## Bucher Says Crew Beaten

### Koreans Free 81 Crewmen From Pueblo

SEOUL (AP) — The commander of the USS Pueblo said today he and his men were beaten in the final weeks of their North Korean captivity in "the most concentrated form of terror, that I've ever seen or dreamed is possible."

Cmdr. Lloyd M. Bucher told a news conference of the beatings after he and his surviving 81 crewmen reached South Korea and were dispatched to a U.S. military hospital for medical checkups.

Some of the men still had black eyes and bruises and others suffered from malnutrition, Bucher said.

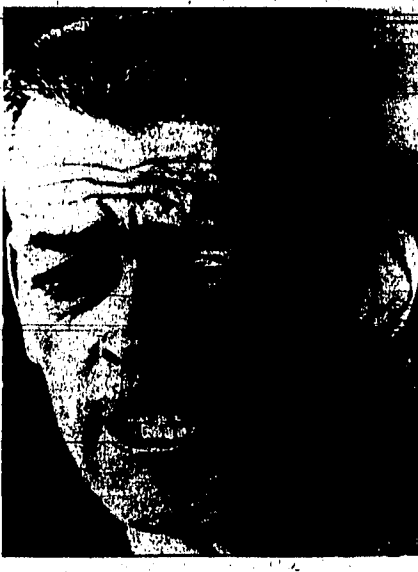
"I was beaten less than anyone else," he said.

"I was mostly terrified of possible beating and I was kept in solitary confinement during the entire 11 months and there were many occasions when I didn't think I was going to make it."

He said he was punched and kicked by the North Koreans but never hit with a stick or a club as some of his men were.

"Commencing with the week before last, we went through the most concentrated form of terror that I've ever seen or dreamed is possible."

"I wasn't prepared totally for the beatings. I thought that they were totally brutal with no mercy of any kind. They were done for one purpose and that was to terrify people. I had about half of the crew last week beaten badly. There are still many people in the crew today who have carried black eyes and bruised ribs. I had one man last week who was beaten with a four by four (timber),

## Apollo Crewmen Prepare To Blast Into Moon Orbit

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — The bold adventurers of Apollo 8 sped ever closer to the moon today and reported they are ready to blast themselves into lunar orbit early Tuesday, fulfilling man's centuries-old desire to explore this mysterious body.

As the spacecraft flew unerringly toward the grip of lunar gravity, commander Frank Borman reported the astronauts were healthy and eager to make their Christmas Eve orbit of the moon.

More than 180,000 miles from his home planet and nearly 50,000 miles from the moon, Borman reported:

"We're looking ahead, of course, to tomorrow, when we'll be just 60 miles from the moon."

But he emphasized he would not commit his ship to a lunar orbit unless he was satisfied everything was perfect.

"I hope you have everyone looking over everything very carefully," Borman told Mission Control. "We want a perfect spacecraft—before—we consider the LOI burn."

LOI stands for lunar orbit insertion—the moment when the astronauts fire their engine to brake their speed sufficiently to enter moon orbit.

That critical engine burn is to occur early Tuesday when Apollo 8 is behind the moon, out of radio communication with earth. It will be about 15 minutes after the firing, when the ship emerges from the back side, before the ground will know the success of the maneuver.

Al Force Col. Borman, Navy Capt. James A. Lovell and Air Force Maj. William A. Anders reached a climactic moment at 3:28 p.m. EST today when they were captured by the gravity field of the moon—the first time man has been in the grasp of another heavenly body.

The tug of the moon will increase Apollo 8's speed, and the spacecraft will sweep toward their historic lunar orbit. A burst from their spaceship on Tuesday is to swing them into orbit just 69 miles above the surface.

Glynn Lunney, a flight controller, said today that "everything with the spacecraft and the people looks good for the lunar orbit. The spacecraft is working in an essentially perfect fashion."

He said the only problem was in a secondary cooling system.

"It appears," he said, "that perhaps the back pressure valve did not close completely after the engine was started and that's being trouble shot right now. I don't think that's anything serious."

There will be no physical change to alert Air Force Col. Frank Borman, Navy Capt. James A. Lovell, Jr., and Air Force Maj. William A. Anders that they have passed through a gravity "barrier" in space.

Borman, in fact, plans to be asleep, and Lovell and Anders after to be staying their cameras after completing a second television show from Apollo 8.

There were a few anxious moments Sunday, second day of the mission, that the astronauts might have to be called back—or, at best, make only a quick flyaround of the moon and come home.

The problem was illness reported by all three crewmen. Borman was in the worst condition, suffering from what he diagnosed as a "24-hour flu, intestinal flu."

The spacecraft commander, who vomited, had diarrhea, and experienced aches during the early morning hours Sunday. But after resting he reported he was much better.

They appeared chipper Sunday afternoon when they beamed their first television show from Apollo 8.

"The program is coming to you from about halfway to the moon," he said.

### High-Flung Flu

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — A space doctor says it is almost certain that all three astronauts eventually will come down with the flu-like virus that is bouncing around the Apollo 8 spacecraft.

"They play ping-pong with that sort of thing," said Dr. Charles A. Berry, chief flight surgeon.

Berry said that Air Force Col. Frank Borman, spacecraft commander, is virtually over the gastrointestinal ailment that struck him Sunday but the virus is easy to catch over and over because of the low immunity it produces.

He said it is almost certain that Navy Capt. James A. Lovell Jr. and Air Force Maj. William A. Anders would come down with the bug in the close quarters of the Apollo cabin and that Borman most likely would be reintected.

### Sinclair Files Suits To Oust Distributor

Two lawsuits were filed in Fifth District Court against Joe Clements, a Twin Falls oil products distributor, records showed Monday.

The suits were filed by the Sinclair Oil Corp. They ask that Mr. Clements vacate property allegedly owned by Sinclair.

The first suit claims a license to occupy property expired Nov. 20, but Mr. Clements has refused to vacate the property. The second suit alleges Mr. Clements is leasing another portion of property to sell, store and distribute gasoline products.

Both suits ask that Mr. Clements be restrained from using the property.

In Nov. 22, Sinclair was informed by Sinclair that he would no longer be allowed to distribute Sinclair products.

The company claimed it was changing its method of dealership and that another person had been hired to handle Sinclair products.

Mr. Clements, through his attorney, filed a claim asking \$247,500 for the good will and business Sinclair claimed. Mr. Clements also alleged he was denied access to bulk tanks on Sinclair property.

Mr. Clements still is in business, but he was not available for press time for comment on the lawsuits.

### Cong 'Truce' Halts Gunfire In Vietnam

SAIGON (AP) — A Viet Cong-proclaimed Christmas truce period began at 1 a.m. Tuesday in the first such stand-down in the Vietnam war since the Tet lunar new year last January.

The Tet cease-fire was broken by an enemy offensive that brought the bloodiest fighting of the war. Heavy truce in Vietnam so far—which each side ordered independently—has been marked by some shooting.

The Viet Cong's National Liberation Front announced it would observe a three-day cease-fire over the Christmas holiday. The Saigon government has said it will put in effect a 24-hour cease-fire for Christmas, beginning at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

(Saigon time is 13 hours ahead of Eastern Standard.)

The Communist command launched a series of attacks across South Vietnam over the weekend.

The heaviest fighting, often at hand-to-hand range with mortars and rockets falling on American troops at the rate of 100 a minute, traced only six miles from the rugged site where U.S. and Viet Cong representatives are to meet Christmas Day to discuss the release of three American prisoners.

A force of 1,500 freshly equipped North Vietnamese soldiers stormed out of Cambodia Sunday morning and lost at least 100 dead and a huge pile of weapons and ammunition in a six-hour attack on an American patrol base 44 miles northwest of Saigon.

The U.S. infantrymen, in deep bunkers but outnumbered by about three-to-one, reported 17 of their men killed and 12 wounded. Bazaoka-firing North Vietnamese torpedoes their way through the barbed wire and fought in the trenches connecting the bunkers. At least 30 enemy bodies were strung along the barbed wire.

Six American B52 bombers attacked positions within three miles of the American base.

## \$250,000 Lawsuit Is Filed Against City

The city of Twin Falls has been sued for \$250,000 by a man who claims he shattered both legs while working on construction of the old city water tank south of the city.

Charles Clett filed the suit in Fifth District Court. His wife, Barbara, is also listed as a plaintiff.

The plaintiffs allege negligence in the remodeling of the old city water tank.

Records showed Monday that the Hartford Accident and Indemnity Co., and Morrison, Malerio and Associates are named as co-defendants in the suit.

Individuals named as defendants are John A. Morrison, J. A. Malerio and Grant Crossman, listed as doing business as Morrison, Malerio and Associates.

Mr. Clett claimed, in the suit, he was an employee of Crom Prestressing, Inc., and was a workman on the remodeling project at the old city water tank.

A new roof was put over the tank this fall. The tank remodeling started after the new water tank at Harrison Street and Salls Avenue was finished and put into service.

Mr. Clett claims he fell when a plank broke. He said in the suit the accident happened about 5 p.m. Sept. 17. Mr. Clett claims he shattered both legs in the fall and is still disabled.

He said Hartford Insurance is the insurance carrier for Crom Prestressing and alleged the company was negligent in failing to make safety inspections of the work site.

He also alleges the work done for the city was done in a negligent manner.

Mr. Clett claims Morrison, Malerio and Associates was aware of the danger and was hired by the city to provide construction supervision. The suit alleges the dangerous situation about planks being used for workmen to gain access to their work site was discovered seven days before the accident, but nothing was done to correct the situation.

The plaintiffs, in the suit, filed a claim for damages was filed with the city, but the city council has failed to take action on the claim.

He and his wife ask \$250,000 for general damages and injury to Mr. Clett, and for reduction of his earning capacity because of his injuries.

Mr. Clett said in his suit that a man was killed and another hurt seriously in another construction project done for the city by Crom Prestressing.

This was last year during the construction of the new water tank.

## Bay Area Fire Lists Damage Of \$5 Million

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fire ripped through four plush stores in the city's shopping district Sunday night causing what one official estimated at more than \$5 million in damage—the greatest loss here since the 1906 San Francisco earthquake.

Heavily damaged by the wind-whipped flames was Gump's, an internationally known fine arts emporium which listed more than \$1 million in Oriental art objects alone on the second of its three floors.

Also gutted was Schneider's—a fur establishment offering its wares for as much as \$40,000 a main—Auger's Jewelers and Malin's Luggage.

Abercrombie & Fitch received extensive damage from torrents of water.

## Deadline Extended On Auto Tags As Sales Sag Badly

Motor vehicle owners have until Jan. 15 to get 1969 tags, but the deadline extension still may not help a lot of citizens in Twin Falls County, it was learned Monday.

The parking lot behind the courthouse in Twin Falls had a few vacant spots Monday, a check revealed. This is in sharp contrast to the scene a week ago, before the snow started to fall.

Inside the courthouse, however, business has been fairly busy. Officials in the assessor's office reported.

An estimated 10,000 1969 license tags have been sold. About 28,000 are sold each year in Twin Falls County.

Officials said the line is moving slowly because many motor vehicle owners are coming in without the proper papers.

"We need the registration, not the title, and the registration must match the description of the vehicle to be licensed," one official said. "Because people are not bringing in the proper papers, the whole process of getting tags is slowed down."

Mrs. Creath Wilson, director of the motor vehicle registration department in the assessor's office, said, "I doubt very much if all vehicles in the county will be registered in time, despite the extension of the deadline."

The deadline was Jan. 1, but the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement ordered a 15-day extension on Monday. The deadline is midnight, Jan. 16.

## City Just Not Geared To Handle Unusual Snowfall

Twin Falls is getting a taste of winter for the first time in many years, as evidenced by the snow piled up in the streets, canceled air flights and the usual shoveling of sidewalks.

The Twin Falls Weather Bureau office in Kimberly reported there is presently eight inches of snow on the ground in Twin Falls and 10 inches have fallen. This compares with a normal snowfall of 3.03 inches at this time in other years. The annual snowfall for Twin Falls is 18.5 inches.

Officials at the weather bureau noted that warmer temperatures are predicted for Monday and Tuesday, with snow and rain. The long-range forecast calls for colder temperatures and snow Christmas day.

Herb Derrick, Twin Falls city manager, said Monday that this is the first time in the eight years he has been here that the snow has actually become a problem in the city.

He said since he rarely have much snow, the city does not budget for snow removal. Mr. Derrick said the city could provide this service, but taxes would have to be raised. In view of this factor, he said he felt most of the citizens would tolerate a little inconvenience.

The city manager said the streets crowd of 18 men has been working at 3 a.m. for the past few mornings to remove the snow. He said many people have complained about the snow being piled into the middle of the street, but there is a reason for this. Mr. Derrick noted that since the snow never stays on the street any great length of time, there has to be room in the gutters to drain off the water when the snow melts.

Mr. Derrick said men from the city water department have been assisting the streets department in clearing all drains in anticipation of the snow melting. He warned

all residents who live in areas where flooding has been a problem to remove everything from their garage floors.

He assured the people that the city departments are working as rapidly as possible with the small amount of equipment they have to remove the snow.

The city also is responsible for clearing snow at Joslin Field and this has doubled the problem.

Ed Woods, airport manager, said the runways were plowed off Monday morning. Two flights, one to Boise and another to Salt Lake City, were canceled, however, earlier in the morning, according to Han Masoner, Air West sales manager. Mr. Masoner said operations at the airport would be "marginal" the rest of the day.

He said since it had stopped snowing some fog has mixed in. All the Sun Valley Airline flights have been operating, he said, but some have been off schedule. Mr. Woods said there is approximately nine inches of snow on the ground.

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"I think that there are many in my crew who are in very bad physical condition and just from a nutritional point of view."

"The bruises and that sort of thing I think are going to heal up quickly," Bucher said.

"The men were in a hospital near Seoul for medical checks before being flown to rejoin their families for Christmas in S."

"To win the release of the men after 11 months of captivity, a U.S. representative at the armistice but in Panmunjom signed a statement apologizing for 'the grave acts of espionage committed by the U.S. ship ... after having intruded into the territorial waters of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.'" But first he repudiated the statement and said he was signing it only to free the ship's crew, a procedure to which the North Koreans agreed.

Bucher also told his news conference that at no time did the Pueblo sail within 13 miles of North Korea, let alone inside the 12-mile limit set by the North Korean government.

"The day we were captured—there were some 15 to 16 miles from shore when the North Korean ships showed up and began their harassment tactics," he said.

"I surrendered the ship because it was nothing but a slaughter, out there and I could see allowing any more people to be slaughtered or killed the entire crew for no reason."

A light snow was falling as Bucher and his men walked across a concrete bridge into a southern half of the demilitarized zone at 11:30 a.m. Korean time.

They carried with them a coffin containing the remains of Fireman Duane H. Hodges, 22, of Creswell, Ore., the crew member who died in North Korea after being wounded during the ship's capture off Wonsan by four Communist gunboats on Jan. 23.

## Julie Kisses Dad, Shuns Spouse At Ring Ritual

NEW YORK (AP) — Julie Nixon, younger daughter of President-elect Nixon, and Dwight David Eisenhower II, only grandson of the former president, were married Sunday in a brief Protestant ceremony that from beginning to end carried out the bride's wish for a private-and-personal wedding.

Before a small, white, silk-covered altar banked by rows of red and white poinsettias in the historic old Marble Collegiate Church, Julie surprised her father, when she turned and kissed him after he gave her hand to the groom. At the end of the ceremony, she again broke tradition and did not kiss the groom.

"That was her idea," Nixon

told reporters after the 12-minute ceremony. "If she handles all of the great events of her life as well as this marriage, she will be all right."

It was also Julie's idea to substitute the words "I do" in the Reformed Church of America service. The Nixons are Quakers. David, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Eisenhower, is an Episcopalian.

The bride also requested Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, who performed the ceremony, to read Psalm 100, which begins, "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord," and Psalm 121: "I will lift up mine eyes ..."

"I rather thought this was a special day," Nixon said. "Just before coming here I saw the

first spots of the Apollo flight and I just heard of the release of the Pueblo crew tonight. Dec. 22 is a lucky day."

The young couple barred newsmen from the wedding and reception, but posed for photographers in a press room at the Hotel Plaza, site of the reception.

Julie, 20, radiant in a Victorian, full-skirted, "puffed sleeves" and a high neck, stood beside the groom, who wore a tuxedo. She clutched a modest white bouquet of lily of the valley, narcissus, sweetheart roses and bonvardia. Her illusion veil was held with a crown or seed pearls.

David, also 20, held her hand

Mr. Mildon thought nothing was strange since his nickname as a ham radio operator happens to be just that, "King of the Spuds," he explained.

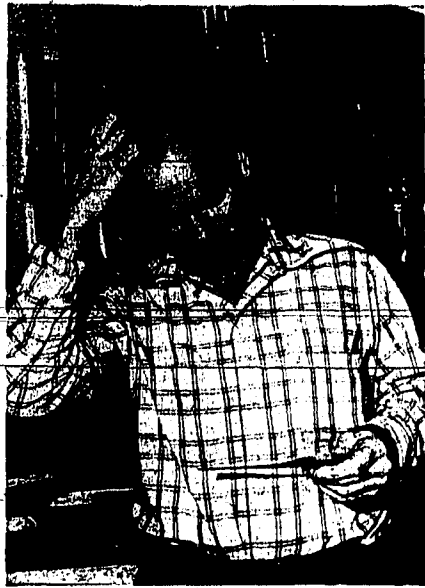
Upon opening the letter he found a payroll-type check made out to none other than "King of the Spuds." In the envelope was nothing but the check and a piece of paper inscribed with a series of numbers, Mr. Mildon stated.

"I was completely taken aback and had no idea why I'd be receiving a check for \$1,500," he said.

Called a local photo broker and he told me no firm with that name existed in our immediate area. I was told to check Jerome, he said.

"I called Jerome and found a 'King of the Spuds' potato firm there," he continued. "I showed them and was very cautious about disclosing any more information than was necessary. The man in Jerome said he'd been expecting the check. 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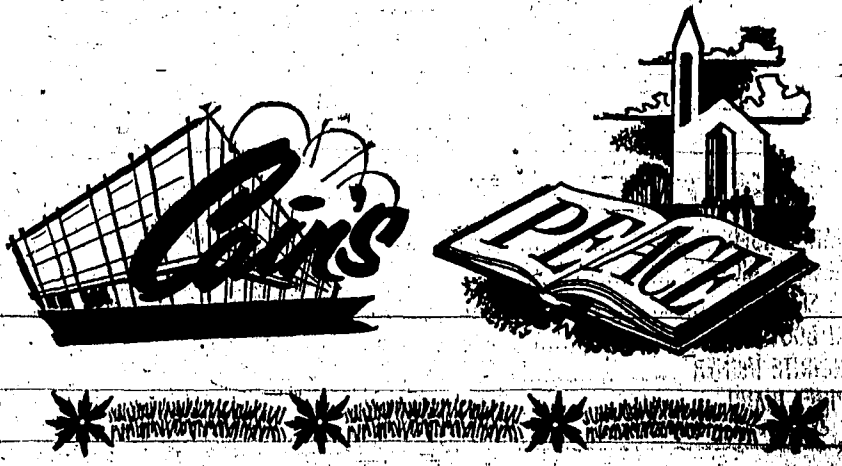

## Bizarre Diplomatic Maneuver Allows Release Of Pueblo Crew By Koreans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Release of the Pueblo crewmen was obtained under what Secretary of State Dean Rusk calls one of the strangest diplomatic procedures in Cold War history and another high official calls just plain "kooky."

The formula called for the chief U.S. negotiator to sign a statement admitting U.S. guilt but only after the North Koreans agreed to let him publicly announce beforehand that the statement was a lie.

"Apparently the North Koreans believe there is propaganda value even in a worthless document which Maj. Gen. Gilbert H. Woodward publicly labeled false before he signed it."

Woodward, in his public repudiation in advance of signing the statement, said "the document which I am going to sign is at variance with the (U.S.) position but my signature will not and cannot alter the facts."

"I will sign the document to free the crew and only to free the crew."

Rusk commented that in 19 years of public service he knew of no precedent for the contradictory statement.

"Another high official privately described the final formula, one of two suggested in the past month by Washington, as 'kooky.'"

The instructions for Woodward to sign the false statement came from the State Department with the knowledge of President Johnson, officials said. President-elect Nixon was informed but not consulted in advance about the arrangement, they added.

The South Korean government also was kept informed of the developments and "showed good understanding of our problem," authorities said.

While Rusk said efforts will have to be pursued further to regain the Pueblo, State Department officials said no more private meetings were planned at Panmunjom to obtain its release.

The North Koreans are believed to have long ago exhausted its value as far as secrets are concerned and they could not call it on the high seas without risk of reprisals.

State Department officials credited Undersecretary of State Nicholas Katzenbach and a small group of Korean experts including Ambassador Winthrop Brown, former U.S. envoy to Korea and Laos and Country Director James Leonard, with working out the formula. North Korea finally accepted. They gave this tentative explanation for its acceptance:

"North Korea will make as much use as it can of the U.S. 'confession' that the Pueblo had illegally intruded into Korean waters on an espionage mission when it was captured Jan. 23. The document may be believed in some Communist countries but will not be accepted in most other countries."

U.S. negotiators also had argued that it would be better for North Korea to deal now with the outgoing Johnson administration, rather than renegotiate the whole case with the Nixon administration.

Negotiators also made the point that release of the 82 crewmen around Christmas would be warmly received by the American public.

High U.S. officials said the United States put two conditions on an offer made Dec. 17 to sign a false confession in order to obtain the release of the men.

One was that all 82 men had to be returned by Dec. 23. The other was that the United States would not accept the facts contained in statements.

## Land Use Sought To Build Dam

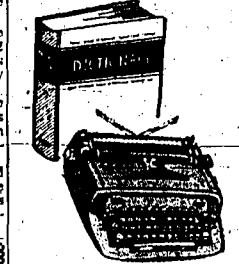
BOISE (AP)—Withdrawal of 5,858 acres of Owyhee County land for part of the proposed Southwest Idaho Water Development project was suggested today by Orval Hadley, Idaho Land Office manager for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

Hadley said the land, on Deadman Creek south of the Snake River, would be used for construction of the Grindstone Butte Dam and Reservoir.

Withdrawal of the land would prohibit appropriation of it under public land laws, prospecting on it or locating of mining claims on it.

Hadley's notice of withdrawal provides a 30-day period during which written objections may be submitted.

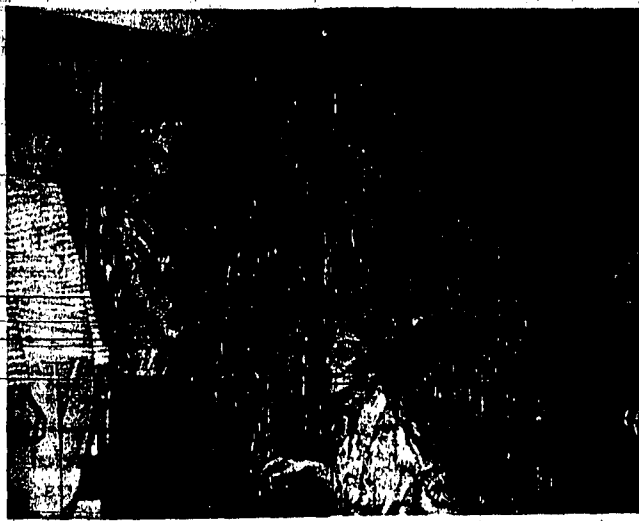

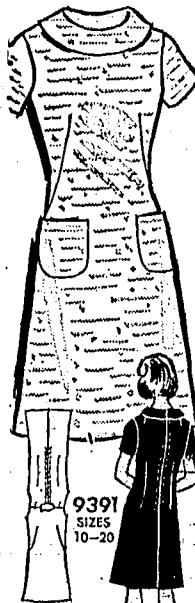

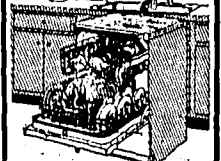

## Hot Stretch Spelled Doom For Minnesota

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Colts won the Western Conference championship during an explosive four-minute stretch Sunday.

Leading only 7-0 after a fierce first half, the Colts put intense pressure on Minnesota quarterback Joe Kapp with the Vikings got the ball with 0:11 to play in the third quarter.

Kapp was rocked hard on consecutive plays by defensive end Ordell Brasse and safety Rick Volk and the passes were far off target.

Then, after a two-yard gain by fullback Bill Brown, the Vikings punted.

On Baltimore's second down, quarterback Earl Morrall tossed a pass to tight end John Mackey at the Minnesota 30, just over the outstretched hands of linebacker Roy Winston. Mackey shook off safety Paul Krause and went the rest of the way for a touchdown.

There were no excuses or apologies at all in the losers' dressing room.

"We knew before the game we had to have a superior effort and not make any mistakes," said Carl Eller, defensive end. "We made a couple."

"Mackey split their zone on the pass," Morrall said. "I threw the ball and it came out the ball got past Winston before he had time to react after turning around. It was a great pass and a great run."

Grant said the big break came when linebacker Mike Curtis of the Colts caught a Kapp fumble before it reached the ground and ran 60 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter.

Morrall, who was dumped four times for 35 yards in losses in the first half, switched late in the half to the rollout—unusual for Baltimore—to get the offense moving.

"That made the score 21-0 and we were out of the game—almost," said Grant. "If we had gotten a similar play and score, it would have been 14-7 and a different ball game."

"We didn't get the things done we wanted to on offense in the first half," Shula said. "The rollout helped the pass protection—and got us moving, and cooled the rush."

"I'm just exhausted," he insisted, although he winced with every move. "You always hurt more when you lose."

Morrall hit tight end Tom Mitchell on a three-yard scoring play for the only points of a bitterly fought first half. Then the Colts won the game.

With four seconds remaining in the game, Kapp connected with Bill Brown on a seven-yard TD pass after bringing the Vikings down the field with his desperation passes and runs.

It was a most profitable day for the Colts, who could come out of next Sunday's game with about \$10,000 each, and a shot at the \$15,000 jackpot in the Super Bowl. It was the second time the Colts had won the Western Conference crown under Don Shula, the NFL coach of the year.

Kapp, 30-year-old rugged center who spent eight years in the Canadian League before he joined the Vikings last season, led the Vikings' running attack with 81 yards in 10 carries.

Morrall completed 12 of 22 for 280 yards, finding Richardson six times for 148 yards.

Morrall rolled out and hit flanker Willie Richardson for 37 yards and then connected with the same receiver for 33 yards as Richardson made a fancy diving catch on the Viking three. After two smashes into the line, Morrall found Tom Mitchell in the end zone for a three-yard scoring pass.

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Mitchell played one season with the Oakland Raiders of the AFL and spent most of his season on the Colt taxi squad.

# Dancer's Image Loses In Final Decision

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—The Kentucky Racing Commission today upheld the stewards' ruling that Churchill Downs in disqualifying Dancer's image from the winner's purse in the 1968 Kentucky Derby. The commission after hearing 14 days of testimony, agreed with the stewards that the colt, owned by Boston sportsman Peter Fuller, had phenylbutazone or a derivative of the drug in his system during the running of the May Derby. Phenylbutazone, which a Churchill Downs chemist said was found in the colt's urine after the race, is an illegal medication under Kentucky racing rules.

Arthur Grafton, an attorney for Fuller indicated an appeal might be made to the courts, but said no final decision would be made until he talked to Fuller. Fuller was reported in Boston. George Egger, racing commission chairman, said the final order redistributing the Derby purse would be entered "shortly."

"While the commission is announcing its decision today," Egger said, "the final order for the purpose of appeal... will not be entered until detailed findings of fact and conclusions of law have been prepared, adopted and filed by the commission. The time for the taking of any such appeal will not begin to run until the entry of that final order," Egger said.

Grafton immediately asked for a complete transcript of the commission's hearing to be prepared and attested by the commission. He said that was the first step in an appeal if one were to be made.

The commission's decision means the \$122,600 first money in the 1968 Kentucky Derby, which Calumet Farm's Forward Pass which finished second to Dancer's image.

Lamonica wound up the chilly, sometimes rainy afternoon with five scoring pitches—the other two going to Warren Wells—before a record Oakland Coliseum throng of 53,605.

## Defense Did The Job For Cleveland

CLEVELAND (AP)—When the shouting and back slapping were over, the Cleveland Browns kept coming back to the same thing: Defense.

And it was the defense that beat the Dallas Cowboys Saturday, 31-20 in the National Football League's Eastern Conference playoff before 81,407 at Municipal Stadium.

Four interceptions were converted into 24 points.

Two of those interceptions came in the opening minutes of the second half. Cleveland turned them into two touchdowns, jumped in front 24-10, and was on the way to beating the team that dropped them 52-14 in the Eastern Conference playoffs last year.

Now the Browns will play at home Dec. 24, for the NFL title against the Colts.

Back to the Cleveland defense. Perhaps Dallas Coach Tom Landry summed it up best.

"The Browns' defense made the big difference," he said. "It made the big play. That's where the game was to be won or lost."

Cleveland Coach Blanton Collier—"The greatest defensive effort for a team that has played for me."

Linebacker Jim Houston—"They'd run at us and we'd knock them down."

Tackle Walt Johnson—"We knew if we could stop their running we could beat the Cowboys." (Dallas rushed for 88 yards.)

Cowboys' fullback Don Perkins—"They lost Paul Wiggin and Bill Glass (at defensive end) but Ron Sniidow and Jack Gregory moved in there and it didn't make any difference."

The interceptions were by Mike Howell, Dale Lindsey, Ben Davis and Erich Barnes, three off Don Meredith and one off Craig Morton.

Cleveland quarterback Bill Nelsen felt Lindsay's interception was the turning point. It was on the first play of the second half. The right side linebacker juggled a Meredith pass, held it and went 27 yards for a touchdown. Cleveland 17-10.

The Browns then came up with the play Landry thought was the key.

Nelsen connected on a 45-yard touchdown pass to Kelly to make it 10-10 at halftime.

"The Browns went into the half with all the momentum after that," Landry said. "We went in dejected. The Cowboys were in a zone defense on the touchdown pass and I tried to pick up everybody. They pulled out of there and left Larov open."

In the last few minutes of the game, minor skirmishes broke out among the frustrated Chiefs and happy Raiders and for a while, it appeared that it might escalate into a full-fledged battle. But referees separated the opposing forces and the game ended without further incident.

Lamonica, a former Notre Dame star, pulled the trigger on touchdown passes three times in the first quarter to build a 21-0 lead over a team favored by from three to six points.

The plays covered 24 yards with Biletnikoff the first receiver, then 23 to Wells and 44 to Biletnikoff. Late in the second quarter, after Jan Stenerud had booted field goals of 10 and eight yards for Kansas City, the Lamonica-Biletnikoff combine struck again.

On a 54-yard play, the swift, shifty end took the ball on the Chiefs' 30, combining ballet steps with whiplash power to run in for the score.

Kansas City's game plan, based on establishing the running game, was smashed early since the Chiefs made just one first down in a first quarter when they had a net gain of 15 yards and quarterback Len Dawson was 6-for-4 in the air lanes.

Lamonica's final scoring pass was gathered in by Wells on a 35-yard play in the final quarter. Kansas City flashed second half threats but on four occasions Dawson's passes were picked off by Raiders. Dan Connor took one at the Oakland 15; Willie Brown at the 35, Nemeik Wilson at the eight and Jerry Hopkins at the 48.

For the afternoon, Lamonica hit 19 of 30 passes for 347 yards without suffering an interception. Dawson, obviously off form in his throwing after leading the league with a 98.5 per cent completion mark, connected 17 times in 38 throws for 253 yards and had the four interceptions.

Oakland and Kansas City donked with 132 records, dividing the two games they played against each other, and were forced into the playoff. By winning, the Raiders extended their victory string to nine games while clipping the Chiefs' streak off at five consecutive victories.

In addition to booting all five conversions, 41-year-old George Blanda kicked 41 and 49-yard field goals in the final period and also took over for Lamonica at quarterback when the issue no longer was in doubt.

# FBI Arrests Suspect In Coed Kidnaping; Family Avers 'Faith' Brought Comfort

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Barbara Jane Mackle, ransomed from a live burial for half a million dollars, clung to her father's arm Sunday as the wealthy land developer explained he met kidnapers' demands because "I had my faith to go on."

Robert Mackle and his daughter met newsmen Sunday for the first time since her release Friday. The meeting was on the patio of Miami Heart Institute where Barbara is recuperating from an 80-hour burial in a coffin-like box.

Faith in God sustained the family throughout the ordeal, Mackle, our son and our daughter, said. "I just feel wonderful and I just want to thank everybody for their prayers and their concern for both myself and my family," she said.

A few hours later Gary Steven Krist, a husky 23-year-old es-

caped convict, was booked into the Dade County Jail in Miami on a kidnaping charge.

Krist was held in a safety cell in lieu of \$500,000 bond, the amount of the ransom.

A posse captured Krist early Sunday on wild, swampy Hog Island on Florida's lower Gulf Coast. The FBI said he carried a suitcase containing about \$18,000 in \$20 bills. Another \$480,000 in 20s was found nearby in the rotting hull of an abandoned boat.

The ransom was paid in used, wrinkled \$20s.

Krist, suffering from exhaustion, was taken to a Fort Myers hospital where he was later arraigned on the kidnaping charge.

The FBI refused comment Sunday on its search for Ruth

Eisemann-Schler, 26, for whom it also has issued a kidnap warrant. She worked alongside Krist at the University of Miami Institute of Marine Science.

The FBI also refused to say whether other persons were sought in connection with the kidnaping.

Krist was identified by the FBI through a tracer on license plates found on a car abandoned by two men during an aborted attempt to collect the ransom Thursday. The \$300,000 was again dropped for the kidnapers in a Miami shopping center parking lot Friday morning.

The FBI said a car rented in Miami Springs under the name of George Deacon—a Krist alias—was found Friday at West Palm Beach.



A boat dealer at West Palm Beach said he sold a \$2,300 boat to an "Arthur Horowitz," who paid for it with \$20 bills from a money-stuffed suitcase.

The boat traveled the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee canals to Florida's West Coast Friday night and Saturday, the FBI said. The Horowitz name was signed on forms at four navigation locks.

The FBI closed in on its quarry Saturday when agents in helicopters spotted Krist's boat in the mouth of Charlotte Harbor. He beached the boat on Hog Island and was found in the mangrove swamps about 12 hours later.

The kidnaping occurred early Tuesday morning at a motel in Atlanta where Barbara attends Emory University. She was in a room with her mother when the kidnapers forced entry by pretending to be police.

Mrs. Mackle said the kidnap pair included a young white man and a boy of about 12.

Barbara's kidnapers later placed her in the wooden box and buried her in the box under 18 inches of dirt in an isolated woodland 20 miles northeast of Atlanta.

For 80 hours—clad in a red and white checkered nightgown and a sweater—she was confined to the box, breathing through tubes reaching to the surface.

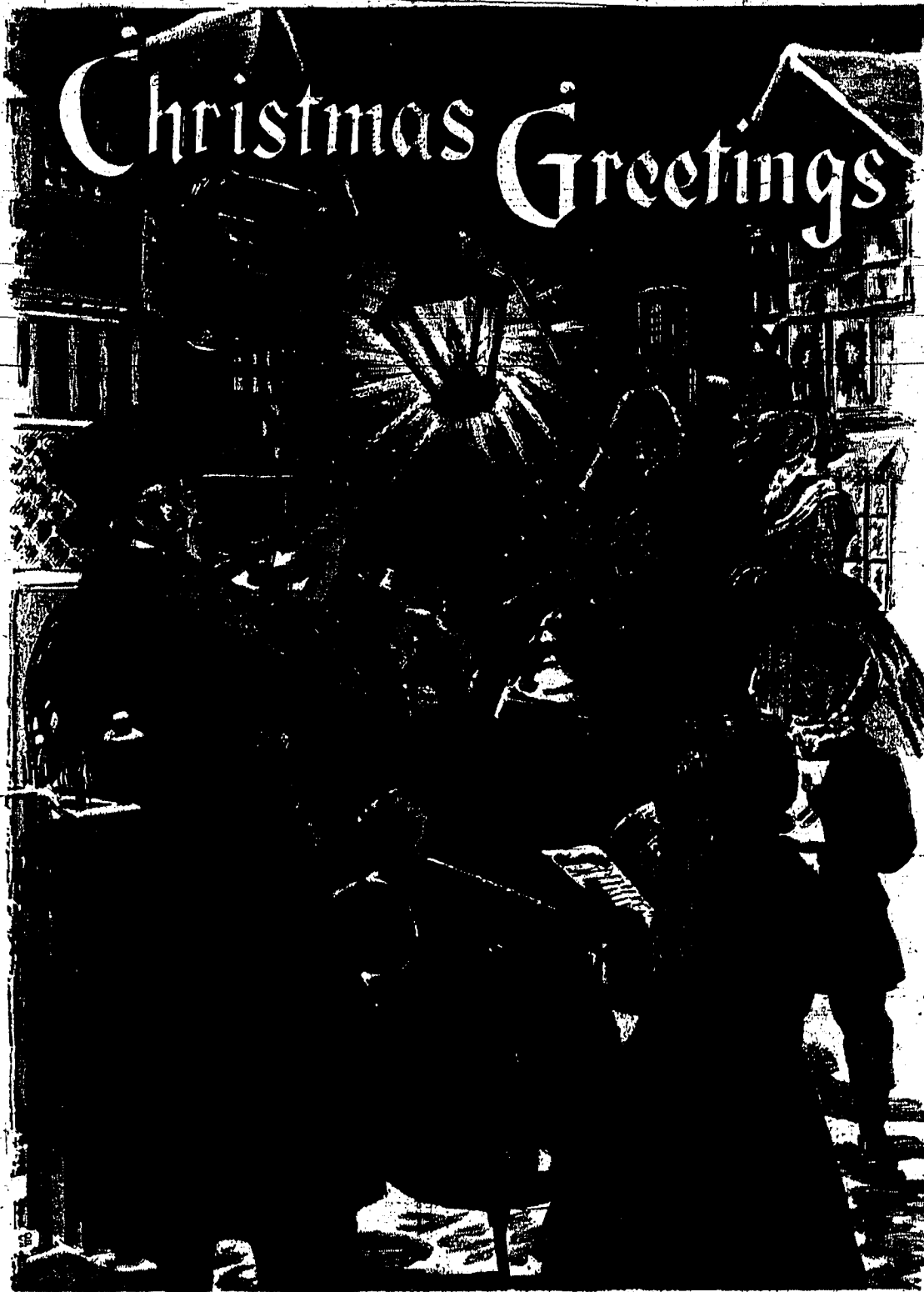

## Candles Light Man's Celebrations Throughout His Spiritual History

It is difficult to imagine Christmastime without candles. Long before Christ, man associated the light of the candle with his spiritual longings. The Old Testament refers to the candle often.

As civilization dawned, man came to guard the flame he discovered he could make by friction of sticks or flint. Crude torches let him hold the light a little longer and to lengthen his days so that he might pursue his labor and his quest for knowledge.

The Romans were probably the first to make candles, which they burned before the altars of their gods, to light their banquet rooms, and to light their pageants and carnivals. It is interesting to note that while pagan Rome used the candles for merry-making, the Christian martyrs used it to light the catacombs.

It was natural for Christians to adapt the candle to their way

of life, for Christ had referred to Himself as the light of the world. More, He had assured them that each Christian was a light.

The Middle Ages found the candle at its zenith. Made of tallow, by the dipping process, the candle was widely used for light until the 18th century.

The Medieval church made sure that candles were made of beehowax — an idea founded in the belief that bees came to earth directly from heaven. Throughout the Middle Ages it was common for swarms of bees to be cared for near religious

establishments.

Some of the candles of the Middle Ages were thick and tall; they rose over the heads of the people and cast a fairly strong light in a royal hall, or cathedral. These huge candles weighed as much as 300 pounds.

The custom of putting lighted candles on the tree came from Martin Luther's time, when hazards of fire from candles was an accepted risk, part of life itself.

The idea of lights on the tree is still cherished by modern man. One of Albert Schweitzer's books tells of a Christmas Day in a

steaming jungle when a dying man begged for a Christmas tree with candles on it.

It is traditional that every family in Ireland have a candle in the home as a symbol of faith, to welcome the Christ and to invite strangers (who may be the Holy Infant with an earthly disguise).

In Italy a Christmas candle is kept burning in front of each crèche during the Yule Season.

In Spain, the Christmas candle is placed over the doors of the faithful.

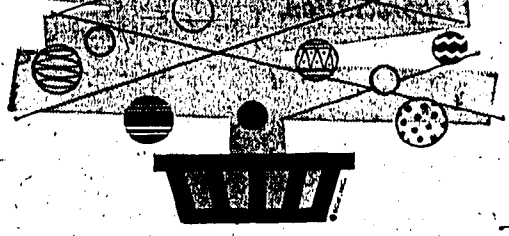

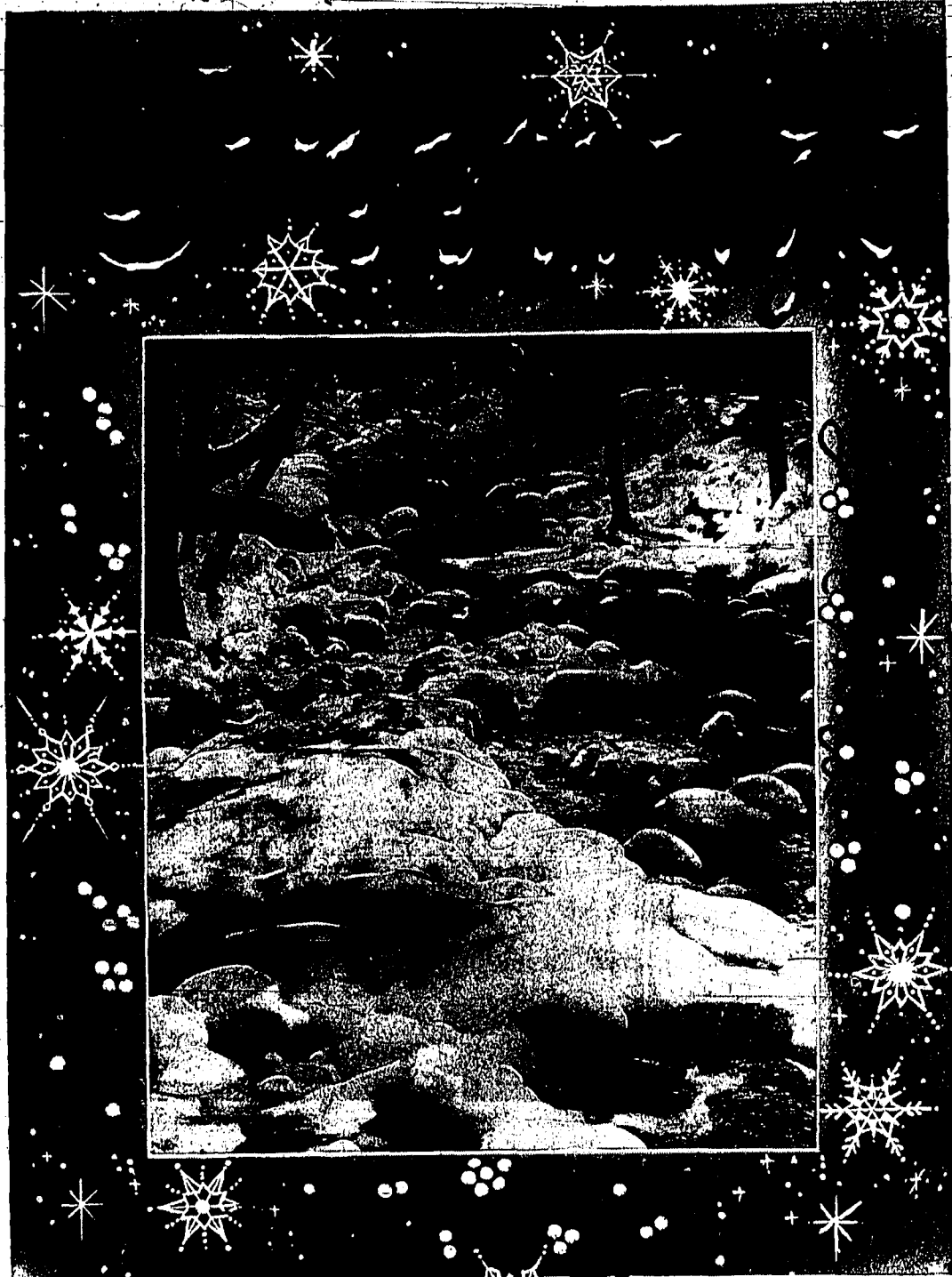

From that day on, the tree bore fruit for the couple at Christmas time. From then on, most German homes displayed trees decorated with fruits and nuts to commemorate this miracle.

Other European folk tales speak of the decorated trees as having originated in the Slavic

countries; the forerunner of this custom was the practice of greeting one's holiday guests at the door with some branches of greenery lighted with candles. It is also said that Martin Luther was the first to light a Christmas tree in 1530. His intention was to memorialize the beauty of winter starlight.

When the use of the tree lapsed from favor, it was Queen Victoria who in 1841 brought it back again. Victoria was evidently influenced by her German governess, Baroness Lehzen. The official tree, decorated

with baubles and candles, was set up in Windsor Castle. After this introduction, the idea became quite fashionable again, and the custom found its way again into many an English home.

Almost 30 years later, the Christmas tree became a holiday custom in the United States.

Today, burning candles are replaced by strings of electric lights; fruits and nuts have been replaced by fragile glass baubles; and, in some cases, the green-boughed tree has been changed to one made of plastic or foil, and much to some people's dismay, even comes in pink and other non-green colors.

The symbolic use of the tree dates back at least 4,000 years to a time when the Egyptians celebrated in honor of their sun

god during the month corresponding to our December. This was the season of rejoicing and the palm tree became its symbol.

Still another story of the Christmas tree goes back to the days of Saint Willfrid in the 7th century.

Once, as he stood among a crowd of his converts, he tried to indicate their severance of all connections with heathen religions by cutting down a great oak.

As it fell to the earth, the oak split into four pieces and — to the amazement of the converts — a young fir tree with its green spire pointing toward the heavens grew from the center.

"This little tree," said Willfrid, "is a young child of the

forest. It shall be your holy tree, bright. It is a sign of an endless life, for its leaves are ever-green. See how it points toward heaven. Let this tree be called the tree of the Christ Child." Whatever the origins of the tree, whatever the legends, the tree remains the best beloved of the holiday greenery. Let those who cherish it honor it when it is wilted and brown by burning it, not throwing it away in the trashcan. This is unworthy of the Christian celebrant and of the noble Tree.

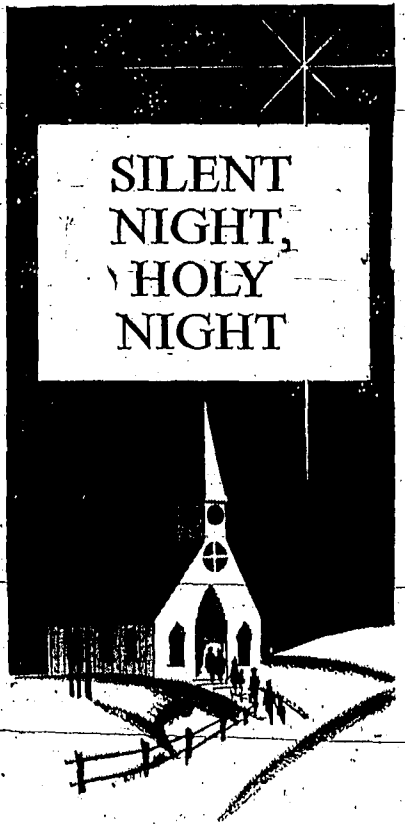

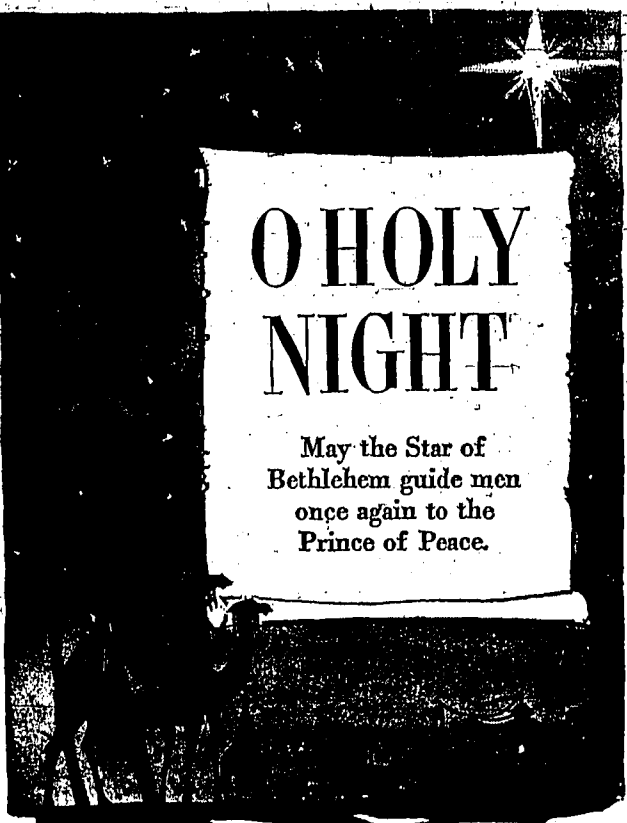

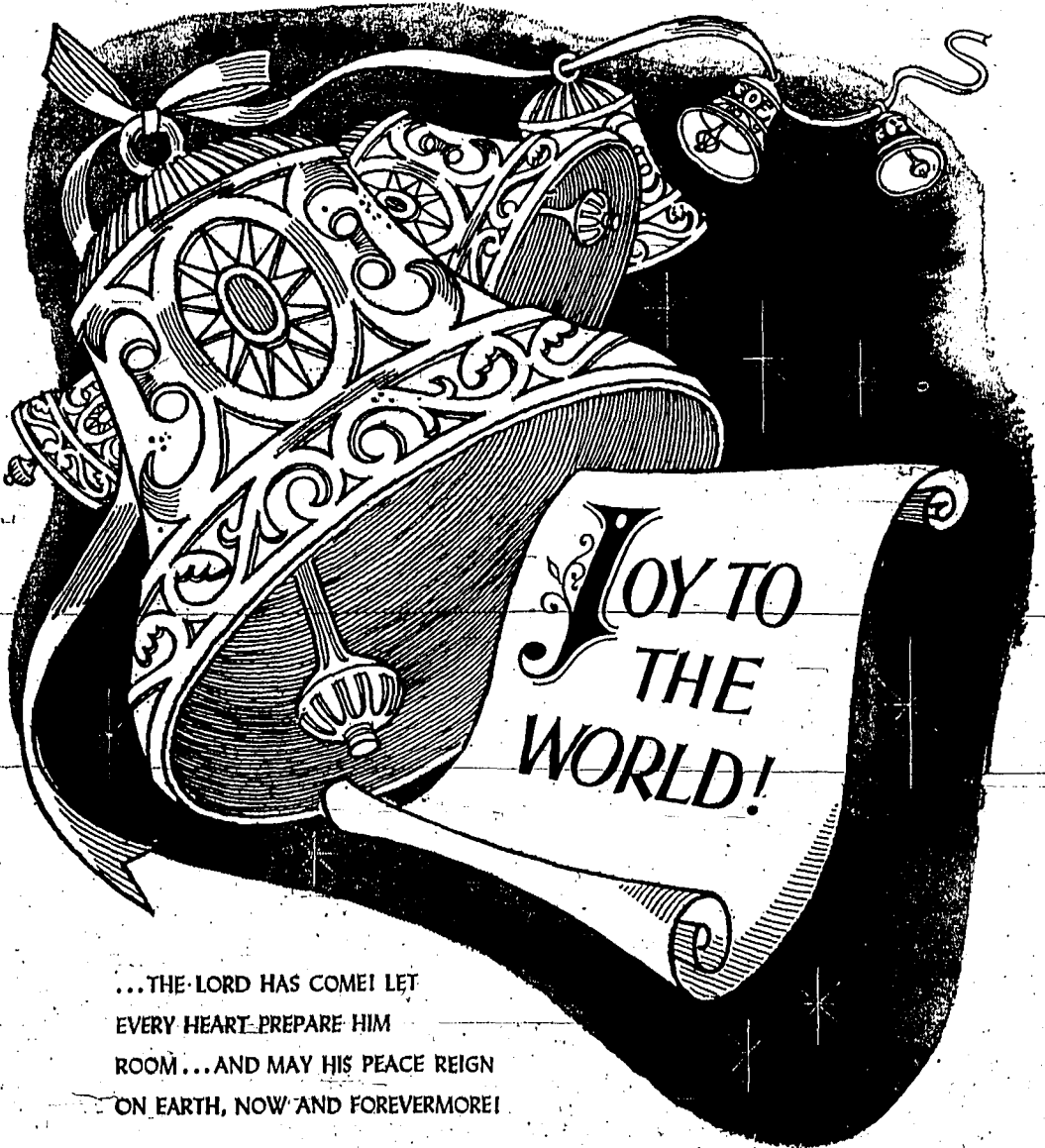

Precious puppet of childhood days, the doll is one of the oldest remains of earlier societies, dolls of clay, wood, bone and ivory were found in children's graves.

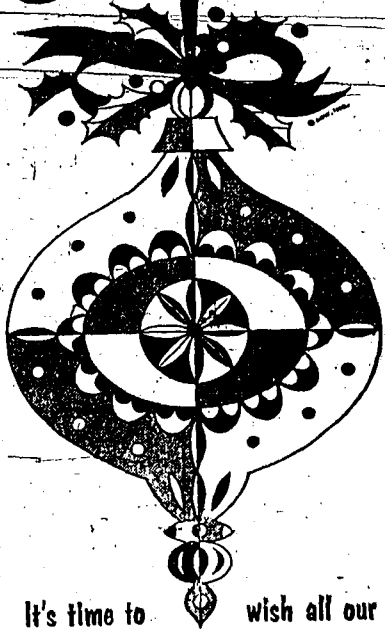
It is known that in earlier centuries, those dolls used as playthings were connected with images of saints.

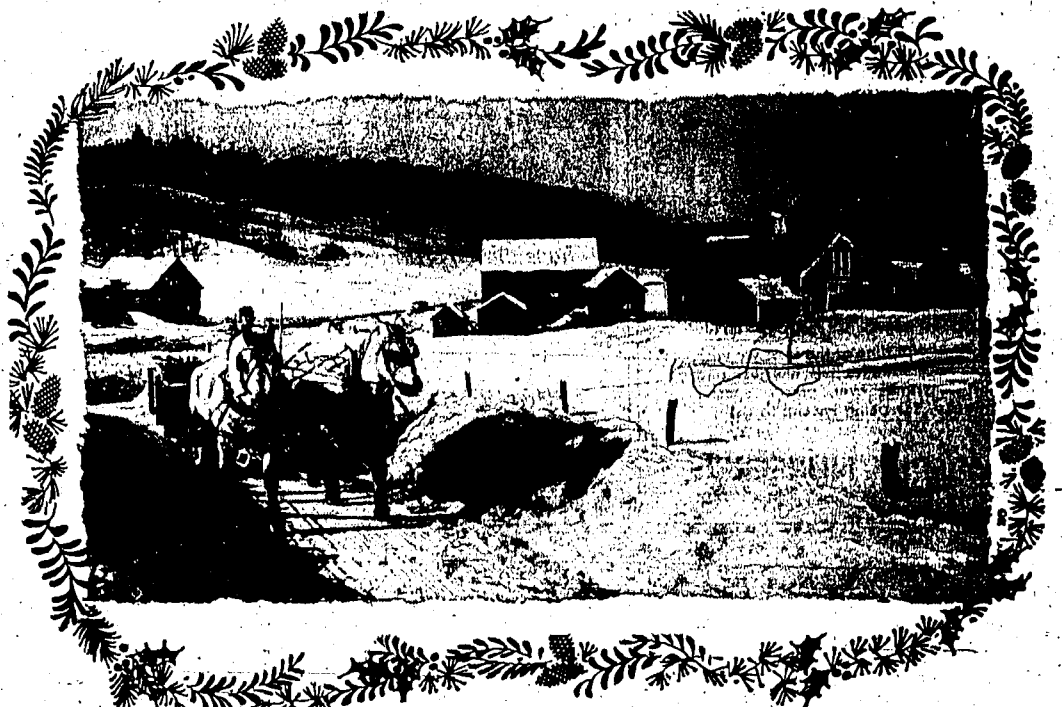

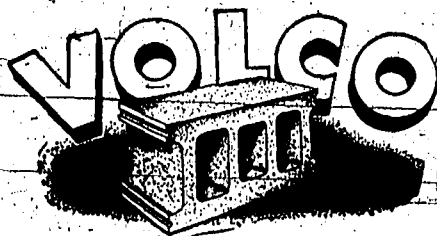

## Christmas Season In Brazil, Canada And The Philippines

In Brazil, the Christmas season is in the nature of a festa. Yet it is solemnly heralded by an open-air Mass at midnight on Christmas Eve.

December 24 here is very tropical, with midsummer weather, which gives the holiday distinction unknown in northern climes.

A colorful altar is set up in the cathedral church-yard where the worshippers pray and chant religious hymns which reflect the Indian and native origins as well. Colorful banners and richly-ornate religious trappings hail the event of Christ's birth.

After devotions the families have Christmas Eve supper in their homes.

French Canada celebrates Christmas with characteristic lightness of spirit yet intense religious feeling.

Christmas Day begins with a midnight Mass of great splendor, followed by revelion, an elaborate after-church dinner in the home.

Throughout, the celebration is charmingly and simply observed with great evidence of faith by the people.

On January 6 the Season ends with the feast of the Kings of Epiphany, celebrated with merriment and festivity. At this feast the traditional cake, Le Gateau des Rois (The Cake of the Kings) is cut. It has a pea and bean in it. The man and woman receiving them are elected the King and Queen, respectively, of the Twelfth Night.

In the Philippine Islands colorful wreaths and chains of brilliant tropical flowers are worn by the children as they partake of the festive after-Mass parade. A band leads the parade, accompanying the children's singing.

A family dinner follows the after-Mass parade. Dancing and musical entertainment provide the celebrations for afternoon and evening.

The children do not have a

Christian tree but they deck their homes homely with flowers, palms and colorful flowers adorn their homes, and a candle is kept burning in the window all night for the little Jesus and the lonely passerby.

JESUS' NAME A group of archeologists discovered the name of Jesus carved before 70 A.D. among inscriptions on an early Christian burial urns found in a cave on the Bethlehem-Jerusalem road.



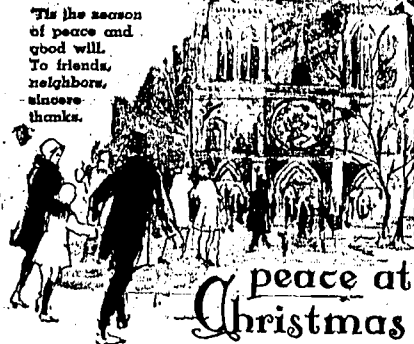

### Famous Carol Sung In 120 Languages

"Adeste Fideles" (O Come, All Ye Faithful) is one of the best-known Christmas carols in the world. It has been translated into more than 120 languages and dialects. Some scholars believe it may have been known to Francis of Assisi and that it might have been sung while the people gathered around the first creches. Still others say that the great carol was written by St. Bonaventura, a contemporary of St. Francis, in the 13th century. Be that as it may, it is affirmed that the carol changed

through the years, and was popular in Germany and France as early as the 17th century. The earliest recorded words and melody of "Adeste Fideles" are found in "Cantus Diversi," a collection of hymns (1750) by John Francis Wade.

The carols, hymns and songs that so enrich our Christmas season today are the products of many countries and many centuries.

This beautiful music came to America with the early settlers. The Germans brought Luther's hymn for children, "Away In A Manger," "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen," came from England. The French gave us "Cantique de Noel" or "O Holy Night." American composers began early to fill the roster of Christ-

### Tradition Says Christmas Tree Began In Egypt

The Christmas tree, now almost a universal symbol, probably came to America from Germany, although tradition has it that Christmas trees originated in Egypt.

The palm tree, is supposed to put forth a branch every month, and a spray of this tree, with 12 shoots on it, was used in Egypt.

In 1730, Charles Wesley, younger brother of John Wesley, founder of the Methodist denomination, wrote "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing." "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear" was composed in 1849 by Edmund H. Sears.

# Time For Living

By ROGERS FRANKLIN



Ever heard of the Aquifoliaeae family? I'll bet you know it, even if you don't recognize the name. Because Aquifoliaeae is the imposing title given to trees and shrubs of the holly family. Nobody has to consult Webster's dictionary to learn that holly is "associated with scenes of goodwill and rejoicing" or that its foliage is used for decoration at Christmastime.

All of which leads me to my thought for today. Why not, this Christmas, invest in a holly tree? I don't mean anything enormous, but a little potted tree to brighten the house now and plant outside later.

If you don't have a backyard, holly trees make wonderful gifts for someone who does. They can be kept outside after the festivities are over, in the garage or in a sheltered place, till the ground becomes workable again. Or a hole can be dug in the late fall and mulched to keep the soil from freezing till you're ready to place the tree in it. (The same system works for Christmas trees of pine, fir or spruce.)

There's a holly tree in my own backyard right now, heavy with red berries against the dark green of its leaves.

It arrived in a pot some Christmas ago, adorned with a huge red satin bow, the gift of some dear friends and neighbors who saw to it that no evil spirits would haunt my household for that year at least.

Protecting their homes from evil spirits was what our ancestors had in mind when they first began bringing holly and other evergreens into the house during the dark days of winter. It's a custom that goes back

far beyond Christianity and its festivals.

In pagan times live evergreens were brought indoors, especially in the frozen northern lands, to shelter the families and ward off evil spirits.

In addition, the living trees provided comforting assurance that nature was not dead, that the sun god would soon appear and awaken the sleeping earth.

If you get a holly tree, you might write to the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. for a pamphlet called "Growing Hollies," at a cost of five cents. This tells you about planting hollies, how to select them, how to look after them, and about the characteristics of the different groups.

For example, the native black-fruited inkberry, "Ilex glabra," is the hardest of all evergreen hollies (some are deciduous). And "Ilex cornuta," or Chinese holly, is the only commonly grown holly that will produce berries without pollination.

There's an explanation of the pollination process. Only female hollies bear berries, after insects have transferred pollen to them from male plants. If you want berries, you have to be sure your tree is female, and that there's a male tree some-

## Archaeologists Find Toys At Ancient Excavation Sites

Who're did the toys that children love so much such as dolls, kites, blocks, etc. . . . come from?

Records and archeological excavations show that children have been playing with dolls, and many other toys we still see today since many thousands of years ago.

The Egyptians were perhaps the first to have dolls. These were not dolls, they were strictly items to entertain the children.

Kites originated in the Orient. At one time kite flying was a national sport in China.

Blocks, which were once called building bricks first appeared minus any decoration. Most were somewhat larger than the average ones today.

Generally as soon as some-

thing now appears for adults, it is duplicated in miniature for children. It was not too many years after the first appearance of the locomotive that a child's replica was designed.

The earliest steam engine, however, far preceded this. Records show a reference to one as far back as 150 years before the birth of Christ.

Santa Claus, Ind., is the most famous of all towns bearing names associated with Christmas.

Except for a coincidence, the name of the town may have been any of a number of less colorful names.

Originally, the name desired was Santa Fe, but officials in Washington suggested the town be given another name, since there was already a Santa Fe in New Mexico.

On Christmas Eve, 1882, the townspeople gathered to select another name, but one name after another was rejected, until "Santa Claus" strode into the meeting to get warm.

He was, in costume, and with his arrival everyone knew what the name of the town would be—Santa-Claus, Ind.

**Christmas Seals Launched By Danish  
Postal Clerk And U.S. Newspaper**

Far more than just a colorful little sticker to brighten cards and gifts, the Christmas Seal epitomizes a mighty crusade for health and happiness.

The Seal originated in Denmark in 1904. A kindly postal clerk, Elmer H. Hobbell, broadened over the suffering of sick children and tried to think of a way to help them.

As he sorted the heavy Christmas mail he was struck by the idea of a stamp which people

would buy, use at Christmas, that would benefit sick and needy youngsters.

The postmaster liked the idea, so did the King of Denmark, and so did the warmhearted Danish people. Soon enough money came in to build a children's tuberculosis hospital.

Some of these seals reached America. A Danish-American writer, Jacob Rife, received one on a letter. Knowing the tragedy of the disease firsthand, (6 of his brothers had died) he wrote an article pleading for someone to take up the cause in the United States.

A doctor serving at a shack set up as a TB hospital in Delaware, desperately trying to save the little hospice, asked help from his cousin, Emily Bissell, who raised funds for good causes.

\$300 was urgently needed, at once. Miss Bissell, having heard of Denmark's success with the stamps, resolved to bring it to life in this country.

After many setbacks, she doubled her efforts, even drew the design for the first Seal herself. Two friends lent money. A printer supplied 50,000 of the bright red stamps in small envelopes carrying a courageous, catchy message.

The stamps went on sale in the Wilmington postoffice. At the end of a few days only a few dollars had been realized... many dollars away from three hundred.

Miss Bissell traveled to Philadelphia to seek assistance from the city's leading newspaper. But all she talked to discour-

aged her. What tie-up could there be between Christmas greetings and the dread disease of tuberculosis?

On an impulse she stopped to see a writer whose work she admired. His name was Leigh Mitchell Hodges. When he saw the sheet of bright red seals his vision and sense of humanity were ignited; he saw the seals as a flaming banner fighting against suffering and death.

His editor "caught fire" too. He instructed Hodges to give the story full play. He even asked Miss Bissell to send the newspaper 50,000 of the Seals.

Incredulous, but thrilled, Miss Bissell had more seals printed, to meet his request.

Through the vast power of this newspaper the story of the Christmas Seal was told, and retold. The crusade gathered momentum. From every walk of life, people came to buy the Seals.

The rest of the story is familiar. We all know how much a part of Christmas the Seal is. But maybe when we use them this Christmas we will remember how hard its advocates struggled to "put it on the map," maybe we will remember the fight it is continuing to wage.

For the dread disease is re-

lentless, cruelly still with us, though to a less degree. Remember to buy, and use, your Christmas Seals. To relax our efforts would be as many as you can afford.

That twinkling bauble in your tree was no doubt mass-produced by American wonder-makers; but up till fairly recently these little beauties were part of an industry which involved whole families.

Just as in medieval Europe families spent lifetimes weaving tapestries to hang on the manor walls, so did Eastern European and Japanese families devote family skills to creating joy for your Christmas in the form of beautiful ornaments.

Many of our readers will recollect how in their childhood they were enthralled with the many colors, intricate shapes and sizes of these ornaments. Frequently they were heavy, and bowed the tree limbs, but they lasted from one Christmas to another, and from one generation to another.

The fragile bubbles of glass, which are so much a part of the decorations of the Christmas tree, were once largely a col-

lage industry in Europe and Japan.

In the tiny villages that cling to the steep mountainsides in eastern Europe whole families shared in the manufacturing process.

Special shapes and designs are the exclusive property of certain families, the patterns dating back for centuries, unchanged.

Using a Bunsen burner, the father carefully blew the thin glass tubing to the desired shape with the aid of an iron mold. His son removed the hot ornament to a cooling table. Next the mother silvered the inside, and the daughter applied painted designs.

Mechanical methods, developed in recent years by American glass manufacturers, have

Frankincense had for centuries been used by both the Egyptians and the Jews in religious rituals, and curative powers were attributed to it for the treatment of an astonishing variety of ailments.

Myrrh held a similar role of importance and was highly esteemed as an ointment and perfume, a ceremonial incense and an ingredient of embalming oils.

So highly treasured were these fragrant resins that pots and vases of ivory and alabaster

were fashioned to preserve them.

Historians tell us that frankincense was burned to purify the air, and that to breathe the fragrance would comfort and refresh the spirit—much as smelling salts are used today.

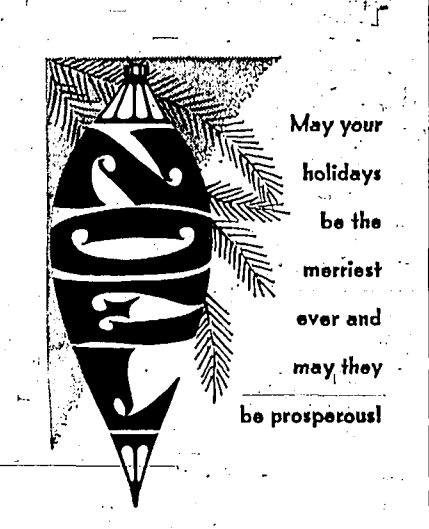
A potion of frankincense was believed to be an antidote for hemlock poisoning, as well as a cure for leprosy.

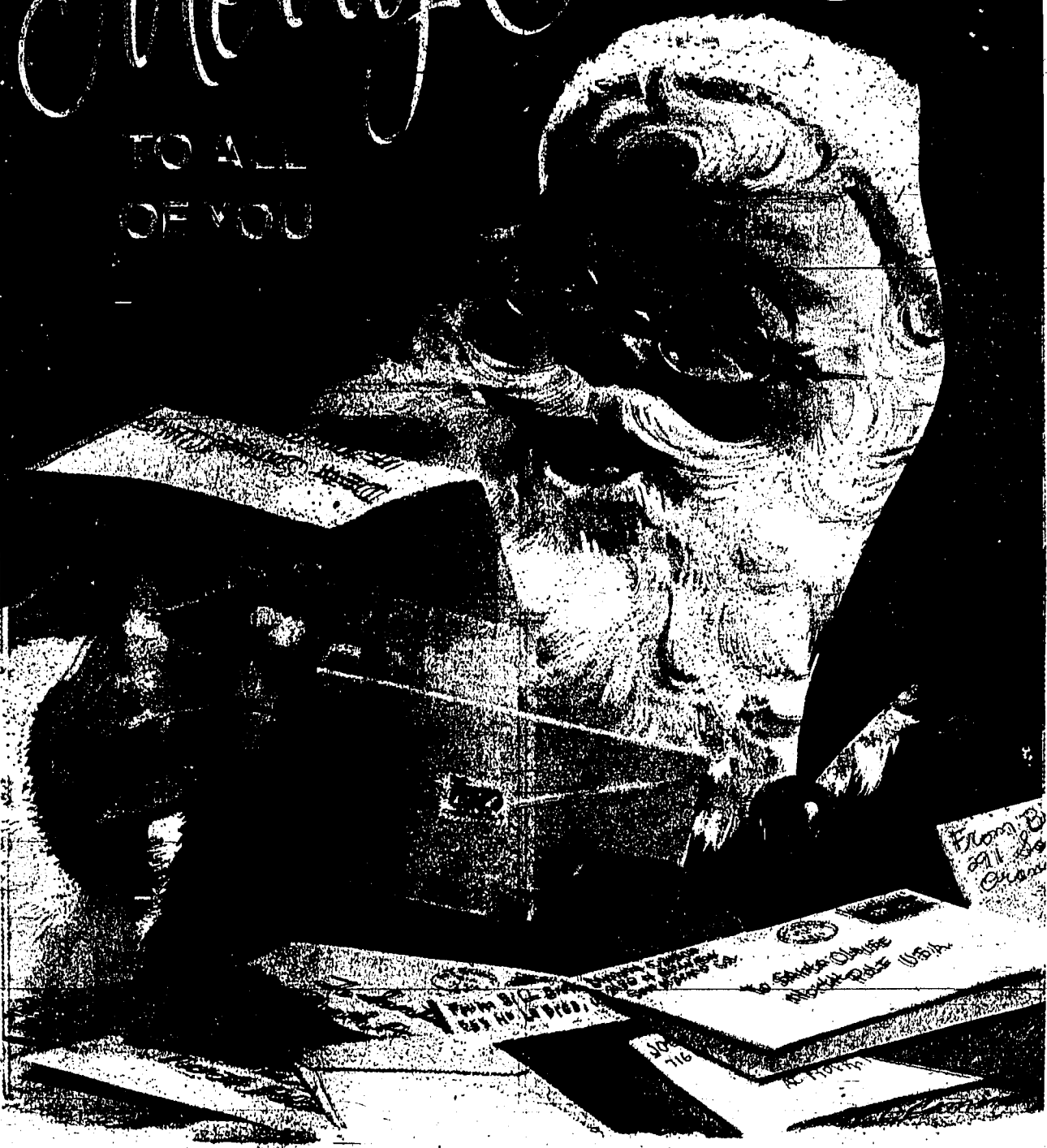

# Jackson Hole Development Is Outlined

Final development plans that are expected to generate an investment of \$58 million in Teton Village have been announced by the Jackson Hole Ski Corp. developers of the two-year-old Wyoming resort.

Paul McCollister, president of the ski corporation, said the cost estimates were based on figures produced by the first comprehensive study ever completed on the company's resort properties.

Teton Village, the community of lodges, restaurants and shops at the base of the Jackson Hole Ski area will include 32 commercial lodges, an estimated 1,200 condominium apartments, 60 private homes and convention and recreation facilities when fully developed.

The mountain itself, with over six square miles of skiable terrain available, will have 18 additional chairlifts and a second aerial tram. Right now the mountain facilities include one 63-passenger aerial tram, 2.4 miles long with a vertical rise of 4,135 feet, and three double chairlifts. The lift facilities are operated on Teton National Forest land under permit from the U.S. Forest Service.

The \$58 million development cost isn't unrealistic, McCollister said, as the existing facilities already represent an initial investment by the Ski Corporation and private developers of \$5.9 million.

No timetable has been placed on the new development, McCollister said, because the development of Teton Village is largely in the hands of present and future investors. "What our development planning has accomplished," he said, "is to provide the structure on which the area can be built. Our program, however, has been established in phases that would see the total maximum development completed in 10 years."

The ski area opened for the first time for the 1965-66 season with three chairlifts, three lodges and base facilities in Teton Village. The aerial tram, which cost almost \$2 million, was completed for the 1966-67 season. For 1967-68, two new lodges, a new restaurant and the resort's first condominium apartment building were completed, doubling the number of rooms available in Teton Village.

Today the Teton Village complex includes a total of five individual lodges, four restaurants and a cafeteria, service station, the one condominium apartment building containing eight apartments, plus shops and Ski Corporation offices.

Four more commercial lots have been sold to private parties. Commercial sites are \$70,000 to \$75,000. Half the 60 private home sites, which sell from \$12,000 to \$20,000 each, have already been built.

A shopping mall and additional lodges are expected to be added during the coming summer.

Bob Corbett of Corbett-Doherty Architects, the firm largely responsible for the development plan, said Teton Village will be unique among similar resort developments.

Corbett pointed out that "Teton Village would not be as urban or disciplined as Snowmass, nor did it have the influence of a once highly developed colorful town such as Aspen. It has greater orientation toward summer recreation than does Vail."

"Teton Village will be one of the few winter resorts where skiers actually ski down through the village," he said.

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## Wintertime Recreation Is Growing

"The thing I like about winter outings is that there are no mosquitoes," said one outdoor enthusiast.

"I like the solitude of camping in the winter," said another devotee of cool weather camping.

Whatever the reason, winter recreation, from camping to snowmobiling, is one of the fastest growing leisure time activities in the U.S. and Canada. So, instead of hot-bathing camping, winter sportsmen enjoy them for a variety of cold weather purposes.

Added to the regular variety of wheeled vehicles, a new conveyance is capturing the imagination of sportsmen. It is the snowmobile, a motorized sleigh on ski-like runners. Snow country inhabitants and visitors are using snowmobiles for cross-country runs, races, rallies and just plain joy riding.

The number of snowmobiles registered in North America has swelled to more than a half million. Clubs have been formed in virtually all northern states and provinces, with competitions and rallies being sponsored by these clubs.

One intrepid snowmobiler has already reached the North Pole after a 60-mile trek across the frozen Arctic wastelands. Others are content with less adventurous shorter runs of 300 miles or so. Most are happy with a short jaunt across the frozen winter countryside.

Snowmobiling is just one of many activities that are increasing the popularity of winter camping. Skiing, ice-boating, ice fishing and other such winter sports go hand in hand with the modern, heated camper. Whether at a popular ski resort or a remote hunting area, it provides a comfortable, convenient and economical kind of accommodation.

In out-of-the-way places, where no other accommodations exist, camping vehicles are an increasingly common sight. Often they provide housing for outdoorsmen who enjoy "roughing it," simply to get away from it all.

Vehicles for camping travel represent a national investment of more than a billion dollars annually. The money is spent for the enjoyment of more than 200 million people who camp at national or state parks each year. (The total, of course, includes persons camping at more than one park during extended trips or multiple use of a single park.)

This investment in pleasure includes expenditures for camping units ranging in price from about \$100 for a large tent assembly to \$12,000 or so for a travel coach or self-contained mobile home.

## Leaflet For Snowmobilers Is Available

Sawtooth National Forest Supervisor P. M. Rees announced today that a new leaflet on snowmobile travel is available at all Ranger Stations and at the Forest headquarters in Twin Falls.

The leaflet was prepared by the Sawtooth National Forest in cooperation with local snowmobile associations and the Idaho Fish and Game Department. Emphasis is placed on safety, respect for the property of others, and protection of wintering big game animals.

Snowmobiling on public and private lands is increasing yearly. More than 225,000 snowmobiles are in use nationally during 1968, compared with only 8,000 during 1964. This impact is also being felt on the Sawtooth National Forest as more and more people are discovering the enjoyment of winter recreation by snowmobile.

Lack of proper planning or caution, however, could lead to loss of life, as has already occurred in Idaho this winter.

# Sad Families Of Entombed Miners Voice Varying Views On Yule Holiday

CONSOL. No. 9, W. Va. (AP) —For the thousands who live around the big coal mine the joy and hope of Christmas is buried here this year with 78 men.

"But Christmas is mostly for children, and many of the adults are determined to salvage something of the traditional holiday spirit for the young ones."

The 78 miners, trapped by explosions and fire in No. 9, were presumed dead when the pits were sealed on Nov. 30 after 10 days of futile rescue attempts. They left 115 widows and 133 sons and daughters.

Mrs. Bea Martin's miner husband was not among the entombed, but she expressed the general community gloom this way: "We're not going to celebrate Christmas. I don't see how anyone can."

Mrs. Harzell Mayle, mother of 16 and widow of one of the lost miners, took a brave opposite view.

"He would have wanted us to have a Christmas," Mrs. Mayle said. "That was our big day. My husband would play football in the house with the kids. We'll all try to have a Christmas."

"We have our farm and we're going to get by. I'm planning to buy some cows and chickens."

"I had a wonderful husband. I know he wouldn't like it if I throw up my hands and said couldn't make it and quit. We're going to make it."

"I'm going to see the rest of the kids get through school. My husband and I always said even if they had beards and were gray-headed, they were going to finish high school."

Mrs. Mayle knew a coal miner's life well. Her husband had worked in the pits since his teens.

Some were new to it like Barbara Tyler who is still awaiting the birth of her baby. Her 28-year-old husband was among those lost.

Mrs. Emma Opyoke's home is on the rising mountainside near the company store.

"They're going to have a Christmas..." Mrs. Opyoke said of the widows and fatherless children. "They're not going to have much but they're going to have something."

"They're going to force themselves to celebrate, especially when they have little ones who don't understand."

Money, clothes and toys keep coming into Farmington where the No. 9 disaster fund office is located. Clyde Riley an official of the United Mine Workers Union, said about \$5,200 had been collected and the fund has only been established a few days. Inquiries have come from Nova Scotia, Florida, California, Mississippi, Wyoming and elsewhere.

# Snowmobiles Used To Conquer North Pole

The Plaided Polar Expedition completed a 43-day 2-hour 30-minute conquest of the Arctic ice cap to reach the North Pole by snowmobiles at 3 p.m. (CST) April 19, 1968.

The band of amateur explorers, led by St. Paul, Minn., insurance man Ralph Plaided, performed a feat that made history. They were:

- First expedition ever to reach the North Pole by motorized travel.
- First surface expedition ever to have its location at the exact geographical North Pole confirmed by an outside source (the U.S. Air Force).
- First surface expedition to reach the North Pole since 1908.
- Driving four compact 15-horsepower snowmobiles, the ice party of six men set out from the northern tip of Canada in 22-degree-below-zero weather at 12:30 p.m. (CST) on March 7, 1968. Their point of departure was Ward Hunt Island, North West Territories, only about 15 miles from where Admiral Robert Peary departed with dogsleds 59 years earlier in his final Arctic expedition.

The Plaided Expedition's major problem in its early days in March was chopping and driving its way through, around and over ice pressure ridges up to 40 feet high, and waiting out

bad weather conditions. At one time, the weather kept the explorers waiting frustratingly in tents for six days.

In the later stages, open water was the big problem. Once the party waited two days for a 2-mile-wide lead of open water to freeze over. They advanced when the ice was less than two inches thick, and jumped their Ski-Doo snowmobiler over the final 8 to 10 feet of open water, which may have been several miles deep.

Besides Plaided, the ice party in the final stretch to the Pole consisted of Gerald Pitzl, 34, St. Paul, geography instructor, navigator; Walter Pederson, 30, mechanical engineer from St. Cloud, Minn.; and Jean-Luc Bombardier, 30, Montreal, snowmobile expert and "pathfinder."

Two members of the starting ice party were needed at base camp and therefore did not complete the trip. They were Dr. Arthur C. Auferheide, 43, Duluth, Minn., pathologist, and Donald Powell, 40, St. Paul, electronics engineer, who were flown back to base camp to work on supply and electronic problems which had to be solved for the success of the mission.

"We were overwhelmed when Jerry Pitzl told us we were at the North Pole," Plaided told the world-by-radio-upon-making the conquest. The party's location was an ice pan in the middle of the Arctic Ocean. They had traveled 825 miles to cover 474 straight-line miles.

The history-making confirmation of their location was made the following day, April 20, by an U.S. Air Force Weather Service aircraft on a routine weather mission, flown daily over the polar regions.

Reported the commander of the Air Force plane:

"At 1530 Greenwich Mean Time (9:30 a.m. CST), 20 April 1968, WC-135B No. 61673 (the aircraft number) passed over the location of the Plaided Polar Expedition. Both navigators plotted the expedition's location, using LORAN, sextant, pressure pattern and Nord radio beacon (Greenland), and their position was calculated to be at the geographic North Pole."

A few hours later, the leased twin-engine support plane which supplied the northward march flew the ice party back to base camp. The return cargo included three of the snowmobiles,

all in good operating condition after the arduous journey.

Victory was all the sweeter for the Plaided expedition in 1968 because of the men's unsuccessful attempt a year earlier. For the second effort, the men combined these elements of success: determination, experience, an earlier start, and a departure point further north.

Most of the group departed from St. Paul-Minneapolis Feb. 21, 1968, on the first leg of their long journey. They received a r.o.y.t.i. homecoming welcome April 27 on their return to the same airport.

# Ski Instruction Techniques Demonstrated At Interski

Beginner and recreation skiers can take a ski lesson in nearly any snow country of the world and learn essentially the same finished form of skiing.

This was demonstrated last April in Aspen, Colo., during the 8th Interski, the International Congress of Ski Instruction.

Here on the deep powder covered slopes of Colorado, top teams of ski instructors from 10 countries gathered for a full month of skiing, workouts and exchange of ideas. The month was climaxed by the public demonstrations and program which covered four days and saw both Alpine and Nordic demonstrations.

Many instructors and other spectators felt the Austrians, with their "wide stance" demonstrations, contributed the most to Interski.

Several other countries used the wide track positions in their teaching exercises and it proved to be not exclusively an Austrian innovation.

Professor Stefan Kruchenbauer, known as the leader of ski teaching trends in Austria, explained the wide track position is adopted in Austrian ski teaching as it is the natural position of children and of young racers when they are concentrating on getting down hill. Turn demonstrations by the Austrians involved stepping first on the downhill and then to the uphill skis to cross the fall line of the hill, and effect the turn.

Nearly all European teams demonstrated their end goal is toward racing. Their demonstrations took the beginner from the awkward stages of getting on skis to shortcuts in running a race-course.

All teams, including the Americans and especially the Americans and Swiss, demonstrated that skiing is fun, is a family sport as well as a highly competitive skill.

Other highlights of the program included a demonstration by amputee skiers ranging in age from skiers down to 7-year-old skiers using one leg and negotiating expert maneuvers. A group of youngsters from Austria and Sweden almost stole the whole show with excellent demonstrations in cross-country, jumping and downhill, showing a wide range of talent for the young skiers of nine to 13 years of age.

# Guests Bring Checkbooks To Woburn Abbey Yule Party

By ANDREW TORCHIA WOBURN, England (AP) —The Christmas season has opened at Woburn Abbey, stately home of the showman Duke of Bedford, with an antique toy fair and a party with the stables.

Guests brought their checkbooks, by request.

The party had a purpose, to help John Robert Russell, 51, the 13th Duke of Bedford, pay the bills for the 3,000 acres where deer graze and his ancestors have lived for 400 years.

Spirits flowed and songs echoed from the stone stable walls but it was a relatively sedate affair for Woburn Abbey. The duke has held jazz festivals, auctions and assemblages of nudists and hippies here since he opened it to the public 13 years ago to pay off the equivalent of \$12 million in inheritance taxes.

The Christmas Fayre — that's how it's spelled on the invitation, was the idea of the duke's third wife, Nicole Millaire of Paris, and Miss Sylvie de Cardenal, who manages the abbey's antique market, opened last year.

"The duchess said, 'let's do something for Christmas' and I whipped up the fayre in about two months," said Miss De Cardenal, 24, a former town planner in Paris.

The toy show, open for the next three weeks, includes several thousand items valued at a total of more than \$30,000. Most items are not for sale, indulgent parents with big bank ac-

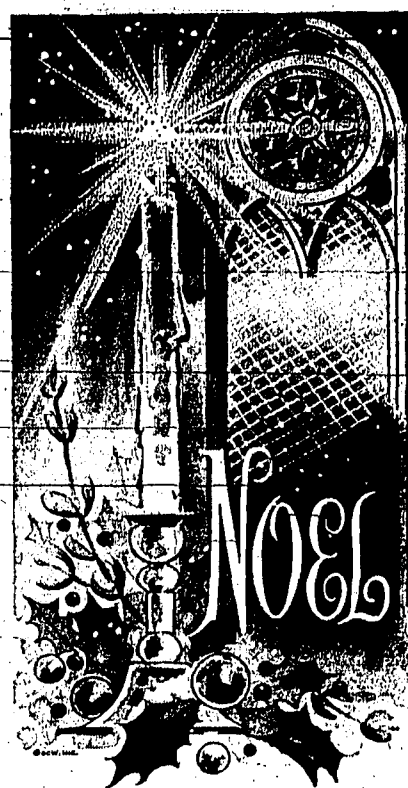

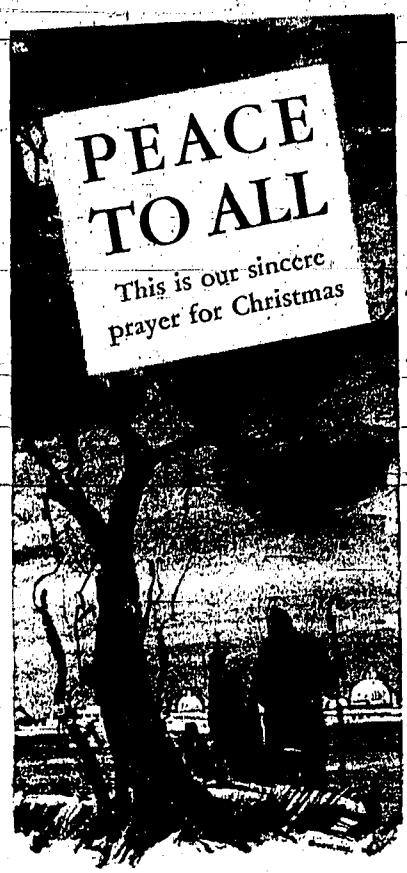

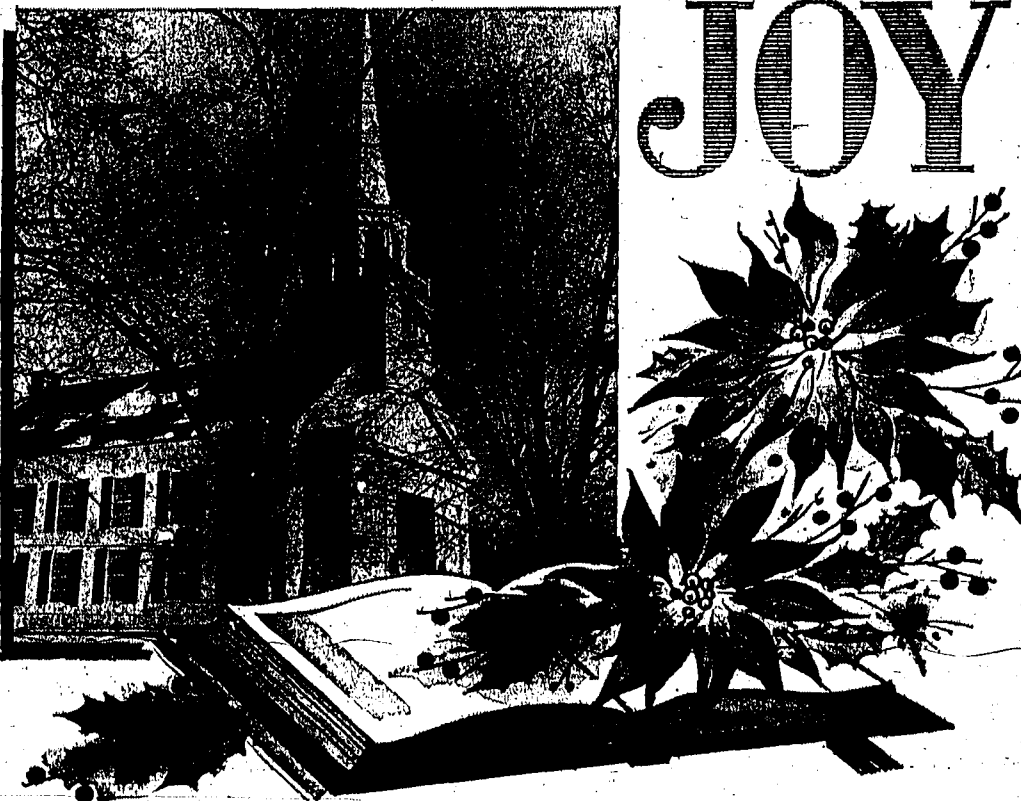
