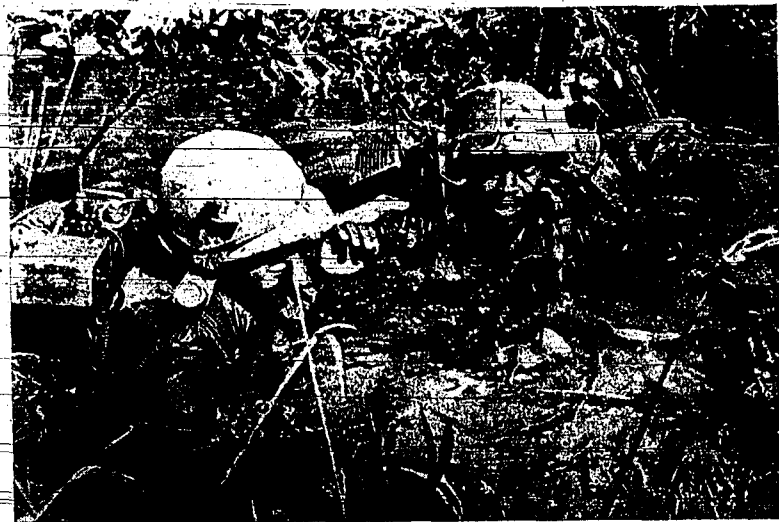

## Nickel Waits For Approval Of Senate While Cabinet Takes Oath Before Nixon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon watched his cabinet members — minus one — sworn today for served notices on them that they will be "a working cabinet."

Chief Justice Earl Warren administered the oath individually to the 11 department heads who were called to the White House ceremony at 8 a.m. EST. Walter J. Nickel, Nixon's choice for interior secretary, was at the White House but lacking Senate confirmation — he could not yet take the oath.

Nixon presided at the ceremony. Pointing out that cabinets of other presidents have had various names in the past — Andrew Jackson called his the "Theodore Roosevelt cabinet" — he called the cabinet and Herbert Hoover's a "cabinet hall cabinet" — Nixon said.

"Due to the fact we started with an 8 a.m. swearing in, we'll call it a working cabinet," Nixon stood beside each man as he came forward with his wife to take an oath swearing to "defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies — foreign and domestic — and accepting their obligations without mental reservations or secret evasions."

At one point Nixon instinctively raised his own right hand as though to take the oath, too, then caught himself and lowered it.

The 11 cabinet members sworn in less than an hour after daybreak were, besides Finch: William P. Rogers, secretary of state; Melvin R. Laird, secretary of defense; David M. Kennedy, secretary of housing and urban development; John A. Volpe, Treasury; Maurice H. Stans, secretary of transportation; Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture; and Winston M. Blount, postmaster general.

Also, John N. Mitchell, attorney general; George Romney, secretary of commerce; George P. Schultz, secretary of labor; and Winston M. Blount, postmaster general.

Also given the oath at the ceremony were Robert P. Mayo, director of the Budget Bureau, and Charles W. Yost, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

## Storm Lashes Valley

Driving snow and below-freezing temperatures, lashed by winds reaching to 35 miles per hour, whipped across Magic Valley Wednesday morning closing schools in Camas and Blaine counties and some highways in the northern part of the valley.

Highway 20-26 was closed Tuesday night because of water over the road between Richfield and Arco. It was opened again at 8 a.m. Wednesday because of freezing temperatures during the night.

Schools were closed in Fairfield because of drifting snow and Halley and Ketchum schools were closed for the second day because of the storm which was abating after four continuous days of bringing precipitation in the form of rain mixed with snow.

Wednesday morning there was rain in the Twin Falls area, but changing to snow, while to the north — the precipitation changed to heavier snow.

State highway crews were still working on Highway 83 over Galena summit which has been closed since Monday because of snow slush. It is anticipated that the route will remain closed until the end of the week.

At Shoshone, which has received rain and snow since Saturday, light snow was falling Wednesday morning. Fairfield reported four inches of snow, accompanied by high wind. It had raised the snow Sunday night, but early Wednesday morning the storm turned to snow.

Four inches of new snow also fell in the Halley area Thursday night, with some drifting reported. Schools remained closed at Carey.

Glenn Brannen, Ketchum city commissioner, said trucks have had to haul away the snow piled in the center of Highway 93, the town's main street, four times since the storm began over the weekend. It is dumped in the Big Wood River.

There were no reports of power outages or of damage in Twin Falls due to the wind but traffic was sparse in the downtown area. By mid-morning, motorists were driving slowly and with their lights on.

Only one minor traffic accident was reported by Twin Falls police during the morning storm and county sheriff's officers had no reports of accidents or damage.

## First Legislative Luncheon Held Legislature Off To Good Start

Twin Falls County legislators told their constituents Tuesday that the 40th Idaho Legislature is moving in high gear, well ahead of the pace in previous years, primarily due to the newly authorized — organizing session held last month.

The legislators were addressing some 30 to 40 persons who attended this session's first Chamber of Commerce — sponsored Legislative Luncheon in American Legion Hall.

Communication between the legislators in the State House in Boise, and those attending the luncheon is over a two-way loud speaker telephone hookup.

Speaker of the House, William Lansing, told the group that "everybody is working. There's no waiting around for things to get going this year." He said that something has been done by the Legislature on more than 350 bills so far. The Legislature was called to order a week ago Monday.

## Bill Drafted That Would Kill Personnel Commission

BOISE (Special to the Times-News) — A bill that would repeal legislation establishing the Idaho Personnel Commission is being drafted for consideration at this session of the Legislature, Rep. Jack Claiborn, R-Twin Falls, reported Tuesday.

The move came on the heels of several meetings of the committee during which Personnel Commission officials appeared to explain measures they advocated to set up overtime pay provisions and change several areas of commission operation.

Asked the reason for the proposed repealer bill, Rep. Claiborn said, "It appears we've set up a little dent that's cost us the taxpayers a lot of money. They have increased the salary schedule of a lot of state employees. When the Revenue and Taxation Committee asked them a couple of months ago for a schedule of the effect this has had on salary scale of other departments, they never got it. There is a lot of feeling that they're just getting too big for their breeches. I doubt whether the repealer will get any place, but it certainly will give the commission an idea of the feelings of a lot of people."

Rep. Claiborn said the Legislature might, however, come out with a new bill that could cause some revisions of or amendments to the present law.

He said there is strong feeling in the committee that amendments to the present law being proposed by the commission are not justified.

repal statutes that established the Personnel Commission.

He also mentioned that the Agriculture Committee, of which he is chairman, will have hearings next week on bills covering use of dedicated funds for various commodity commissions. He said times would be announced.

Rep. Ray Lincoln said the State Affairs Committee has been studying changes in the election laws recommended by an interim committee.

The committee has decided, he explained, to introduce a bill covering all changes recommended as a result of the interim study. The plan is to bring the all-inclusive bill onto the floor of the House where an effort will be made to iron out differences in the Committee of the Whole.

If this fails and the bill is defeated, he went on, individual bills covering non-controversial provisions will be introduced.

Rep. William Roberts, a member of the Appropriations and Finance Committee, said that group already has heard presentations of 26 or 27 major budgets.

It will be about two more weeks before any bills are introduced. See LUNCHEON, pg. 2, col. 4.

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## Legislators Consider Bills For Expenses, School Funding

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's legislators, faced with a multitude of proposals and counter proposals on financing education, ended a "crisis" and then voted \$2,005,000 to pay their salaries and legislative expenses.

A proposed increase of \$15.5 million for public schools in Idaho was termed "not enough to meet the needs of the state," but minutes later the Senate received a bill that would raise the ante to a "satisfactory" \$18 million.

Later in the legislative day, the Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Rep. Jenkin Palmer, said the legislature will exceed Gov. Don Samuelson's budget recommendations for education.

The Senate proposal to bring public school funding to the \$18 million level south by the Idaho Education Association was introduced by Sen. Art Murphy, D-Mollon. "I would appropriate the amount of money from the state general fund for the population totaling \$78,742,000. This bill provides for a \$18 million increase as recommended by the IEA," Murphy said.

"We know the needs, we know that the time to act is now. The money is available without additional taxation," he said.

Shortly before, in a Senate Education Committee meeting, Wayne York, IEA executive secretary, said the proposal by Gov. Don Samuelson to give the public school education just \$15.5 million more would not lift the state from the red ink.

The teachers have urged other educators not to come into Idaho and have asked that no new contracts be signed.

More militant action has been threatened.

The action on the funding of education capped one of the busiest days so far in the 40th session.

Eight bills were introduced and representatives unanimously approved the expense bill. But the traditional "feed bill" to pay the salaries and other expenses received two "no" votes in the upper chamber.

In other legislative developments:

Rep. Lester Hartvigsen, D-Malad, told House members the conditions at the Idaho State School and Hospital were "appalling."

State Agriculture Commissioner Stanley Frenkel told the House Agriculture Affairs Committee it would cost the state about \$500,000 the next two years to comply with the federal meat inspection act.

And, the Senate received a bill that would turn over enforcement of the state law to the State Law Enforcement Department from the State Pharmaceutical Board.

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## Jerome Schools Closed Because Of Flu Epidemic

JEROME — Jerome schools were closed Wednesday for the first time in 25 years because of a flu epidemic here, called "an epidemic of flu, about midway in its course."

At the end of Tuesday's classes, students were told not to return until next week, Supt. William Lipscomb said.

Lipscomb said absenteeism, which normally runs about 10 percent, averaged 20 percent throughout the city schools Tuesday.

The flu "apparently has hit hardest in the junior high age group, with absenteeism there running 25 per cent, and lowest in the grade schools," Supt. Lipscomb said. It would be up to the school trustees to decide when students will make up for the last three days of school.

He said it was the consensus of local doctors that the flu just here was high enough to be termed an epidemic, which is about half way through its course.

### Draft Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A bipartisan panel of legislators joined Wednesday to sponsor a bill to end the military draft and substitute an all-volunteer professional Army.

The bill bore the signature of Sen. Mark O. Hatfield, R-Ore., but was co-sponsored by such Pentagon supporters as Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., and such critics of the Vietnam War as Sen. George McGovern, S.D.

Other co-sponsors included Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan.; Marlow W. Cook, R-Ky.; Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis.; Robert Packwood, R-Ore.; Richard Schweiker, R-Pa.; and Winston Prouty, R-Vt.

President Nixon, during the election campaign last fall, also advocated an all-volunteer Army and end to the draft but with an important qualifier — "when the war in Vietnam is over."

In a statement accompanying the bill today, Hatfield said, "Each man has a moral obligation to serve his country, but he must be granted as much freedom as possible to choose what form this service shall take."

### Lodge Confers With Vietnam War Allies

PARIS (UPI) — President Nixon's new Vietnam War allies chief conferred privately today with representatives of allied nations which have troops in Vietnam but are not taking part in the expanded negotiations opening Saturday.

Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, who began his mission Tuesday by conferring with South Vietnam delegation leader Pham Dang Lam, met today with representatives of South Korea and Australia.

In Saigon, meantime, Prime Minister Tran Van Huong said the outcome of the Paris negotiations will depend on political and military developments in Vietnam itself.

Huong expressed pessimism over any quick agreement between the United States and South Vietnam and North Vietnam and the Viet Cong and the Viet Nam.

### Lawsuit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, told the Supreme Court today his suit against the House for refusing him a seat in the 80th Congress is just as alive as ever even though he was allowed to take his seat in the 81st Congress.

When the House on Jan. 3 seated the Harlan Democrat for this Congress it imposed a \$25,000 fine on him for allegedly misusing congressional funds while chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee in the 80th Congress.

Powell told the high court that the fine represented a continuation of the "illegal and unconstitutional conduct" against him by the House.

Powell's lawsuit against the House comes after he was unconstitutionally excluded from the House on March 1, 1967. He wants his salary restored and reimbursed for the pay he lost during the two years of his exclusion.

Lawyers for the House contend that Powell's suit is a matter for the court of claims to decide but Powell's memorandum insisted that the Supreme Court has jurisdiction over his entire case.

### Surveying Marks Urban Renewal Start

The first signs of an urban renewal project in downtown are visible and officials predict the first relocation of business will come before the end of the month.

The signs of urban renewal include surveying crews and utility lines being "on site" throughout the downtown area. The crews are plotting land in the downtown area and have been doing so for the past two weeks.

Surveyors are under the direction of Paul Newton and Tom Schaefer, engineers, of Twin Falls.

James Kelch, urban renewal agency director, said Tuesday Dean Motor Co. will move from its present location at 126 Second Ave. W.

The property at Dean Motor will be torn down and used as a parking lot for the new Bank of Idaho. It was learned, the new Dean Motor will be located in Twin Falls, but the exact location has not been announced yet.

Mr. Kelch said Dean Motor will get relocation assistance through the urban renewal agency.

He said also that a regulation for \$300,000 has been made to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for the purchase of property, relocation of businesses and for the general administration of the urban renewal project in the future.

A total of \$1,402 million in the form of a grant has been awarded the city for its downtown urban renewal project. The funds are being jointly used with funds from a downtown local improvement district.

### Surveying Marks Urban Renewal Start

Mr. Kelch and L. James Koutnik, a member of the urban renewal agency board of directors, said they are pleased with the progress of the urban renewal project to date. "Things in the downtown portion of Twin Falls are beginning to change. We'll see some real transformation soon," Mr. Koutnik said. The project is a six block area (three to five years.

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# Burley Has Talk On Exceptional Persons

**BURLEY** — Dr. Edwin Burke, consultant to the State Department of Education, spoke on treatment of exceptional persons during the Monday luncheon meeting of the Burley Chamber of Commerce at Bryan's Cafe.

During the early 1800's the first institutions for exceptional people began and they were home-like institutions. By 1869 institutions were preparing the individuals to return to society.

Next came the protective shelter trend, and by 1880's people were believing the retarded person was a menace to society, the speaker said. The exceptional person was isolated and laws were passed forbidding marriages between mentally retarded persons and providing for their care.

From 1918 to 1925 all institu-

tions for the retarded had cells where the people were kept. In the 1960's there were still cases of mistreatment, with persons in the institutions being tied with restraints.

In the last eight years many changes in the treatment of exceptional persons have taken place all across the nation, Dr. Burke noted.

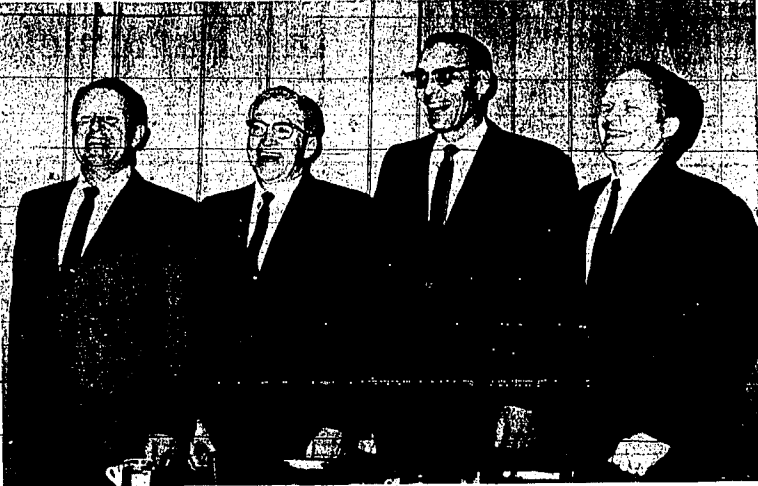
Society is learning to accept the exceptional people and recognize their needs and through different programs are trying to rehabilitate these people.

In Idaho there are 117 school districts but only 39 have exceptional school training programs. These are in 26 counties out of the 44 counties in the state. There are only 23 speech and hearing therapists in the state.

School districts are encouraged to have special classes for emotionally disturbed children, the deaf, the blind, retarded children and also the gifted children.

Presently a joint program between Cassia and Minidoka County Schools is the rehabilitation program which helps the exceptional person learn to work and then get assistance through the program to find employment. Thus the person is able to earn wages and live a near normal life in society.

There are several hundred people who have been rehabilitated this last year and have been released from institutions. Several more could be rehabilitated if the funds were

# Japanese Jet Will Fly Again After Repairs

**SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)** — The big Japan Air Lines DC8 which splashed down into San Francisco Bay last November may take off again by April.

A team of United-Air Lines maintenance workers has been making extensive repairs on the aircraft since it was hauled from the bay. The plane splashed down when 107 persons aboard short of the runway at fog-bound San Francisco International Airport.

Amazingly, nobody was hurt in the mishap, but the \$3.3 million aircraft stayed in eight feet of salt water for 35 hours.

A United spokesman said in a report Tuesday that thousands of feet of electrical wiring had been replaced as well as hundreds of nuts, bolts and brackets. All removable equipment was taken out, but will be reinstalled when the rewiring is completed.

Damage to the landing gear has been fixed and blades in the four big jet engines were washed repeatedly to remove all the salt.

The United spokesman said it was the biggest repair job of its type ever undertaken on a jet aircraft. United has not yet been able to estimate the cost of repairs, but will send Japan Air Lines the bill.

Before the plane can re-enter service, it will undergo extensive flying tests under the supervision of the Federal Aviation Agency.

He said Johnson's move was "a slap in the face" to the state's effort to involve a lot more land in the west.

Utah ranchers and miners have lashed out at the move, which would in effect retract land formerly open to them.

# Bill Pays For Costs Of Meet To Retired Men

**Boise (UPI)** — Idaho's legislators appropriated nearly \$3 million Tuesday to pay their expenses for the next two sessions. The bill is expected to tackle a multitude of major legislation items on Wednesday.

The House and Senate voted in favor of an appropriation of \$2,995,000 to pay salaries and legislative expenses. The traditional feed bill cleared the House unanimously, but received two "no" votes in the upper chamber.

Gov. Warren Brown, R-McCall, said, "I just hate to spend \$3 million without knowing what it is for. I felt the bill should have been explained."

Also voting against the proposal which made it through the Senate 29-2, was Sen. Edith Miller Klein, R-Boise.

Lt. Gov. Jack Murphy, acting governor, signed the measure Tuesday afternoon. It will pay for both the first and second sessions of the legislature in addition to financing several interim studies.

Beginning with the session this year legislators will meet on an annual rather than biennial basis.

Late Tuesday the upper chamber received a bill that would turn over enforcement of Idaho's narcotics laws to the State Law Enforcement Department from the State Pharmaceutical Board.

Also received was a bill from the Senate's Transportation and Defense Committee which would lower the determination of drunk driving based on a blood alcohol per 100 cubic centimeters of blood, to .10 per cent from .15 per cent.

The blood alcohol bill had been requested by the Idaho Traffic Safety Commission and the State Department of Law Enforcement.

Judge Removes Order Banning Merger Meeting

**Wallace (UPI)** — District Judge James B. Towle dissolved a temporary restraining order against a meeting of the stockholders of the First National Bank of Wallace Tuesday. The stockholders had plans to meet Tuesday evening to take under consideration a merger offer from the First Security Bank of Idaho.

Towle had earlier issued the restraining order against the meeting of the stockholders at the request of J. W. Fosbeck and George Albert, stockholders in First National, and H. F. Magnuson.

They contended that the meeting was illegal because the bank's board of directors had not furnished stockholders with enough information about the proposed merger, or about another offer made by Magnuson, W. Turner Giesek and David L. Clack.

The merger, scheduled to be considered by approximately 80 First National stockholders, would give them the equivalent of 3 in First Security Bank stock for each share of First National stock.

Early Session Draws Praise

**Boise (UPI)** — The three-day organizational session in December was termed an advance step reflected in the final start of the 40th Idaho Legislature Monday.

Acting Gov. Jack Murphy intoned the December session and said, "Compliments are in order for both the House and Senate and that includes both majority and minority parties and their respective staffs."

Murphy is acting governor in the absence of Gov. Don Samuelson who went to Washington, D.C. for the Presidential inauguration.

Murphy said that through four terms, totaling eight years in the legislature in which he has served in leadership positions, he has never witnessed a finer, more encouraging start.

Sen. Art Murphy, D-Mullan, Democratic caucus chairman, said the proposed rule would also provide that by a majority vote a committee may resolve itself into an executive session, excluding if it desires, members of the press, legislators who are not members of the committee or any other persons.

House Democrats reported Monday that newsmen should have greater access to committee meetings than in the past. The rule was approved Monday by the Senate Judiciary and Legislative Administration Committee.

The Capitol Correspondents Association, which accredits newsmen covering the legislature, last week asked the Joint Judiciary Committee to approve a rule specifically opening committee meetings to the press.

**Budget Director Called By Panel**  
**BOISE (UPI)** — State Budget Director James A. Defenbach and tax consultant Dol Low are scheduled to appear before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee again Thursday night to discuss revenue projections.

Chairman Allan F. Larsen, R-Blackfoot, said the committee hopes after hearing from them — to be able to come up with a general fund revenue estimate for the next biennium by the end of this week. Such an estimate was requested by the Joint Finance - Appropriations Committee.

Larsen said Defenbach has been "rechecking" his figures to take into consideration the latest income reports. He said Low also has some significant price trends to report to the committee.

**Measure Ratifies Bond Exchange**  
**BOISE (UPI)** — Introduction of a bill ratifying exchange of Boise Junior College territory housing commission bonds for State Board of Education revenue bonds was authorized Monday.

The House Education Committee made the authorization Monday. The exchange would involve \$2,320,000 worth of bonds. Resolutions authorizing such an exchange were adopted earlier this month by the commission and the State Board of Education.

Under the bill, the bond exchange would take place April 15. The board assumed jurisdiction of the institution Jan. 1.

# ISU President Endorses Fund Formula

**BOISE (UPI)** — Idaho State University President Dr. William E. Davis said Tuesday he does not favor any change in the State Board of Education's formula for distribution of funds to the four state institutions of higher learning.

He told the House Education Committee the formula actually favors the University of Idaho at the present time which has a higher percentage of graduate students. He added the overriding principle is "to establish a level of spending" to which the other institutions — ISU, Boise State College and Lewis and Clark Normal — can aspire.

"Davis said, "The University of Idaho is the best funded of all our institutions, but it is not lavishly funded." He pointed out that the board's total budget for higher education of \$37 million for the 1969-71 biennium

is nearly matched by the \$54 million budget of Washington State University for the same period. Dr. Donald Keith, executive director for higher education in the Department of Education, told the committee the board's formula "other than being too low for this state" compares favorably to many of those he studied in other states.

Davis also said adoption of the proposed budget of Gov. Don Samuelson, \$2.3 million less than the \$15.4 million recommended by the board, would force him to consider dropping a number of programs at ISU, including intercollegiate athletics.

## Negro Minister Is Waging His War Against Crime

CHICAGO (NEA) — When it comes to law and order, Negro minister Henry Mitchell scrupulously follows the scriptures of his Bible.

He believes in an eye for an eye.

If somebody shoves him, he says, he'll shove him, somebody kills his cat, he'll kill the damn well go out and kill the dog.

It doesn't matter who is doing the shoving or the killing, either Black man or white. He despises the entire criminal element and his personal vow is to "see them all rotting in jail."

To this end, Rev. Henry Mitchell is waging his own war on crime in the slums of Chicago's West Side. Working through his church (North Star Baptist) and a conservative group called North Star United Missionaries, the minister's fight is bare knuckled and shot from the hip.

He organizes local residents to act as de facto vigilantes, listening posts, counterinsurgent guerrillas. He says he has thousands of citizens ready to react in case trouble busts out in his neighborhood.

Last year, Mitchell offered cash rewards for information leading to criminal convictions. So far, he says gleefully, it has cost him \$15,000.

Mitchell's war is rooted on the premise that citizens must know their enemy. And on Chicago's West Side, he believes, the enemy is mostly black.

8-to-4-ly Carmichael, Rap Brown, the Black Panther, Revolutionary Action Movement, Black street gangs.

These people and groups, according to Mitchell, are the adversaries of all men who want peace and security.

Carmichael, he says, is a "black bastard" and he adds he uses the epithet in its biblical sense. He accuses the young militant of "lying, cheating and exploiting every decent Negro person in America."

"Negroes must realize, says Mitchell, that it is no longer just white men trying to tromp them." "Let me say, the bad Negroes is just as guilty as the Black may be beautiful, he

agrees, but it's not perfection. He remembers Negro ancestry in Africa "where we used to eat each other." He believes some blacks still practice a kind of social cannibalism.

"Brother," he says, his fists clenched for emphasis, "how many cartons of milk has Stokely Carmichael delivered to the poor? How many boxes of clothing has Rap Brown distributed to the cold? Man, them dudes ain't got time for that. What they want to see is the whole country running around eating each other up."

Rev. Henry Mitchell, age 56, runs his personal war on crime from a three-story building (located) on South Pulasky Road. The headquarters structure is as patchy and threadbare as the ghetto which surrounds it.

Mitchell is partly and threadbare also. He says he earns no salary in any capacity (his wife is the breadwinner for their 12 kids) and spends his 12-hour work weeks in two shiny suits and a single pair of shoes.

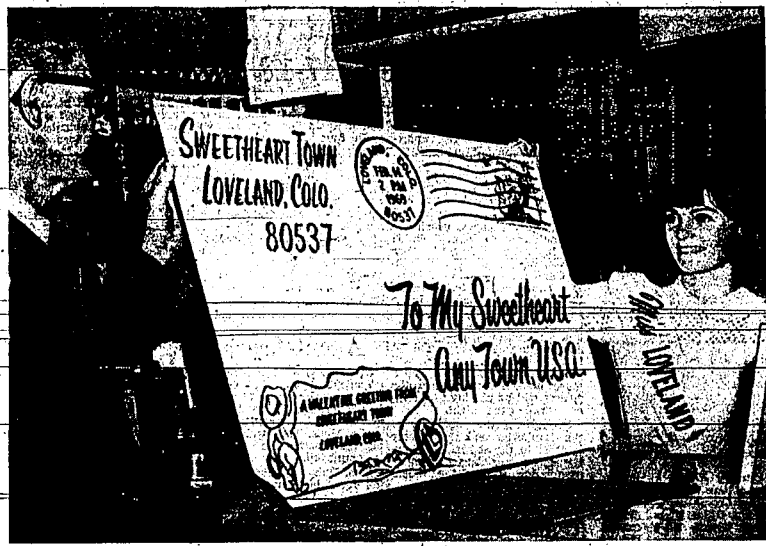
He supposes he could earn some money and move away from the slums, "but that's what too many Negro leaders do." Thus he's content to "stay in the bog, wear dirty clothes, keep my hands right in the mud."

And there is plenty of mud, he says, on the West Side. Hoodlum gangs roam at will providing Chicago-style "insurance" for merchants. Dishonest businessmen prey on ignorant working stiffs ("All you have to do is sign"). Graft and corruption are indigenous to all-walks of life.

Says Mitchell: "We got us a living hell, brother."

Mitchell believes only the people can save themselves from the fires. He urges them to graze the Lord but pass the ammunition. He preaches that "we run out of checks to turn." He shouts that decent and responsible people everywhere have to help the police stamp out crime.

"Brother, it's got to stop. We got to end it. We got to stand up once and for all to these militants and crooks. And if they strike out at us, then; by God, the good book says we must strike back."

## Jackie's Wife Opposes Divorce

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mrs. Jackie Gleason challenged a key provision of the state's new divorce law Tuesday in her petition to block the comedian's divorce suit.

Through her attorney Vincent Malone, Mrs. Gleason contended that if the divorce petition were allowed to proceed the guilty party would be rewarded and the innocent one (Mrs. Gleason) would be punished.

The 1954 separation agreement found the comedian to be "the guilty spouse" and Malone maintained that the legislature's

## intention was not to permit the guilty spouse to win a divorce.

Malone asked the court to declare that one section of the divorce law unconstitutional.

The 52-year-old TV star said that since the separation he had paid his estranged wife more than \$1 million and had contributed toward the support of their two daughters.

# Craters Of Moon Training Site Eyed

Although there will probably be American astronauts walking on the moon before the year is out, the experience on that dead world will be foreign to man.

Terrain of the moon is of prime concern to astronauts. Their suits will weigh 200 pounds on earth and 50 to 80 pounds on the moon. Walking will be difficult, and at some future time America might decide to build a space colony on the moon.

To gain experience in working on a rough-terrain, astronauts need training here on earth, and the Craters of the Moon east of Shoshone is the best place for that kind of training.

At least, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration considers it a prime area. Definite plans for astronaut training at the Craters of the Moon have not been made yet, but the Idaho site is being used according to NASA officials. It will be used sometime after May 1, depending on the weather.

Last year some NASA geologists looked at the area and made some inspections. Sen. Len Jordan, R-Idaho, is working with NASA officials on the astronaut training.

It is not known what kind of training the astronauts will face if they visit the Craters of the Moon.

However, some officials feel the training will also include an astronaut's ability to maneuver on the moon-like terrain offered at the Craters of the Moon. A public announcement will be made if the site is chosen for astronaut training, an official of NASA reported.

# Tax Equality Aide Changes Statement

## 'Five-Day' Hospital Care Draws Fire Of Officials

NEW YORK (UPI) — one of the biggest businesses in the United States still runs on a five-day week, even though many officials think it could save lives and money by working around the clock.

That business is hospital care — a service where costs are spiraling and beds are at a premium.

Why do most hospitals go along with a "lost weekend" operation?

"Many hospital facilities are not used during weekends because many physicians and surgeons prefer not to use them," said a report by the National Commission on Community Health Services (NCHS), an independent group co-sponsored by the National Health Council and the American Public Health Association.

"Most surgeons prefer to operate in the mornings and very few prefer to use the surgery on Saturdays and Sundays, except in emergencies," the NCHS report added. But, "it follows logically that operating and maintenance costs would be kept down if hospitals operated on a full-time basis."

Other reasons given for the five-day week are: Reluctance to give up on proven methods, shortages of skilled employees, need to extend services and belief that only large hospitals will be able to lengthen weeks without losing money.

The Health Insurance Institute, citing figures from the American Hospital Association, notes that the cost-of-an-average hospital stay has more than doubled in the last decade.

And Robert V. Garrett, Jr., administrator of the full-time Cooper Hospital, Camden, N. J., the lowest-cost hospital in the state, thinks administrators should go full-time right now.

As he sees it, the five-day schedule is "morally indefensible."

"It's ridiculous to hospitalize a patient on Friday and force him to wait until Monday or Tuesday for surgery because operations aren't done on Saturdays or because lab test results aren't available," Garrett said. "It's also ridiculous to tolerate the crush of work in the labs and the crowded surgical schedules on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays that are common in many hospitals."

At New Year's Albany Medical Center Hospital, the seven-day week has been successful since 1965, according to Dr. Ferdinand Haase Jr., medical director. Eighteen months after the full-week schedule went into effect the average length of a patient stay, except for pediatrics, psychiatrics and tuberculosis, was reduced by one-half day.

Other hospitals have experimented with the seven-day week and endorse the system. One is Pontiac, Michigan, General Hospital. Another is Joseph's Hospital in Pittsburgh where a spokesman said, "We never close; if a person needs help here he gets it."

## DeSalvo's Aide Defends Client As 'Normal Boy'

BOSTON (UPI) — An attorney for Albert DeSalvo, the man who once said he was the Boston strangler but now denies it, said Tuesday his client is a "normal red-blooded American boy."

Boston lawyer Thomas Troy said analysis of a sample of DeSalvo's blood by Bio-Science Labs of Van Nuys, Calif., established that he does not have the extra Y chromosome associated with abnormal behavior in connection with assaults related to the 13 stranger murders of Eastern Massachusetts women between June, 1962, and January, 1964. No one has been held for the murders.

"Al is a normal, red-blooded American boy," Troy said. "It's further proof that he was not the type of individual who would perform such bizarre crimes."

## Palmprints Solve Identity Dilemma

DETROIT (UPI) — Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Bruce now can introduce their 6-month-old twin daughters by name.

They could not until Monday. Terry and Tracy Bruce are identical. Last week, a big dot of red polish on Terry's toe washed off and "it was all guesswork" as to which twin was which.

The Detroit police department took palmprints of the twins and had them compared to the ones taken at Hutzel Hospital, where the girls were born. The hospital then gave Mr. and Mrs. Bruce the word about who was who.

"When we found out," Mrs. Bruce said, "it felt like a hot polka-dot right back on Terry's toe."

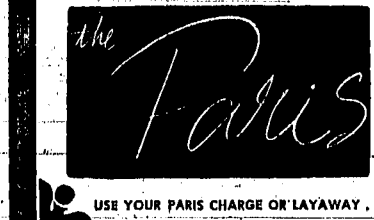

  - 1 Washington State apple, cored and diced
  - 1 cup cooked, chopped chicken
  - 1/2 cup celery, sliced
  - 1 tablespoon pimiento, chopped
  - 2 tablespoons sliced ripe olives
  - 1 large Washington State apple
  - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 1/2 cup water
  - Lettuce

To prepare dressing, combine first five ingredients in mixing bowl. Remove 1/4 cup of the dressing and chill. Wash, core and dice unpeeled apple into remaining dressing; add chicken, celery, pimiento, olives and combine. Chill. Cut 1/2 inch slice from top of four apples. Remove pulp leaving 1/2 inch shell. 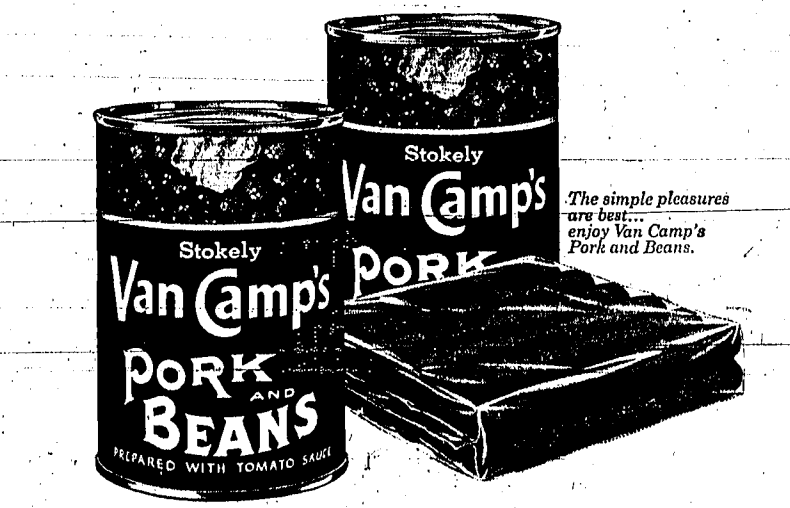

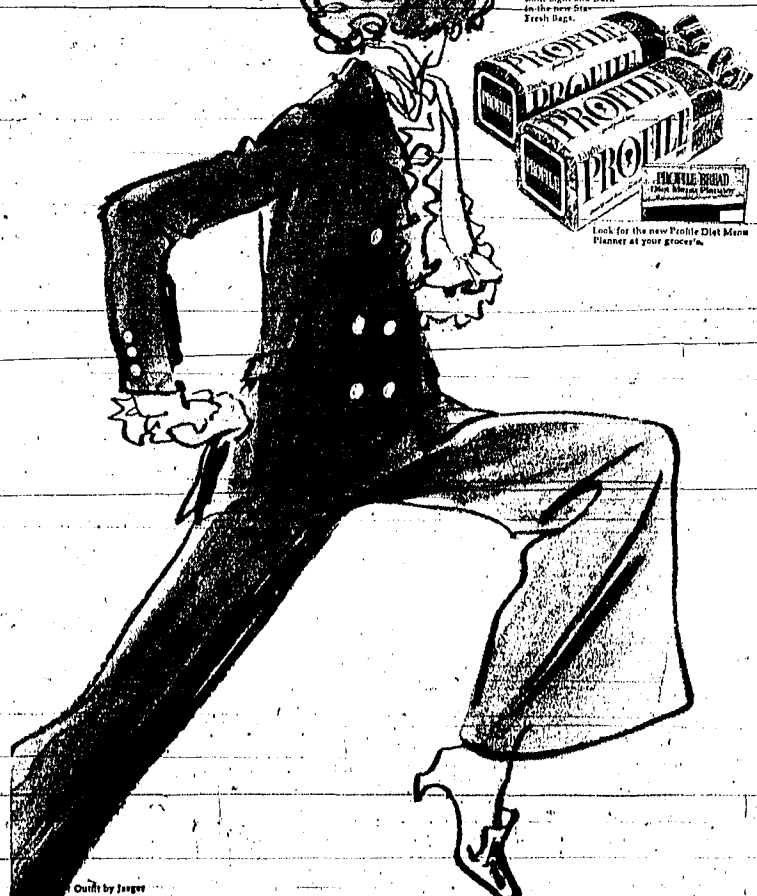

# It's Income Tax Time Again, Everyone's Moaning

more, and while taxes go up and while the 10 per cent surtax charge remains with us, the \$200 deduction also remains. It has remained so for the past 30 years. It appears nothing will be done about it, at least before April 15. And everyone knows what that day is.

It's income tax time again and, as usual, everyone is moaning. The income tax has been with us since Feb. 25, 1913, when the 18th Amendment to the Constitution was declared to have been ratified by the necessary number of states.

The annual bite has grown from a modest few million dollars to the more than \$100 billion

the government is expected to take in this year from individuals who pay taxes.

The average tax figure in America is \$500 for every man, woman and child in the country. And while the cost of living has increased, and while taxes have increased through the years, the standard \$600 deduction for dependents and the head of the household is still with us.

Efforts to increase this amount have failed, although an attempt to make a change is seen in almost every Congress. To see what this \$600 figure represents, a look at Mr. Average in Twin Falls is necessary.

Mr. Average makes \$7,000 a year. That's what his gross salary is, before deductions. Now he paid \$905 in withholding taxes, another \$307 for social security, and another \$144 for

when he fills out his income tax form each year. Mr. Average got back \$150 from both the federal government and the state.

What surprised him the most was the taxable Idaho income figure he arrived at when filling out his income tax form. The figure was \$3,678.

He was a member of the Idaho Peace Officer's legislative committee in 1955 and 1957. He is presently state director of the Idaho State Employees Association.

He has been active in Republican politics most of his life and has been an Idaho law enforcement officer for many years.

In 1955 he was a participant in a council on government and represented the state police. Thirteen states were represented on the council.

Recommendations on the post will be made to President Richard Nixon by Idaho's Republican Sen. Len Jordan.



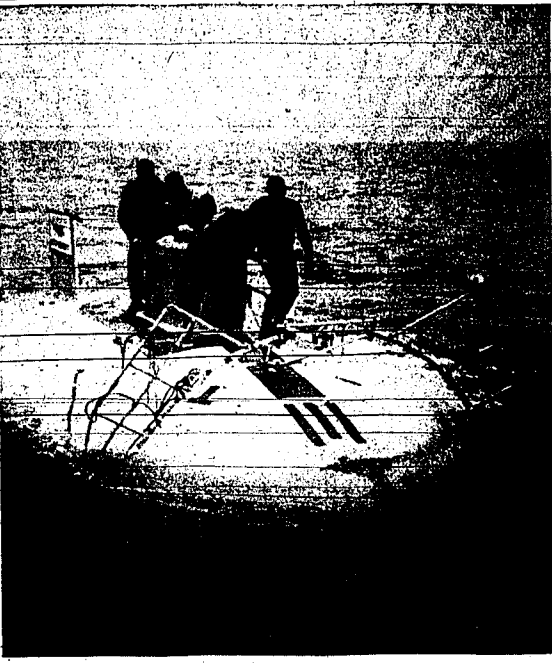

### Experimental Sub Finds Landing Gear Of Crashed Aircraft Deep In Pacific

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — An experimental submarine with underwater cameras, awaited clearance for a dive into the sea off Los Angeles Wednesday to photograph the tail section of a Scandinavian Airlines System jetliner.

The submarine "Deep Quest" already has located and photographed one landing gear of the SAS plane that crashed Jan. 13 while approaching Los Angeles International Airport. Fifteen of the 48 persons aboard were killed.

The "Deep Quest," developed by Lockheed Missiles and Space Co. as a research project, found the landing gear and other items from the SAS plane on Monday.

Lockheed personnel believe the submarine's sonar also located the missing tail section of the SAS plane, although it was not seen. The jet broke in two parts at the time of the crash. The forward portion has been recovered.

The submarine was idled Tuesday by mechanical troubles. Federal investigators are anxious to recover the tail of the plane, because it housed an electronic flight recorder essential to the investigation of the accident.

Four bodies were recovered after the accident. It is believed some of the missing 11 may be entombed in the tail section.

Meanwhile, the Coast Guard terminated sea search for bodies and debris from the United Airlines jet that crashed in the ocean Saturday near the scene of the SAS tragedy.

### Pediatrician-Is Head Start Consultant

Dr. Elmer M. Wright, 676 Shoup Ave. W., has been selected by the American Academy of Pediatrics to serve as a Head Start consultant in Idaho.

The academy has selected more than 600 physician consultants from its membership and from other leaders in the field of child health to evaluate the medical aspects of Head Start programs in nearly 2,000 communities throughout the United States.

The AAP has appointed the consultants to implement the academy's national Head Start Medical Consultation Service initiated recently in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity.

Under this service, the AAP provides physician consultants who advise and offer technical assistance to the Head Start programs at the state and local level.

Each medical consultant will work with the medical director and other professionals in local Head Start projects.

He will review the medical aspects of Head Start applications submitted by a community; meet with local planning committees to map out Head Start medical programs; maintain contact with program medical directors; follow up and evaluate programs, and maintain liaison with OEO regional and national offices.

Consultants will work with the Office of Economic Opportunity representatives responsible for funding and evaluating Head Start health programs, helping them interpret the needs of the children, the resources of the community, and the success of the Head Start programs. The consultant will supplement, rather than replace, the medical and administrative skills available in each community.

The American Academy of Pediatrics is administering the Head Start Medical Consultation Service under a contract signed with OEO.

The contract represents a new type of relationship between an agency of the federal government and a voluntary professional organization. In effect, the American Academy of Pediatrics has accepted a major responsibility for ensuring the health services provided to Head Start children adequately meet the health needs of these children, their families and the community in which they live.

The academy represents more than 10,600 pediatricians in the U.S., Canada and Latin America.

"The union is prepared to make the pesticide issue a new battle line," declared Chavez. Last June, the union organized a national boycott of California table grapes in an effort to force grape growers to the bargaining table.

Chavez revealed he sent letters to three organizations connected with the table grape industry on Jan. 14 requesting a meeting on the issue of pesticide use.

Having received no reply, Chavez said UFWOC has a community in which they live.

### Jury Resumes Verdict Study In Fraud Case

NEWARK, N. J. (UPI) — A federal jury resumed deliberations Tuesday in the case of several construction executives and a former town official involved in an alleged \$110,000 kickback on a Texas-to-New Jersey oil pipeline.

The defendants are Robert J. Jacks, former Woodbridge Council president; Ben Leuty and Karl T. Feldman, executive of Colonial Pipeline Co. of Atlanta; the Colonial firm itself, and two construction companies, Rowland Tompkins Co. of Hawthorne, N.Y., and Bechtel Corp. of San Francisco.

U.S. District Court Judge Reynier J. Wortendyke included a lengthy definition of the legal meaning of bribery in his charge to the jury.

During the trial, the government contended that Jacks and former Woodbridge Mayor Walter Zirpolo demanded and received \$110,000 in bribes from Colonial—the firm building the pipeline.

The bribes were paid in return for land easements and other building rights in Woodbridge, the government contended.

The government said the bribes were actually delivered by employees of the two construction firms which had been contracted by Colonial for work on the pipeline project.

Zirpolo was indicted along with Jacks, but separated from his trial after he suffered a heart attack. He will be tried later.

### UCLA Murder Suspect Is In Custody

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The second of two brothers wanted in the murders of two Black Panthers on the campus of the University of California at Los Angeles turned himself in Tuesday and police still sought two other men.  
 A Black Panther spokesman said his group had supplied the police with information about the brothers and the other two men. Police said that the other two were "very probably" involved in the slayings last Friday in a UCLA cafeteria and were wanted for questioning.  
 The two brothers now in custody, Phillip and Larry Joseph Siner, were identified by witnesses as members of a Negro militant group, US, which had been involved in a dispute with the Black Panthers and the Black Students' Union over appointment of a director for a proposed Afro-American studies center at UCLA.  
 The meeting Friday at which two Panther officials, John Jerome Huggins, 23, and Alprentice "Bunchy" Carter, 26, were gunned down was called in an attempt to resolve the conflict among the three black militant groups.  
 One of the Siner brothers, Larry, 21, surrendered himself to police early Tuesday at the San Diego, Calif., airport after his attorney, Frank Evans, had arranged for him to do so.  
 Evans on Monday had arranged for the other Siner brother, George, 22, to turn himself in to West Los Angeles detectives.  
 Neither brother would make any statement at all to police on the charges of the slayings. Both were booked on suspicion of murder.

### T. F. Man's Unit Took Part In Massive Vietnam Assault

Capt. Richard E. Fouk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fouk, Twin Falls, recently took part in a massive ground assault during the early morning hours of Dec. 22, in Patrol Base Wolf City, seven miles south of Tay Ninh City.  
 It was reported by the information officer of the 25th Manchu Division, in a special news release to the Times-News, that the attack began shortly after midnight with a fierce mortar, 81mm recoilless rifle and rocket grenade assault that was followed immediately by a heavy concentration of small arms and automatic weapons fire.  
 "Approximately 15 minutes after the listening post spotted movement, the ground attack started in Charlie Company's front. Charlie Company was being fired on from the front and the side. According to the lieutenant, Charlie Company had all the help they needed."  
 The battle continued for seven hours, with the enemy penetrating the trench line between two bunkers. Once the enemy troops were in the trench, they were picked off by Manchu marksmen.  
 Mole City had been constructed only four days before the attack, and construction supervisor, Lt. Col. Lee L. Wilson, was certain that the base could withstand any assault. It was reported that the enemy threw everything they had at Charlie Company, but it was thrown right back at them. A human wave attack was repulsed by the valiant Manchus by laying down a massive field of fire. So heavy was the volume of fire that four M-60 machine gun barrels melted down completely.  
 "Air strikes were right on station after the contact commenced," said Capt. Fouk, the Manchu's S-2 officer. "They did a real fine job. You name it and we had it out there, everything except the B-52s." Those B-52s did show up on the night and pounded suspected concentrations in the Straight Edge and Renegade Woods.  
 After the fighting ended at about 7 a. m., focal sweeps within 200 meters of the base were conducted to determine enemy losses. The sweep immediately following the battle counted 81 enemy dead (105 was the count after three days of sweeps). In addition the Manchus detained one suspect and captured nine light machine guns, two chi-com radios, assorted other ammo and several documents.  
 Capt. Fouk is an officer with the Manchu Division, a part of the 25th Infantry.  
 The captain was graduated from Twin Falls High School in 1959.

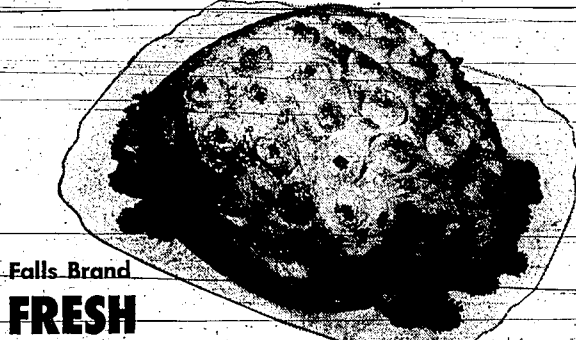

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# Solon Nets Top Office Sans Oath

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — An unprecedented set of circumstances made veteran Democratic legislator Hugh M. Burns the governor of California Tuesday without a lieutenant governor.

Burns, president pro tem of the Senate, became acting state chief executive when Gov. Ronald Reagan left California to attend the inauguration of President Richard M. Nixon in Washington.

Ordinarily, Lt. Gov. Robert H. Finch would succeed Reagan as temporary governor. But Finch resigned the post when the U.S. Senate confirmed him as Nixon's Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare on Monday.

Finch's successor, Republican U. S. Rep. Ed Reinecke, also was in the nation's capital and had not taken the oath of office as the 33rd lieutenant governor of California. Reagan announced Reinecke's selection earlier in the month.

Although Finch announced his resignation shortly after Nixon tabbed him for a cabinet assignment, he left behind in his Sacramento desk a signed but undated letter of resignation.

Actual submission of the letter to Republican Speaker Robert T. Monagan and Senate President Pro Tem Burns was carefully timed to follow Finch's confirmation by the U. S. Senate.

He interrupted his inaugural activities to call his Sacramento staff from Washington and give his personal go-ahead for delivery of the resignation.

## U.S. Bookstore Will Offer Wide Range Of Publications

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The nation's seventh government bookstore will be opened on Wednesday in the San Francisco Federal Building with appropriate ceremonies.

The store will display about 1,000 government publications and provide special mail order service for any of the other 26,000 publications the government has in print.

The government has four such stores in Washington, D. C., and has recently opened branch offices in Chicago and Kansas City.

Books and pamphlets on display at the San Francisco store cover nearly every field of human endeavor. The government's pamphlet on "I n f a n t Care" has sold 14 million copies and is second in sales only to the Bible.

Prices vary from five cents (Chart of Household Weights Measures) to \$18 (The 26 volumes of the Warren Commission report on the assassination of President Kennedy). More than a million copies are sold annually of "Your Federal Income Tax," a pamphlet priced at 60 cents.

In addition the bookstore sells unframed pictures, including the "America the Beautiful" series, consisting of a color illustration from each of the 50 states in the Union and Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. These measure 20 to 24 inches and sell for 10 cents each or the whole set for \$5.

The mail order service will bring purchasers the books not stocked in the San Francisco store in about two weeks, as compared with six to eight weeks for books ordered directly from Washington.

It was the first day of their lives that Luci Nugent and Lynda Bird Robb, daughters of former President Lyndon B. Johnson, spent as private citizens.

"I've never been to the grocery store alone without the Secret Service," said Luci, the younger.

"It's like being born again," she said about being away from the public spotlight. "For the first time I'll be living my own life."

Both girls of the nation's 36th President, who turned over his job to President Richard M. Nixon Monday, were born in Washington. They have known only their father's world of politics.

"They said they won't soon forget the world."

"Daddy isn't the president anymore but he'll always be called Mr. President," said Luci, the dark-haired mother of 18-month-old Lyn Nugent, Johnson's first grandchild.

Lynda, mother of an infant daughter, Lucinda, said she and her sister will be "in limbo" until their husbands return from Vietnam.

Both Marine Maj. Charles S. Robb and Airman 1. C. Patrick Nugent are serving in Southeast Asia.

Heading the gossip list was Lynda's tale that she convinced Tricia Nixon, 22-year-old daughter of President Nixon, that the "solitude" on the third floor of the White House was best for courting.

Luci said both Robb and Nugent proposed in the room, "but on different couches."

**Clay Shaw Chain Smokes In Courtroom**

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Clay Shaw, chain-smoking cigarettes but the calmest man in a courtroom patrolled by 52 sheriff's deputies and packed with reporters, went on trial Tuesday on charges of conspiring to assassinate President John F. Kennedy.

His old adversary, Dist. Attorney J. Dan Garrison, was not to be seen, but Garrison's assistant told Judge Edward A. Haggerty the state would try to prove six specific acts by the 55-year-old retired businessman which would show he plotted Kennedy's death in New Orleans in 1963.

Shaw is accused of conspiring with Harvey Oswald, former Marine pilot David Ferrie between Sept. 1 and Oct. 10, 1963, to kill Kennedy. The district attorney, over a period of two years since he first announced he had "solved" the assassination, has produced a Warren commission report that Oswald alone did the killing was "only a theory."

Only Shaw of the alleged conspirators named so far by Garrison is still alive. Oswald was shot by Jack Ruby in Dallas two days after the assassination and Ferrie died of a natural cause at his home in New Orleans Feb. 22, 1967.

A Garrison aide said the six allegations the state will try to prove against Shaw are:

—That he met with Oswald and Ferrie in Ferrie's New Orleans apartment in September, 1963.

—That there was a discussion there of the means of assassination, including the use of high-powered rifles to obtain "interruption" and crossfire.

—That Shaw made a trip to the west coast which put him in California on the day Kennedy was assassinated.

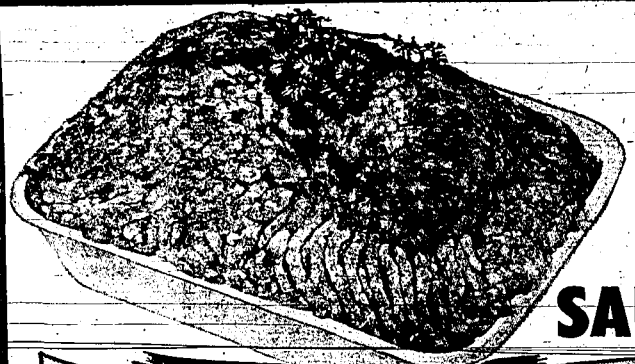
—That Oswald took a rifle from the garage of Mrs. Ruth Paine, with whom his wife was staying, in Irving, Tex., before the assassination. What this had to do with Shaw was not elaborated on.

**Guerrillas Hit "Secure" Resort Areas**

By BERT W. OKULEY  
SAIGON (UPI)— Viet Cong guerrillas hurled bombs at two U. S. billets in Saigon and attacked American installations in two "secure" resort towns, killing two GIs and wounding 19 military spokesmen said Tuesday.

The heaviest losses came in an eight-round "rocker" salvo Tuesday into a U.S. airfield and dock at coastal Vung Tau, a GI recreation center, 53 miles southeast of Saigon. It was the first attack there since Oct. 18.

One of the rockets scored a direct hit on the 384-foot Navy supply ship Tom Green County, killing one crewman and wounding 12. The ship was badly damaged. Another American died at the Vung Tau airfield.

A U.S. spokesman said, "There does not seem to be any pattern to the attacks" in and around Saigon, "nor has there been any substantial Communist troop movement toward Saigon that we know of."

U. Alexis Johnson meantime concluded a six-day fact-finding tour for President Nixon and said he would recommend "no changes in the U.S. Vietnam policy." "Great progress has obviously been made within the last year," he told newsmen before flying to Tokyo and then Washington.

In Saigon Tuesday, a terrorist lobbed a bomb into a group of U.S. enlisted men waiting for a bus in front of their billet, the Annapolis Annex, wounding six of them. The building sustained damage and the terrorist fled.

It followed a Monday night incident in which a terrorist bomb exploded in another American billet, the Missouri Box, damaging the building but causing no casualties. The bomber escaped.

**Era Ends For Elizabethan Social Queen**

NEWPORT, R.I. (UPI)—Like her contemporary, the late Mrs. Mary Brygulewicz, Mrs. Brygulewicz employed enough liveried footmen to assist one to every two dinner guests.

She was a social queen in Newport, R.I., for 40 years. Mrs. Brygulewicz in the great parlor—drawing room—of her home, bringing to a close the age of American society which her mother-in-law, Mrs. William Brewster, began.

Only the immediate family and nearby servants, including the silver and brass polishers, will attend.

The last dowager of the Newport-New York-Washington social circle died Monday at her seaside villa, Wakehurst, of complications resulting from a long illness.

For most of her adult life, Mrs. Brygulewicz was Mrs. James Laurens Van Alen—"Auntie Van Alen"—to Newporters—and had been a widow 16 years when she married Brygulewicz, a San Francisco yachtman, in 1943. He died in 1954 and she presented nine Renaissance tapestry works from designs by Raphael to New York's cathedral of St. John the Divine in his memory.

Born Margaret Louise Post of blueblood colonial stock, she married Van Alen in 1922, a few years after she served as bridesmaid to Consuelo Vanderbilt at her marriage to the Duke of Marlborough. Van Alen's mother was Emily Astor and his wife's aunt was Mrs. Frederick Vanderbilt, so the marriage had dynastic overtones.

Six, Brygulewicz presided at the head of a long English table at Wakehurst, with footmen wearing the black and yellow Van Alen livery moving silently among her guests. Her hair was tinted lavender, ropes of oriental pearls circled her throat, and her lace gown was long—a wear those of all her women guests. The show was the pedigree of almost everyone at the table or had at least made inquiries.

She also thought someone new in Newport might be worth knowing, she asked them to tea, said a friend, they made the grade they would be asked to lunch, possibly dinner. But no matter she was very gracious and always made everyone at ease even if they weren't to be asked back.

**\$88,800 Of New Funds Available For Pea Study**

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI)—A total of \$88,800 in new funds has been made available for the United States Department of Agriculture's pea study research program currently underway at Washington State University, Administrator of the Washington and Idaho dry bean and lentil commission, Harold Blaine, announced here today.

Allocation of the new funds is the culmination of three years' effort by the industry to expand the current program.

# Hughes Shuns Airport

LAS VEGAS (UPI) — Industrialist Howard Hughes apparently is reconsidering his proposal to build a jet-age airport which would handle future supersonic transports.

Hughes proposed to carry out a feasibility study and if it were favorable he would build a new airport in Southern Nevada and turn it over to Clark County at cost and interest free.

Hughes and the county in which Las Vegas is located agreed to the proposal Dec. 20, 1967, but the Hughes Tool Co. never carried out the feasibility study.

Monday, the county commissioners received a note from Richard Gray, Hughes' Tool Co. attorney, which said the firm consents and agrees that its proposal be rescinded.

The December resolution was binding on both parties unless mutually rescinded. The county had no comment on the situation and the note did not say whether the county had requested abandonment of the agreement.

In return for the jet-age airport, the county was to give Hughes McCarran airport near Las Vegas, the largest commercial air terminal in Nevada.

The rescinding order of the agreement could clear the way for Clark County to expand McCarran airport. The pact had been a stumbling block for county plans to float a \$72 million

In acquitting Richardson, Gray said he had been troubled about the sufficiency of the evidence that the Las Vegas casino executive was in on the conspiracy when it started in mid-1962 at the posh stag club of show business celebrities, re-opening. "He certainly was in on the know."

Attorney Grant B. Cooper, who represented Las Vegas dealer Maurice Friedman, argued during the trial that his client withdrew from the scheme at least five years prior to his

grand jury indictment. Despite Cooper's contention that Friedman was protected by the statute of limitations, Friedman was convicted.
