## Soviets Launch Flier

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union sent a manned Soyuz spacecraft into orbit around the earth today on what the Russians said was a "complicated" program. There was speculation the cosmonaut would attempt a space linkup with another craft as a first step toward establishing a space station.

Within minutes after the launch, the pilot, Lt. Col. Vladimir Shatalov, told a television audience, "Everything is fine. I am fine." The lone spaceman reported success in a number of manual operations and said he had locked his solar batteries onto the sun to maintain power.

In a move unprecedented for the Soviet Union, Moscow television within 90 minutes of liftoff broadcast videotapes of Shatalov's ship soaring majestically from the Soviet's Central Asia space center and curving toward orbit.

The Russians broadcast pictures of the launch of Soyuz 4 November about 30 hours after it left its launch pad, also unprecedented for the Russians. Previously no launch was shown on television until four years after the event.

As usual, the Soviet Union did not detail goals of the latest flight. But the news agency said it was a "mission to match America's Apollo 8."

U.S. space experts said the Soviets had a "window" for a shot at the moon if Soyuz 4 was to jump from earth orbit toward a lunar mission to match America's Apollo 8. But most speculation centered on a linkup with unmanned Soyuz 23 satellite, sent off Sunday, or for docking with a manned spacecraft yet to be launched.

## Guardsmen Held In Weapons Probe

LITTLE FERRY, N.J. (UPI)—Two sergeants and a civilian employe of the National Guard were under arrest today and a truckload of apparently stolen military weapons was in the hands of federal agents who had broken up one of the nation's largest black markets in guns.

# Airliner Crash Kills 15 At Los Angeles Airport

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Fifteen persons were believed dead today in the crash of a Scandinavian Airlines System DC-8 during a landing approach to Los Angeles International Airport.

Indication of the fuselage of the liner broke in two just after the wings when the plane hit the water about eight miles offshore during a rainstorm. The tail section almost immediately in 300 feet of water.

The Coast Guard reported early today that four bodies had been recovered from the choppy sea and 11 more persons were missing and may have drowned. There were 30 known survivors among 115 persons aboard.

A massive search for the missing began at dawn but hope was fading. Sharks were reported in the area and small boats were almost all posted because of the rough seas.

Six crewmembers, including the pilot and co-pilot, survived. The remaining three, including two stewardesses, were dead or missing.

The jet pancaked on the water after the pilot, Kenneth Davies, a former RAF flyer who now is a Swedish citizen, ordered the control tower "Something is wrong with my landing gear." The jet faded from radar screens in the lower Los Angeles Center it was three miles from the runway.

Passengers said there was no warning when the plane hit the water. One said the first indication of trouble was a "bumpy landing."

Olof Anderson, 38, an SAS pilot on leave and honeymooning with his new bride, said: "Everything was calm and quiet until about everything happened. I first thought we had just had a hard landing. Then I saw the water coming into the plane."

He and his wife both were able to reach a life raft and saved. The survivors were taken by helicopter to the coast, the closest harbor to the scene. They were rushed to Santa Monica Hospital and Los Angeles City Hospital, where they were reported seriously injured.

There was no immediate explanation of why the jet lost control. The Federal Aviation Agency said a natural question was why the passengers were not warned the plane was going into the water.

# Harriman Nears End Of Role In Paris

PARIS (UPI) — With less than a week left in the Johnson administration, Ambassador Averell Harriman today began his formal goodbyes as chief of the U.S. negotiating team at the Vietnam war talks.

Harriman, who will be succeeded by Henry Cabot Lodge when Richard M. Nixon is inaugurated president Jan. 20, is scheduled to leave Sunday for Washington, where he will return.

Harriman said Monday it makes no sense to speak of winning a "limited war" such as Vietnam, but that America should concentrate on doing what it has pledged to do—such as reaching the point of self-determination for Vietnam.

He said that the press and the public will realize this and not talk about winning a war but rather of achieving these objectives.

Harriman added that both sides are now committed to the talks and, although time and patience are needed, "I believe that out of the negotiations a peaceful solution will come."

Harriman was guest of honor Monday night at a reception given at the headquarters of the Vietnamese delegation to the talks, Pham Dang Lam. The ambassadors of all the allied

## Mini-Cassia Concert To Feature Bass-Baritone

BURLEY — Raymond Michalski, a bass-baritone, will be the guest artist at 8 p.m. Jan. 18 during Mini-Cassia Community Concert in the Burley High School auditorium.

One of his outstanding achievements was the creation of the role of Alexus in Samuel Barber's "Anony and Cleopatra" at the gala opening of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York.

Michalski made his recital debut in 1968 on the west coast in Los Angeles.

He was heard on nationwide television with the NBC Opera Company, and in a special performance of "Messiah" with the Handel-Haydn Society of Boston, as well as being heard on Radio Free Europe.

It was his father's singing that provided the initial inspiration for Michalski's study of music.

At the age of 14 he started on the piano and to this day he is a fine pianist.

Not until after his Army service did he seriously consider vocal study and begin to work at the Mannes College of Music, New York.

Michalski is accompanied at his recitals by his wife, Nadine, who also sings and teaches.

On that occasion, his voice was called "rich, textured, ample range, power and stylistic polish."

The "New York Times" echoed itself a year later after his second New York recital: "His performance is the kind that allows the listener to sit back and relax without worrying over the possibility that something disconcerting might happen. His voice is supple and resonant, his musicianship good, and communication—of mood comes easily."

They had also heard him with the American Opera Society, and audiences and critics alike had praised his exceptional talent.

In Chicago, he has performed both in concert and opera, meaning praise similar to that received in New Orleans, Pittsburgh, Washington, Toronto and Boston.

In a career assisted by the Sullivan Award, further enhanced by winning two Rockefeller grants and First Prize in the International Music Festival in Munich, Michalski has sung in opera, oratorio and with orchestra with the same stunning success as greeted his debut recital in 1959 in New York City.

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## Mental Health Clinic Is Sighted For Burley Area

BURLEY — Investigation into the feasibility of the establishment of a full time Mental Health Clinic in the Mini-Cassia area appears favorable, reported Dr. Kelsey, chairman of the Joint Hospital Planning Committee.

Local physicians Dr. Arthur Dalley and Dr. Charles Terhune, supported by Dr. Myrick Pullen, director, division of Mental Health; Dr. Luther Thompson, medical director, South-Central Health District; Dr. Fred T. Kolouch, department of psychiatry, University of Utah Medical Center; and Jack Steneck, assistant director, division of mental health, met with the Mindoka and Cassia County Commissioners last week to review some of the problems suggesting a strong need for development of the clinic.

Dr. Pullen and Mr. Steneck offered strong recommendation for development of a clinic on a local level which, in their opinion, would be superior to the present methods and in the long run less costly.

In speaking for the various medical members of the community, Dr. Dalley indicated that every physician presently had patients who would benefit from the development of such a clinic.

Such problems as drug abuse and increased trend in the incidence of dope usage by the younger population has resulted in increased life-threatening crises.

Dr. Terhune said that increased physician intervention in these crises at the present level must be supported by qualified medical psychiatric consultation and continuous follow-up.

# Retirement Credit Cuts Tax

Editor's note: It is time to think about the income tax again. This is Chapter Eight of a series reviewing the regulations with emphasis on taking advantage of all exclusions and deductions legally due.

The Retirement Income Credit, always a valuable tax-saver for those entitled to use it, has a double advantage this year. It not only reduces the income tax otherwise due, but it softens the wallop of the surcharge as well.

This twin-action effect is produced because the income tax is first computed without the benefit of the retirement income credit, and then the credit is applied as a direct reduction against the tax itself. The secondary benefit comes when the 10 per cent surcharge (actually a 7 per cent tax for 1968) is effective for only three-fourths of the year is applied. The 7 1/2 per cent multiplied by the reduced income tax (after retirement income credit) and not the original higher income tax.

In some cases the credit goes a step further and eliminates the surcharge completely. The new surcharge is so calibrated that lower income taxpayers are not subject to it. Conceivably, a retiree could be within the range of the surcharge before the retirement income credit, but among those exempt from the surcharge after credit, the credit is applied against the taxable retirement income.

The credit is applied against the gross income, together with any gross rents collected. The credit is 15 per cent of the income, up to a maximum limitation of \$1,524.

For taxpayers under 65 retirement income is only the taxable portion of pensions or annuities received under public retirement systems (for example, civil service employees or employees of city, county,

state, federal government, or school board.) Retirement income, or the maximum limitation, whichever is lesser, is first reduced in two steps before the 15 per cent credit is applied. First reduction is the total of Social Security or Railroad Retirement Act benefits received in 1968. (For many this will wipe out the credit completely.) The next reduction is a portion of earned income beyond certain amounts.

For retirees less than 62 it is the earned income in excess of \$900.

For those between 62 and 72 there is no reduction for the first \$1,200 of earned income. For amounts between \$1,200 and \$1,700 the reduction is 50 per cent of the excess over \$1,200. And if the earned income is more than \$1,700 the excess over \$1,450 is used to reduce the maximum amount of retirement income to be subtracted to 15 per cent credit.

Where husband and wife are each 65 or older and one is fully qualified for the credit, they may compute their credit on maximum limitation of \$2,286 instead of the \$1,524 permitted on separate returns—or where only one spouse is 65.

To be eligible for the credit you must have had earned income of at least \$600 in each of any 10 years before 1968. A widow or widower qualifies if the deceased spouse earned more than \$600 in each of any 10 years before death.

The rules are admittedly complex, but since the savings can be substantial, retirees should carefully consider the retirement credit.

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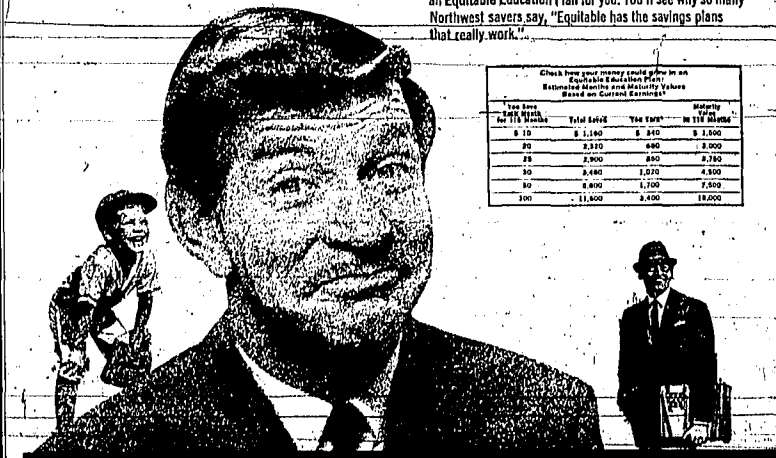

# CBS Leader To Head Up Key Agency

NEW YORK (UPI)—President-elect Richard M. Nixon today named Frank Shakespeare, a CBS television executive who served him as key adviser during his campaign, as head of the U.S. Information Agency.

Shakespeare, 43, and president of the CBS-TV Service Division which includes most of the networks' international operations, was the man who developed Nixon's campaign television format in which he answered questions from panels of citizens. It was considered one of the president-elect's most effective campaign weapons.

The television executive will succeed Leonard Marks, who recently resigned as USA chief, Shakespeare, a native of New York and the father of three children, will resign from CBS to accept the USA post.

Ronald Ziegler, Nixon's press spokesman, announced the president-elect would fly to his vacation retreat at Key Biscayne, Fla., tonight for two days of rest before his inauguration. He will be accompanied only by a skeleton staff and will complete work on his inaugural address.

He is scheduled to return to New York City on Friday, spending the weekend here before heading for Washington Sunday afternoon.

Nixon will leave for Florida after a dinner tonight honoring Maurice Stans, who will be the secretary of commerce in his administration.

The president-elect is making a concerted effort to win support from the nation's intellectuals, who have traditionally been lukewarm toward him.

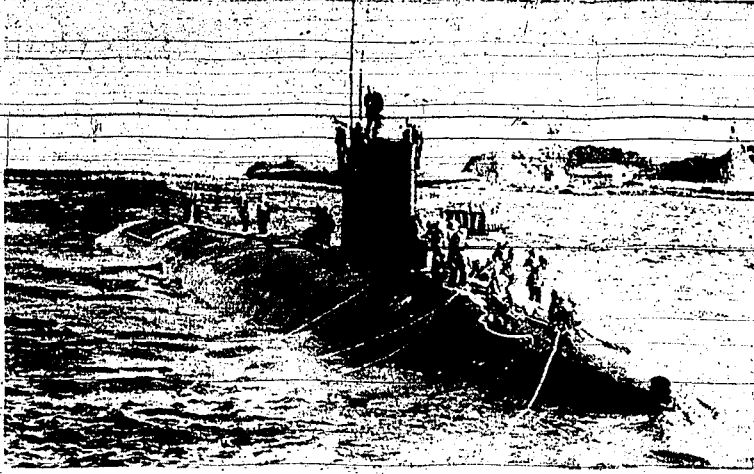

## Weather Forces Sun Valley Airline To Skip Northern Stops Until Spring

GOODING—The weather which has been plaguing the airlines of the West finally caught up with Sun Valley Airline operations and service to five communities all "up north" will be discontinued until April 1, it is announced by D. J. Wilkins, airline president.

Mr. Wilkins said that the five communities having to get along without Sun Valley service until spring will be McCall, Moscow, Coeur d'Alene, Sandpoint, and Spokane, the latter in Washington.

The route structure and schedules in Southern Idaho between Idaho Falls and Boise, remain unchanged for flights 109, 250, 350 and 450. The new schedule, which has been planned in addition to Southern Idaho necessary to the ground support flights, shows that the planes and operation of an airline will terminate flights in Lewis, extreme winter weather conditions.

Complete schedules for the winter are available at the company office in Gooding or at our office in Twin Falls, Burley or Idaho Falls.

"It is unfortunate that the unusually severe winter weather being experienced in Northern Idaho has created operational problems requiring us to make route adjustments," Mr. Wilkins said. "Sun Valley airlines fully intends to provide dependable daily scheduled service to the entire state of Idaho and sincerely regrets that existing difficulties prohibit an acceptable level of service dependability to those areas at this time."

"Due to the fact that the State of Idaho has not yet acted upon our application for a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity to serve Idaho, it is impossible to justify this tremendous investment, until such time as a certificate may be awarded. We anticipate favorable legislation in this session of the legislature."

## Private Found Guilty Of Two Assault Charges

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI)—A 21-year-old Army private was convicted of two assault charges by a general court martial on Tuesday and sentenced to a dishonorable discharge, four years of hard labor and forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

Pvt. James M. Starks Jr., assigned to the 82nd Airborne Brigade in Vietnam, had been accused of punching and kicking Pvt. Kenneth Burnett, guard who joins Services Stockade at Sukiran, on Okinawa, during a disturbance in the stockade last Oct. 15.

Starks-always was charged with holding a razor blade at another prisoner, Pvt. Saunnie D. Jaker, during an incident Oct. 24.

The trial was the first of six being held this week in connection with disturbances at the stockade since a group of prisoners was brought here from the Long Binh stockade in Vietnam.

During the Oct. 24 incident, Starks reportedly held guards at bay using Baker as hostage. The guards allegedly attempted to take Starks in solitary confinement for his previous offense.

"The Oct. 15 incident was allegedly triggered by racial slur, Starks is a Negro, son of a minister in Compton, Calif., he claims he was "educated in Watts" in Los Angeles.

## Leader Of Tax Group Speaks On Fiscal Payments

BOISE (UPI)—Max Yost, executive manager of the Association of Taxpayers of Idaho, Saturday said intergovernmental fiscal payments are becoming a more important factor each year.

In his weekly newsletter, Yost said "To demonstrate the importance of aids in the tax structure of the state, one needs only to convert them to a tax levy, something with which most of us are reasonably familiar."

He said during fiscal year 1968, Idaho received \$62.3 million in federal aids. Net state income tax collections, individual and corporate, including the head tax, was \$38.7 million during the same period.

Yost added if there had been no federal aids and Idaho had kept the same expenditure program, it would have been necessary to have increased the state income tax by 161 percent to have "filled the vacuum."

# Students Reject Offers

SWARTHMORE, Pa. (UPI)—Negro students holding out in the admissions office of Swarthmore College rejected Monday night the concessions made by the Quaker-affiliated school to meet their demands.

Three representatives of the Swarthmore Afro-American Students Society (SASS) told a meeting of the faculty that they were not satisfied with the college's decision to implement faculty resolutions supporting their demands.

The black students indicated the college had agreed to the SASS demands of Dec. 23rd for increased black admissions, but that the concessions fell far short of demands made on Jan. 9 for greater Negro voice in policy-making decisions.

"We are still committed to the occupation of the admissions office" until the demands are met, the SASS representatives said. They called on the faculty to reconsider more fully their second set of demands.

The spokesmen, Clinton Etheridge, Don Mizell and Michael Chavez, also announced additional demands as the price of returning the admissions office to college control.

The new demands were for appointment of a black dean, appointment of an assistant black dean of admissions, amnesty for the demonstrators, and "final approval and disapproval by the SASS" of all decisions to be made by an ad hoc committee on admissions policies for black students.

The black students also increased their demands for admission of black students from 25 to 35 freshmen in each of the next three years and 40 freshmen in each of the succeeding three years. They also boosted demands for the ad hoc committee to include four black students among the five student members and one black faculty member among the three faculty members of the committee.

The sit-in disrupted classes at the school and delayed mid-year examinations.

The suburban Philadelphia school has 47 negro students in an enrollment of 1,024 and 20 of them are taking part in the sit-in.

The college decision to implement the faculty recommendations was announced by President Richard Smith at a meeting of more than 800 students. The recommendations included active recruitment of black students from a community colleges, the appointment of a black counselor, pre-college programs to permit more Negroes to meet entrance requirements and increasing procedures for Negro applicants.

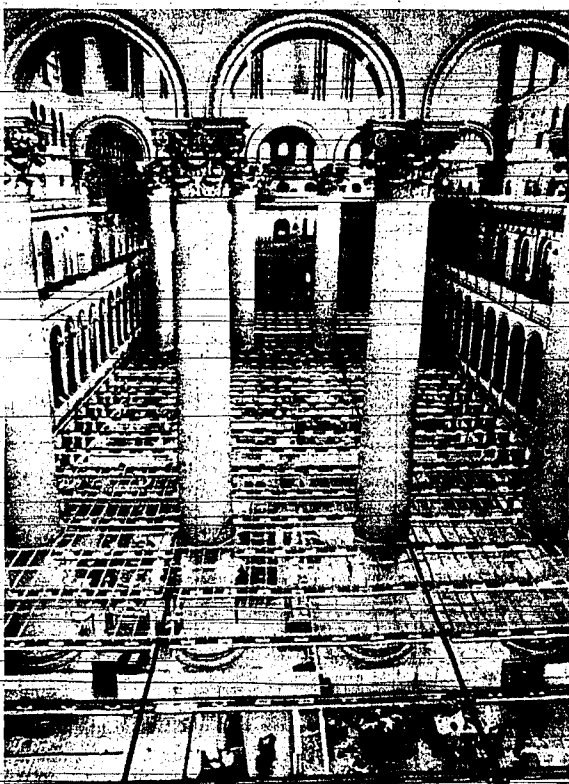
**Emmett Child Killed By Car**

# Most Intermountain States Believed Liable For Heavy Earthquake Damage

Much of the Intermountain area and California and part of Washington State are in areas of potentially major earthquakes, according to the Coast and Geodetic Survey.

In a map released Monday, developed by the U.S. Geological Survey, the map said the nearly all of the 10 western states were listed as potential "major" or "moderate" quake areas. Western Utah, southeastern Idaho, southwestern Montana, northwestern Wyoming, western Nevada and a large portion of California were designated as areas most in danger from earthquake damage.

Other areas of the nation historically subject to heavy damage, according to the survey map, were near Boston, Mass.; Charleston, S.C.; northern parts of states bordering the St. Lawrence River and a portion of Missouri.

# Rainfall Floods Coast

Heavy rains continued to cause flooding in northern California and deluging parts of southern California with rain falls of as much as an inch or more.

Continuing heavy rain that past few days have caused several northern California rivers to overflow, including the Russian, Sacramento, Eel and Van Duzen Rivers.

Rain also fell north of California changing to snow fall north and inland to leave two inches of new snow at Quillayute on Washington's northern coast.

Rain, with snow in the high mountains, fell down the coast and inland to Arizona and western Montana.

Western Montana provided the dividing line of two markedly different air masses: Mild Pacific air to the west and cold, arctic air to the east. The change was sudden, with readings in the 30s and 40s west of the line and 2-below zero to 10 above zero to the east.

The system was expected to move off the lee side of the northern Rockies onto the plains and into the Gulf of Mexico.

Most of the eastern half of the nation got the brunt of another cold temperature onslaught, with below zero readings reported early today in the northeast Wisconsin, including the nation's low at below at Green Bay at 2 a.m. EST.

The temperatures were below the freezing mark as far south as extreme northern Florida.

# Broken Pipeline Inundates Ohio City With Ocean Of Oil

LIMA, Ohio (UPI)—A pipeline break poured thousands of gallons of fuel oil into the streets and sewers of Lima late Monday. A \$200,000 fire destroyed the sewage disposal plant and minor explosions rocked the sewer system, but the threat of widespread fire damage was averted.

A policeman suffered minor facial burns, but no one else was known to have been injured.

About 10,000 persons—4,000 adults and 6,000 children—were moved out of a 12-block area along the route of the sewer line. Officially involved in the flood of oil. They were waiting today for the word to return to their homes.

Officials of the Buckeye Pipeline Co. said a 22-inch fuel line burst at about 4:30 p.m. Monday, spewing oil under pressure into the streets. A spokesman estimated that at least 8,000 gallons—an hour's normal flow—escaped before the line could be shut down. Lakes of highly-volatile oil six inches deep and a block long formed in some places.

Mayor Christian Morris proclaimed a state of emergency and put all firemen, policemen and other city employees on round-the-clock duty. Firemen flushed the oil into the sewer while policemen informed residents of the danger and led them from their homes.

The policeman's face was burned when he lifted a manhole cover and flames erupted from the sewer.

Acting Police Chief Ronald Cook said at 5 a.m. the entire area would be checked beginning at daybreak and all residences would be inspected before persons could return to their homes.

"There's no definite time on when we can let people back in," Cook said.

Cook said fire fighting foam and a pumper were flown in from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base at Dayton. He said the foam has been forced into sewers to prevent more explosions or fires.

He said the large Lima-Baldwin-Hamilton manufacturing plant, located in the heart of the area, was also closed by officials.

"The first floor was completely saturated with oil," Cook said. He said the oil had apparently also damaged other buildings.

"The city set up cots in school gymnasiums. About 2,000 persons gathered clothing and bedding and spent the night in the temporary quarters. Others sought out friends and relatives living in other parts of the city."

"The folks here seem to be in good spirits," said Howard McGinnis, principal of Edson Elementary School. "None of them are kids. The kids aren't afraid. They seem to be enjoying it."

"In fact, the main problem we had was keeping them from running in the hallways," McGinnis said. The city buses carried some evacuees to the schools. Others drove their own cars.

Mrs. Leartha Gorday, one of the 10,000 uprooted, said the emergency did not frighten her. "I don't think anyone was scared, really," she said, "but my husband says he's going to get some insurance on the house for certain now." Mrs. Gorday, her husband and a 4-year-old daughter spent the

night at South Junior High School.

# Sen. Bennett Scores Boost Of Graze Fees

WASHINGTON (UPI)—In a scathing attack on Monday's announced increase of grazing fees, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R-Utah, said "our lame duck administration chose to strike one more blow at our nation's farmers and ranchers before retiring."

The grazing fees are paid by livestock producers who graze cattle and sheep on lands administered by the Interior Department's Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the Agriculture Department's Forest Service.

Bennett said, "The decision to increase grazing fees by an average 250 per cent of forest lands and 100 per cent average 75 per cent on Bureau of Land Management lands over the next 10 years is exorbitant and unjustified."

It has been estimated that 100,000,000 acres in strike net income as a result of the fee increase.

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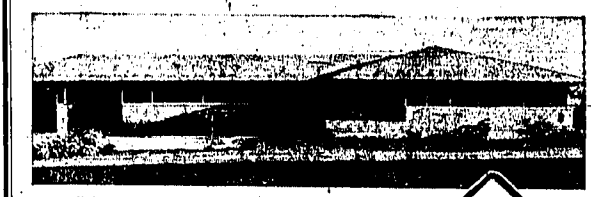

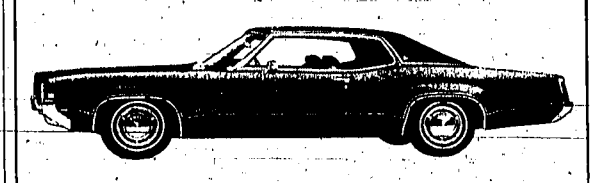

The unit will be constructed in the present nursery area of the Cassia Memorial Hospital with four beds, two of which will be for sound control and cardiac monitoring with the remaining two especially equipped to provide intensive care for other patients requiring extensive specialized nursing care.

## "Underwater" Tests Show How Man Will Function On First Space Station

WASHINGTON (Special)—Engineers have gone "underwater" to learn more about how man and equipment will function in the first United States space station.

For more than three years, design and human factors engineers at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Ala., have been testing their theories and hardware designs in underwater maneuvers, first in a small tank and more recently in a larger, better equipped, Neutral Buoyancy Simulator (NBS).

The NBS today is playing an important role in the design of a number of flight elements which will be brought together in Earth orbit in the early 1970's to form an embryonic space station. This pioneering space outpost is being developed in NASA's Apollo Applications program, making major use of the hardware and techniques developed in the Apollo lunar landing program.

The space agency plans to launch the workshop as part of a two-stage Saturn IB launch vehicle. Once the second stage has propelled itself into space, astronauts lofted by another Saturn IB will rendezvous and go about converting the spent stage into spacious living and working quarters.

The pioneering space station's design is being moved along at a fast clip. As weightlessness is impossible to duplicate on Earth for longer than a fraction of a minute, an effective simulation method was designed to man-rate the workshop equipment. The Neutral Buoyancy Simulator is one of the Marshall Center's answers to this essential requirement.

Test results obtained in this simulator and in previous underwater tests are being fed directly into the workshop design program. Most of the jobs planned for the workshop astronauts will have been tried many times at NBSFC and conclusions reached will be reflected in the workshop's final design. The final decision is expected in May 1969.

The tank is made of one-inch thick steel plate. It has 72 port holes, 36 of which contain high-intensity lamps to light the underwater area. Also, translucent ceiling panels have been installed in the building to let natural light in. The light from those sources plus portable underwater units is sufficient to illuminate the area for documentary photography.

Using Scuba gear and pressurized space suits, design engineers, technicians and professional divers go about "space" tasks in the 75-foot-diameter, 40-foot-deep tank much as they expect astronauts to do. Once in the water, the "simulated astronauts" pressurized suit is fitted with weights to suspend him in a relatively stable position that is to neither rise nor sink. The diver experiences neutral buoyancy similar to the weightlessness of outer space. Space tasks being conducted now in the Neutral Buoyancy Simulator, or the "NBSFC" Manufacturing Engineering Laboratory, include those necessary for the astronauts to activate the orbiting workshop. These tasks include scaling, peening, fitting, moving equipment and experiments and other work.
