# Dear Mr. Mills: Why Not Give The Little Guy A Tax Break?

Hon. Wilbur Mills, Chairman  
House Ways & Means Committee  
Washington, D.C.

Dear Congressman—  
Your committee of the House of Representatives has been holding hearings on the question of income tax relief for low-income taxpayers. These sessions have all been devoted to the tax-exempt status of various charitable foundations and trusts.  
Hopefully, before your committee hearings end, the question of changes in the tax laws for the benefit of low-income citizens will be considered. These are the people who have no income from tax-sheltered sources, who can't take advantage of the 27 1/2 per cent depletion allowances on oil investments and who don't have the funds to invest in tax-free municipal bonds.  
They do faithfully and honestly pay their taxes, however. Even though the amount of tax they pay these days is more than they can hope to save in an average year.  
Based upon experience acquired in more than 30 years in writing on taxes and listening to the problems of the small taxpayer, I would like to propose these for your consideration:

**Credit for Dependents**  
The \$600 allowance for dependents has not been changed in 20 years. Can you feed, clothe, house, provide medical and dental care, and educate a growing child for \$600 today? Take it from a father who has seven children at home; at today's prices you can't even feed them for a year for \$600.  
The allowance is a fiction that should be adjusted upward or eliminated entirely. Give parents some tax relief in another form, if need be, but don't insult them by trying to tell them that \$600 is a suitable allowance for each child.

**Poverty Level Taxpayers**  
We are told by one branch of our government that \$3,000 represents a poverty level income for an American family. If this is true how can you justify adding to the burdens of this family by taxing them? At this year's tax rates a family of three — husband, wife and one child — pays \$104 income tax on that \$3,000 "poverty" income.

**Dividend Exclusion**  
A husband and wife together may obtain up to \$200 in tax-free dividend income every year. The fact of ownership of securities indicates they have extra funds for investment purposes. But the family which does not have enough to invest and puts all its resources in a saving account must pay a tax on every cent of interest earned. Does this seem fair?

**Sick Pay Benefits**  
One of the most glaring inconsistencies is in the handling of sick pay. A salaried employee who is absent from work because of illness receives full pay. Yet, under certain circumstances, this same employee can deduct up to \$100 a week for the period of this enforced absence from work.  
On the other hand, the hourly rated employee whose pay stops when he is out sick receives no such benefit. He has the expense of medical care, he doesn't have the income to offset it, yet he is denied the deduction the other man got who received full pay.  
A sense of fair play would indicate things are being done in reverse.  
This may be presumptuous, Cong. Mills, but I thought I would pass on to you some of the things that are on taxpayers' minds these days as we struggle with Form 1040.

## Supreme Court Forbids States From Changing Voting Laws Without Sanction

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The federal district court in the changes, if any, has not yet been determined.  
Supreme Court ruled Monday District of Columbia, the states covered by the 1965 Voting Rights Act may not change their election laws "in law" or "in fact" without approval by federal authorities.

Other laws temporarily nullified on Monday change the rules for qualifying as an independent candidate for state office and require that school superintendents of 12 Mississippi counties be appointed instead of elected.

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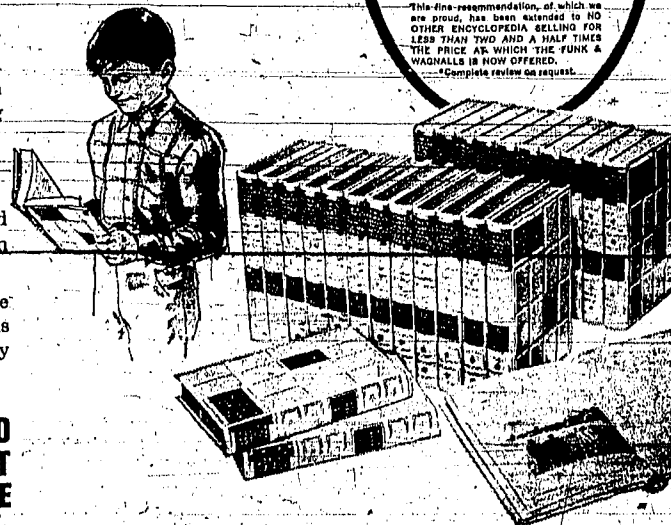
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# House Ponders Schools

BOISE (UPI) — The Idaho House prepared this morning to tackle the \$99.4 million Public School Appropriation Bill, a measure that passed the Senate Tuesday by a 33-1 margin. The bill sailed through the upper chamber after the Debbs vote failed by a 16-18 margin and considerable debate. To amend the proposal to add \$50,000 to it in an attempt to increase public school funding by \$1 million as opposed to the Republicans' increase of \$185 million.

He was instead for relief for the taxpayers. Sen. Richard Egbert, D-Tonahvale, said, "This is a substitute for the legislature. It will remove their sanctions." The only Republican in the Senate to bolt the ranks and vote in favor of the Democrats' attempt to amend the bill—the first major appropriations measure of the 49th legislative session—was Sen. Robert Rowley, R-Mountain Home. Otherwise, it was strictly a party-line vote.

Sen. Richard High, R-Twin Falls, a co-chairman of the Finance Appropriations stressed that the total \$99.4 million figure compares with \$78 million appropriated in the last session and "actually represents an increase of \$21 million — not \$19 million or \$185 million." He said, "Idaho is not going to reach parity with other states in a single year but we have made a very significant step toward it."

During the Senate debate on the proposal, Rep. Joe Preston, R-Doyle, said, "We can all add and we all know the total is more than requested by the JEA, more than requested by Gov. Don Samuelson and more than requested by the School Trustees Association."

But Sen. Nels Solberg, D-Orion, who carried the unsuccessful fight to have the bill amended, stressed the difference of \$350,000 between the Democrats and the Republicans' proposal. He said the difference is in the JEA, the Trustees and the Board of Education."

## Idaho's Capital Is Only City Affected By House Bill On Full-Time Government

BOISE (UPI) — The House Tuesday gave final legislative approval to a Senate bill requiring banks to pay Idaho tax on deposits. The measure, though some lawmakers called it "blackmail," opponents in the House pointed out that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled national banks are exempt from state taxes. The bill would affect only Boise City because it applies only to cities with a population of more than 50,000.

Proponents took note that the House already has approved a memorial asking Congress to allow state taxation of national banks and added the bankers themselves have agreed to the "no tax, no deposit" bill.

"Unequal taxation on every bank should be eliminated," Rep. Joe Wagner, D-Lewisville, floor sponsor, said, adding that state banks must pay state taxes. "Many areas in Idaho won't have a place to bank if we pass this legislation," countered Rep. Walter Little, R-New Plymouth, and I think you should consider that fact when you vote on this legislation." Rep. H. Ferd Koch, R-Boise, viewed the bill in even stronger terms. "We are, in effect, getting ourselves involved... In blackmail, as such, because the Supreme Court of the United States has said national banks are instrumentalities of the federal government."

Rep. Steve Antemer, R-Rupert, said he could agree that the bill appeared to be blackmail but he said the bankers have agreed to accept the condition that they will be given a year to secure needed federal legislation. "They agreed," Rep. E. Don Copple, R-Boise, said, "but after considerable pressure was put on them. This bill is wrong. This law is unconstitutional and also discriminatory against national banks."

Wagner closed the debate by asking, "Who of us in this House are exempt from taxes? Ask yourselves that."

## Banks Ordered To Pay Taxes

BOISE (UPI) — House members approved 45-11 Tuesday a bill allowing cities to tax banks. The measure would have to gain voter approval at a special election, councilmen now serving in office. City council members would eventually "old duffers" eventually go to the Senate for scrutiny. # Gas-Station Owners Reveal Tactics Used By Oil Firms On 'Giveaways'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gas station owners are pressured by big oil companies to participate in giveaway games which cost them money but make money for the oil companies.

William D. Snow, representing the National Congress of Petroleum Retailers Inc., testified before the House subcommittee on the oil companies.

Snow said owners of new gas stations sign agreements to accept the promotional games to one-half the total they charge dealers for the chances.

Snow said most gasoline station operators who offer the games do so against their will, but that the oil companies are able to coerce up to 100 per cent dealer participation because of their economic power over the retailers.

He said advertising campaigns lead customers to expect that the games will be available when they drive in to fill up their tanks.

"The company's advertising thus confronts the dealer with the coercive choice either of buying chances which in a majority of cases he does not want or of losing some of his customers because their expectation of free chances are not met," he testified.

# 'Quiet' Utahn Battles Draft

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Peter Crockett is a quiet talker. He doesn't feel that young men should wait to be drafted.

Crockett is a strong threat to the Selective Service System.

"Salt Lake Resistance" began by Crockett about three months ago, counsels potential draftees on their rights under the Selective Service System regulations.

Nearly 20 full-time and part-time workers give confidential counseling at offices in the Cosmic Aeroplane, a hippie shop in west Salt Lake. Most of the volunteers are students, college and high school, but include former servicemen.

"Some men feel they can serve their country only by confronting the Selective Service System through noncooperation with laws they feel to be unjust. Some men choose to leave the country rather than comply with Selective Service," Crockett wrote in a leaflet announcing the counseling.

Crockett, who received an honorable discharge from the Marine Corps, doesn't feel that young men should wait to be drafted.

"If we counsel you to do anything, it is to know how you feel about war, the U.S. policy in Vietnam, the Selective Service System, how your beliefs correspond with them and then to act in accordance with your beliefs," he said.

"We will not urge, advise or counsel you to confront the draft (through our resistance)," says Crockett, "because you, not we, will have to live with your decision. We urge you to consider the different alternatives."

# Accreditation Threatened By Overcrowding

**RUPERT** — The extremely overcrowded condition at the Minidoka County High School may cause the district to lose its accreditation from the Northwest Accrediting Association, according to a report received by Supl. Camden Meyer.

Mr. Meyer said district voters would either have to voice their approval of the \$2.2 million dollar bond election on March 24

by a two-thirds majority or will have to accept a split shift schedule at the high school, or the district will not build any more than the \$2.1 million asked last year would have built then, because of the increase in cost of building material and the hike in interest rates.

Passage of the bond election March 25 would mean an increase of four and one-half mills or five per cent of real taxes in the district.

Parents and other taxpayers are invited to visit the district's schools before March 25 to better understand the county's education facility problems.

Mr. Meyer also noted that all eligible voters should cast a ballot since each vote not cast would be the same as a No vote because of the two-thirds majority requirement.

Board members Monday night agreed to continue with the previous plan to construct two new junior high schools, one in the west end and the other in the east end of the county, should the bond issue pass.

The sites have not yet been selected. A 15-member Citizens committee last year studied overcrowded conditions and agreed that the bond election would have been the most feasible solution.

## City Issues 12 Building Permits

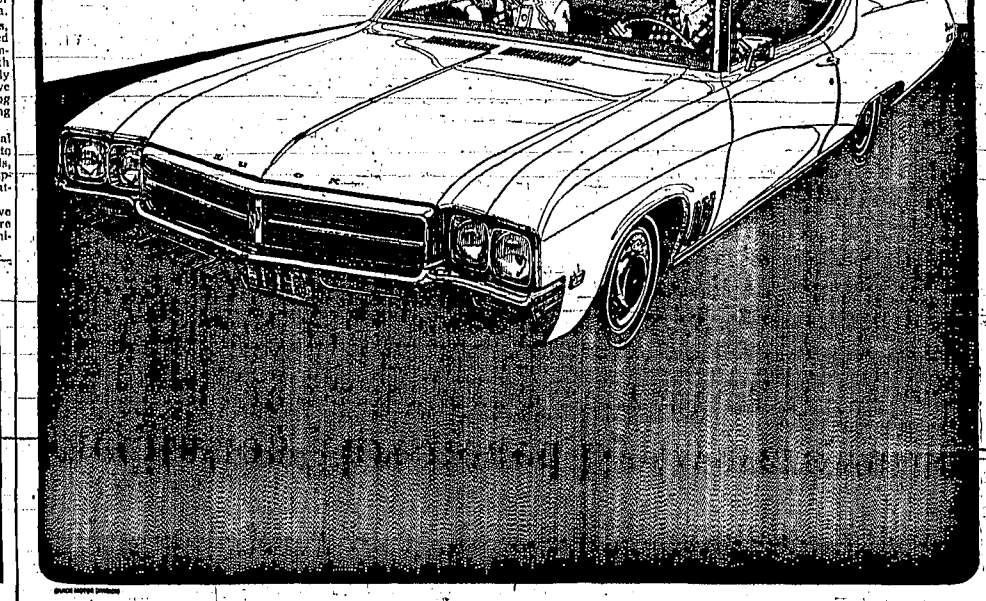

## 'Mother Of The Year' Loved All Children

This is the story of Minnie Guenther, named American Mother of the Year for 1967. She's my own mother.

How do I remember her, the woman who raised me, who not only reared nine children of her own but who has cared for hundreds more since 1911 on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation in Arizona.

The story really begins over 50 years ago before I was born. Mother met my father, Edgar Guenther, at choir practice one night in 1907 when they lived in Milwaukee. He was in a Lutheran Seminary. Mom was a secretary.

It took Dad four years to get around to a proposal. Mother was on her way out one day when he came and asked her to marry him. I've just accepted a call as a missionary to the Apache Indians in Arizona. Will you go with me?

They left for Arizona the day after they were married, carting all their worldly goods with them in a coolie case, a couple of clothes, their Bible, a few other volumes and a mail order medical book.

Their first home, a two-story, two-dorm rooms of a four-room frame building on the east fork of the White River, the fledgling mission of the Wisconsin Lutheran Synod. Back in 1911 Arizona was not yet a state, only a territory. Mother went to work.

She learned to ride a horse so she could accompany her husband on his camp visits up and down the valleys and mountains of the 1,666,000-acre reservation.

They both learned the Apache language and Mother taught her to play the piano and a small portable organ for church services.

During the epidemic that took the lives of a third of the children among the Indians, she learned how to nurse.

"It's remarkable," she says, "how much therapy there is in oil, epsom salt, skunk oil, axle grease, honey and water, flannel blankets, bed sheets torn into bandages, a pin on the head and the love I had."

My parents were horrified to discover that the Indians considered it an evil omen when a white man visited a sick Indian. The practice was to kill one of the twins and all the orphans.

Mother took many such children into her home. The first child was bedded in an apple box in a corner of one of their rooms.

From this humble beginning an orphanage was established which is now an institution caring for 37 children from broken homes and poor families. In the past 25 years 880 babies have been provided for.

Six months after she arrived Father built some desks and benches; Mother typed copy after copy of "textbooks" for reading, writing, arithmetic and religion; then she started a school in her home with 10 children. She fed them a hot meal at noon and also taught the girls how to sew, bake bread and raise vegetables.

This school is now a big, beautiful building with 285 children and classes from kindergarten through high school.

Mother did all these things while she raised her own family, she had nine children, all born without benefit of doctor or hospital.

When the first baby was arriving, Father reached for the medical book and yelled, "Quick, Minnie. Read what I have to do." Mother couldn't find a place in the book that had a passing cowman, who officiated. After that Father was the midwife.

She even managed to stretch his father's \$20 a month for food and clothes us all still as

## Gold Soars

PARIS (UPI) — The price of gold shot up to a record high of 463 1/2 dollars per ounce Tuesday on the Paris gold market on the opening day of new wage talks between industry and labor leaders.

Labor leaders claimed at the opening of the two-day meeting that increasing the price of gold had eaten up wage increases won last year after a month of crippling strikes.

The soaring gold prices measured officially Tuesday at \$1,483 for a one-kilo gold ingot appeared influenced by the uneasiness of industrial leaders over the new wage demands.

In New York, gold prices rose to \$123 1/2 an ounce Tuesday in moderate trading. The price also was up in London, Zurich and Frankfurt.

The management leaders feared giving in to new labor demands for across-the-board increases would topple the French economy, which still is weak from last year's month-long walkout by nine million workers.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Banking Committee approved Tuesday a foreign aid measure after President Nixon said "How It Works" through the proposal that was blocked last year by House Republicans.

Treasury Secretary David M. Kennedy told the committee the measure, replenishing funds to a world bank affiliate, has his "full support and approval."

# U.S. Allows Merger With Restrictions

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government Monday announced it would allow the merger of Atlantic-Richfield Oil Co. and Sinclair Oil Corp., the largest in oil history, under stringent conditions that could pave the way for a future breakup.

A settlement to be filed later this week in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York would allow the merger to go through, but only on condition Sinclair, the smaller of the two firms, maintains full identity as a competitive corporation pending final disposition of legal action.

Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell made public a stipulation which the Justice Department withdrew its opposition to some terms of the proposed merger in return for Atlantic-Richfield's agreement to maintain Sinclair gas stations in the Midwest and Rocky Mountain states.

The two companies also agreed, simultaneously upon court approval of the merger, to sell all of Sinclair's retail gasoline outlets in the north-eastern and southeastern states to British Petroleum Co. for \$100 million, giving the British firm a major foothold in the U.S. market.

But British Petroleum would have to keep the Sinclair trademark for five years, Atlantic-Richfield similarly would have to retain the Sinclair trademark for two years on every station transferred to it under the agreement.

The Johnson administration filed a civil antitrust suit Jan. 15 against their proposed merger, which would create the nation's sixth largest oil company.

The agreement announced Monday keeps the suit alive because the Justice Department continues to oppose Atlantic-Richfield's acquisition of Sinclair's crude oil refineries and its marketing system in the Midwest and Rocky Mountain states.

## Permits Issued

Fifty-three electrical permits were issued by Twin Falls City during February. This compares with 43 issued during the same month in 1968.

There were four condemnations in February, 1968, and three in 1968. Eight complaints were investigated, as compared with four in the same month last year.

Total electrical fees collected was \$361.20, as compared with \$321.25 in February, 1968.

He said Selig rejected the demand flatly and Milwaukee did not want to pay \$2 million to Montreal. Mathews said the \$2 million would have come in the form of a \$1 million loan and annual payments in an expansion draft.

The title was "Contract Bridge Harmony" and a quotation from that article might serve as a precept for all bridge players today.

Undoubtedly, some modern experts will have a different view of finding it out but we feel that this 1929 bidding was not only successful, but mighty good for any day.
