Oil, Atomic Union Shuts Refineries In Salary Dispute

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — Union oil workers struck refineries across the nation Saturday to enforce demands for a wage increase. The Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers' Union said 76,000 workers had joined in the walkout. A spot check showed pickets had appeared at refineries located from Washington State's Puget Sound to Marcus Hook, Pa.

War Toll Surpasses \$5 Billion

SALON (AP) — The Vietnam war's toll on U.S. aircraft is approaching the \$5 billion mark. Figures issued by the U.S. Department of Defense showed the United States has lost 4,768 aircraft—2,493 planes and 2,275 helicopters—from enemy fire and other causes since Jan. 1, 1961. The best estimate available here places the loss at about \$2 billion in conventional aircraft—meaning bombers, fighters, cargo carriers and observation planes—and at least \$500 million in helicopters, a total of \$4.8 billion.

Nixon Names Administrator For Policy

NEW YORK (AP) — President-elect Nixon rounded out his top-level team for the State Department Saturday, picking an administrator and two key diplomats. He also said he would name Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker to stay on for a time in Vietnam. Nixon confirmed his choice for the No. 2 job in the State Department, Massachusetts Attorney General Elliot L. Richardson, 48, a man who, like Secretary of State-designate William P. Rogers, has little foreign policy experience.

After a joint session with the Senate to certify presidential election returns, the House is expected to take up Monday the question of pay raises for cabinet members and the President.

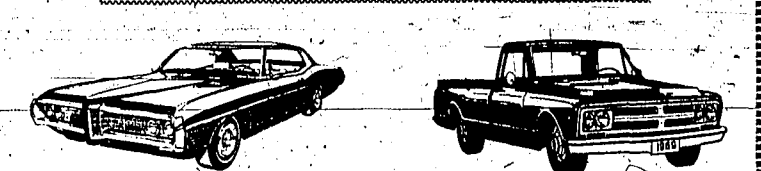

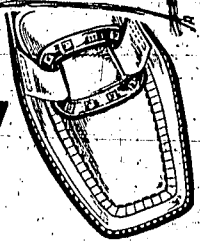

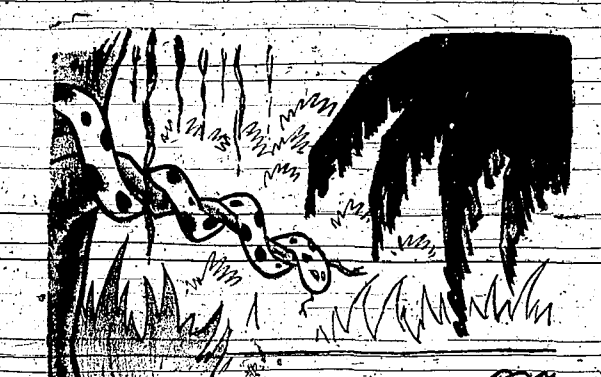

Crime In Twin Falls During 1968 Was About Average, Chief Says

The crime rate in Twin Falls was about the same as that recorded in previous years, Chief Frank Barnett said Friday.

He said he believes Twin Falls' crime rate is less than that of other Idaho cities of similar size. He said, however, that Twin Falls, Caldwell and Nampa have about the same crime problem.

This probably means that Twin Falls is "lucky" when it comes to the amount of serious crime.

The chief noted that while Twin Falls is "the big city" in this area, Nampa and Caldwell are near the largest city of Boise. Thus—many criminal activities by residents of the smaller cities probably take place in Boise, while a portion of crime in Twin Falls is not perpetrated by its residents.

but by residents of the outlying area.

An interesting facet of the 1968 crime record in Twin Falls shows that kids are getting better every day.

The 1967 figures—and the 1968 figures are exactly the same—showed on 47 juveniles were made during both time periods.

Two of the year's major burglaries, at West Five Points and at the College of Southern Idaho Vocational School.

About \$2,600 worth of merchandise and cash was taken June 13 from the West Five Points Store; and on Aug. 5 more than \$8,000 in cash and merchandise was taken from North Blue Lakes Sporting Goods.

The city just barely made its average of one murder a year in the city limits. In the early hours of Jan. 1, 1968, Kent Mellies turned a gun on himself after shooting and critically injuring his wife, Linda Mellies. Mrs. Mellies died within hours.

Another man also was injured in the fracas, but he later recovered.

The murder-suicide were the only violent deaths, other than suicides, in 1968 within the city. For several years running, Twin Falls has had no traffic fatalities recorded.

A total of 971 arrests were made in Nov. 1968 by Twin Falls City and Sheriff's Office, 1,001 in Nov. 1967. This figure, however, represents all arrests, including small offenses such as parking violations.

The yearly total of arrests, though Nov. 1968, was 10,800, or about the same as the yearly total of arrests in all categories usually runs about 12,000.

The police department had fewer complaints in 1968 on sex crimes, including child molesting, than normal, the chief

"We didn't have nearly the problem with child molesting cases this year as we usually do," he said.

While the total crime rate ran on about an average, the chief also feels the incidence of serious crime was lower than usual. "It's hard to remember from one year to the next," he said, "but it just seems to me like the serious crime rate this year was much lower."

The city made no arrests on drug charges this year and while the chief admits that drugs are being used in Twin Falls—the use isn't as heavy as some people would like to think. This is the sort of thing

that people really eat up, but \$39,228.08 of that amount was recovered.

Value of property taken in burglaries during that time period was \$24,288 and \$9,057.60 of that amount was recovered, Chief Barnett said that the national average on the recovery rate in burglaries is about 20 per cent, so Twin Falls is doing a much better job than average.

He also emphasized that burglaries include stolen vehicles and that burglaries includes anything taken from inside a car, home or business.

Idaho Mulls Computers

By **BUD JORGENSEN**

BOISE (AP)—Computer work is doing more and more work for Idaho's government and the state. A study will be made soon on how much more expansion will be undertaken.

The study is expected to be released this month and the legislature, which convenes Jan. 14, likely will be asked to decide on recommendations of the consultant.

The first step in a coordinated computerization program was taken by the 197 legislature. It created the Administrative Services Department and gave authority to the department to investigate the use of computers for any state agency.

William A. Carter, the director of the Administrative Services Division, said the department considers the present computer program an interim setup until long-range plans are developed. In August of 1967 it worked with the State Tax Commission to develop an inter-agency computer program.

For consideration of long-range computer development, Gov. Don Samuelson established an executive committee composed of agency chiefs, a supreme court justice and a legislator. This committee hired the consulting firm of Ernest and Ernest to do the study which is scheduled for release this month.

When the Management Services Division was brought into the computer field, the tax commission had what is known as a second generation computer, Carter said.

To satisfy expanded state needs, Carter said, they rented a third generation computer last January. Third generation computers are more efficient than previous computers.

The first one can handle a piece of data in about a six-millionth of a second; can perform more than one operation at a time; and can be programmed.

Enemies of Mao Charge 'Fraud'

HONG KONG (AP)—Pro-Nationalist Chinese sources here charge Communist Chinese enemies of party chairman Mao Tse Tung have accused him of trying to "illegally" force Minister Lin Piao as his successor.

The sources said the reports came from "anti-Mao" organizations inside China. They indicated Nationalist agents working in China had transmitted the reports to their government in Taiwan.

There was no way of confirming the reports here. Some western China analysis were skeptical. The reports said Mao planned to get the long-delayed 9th National Congress, now scheduled this year, to put Lin Piao's name in the constitution when it considers the new document.

Western analysts pointed out that no names were included in previous party constitutions and some doubted Mao would attempt it this year even if he had the power.

Besides, they said, if Mao had the power to insert Lin Pao's name he presumably would have the power to dictate Lin Piao's succession without writing it into the constitution.

Public Assistance. The machine now carries state tax rolls, payroll, state personnel information, inventories and welfare case information.

Carter said the size machine they now have could not take another major program, such as driver licensing. To expand, he said, a new machine with a larger workshop area will be needed.

The present computer costs about \$5,400 a month to rent, he said. There are a variety of plans to pay for computer services ranging from outright purchase to rental and the plan used depends on the needs.

The state has 10 other computer systems: three at Idaho State University; two at the University of Idaho; one at Boise State College; and four at state agencies in Boise.

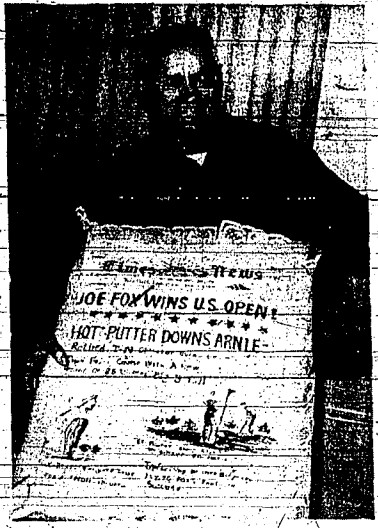

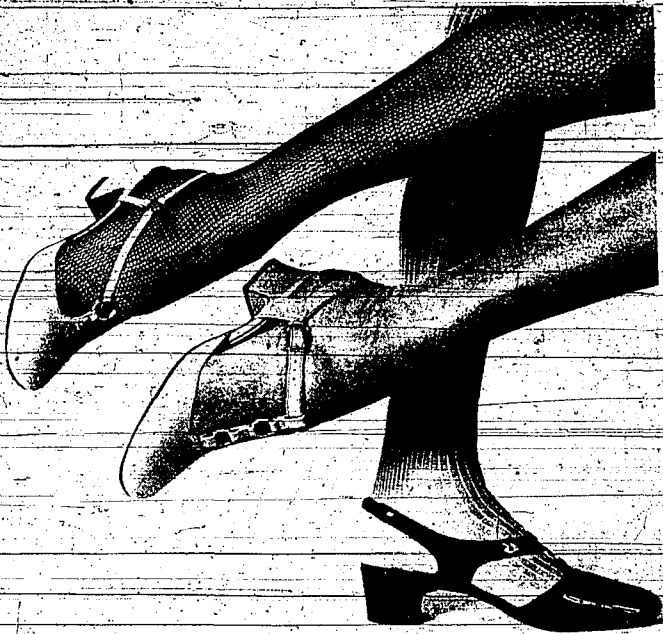

The slightly pointed toe with the neat thin two and one-half-inch heel that was so flattering to the legs has gone by the wayside. One would think with clothes becoming more fitted to emphasize the feminine form, that shoes would do the same, but from my standpoint, not so.

This spring, we "simple and safe" types will be greatly outnumbered as shoes as well as clothing styles tend to fit in with the high good humor most of fashion enjoys now.

When my teenage daughter bought her first pair of (get this)—"monsters"—I could hardly believe my eyes. Surely no sensible girl would wear such things. Much to my surprise—they all were. Now I understand from information received from the National Footwear Institute that when monster shoes first came out, young men in Paris bought them and started a whole new game of matched pairs. Now everyone wants to play. Two by two they're coming for spring, the full blown walking shoes, the monstrosities, the "civitas" and "bruder" brogues, and they're identical for men and women. Only difference might be a higher heel for the women. It's hard to say how far this trend will go, but it will win with the couples who are already wearing twin shirts, scarves, blazers and trousers.

Where we used to see the basic whites, blacks, browns, olives and greys we now see every color of the rainbow during

any season of the year. Patterns are so popular and in any shade one would desire.

The "anything-goes" trend for the new season will see rounded toes on all shoes, but a little softer than the exaggerated bluntness that was experimental a season ago. (According to the people in-the-know on styles, designers have worked out all the ways to balance the snubby toe with height at the back; heels now can be flat or fair-to-middling or nearly three inches high. Broader and straighter, the heels are being set rather far back and rising straight to the body of the shoe, without the full curve at the top.)

Probably the single most important look on the landscape for spring are the opened shoes.

At first, there were the broad strapped shoes that were more covered than bare. Now they can be uncovered everywhere, fore, middle or aft. A city sandal now might be a criss-cross of straps or a shabby-toed shoe in a shout of green, buckled off-sides and opened at the back.

It might also be a classic silhouette, an oxford, say, or a spectator, with everything possible pared away until what remains is a sandal.

Flats will be having more fun this season, scampering all over summer, highlighted with color and good ideas, like frothy linens, open-backed frogues, scrolled designs, tri-colors and wet-look leather.

There will be dress shoes that catch all the bows. The bows will match the shoe and be large enough to muffle the toe and leave the throat to its own. This is no shoe that can have a high satin collar and a little jeweled button—and look as 1000-ish as a felt cloche.

Changes in shoe fashions during the past few seasons have sent designers back to their drawing boards—again and again—and the various styles featured on this page are the up-and-coming ones for 1939.

Carpet Paths
Enhanced By
Tile Covering

SHOSHONE — "One answer to the problem of carpet paths worn by foot traffic is carpet tiles," states Mary Lou Raley, county home economics agent. They are a recent development in floor covering. Because they are not permanently attached to the floor, they may be rearranged to create original designs.

As most carpet tiles can be applied directly to nearly all kinds of floors they can also be switched from room to room. And if the family moved to another house, the covering can be moved readily.

Carpet tiles come in various sizes, colors and textures. The fibers vary, too. There is a combination of animal fibers, artificial and synthetic fibers, including polypropylene which is like some indoor-outdoor carpet.

The tiles can also be applied to walls for decorative treatment. Double stick carpet tape attaches them to walls.

- 1/4 tablespoons butter
 - 1/2 cups milk
 - 3/4 tablespoons mayonnaise
 - 3 tablespoons prepared mustard
 - 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 2 hard-cooked eggs, coarsely chopped
- To make loaf: Combine milk, eggs, onion, horseradish and mustard. Add corned beef hash and mix well. Line the bottom of a 2 1/2 quart pan with aluminum foil; pack corned beef hash mixture into pan. To make sauce: Melt butter, heat, cook over medium heat; pepper; stir to blend. Add chopped onion, sauté over low heat; stirring constantly, until mixture is tender. Add eggs. Make two-and-one-half cups. Move to four-cups sauce. Serve with loaf. Add mayonnaise. Corned Beef Loaf. Makes eight servings.

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Times-News To Carry Special Service On How To Cut Taxes

The 1968 income tax returns which were mailed out to the nation's taxpayers in early January are now colored in red, white and blue.

Sheldon S. Cohen, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, is not attempting to appeal to the patriotism of taxpayers by his choice of colors.

Rather, he is taking this step in an effort to reduce taxpayer errors. The use of red-colored type in critical areas of the return is designed to highlight the sections where errors most frequently occur.

Last year more than 8,000,000 errors were made by taxpayers in 71,000,000 individual income tax returns that were filed.

"This means," Commissioner Cohen reported, "that almost one in nine individuals had an error that slowed processing and may have delayed the taxpayer's refund. What we are trying to do now with this version of the form is simply to help the taxpayer concentrate on the common trouble spots."

The cynic might have replied to Commissioner Cohen that the color used by IRS on the income tax forms, in the mind of the taxpayer there is only one appropriate color—the extra dollars he will have to pay.

As a further experiment this year, 5,000,000 taxpayers in 15 states will have tax forms with a blue tint screened over everything on the form except the taxpayer's name.

The errors were uncovered by Internal Revenue's giant computers which now process every return filed in the country. Two of the boys are 12, one is 11 and the other is 7. They are in the custody of their parents pending a court hearing next Thursday.

Of the nine business establishments entered, a total of 28 incidents were listed in the "petitions." Two of the boys are accused of entering businesses more than once.

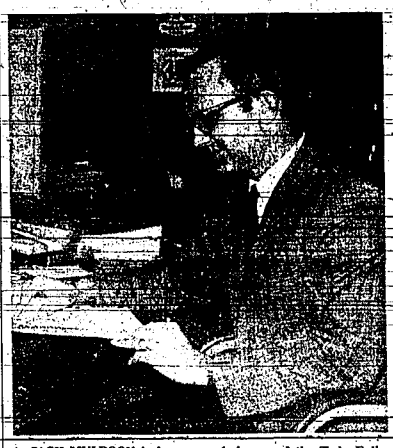

The seven-year-old is accused of entering the Elm Street Grocery at 264 Main Ave. N. on Nov. 30; R and S on Dec. 6 and Mamba's Bar on Dec. 11, and the other 12-year-old is accused of entering the same establishments at the same times.

The boys were questioned about the burglaries last week, then placed under the jurisdiction of the Probate Court, it was learned.

Officers said entry to the businesses was usually made through broken or open windows.

Surprise! Ohio State Is Voted No. 1 Grid Team, Lions Second

Ohio State's potent young Buckeyes, firmly entrenched atop the college football world after their Rose Bowl triumph over Southern California, looked forward today to a year of possibly top-of-continued dominance.

The Buckeyes, named national champions by a wide margin Friday in the final Associated Press poll of sports writers and sportscasters, will return all but four of the 22 starters who paved the way to a 10-0 finish capped by a 27-16 conquest of then No. 2 Southern Cal.

Thirteen of the 22, including quarterback Rex Kern, are sophomores, making the future brighter than ever for Coach Woody Hayes.

Ohio State, which last won the national championship 15 years ago, received 44 of the 60 first place votes cast in the final AP ballot. The Buckeyes got 588 points to 727 for runner-up Penn State, the only other unbeaten, untied major team.

The 11-0 Nittany Lions, who edged Kansas 15-14 in the Orange Bowl New Year's Night, moved up from the No. 3 spot they held in the next-to-last poll, conducted at the close of the regular season, Texas, 9-7, after trouncing Tennessee 36-13 in the Cotton Bowl, nailed the third spot, with Southern California, 9-1, falling to fourth.

Penn State and Texas each received two first place votes, Arkansas, which jumped from ninth to sixth place, behind Notre Dame, picked up one. Arkansas wound up 10-1, upsetting Georgia 16-2 in the Sugar Bowl, and Notre Dame, which didn't go to a bowl was 7-1. The Irish were seventh in the next-to-last poll.

Kansas, 9-2, Georgia, 8-1-2, Missouri, 8-3, and Purdue, 8-2, complete the final Top Ten. Kansas was No. 6, Georgia No. 4, Missouri No. 16 and Purdue 11th before the bowls.

Missouri made the big jump following an impressive 35-10 Gator Bowl victory over then 12th ranked Alabama, which slipped to No. 17. Tennessee and Oklahoma also dropped out of the Top Ten.

Fourteen of the Top Twenty in last year's regular season poll played in bowl games and eight were beaten.

Southern Methodist and Louisiana State, which were tied for setting Oklahoma and Florida State, respectively, in post season scraps, moved up to Nos. 14 and 19.

The final AP poll was taken after the bowl games for the second time because of the "staggered" nature of Ohio State and Southern California and the fact that nine of the Top Ten teams had post-season games.

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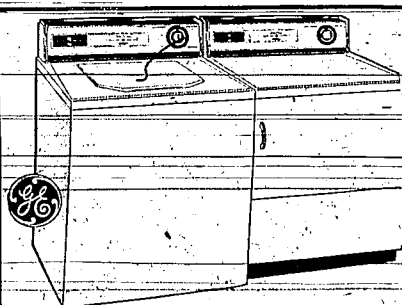
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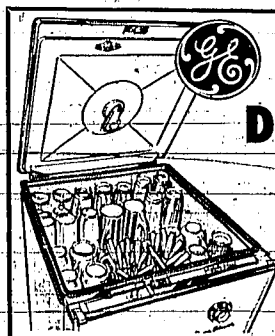

Williams Lake Development Will Provide Authentic Old West Atmosphere For Spring Opening

SALMON — An historic collection of some 20,000 items is expected to open in the spring at Williams Lake Resort south of Salmon.

Harry LeMoine, Williams Lake developer, and M. M. Melton, resort owner, purchased the collection which includes the estates of Alden J. Bennett and his son, Lyman H. Bennett, banker and judge, at Virginia City, Mont.

Most of the material dates from 1861 to 1933 and now is housed in the old LDS Church house in Salmon.

LeMoine, who is president of LeMoine Development, Inc., Twin Falls, and Melton, began construction this fall of a three-story frame building along the shore at Williams Lake to house the collection.

Work has been suspended for the winter but will be resumed in the spring for completion

when the resort opens for another season June 1.

The building is part of a program to remodel the entire Williams Lake resort complex into an authentic old western town.

It will include a Red Dog Saloon to be furnished with authentic furniture of the period. Other rooms in the building on the ground floor will include an old land and assay office, a rock shop and music room. The second floor will serve as a museum to house the most valuable of the historic items from the

Bennett collection, including Judge Bennett's law library.

The museum will be separated into areas to include Barker Bennett's records, another area for glassware, furniture, paintings, clocks, etc.

Many of the items from the vast collection will be offered for sale at a general store which will be located on the ground floor.

The third floor of the building will contain two rental apartments and 10 one-bedroom hotel rooms which will be furnished with antique furniture and decorated accordingly.

LeMoine purchased the metal ceiling from the old Perrine Hotel in Twin Falls for use in the ceilings in the building.

The structure is 40 by 100 feet. An old bar extending the length of one wall will serve customers in the Red Dog Saloon. The building will have a board walk around it. Melton plans to enlarge the present cafe serving the resort.

LeMoine said that the Bennett collection is believed to be the largest single collection of authentic western antiques.

Alden J. Bennett, who owned much of the material, arrived in Montana in 1870 and taught school, later becoming Madison County, Mont., superintendent of schools.

In 1879 he associated with the banks of Raymond, Herington and Co. and a few years later bought out their interests and the bank became known as Hall and Bennett.

In 1900 the bank was incorporated as the Madison State Bank with Bennett serving as president for many years.

The elder Bennett was a member of the Ninth Legislative Assembly of Montana which was composed of only eight men.

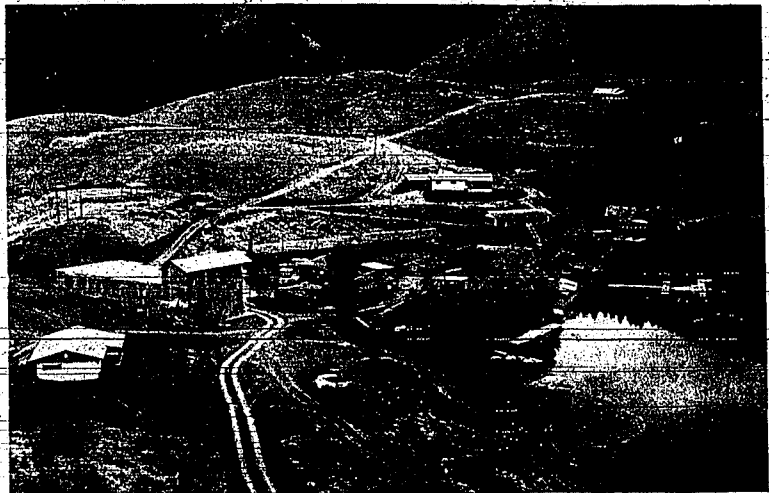
Bennett's son, Lyman H., became a district judge for the Virginia City district.

The estate was purchased by LeMoine and Melton indirectly from one of the Bennett heirs. The items were shipped out of Virginia City to Billings 15 years ago and stored there in a barn, warehouse and in the upstairs of a building.

Included in the 20,000 items are some 400 pieces of furniture, 3,000 to 4,000 pieces of china and glass, 3,500 to 4,000 books, 3,500 to 4,000 old phonograph records, discs and cylinders, 1,500 pieces of kitchenware, including cast iron pots, coffee grinders and the like.

There are hundreds of other items, including some 350 copper and brass lamps, many pictures, Judge Bennett's law books, titles, chairs, beds, personal belongings, bank records, checks, general store records from Virginia City, some 10 hotel registers dated from 1892 to 1913.

Names on the registers include two famous western painters,

LeMoine noted that Williams Lake now has 30 homes with 250 homesites sold and 100 remaining to be sold.

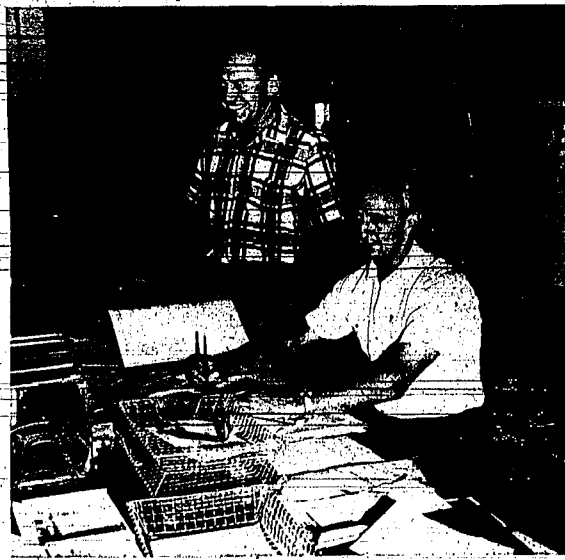
Melton owned the original Williams Lake Ranch and LeMoine has purchased the land and is doing the development of lots.

The two also have purchased several ranches in the area including Tower Creek Ranch, Trappan Ranch and school section lands on 12-Mile Creek and McKim Creek.

"We intend to develop all these properties eventually," LeMoine said. The property will be broken into one, five and 10-acre lots.

LeMoine said the investment in the collection and building to house it along with the other business activities planned centered around the collection is estimated at \$100,000.

Williams Lake, 12 miles south of Salmon, just off U.S. Highway 83, is considered one of the top rainbow fishing lakes in Idaho.

First Coho Salmon Spawning Is Observed

The coho salmon introduced into the South Fork of the Clearwater River have had limited success in developing a run to fish in Idaho, according to Terry Holubetz, Clearwater fishery biologist.

Since 1963 a total of almost 11 million eggs have been planted in the Red River and Crooked River hatchling channels on the South Fork of the Clearwater River beginning in 1965, and this year's run to Lewis and Clark Dam, since these fish run fish this season is almost complete for the year. The eggs for these plants come from various lower Columbia River tributaries and were furnished to Idaho by the U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.

Even though coho are returning to Idaho it is difficult to discover if any were successfully spawning in the South Fork. For the first time this year, 11 coho were observed spawning in Three Mile Creek, a tributary of the South Fork of the Clearwater River near Siltco.

The reason for the selection of a stream at a lower elevation and about 40 miles downstream from the main hatchling channels is unknown.

However, there are two possibilities. The small fry could have drifted down to the Three Mile Creek after hatching at the Lewis and Clark Dam.

Another possibility is that the adult fish found Three Mile Creek to have warmer spawning temperatures in the creek and selected it for this reason. The cold water temperatures in Idaho's high country in late fall create a spawning problem for these fish. Many of the small creeks, which coho normally prefer are ice covered in November.

The coho salmon, or "silver" as it is called by many people, is not normally a fish that runs long distances to spawn in fresh

water. Most coho runs on the Pacific Coast are on streams of less than 100 miles in length. Therefore, the 500 mile plus runs into Idaho are unusual.

These fish enter the Columbia River in late August and early September and arrive on their spawning beds in Idaho sometime in November. They spawn immediately and the eggs remain in the gravel overwinter, hatching the following spring. After 1 1/2 to 2 years in fresh water, they migrate to the ocean at about 4.5 inches long.

Coho salmon adults return after two years in the ocean. They average about eight pounds in weight. They are a spawning fish when caught in the ocean and upon first entering the Columbia, prefer jumping rather than fighting deep. They are most difficult to catch after they have been in fresh water for sometime.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department has released coho in 14 bodies of water in southern Idaho in an attempt to get them established in fresh water reservoirs similar to a recent successful introduction in the

Great Lakes. This program has run three years ago, producing a surplus of coho eggs available from Oregon hatcheries. Coho salmon grow from about three inches to 12 inches the first season. Yearlings, however, develop the urge to migrate and they head out down river.

As a result, people have caught "silvers" in the main Snake River and even in the irrigation ditches in Pocatello. It was hoped they would remain in the lakes or reservoirs and feed on the abundant rough fish available, but they have not done this. The Department plans

to continue this program as long as the hatcheries are available from Oregon hatcheries. The fall chinook introduction program in the Selway River has been disappointing. Since 1962, there have been about 5 1/2 million eggs planted in the hatchling channel and our largest run occurred in 1968 when 122 were counted over Lewis and Clark Dam. This year only 20 returned to the Clearwater. No eggs have been planted in Four Mile Creek hatchling channel this fall and this particular program will probably be discontinued.

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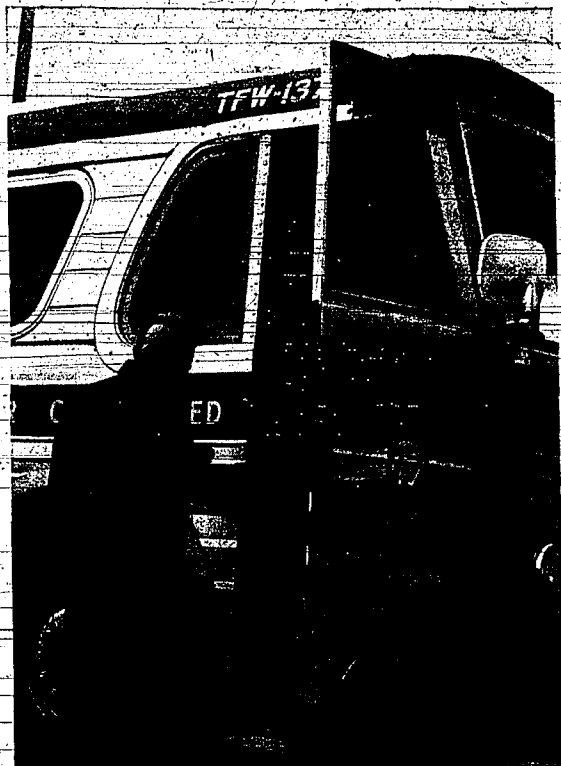
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Family Owned Bus Line Rolls To A Stop

Wheels that have been rolling for a pioneer southern Idaho business the past 43 years have come to a halt.

H. R. Personius, owner of Twin Falls-Wells, Nevada Stage Line has announced the closing of the business that began operating in 1926 and is one of the oldest bus lines in the entire nation. It is one of the few, he says, to hold a "grandfather" charter, which is one passed on through three generations of the same family.

Jack Personius, grandfather of the present owner, acquired the bus line in lieu of payment of a \$500 debt and in the ensuing 40 years turned it into a major transportation enterprise for southern Idaho and northern Nevada.

The operation has covered millions of miles throughout the country and there has never been a major accident for the stage line. In the 43 years of constant travel.

In the early operations, the line ran from Hailey to Wells with operations to Boise, Gooding and other areas as well.

Later, the line's main operation was confined between Twin Falls and Wells, Nev., because of the major rail terminal there.

Nearly everyone traveled by train and Twin Falls, with no major rail service, was best served to the southwest via Wells. Mr. Personius recalls that at times as many as 16 buses would bring servicemen from Wells to Twin Falls and back each run during holiday leave periods.

Charter business in the past few years has also taken up a large share of the firm's operation including trips to New York City, San Francisco, and throughout the west.

The present owner recalls he first began working in transportation at the age of 6 years. At that time he was trusted to clean out buses and work around the terminal. Since then he had held every job from office management to driver.

Before becoming owner after the death of his father, Ray Personius, in 1960 and his grandfather, Jack Personius, in 1968.

When the bus line began operating from Hailey to Wells, Mr. Personius says his grandfather reported the run could be made in eight hours and 40 minutes, if there wasn't any trouble, but he could never recall a time when there wasn't trouble.

As business progressed the line switched from the use of "large" automobiles that would carry four to five passengers, to the "stretch out" Chryslers that could carry nine passengers.

During World War II, the bus business was one of the most active in the area. Nearly everyone rode the bus because of gasoline rationing and the relative scarcity of air transportation.

But Mr. Personius can see the handwriting on the wall. Air transportation is now less costly and much better connections are available from Twin Falls. Interstate highways make automobile travel much faster and nearly every family has one to two late model fast and comfortable automobiles.

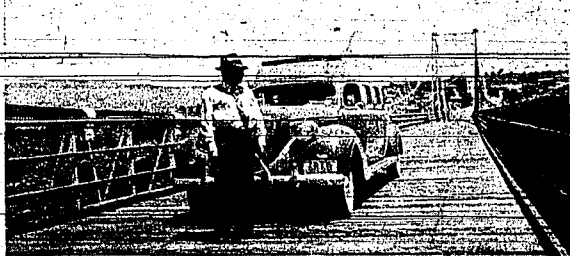
Buses, like the trains, are becoming less important in the transportation of passengers and many small companies throughout the country are closing their operations.

There is a future in bus operation, Mr. Personius feels, as the major lines and many charter operations will continue economically for some time. Buses are flexible and can reach areas not served by airlines or trains.

Noting that not too many years ago it was nearly impossible to get a seat on the bus to Wells, Mr. Personius said the operation hit its peak from 1960 to 1965. However, this year all servicemen were flown to their destinations and the operation to Wells, even during the holidays, was almost nil.

"Times change," he said, "and you have to be ready to change with them. This is the reason we have decided to close up shop now rather than operate at a loss and become a failing business."

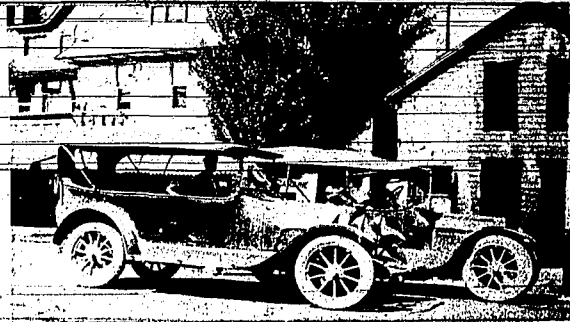

Eighteen years ago, Remond published "Water in the West," a book about water in a green agricultural valley not too far from the Magic Valley. If they have nothing else, politicians have only one thing to get boxed in on some issue or quibble. Government has gone out of the even. Very rarely do you ever name a politician who will go out of his way to create a majoring of his reputation for the benefit of him out of office, particularly when he stands to gain nothing.

At the same time, it was virtually lacking in personnel who were able to train prisoners for the penitentiary day of release. Rehabilitation, they found in their study, was at a minimum, and a completely ineffective phase of the operation.

A most incredible situation has taken place in the appointment of Virgil Terry as warden of the penitentiary in 1958 and has been with the

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Surgeon Agrees To Repair Heart Of German Shepherd

NEW YORK (AP) — The surgeon who directed a heart and kidney transplant on New Year's Eve has agreed to perform open-heart surgery on a German shepherd puppy as a gesture of gratitude to the many animals used in heart research.

Dr. C. Walton Lillehei, surgeon-in-chief at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center, plans to make X-ray studies of Kai, the four-month-old pet of Allan and Kevin Fogel, 8-

year-old twins of Brooklyn. On Tuesday, Dr. Lillehei directed a 60-man team in transplanting the heart and kidneys of a dog, a psychoanalyst and three recipients.

Dr. Lillehei, a former teacher of Dr. Christiana Barnard who performed the first human heart transplant, volunteered to perform the open-heart operation, "on behalf of the many dogs who have served to benefit mankind in helping develop these techniques."

"Dogs have been the backbone of open-heart surgery," he said, explaining that their hearts are "almost identical" to the human heart.

Dr. Lillehei read about the dog in the letter to the Daily News from Kai's owners. In the letter, the young boys said their veterinarian had told them that Kai must be put to sleep because he had a congenital heart defect which can only be cured by surgery.

The dog is being examined by Dr. Lillehei and admitted to the hospital's kennel for experimental animals Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Lillehei said his human colleagues suspect that the veterinarian's diagnosis is correct and one of the valves in the puppy's heart will have to be replaced.

If the tests confirm this diagnosis, he said, the operation may be performed some time next week.

42 years in the same community and by the same people.

The bus line says goodbye to a member of the family, Mr. Personius said.

There are other factors in the operation of bus-lines that have led to profits in the past few years.

During World War II, the Twin Falls, Idaho, New, line was a vital link in the transportation of soldiers and their families. It was a link in the chain of service, representing the ultimate in convenient bus travel. Many of these are still in use in the local area by business firms or individuals.

At that time, Mr. Personius said, you could purchase a good bus for around \$5,000. Today they must have air conditioning, tinted picture windows, rest-room and lounge facilities and cost around \$50,000.

"This is progress and the traveler wants and expects the best of whatever line he travels," the businessman said.

Back in 1926 when the line first began operating, a passenger could travel the 113 miles to Weiler for \$8 and he could get the same with a lot more comfort and speed today.

In the 43 year interval, the fare dropped to well below that figure during depression years and the value of the dollar has fluctuated considerably. Most other costs of 1926 including fuel, tires and repairs have been far overshadowed by those of 1969, but the fare still \$8.

Here is a hand from a match between Britain and Venezuela which should present no problem in the play, yet one declarer had a blind spot and made a play that might well have been the most expensive of the year 1968.

Then he returned to his hand with the queen of hearts, led his four of spades and finessed dummy's nine. When that hold he discarded a club on the jack of spades and claimed 13 tricks on a cross-ruff.

Victor remarked: "I hope Venezuela doesn't get to seven. If they do, they will have to make. The Venezuelan declarer went into a long huddle at trick one. Finally he won the club in dummy and played two rounds of trumps. Then he thought again and eventually played the ace and another club.

A Nightingale Sang!

The horrors of war were all around this famous author—then the trilling of a bird foretold the gentler blessings of peace.

One of America's most distinguished authors, MacKinlay Kantor was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for his Civil War classic, "Andersonville." Among his other notable works appear such familiar titles as "Spirit Lake," "The Voice of Bugle Ann," "Long Remember," and "Happy Land."

Mr. Kantor's most recent work was "The Day I Met a Lion," a collection of articles, anecdotes, and essays. The title piece of that volume appeared first in the pages of FAMILY WEEKLY.

The incident related here, although it occurred late during World War II, has a contemporary significance. Here with it is dedicated to the hope that the New Year will bring a victorious termination to the tragic war in Vietnam.

The Editors

V-2s had stopped during the month just past. It was April of 1945, and the V-1s had stopped also, and London lay stretched at night, awaiting more wounds. There was the long habit: how many die tomorrow?

Detonation of a V-2 rocket was a mighty blast, sometimes too heavy for ears to accept. Many folks who had been near when one went off, and who had survived the concussion, swore that they had heard not a sound. The killed lay undisturbed through slow settling brick-and-plaster dust, and many times were not torn at all. They died from the sudden extinction of their own hearts and breathing.

V-1s sounded like scooter-bikes. They popped and burbled, they went chop-chop and putt-putt. Then the engines cut out, and you'd wait for them to come down, and wonder in which direction their stubby wings would bear them as they swooped to burst.

And there had been that ragged history of numberless aerial bombardments: cargoes of bombs sinking from planes, the ack-ack answering, batteries over In Hyde Park and Regents Park and all those other parks, batteries hanging at the haunted sky. Strange new missiles resembling old-fashioned fireworks fun-dragons or shooting stars, orange cones spinning up, and all the searchlights sweeping.

This was no more. People opened their mouths as if to speak about it and then wisely decided to wait, to say nothing. Because nobody could be quite sure.

I had flown my last mission on April 13. Now-

days I was shuttling constantly back and forth between London and France, consulting with historians of both the Eighth and Ninth Air Forces and officers at USSTAF Headquarters, trying to do a job for General Spatz. Nighttimes I played hooky.

The Honorable Theodora Benson and I had dinner together, that evening of April 13, and we talked late in front of her Hampstead fireplace. The Honorable Theodora was and is an impressive woman, not only because she is the daughter of Lord Charnwood (he wrote the only definitive biography of Abraham Lincoln which was ever published, I think, by a Britisher) or because of her own numerous accomplishments in the literary field, but also because she was a wheel in the Ministry of Information and was regarded there with trust.

So it was mighty late, and I said that I'd better go hunting for a taxicab, and the Honorable Theodora said that there wasn't a taxicab to be had for love or money—not in all Hampstead—and please to remember also that the Underground had stopped running ages ago. Her modest staff of one had long since retired, but there was a room ready and waiting. The room had been prepared for Theodora's brother-in-law, newly liberated from a prisoner-of-war camp, but he wasn't due for a few days yet. Everything ready, even to fresh toothbrushes, soap, and a razor.

She escorted me up to the third floor of this house at No. 10 Downshire Hill. She explained the mysteries of light switches and blackout curtains and wished me a good night. Soon I was fast asleep and dreaming of home—which meant, in that season, Florida and mockingbirds.

Never had I heard a nightingale. (But I knew our own ugly-named *Mimus Polyglottos* and had heard people who knew both birds argue extensively as to which was their favorite. Some said the mocker, some said the nightingale; some had no fault to find with either songster and were only thankful that America owned the mockingbird and Europe the nightingale, and God pity all regions of the earth where neither of these magicians might ply his skill!)

As for our gray mockers in Sarasota County, I'd grown familiar with dozens of them through the years. Perpetually they nested in bushes along the edges of our lawn and spouted their trills from the bare branches of tallest pines. Some were like pots and followed us down to our beach or to the mailbox. Some were more adept at mimicry than others (or else more willing to

imitate). In addition to native fluency, they'd try to be the children's bicycle bells or the yardman's hymn-whistling. Other individuals seemed to forgo to so demean themselves.

Why, after all, should any bird copy the conduct or utterance of mankind? They lived aloof in their old-Quakerish clothes but with another garb of pure melody to hang around them almost visibly when the mating season came.

Transported thousands of miles out of mid-night London, I floated to Siesta Key . . . hibiscus was thick, so were oleanders. Shell lilies would be bending their weight of gold and pink blossoms when day came.

But just now? Dream or no dream, it was the middle of the night and the middle of mockingbirds' inexplicable joy. Chuck-will's-widows (our Southern whippoorwills) may have been chanting their own plaint beforehand, but it seemed that they had stopped to listen. So had any gull or heron, come croaking in from the Gulf. They'd surrendered, closed their beaks. The mockingbird ruled. It was as if he coaxed from high limb to high limb in moonlight, and the imagination sought to follow and to track him. Yet he was too remote and high, too spectral, and too elusive.

I found myself sitting up in bed. The world around me was still the London world. I hadn't been whisked miraculously to our American live oaks and sassafras palms. But the universe rang with inane music beyond those open windows.

All the blackout drapes had been opened before I went to bed. Thus, even in sleep, I might observe the weary plough of a long-hammered metropolis, the little moan or mutter it made . . . slow ploughing of some vehicle (military, probably) along Hampstead High . . . footfalls of lovers creeping home, a Jane or two away . . . steady steps of the doctor who went to help a life in its burning or its vanishment.

I threw my shirt around my shoulders, made my way to the window, leaned there. Mockingbird? A mockingbird in London? Might we paraphrase an old popular tune and tell that a mockingbird sang in Berkeley Square?

The most tender and intrepid poetry was being cried aloud. I tried to spot the location, listening and tense with that fierce desire to hold, to grasp, to retain forever—the desire which overyields an individual in his moment of unexpected encounter with a beauty he cannot even recon.

Yes, yes, across Downshire Hill, across the pavement; but further away, below the slope,



farther down, away beyond the incline. Over there the moonlit trees were thick; I remembered them in late daylight. A wall? Some sort of wall, and trees beyond—it was like a park, and no bombs had mutilated that particular arborescent thickness, no guns had flashed there.

*I cannot see what flowers are at my feet,
Nor what soft incense hangs upon the boughs—*
I had been drugged with sleep; I was past 40, I was anesthetized with middle-aged slumber because I had been trying to keep up with men who were young enough to be my sons. The body had balked and groaned, so had the brain.

Nor can I now identify the moment in which I first realized the nature of the fluting and knew that I was listening to a nightingale . . .

*In some melodious plot
Of beechen green, and shadowy numberless*
My hands and feet were trembling, arms and legs jelled. There was one awful moment when I thought that I had leaned too far and might topple out of the window. Because emotion was warring with memory; and both emotion and memory were being called to account by common sense.

No, no, it couldn't be a nightingale, this wasn't yet summer!

Hold on, wait a minute. Yes, there was the recollection of something read, one time, barely

retained . . . nightingales were apt to reach England by mid-April, but seldom sang after mid-June; and always were gone back to Africa by the end of summer.

Yet I wondered again: "Am I imagining, after all? Is it because the weapons were too fearsome, too calamitous and bass-voiced? Might not a man be demanding nightingales merely because the cruel monstrosities have ceased? Could there be a more luxurious contrast?"

And I remembered how the flak was still red-hot when it came down, spitting and bounding off the pavement; and those sloping settling piles of structural garbage, with raw laths sticking up, holding scraps of worn lace curtains and cabbages and broken bottles and wrecked portraits, all smoking together; voices of the ARP men saying, "Quick, Geordie. Thought I 'eard someone under 'ere . . ."

Had this awareness sent me butterfly-chasing after mockingbirds and nightingales?

There, there! Over among the trees . . . it was moving, singing on the wing. It yodeled a prayer and exultation, it cheerily screamed its apology for the wickedness of a war now ending.

"I am opening a door for you," cried the nightingale. "A very gentle door, and you must move with tenderness and appreciation as you come through; or else I shall go on and on, and leave

you; and never fly and never sing for you again."

I could quote from the poem, but only in fragments; couldn't put the thing together as was needed sorely.

Music had ceased "upon the midnight, with no pain." Finally after trying to sleep again, I got up; drew the curtains, turned on the lamp; and hunted among generous bookshelves lining the walls. Soon I found the poem; it had to be there, I had to find it. I lay upon the bed and felt the religious experience of reading slowly that entire ode in its antique type. And witnessed the date—1819—and marveled again; and knew that it was spring when Keats wrote those lines as if a nightingale were singing them outside.

Possibly a couple of years before he made his sombre journey to Rome . . . consider an inconspicuous grave near the pyramid of Caius Cestius. *Here Lies One Whose Name Was Writ in Water.*

Light oozed around edges of the curtains. I'd fallen asleep again, with the volume of poetry beside me and draperies still drawn. I barely had managed to turn out the lamp, that was all. So I climbed up, dragged heavy cloth away from the windows, and saw sunrise.

A thought came: If I were to go out and walk these slopes, I might hear it again. The nightingale does sing in daytime, too, they say, just as our mockingbirds at home sing both by day and by night. And always when their hearts tell them to.

Perhaps I'd meet the creature and could fall down and bless its sad and patient colors.

Then, so help me, ensued one of those moments which sparkle like magic metal through the heavy ore of a lifetime. For after I'd tiptoed down long stairways and lost myself out at the front door and arranged the locks so that I might get back in again; after I'd cut diagonally across a completely empty street and stolen along a wall, I came to a turning. And distant color of a house could be seen through the gateway, trees, and unkempt bushes.

There was a small plaque. I bent to read it, and suddenly the world was swimming.

Here stood, bravely unhurt, the house of John Keats.

Bombs and rockets had spared this shrine. It lived, with its line of soloists protracted and rejoicing through 126 years. A nightingale inhabited John Keats' own garden, and it had flown and sung and was the first nightingale I ever knew.

Thou wast not born for death, immortal Bird!

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JEAN-CLAUDE KILLY:

How He Became the Glamour Boy of Sports

This handsome French ski whiz has parlayed three Olympic gold medals into a million-dollar bonanza.

HE WON'T leave Hollywood as long as a famous actress (married) is there, says one movie gossip columnist. Another spotted him with the estranged wife of one of the world's richest men, and now he is being romantically linked with her.

This kind of attention is usually reserved for the super-rich and for superstars—and that about describes Jean-Claude Killy, France's Olympic triple-gold-medal skiing marvel.

For Killy is the hottest property in the world of sports since golf's Arnold Palmer. He is even being managed by Mark McCormack, the Cleveland lawyer who made Palmer and Jack Nicklaus millionaires. Loaded down with endorsement offers, movies, tv, magazine offers, and newspaper interviews, Killy has little time for the thousands of girls, most of them teen-agers, who besiege him wherever he goes—he's just too busy making a million dollars.

The Madison Avenue personification of youth and speed, the symbol of the "go" generation, Killy the

superstar has become Killy the salesman. This glamorous transition is the subject of a David Wolper tv documentary which has Killy fighting bulls, bicycling in Central Park, driving a souped-up Dune buggy in Nevada, water skiing, surfing, and swinging in New York City's newest discotheque.

When not in front of someone else's lens, Killy is filming a 13-week tv series at the world's great ski resorts for CBS (it starts today); General Motors has him peddling a Camaro, the auto manufacturer's sports model; Citroën is launching a new line of men's heavy products with Jean-Claude as Mr. Citroën, of course; *The Ladies' Home Journal* has signed a \$250,000 contract with him for a fashion feature, his autobiography, and various other "Killy byline" stories. All this plus the obvious ski-apparel endorsements.

Part of the explanation for his fabulous success lies in the good fortune of his timing. Killy arrived on the top level of the ski scene at just the right moment. International ski racing became a regular feature on the American skiing circuit in 1964—just as Killy and his French teammates were beginning

to dominate the sport.

Killy's exploits in such American ski areas as Franconia, N.H., Vail, Colo., and Sun Valley were widely reported and televised. He won race after race, and anyone watching him wondered how he managed to do it. In becoming the world's best skier, he had developed such a breakneck, acrobatic racing style that he always seemed on the brink of disaster. He skied with abandon, seemingly caring little for life or limb. This style endeared him to sports buffs of all ages—and particularly to women.

Singlehandedly he bridged the generation gap. He looks frail, although he doesn't have the strength to slide on his skis for two miles, much less to travel 60 mph on them. With close-knit eyebrows and cool gray eyes, he usually appears slightly embarrassed and shy.

He's wildly popular with men, too—because he doesn't look so darned capable, like a Joe Namath or a Johnny Unitas looks capable. He doesn't overpower you but seems about as incapable of star performances as you are.

By the time he won the world ski racing championships in Portillo, Chile, in 1966, he already was becoming the sort of cult figure that found airline stewardesses carrying his photograph in their wallets and secretaries pasting magazine covers of him above their desks. Then came the Grenoble Olympics last winter and, while watched by 50 million Americans, Jean-Claude Killy won three gold medals—a feat achieved just once before, by Toni Sailer of Austria at the Cortina Olympics in 1966.

There is more to the Killy charisma than this, of course. He loves America—and it shows. His best friends on the ski circuit have been members of the U.S. ski team. They are more relaxed than the Austrians," Killy says. "They don't take everything so seriously. They know how to laugh when they lose and laugh when they win and to relax in between times. I learned a lot from them about relaxing. That has

helped me in racing."

Next to his home in Val d'Isère, France, Killy loves the American West best. The first things he puts on when he gets to the Rockies for ski competition, for example, are a cowboy hat and boots. Then he heads for town to look for antique American guns to add to his collection.

He was almost involved in a Western melodrama after the World Cup races (which he won) in Jackson Hole, Wyo., in 1967. Killy and the whole French team took over an antique stagecoach that was the signpost and prize of a local motel and began pulling it through the streets at midnight, playing a scene from a Western film. The town sheriff and his deputies arrived, and it began to look like a showdown at the OK Corral. The French slammed out of trouble, doing no damage except leaving a few lawmen, not so dexterous, lying in the mud.

For relaxation, Jean-Claude retreats to Val d'Isère, the simple mountain town where he has lived since he was three. There much of his time is spent answering fan mail—he receives some 50 letters a day, mostly from teen-age girls. "The letters come from all over the world," Killy says, "even from behind the Iron Curtain. Usually the letters are addressed with just 'Jean-Claude Killy, France' or 'The Skier, Val d'Isère.'"

Every letter gets answered and is accompanied by a signed photo of the world's greatest skier. Killy autographs the pictures while eating an apple. He eats an apple before every meal. So it won't be long before some food company jumps at the chance to put out "Killy applesauce—favorite of champions." ♦

■ Packages of spaghetti and noodles may be found in the kitchen of just about every good cook. Using those pasta products in these interesting recipes will add pleasing variety to family meals.

Cottage Noodle Casserole

- 8 oz. wide egg noodles
- 1 cup butter
- 1 env. (1½ oz.) onion soup mix
- ¼ cup butter or margarine
- ¼ teaspoon dry mustard
- 2 cups large curd cottage-style cottage cheese
- 1 can (1 lb.) applesauce
- ¼ cup dark seedless raisins, plumped
- 1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

1. Cook noodles in boiling salted water as directed on package; drain.
2. Meanwhile, bring the 1 cup water to boiling in a saucepan. Reduce heat and stir in the onion soup mix; butter or margarine, and mustard. Cover and cook the onion soup 10 min.
3. Toss noodles with the onion mixture, cottage cheese, applesauce, raisins, and half of the shredded cheese.
4. Turn into a 2½ qt. casserole. Sprinkle top with remaining cheese.
5. Set in a 350°F. oven 30 min. or until thoroughly heated.

Spaghetti Supreme

- 7 oz. spaghetti
 - 3 tablespoons olive or other cooking oil
 - 2 tablespoons snipped parsley
 - 1 teaspoon basil leaves, crushed
 - 3 cloves garlic, minced
 - 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
 - 1 teaspoon anchovy paste or 3 anchovy fillets, mashed
 - ¼ teaspoon salt
 - ¼ teaspoon Accent
 - ¼ teaspoon pepper
 - ¼ cup water
 - ¼ cup shredded Parmesan cheese
 - ¼ cup heavy cream
1. Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water as directed on package; drain.

2. Meanwhile, add parsley, basil, and garlic to hot oil in skillet and cook about 3 min., stirring occasionally.
3. Mix in the mustard, anchovy paste, seasonings and water and simmer the sauce about 5 min.
4. While sauce is heating, alternate layers of hot spaghetti and cheese on a platter kept hot in oven.
5. Stir cream into the sauce, heat thoroughly (do not boil), and pour over the spaghetti. Serve immediately.

About 5 servings

Orange Noodle Dessert

- 1 lb. wide egg noodles
- 5 or 6 Navel oranges
- ¼ to ½ cup lightly packed brown sugar
- 5 eggs (about 1 cup)
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1½ tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
- ¼ cup dark seedless raisins, plumped
- ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¼ cup butter or margarine, melted

1. Cook noodles in boiling salted water as directed on package; drain.
2. Meanwhile, grate enough peel from the oranges to make 1 tablespoon and set aside. Pare oranges and section them. Toss sections with brown sugar and wet sugar mixture aside.
3. Put eggs, grated peel, sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, and lemon juice into a large mixing bowl; beat well. Mix in noodles, nuts, and raisins.
4. Turn one half of the mixture evenly into a well-greased 3-qt. shallow baking dish. Spoon orange sections over first layer. Top with remaining noodle mixture. Sprinkle with ¼ teaspoon cinnamon. Pour melted butter or margarine evenly over all.
5. Bake at 350°F. 45 min. Remove from oven and cool.
6. Cut slightly warm or chilled dessert into squares and serve with whipped dessert topping.
