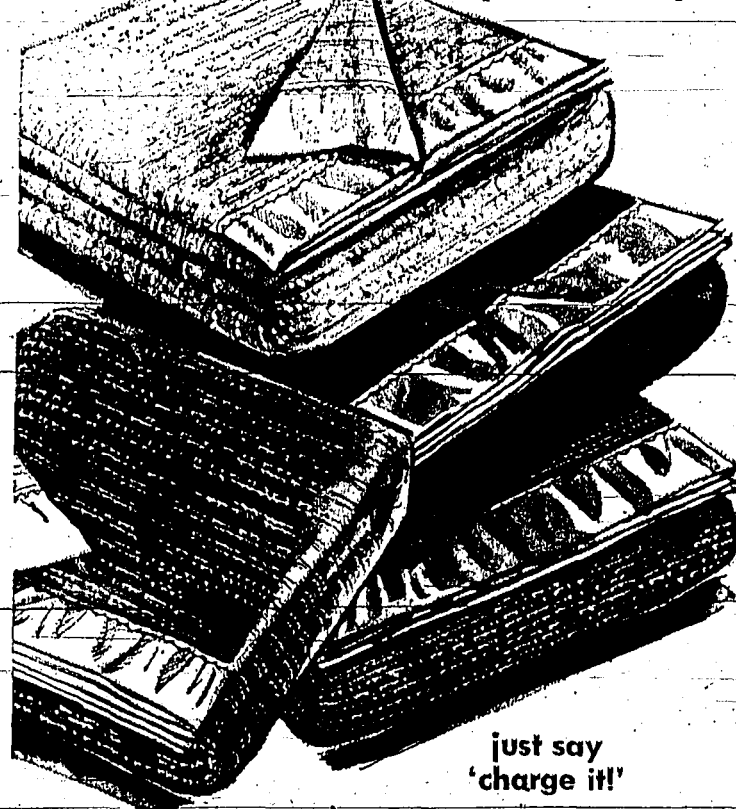

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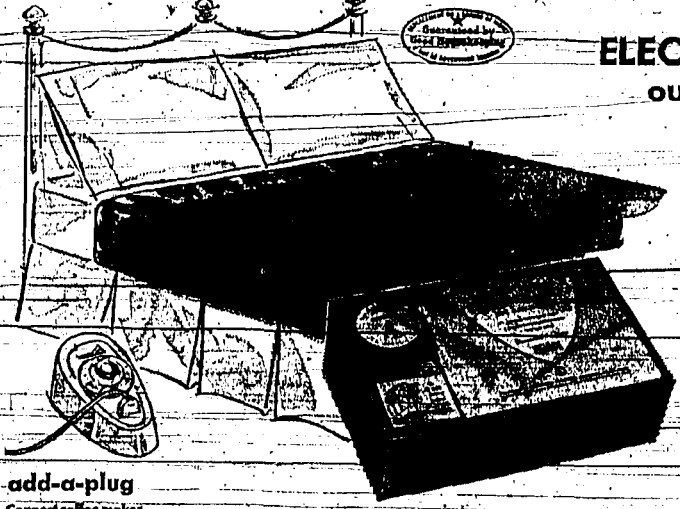

# Elza Murphy, Native Of Spain, Gives Tips For Tourists Visiting There

Feel free to enjoy the many rare and delicious wines of Spain, but watch out for the water.

That's one of the tips offered for tourists to Spain by a native of that country, Elza Murphy, Twin Falls. The wife of Wayne Murphy, she was born in Spain and lived there until six years of age when she moved to France. Later she made her home in New York City and is now an enthusiastic resident of Twin Falls.

Mrs. Murphy works with the local school system, in the summer with the migrant children's program. In winter months she assists the children of Spanish speaking families as interpreters and to train them in speaking English.

While it has been many years since Mrs. Murphy visited Spain, she has kept in touch with relatives and friends there over the years.

An aunt who visited her this summer in Spain was shocked when she learned Mrs. Murphy, who has four children, did not have a maid.

"In Spain, very few of the families have modern appliances such as does the average United States housewife. Instead they are able to hire a maid for something like \$25 to \$40 a month who will take on the tedious chores about the house as well as help with the children," Mrs. Murphy said.

"People in Spain don't own all American electric and when my aunt learned I didn't have a maid she just couldn't understand it," the Twin Falls mother explained.

Americans who live temporarily in Spain, however, are not the most popular people there, she added. They have been called the girls who work as maids at much higher pay than the Spanish people can afford and thus have raised the cost of living for many Spanish families.

As a result, she warned, many of the Spanish people are not taking advantage of the "rich" American tourist when possible.

Mrs. Murphy said she believes anyone visiting Spain will enjoy the beauty and historical wonders of the old country.

"Especially if you tour the countryside and go to some of the more remote villages and towns where people still adhere to their old customs and dress in beautiful and colorful clothing," she pointed out.

Mrs. Murphy especially recommended the art galleries and said the best buy for the tourist will be in the beautiful hand-crafted leather items and leather clothing. Silver and beautiful glassware are also available at bargain prices in Spain.

Contrary to what you might think, food in Spain is not especially spicy. In the larger cities you can purchase meals similar to those in any American city.

"You can find almost any climate you like in Spain, from high snow-covered mountains to the warm coastal areas of southern Spain.

Mrs. Murphy said for the most part the climate is much like California. In some areas it is extremely dry. One of the most beautiful areas, she said is Costa Brava, surrounded by beautiful deep blue water, high cliffs and wild forest areas.

People of Spain are proud but carefree. Many sleep until noon and then rest again in the afternoon, but at night they are wide awake and ready for fun. Their largest meal is eaten about 4 p.m. At Christmas they do not have a Santa Claus, but the three wise men call on the little children to distribute toys.

Spanish people are very proud of their families, Mrs. Murphy says, and there are no nursing homes. Each family takes care of its own elderly people and treat them with great respect.

Usually the grandparents, regardless of how old they are, maintain a place of great authority in the family. Children must respect them and are taught to mind the adults.

Mrs. Murphy says her own father came to New York at the age of 20 and with nothing in the way of finances.

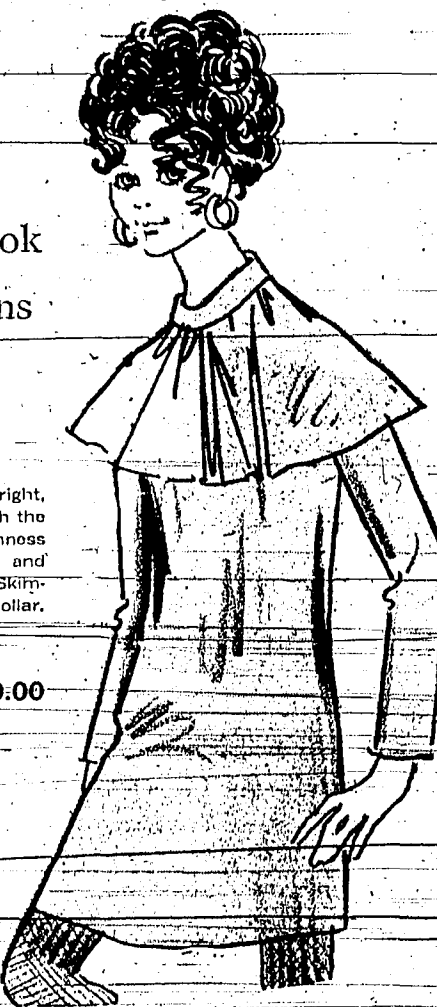

Another designer, Alexia, brings the Japanese "Happi Coat" to the beach.

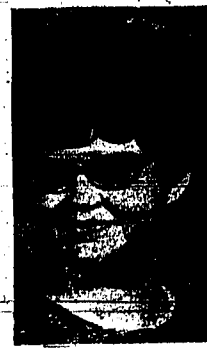
"Everyone shows a version of what Catalina dubs the "Trink," a blushing interpretation of the bikini with a short skirt wrapped around the brief bottom.

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# Johnson Ponders 'Summit'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, whose credo has sometimes seemed to be "keep 'em guessing," doesn't appear to be changing his ways in the final days of his administration. Johnson watchers, conditioned by some pretty staggering surprises in the past five years, are busy trying to figure out just what—if anything—the chief executive is planning for a White House successor.

And Johnson aides, showing a little of the same conditioning, have appeared to adopt the policy of not ruling anything out. That was the position taken Monday by the State Department on the No. 1 item in the guessing game—whether Johnson still hopes to have a summit session with Soviet leaders on curbing the missile race.

"There has never been a time or place or the level agreed upon," said press officer Robert J. McCloskey.

McCloskey had been asked about comments Secretary of State Dean Rusk made Sunday on television that seemed to imply the possibility of a summit session was very much alive. Rusk had said there were no plans for any such meeting.

The secretary expressed the theoretical possibility that a meeting might take place. But he did not intend to imply any planning was taking place. He said McCloskey—in a "clarifying" statement that didn't do much to cool off the guessing.

He also said that Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin had raised the possibility of a summit session on missile curbing with several recent U.S. visitors to Moscow.

Johnson reportedly had been looking forward eagerly to such a session last summer but called it off after the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia.

Johnson's attitude in the capital guessing game is whether Johnson will call a special session of the Senate to vote on ratification of the treaty banning the spread of nuclear weapons.

In a familiar variation of the "don't put it in front of me" as White House said last week "no decision has been made."

Then, in a classic understatement, the White House spokesman said: "If a decision is made, it will be premature to speculate on what might or might not happen."

Johnson should decide the climate is right for a missile curb summit, he presumably wouldn't be bound by tradition to give such a summit a chance.

When the President decides to make one of his quick jaunts around the country he has been known to give the press corps half an hour to make an airport trip that sometimes takes longer.

# London Bridge Will Span 'Lake' In Arid Arizona

LAKE HAVASU CITY, Ariz. (NEA)—Three shimmering splashes of color interrupt the monotony of the desert. Everywhere there is brown, as far as the eye can see—except for the three incongruous flags, fluttering on their staffs high above the parched sand.

They are the flags of the state of Arizona, the United States and Great Britain. Behind them, inside an iron-fenced square, is a block of granite. This is the cornerstone of the London Bridge.

Down the way are twin sets of rough wooden poles, on either side of the road. These show where the bridge will be, when it finally is transported from London and erected here.

Nearby is a seven-acre leveled area, edged with a cyclone fence topped by barbed wire. Outside it a sign that reads: "London Bridge Granite Stone Storage Compound." More than 800 tons of granite stones are lying there, each on wooden planks so it can be moved easily.

Each wearing a code number like "5330"—so it can be identified and put where it belongs.

Nowhere is there any water for the bridge to span. That will come later. Lake Havasu City is something now, and they even start building bridges before there is a river to cross.

This new city started from a spot five years ago. In 1963, there was absolutely nothing here. Then industrialist Robert P. McCulloch figured that Lake Havasu (which was founded in 1838 when Parker Dana blocked the Colorado River) would be a great place to test outboard motors.

He bought 28 square miles of desert along the lake shore. And he founded a city, which is growing rapidly. Some 4,500 people live here now, with others coming in at the rate of 150 or so a month.

One of the topographic features of the area is a peninsula jutting out into the lake. McCulloch and his town planners felt that a channel across the base of the peninsula would be a good idea, so that pleasure boats would not have to go all the way around.

This is the channel which London Bridge will eventually cross. McCulloch had the bridge and bought it for \$2,400,000—one million pounds plus \$60,000 in honor of McCulloch's 60th birthday, which will be in 1971, the year the bridge will be finished here.

It will cost another \$3.5 million to have the bridge shipped from London, rebuilt here around a concrete core and to dig the channel.

The Lake Havasu people feel the expense is worth it. Before the announcement of the new attraction, they used to get about \$500 million worth of land each year—they fly prospective buyers in from as far away as Chicago. In the weekends after the announcement, sales more than doubled.

park, benches, recreational facilities. The bridge was considered obsolete in London, because there had been a lot of traffic in the traffic it had to bear. It was completed in 1831. The purchase price included only the bridge's "skin"—the stones on the surface. London is building a new bridge over the original one while it carefully removes and ships these stones.

Obviously, the top-most stones will be taken off and sent to Arizona first. The bottom stones will be the last to arrive. So the Lake Havasu bridge builders face a problem, which they have solved with a unique engineering concept.

They are going to build the bridge over and on dry land. In effect, they will construct a large and immensely strong mold—using the sand and stone being dug for the channel as Storage Compound—on which they will ultimately affix the London Bridge stones.

By the time the bottom stones arrive, this core bridge will be ready. Then they can start fixing the stones where they belong.

Lake Havasu is tremendously excited about the bridge. Children in the elementary school learn all about it in history classes. The town's bumper stickers feature a bridge being dug for the channel.

Residents feel the bridge will be a financial boom. "It's the greatest thing that's happened," says a pharmacist Gene Duhon. "It will stabilize our economy and be a great tourist attraction."

"It's wonderful," says cocktail waitress Phyllis Herbert, who is an English girl. "I'll feel at home. My mother sent me some clippings from English newspapers, and some of them are being bled about it. They think Americans can buy anything. But it was up for sale, wasn't it, and you bought it fair and square, didn't you, so why shouldn't you have it? It will be wonderful for Havasu."

For engineer Joseph Combs, in charge of the project here, however, the bridge is merely an engineering problem to be solved.

The bridge will be built between Dec. 5 and Dec. 10 in conjunction with the major producing and labor supply regions of the sugar beet area. The center will be considered as one hearing, and testimony at each place will constitute a part of the same record. Persons may present testimony at any of the designated places.

**SAFETY DIDN'T HELP SOUTH!**  
Today's hand was played in an International Match Point game in England. The bidding is a typical British style with everyone bidding, and South, at least, having all his bids. We don't quite understand

Jack of hearts. The play of the ace, king and queen only works against a 3-3 heart break because even if the lead of the second high trump drops the jack, defender's seven or eight will be established as a trick. South must have known this percentage play but nevertheless played out his high trump and wound up losing a trick in each suit for down one.

His reason for adopting this line was that he expected to go down several tricks if he tried that first-round finesse and lost. At the other table South played a "conservative" club contract and made four odds for a total 130 so there was a seven IMP loss instead of a 10 IMP gain due to South's decision to play safe.

We don't like South's play. When you do get to a doubtful contract, always give yourself the best chance to make it. You don't win with small losses.
