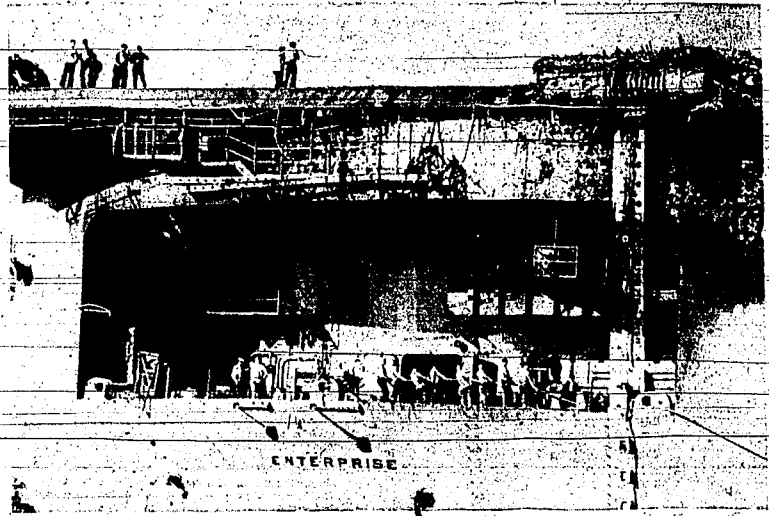

## Nuclear Carrier Badly Damaged 24 Die As Blasts Sweep 'Big E'

PEARL HARBOR (UPI)—Mechanists mate Girard Train started with debris in a 20-foot deep hole in the fire and explosion-torn flight deck of the nuclear carrier USS Enterprise. "Thank God," he said, "they moved me out of that compartment last week."

Soot and grime covering his clothes from hours of firefighting, the 22-year-old sailor from Central Falls, R.I., was among dozens of crewmen who narrowly escaped death or serious injury Tuesday when explosions and fire swept the Big E, the world's largest warship.

The Navy said today 24 men were killed, 17 were missing and 85 injured. Identities were withheld until families were being notified.

The 90,000-ton Enterprise returned to Pearl Harbor showing the scars of the tragedy which one shipyard worker said put it in the worst condition he had seen any ship since World War II.

The inferno erupted at the onset of a practice bombing mission at sea 75 miles southwest of here. Fifteen planes were destroyed.

The ship and her crew of 5,400

men were preparing for their fourth tour of duty off Vietnam. Training flights were in progress with 14 planes already launched when the explosions and flames swept across 75 yards of the rear end of the flight deck shortly after 8 a.m. The planes were loaded with rockets, bombs—and 20-millimeter

ammunition to be used in a mock attack on the small island of Kahoolawe, a frequent bombing target used by Navy carrier planes before assignment to Vietnam.

The blasts and blaze ripped three large holes from the flight deck to compartments three levels below, and touched off a rescue mission involving dozens of emergency helicopters and more than 1,000 persons from Honolulu.

## Williams Urges Competition On Fire Policy Bids

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's State Auditor Joe R. Williams Tuesday suggested the state call for competitive bids for fire insurance for timber protective associations.

Williams noted at a meeting of the state land board, that timber protective associations handle their own insurance. The state owns 62 per cent of the land in the Clearwater-Pulaski Association and about one-third of the land in the Priest Lake Association.

The budgets for the protective associations were approved with the understanding that the state would look into the possibility of ending for competitive bidding.

In other business, the land board agreed to swap 54.8 acres of state land for the city for a golf course in return for 20 acres of land for the new governor's mansion. The swap is subject to the approval of the secretary of the interior.

## Air West May Fold If CAB Nod Delayed

RENO, Nev. (UPI)—Unless the Civil Aeronautics Board acts on Howard Hughes' purchase of Air West as "fast as possible" the airline may be doomed, a Hughes spokesman revealed here Wednesday.

Frñchka Fox, director of aviation for the Hughes Tool Co., told a CAB official that quick action is needed to insure that the airline will survive.

If the sale is approved by the CAB, Fox said, the service of Air West could be improved in 30 to 60 days.

The poor service has concerned us very much. The trouble has been pinpointed where there will be improvement," he said, and agreed to provide a copy of the agreement.

The CAB should receive this week a copy of the agreement of Howard Hughes to purchase Air West, but there is still no indication how long it will take to approve the deal.

Some actions require many months before the board reaches a final decision and Fox told CAB officials the airline might not survive unless the board acts very quickly.

Air West was formed several months ago by the merger of Bonanza, Pacific and West Coast Airlines. Hughes made an offer to purchase Air West last year, and in December the stockholders approved the sale.

Directors held out for a time, but then decided to sell the airline to Hughes for \$22 a share.

## Russ Loft Three Men To Space

MOSCOW (UPI)—Three Soviet cosmonauts rode a Soyuz 5 spacecraft into earth orbit today barely five miles away from the Soyuz 4 which was launched Tuesday with space man Vladimir Shatalov aboard.

Although Shatalov reported he could see Soyuz 5 plainly, there was no communication between the two spacecraft.

Shatalov rode his Soyuz 4 ship into earth orbit Tuesday and was in his 15th pass around the earth when the Soyuz 5 cosmonauts lifted off.

According to Tass, today's cosmonauts attained the same orbit as Shatalov, a confirmation the Soviets would try the first docking of two manned spacecraft and possibly attempt transferring one man into Shatalov's Soyuz 4.

The announcement said Soyuz 5 was circling the earth every 88 minutes and 42 seconds, 27 seconds faster than Shatalov, but its angle to the equator, 51 degrees, was precisely the same.

It was the Soviets' first major step in a program to establish earth orbiting manned space stations for future interplanetary travel.

Never before have two manned space vehicles docked in space, although America's Gemini program included link-ups of manned Gemini capsules with unmanned Agena vehicles.

Shatalov's Soyuz 4 spacecraft is capable of staying in orbit 30 days, and some space observers have thought it possible that the Soviets would change its crew at least once and use it as a manned laboratory.

Shatalov 41, flashing back periodic television reports to Soviet viewers, opened his second day in his 15th orbit. He breakfasted, exercised, and watched pictures of earth and said he was fine.

Tass said his Soyuz 4 spacecraft was a spacious cabin for sleeping, definitely capable of taking on another man in a space transfer.

## LBJ Asks New Peak In National Budget Of \$195.3 Billion

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson today proposed a record \$195.3 billion budget and asserted that every dollar was needed to meet America's "minimum requirements" in the quest for peace, justice and prosperity.

In the final budget message of his five-year presidency, he threw down what amounted to a challenge to his Republican successor, Richard M. Nixon and to the Democratic-controlled Congress to find any place to economize on his spending proposals without jeopardizing national security or the economy.

Johnson's budget for the 1970 fiscal year beginning next July 1 forecast a \$3.4 billion surplus. But achievement of the surplus, which would ease the credit pinch and relieve inflationary pressures, was conditioned on congress approving \$11.9 billion in proposed taxes. Without them there would be an "\$8.6 billion deficit."

## Meat Inspection Future Questioned

BOISE (Special to the Times-News)—The Idaho Legislature this session may be called on to decide whether the state will retain its own meat inspection machinery or abandon it entirely to the federal government.

The issue emerged from Gov. Don Samuelson's State of the State address Monday when he called on the legislature to thoroughly analyze the matter and carefully consider it in hearings.

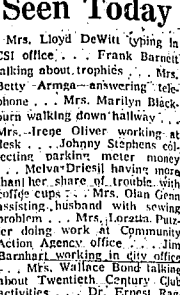

# Judge Releases Key Figure In 1951 Scandal Involving Sale Of Atomic Data

 NEW YORK (UPI)—Morton Sobell, convicted of conspiring to give Russia the secret of America's atom bomb, was freed today, having served nearly 18 years of a 30-year prison term. The 45-year-old former engineer was greeted by his 74-year-old mother, his wife and their two children when he arrived Tuesday night by bus from the federal prison in Lewisburg, Pa. He had been released from prison on a few hours' notice after a federal court ruled Tuesday that he was entitled to credit for 7½ months he served in prison between arrest and sentencing. Those months, added to time taken off his sentence for good behavior, entitled him to an immediate release. Sobell was convicted in 1951 along with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg and Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, David Greenglass, of conspiring to give Soviet agents a sketch of the "Fat Man" atomic bomb which was dropped on Nagasaki in 1945. The Rosenbergs, found guilty of actually handing the sketch to a Russian vice consul in New York, were convicted of espionage and executed June 19, 1953. Sobell's wife, Helen, who had appeared repeatedly for his release, was carrying an armful of red and white gladioli when she greeted him at the Port Authority bus terminal on Manhattan's West Side. There were no tears at their reunion—just a quick embrace before another taxi took them to their Greenwich Village apartment. 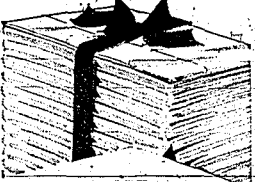

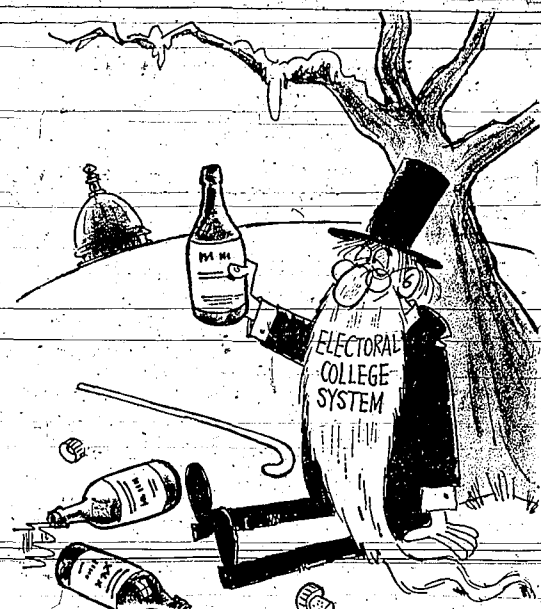

NEW YORK (UPI)—The job of Vice President of the United States "is an awkward office with a good deal of responsibility and little power," according to Hubert H. Humphrey, who must leave the job next Monday.

Humphrey said Monday that his four years as Vice President were years of "ecstasy, pain, humiliation and frustration."

"The definition of being powerful is to be Vice President," Humphrey said. "The definition of being superpowerless is to be a Vice President who is a defeated candidate for President."

The Vice President spoke to about 1,000 persons at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel during a book and author luncheon to promote his new book, "Beyond Civil Rights: A New Day of Equality."

His comments on the vice presidency came in answer to a remark by Alastair Cooke, a British newspaperman, "The Guardian."

Cooke said he subscribed to the view of the Vice President held by American humorist Henry Louis Mencken who called the Vice President "the man who is sitting in the outer office of the President, waiting to hear him sneeze."

"You have never suffered the Vice Presidency, Mr. Cooke," Humphrey said. "How can you really know it?"

Some lamb may be available in some areas. Seafood buys to watch for are canned salmon, fish sticks and portions, and frozen fish fillets according to the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Fresh vegetables in best supply are cabbage, celery, lettuce, onions, and potatoes. Apples, Bananas, grapefruit, and oranges are the most abundant fruits.

# Principals Are Rehired At Jerome

JEROME — Approximately 50 interested persons attended a lengthy school board meeting Monday evening during which all principals were rehired.

Trustees considered the mandatory activity fee now being used. Principals Kenneth Noble of the Junior High and Ace Bahard of the Senior High explained what the money collected is being used for and made recommendations concerning it.

Both recommended the continuation of the fee and if this is not possible, that many of the non-paying activities be eliminated. The board voted to continue the policy for the remainder of the year and review it before starting another year.

Andrew Bybee and Veri Yensen reported on the guidance and testing program currently being used. Yensen explained the Iowa test of basic skills and showed how Jerome students rank in the seventh grade.

Mrs. Cathleen Orr, representing the English department, asked that Title I funds be used for remedial reading beginning in the seventh grade.

A special meeting was set by the board for Feb. 24 to review the total athletic program.

Floyd Cuff appeared before the board and stated that the paycheck of his daughter, who is employed by the Neighborhood Youth program, had been withheld by the principal because her activity fees had not been paid.

Levi Gifford, board chairman, mentioned that the complaint he submitted to the board in writing and promised that some action would be taken.

Warren Van Cinn asked permission of the board to ask approximately 20 senior students on an overnight field trip to the Craters of the Moon on May 16 and 17. Permission was granted providing both a male and female chaperone accompanied the group.

In an executive session, the board requested Frank Rottig, the school attorney, for a written statement on the right to search the student's locker and person and the right to question the students.

# Valley Housewives Caught In Price Squeeze

Not long ago a young housewife went to the supermarket for the week's groceries. When she checked out, the bill was \$11.26 and for the first time Mrs. Mary P. questioned the total. "It's outrageous," she said.

But when she compared the list with her purchases at home, Mrs. P. found the total was correct.

"It wasn't this bad a year ago," Mrs. P. moaned.

And that is the case. The rising cost of living is hurting the wage earner, the person in the middle income bracket. It is killing those in the low income bracket. Even those who are well off are feeling the pinch.

Federal figures show the cost of living has gone up four percent in the last nine months; 8.9 percent in the last year.

Although Magic Valley and Twin Falls are somewhat secluded, the increase in the cost of living is felt keenly.

Mrs. P. actually exists. But her story is the story of many housewives in Magic Valley.

After two years of college and a short stint at a fairly responsible job, Mrs. P. married. Her husband continued to work, but finally fell into a trade. Today he makes \$125 a week. He supports his wife and two children.

"What they were first married," Mr. and Mrs. P. made a combined salary of \$125 a week. That was eight years ago.

Even with the rent payments, the costs for food and the baby and the monthly installment on the new car—a foreign make—they managed to put away between \$50 and \$75 a month.

"We're no better off today than we were eight years ago," Mrs. P. told this reporter. "We bought another car two years ago and in a better installment plan—now we aren't saving anything a month and to tell the truth I don't know how we get by."

They pay \$90 a month for a two-bedroom home. The furniture is paid for, the car costs \$75 a month to repair, operate and keep the tires on a highway.

The food bill runs to \$120 a month, the average.

Doctor's bills came to, just over \$300 last year, but some hospitalization on a group policy, Mr. P. would still be paying for the baby born 18 months before.

Mr. and Mrs. P. maintain no credit accounts anywhere in Twin Falls. They try to pay cash on all expenses, but sometimes the heat or water bills have to be put off a month.

Breaking it down, Mr. P. makes \$6,500 a year or \$541.66 a month. His take-home pay is \$5,252 a year or \$437.66 a month.

He pays \$90 for rent, \$120 for food, \$100 for the car; \$10 for the telephone; \$15 for heat in the winter; \$5 for water and sanitation; \$10 a month for insurance; \$10 for the doctor; \$15 a month for clothing; and \$50 a month for miscellaneous items such as hair, dentist, beauty parlors and entertainment.

This comes to an even \$400 a month. There should be \$37.66 left over at the end of the month.

Of course there never is, no matter how hard Mrs. P. tries.

There are, for instance, the two children. The 7-year-old boy had to have tennis shoes for school, and Mr. P. stopped off at the book store once and purchased two magazines and a book. He also ate lunch downtown five times last month instead of going home.

"The \$17.68 doesn't go very far," Mrs. P. said.

And in light of the present situation, Mr. and Mrs. P. are worried.

"What's going to happen to us if everything keeps going up?"

She shakes her head and wonders because she knows there's no answer, unless she is forced to go back to work or unless the husband takes a second job.

### Traffic Violations Put Big Percentage In Jail

Traffic violators counted for the largest share of prisoners housed during 1968 in the Twin Falls County Jail, according to Sheriff Paul Corder.

He said that 377 of the 850 prisoners booked into the jail were taken into custody because of traffic offenses. There were 208 felony prisoners booked into the jail during 1968 and 223 misdemeanor prisoners. Juvenile offenders counted for 84 of the prisoners and 52 inmates were held in transit for federal authorities.

Sheriff Corder said that about 50 per cent of the traffic, and misdemeanor violators bond out the same day as their arrest. The average time served by prisoners in the jail was just over nine days.

The number of prisoners varies from a low of about 15 to a high of about 40. Sheriff and Mrs. Corder occupy a fourth floor apartment at the courthouse. The apartment is on the same floor as the cell block and Mrs. Corder prepares meals for the prisoners.

During 1968 Mrs. Corder prepared and served 17,341 meals to the jail inmates. Prisoners are fed twice a day, with the exception of a daily trusty who receives three meals a day.

Mrs. Corder does all the cooking by herself, however, as the trusty is kept busy with janitorial type chores.

She said that in an average week about 250 pounds of potatoes are fed to the prisoners. A large quantity of beans, another staple prison diet, also is fed to the prisoners.

County officials are studying various plans to improve jail facilities for county prisoners. Sheriff Corder feels that the present location of the jail could be remodeled and improved to create more space and better conditions for prisoners.

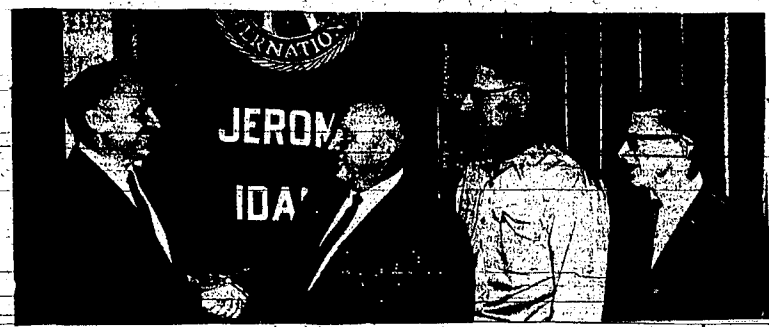

**Dormant Spraying, Pruning  
Discussed By Garden Club**

Mrs. C. W. Newbury, guest speaker, and Clara Walton presented talks on dormant spraying and pruning when the Twin Falls Garden Club held a meeting recently at the YWCA building. Theme of the program was "Magic of Trees and Shrubs."

Mrs. Russell Miller, vice president and program chairman, introduced the speakers. Mrs. Newbury gave tips on use of dormant oil spray to combat various scales and said application should be made any time after first of year when weather was not wet or windy, before leaves emerge. She advocated thorough spraying even on ground underneath to control harboring insects.

Mrs. Newbury warned against spraying blue fanged evergreens as spray destroys the blue color. Among plants affected by oyster shell scale are lilacs, willows, shrub and green ash, pyracantha, spirea and peonies. Mrs. Newbury described the San-Jose scale and showed samples of branches covered with oyster shell scale and cottony maple scale. She answered questions from the audience.

Miss Walton spoke on types of tree and shrub pruning. She noted that Lombardy poplars need trimming every few years to rejuvenate them. Spring blooming shrubs are pruned after blooming. Showballs can be pruned severely. Roses are pruned in the spring for bloom on new wood. Old fashioned roses may be cut back to two or three feet each spring. As long as a plant is in good growth with room to expand little pruning is required. Other types of pruning are pinching back to induce bushiness and removal of spent blooms on annuals to prolong season. Miss Walton said.

Mrs. J. C. Reynolds, president, conducted the business meeting. The collect was read

The next play took a lot of time. South couldn't lose the hand if West held both the ace and queen, he couldn't make it if East held these cards. If they were divided, it was up to South to figure out the "play" held which card. It was no problem for us. We see the cards, but it was quite a problem for South.

As a matter of fact he studied so long that we went away and said "bet" "know" if he guessed right-or-wrong!

This bid didn't keep South from naming spades but it gave him a problem. Should he bid three or four spades? Finally South decided that he would be cold for four if his partner held trump support and a side trick, so South jumped to game.

West really did not have enough to go to five hearts after his partner's pre-empt but West was a pretty smart player and felt certain that a five-heart bid would not be doubled so he got into the act with five hearts.
