# County Officials Work On Budget

The Twin Falls County commissioners, working steadily for more than a month now, are putting together a 1969 county budget.

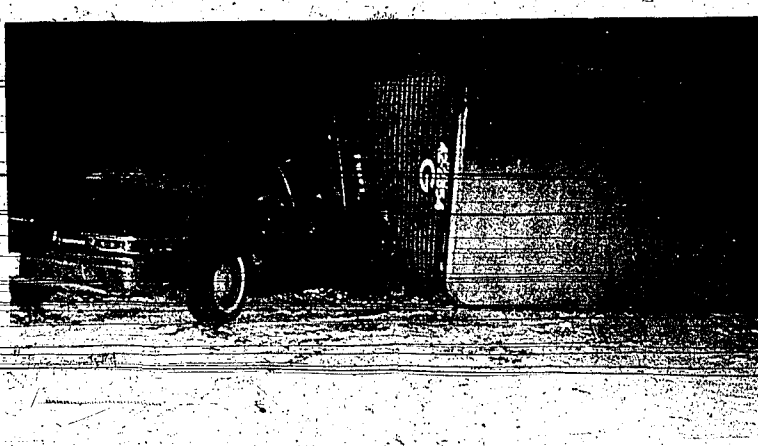
By the middle of January the tentative budget will be finished and released to the public. Between now and then, county commissioners are hopeful that all interested persons will visit with the commissioners and express views on what should be contained in the new budget. The commission meets every Monday and Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The 1968 budget was in the amount of \$3,566,285 and the year before the budget was for \$3,237,120. But the 1968 budget carried a cost of more than \$35,000 to handle general election expenses.

The budget has to be approved by the commission every February. Hearings on the budget will be held by commissioners, it was reported, and adjustments may be made in the tentative budget arrived at by the middle of this month.

The budget annually includes requests from the school districts, the cities in the county, the highway districts and amounts for the state building bond sinking fund and the various county levies.

County levies are for current expenses, charity, and indigent expenses, the agricultural fair,

## Utah Group Backs Session On Budgeting

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)**—The Utah Foundation, a private group about research and organization, says legislators and budget sessions may deal with legislation other than fiscal matters.

Under a constitutional amendment approved by voters in November, the Utah Legislature will hold budget sessions on alternate years with the general sessions.

The foundation said Wednesday organizations in five states reported that their legislatures had effectively limited budget sessions to consideration of fiscal and related matters, and that virtually every type of general legislation had, on occasion, been considered.

On other subjects, the foundation said:

- Utah's population, at mid-year was 1,034,000, an increase of about 2,000 from the 1967 figure, and Utah's 1968 growth appears to have been entirely from births, with perhaps even a slight outmigration.
- The cost of living increased about 3.06 per cent from 1967.
- Per capita personal income in Utah was \$2,684, an \$109 from 1967, but Utah fell from 35th to 38th in the national ranking.
- Population growth at elementary and secondary schools has tended to flatten out, but at schools of higher education has turned sharply upward.
- Highway maintenance costs were \$9.3 million, up 10 per cent from 1967.

## Electrical Use By Business Customers Is New Record

**BOISE**—Idaho Power Co. estimates Wednesday that electric use by its general business customers jumped to more than 5.5 billion kilowatt hours in 1968—a new record for the utility.

Albert Carlson, company president, making the estimate in a review of last year's operation described the record use as "one of many significant achievements" by Idaho Power.

Another accomplishment he cited in the review was a "substantial" investment in new service facilities which the utility president estimated was coming more expensive because of rising construction and financing costs in a period of "rapid inflation."

Mr. Carlson also pointed to completion of the P. E. Roach Hells Canyon Development, the opening of new facilities for free public recreation in North America's deepest gorge, and steady growth in electric heating.

On the basis of near-complete figures for the year, the utility president estimated electric use by Idaho Power's general business customers at about 5,555,460,000 kilowatt hours.

"This marks the first time that general business use has surpassed above 5 billion kilowatt hours, and represents an increase of more than 200 million kilowatt hours over 1967," Mr. Carlson reported.

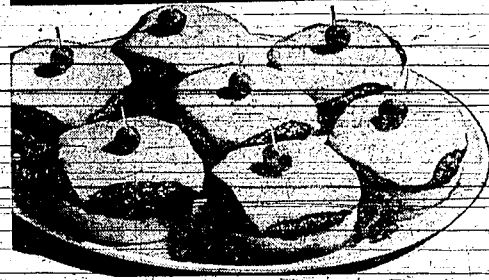
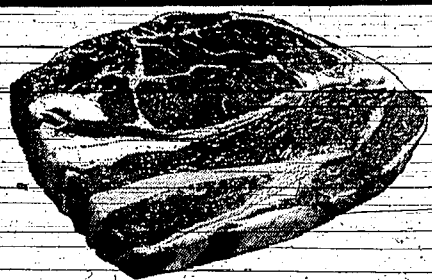

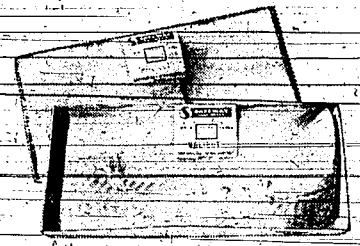

# Pocatello Collision Kills 3

POCATELLO (AP) — A head-on collision killed three Pocatello residents near Pocatello early today, passing a bloody head start after a record-breaking 1968 toll of 298.

State police said Highway 30 was coated with black ice when the two cars collided shortly after midnight. The victims were listed as David C. Christensen, 21, of Pocatello, the driver of one of the cars; his sister, Susan Christensen, and Sheri Goff, 20, also of Pocatello, who was riding with the Christensens on New Year's Day.

The state was officially without traffic fatalities for the New Year's holiday period, which ended at midnight Wednesday, police said.

A year ago, the state also escaped death on the first day of the year, with the first fatality on Jan. 3. The state went on then to set a new record of 298 deaths, 27 more than ever before, "being recorded in a single year."

# Coast Thaws After 4 Days Of Bitter Cold

Portland and the Columbia Gorge slowly thawed Thursday after four days of paralyzing rain, sleet and ice.

Signs of the recovery: Interstate Highway 500 along the Columbia River from Troutdale to Rainier, closed for days, finally reopened Wednesday night.

Most Portland businesses are open Thursday, a few of the smaller shops and stores for the first time since last Friday.

Most homes had electricity and telephone service. Portland General Electric, borrowing crews from Tacoma, Salem, Newberg, St. Helens and Hillsboro, as well as 20 crewmen from Pacific Power & Light Co., worked to restore service to customers in Lake Oswego, Dunsmuir, Milwaukie, Lake Grove, Gresham and Oregon City.

Bus, train and airplane service was restored in Portland, and practically was nonexistent at times New Year's Eve and New Year's Day.

Most of the rest of Western Oregon recovered earlier, as warmer temperatures and rain melted the snow and ice. It was 49 in Astoria Wednesday, 50 in Seaside, 47 in Medford, 42 in Newport and North Bend.

But it stayed cold New Year's Day along the gorge and in Northwestern Oregon—a high of 49 in Bend, 47 in Prineville, and only 24 in Portland, where warm air had been expected to melt the layers of snow and rain that have frozen into a slippery glaze coating streets, sidewalks, shrubs and trees.

# Sen. Batt Asks Use Of Revenue For State Police

WILDER, Idaho (AP) — State Sen. Philip E. Batt, R-Wilder, has proposed that the revenue from Idaho's vehicle inspection program be used to hire extra state policemen, who would do the inspecting.

Batt, in a letter to Law Enforcement Commissioner Warren Mills, said the present law is not doing what it should be doing.

"The inspection program," he said, "should be aimed at one thing—getting unsafe vehicles off the road."

Under the present system, the inspections are done by service stations authorized by the state and a \$2 fee is charged. Batt noted the \$2 per vehicle could add up to about \$1 million for all vehicles in the state.

SEATTLE (AP) — Condemned murderer Ernest James Tyler, 35, left part of a backwash blind and an apology behind when he escaped from the King County Jail Dec. 24.

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# Dr. Blaiberg Plans To Celebrate 'Life'

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP)—A 59-year-old doctor, the longest-surviving heart-transplant patient, planned a dinner party tonight to celebrate the first anniversary of his operation.

Dr. Blaiberg, who is now 59, felt even better than he did years before the operation. "I said the chubby, mustached 59-year-old doctor who received a new lease on life when Dr. Christiana, Bernard's transplant surgeon, gave him a new heart. The location of the heart was in the Groote-Schuur Hospital last Jan. 2.

Barnard was invited to the anniversary dinner.

Blaiberg said he took a glass of wine Wednesday, the first since the operation.

"On that score you're behind me," Blaiberg was told by the Rev. Charles Boulogne, the French Dominican monk who is No. 2 in length of survival for heart-transplant patients. "I've been drinking for a long time now."

The two men talked briefly in Cape Town. To telephone hook-up arranged by a French radio station, Boulogne received his new heart last May 12.

Except for a crisis that at first required a second heart transplant and kept him in the hospital 116 days last summer, Blaiberg has led a fairly normal life.

He drives his own car, goes swimming, attends shows, receives visiting celebrities and celebrates a week with friends to tea at his apartment.

However, he still walks with a slight limp and has to follow a strict regimen including 10 minutes taking medicine four times a day. He has a medical checkup twice a week but no special attention.

Blaiberg was given the heart of Clive Haupt, a 47-year-old millito factory worker who had died of a brain hemorrhage. Blaiberg went home from the hospital on March 16, 74 days after the operation. He was back in the hospital May 24 with a liver complaint that was diagnosed as hepatitis.

Lung complications set in, and by July 6 Barnard had decided to perform a second heart transplant. On that day, Blaiberg recalls in his book "Looking at My Heart," he told his wife Ellen: "You know as well as I do that this is the end of the road."

Then he was given injections of anti-anaphylactic serum and by the next day he was on his way to recovery. He was released from the hospital Sept. 26.

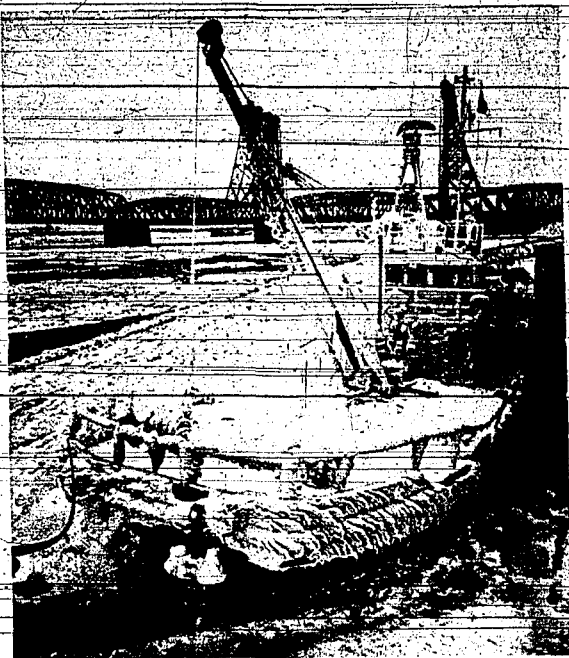

### BRIDGE ERRORS NOT PERMANENT
