## Communist Troops Aim New Offensive At Saigon

SAIGON (UPI)—Communist troops in an offensive ultimately aimed at Saigon slammed at least 50 rocket and mortar barrages into cities and allied military camps today most of them near the capital.

But unlike the opening day of the offensive Sunday, U.S. headquarters reported "no significant ground actions."

U.S. and South Vietnamese spokesmen listed more than 1,000 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops slain Sunday in heavy fighting with Allied troops.

## Three Astronauts Seek Medical Clearance For Friday's Launch

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The three Apollo 9 astronauts sought medical clearance today for launch Friday in the window of a space tripleheader opening tonight.

The busiest week of space activity in years gets under way at 8:14 p.m. EST with the launch of a Mariner television probe on a 156-day journey to the planet Mars.

They were getting their last major physical examination today, but there was little doubt about its outcome. All three pilots were expected to be declared in top physical shape for the toughest spaceflight yet attempted.

## Ike Recovers From Intestinal Surgery

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower is making a steady recovery from major surgery to relieve intestinal blockage, doctors said today.

The former chief executive underwent a high-risk, two-hour, 20-minute operation Sunday night after physicians had tried unsuccessfully to unblock an intestinal obstruction by other means.

Doctors told reporters today they could not tell whether the scar tissue was from a 1923 appendectomy or a 1969 gall bladder operation. They ruled out a 1956 intestinal block operation, saying an examination showed the scar tissue to be in satisfaction.

The operation was a risky undertaking in view of Eisenhower's advanced age and especially his cardiac history. Eisenhower has suffered seven heart attacks and has been hospitalized since last April.

## Stillman College Students Are Ordered To End Their Boycott

The president of Stillman College Sunday ordered students to break up a boycott of classes and go home but the students locked themselves in a campus building. The president talked to some of their parents and postponed his order until today.

At the University of California's Berkeley campus, a new board of regents ruling to suspend immediately any student violating campus regulations during a "state of extreme emergency" went into effect today and campus militants predicted violence.

The students demanded the firing of a maintenance worker who was a security guard last fall when he shot a student in the leg; more and better qualified instructors; better living quarters; relaxed rules on dormitories and off-campus living; a Negro faculty couple for all students in the boycott.

## Archie Moore Takes Role Of Counselor To Youth

The speaker was Negro. So was his audience. His subject was freedom. Midway through his talk, he quoted Boy Cayman, the author of the chapter of Exodus. When he reached the Ten Commandments, a group of boys who occupied the platform with him started to call them out with him. Suddenly, a voice in the audience objected. "What's this got to do with our freedom?" A true silence fell over the auditorium. The man before the lectern smiled.

"My friend, you have your freedom now — only you don't know it." The audience erupted into loud prolonged applause. This was Archie Moore, former light heavyweight boxing champion, in a new role — trying to inspire young men and women to realize the opportunity that is theirs.

Moore heads a program in San Diego named ABC. "Any body can," Archie says, "improve himself, if he wants to," says Moore, a man who speaks from experience.

"The idea of ABC had been shimmering in Moore's mind ever since he was a teen-ager and a self-admitted delinquent in the Negro ghetto of St. Louis.

"I've been no angel," says Archie, a high school drop-out. "Once I stole \$7 from a street-car coin box and ended up in reform school. But there one night I had a dream — I saw myself helping other boys who were in trouble. It wasn't clear how I was helping them, but I knew that someday, if God would use me, I would figure out a way."

Years later, in the summer of 1965 — during the same week that the Watts riot exploded — Archie received a phone call that helped him figure out the way. A friend, a real-estate promoter, asked him to sell homes in a new housing development to the Negro section of Vallejo, California.

Arriving there, Moore learned some of the neighborhood's problems. Boys would throw rocks through windows of the vacant new houses, dislodge the plumbing and steal anything they could pry loose. "I remembered my dream in reform school," Archie says, "and I began to think. He set up a punching bag in a makeshift outdoor gym. A young Negro boy came to watch the former champion nonchalantly punch the bag. "I can do that," the lad piped. "Maybe you can," Moore replied. "Come back with 10 more kids tomorrow, and we'll see." The boy returned the next day with 30 other kids. Holding out

the punching bag, Archie explained that learning how to box is as simple as ABC. "But before the B and the C," he said, "you must first learn the A." For the next hour, using puns, parables and dry humor, Moore taught the eager kids lessons in moral behavior.

"All right, students," he concluded, "I'll see you all tomorrow at the same time." Twenty-four hours later they were back. Soon Archie was teaching them how to shadow-box, "but not necessarily how to fight," Moore insists. "The purpose is self-defense, not to will harm. The goal is to be strong so that they can walk away from a bully — without cowardice but with dignity." Gradually he began to instill in the kids a sense of pride and moral responsibility. Scores of other kids, white as well as black, came around to join the ABC. Archie accepted them all. He asked the boys to call him "Instructor Moore," and they are known as his "students." Explains Archie, "It's a subtle way of telling them to be established, not drop-outs." He established religious faith as the cornerstone of his program, and called on the boys to memorize and recite passages from the Bible. He pounded away at the importance of education. Teachers in the Vallejo schools were amazed at the sudden enthusiasm for studies.

For two years, Moore commuted to Vallejo from his home in San Diego, where he lives with his wife and five children. After putting older teenage-instructor in charge of his Vallejo group, Moore established an ABC club in San Diego.

So far, ABC has been financed by city funds, service clubs, private industry and by Moore himself. He hopes to develop a training program so that ABC projects can be set up throughout the country.

"I'll fight the man who calls me an Uncle Tom," Archie declares. "I was born in a ghetto — but I refuse to stay there. I am a Negro and proud to be one. I am also an American and I'm proud of that. Granting that, the Negro still has a long way to go to gain a fair shake with the white man in this country. But believe this: if we really do love the Negro, the only thing we can hope for is bloodshed and the end of our dreams."

At a civic luncheon honoring Moore as "Mr. San Diego," an admirer came forward to shake his hand. "You were a real champion in the ring," Archie said, "but what you're doing now is much greater. God bless you." "I think," Archie replied, "He already has." (From the magazine Guide-

Smoking Decline

From The Christian Science Monitor
Five years ago this week the U. S. Surgeon General's report on the health hazards of cigarette smoking was published.

While the decline in smoking is taking place in all age groups, it hearteningly is dropping fastest among teenagers.

Ad Ban Off Base

The Federal Communications Commission's proposed ban on television and radio advertising of cigarettes is not only unprecedented, it is also beyond the authority of the FCC and is probably unconstitutional.

The FCC has regulatory power over broadcasting because channels are limited and must therefore be assigned by responsible authority.

The majority of the commission bases its action on findings that some 50,000 deaths a year can be traced to lung cancer, which has been linked to heavy smoking of cigarettes.

Falling Behind

American public opinion recognized the injurious personal and public effects of alcoholic beverages by writing their prohibition into the Constitution, later relenting.

The FCC might get away with its flat for a time, if Congress does not act, for broadcasters are beholden to the agency.

The moral grounds of such a federal government edict are certainly null. The government not only sanctions cigarettes by taxation; it actually encourages their manufacture and sale through support of tobacco crop prices.

The issue here is not the morbidity that may be assigned to smoking cigarettes. It is whether a federal agency may, by decree, say what may or may not be advertised to the public when there is no question of fraud or other crimes being involved.

ment has not done its job. Quite the opposite in fact, the department has performed admirably in maintaining the system of highways we have.

WASHINGTON — When Republican State Chairmen from the 11 Southern states were pooled at an emergency private meeting here on Feb. 16, there was unanimous agreement that President Nixon would not carry a single Southern state if the 1968 election were held today.

Moreover, the top party leaders from the old Confederacy also agreed unanimously that Mr. Nixon could not win a majority of a single-Southern delegation, out of last summer's national convention at Miami Beach; Gov. Ronald Reagan of California would carry them all.

What makes this a transcendental political event is the fact that Mr. Nixon could have been neither nominated nor elected without the vigorous support of the Southerners who gathered here Sunday in a state-of-such-unhappiness.

That secret meeting was called to discuss rising Southern anger over Administration policies, mostly over school desegregation but also regarding patronage and foreign policy.

Attending were Bryce Harlow, Mr. Nixon's chief Congressional lobbyist; Harry Dent, former South Carolina State Chairman and now deputy White House counsel; and John Sears, White House political adviser.

During more than two hours at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, the Southern chairmen were restrained and cautious in criticizing Mr. Nixon's school-integration policies.

What they agreed that the lack of any fundamental change in those policies contradicted the overwhelming conviction throughout the South that Mr. Nixon had promised to ease a Johnson administration school-desegregation guidelines.

So deep-seated is their frustration that the Southerners declined an invitation by Harlow to visit the President at the White House. One confided later that they would have had to make a statement to reporters on leaving the White House and did not want to be forced into criticizing their host and their President.

Throughout the tense session, the three White House aides listened respectfully, appealed for patience, but made no pretense that the school situation would change.

In fact, they could not have done otherwise. For example, some angry Southern Republicans complain that last week's Justice Department suit against the school system of Harris

County (Houston), Tex., was filed without the knowledge of Atty. Gen. John Mitchell, implying Mitchell would have stopped it. The facts, however, are quite different.

Mitchell was well informed on the Houston case. He has also been in continuous communication with Robert Finch, Secretary (HEW), whose cut-off of federal funds from Southern school districts made him the chief target of Southern Republican anger.

Mitchell and Finch conferred on the school desegregation question and came to one principal conclusion: HEW and the Justice Department, far from surrendering to the South, should move against de facto school segregation in the North.

Moreover, the Sunday protest meeting contributed to President Nixon's reversing one past decision—the reversal of last Monday's Texas businessman Hillary Sandoval to head the Small Business Administration (SBA).

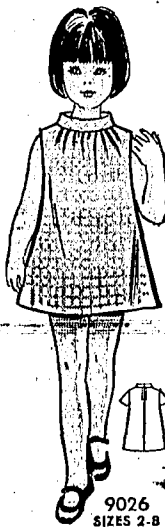

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI)—Hubert H. Humphrey, warning that America's big cities are "teetering on the verge of financial collapse," called on the Nixon administration Sunday to set up a "Model States" program to pump needed money into a national effort to improve urban life.

It was his first speech on urban life since his resignation from the office Jan. 20. The former vice president resumed one of the major themes of his unsuccessful presidential campaign—the "Model States" program. In remarks prepared for MacAlester College Sunday night, Humphrey said, "Only an essay."

of this vision—generating the political support which is essential" to coordinate splintered federal, state and local efforts in urban redevelopment. To promote the "Model States" effort, Humphrey proposed a program to provide billions in federal aid to industrial states willing to reform outdated city and local agencies and programs.

# Apollo 9 Purpose Is To Fill "Missing Link" In Plan To Land Man On Moon

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—The purpose of Apollo 9 is to fill in a "missing link" in the plan to land American astronauts on the moon later this year.

Apollo 8's flight in lunar orbit at Christmas proved the Apollo command ship can perform its tasks. But the command ship will only carry two astronauts within 69 miles of the lunar surface.

A second spaceship is needed for the highly specialized job of flying from that point down to the moon's gray surface and returning to the command craft with two lunar explorers. The "missing link" was a demonstration of this craft's operation with men aboard.

### Hijackings Are Subject Of Meeting

MONTREAL (UPI)—Government aviation experts gathered from points as far afield as Australia Sunday for talks that will include a hard look at the growing problem of hijackings and attacks on airlines.

The meeting, a regular session of the governing council of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), begins Monday and is expected to run until Easter.

Delegates from 27 countries will meet around a doughnut-shaped table in the Montreal headquarters of ICAO, a United Nations specialized agency.

Although the agenda included only routine subjects such as finances and a review of the agency's world wide operations, Council President Walter Blomquist of Argentina is under pressure to provide time for a discussion of violence in the air and on the ground. The campaign, led by the United States, has been conducted for nearly a month and was intensified after Arab terrorists machine-gunned an Israeli airliner at Zurich, Switzerland, last week.

Agency sources said the urgency of the matter ensured its inclusion in the talks, as did its sponsors who represent a cross section of the key nations involved in international air transport. These include the United States, Canada, Britain, France, Brazil and Japan, among others.

An "ICAO Doctrine" on noninterference with civil aviation was believed likely to come out of the talks. This would call for long negotiations and approval by all governments concerned, and could take a year or more to accomplish. Basically, it would commit governments of all 118 countries represented in the agency to act in some uniform way against hijackers and on-the-ground raiders who come their way.

Under the ICAO constitution, it could also establish a continuing committee whose members would immediately investigate complaints in that field and recommend what to do about them.

### Legislature Nears Windup Utah Ponders Youth Training

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—The fate of a bill to put the Industrial School at Ogden under jurisdiction of the State Board of Education remains in doubt as the 33rd Legislature enters its final three weeks.

The measure was killed by a narrow margin at the end of the sixth week of the session, but backers of the legislation have served notice they plan to ask for reconsideration of the bill in the House.

Rep. Della L. Lovelidge, D-Salt Lake, chief sponsor of HB146, says her bill would create a Division of Youth Services to provide programs in the public schools to identify potential dropouts.

A provision of the Youth Services Act would remove the Industrial School from the Department of Public Welfare and place it under the State Board of Education.

The vote on the measure in the House was 29 for, 34 against, and six representatives absent. Mrs. Lovelidge must find six additional votes before Monday to put her measure over the top and send it to the Senate.

In other action Friday, the Senate threw the rules away and advanced two liquor control bills to the third reading calendar.

Final debate on the measures should come sometime Monday, and all indications point to passage.

The two liquor bills are backed by a group known as "Citizens for a Better Utah" and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

One of the measures amends

the current state Liquor Control Act with provisions for tightening enforcement and sale of mini-bottles in restaurants. The other bill sets procedures for governing so-called private liquor locker clubs.

The House passed and sent to the Senate two measures dealing with voting machines in Friday action.

One of the bills authorizes any county to purchase voting machines and the other would approve use of electronic voting systems in elections.

Also approved by the House Friday was a Meat and Poultry Products Inspection Act which provides for the mandatory inspection of meat packing businesses.

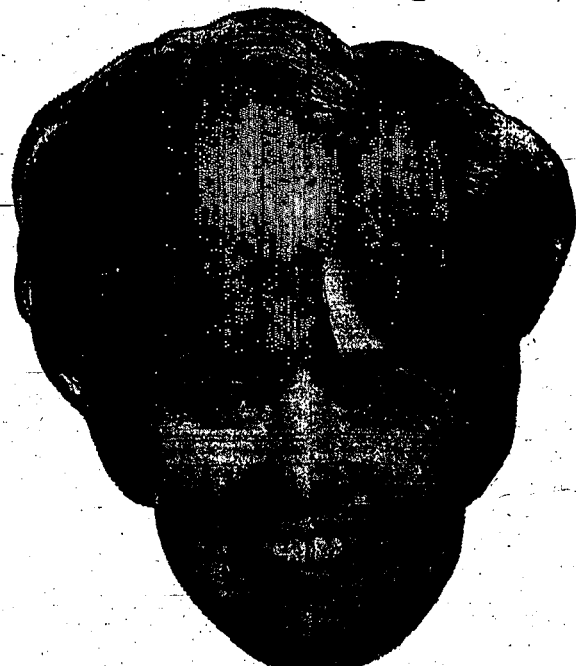

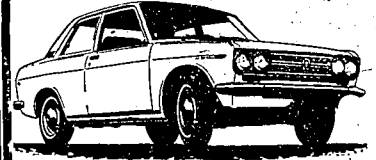

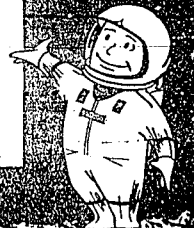
