Shoveling Snow Is Major Task

HATLEY — "Go north young man, if you want to make money." But take your snow shovel with you. Good snow shovelers at Ketchum are making \$3 to \$5 per hour digging into six feet of snow, tipped in places by the freakish winds, which is atop buildings in this area.

Sun Valley has signs posted in several conspicuous places asking for shovelers, at a wage of \$2.50 an hour.

One of the main difficulties now is finding a place to put the snow. In many instances it

is an uphill grade with having to throw the snow up instead of down.

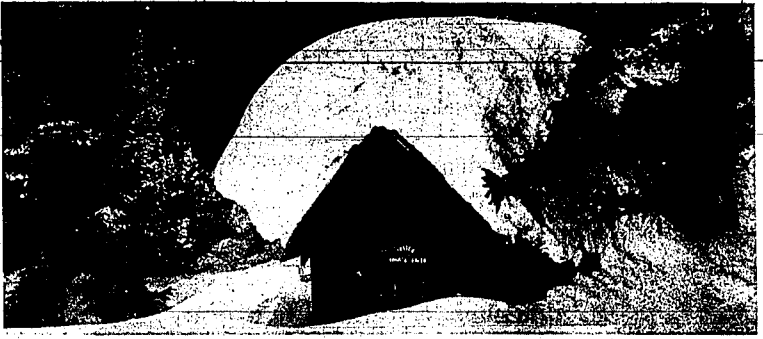
Four men worked Saturday to clear the roof of the DeCosta store (formerly Your General Store) on Main street, after beams showed signs of breaking.

In Sun Valley the snow is being shoveled from all buildings, including the hospital and condominiums.

Summer cabins in the area are almost covered. Last week Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Bennett went to Petit Lake where he shoveled off

the buildings of Mrs. Mary Brooks. Mr. Bennett said he believed there was more snow there than he had seen during all the years he has taken care of the buildings for Mrs. Brooks. He said this is the first time he has had to shovel the sides of the buildings toward Alice Lake. High winds had lifted the snow onto the tops of the buildings.

At Hatley, too, snow shoveling has been the principal exercise. Most residents have been getting Sunday four young men shoveled the Masonic Temple roof.

Bombers Blast Red Troops

SAIGON (UPI) — American B52 bombers dropping 750-pound bombs from an altitude of 30,000 feet blasted a Communist jungle base camp and killed 30 North Vietnamese soldiers, military spokesmen said today.

South Vietnamese troops explored the ruins of the camp in South Vietnam's Central Highlands—235 miles northeast of Saigon Monday and found the dead, who wore green jungle fatigues, the spokesmen said.

Direct hits from the bombs also destroyed 10 barracks structures, a network of bunkers and a food storage depot.

In Saigon, the U.S. Command announced the close of three extensive military operations in central South Vietnam. The campaigns occurred over a 16-month period and resulted in more than 7,000 Communist troops killed, spokesmen said.

The spokesmen said U.S. losses in the long-term operations were 1,095 killed and 5,312 wounded.

American officers also reported the loss of the 990th American helicopter shot down by Communist forces in South Vietnam. Groundfire downed the UH1 Army helicopter Sunday in the Mekong Delta about 75 miles south of Saigon. None of the crewmen was injured.

Monday night in Saigon, a semi-official South Vietnamese broadcast said the United States would turn over 300 helicopters to government forces. The account said the move would allow the Saigon government to assume a greater portion of the burden of fighting the war and lead to replacement of some U.S. troops this year.

The South Vietnamese government announced today it was cancelling leave for all civil servants during the Communist offensive.

"Drive-Ins" Must Close At Midnight

The Twin Falls City Council unanimously approved Monday Ordinance No. 1411 providing closure of drive-in restaurants at midnight on Fridays and Saturdays instead of the present 1 a.m. closure on those nights.

The council approved the ordinance after its third reading. One letter supporting the ordinance was read, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Murphy, owners and operators of the Dairy Queen, the only drive-in closing at 1 a.m., protested the action when the ordinance was on second reading.

Ron Williams was appointed by the council to the urban renewal agency. He fills the vacancy created by Robert Sumnerfeld's death.

City Is Given Funds For Cascade Park

Harold T. (Peter) Brown, vice chairman of the Idaho Park Board, presented a check to the City of Twin Falls Monday in the amount of \$19,482.29.

This is the first payment from the federal government of 50 per cent reimbursement for monies expended in the development of Cascade Park (formerly Haysen Park) located on five acres of land donated by Base Cascade Corp. to the city for a day-use recreational area.

Facilities included in this project are tennis and basketball courts; playground equipment; restrooms; paved parking areas; walking trails; garden, and an irrigation system to be developed over a two-year period.

Now that the construction work has been completed on the park, except for the installation of the sprinkling system, Howard Johnson, parks superintendent, said about one-third of the sprinkling units have been installed and the rest of the work will be done in the spring. Landscaping will begin with the warmer weather.

Mr. Johnson has already ordered the shrubs, trees, etc., to be planted. The park is expected to be officially open in June.

The State Park Board administers the Land and Water Conservation Fund on the State level. Monies for this program are derived in part from the sale of the Golden Eagle Passport, which allows entrance into many federal recreation areas.

Arab Leader Vows 'War' Against Israeli Enemies, 'Air Strike' Protested

United Press International — An Arab guerrilla leader today vowed to mount a "war of liberation" throughout Israeli-occupied territories.

In Cairo, Yassir Arafat told newsmen he would "escalate the Palestinian armed revolution in all parts of occupied Palestine against a popular war of liberation."

He spoke following his election Monday night as chairman of the executive committee of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), a combine of guerrilla bands and groups of Arab refugees from Israeli-held territory.

Arafat said armed force is their only solution. He ruled out "negotiations." He is a leader of the fanatic El Fatah guerrilla band.

In Amman, Jordanian authorities Monday accused Israel of sending two helicopters gunships backed by jet fighters into the area and strafing a civilian settlement, killing two women.

According to Jordanian and Iraqi spokesmen it was the fourth Israeli air intrusion and strike of the day into Jordan. Both Jordan and Iraq, which keeps some 10,000 troops in Jordan, claimed downing two

Israeli aircraft.

In Jerusalem, Israeli spokesmen denied their craft did any raiding Monday except for hitting Jordanian guns that popped at an Israeli patrol on the west bank of the Jordan.

The Israelis reported no air losses.

In other Middle East developments: — Israel officials said an Arab terrorist grenade killed two Arab boys and wounded eight other bystanders Monday

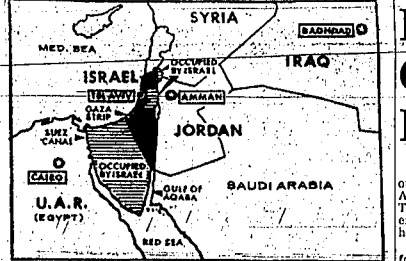
in Israeli-occupied Gaza. The blast came shortly after Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan and a tour of the city.

— In Cairo, Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Riad appealed Monday to U.N. Secretary General Thant to "put an end to Israeli barbaric acts" against demonstrators in Gaza.

He also told his parliament Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser reached "very important" decisions the past week in

talks in Cairo with visiting Soviet Communist party president member Alexander N. Sholeikh. Riad did not detail the decisions.

— In Damascus, Syria, the official Syrian newspaper Al Thawra said Iraqi leaders had ousted and placed under house arrest their vice premier and defense minister, Lt. Gen. Hardan Takriti. It said a power struggle in Iraq has reached a peak, involving mass arrests and "terrorist activity."



PRESIDENT RICHARD NIXON launched a "peace drive" in the Middle East on Tuesday, agreeing in principle to "summit" talks on the Arab-Israeli crisis, and opening the door to resuming diplomatic relations with Egypt. CAB Charts 'Pre-Hearing' On Air West

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board will conduct a pre-hearing conference Feb. 17 on an application to sell Air West to Industrial Howard Hughes.

The CAB moved to speed a final decision on the application in which Air West's financial position is deteriorating and approval of Hughes Tool Company's offer is needed if the line is to continue operating.

Monday, the Nevada Assembly adopted a resolution urging the CAB to act quickly on the application. Lawmakers, Israel at frequent delays in their travels between Las Vegas and Reno, toned down the strong wording in the original resolution, which complained about Air West's services.

Nixon Offers Plan For Mideast Peace

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon met again today with his National Security Council for further discussion of the potentially explosive Middle East situation.

It was Nixon's fifth session with the panel of top diplomatic, military and intelligence advisers since he took office, and the second in four days devoted with the Arab-Israeli crisis.

The chief executive called this latest session to unfold and discuss his plans for U.S. participation in a possible four-power peace conference on the Mideast within two United Nations.

In Paris, meantime, Western diplomatic sources reported that the President will arrive in Paris in early March for talks with President Charles de Gaulle, who shares Nixon's deep concern about the Middle East. Paris will be the first stop of Nixon's forthcoming tour of Europe, the sources said.

As for the President's plans for dealing with the Mideast crisis, it appeared likely he would announce them at his second presidential news conference Thursday morning.

Even with the Mideast problem hanging heavy over the early days of his administration, Nixon tentatively plans a weekend trip to Florida Friday. Nixon continued making rounds of various federal agencies for get-acquainted sessions Monday. He dropped in on the Department of Housing and Urban Development and told HUD's top officials they must "maintain the character of American life in our cities."

Army Men Differ In Review Of 'Mutiny' At Presidio

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Army Military Police officers gave conflicting testimony Monday concerning events which led to charges of mutiny against 27 soldiers for holding a sit-down strike at the Presidio Stockade.

The testimony came as the group became a case in the court martial of Pvt. Lawrence W. Reidel, 20, Crescent City, Calif., and Louis S. Ozecinski, 21, Douglas, N.Y. They are the first of the 27 defendants to be tried.

Capt. Robert S. Lamont, the presiding officer for the court martial, testified his mind was "focused on mutiny" when the speaking mounted in an MP camp. He refused to obey it. Lamont said he had read the mutiny article to stockade prisoners several days earlier when Pvt. Richard Bunch, 19, of Dayton, Ohio, was shot to death during an escape attempt.

Lease For Center Is OK'd

L. James Koutnik, chairman of the Twin Falls Salvation Army board of directors, said Tuesday the board has voted to extend its lease to the Neighborhood Center for another year.

The center, which opened last fall in the Salvation Army annex, 139 Eighth St. N., is one of the programs under the direction of the South Central Community Action Agency.

There have been some rumors lately that the Neighborhood Center would have to relocate, and the staff cleared the board has allowed the center to have the quarters for another year. This agreement would extend Dec. 31, 1969. Mr. Koutnik said the lease request is now awaiting action in the Salvation Army headquarters in San Francisco.

The Neighborhood Center pays the Salvation Army for the general maintenance. When the center prepared to open in September, Mrs. Betty Wooten, director, and her staff cleared and painted the annex for use as a Day Care Center. There are no meetings and classes held there for adults during the evening.

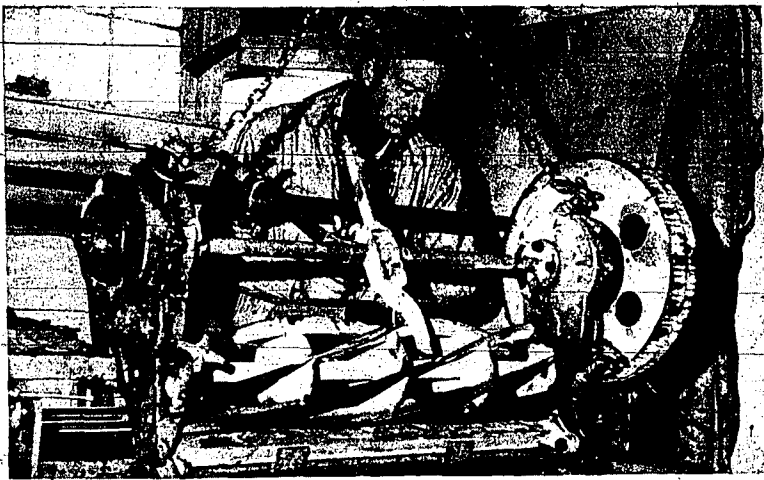
Mr. Koutnik said it is the opinion of the board that the Neighborhood Center is providing a worthwhile service to the community and that the building is being used for a good purpose.

City Parks Department Is Busy, Even During Winter

Strange as it may seem, the employees of the Twin Falls City Parks Department are just as busy in winter as they are during the summer months. Howard Johnson, parks superintendent, says that the men use the winter months to repair equipment and do maintenance work they aren't able to do in the summer.

One of the biggest winter jobs is sharpening, servicing and repairing the mowers. Charles Burgoyne, greenskeeper at the golf course, is in charge of this operation. Mr. Johnson

noted that Mr. Burgoyne is especially trained to sharpen the mowers. The city has a 70-30 inch fairway mowers, a 70-inch triplex, one three-gang unit, three triplex mowers, two 32-inch whirlwind mowers and five 20-inch whirlwind mowers. He said it takes about a month to sharpen all the mowers. Harold Galt, park assistant at the golf course, helps Mr. Burgoyne in this operation.

Mr. Johnson said the city has 99 portable park tables which must be painted and repaired every winter. They also use the winter months to redecorate recreation buildings and restrooms.

Four Persons Hijack Jetliner As Second Attempt Foiled

 MIAMI (UPI)—Four persons hijacked a Newark-to-Miami jetliner with 93 persons aboard Tuesday, the 12th hijacking this year, and a few hours later a young New York student and his girlfriend were bluffed out of hijacking another big New York-to-Miami jet.

The four hijackers were tentatively identified from a passenger list as three members of the W. Hernandez family—a man, wife and daughter, and another man, J. Bahin.

The four hijackers of an Eastern Airlines jet, were not further identified.

The FBI said Michael A. Peppard, about 20, a student at Duchess Community College in Putnam County, N.C., and his unidentified girlfriend tried to hijack National Airlines flight 11

with 66 passengers and a crew of seven aboard.

The short, slender Peppard, whose black hair flowed to his shoulders, brandished a knife and an aerosol mosquito spray can he claimed was a bomb.

Peppard's home town was given by the FBI as Cold Spring, N.Y.

A stewardess on the National jet said she saw Peppard pull a pistol on the youth when his back was turned after the plane was on the ground.

The youth had agreed to let the plane land to take on more fuel to get to Havana, and then had agreed to let the passengers get off.

Aboard the hijacked plane, an Eastern Airlines jet, was television's "Candid Camera" producer Allen Funt. Two men and two women, all smartly dressed in long topcoats, were the first off the Boeing 727 jet when it landed in Havana at 11:27 p.m. EST.

After the hijacking off Florida's east coast, the four were taken into custody by Cuban security police. They were not further identified.

The hijacking—the fifth this year for Eastern and the ninth involving a U.S. commercial airliner—came as U.S. officials continued to grope for some way of putting an end to sky piracy.

Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., called on President Nixon Monday to "make a stern demand" to Premier Fidel Castro "through diplomatic channels" to return these hijackers and to quit encouraging hijackers by giving them sanctuary.

Pepper also proposed payment of a \$100,000 reward to anyone responsible for the

That Pay Raise

As one of his last acts, President Johnson recommended sweeping salary increases for hundreds of upper-level federal employees, including a raise from \$30,000 to \$42,500 a year for congressmen, from \$35,700 to \$50,000 for cabinet members, from \$39,500 to \$50,000 for Supreme Court associate justices.

WASHINGTON — In a dramatic series of events which culminated in his final hours in the White House, former President Johnson gave his critics a review, in miniature, of those qualities which tumblined his personal popularity and now blur the Johnson record.

In the first place, the angry showdown with Udall (which was quickly publicized in the press) came after a long period of presidential indecision. The delay necessitated a rather typical last minute action by the President.

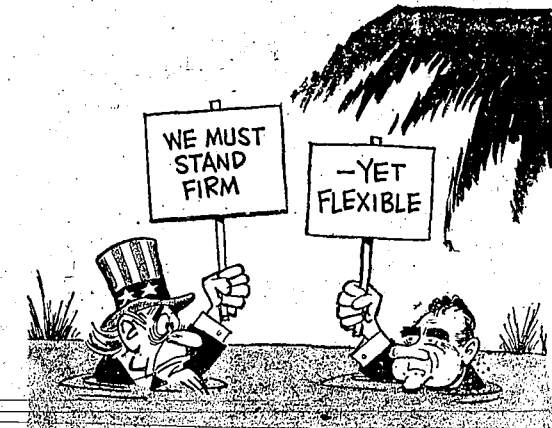
It should be said at once that Johnson, as was frequently the case, was genuinely and rightly concerned — this time about the propriety of so large a park addition under authority of the Antiquities Act.

Conservationists in Congress were urging the President to act, and at least one of them advised that the proclamation should be made quickly, so that it would not be a last-gasp action by a departing President.

Kissinger And Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON (NEA) — In a very quiet way, Henry Kissinger will exert a very heavy influence on the course of U.S. foreign policy in the years just ahead.

Dave Bolster, the drummer of the Fifth Wall, was named most talented individual in the contest.

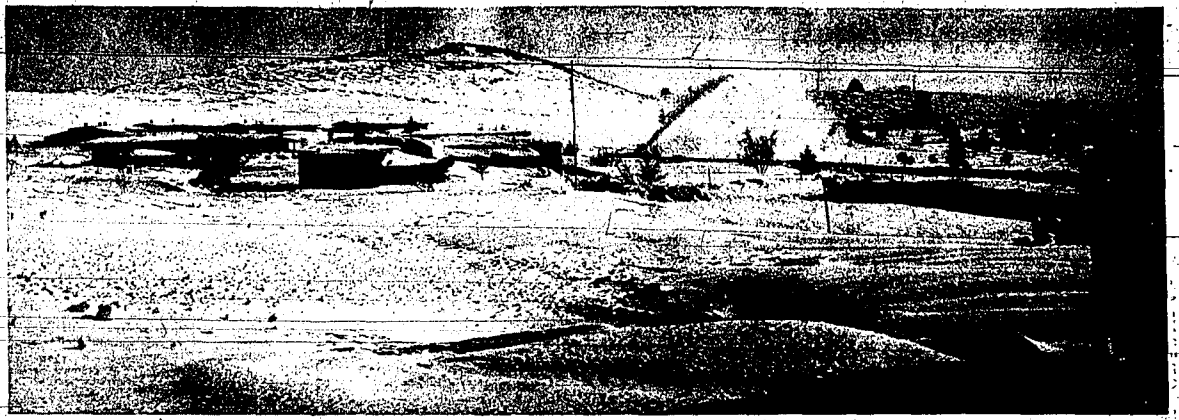

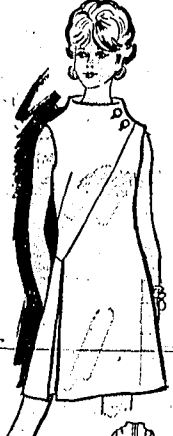

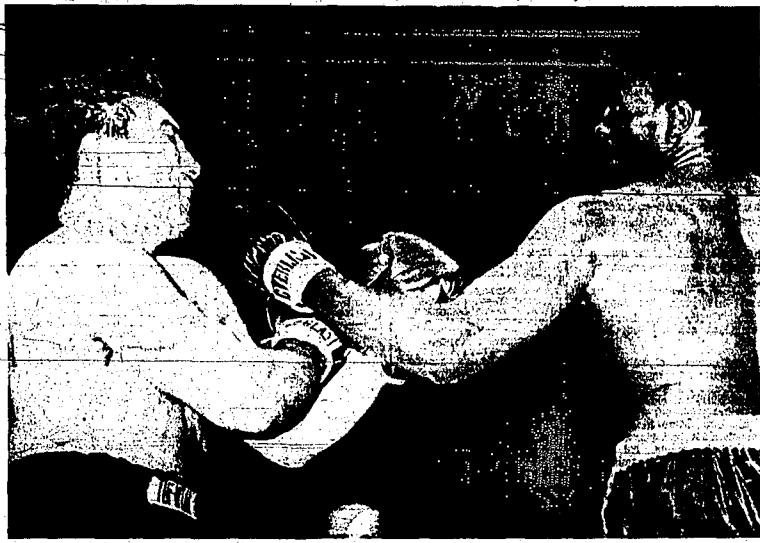

EVANSTON, Ill. (UPI)—Larry Glass has resigned as basketball coach at Northwestern, effective at the end of the season, athletic director Tippy Dye announced Monday. Glass said his resignation came as a result of "pressure" with myself and because "in my opinion the basketball program will be more effective with someone else in the head." Glass' current team has a 2-4 record in Big Ten competition and 10-6 overall. The Wildcats, a pre-season dark horse in the conference title ratings, put together a nine game winning streak, second longest in school history, before conference competition began. "I have always felt that a coach should be given five years to do a job," Glass said. "This is my sixth year. I can honestly say that I have felt no alumni pressure." He recommended that one of his two assistants, Brad Snyder, be named to succeed him. Dye said he was "disappointed" that Larry has decided to resign as basketball coach. "I feel he has done an outstanding job. His 1967 team was the highest scoring club in Northwestern's history and second highest nationally."

Doctors Remove Hull's Wires

CHICAGO (UPI)—Physicians Monday removed the wires from the mouth of Chicago Black Hawks star wing Bobby Hull and said he was completely recovered from a broken jaw. Hull suffered the injury in a game in December and missed one game after his jaw was wired closed. He has played all other Black Hawks games since then with his jaw wired and wearing a headgear with a protective device over his jaw and mouth. Hull has existed on a gruel based on ground meat which he has been able to take through a straw inserted in the gap between his teeth.

LOUIS (UPI)—Sports-center Jay Randolph of KSD-TV in St. Louis predicted Monday night on his sports show that veteran split end Sunny Randle of the Dallas Cowboys will be named assistant football coach and track coach at Washington University here. Randolph said he learned that Randle has signed with the school to coach through the Spring before reporting to the Cowboys' summer training camp.

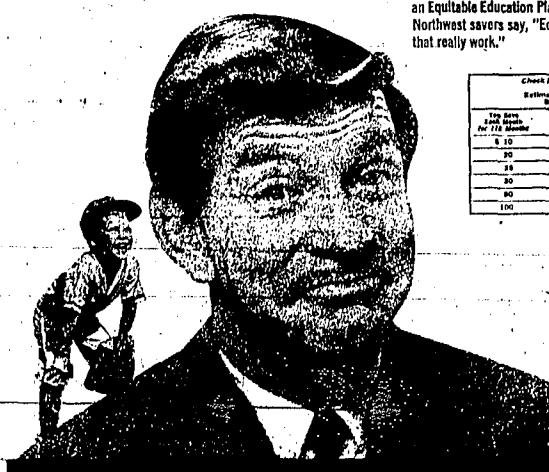

SPECIAL STAYMAN AIDS TO SLAM

North plans to get to a slam the moment he hears his partner open with no-trump. He has 12 points and a five-card suit. North has some mild interest in a grand slam even though his partner's two no-trump open-

The play at six-no trump illustrates a standard safety-play. South counts up his sure tricks and sees that he needs four heart tricks for his contract. He doesn't know how the hearts will divide but he can be sure of four tricks provided he does not run into a five-two break.

He wins the spade in his own hand and plays his king of hearts. West's queen drops and now South has his four heart tricks.

If the queen had not dropped South would have gone over to dummy and led a second heart toward his jack. He would lose one heart trick but that would be his only loser in the suit. Suppose East had started with four to the queen. He could play it or duck. He would still collect one and only one heart trick. Suppose West had started with four to the queen. South's jack would force the queen. Later, South would lead a heart from his hand and finesse against the 10 spot.

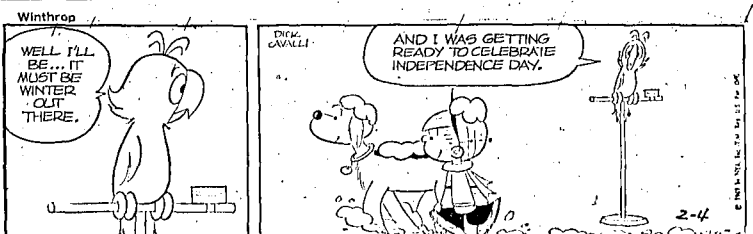
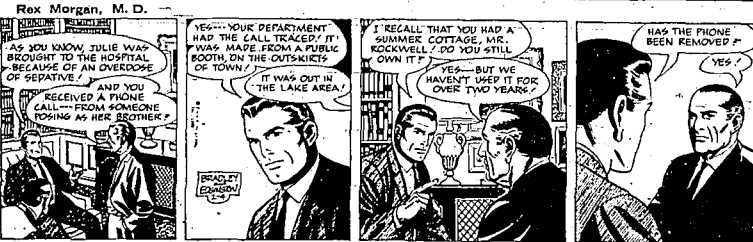
South's three no-trump rebid is a method used by Stayman, the Jacobys and most experts. It denies four cards in either major and also denies four diamonds. A three-diamond reply would show four diamonds.

This rebid simplifies matters for North who jumps right to six no-trump.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) — Spear and Staff Inc. sees many "trap shooters" in the market at present, with money increasingly finding its way "from slowpoke stocks to a few issues where the action is." This pyramiding effect, the firm says, "may simply be regarded as a continuation of 'trap' issues.

Moody's Investors Service suggests caution in purchasing stocks and advises retention of cash reserves until a more favorable buying climate develops. A serious market weakness is possible in coming months, it says, adding that the market might remain in a state of worry, common stocks will be quite vulnerable on the basis of fundamentals.

Standard & Poor's believes a constructive investment stand is justified since "mounting signs of further economic boom and of favorable monetary development trend should make for a higher price level, notwithstanding continued monetary restraint." The market might snap out of its stalemate at any time, the firm says, possibly on wider recognition that the economy is not losing steam, or easing of the Middle East crisis, or signs of progress in the Vietnam peace talks.

Q.—I am approaching retirement and am trying to figure out how much income I can muster up. I have been considering a 5 percent passbook savings account. But a high-rated insurance company has offered me a straight life annuity that will pay me \$100 per month for the rest of my life. Would this be a better investment than the bank?

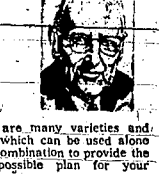
A.—The annuity is a very attractive investment. It provides a steady stream of income for the rest of your life. However, you should consider the inflation risk and the fact that the insurance company's financial strength is crucial. A 5 percent passbook savings account is a safe investment, but it may not provide the income you need in retirement.

AN INDIVIDUAL could set up a 5 percent passbook savings account and withdraw \$9,000 annually. It would take only 17 years to exhaust your capital plus accrued interest. This same capital used to purchase a single premium straight life annuity would guarantee you \$9,000 annually, regardless of how many years you lived.

IF YOU are married and have heirs, you would probably prefer a type of plan other than straight life for your annuity. Potatoes, onions, and other vegetables are also available for purchase.

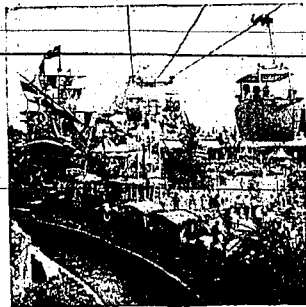
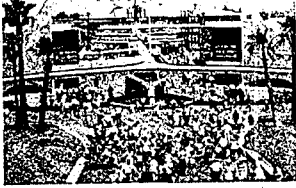
