## Added Funds For T.F. City-County Airport Available

Word received from Federal Aviation Administration officials indicates that the Twin Falls city-county airport will receive more federal funds in the fiscal year starting July 1, 1969, than was first anticipated, it is announced by Ed Woods, airport manager.

A session here last week with city and county officials, the FAA officials mentioned the sum of about \$125,000 which would probably be available for Idaho airport upgrading.

But Wednesday, Mr. Woods said that further communications from the officials showed that an estimated \$469,000 would be the total available. Of this amount approximately \$206,000 would come from a carryover of unused funds in the last calendar year and about \$138,000 from regular sources.

"This makes the picture in Twin Falls much better," Mr. Woods said. "We will not know the amount the federal government will have available for use in Twin Falls until April next year, but now we can be sure that it will be more than was initially anticipated."

Plans for upgrading the local field over a period of time have been completed and are now in the hands of FAA officials for study. It was pointed out by Mr. Woods.

In Idaho, other airports including Pocatello, Idaho Falls, Boise and Lewiston have also made application for substantial amounts of federal funds to aid programs at those communities.

## County Gives Okay To Airport Venture

The Twin Falls County Commissioners indicated "they desire to sign a pact with the city making the operations at the airport a joint venture."

The signing of the joint-service airport agreement came after a legal determination on one word was made.

The commissioners "told of their approval of the joint venture following a public hearing, which got under way at the courthouse at 11 a.m. Tuesday. Six area farmers attended and one of them said, "We farmers don't want very tight control over this airport. We should let the people who use it pay for it."

The agreement calls for joint financing of the airport on a 50-50 basis. The city presently operates the airport.

The agreement also calls for the creation of a city-county airport advisory board of five members. The board shall be responsible for the plans and operation of the airport.

Outside of improvements, it is expected the cost to the county annually will be \$25,000.

The aim is to get the airport to support itself in three to five years.

"There was no real opposition voiced at the hearing on the joint airport operation agreement and commissioners said, "We've come too far to turn back now."

They said they were all in favor of the agreement and looked forward to the joint operation of the airport.

The city council will hold its hearing on the agreement at 7:30 p.m. next Monday at city hall.

## 300 Expected For Reclamation Parley

Approximately 300 people are expected to attend the Idaho State Reclamation Association's annual convention Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the Holiday Inn.

Registration began at 5 p.m. Wednesday and the committee hearings were scheduled to start at 4 p.m., according to John Rosholt, Twin Falls, who is serving as general chairman of the convention.

Twin Falls Mayor Egon Kroll will give the welcoming address at 9 a.m. Thursday. Howard Allen, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, will present a traveling gavel. This is the first time the gavel will be used by visiting conventioners.

The first speaker on Thursday morning's program is Dr. Robert Lee, director of the Idaho Water Resource Board. His topic will be "State Water Development—Yes or No."

James Ayes, Portland, Ore., regional director of the Northwest Region Federal Water Pollution Control, will discuss "Decisions for Water Quality Management." Mr. Ayes is best known in the area for his report on water quality of the Upper Snake River.

State Reclamation Engineer R. Keith Higgins, Boise, will speak on "Two Years of Progress and What's Next." His talk will deal with proposed revisions of the Idaho water laws.

Ray Rostrom, manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, will act as toastmaster at the noon luncheon. He will introduce H. Nelson, Boise, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation. The title of Mr. Nelson's speech is "Can the Sum of the Parts Be Greater than the Whole."

During the afternoon session the group will hear Darrell Larson, extension brigantini with the University of Idaho Extension Service. He will view advances in the field of irrigation in his talk entitled "One Potato, Two Potatoes, Three Potato More."

Jack Woodworth, director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department will discuss "Effects of Reclamation on Fish and Wildlife," which has become a controversial topic in the state.

Dr. Paul Heuston, Twin Falls radiologist, will be the featured speaker at the banquet Thursday night. He will show slides from his recent trip to Nepal.

Business sessions will fill out the balance of the convention Friday morning. An election of directors will be held.

Mr. Rosholt said the resolutions will be presented at this time and voted upon. He said the organization will consider the endorsement of four major projects, desert land entries and the Land Limitation Law will also be voted upon.

## Ledge Saves Man In Fall Over Canyon

A narrow ledge prevented a certain death for a Twin Falls man Tuesday afternoon after he fell from the rim of the Snake River Canyon and landed on the ledge 30 feet below. A drop of several hundred feet was just beyond.

The man, in a condition at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital and being kept under observation in Ken Wills, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joy Wills, 2112 Maple St.

According to Twin Falls County Sheriff Paul Cordes, Wills was a companion, Jeff Harpelle, also Twin Falls, had driven to the edge of the canyon on a duck hunting trip, and Wills walked to the edge to look for ducks when he disappeared over the ledge.

Wills fell from the canyon edge and found Wills had fallen to the ledge 30 feet below. He then went to a nearby house and called the sheriff's office. Together with state police, Jerome County Sheriff Pat Burns and volunteers, the sheriff and deputies climbed down to the ledge and placed Wills on a stretcher. He was then hoisted to the top with a crane supplied by Magic Valley Ambulance Service.

## Nixon Appoints Mayo

NEW YORK (AP) — President-elect Nixon announced today a federal budget director—Chicago banker Robert Mayo—before flying to Washington to announce his cabinet choices to the nation tonight.

Appearing before newsmen at his Pierre Hotel headquarters in New York, Nixon said that Mayo, whose background includes 18 years in the Treasury Department with nine years in private banking, will be considered "a top member of the cabinet" and will attend all meetings of that body.

Mayo wound up his Treasury career in the Dwight D. Eisenhower administration as assistant to the secretary for debt management and in 1960 joined the Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co. of Chicago, where he has served as a vice president.

Nixon met earlier with Vice President-elect Spiro T. Agnew to give him an advanced look at the cabinet roster.

To reporters, the president-elect said he thinks his choices are "big men, strong men I rely on." He said it would be a cabinet basically of "yes men."

William P. Rogers, attorney general for three years in the Eisenhower administration, will be named secretary of state.

Word of some other Cabinet selections has already gained public circulation.

George Romney of Michigan, according to informed Republican party officials in Washington, will be secretary of housing and urban development.

Another Republican governor, Walter J. Hickel of Alaska, will be secretary of the interior, according to Alaska's senator—See NIXON, Pg. 2, Col. 4

## Jerome Superintendent Is Fired By Board In 3-2 Vote

JEROME—The Jerome superintendent of schools, William Lipscomb, has been fired by the Jerome school board, in a split decision, it was learned Wednesday.

Three of the five board members, including Lew Gifford, chairman; Dr. R. E. Williams and Gordon Hofffield, voted against renewing next year's contract for Mr. Lipscomb. The superintendent will complete the current contract which runs until July 1.

"General dissatisfaction" was the only reason obtained from school board officials. It was learned that petitions, bearing between 150 and 200 signatures of parents, were presented to the board at its monthly meeting Monday night.

The decision not to renew Mr. Lipscomb's contract next year was made during an executive session closed to the public. Warren Kays, clerk of the board, indicated that the petitions had little effect, however, as he believed the board members had already decided how they would vote.

It was indicated that there is a teacher discord in the schools and people in general are dissatisfied with the operation of the schools. In the past year, the senior sneak and the Headstart program have drawn considerable dissension in the community.

# CSI Fully Accredited

The College of Southern Idaho was assured of six years of full accreditation Wednesday in an announcement made at the Reno, Nev., convention of the Northwest Regional Accrediting Association.

In a telephone call to the Times-News Wednesday morning Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president, also announced that he was elected to a one-year term as second vice president of the Northwest Association of Junior Colleges.

Dr. Taylor said that CSI received accreditation for a three-year period. At the end of those three years the college will submit an interim report and then will be automatically accredited for another three years.

During the announcement Wednesday before the full assembly of the convention, it was stated that the accreditation carries no restrictions whatsoever.

This report on CSI's accreditation also stated that the college has made more progress than any other college in the association history in the same length of time.

CSI is four years old and is in its third year of classes. There are 67 colleges from Canada, Alaska, Oregon, Washington, Montana, Utah and Idaho, in the northwest association. The approval of CSI's accreditation was based on a report made following an accrediting team's visit to CSI in September, shortly after the college moved on campus.

Both academic and vocational programs were evaluated by the team, headed by Dr. Dwight Baird, president of Clark College, Vancouver, Wash.

CSI has been a candidate for membership in the Northwest association since classes began at the college.

As a full member in the regional accrediting group, CSI's credits will be fully transferred to any other institution of higher learning.

There are six regional accrediting associations in the nation and all accept and transfer credits on a reciprocal basis with other member schools.

Attending the Reno meeting which ends Thursday are Dr. Taylor, Dr. Terry Smith, academic dean; Orval Bradley, vocational school director; and Robert Bradley, CSI trustee. Eldon Evans, chairman of the board of trustees, attended the opening sessions of the convention but has since returned to Twin Falls.

## Reds Aver U.S. Slows 'Progress'

PARIS (AP) — North Vietnamese charged today that the Vietnamese peace talks are being delayed by the "lack of goodwill and the nonserious attitude of the United States and its lackeys" — the South Vietnamese.

Nguyen Thanh Le, North Vietnamese delegation spokesman, referred to procedural questions that have held up the start of expanded four-way peace talks.

In reply to a question, Le said that discussions so far between the United States and North Vietnam in Paris have not touched on the substance of peace negotiations at any stage.

Asked specifically about a statement Tuesday by Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford expressing the hope that U.S. and South Vietnamese forces might begin withdrawing from South Vietnam within 40 days, Le replied: "If the United States has any respect to make, it has to pull them forward in the four-party conference."

U.S. Ambassador Cyrus R. Vance, deputy chief of the U.S. delegation, met with this opposition number, Col. Ha Van Lau, Tuesday and rejected a plan that the four-way talks be seated at four separate tables and should determine the order of speaking by drawing lots.

"The United States has taken the obstinate position of turning back this serious and just demand," he said.

The United States objected to the table arrangement because it would give the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front the status of a separate delegation.

The United States and South Vietnam consider the front only part of North Vietnam's delegation.

## Removal Of AIP Chief Challenged

Legal problems continued to dog the American Independent Party of Idaho and officials of that party were rapped Wednesday by the Secretary of State.

Pete Conarussa said the removal of Joseph K. Stumph Jr. of Twin Falls as party chairman was not proper.

Mr. Stumph was replaced by Nolan Victor, also of Twin Falls, in an AIP meeting last Saturday in Twin Falls. The announcement of Mr. Stumph's removal was made Tuesday by Mrs. Alice Jackson, Kimberly, a spokeswoman for the party.

Mr. Conarussa said he received no official notification of the dismissal of Mr. Stumph. He said such a procedure should follow the Republican form of government.

"This means the actions have to be representative of the wishes of the party, not one individual," Mr. Conarussa said. "If one person says 'you're out' that is not representative."

The party has had its share of trouble in Idaho in the past year. There was trouble getting Gov. George Wallace on the ballot, trouble with printed ballots after Gen. Curtis Lemay was placed on the ticket with Wallace, and trouble in Twin Falls in the selection of the Second District Congressional candidate.

Mr. Victor lost to Joel Anderson of Pocatello in a tight contest, committing the vote on who should represent the party for the race in the Congressional District. Mr. Anderson won and went on to defeat in the general election.

Mr. Victor lost the nomination district to run for the Legislature, and was defeated by a large margin in the general election.

Mr. Victor, when contacted Wednesday on the comments made by the Secretary of State, said, "I have no comment."

Mr. Stumph could not be reached Wednesday for comment on his removal from office or the statements made by Mr. Conarussa.

In Boise, Mr. Conarussa said Mr. Stumph is still listed as chairman of the Idaho AIP. He said that for a change to be recognized he would need to have certification that it was made properly by the state central committee of the party.

## Hijacker Hits First Trip Of New Route

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — The captain of a Trans World airliner on an inaugural flight from St. Louis to Miami radioed today that "a guy has a gun at my back" and the plane with 40 passengers and seven crewmen aboard had changed course for Cuba.

"He is forcing us to go to Havana," Capt. Dennis Maloney advised the Atlanta control tower. "We are proceeding there."

The hijacker entered the cockpit shortly after takeoff from Nashville. At the time of the call, the plane was 10 miles south of Chattanooga.

Trans-World said Mason Rudolph, the professional golfer, and Tex Ritter, country and Western singing star, boarded the flight, No. 486, at Nashville.

The Boeing 727 was inaugurating a flight making stops for the first time at Nashville. It took off from Louisville at 8:15 a.m. and was due in Miami at 12:17 p.m.

He said for the first time information was received on energy flowing from that star in the ultraviolet portion of the spectrum.

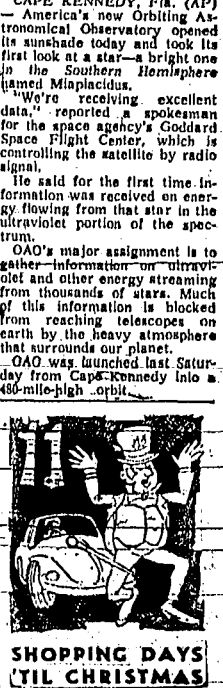

### Lawmaker Backs Ideas On Safety

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sponsor of the nation's first coal mine inspection law enacted 27 years ago gave cautious endorsement today for stiffer federal safety rules.

Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W. Va., a senior member of the Senate Labor Committee, said he will sponsor legislation "dedicated to improvement of coal mine safety and federal enforcement."

But he did not specify what he plans to propose in the next Congress.

Randolph's comments came in a statement to Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall, who after the 78-death Mannington, W. Va. mine disaster last month called a conference on mine safety.

The conference, to be held here Thursday, already has been preceded by proposals from two West Virginia Democrats, Reps. Ken Hechler and John M. Slack.

Slack said Tuesday he has written President-elect Richard M. Nixon asking him to allocate at least \$5 million next year to the Office of Coal Research for industry studies on mine safety.

Hechler has said he'll sponsor federal mine safety next year that is far stiffer than that proposed by the Administration in the waning days of the 90th Congress.

Randolph said the Administration measure obviously "did

not have the complete stamp of acceptability" by union, industry and federal officials.

"There probably is not any measure that can be fashioned to achieve total acceptability," he said, pledging to do whatever he can to improve coal mine safety legislation.

The Interior Department said Friday it is studying federal coal mine legislation proposed last September by President Johnson.

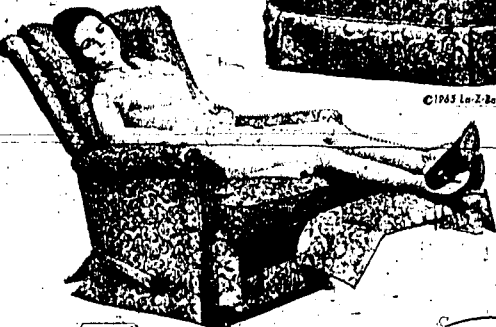

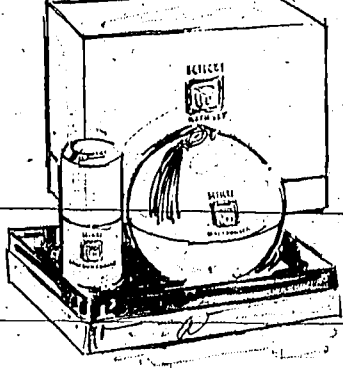

### Court Appeal Raises Query Of Violence Against Rights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has been urged to "back police discretion" in curbing demonstrators officials believe might bring violence. But an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer argued to the contrary Tuesday that police have a responsibility to protect demonstrators' right to take grievances to the street.

The free speech and police-penetrating discretion question was posed in an appeal by Negro comedian Dick Gregory over his disorderly conduct arrest in 1966 for refusing to disperse a demonstration outside the home of Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley.

The demonstration by 65 to 70 people drew some 1,200 spectators and the demonstrators said they were pelted with rocks and eggs.

### Skipper's Wife To Carry Plea For Release

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Mrs. Lloyd Bucher, wife of the skipper of the USS Pueblo, says about 500,000 signatures supporting action to release the captured intelligence ship will be taken to Washington Saturday for delivery to the White House and the office of President-elect Nixon.

Mrs. Bucher, in accepting petitions containing 8,000 signatures demanding the release, said Tuesday that she hopes the Johnson administration will get the Pueblo crew home or that Nixon will use "new men with new ideas" to do it.

North Korea seized the Pueblo 322 days ago.

The signatures will be forwarded by the National Committee for Responsible Patriotism in New York, she said.

### 10 Challis Forest Range Areas Studied

CHALLIS — The Challis National Forest allotment analysis crew recently completed field work on 10 range allotments for this year. Five of these allotments were cattle and five sheep.

Range conservationist Tom Stinson, in charge of the range analysis crew and with the three range students completed the field analysis.

Branch Chief Nornt Hack reports that a total of 700 studies were made over these 10 allotments which covered approximately 126,540 acres. These studies are designed to indicate the condition and trend of the livestock and big game ranges. This information is recorded on aerial photographs along with the vegetative types. A map is then made from these photos for each allotment for planning purposes.

Permanently-staked range condition and trend studies were also established on 13 key areas on the Challis National Forest, with help from the ranger district personnel. These studies will be used by the crew to determine the range trend changes occur on each allotment.



# Governor Names Pocatelloan As 'Commerce' Chief

By ALLEN M. BAILEY, Associated Press Writer

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Don W. Samuelson Tuesday introduced two new state officials to news-mag, and told his afternoon news-conference that he went to "one of the most productive conference that I have attended" last week in Palm Springs, Calif.

The governor announced his appointment of Albert E. Minton as head of the State Department of Commerce and Development.

Minton, a 45-year-old Pocatello city councilman and former Eastern Idaho businessman, replaces Louise Shatuck as executive secretary of the department.

Robert M. Robson, named last week as the next Idaho attorney general, spoke briefly. He will replace Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard who will be sworn in next month as a State Supreme Court justice.

Robson said he wasn't ready to announce staff changes but said he had spent the day arranging for the transition next month.

He also confirmed he would run in 1970 and that if elected he would probably continue active in Republican politics.

Samuelson said he was pleased with developments at the Republican Governor's Conference in Palm Springs, particularly with the assurance on the new secretary of the Interior, President-elect Nixon conferred with Samuelson and other Western governors, the Idaho governor said, and promised the Interior secretary would be from the West.

All governors present — except Alaska Gov. Walter J. Hickel — endorsed Montana Gov. Tim Babcock for the post, Samuelson said. But he said he understood Babcock would not get the post and that Hickel might.

Vice president-elect Spiro T. Agnew explained to the governors, his proposed role as a liaison between Nixon and governors under the new administration, Samuelson said.

Samuelson said governors now have difficulty communicating problems and needs to federal officials. "At least we'll be able to tell our story" in the new administration, he said.

The governor said he would re-appoint Charles Marshall of Jerome and Ferris Kintz of Montpelier to the Idaho Water Resources Board when their terms expire next year.

But Samuelson said he had not decided whom to appoint to the other two vacancies opening next year, including one now held by board chairman George Chroham.

## Army Spokesman Outlines Uses Of Atom Blasts

BOISE (AP) — A single nuclear-blast might produce enough material to build an earth-fill dam in Idaho, an Army Corps of Engineers official told state and federal officials Tuesday.

Maj. Richard W. Mattel of Livermore, Calif., said a nuclear explosion suggested part of a proposed Twin Springs Dam Project on the Boise River's Middle Fork might produce all material needed for such a dam.

Considerable opposition was voiced last summer to the proposal, primarily because it had not yet been considered by Congress and because of the nuclear energy angle.

Some objectors feared the action would endanger plans for the proposed Southwest Idaho Water Development Project.

### Airline Seeks Regulation By PUC Laws

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature will be asked to give the Public Utilities Commission authority to regulate intra-state airlines, according to the head of Sun Valley Airlines.

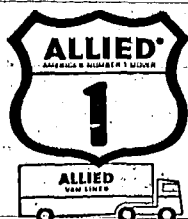

**U.S. Charges Ohio Agency Denied Rights**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department says it has filed its first suit charging a state employment service with racial discrimination in violation of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. The suit against the Ohio Bureau of Employment Services and its administrator, Willard P. Dudley, was filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Columbus.

It charged the Ohio bureau has not referred qualified Negroes for jobs or apprentice openings on the same basis as whites and has failed to circulate job orders to its offices where most applicants are Negroes.

It also charged Negroes have not been classified commensurate with their education, training and experience, and that job orders have been accepted from employers the bureau knows of efforts to obtain voluntary compliance with the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

**Drug-Sniffing Dog Stirs Controversy**

COCOA, Fla. (AP) — When Postmaster C.P. "Rinky" Geiger asked us to come over — all right," Duke — Brevard County's pot-sniffing pooch — to sample the aroma of a pile of suspicious Christmas packages, he touched off a controversy that shouldn't happen to a dog.

"That dog violated the sanctity of the seal," declared Postal Inspector J.A. Callahan, who said sniffing first class mail is strictly taboo.

Callahan, Geiger's boss in Atlanta, said Tuesday an investigation was under way into the incident which he said violated the policy of the post office to keep unauthorized people out of the inner sanctum of the mail room.

Geiger, meanwhile, wasn't talking.

However, Brevard Sheriff Leigh Wilson had plenty to say. "When a dog can do your job better than you can," said the sheriff, "that's something to be concerned about."

Wilson admittedly was irked by the adverse reaction of postal officials to the visit by narcotic agents and Duke, pride of

the narcotics division. "I understand that Wilson's agents tipped that a shipment of marijuana was being sent to Cocoa Beach — had approached Geiger with the suggestion that Duke look around in the mail room."

At any rate, Duke put his intelligent nose to work and found three packages which the narcotics agents noted and allowed to continue their way, unopened.

Callahan said that authorities cannot use evidence gleaned in such a manner because the "sanctity of the seal" has been broken in the mail room.

"Duke has made numerous arrests and was instrumental in breaking up a \$20,000 drop," said Wilson. Duke had qualified in court as a witness in a burglary defendant in a narcotics case, Wilson said.

Lt. Edgar Brannon, the dog's handler, said Duke has "sniffed the stuff in a minute," said "become high" on narcotics in Brannon who added he has not the course of his sniffing but admitted it is because he is there, hence, to keep him away from the drugs.

# Warning Issued To Snowmobile Owners

**BURLEY** — Warning to snowmobile operators "use caution and abide by the regulations when in the Howell Canyon area," were jointly issued Wednesday by Cassia County Sheriff's office and the Forest Service.

It is illegal to drive snowmobile machines on roads. The Uniform-Registration Act prohibits any unlicensed vehicle to be operated on any public road and Howell Canyon is a public road, Sheriff Ray Mitchell states.

There have been "close calls" this winter with snowmobiles traveling on the Howell Canyon road or crossing the road, Sheriff Mitchell reported.

The Lake Cleveland entrance is dangerous because many snow machines are being parked on the "cut-off" at the upper Cleveland turnoff. This makes it hard for motorists to see oncoming snow machine traffic or snow machines crossing the road.

Persons driving in the area must remember it is difficult for cars to stop on the icy-snow-packed road, the sheriff added.

The Forest Service has designated places where snow machines may be used. Most of the Howell Canyon area is open to snowmobiles, except the "hot area" and areas where snow slides may result.

The Forest Service is erecting signs along the Howell Canyon road to direct the snowmobile traffic to areas where the machines can be loaded and unloaded without getting on the main road.

After the signs are erected it will be illegal for snow machines to park on either side of the curve. "Anyone violating this regulation will be subject to a citation," Mitchell warned.

To assist snowmobilers to get from their cars to the open area, the snow will be shoveled on both sides of the road to provide a cut-off wide enough for the machines.

The Forest Service presently is working to eliminate the danger of auto-snowmobile collisions near the lake road by opening a road for snow machines. This road, scheduled for opening next year, will be as wide as the present road and will lead to the area which most snowmobilers are now using.

The Forest Service also has tentative plans to put restrooms and a warming hut in this area.

If snowmobile operators abide by the present rules and keep off the roads and away from restricted areas, it won't be necessary for the state legislature to enact specific regulations as to where snow machines may be used," stated Sheriff Mitchell.

Presently it is individuals and small groups who are violating the rules. "Members of the Snake River Trail Machine Riders are to be commended for keeping the rules in their riding," Sheriff Mitchell added.

In the joint release the Forest Service and Cassia County Sheriff's Office stated, "they only wished to insure the safety of snowmobile operators, motorists and skiers."

The couple met while on holiday at Sochi on the Black Sea in 1961.

Her letter of long ago asked, "Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Please tell me the truth."

The reply, written by the late Francis Pharcellus Church, said in part:

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist... alas, how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus; it would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias."

# League Aide Hails Study Of Civic Ills

**NEW ORLEANS (AP)** — The creation of a White House Council on Urban Problems "is a good first step" toward development of a national urbanization policy, the executive director of the National League of Cities said Tuesday night.

President-elect Nixon announced the formation of the council Tuesday while disclosing that sociologist Daniel P. Moynihan would be his special assistant for urban affairs.

Patrick Healy, executive director of the league, said he understood that Moynihan "would be a sort of director of planning."

"By having an executive arm of the president actually posing policy for the President to propose should result in some steps toward a national urbanization policy," Healy said.

An 82-page document, approved earlier in the week by a 45-member resolutions committee, said a national urbanization policy must "rank with foreign policy and economic policy in determining the priorities of America."

The document said, "the potentially disastrous consequences of unguided, unchecked urbanization demand unprecedented federal action."

The policy statement—the work of 10 committees, all headed by mayors of major cities—said "massive federal land state financial assistance" is needed "to supplement inadequate local resources."

The mayors said, too, "increased participation of citizens is essential."

# 'Clever' Thief Snags Bonuses From Company

**TOKYO (AP)** — A clever highwayman stole \$316,000 worth of yen that was to be used for Christmas bonuses at the electric company in Fuchu, but the bonuses will be paid.

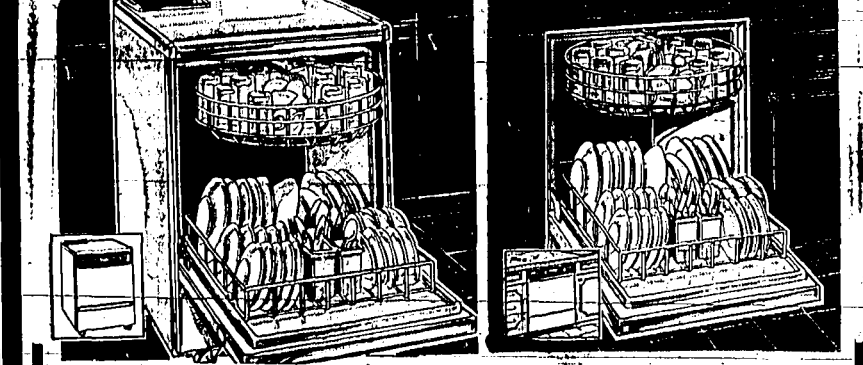
Police said they had no clues to the robber who dressed in a policeman's uniform Tuesday, flagged down four unarmed bank officials in a car with the money, got them out by telling them the car contained a bomb, and then drove off.

# First Week Of Airline Shows Profit

**BOISE (AP)** — The president of Sun Valley Airlines, the new Idaho-based operation, said Tuesday the firm found some encouragement in its first week of operation.

The line began scheduled flights Dec. 1 with routes connecting points between Spokane, Wash., and Boise and between Idaho Falls and Boise. The headquarters are at Gooding and aircraft overnight at Idaho Falls and Spokane.

"We did not carry as many passengers last week as we had hoped, but we carried more than we thought we would," President Jim Wilkins told a meeting sponsored by the Idaho Department of Aeronautics.

Wilkins said it would be at least six months before they could expect to show a profit. He also noted they have talked to other states and have yet to find a commuter airline that has made a profit.

Wilkins said it costs more than \$2,000 a day to operate the two 18-place airplanes and one 7-passenger craft.

The line's break-even point on passenger load is 37 per cent of capacity, Wilkins said.

The airline has asked the Idaho Public Utilities Commission to undertake regulatory authority and the PUC has held it does not at present have that authority. Sun Valley Airlines wants PUC control to prevent unfair competition from larger airlines.

# Holdup

**TOKYO (AP)** — A lone robber disrupted in a police uniform flagged down a bank car in suburban Tokyo and escaped with 300 million yen — \$833,333. Police described it as the biggest highway robbery in Japan's history.

The Nippon Trust and Banking Co. of Tokyo said the money was being taken to the Tokyo-Shibaura Electric Co. in Fuchu, 20 miles west of Tokyo, for distribution as year-end bonuses.

Four bank employees were assigned to escort the money, but officials said none was armed.

Police said the robber flagged that car down on an isolated road behind the Fuchu prison, then got the four men out on pretext a time bomb had been planted in the car.

**ROME (AP)** — Australian scientist N. E. Grylls has pinpointed a white fly as the carrier of a yellowing disease that kills palm trees. The discovery is expected to help coconut growers in Jamaica, who lose as many as 30,000 trees a year, and in southeast Asia where the disease cuts sharply into growers' earnings.

# Burley Hikes Fees On Swimming, Golf

**BURLEY** — The Burley City Council has adopted ordinances which increase rates on the new cemetery, golf course and swimming pool.

Private party rental rates were increased to \$16.50 for 35 people; \$22 for 36 to 75 people, and \$27.50 for 76 to 115 people.

# Texan Must Stand Trial In Murder Of Utah Youth

**BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)** — A Texas man must stand trial here for the murder of a Salt Lake City youth and the attempted murder of a San Jose, Calif., girl.

Richard Welch, 26, of San Antonio, was bound over Tuesday for arraignment in Kern County Superior Court after a preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge John Nairn.

Welch is charged with picking up two hitchhikers here last Sept. 25, and then murdering Randy Jenkins, 17, of Salt Lake City, and shooting the girl, 16-year-old Diane Bradford of San Jose, and leaving her for dead in the desert near Mojave with a bullet in her head. She recovered.

At his preliminary hearing Tuesday, Welch's own alleged account of the incident was entered into the record in the form of testimony by sheriff's detective Robert K. Dennis.

He said Welch told him Oct. 11 while being returned to California by air that he had shot young Jenkins before Jenkins could shoot him.

According to this version, Welch said that after he picked up Rankin and Miss Bradford and drove east into the desert he heard her ask Rankin "if he was going to go through with his plan." Welch said he got his gun out of the back of his car during a stop, and at another stop, when he saw Rankin pull up his trouser leg and reach into his boot as if for a gun, he fired first and killed Rankin. Then, he said, he shot the girl because she was the witness.

He said he and his wife, Anita, 17, returned to Bakersfield, where to Welch's money, and after it arrived abandoned the car and then returned to Texas by bus. The wife has pleaded guilty as accessory to her husband's unlawful flight, and a murder charge originally lodged against her has been dropped. She has been ordered to a state institution for diagnostic observation.

Dennis' testimony met strenuous objection by defense attorneys James Keon and Henry Bianchi, but Judge Nairn ruled it admissible in a preliminary hearing.

As the first witness Tuesday, Miss Bradford testified that after Welch had shot Rankin he had forced her to undress partially and lie on her stomach. She remembered nothing more until she was found crawling along the road by a passerby, she said.

Under defense questioning, she admitted that the night before the incident she and young Rankin had shared an LSD pill during a trip to the "Haight-Ashbury" district in San Francisco before starting to hitch hike to Salt Lake City to visit Rankin's father.

Her mother, Dorothy Bradford of Campbell, Calif., testified that she had argued against the hitchhike trip. She said she had known that her daughter had smoked marijuana but said she knew nothing about the LSD.

The girl's father, Joseph Bradford of Palmdale, Calif., is in court but did not testify.

# Police Probe Knife As Clue In Killing

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — A fixed-blade knife and the statements of an elderly couple were the primary clues police had today as they hunted the killer of a University of Southern California freshman.

The knife, found near the scene of Monday night's fatal stabbing of Bryan Clay, 18, of Honolulu, was undergoing police laboratory tests to determine whether it was the murder weapon.

The white student was running an errand for a fraternity brother when he was slain. Clay was retrieving a jacket from a car parked in front of the fraternity house, six blocks from the university campus.

Police said the elderly couple, apparently the only witnesses to the slaying, told them they saw three young Negroes surround Clay as he stepped out of the car.

They closed in on him and one of the assailants lunged forward for an instant before they fled. Clay staggered to the fraternity door and collapsed. He died less than an hour later.

Detective L. John Gist, heading the investigation, said no motive for the murder has been established.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Clay, the slain youth's parents, were in Los Angeles planning his funeral. The freshman has been a football, baseball and track star at Barrington High School in suburban Chicago a year ago. The father is a airlines executive recently transferred to Hawaii.

# Soviets Boost Propaganda Against Births

**MOSCOW (AP)** — The Soviet government is increasing production of birth control devices and explanatory literature to try to reduce abortions.

Boris Petrovsky, minister of health, said one million contraceptive devices would be produced by the end of this year. Contraceptive pills are not being sold, he said, because there were "unfavorable side effects."

But another official told the Literary Gazette, studies were being made to prepare for industrial production of oral contraceptives.

Because of the poor efficiency of existing artificial birth-control aids, 75 per cent of all unwanted births in the Soviet Union were prevented by abortions, a recent study showed.

### Young Slayer Gets Terms Of 99 Years

CHARLESTON, Ill. (AP) — Thomas Charles Fuller II, 19, convicted slayer of five brothers and sisters, was sentenced Tuesday to two consecutive sentences of 70 to 99 years in prison.

Circuit Court Judge Harry J. Hannah, in handing down the sentences in Coles County Circuit Court said, "The nature and the enormity of the crime demands that the defendant receive a substantial penalty." Fuller pleaded guilty to the killings Oct. 23, of five children of Mr. and Mrs. William Cox. The slayings occurred April 27 on their farm northwest of Maitland.

Fuller had been dating Louise Cox, 16, sister of the victims. Louise was not harmed.

In passing sentence Judge Hannah said he considered two separate crimes had been committed, thus bringing about the consecutive sentences. "Three Cox boys were shot to death behind a corn crib on the farm while two girls were killed a short time later inside the corn crib."

The five victims were Lewis, 18; Theresa, 9; Mary Catherine, 8; Gary, 7; and Kenneth, 6.

### Biafrans Found Guilty Of Threats

LONDON (AP) — Two Biafran Black Power supporters were found guilty Tuesday of threatening to kill police officers at Hyde Park speakers' corner and inciting other colored people to violence.

They were Benedict Obi Egbuna, 32, writer, and Peter Martin, 27, artist. Egbuna was sentenced to 12 months in jail, suspended for three years. Martin was placed on probation.

The men were charged in August with preparing a confidential report giving instructions for policemen to be "beaten unconscious, or better still permanently — and they should be beaten until they are dead."

Wedding 'Race' Pleases Judge  
KNOXVILLE (AP) — John L. Shippe pleaded guilty to a speeding charge in sessions court Monday, but he told Judge W. Earl Layman he had a good reason.

"I was trying not to be late to my wedding," Shippe said. "Were you?" asked the judge. "I was, after the officer stopped me and wrote the ticket," Shippe replied. He was charged with traveling 100 miles per hour in a 75 mph speed zone. The judge fined Shippe \$5 and costs.

TECH CHIEF NAMED PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Dr. Robert F. Baker, a former member of the Atomic Energy Commission, is the acting president of California Institute of Technology. He was named Tuesday for 22 years, delivered his official farewell address before retiring President-elect Nixon as science adviser.

### Irish Official Quits In Tiff Over Policy

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Prime Minister Terence O'Neill "forced" Home Minister William Craig out of his Cabinet today for suggesting that the territory could "go it alone" without Britain.

Craig, at the center of Northern Ireland's crisis over the civil rights of the Roman Catholic minority, resigned after O'Neill demanded that he quit.

In a letter to Craig made public after he resigned, O'Neill said he had to request the minister to amend at least two speeches. "Which attempted to show either that we could manage our own financial affairs economically, or that in certain circumstances we should contemplate a breach in our relations with Britain."

"But what is at risk is the enormous financial conventions which make it possible for us to enjoy a British rather than an Irish standard of living," said O'Neill. "Your idea of an Ulster which could go it alone is a delusion, and I believe all sensible people will see it to be so. Clearly, you cannot propound such views and remain a member of the government."

Craig had backed his police force to the hilt against demonstrators' charges of brutality in quelling riots in Londonderry Oct. 5.

"Craig Out" had been a battle cry of the demonstrators whose protests set off two months of clashes with police.

The demonstrators claimed that Northern Ireland's Catholic population — one third of the 1.5 million population — are discriminated against in jobs, housing and local elections.

O'Neill has put through reforms in local government but has not so far conceded the universal suffrage the Catholics demand in local elections. Property qualifications are still required to vote in local elections.

Meanwhile, a George Forrest, a Unionist member of the provincial parliament, died Tuesday but a special election to fill his seat is likely to be delayed due to the religious tension.

Most Protestants support the pro-British Unionists, and most Roman Catholics back the Sinn Fein Republicans who want to unite Northern Ireland's six counties with the neighboring Irish Republic.

### T.F. Navy Office Seeks OK To CSI Vocational School

Will the Department of the Navy accept graduates of the College of Southern Idaho Vocational School for advanced pay grades in the new Navy Seabee program?

This is the question being asked at the Twin Falls Navy Recruiting office.

Two weeks ago Chief Ron Jennings of the local Navy office sent the curriculum of the CSI Vocational School to Portland for approval after consulting with Dr. James Taylor, CSI president.

"We won't know for two or three months if the school will be accredited by the Navy Department unless we have a test case," stated Chief Jennings.

"We are now contacting past graduates of the vocational school and telling them about the Seabee program," he said.

'BUSINESS' TAKES HELM SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Ky-you-ha-ha-de, a 53-year-old Indian whose name means "un-finished business," is the new leader of the 200,000-member six-nation Iroquois Confederacy. He was named at a meeting in nearby Nedrow.

Graduates of vocational schools in Weiser, Boise, and Portland are now enlisting for 30 months in the Navy Seabee program and entering the service for the first time with advanced pay grades of E4 and E5 which are petty officer grades in the Navy.

### U.S. Charges Top 'Panther' With Flight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal warrant was issued today charging Black Panther leader Eldridge Cleaver with unlawful flight from California.

An FBI affidavit asking the warrant said Cleaver's wife, Kathleen, flew to New York Sunday.

The affidavit said she earlier had withdrawn \$33,000 from Cleaver's San Francisco bank account.

"It appears she has transported funds which are the fugitive's property for delivery and probable use outside the state," said FBI agent Fred Liparde.

Cleaver was under state court arrest for murder last November. He was returned to state prison as a parole violator. He also pleaded two days earlier after his parole was revoked.

### Fund Investment Proves Profitable

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Treasurer Marjorie R. Moon said Tuesday state income from investment of idle funds had increased more than 270 per cent in the past two years.

Miss Moon made the statement in her department's biennial statement which said general fund income from such investments rose from \$184,507 in 1966 to an estimated \$1,321,850 this year.

The report said increased investments were possible because of the growing revenue, mainly from sales tax.

Miss Moon said short-term investments of idle state funds was limited to U.S. treasury bills by state law.

The trio rented the plane Sunday in Hillsboro and flew to Astoria. They left Astoria about 4 p.m. and crashed near Vernonia, about 40 miles northwest of Portland. The apparently were headed for Hillsboro.

A Coast Guard spokesman said a helicopter, flying low because of cloud cover, spotted the wreckage.

"It was in an area of 80 to 100-foot trees and apparently spun in and did not leave a trail in the woods," he said.

Searchers found impact had broken one wing tip and thrown the fuel tank free but the plane was not badly smashed.

Ing's brother-in-law, Capt. D. Lee of the Honolulu police department had flown to Oregon when he heard the plane was missing. He waited at the Vernonia search headquarters for verification of the crash findings. Waiting in Forest Grove and Portland were the parents of the other students, Dr. John K. Foose and his wife and Gen. C. B. Harts Army, Ret. and his wife.

Dr. M. A. F. Ritchie, president of Pacific University, said, an all-university memorial service was being planned.

# Effort Under Way To Bridge Gap In Agency Coordination

The Cooperative Area Manpower Planning Service is an informal effort on the part of many Valley public service agencies to bridge the gap that exists between them.

Representatives from various local agencies meet once each month on a volunteer basis to discuss the problems. In the past, no such common meeting ground was available and no different agency often had no idea what each was doing, stated Bill Parenteau, assistant manager of the Twin Falls office of the Idaho Department of Employment.

The agencies involved in the CAMPS effort include the Department of Public Assistance, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Service, the Community Action Agency and the College of Southern Idaho.

CAMPS attempts to coordinate the activities of all the area agencies, stated Mr. Parenteau.

All of the agencies are equal partners in this effort. "We want to avoid duplication of service and better utilize the resources of each agency, our job is to first identify the needs of the area and then to focus the resources of each agency accordingly," he said.

CAMPS is now in its pilot phase of development. "This job is a big one and can't be done overnight," stated Mr. Parenteau.

Idaho presents an unique problem because of its sparse population and the great distance over which it is spread.

"Where in the Magic Valley area we might have 20 individuals who qualify for a particular program, a city the size of Cleveland may have 400. There may be only 200 such people in the entire state of Idaho. How do we best utilize the staff and resources of each agency to reach these 200 scattered individuals? That is the type of problem we hope to solve through CAMPS," he said.

In June of 1968 a handbook was prepared which compiled the activities and programs of all the public service agencies in the state. The handbook

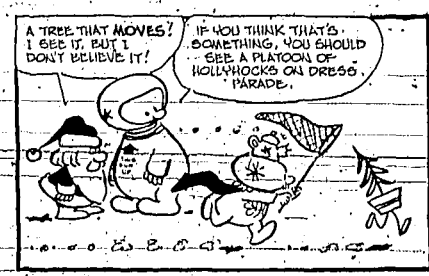
Cassin said he would use most of the prize money to found an institute for the study of human rights in Strasbourg, which he called "The moral capital of Europe."

## Tribesmen May Starve

# Dispute Over Relief Poses Famine Threat

ASABA, Nigeria (AP) — Eight thousand Ibo tribesmen will be without food by Friday because of a row between white International Red Cross workers and Nigerian officials.

"We will run out of food Friday," Father Hugh Conlon, an Irish priest, said Monday to Maj. T. K. Adamu, the federal commander of the Asaba sector including rebel Biafran territory.

"God will provide," replied Adamu with a faint smile. While both men spoke, gunfire could be heard across the Niger River. Adamu said federal troops were mopping up some Biafran secessionists after establishing a beachhead at Onitsha.

A week ago Adamu expelled the last five International Red Cross workers from his sector after a dispute that provoked antiwhite slogans in Asaba's refugee camp and accusations of spying against European relief workers.

They included an Austrian doctor and two male nurses, an American and a Norwegian. Asaba's 6,000 residents, who rely on the International Red Cross for food, now receive none. Five hundred tons of food and medical supplies are locked

in a warehouse here, but the key is 280 miles away in Lagos, held by Robert G. Kerepe, a former Peace Corps member from Los Angeles, Calif.

In the refugee camp where the dispute started, there is plenty of food. The Nigerian army provides for the 2,100 inmates.

Father Conlon, a veteran missionary, used to provide for the spiritual needs of Asaba. He is now trying to save the population, starved to 25,000 to 30,000 since the civil war, from starvation. International observers under Maj. Gen. William A. Milroy of Canada also are investigating the expulsion of Red Cross workers and attempting to arrange a reconciliation.

The Asaba argument is just one example of the distrust prevalent in Nigeria—Asaba—the Red Cross relief operation started last July.

Sources in Asaba claim a succession of English, Norwegian and Austrian medical teams never stayed in town long enough to gain the confidence of the people.

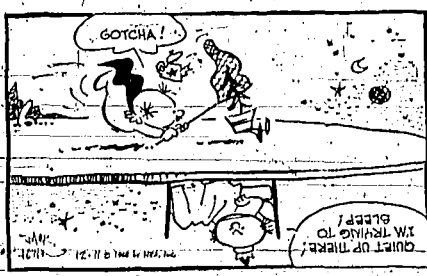

## Computerized 'Egg Factory' Houses 400,000 Hens

BRIGHTON, Colo. (AP) — space on a lay-or-else basis. Those that don't are headed for the stew pot. Replacements are supplied on a regular schedule by a chick breeding plant near Platteville, Colo.

The complex of 12 buildings, looking a little like a missile site, sits on a ridge west of Brighton. Each building contains 34,000 hybrid white Leghorn hens and pullets.

These 400,000 chickens, fed at regular intervals on a special diet developed in a decade of research, produce close to 400,000 eggs per day.

The hens are kept in cages in tiers—10 cages high in each building. The cages are rigged around a metal scaffolding that rotates slowly from darkness into light. Each hen gets six four-minute watering periods and six four-minute eating periods in 24 hours.

Lewish Hayden, Gates Cycle president, calls the plant "perfect in all respects."

"We've learned the exact temperature on a constant basis around a degree Fahrenheit—at which hens prove most productive," he said. "We've worked out the exact formulas for mixing our own feed for different age groups of chickens to insure maximum production."

"And we've found ways to use everything, including the inevitable fertilizer and the cracked eggs, and still keep the place odor-free and full of chickens."

Hayden contends that the factory hens are "happier by far than any farm-raised chicken. Each hen occupies her cage

Adamu ordered the Red Cross workers out, halting food distribution to the 8,000 townspeople and to an estimated 17,000 persons believed hiding in the bush south of Asaba. Many of the latter are believed to have slipped from Biafran territory across the Niger.

Adamu told the International observers Monday he is willing to accept other workers from the International Red Cross "as long as they are willing to work with us."



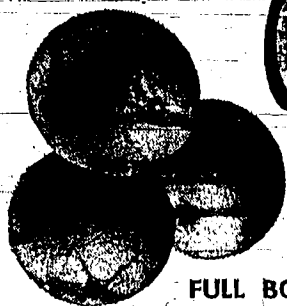

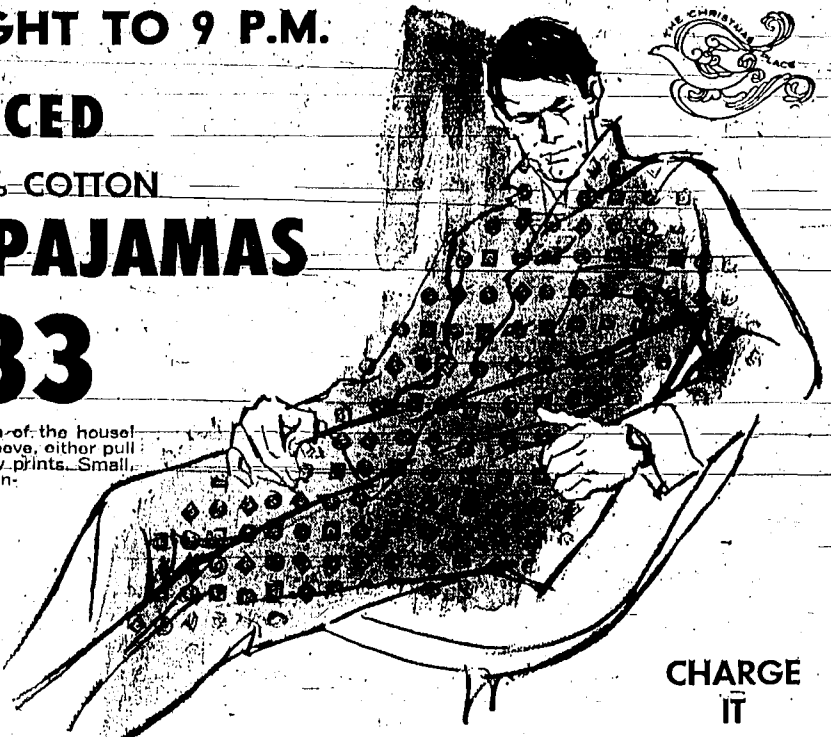

Thai Planes Smash Red Strongholds

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Thai fighter-bombers and helicopter gunships made a major effort this week to break up terrorist strongholds in Communist-controlled areas of the northeast, official sources said today.

This was the first time the U.S.-built F-72 fighter-bombers had been sent on bombing and strafing runs in the area about 300 miles northeast of Bangkok.

This showed government concern with the rise in Communist-led insurgency. The insurgents are better armed and are more willing to battle government forces.

Only Monday, a police source said heavier fire power would have to be brought to bear on the insurgents. This presumably meant artillery fire as well as air strikes.

The source confirmed reports said a U.S. Air Force Jolly Green Giant rescue helicopter was called in to pick up a downed plane crew. Whether the plane was shot down or ran into mechanical trouble was not indicated.

## Nobel Prizes Given Five Americans

STOCKHOLM, (AP) — Five American scientists and a Japanese author, Yasunari Kawabata, were awarded 1968 Nobel Prizes Tuesday for their contributions to the "benefits to mankind."

The prestige-laden awards, each worth a record 350,000 crowns, about \$70,000, were handed out by Sweden's scholarly 88-year-old King Gustaf VI Adolf at a banquet mixed with royal pomp, academic rites and solemn music.

The all-American team of scientific laureates were: Prof. Luis Alvarez, 57, of the University of California at Berkeley, winner of the prize for physics.

Norwegian-born Prof. Lars Onsager, 65, of Yale University, the chemistry prize winner.

Three biochemists, Dr. Marshall W. Nirenberg, 41, of the National Heart Institute at Bethesda, Md., Indian-born Har Gobind Khorana, 46, of the University of Wisconsin, and Robert Holley, 46, of Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y. They shared the prize for physiology and medicine.

Earlier today, in Oslo, this year's Nobel Peace Prize was presented by the Norwegian Nobel Committee to French jurist Prof. Rene Cassin for his human rights work. He said he would use most of the prize money—\$70,000—to found an institute for human rights in Strasbourg.

Top hats and tails took over in frosty and dark Stockholm as the annual Nobel festival opened up in the Grecian-columned red plush concert hall where it has been held for the past 40 years.

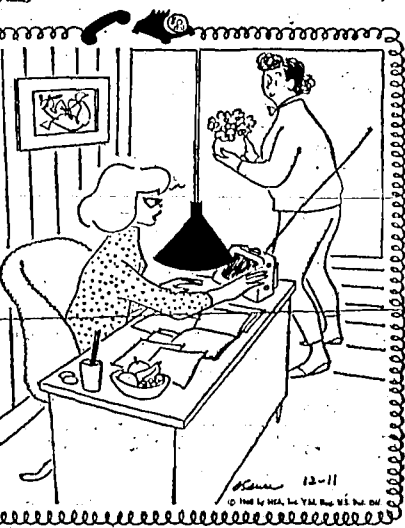

# Colorado Boys' Ranch Offers 'Ideal' Solution For Troubled Youths

 LA JUNTA, Colo. (AP) — Colorado Boys Ranch was started nearly eight years ago for youngsters "with no place to go but into trouble."  
 "The quotes are from Dist. Judge Mitchell D. Johns of Denver, one of the founders of the facility in Southeastern Colorado that now is home to 75 boys.

"When you handle domestic relations cases, you learn that many children have parents but no home," Judge Johns said. "Their parents either don't want them or simply can't provide them with a home."  
 "These are the children with no place to go but into trouble. They certainly need to be the ones who become delinquent."

"We felt there should be some place for these boys in the home base that could give them a chance to grow up as useful citizens."  
 The late Judge Hal Chapman of Rocky Ford, Colo., promoted the idea of a boys' ranch to the nearby city of La Junta offered a 33-acre site that had been an air base civilian housing area during World War II.

Citizens of La Junta collected \$15,000 and gave freely of time and labor to get the project underway. The ranch is frantically patterned after Cal Farley's boys' ranch near Amarillo, Tex., and Boys Town near Omaha, Neb.  
 The first to arrive at the ranch north of La Junta was a 13-year-old boy with no father. Now he is a Junior at the University of Colorado.

Boys of 10 to 14 are accepted. They are assigned by age groups to dormitories, each of which is supervised by a man and his wife.  
 Administrator Ray S. Steff, a former Army lieutenant colonel,

says that only nine per cent of the boys coming to the ranch since it was opened in April 1961 have had to be transferred to other institutions for special physical or emotional care. He said that only two per cent of the boys have had to be dropped for delinquency reasons.  
 Boys riding through the big gate find they are coming to a

real Western ranch. In the beginning, the Colorado Cattlemen's Association donated all chows to the ranch. Now it has 40 head of cattle, 30 horses, 80 hogs, 40 sheep and four goats. The boys raise all the beef and pork consumed at the ranch.  
 Each boy sent to the ranch must stay until he is 18 or has finished high school, although

officials may release a boy to his parents before then if they feel that his home conditions have improved.  
 The first six boys accepted at the ranch one ran away some years back, but soon returned. Keep their ties with it, although all are in college or at vocational schools. As one 19-year-old said, "This is my home."
