WASHINGTON—Many state, local and national groups are too timid in dealing promptly and forcefully with student rioters and insurrectionists. That's what Sen. Herman Talmadge, former Georgia governor and chairman of the newly-established Senate Veterans Affairs Subcommittee, is bluntly telling his colleagues.

In his emphatic opinion, "The time has come to crack down and order on our campuses, and the best way to do that is for the responsible authorities to crack down vigorously and decisively on trouble-makers. With characteristic outspokenness, Talmadge told the Senate: "These people want a confrontation with authorities. Let them have it. The time has come to grant for the U.S. Office of Education or a bank guaranteed by the government, to provide no place in the American society for anarchists of any kind, whether they be of the student-stillborn or the adult, full-grown career type."

The measure first was killed by a narrow vote in the State Senate, then brought back for reconsideration. The principal drawbacks appear to be that it caters to only one region that it usurps authority of the Highway Board, and that it would require added taxes in one form or another.

Flandro does not seem particularly disturbed at the prospect of legislation earmarking funds for a specific project, perhaps because his tenure does not extend back to the time when the board was subject to the dictates of powerful legislators who got roads for their counties. The Legislature some years ago ended that practice by decreasing that funds would be appropriated while a bi-partisan board would decide where they were most needed. The system has worked well, and there have been few complaints of favoritism.

We would not like to see that system disrupted. If the lawmakers decide it prudent to offer some new method of financing such as the revenue bond measure, it should not be tied to any one locale. The Highway Board should keep its prerogative to make decisions on the basis of priorities. And North Idaho certainly appears to have a strong case.

Pocatello, too, has some needs, such as four lanes on Alameda Road between the Yellowstone Highway and Highway 30, an interchange at Oak and Yellowstone, and more overpasses over the railroad. Pocatello officials have found Flandro willing to listen to their highway problems, and he has acted to persuade the state board to accede to justifiable requests. Flandro was instrumental in seeing that I-15 did not bypass the Pocatello airport. He also carried the ball for the city in getting plans changed to improve the traffic flow on Pocatello Avenue near the new shopping center, and to improve the traffic pattern at the west end of the Benton Street overpass.

With Flandro in the chairmanship, Pocatellans can be assured of continued fair treatment each year when the board charts its annual construction program. So can the rest of the state.

Nixon Goofs On Patronage

WASHINGTON (NEA) — By a strange turn, the high marks President Nixon has gained for his general conduct since his election have been won at the cost of some blunders in the political arena — where he has long been rated pre-eminent. Republican party confusion and disagreement over two matters — the handling of the departure of Rep. Bilis as national chairman and the whole patronage problem — need not have developed if the President had been giving politics priority attention.

But, once elected, he became strongly possessed of the idea that statesmanship behoves the necessary order of the day and that political decisions therefore would have to be shoved into the background. With war and urban strife hanging over the nation, Nixon did not believe that it would look well to focus early on narrow, internal party matters.

Home Electrolysis

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am a woman 65 years old and smoke two packages of cigarettes a day. When I was in the hospital they gave me some sort of a lung test. They sprayed my mouth and throat and then gave me shots to prevent pain and infection which might be contributing to the end of it.

My question is: Is that harmful, and what is the object of doing that? Afterward the doctor said he was surprised, and my lungs looked real good. I have chronic bronchitis, etc.

From your description, you had a chronic bronchitis, but you had no emphysema. The diagnosis is used so the doctor can examine, by direct vision, your bronchial tubes.

Because of your chronic bronchitis, he doubtless suspected some lung disorder other than the bronchitis — cancer, polyps, bronchial obstruction, or other conditions which might be contributing to your trouble.

Set your mind at rest. The procedure is not harmful, but it is very useful and gives information about the condition of your lungs that cannot be obtained by listening with a stethoscope or by X-ray.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My husband is 54, a heavy smoker, and has emphysema. He claims he can't stay in this climate. Would a warmer climate help? —D.M.G.

Possibly another climate would help, and he would do best to consult his own physician on that. But one thing is certain: he will be better off if he stops smoking than by just changing climate. It is fretting about one of the lesser aspects of treating emphysema and ignoring the more important one of giving up smoking. Climate change should not be made lightly; the economic upheaval may be more than any physical gain that is realized.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is anemia caused by? Mrs. J.M. It's a form of anemia due to failure of the bone marrow to produce red blood cells. Other elements of the blood (w/leucocytes, thrombocytes) may be deficient.

The cause is not known in most cases, but it is often due to a deficiency of iron, or a deficiency of vitamin B12. Some may be due to exposure to chemicals or to certain drugs. Some cleaning agents are one example.

Farmers' become angry, and rightly so, when someone who does not know better cites the total budget of the Department of Agriculture as the cost of federal farm programs.

Actually, only about half of the money spent by the department goes for programs involving assistance to farmers. The rest pays for the U. S. Forest Service, rural electrification and telephone loans, the Food for Peace shipments to other countries, the school milk and hot lunch programs, the food stamp program for the needy, meat and poultry inspection and nutrition and research programs that benefit consumers, business and the general public.

To make the cost of farm programs more readily apparent, 18 senators, including Bob Packwood of Oregon, have introduced legislation requiring the Agriculture Department to separate its budget into two categories — one covering farm programs and the other the department's many other involvements.

The legislation should be adopted. Farm programs do run into money, but farmers should not have to keep on explaining to city cousins that they are not divvying up the whole, multi-billion dollar USDA kitty.

The decision of Australia and New Zealand to keep troops in Malaysia and Singapore after British forces withdraw in 1971 does not portend a massive military buildup. But what that decision lacks in numerical significance it makes up for in terms of the commitment of two nations to the long-range security of Southeast Asia.

Although the prime ministers of both Commonwealth nations now say there was never a question about the continuation of troop commitments, the certainty has not been so clear to Malaysia and Singapore. Officials of both had voiced fears about the security of the area following John Bull's departure for home.

Pledges of support from Australia and New Zealand are the type of local involvement required to provide regional security. The United States, as a partner in the Anzus Treaty, is directly concerned with that security.

Diver May Have Taken 'Pep' Pills

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—Sealab III aquanaut Berry M. Cannon, who died Feb. 17, 60 feet below the surface of the Pacific Ocean, may have taken several "pep pills" prior to the fatal dive.

That testimony was given during a hearing by a three-man Navy Board looking into the events surrounding Cannon's death. The tragedy halted the Sealab project, which would have pitted man against the sea.

Lt. Lawrence W. Raymond, a Navy physician, said several amphetamine pills given Cannon to combat fatigue might have caused a chaotic heart beat, which combined with other underwater stresses, could have led to the veteran diver's death.

Raymond said no one saw Cannon swallow the pills, but that no one saw him put them aside either.

Raymond also speculated that Cannon might not have warmed up completely after an initial dive to repair a leak on the Sealab capsule. He said the loosely fitted diving suits provided no insulation.

He said the extreme shaking Cannon suffered as he died could have been violent shivering.

An autopsy showed Cannon suffered heart and lung failure, bleeding and congestion in his lungs and damage to tissues in his voice box.

San Diego County Coroner Dr. F.J. Label, who earlier said Cannon died of carbon dioxide poisoning, said a better "label" might be asphyxiation.

Label said his earlier conclusion was on a toxicologist's report and not on the autopsy.

A toxicologist, Richard Shaw, told the board that chemical tests indicating high carbon dioxide in Cannon's remains could have been contaminated by air in the laboratory.
