Walk Uprightly, Malta LDS Members Are Told

MALTA - "Follow the counsel of the priesthood and teach the youth to walk uprightly before the Lord," urged Elder Gordon B. Hinckley, member of the Council of 12 Apostles of the LDS Church, when he addressed the Ratt-River Stake quarterly conference held over the weekend at the Malta Stake house.

Elder Hinckley has coordinated the world-wide missionary program of the church since 1961. Prior to that he supervised radio programs, public relations and mission literature of the church for 13 years.

He also is the author of five books and many pamphlets and articles on church subjects.

Elder Hinckley explained that of the 30,000,000 people who are fine persons, yet they face the greatest burdens ever known. On their shoulders depend the welfare of the world's problems.

Another guest speaker from Salt Lake City, Stephen C. Richards, regional representative of the Twelve, discussed the importance of home evenings.

"All the standards of morality are in the decaying around us," he explained. A recent survey of prison inmates disclosed that reasons for their problems included home conditions, lack of discipline, broken homes, alcoholism and bad companions.

"I was born of godly parents and they taught me the difference between good and evil," he continued. "It is the duty of the home to teach the gospel to children and prepare them for a mission."

Edwin H. Paskett who conducted the conference, spoke on the importance of keeping the commandments of the Lord.

"We are in the world but not of the world," he said, urging members to keep the Word of Wisdom, pay their fast offerings and tithing, attend important meetings and increase their faith.

Discussing the importance of communication, he noted that children hurt parents and parents hurt children through lack of communication.

Way L. Neilson, member of the stake presidency, stressed the importance of exhortation.

"What you are speaking so loudly I can not hear what you are saying," he quoted. "Parents are the best teachers of their children whether for good or for evil. Each of us should be a missionary to those who live around us."

Comptrolonial singing was directed by Janet Ware with Kathryn Odeklirk as organist. Speeches followed.

U.S., Cuba Agree On Returning Hijack 'Victims'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. and Cuba have reached an "understanding" that will permit passengers on hijacked American airliners to be released and continue the flight on the same plane, officials said Tuesday.

The officials said the agreement with the government of Premier Fidel Castro was reached after the U.S. Embassy in Havana, which represents American interests in Cuba.

On Monday, the Cubans had permitted only the crew of an airliner forced to Havana to fly back to the United States. The passengers had to wait to be picked up by aircraft chartered by the airline on whose plane they were flying when it was hijacked.

The first tangible result of the new understanding came Monday when an Eastern Airlines plane, diverted to Havana during a flight from San Juan to Miami, was permitted to continue on to Florida with all the passengers who had been aboard with the exception of the hijacker.

Danger Of Losing Social Security Benefits Noted

Pat O'Mara, Social Security district manager, Twin Falls, said this week that many people who first became eligible for Social Security benefits under the 1967 amendments to the law stand to lose some benefits if they don't apply for these benefits before March 1.

If a person applies for benefits after the month he first becomes eligible, he may receive the back benefits for up to 12 months before the month of his application. The new types of benefits were first payable for the month of February, 1968. To be entitled to all back payments, a claimant must apply no later than Feb. 28, Mr. O'Mara explained.

"If the person waits until March, he will lose one month's back benefit payment and each additional month's delay will mean the loss of an additional month's payment," he said.

Under the 1967 social security changes in the law, benefits may now be payable to the following:

State Department officials said the limitation was heartening but pointed out that it did nothing to resolve the main problem, which is to find ways to deter hijackers.

The International Air Transport Association (IATA) has been seeking Castro's agreement to return to the United States for trial any hijackers who are not genuine political refugees.

However, an IATA delegation which was in Havana about 10 days ago left without any indication Cuba would be willing to tackle the heart of the hijack problem.

Senate Ponders Teachers

BOISE (UPI)—The Idaho Legislature started down the homestretch today with just 29 days of lawmaking left in the official 40th session.

The Senate had a full slate of bills up for debate today—including a bill that came out from its education committee Tuesday without recommendation that would require principals to cancel a teacher's certificate if the teacher breaks his contract anytime after April 1 before the new contract begins or any time during the period contracted.

It provides that a new certificate may not be issued to that teacher for 12 months after such resignation and termination.

The House State Affairs committee held a hearing Tuesday when two Republican members of the committee moved to introduce a bill discouraging "demonstration" instruction—the type—that have plagued universities in California and elsewhere.

Two Democrats held up the bill Tuesday day when they discovered it might prevent picketing by labor unions.

Chairman H. Ferd Koch, R-Boise, put the measure before the committee.

Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, asked, "Has anything around the state prompted this legislation?"

Koch said, "It's more in anticipation of things that might occur."

"Miss McDermott said she felt the introduction of such a measure might encourage a protest or 'issue a challenge to professional agitators."

Rep. Harold Snow, R-Moscow, disagreed and said, "I don't know much about the technical aspects of this bill but I'm for the philosophy."

But Rep. John Molyneux, D-Coeur d'Alene, a labor union official in private life, raised objections to the measure and said as he read it the bill might be interpreted as misdemeanor or possibly a felony.

Miss McDermott Tuesday successfully moved that the bill be held for one week from the bill-drafting attorney.

Judge Vetoes Tuition Plan In Virginia

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI)—One of the last major moves for maintaining segregated schools in Virginia—the state's tuition grant program—was ruled illegal by a three-judge federal court Tuesday.

The 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled the state's grants to private, segregated schools were a violation of the U.S. Constitution.

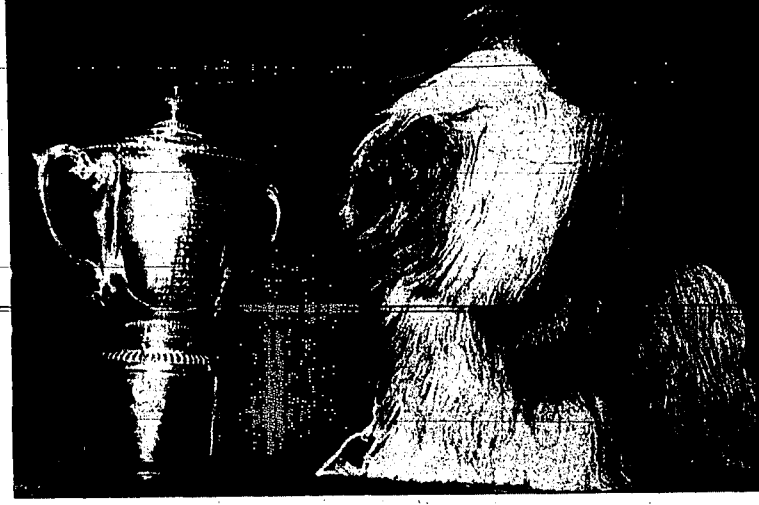
The court said tuition grants could not be made to students attending the all-white schools after June 30, 1969, and noted that after this school year, the tuition grant program "will not be a state-subsidized means by which white children can avoid attending schools with Negroes."

An exception would be state financial aid in schools for the retarded or otherwise distressed children who cannot be cared for in public schools.

Private academies have thrived since the grants were established 10 years ago during Virginia's era of "massive resistance" to school desegregation.

The Commonwealth has paid more than \$20 million over the past decade to 12,000 children annually for tuitions in private schools. Most of the children were white.

Official Advises Board

BOISE (UPI)—The State Land Board spent an hour Tuesday going through administrative details only to hear Lt. Gov. Jack Murphy urge the board to "streamline itself" to avoid the details.

Murphy, appearing at the request of Gov. Don Samuelson, said the board should supervise the State Land Department, but should formulate policies and leave administrative details to staff. The present method, he said, leaves "five of the state's top officials" in effect, bogged down administering the state's land.

D.F. Engelsing, supt. of public instruction, agreed, but pointed out the board is faced with "lack of money and the funds to do what we should do, even though we know what needs to be done."

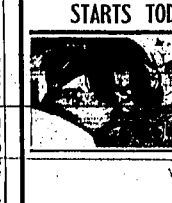
The board approved the 1969 annual timber sales plan. Total timber sales and small sales in northern Idaho were estimated at 60,965,000 board feet; central sales at 51,300,000 board feet; southwestern sales at 11,000,000 board feet; and eastern at sales at 4,700,000 board feet.

NNC Students Hit For Dancing

NAMPA, Idaho (UPI)—President John E. Riley and a joint panel of students and administrative officials have suspended six Northwest Nazarene College students for alleged dancing on campus.

Both the schools and the church which supports it have issued a notice of conduct opposing dancing.

Nixon's Urban Affairs Council Drafts Major Changes In 'War' On Poverty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon's Urban Affairs Council was likely to present his plan today with recommendations for changing the war on poverty.

The new plan was expected to strip the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO), the White House-directed agency for administering antipoverty programs under the Johnson administration, of much of its responsibilities and transfer them to various Cabinet departments such as Health, Education and Welfare and Housing and Urban Development.

Head Start and Upward Bound programs probably will be transferred to the Office of Education, and the Job Corps to the Labor Department, Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Robert H. Finch indicated to a group of newsmen Monday.

The Cabinet level policy-making group for dealing with urban problems hammered out ways of restructuring the multimillion dollar package of federal programs during a Saturday meeting at the White House while Nixon was vacationing in Florida.

Park Chief Backs Land Acquisition

BOISE (UPI)—Lt. Gov. Jack Murphy's suggestion the legislature appropriate \$7.5 million in surplus to buy Idaho's state park lands has been endorsed by Ernest Day, chairman of the State Park Board.

Day said he agrees with the proposal. He said without the purchase or acquisition of the land by the parks department in some other way, Idaho will lose millions of dollars in federal matching funds for parks development.

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Water Management Studied Voters League Opens Parley

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Women representing 12 western states opened a three-day meeting here Tuesday in preparation to make the most of a 10-year moratorium on water importation into the Colorado River Basin.

The women, members of the League of Women Voters of the United States, met to determine how they can help in preparing management decisions in their states.

Conference chairman Mrs. Donald E. Clusen of Grand Island, Wis. chairman of the LWV said a major factor in present decision-making was the Colorado River Basin Project Act passed last year by Congress.

Mrs. Clusen said the 10-year moratorium "is designed to give neighboring basins a chance to inventory their own needs."

She then proposed that the league take action in "making the best use of the 10-year moratorium" through developing a final water plan for the involved states and helping the results reach the citizenry.

Charles J. Hodge, chairman of the Pacific Northwest River Basins Commission, outlined where the water supply lies in the west.

Hodge advocated giving first attention to water supplies in individual regions and how it can be improved and fully utilized before attempting importation from other sources.

He recommended study commissions similar to his own state-federal commission compiling a comprehensive regional report. He said, "We believe the River Basins Commission mechanism should be adapted in all

regions of the West to properly evaluate both water supply and need."
Myron B. Holburt, Los Angeles chief engineer of the Colorado River Board of California, described water uses and planning.

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Shortage Of Funds Is Paramount Concern For T.F. Public Library

Robert Bruce, librarian at the Twin Falls Municipal Library, says he has a number of plans for the library for the coming year, but he doesn't know if he will be able to accomplish them on the 4 1/2 mills allotted to him by the city.

He said he had figured his budget on 5 mills and had requested this amount. Five mills is the maximum the city is allowed to levy for library purposes. Mr. Bruce said he was extremely disappointed in the council and city manager had not taken his request more seriously.

The librarian said the additional funds are needed to increase the book stock and to increase his employees' pay.

Mr. Bruce said the library is short of nearly every type of book except in the fiction department. He said there is a great need for business books and that the library falls short in supplying the needs of the business community. He said the science collection is likely to lose some good staff members. He said the staff pay structure needs overhauling with pay classes being established.

Mr. Bruce also pointed out that although the library building is a sound structure, the cost of maintenance is increasing. He said the furnace and air conditioning have been constant concerns.

"We've just begun to make some kind of impression on the community," he said. "We

would like to continue to do so and serve the entire community." Mr. Bruce said the municipal library is not competing with the college or high school libraries, but is trying to serve the needs of the community. He said, however, that these services must be financed.

He said the regional library program is working out well and should provide benefits to the local library.

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

'Conversing' Computers Tally Pension Data

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Computers may be having silent conversations with one another about the money being credited toward your retirement.
 The Social Security Administration says the earnings of more than 7.5 million workers are being recorded every three months on reels of magnetic tape.
 The reels are prepared by computers owned by employers of these workers, and read by Social Security computers which record the information.
 "What it amounts to is computers talking to computers," said a Social Security spokesman "without human intervention and the possibility of human transcribing errors."
 Not only does the computer talk out down on mistakes, it saves money, both for the companies involved and the government.
 And use of computer-prepared tapes is increasing, said Social Security Commissioner Robert M. Dahl. More than 535 employers are now reporting their employees' quarterly earnings this way.
 The list of companies making Social Security reports on magnetic tape is six times longer than it was four years ago.
 One of the big users of tapes is the military which reports this way every six months only the earnings of 3 million uniformed personnel in active service.
 One thing an alert computer does is to compare names and account numbers to see if they match. If they don't, the computer rejects them.
 Earnings reports not prepared by computers will have about 9 to 10 million mistakes a year either the name or account number with about 80 per cent of the mistakes involving one digit of the account number.
 When computers do the talking about your earnings, the cash savings amounts to \$12 for each 1,000 individual wage reports, or \$12,000 per million employees.
 Once a Social Security computer has read a tape, it is returned to the employer with a copy of the report. A microfilm copy goes into Social Security files.
 The computers are trying to root out the kind of mistakes that a Texas oilfield worker encountered about 10 years ago when he found after years of employment he had only \$14 credited to his Social Security account.
 His employer had been recording his wages and Social Security deductions with two digits transposed, the spokesman said, and his number became the number of a man with the same first and middle initials and last name.

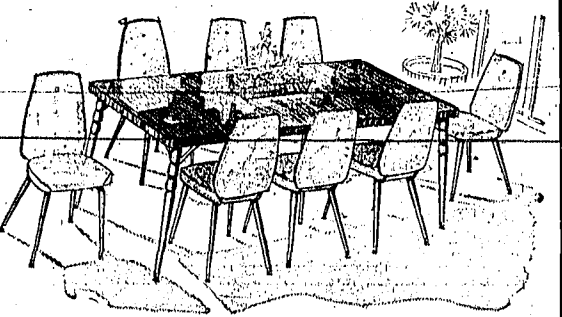

Legislators Find Salary Still Trimmed

BOISE (UPI)—It was a pay-day Tuesday for Idaho state legislators but they didn't get much of their new pay raise that went into effect last Thursday.

Senators got an average of \$350 apiece for their labor to date and Representatives received about \$100.

Faith Auditor Joe Williams said he would continue to withhold the pay raise, recommended by the Citizens Committee on the Legislature, until the attorney general rules on its legality. Voters in the Nov. 4 general election beat down a constitutional amendment to let the legislature set their own salaries.

A move was made in the House earlier in the session to defeat the pay recommendation but it failed. The raise automatically went into effect on the 25th legislative day.

An attorney general's ruling was not expected until the end of the week or sometime next week.

'Wanton Killer' Kills Cougars

BOISE (UPI) — Sen. Thomas McAteer, D - Pocatello, said Tuesday a "wanton killer" entered the Big Creek area and slaughtered two female cougars the day after the Senate passed a bill protecting the animals.

McAteer said it was "apparent that this act was done just to spite the passage of this bill" and urged that the person or persons responsible be caught and "punished for this inhuman act."

Alcoholism Bill Ordered Printed

BOISE (UPI) — The House Health and Welfare Committee ordered printed Tuesday a bill abolishing the Idaho Commission on Alcoholism and turning its functions over to the State Board of Health.

Also ordered printed was a model ambulance law that allows the board of health to establish standards for equipment and to prescribe skills for ambulance attendants.

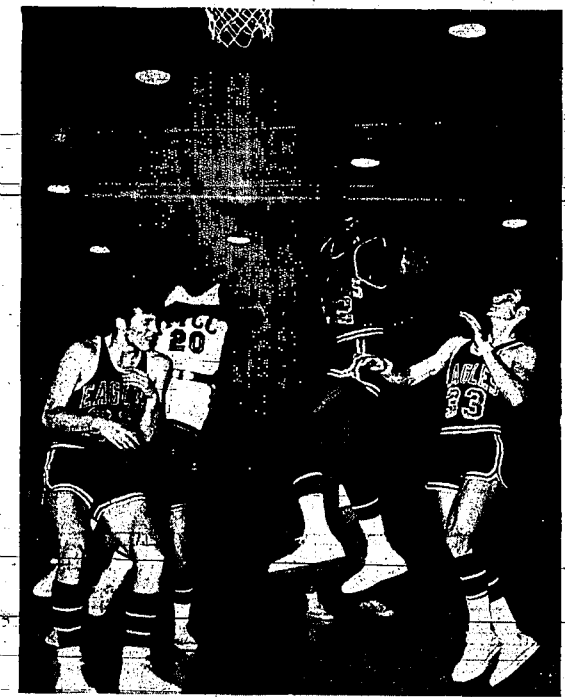

On their way, they met two busloads of police called to the campus. The students tried to block the buses, but dispersed when policemen left the vehicles and advanced on them. There was no violence.

The incident followed an all-night sit-in at the Wisconsin Social-Science building.

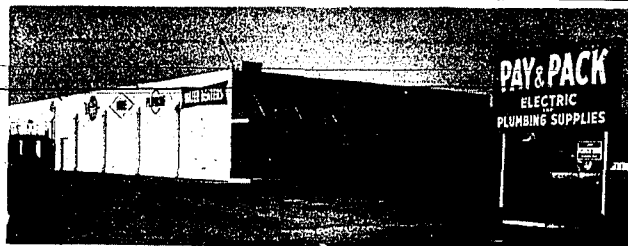

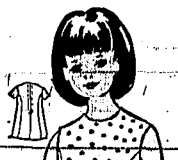

Rural-Wife Thinks T. F. Families Are Close-Knit

"Around Twin Falls especially I think families are close-knit. At least it seems that way in the country — maybe it's different for those in town," says Mrs. Ronald A. Kasel, who lives near Rock Creek canyon, rim with her husband, five children, two cats, a dog, horse, cattle, and sheep.

"I think the family unit can be just as strong today as it used to be if the parents take care to make it strong. Religion plays a big part in the family makeup," commented Mrs. Kasel.

"Most important to the children is security, being willing to listen, having lots of patience, and doing things with them. As for discipline, with younger kids physical discipline is most effective, as they get older, teaching them good values and away privileges is a better method."

Carole is the mother of four girls, from 8 to 14 years' old, of one boy, Eric, 5. She thinks a homemaker is responsible for "taking care of the home and raising the children, teaching them good values and how to face the problems they will have. Also she provides food and clothing for her kids and her husband."

"Some women can combine a career and homemaking, but many can't. I think it depends upon the woman and on the family situation," said Mrs. Kasel. She was listed by the Homemakers Council as a representative homemaker.

About the drudgery of housework, Carole commented, "there are times I would rather work outside, but I feel that all those necessary things that have to be done."

"Children of course should have regular chores in the home — jobs are just expected of them, like keeping their rooms clean. They need these to get in the habit of doing them, and shouldn't be paid for them."

"But if they go out on their own and clean the yard or wash the car, then perhaps they should be paid. For instance, our kids have helped feed the cattle, and I think they deserved to be paid."

"We're very strict about the movies — our kids see — not so strict about TV programs as long as schoolwork is done first. The kids really go to very few movies. They all ride and sled and would much rather be outside doing something, so there really is no problem. It might be different if we lived in town where there is less to do," Carole explained.

Among special homemaking activities Mrs. Kasel lists sewing and canning as favorites. "What else can you do with five women in the family," she jests.

Burley Man To Compete In Olympic Meet For Deaf

BURLEY — Ricky Berg, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Berg, Burley, student at Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C., the world's only college for the deaf, is in intensive training as a distance runner. He was recently named to the 120-man Olympic team that will represent the United States in the 11th International Games for the Deaf which will be held Aug. 9-16 in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. Financial help is needed for Berg to be able to attend the International meet and participate in the Olympic trials. It will take \$1,000 to send the youth to the meet where he will represent the United States and his home state of Idaho. An account has been opened at the First Security Bank, Burley, for the Ricky Berg Olympic Fund which has \$124.20, according to bank officials. Tryouts for the Olympic team were held last fall at Berkeley, Calif. Berg was unable to attend the tryouts, but was invited to participate at Gallaudet College under clocked time. The clocked time was 1:53.1 for 500 meters, which was set in Berkeley. This time is the best clocked time in the United States. The previous best time recorded was 1:53.6 during tryouts. The first time qualified Berg for assistance from the U.S. Olympic Committee and he is now eligible for more tryouts which will be held July 28 in New York. At the New York meet Berg also plans to enter the 1,500 meter race. Fame as a distance runner for Berg has already been established. For in a national meet July 1967 at Indianapolis, Ind., he captured the 800 meters race and placed second in the 1,500 meter race. Earlier in 1965, he participated in the NCAA Track meet where he took third in the mile run. He is a member of the college track team and the cross-country team, which he has been training in during the winter. During a Christmas vacation Berg was home and he kept in training in preparing himself for the coming Olympics by running around the section daily, showing his determination for it was near freezing temperatures when he made his daily run around the section. To run alone, day after day, with no one to pace you or instill a competitive spirit within you takes a great deal of initiative for an individual and pride and determination in keeping up the pace day after day. Berg's initial clocking at 1:53.1 is just three seconds off the world record of 1:50.1 which was set by Leonid Djourouk of Russia in the 1965 Olympic Games. The United States time is 1:55.3 and was set in the same race by Tom Henes, Riverside, Calif. According to Berg's coaches when he qualified it was under unfavorable weather conditions. "I am confident that I can

better the existing times recorded by the time the Olympic games are held," stated Berg. There will be 33 nations competing at YUGO 69 (short for Yugoslav Olympic Games for the Deaf) in track and field, swimming, wrestling, basketball, volleyball, shooting, soccer, cycling, tennis, table tennis, water polo, handball and gymnastics. Over 1,000 deaf athletes are expected to attend the 11th International Games. In many countries participation in the International Games for the Deaf is so highly regarded that the expense of a team of individual athletes borne by the government. In the United States, however, the sports loving fans and public finance the team of athletes, free from government control. All necessary funds are raised through popular contributions from within the community.
