Suit Seeks \$60,200 In Damages

A lawsuit asking \$60,200 in damages in connection with an alleged industrial accident nearly two years ago has been filed in Fifth District Court, records showed Wednesday afternoon.

He alleges a boom on that truck struck various safety features, and there was neglect in construction and maintenance of the boom.

The boom fell and crushed his left foot, Mr. Cunningham alleges.

He asks \$1,200 medical; \$9,000 for lost medical; and \$50,000 general damages.

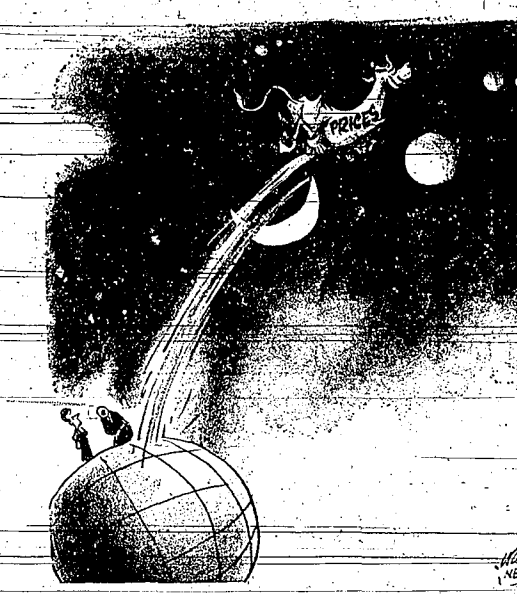

Minidoka To Appeal Case Over Fees

RUBERT appeals are being prepared by attorneys Charles Cronson, Rupert, and Charles Blanton, Boise, to present to the Idaho Supreme Court to appeal an early 1963 decision of the Fifth District court concerning school fees. The men met with the district school board trustees Monday night to report on the progress of the appeal which stems from the Jan. 30 decision by Judge Sherman Bellwood that the district was "harsh and unreasonable" in demanding payment of school fees before transcript would be released. The case arose when a suit was filed by Rupert area farmer Jack Paulson against the school district for refusing to release a transcript for his son when he entered college. The youth's school fees had not been paid. Also discussed was the upcoming \$2 million school bond election, scheduled for March 25. The board is presently in the process of taking options on a new site for the construction of the district's proposed two new junior high schools, which will be built on the bond issues plus with the required two-thirds majority. Supt. Camden Meyer said that the board anticipates a public hearing on the selected sites this week. The board also okayed the judges of election for the bond issue during Monday's meeting. The board opened bids submitted for five 60-passenger school buses for the district. The group agreed to purchase Ward bodies from Clark Motor Co. R. Rupert, and Chevrolet chassis from Hanzel's Chevrolet, Rupert. Bids were \$17,475.00 for the bodies and \$14,840.70 for the chassis, for a total of \$32,315.70 with freight for the units. Other bids were submitted by Wayne, Blue Bird, and Carpenter for bodies and by Rupert Auto, Guide Motors and Work-A-Rite for the chassis. The board then reviewed the upcoming budget, on which a public hearing will be held later this spring. The board noted they will have to revise teacher salary schedules with additional monies from the state. 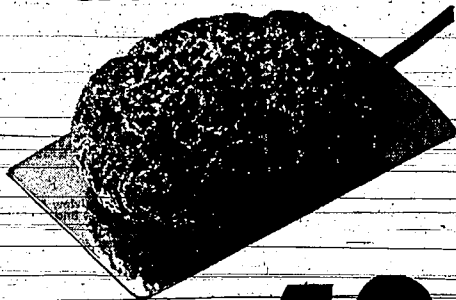

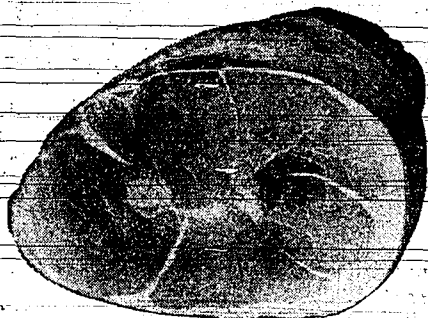

Legislature Faces Extra Session As Fund Fuss Flares

BOISE (UPI)—The 40th session of the Idaho Legislature closed today today but adjournment sine die was nowhere in sight.

Senate Republicans refused late Wednesday night to go along with a conference committee report funding higher education at \$48.15 million in general fund monies and Senate President James A. Ellsworth, R-Idaho, said, "The bill (higher education) is dead."

Joint Finance Appropriations Committee was back at work today, trying to hammer out a new higher education bill and prospects were not all bright that the task would be completed soon.

"We are not going to go along with it," starting all over," Ellsworth said late Wednesday night as the Republicans in the Senate completed their third caucus on the legislative day. The conference committee immediately disbanded and finance appropriation was handed over to the House for study.

Ellsworth said the bill was not to be introduced until 6 p.m., before it was finally decided that they could not satisfy all segments on higher education.

Following an afternoon caucus session, the Senate Republicans had already agreed that a conference committee report was not to their liking.

Republican caucus chairman Harry Brooks, R-Rupert, said, "We are not going to go along with anything but our Senate amendments to the higher education bill."

"We are spending too much and we are headed to a tax increase," Legislative leadership said that the 40th session already was appropriated \$250 million from the general fund.

Gov. Don Samuelson originally asked for a general fund appropriation of \$210 million but later said he was willing to go up to \$209 million.

Also rejecting the conference committee proposals were different reasons, were Senate and House Democrats.

"We're going to hang tough on this," Sen. Art Murphy, D-Idaho, said, "We feel the Senate (those proposed by the Senate) are not going to be passed by the conference committee."

House Minority Leader Ed Williams, D-Idaho, said the lower chamber would not accept the proposal of the conference committee "which splits the difference" between the House and Senate versions of the appropriations.

The original conference committee proposal called for appropriating from the general fund \$21.4 million to the University of Idaho, \$9 million to the State College of Business and Idaho State University, \$1.5 million to Lewis & Clark College and \$1.4 million to the junior colleges.

Flood Threat Studied

BOISE (UPI)—Members of the Army Corps of Engineers expressed confidence Wednesday that within the next two weeks they could do enough advance work to allow them to start work on flood fighting in Idaho.

Maj. H. M. Mathias, deputy district engineer for the Walla Walla District, cited Big and Little Lost Creeks and the Wood Rivers, Willow Creek and Sand Creek in the Idaho Falls area, the Boise front watershed, and the Snake River as the most serious areas.

Maj. Gen. F. J. Clark, deputy chief of engineers, Washington, D. C., said the action of the corps "stems from the concern the President has about the heavy snowpack extending across the Western United States."

Clark said the army had received a "strong letter" urging the Corps of Engineers to be "aggressive" in the use of its powers to prepare for the floods.

He said members of the corps were working in committees to determine what is to be done.

He said the corps was prepared to provide lumber, sand and other materials, plus equipment, and, perhaps most important, what can actually do the work, the floods," he added, "we will come back in and put projects back into shape and do whatever is asked for by the state or Economic Preparedness."

"Our job right now is to do everything we can in these few weeks to get the Corps ready to determine what is to be done."

Members of the corps said they would be guided largely by predictions from the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Mathias said there would be little trouble if the snow melted at a slow rate, but said if the snowpack melted rapidly "there would be floods in many streams that haven't even been named yet."

There's more water in the hills above Mud Lake than Mud Lake could possibly hold," he said, adding that the Corps would dig trenches to divert water from the area.

Mathias said the Corps could run off the lava flows instead of into Mud Lake.

"We've expressed optimism over the Boise front watershed, noting 'We've been lucky for a year. The threat is still there, but it's less than it was two months ago.'"

Ray Williams of the Office of Economic Preparedness said the Corps' action "is very important" because the Corps is doing work on the flood, but "our executive order provides the money but we will foster preparedness."

Williams said if the situation warrants, his agency can ask for authority, if the request requests it, to coordinate the federal agencies.

He added that his agency would keep all congressional delegations informed.

Navy Ends Probe

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—A Navy investigation into the death of Sealab III aquanaut Berry Cannon on the ocean floor of the San Diego Bay ended Wednesday without establishing whether he was the one who rig on the fatal dive.

The findings of the three-man Board of Investigation will be forwarded to the office of chief of naval operations in Washington, D.C. where they will be expected to be released in three weeks to a month. The board can recommend disciplinary action including a court-martial if it concludes a dereliction of duty led to Cannon's death.

Still unsolved at the conclusion of the 17 days of hearings, was whether Cannon wore a diving rig that was missing the chemicals needed to remove carbon dioxide from the aquarium atmosphere.

It was disclosed Tuesday that the same rig had a hole in its breathing hose.

Cannon died Feb. 17 after he and three other aquanauts had dived to the Sealab III habitat 610 feet below the ocean surface off San Clemente Island. The coroner's office listed the cause of death as carbon dioxide poisoning, although doubt was cast on this during the board's hearings.

After the fatal dive it was discovered one of the rigs worn by the four aquanauts had a coarser mesh of its air filter chemicals.

Prison Terms Given in Holdups

Judge Fred M. Taylor sentenced William L. Owen, Portland, to a term of 35 years on the two bank robbery charges and a charge under the new gun control law.

Owen's attorney, Harry E. Webb, Parma, to a total of 25 years in prison.

Both men pleaded guilty to the crimes.

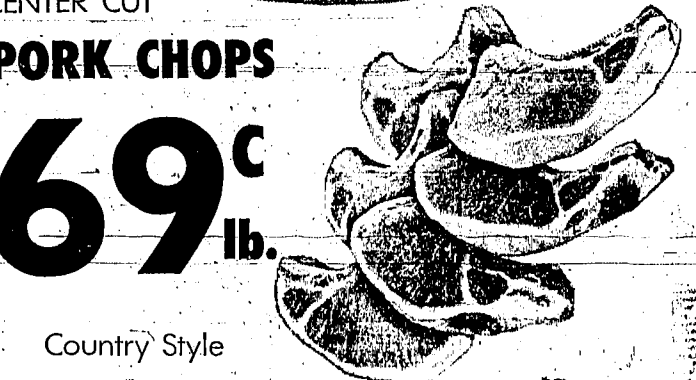

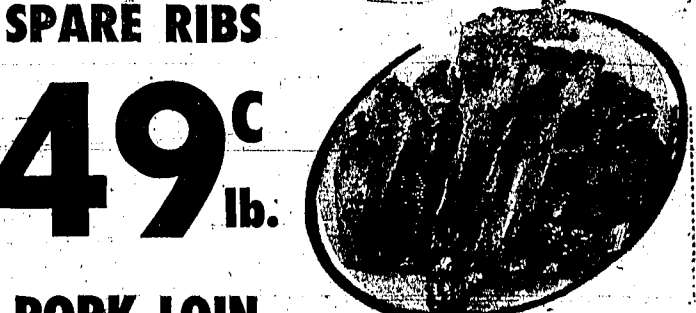

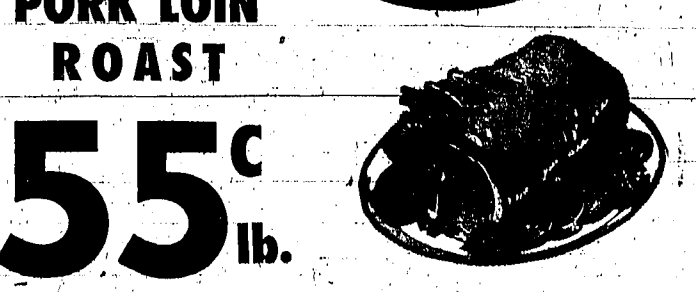

Dog License Date Ends On April 30

Expiration date for current Twin Falls city dog licenses is April 30 and the new licenses are now available at the office of the city clerk.

All dogs over 6 months old must be licensed. Information required for licensing is the name and address of the owner, the breed, sex and color of the dog, and a certificate of certification indicating the animal has been inoculated with anti-rabies vaccine. The owner of any newly acquired dog of licensing age or of any dog which attains licensing age shall make application for the license within 10 days after the acquisition or the age attainment.

The license must be worn by the dog at all times. The tags are not transferable from one animal to another, and no refund will be made on any dog license for any reason. If the dog is not licensed prior to July 1, the fee is increased to \$3 for each male or spayed female and to \$5 for each female.

The shape and color of the license is changed each year to aid the dog catcher in determining if an animal is properly licensed. The new tag is brass in the shape of a miniature dog house.

Any dog which has been properly trained to assist the blind and is now acting in that capacity is exempt from payment of a license fee, but registration is required. Under certain provisions, kennel licenses are available where more than two dogs are kept for commercial breeding purposes.

The city hall office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Settlement Ends Lawsuit In Drug Case

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—An undisclosed settlement has brought an abrupt end to a damage suit against two pharmacists and a doctor in an eight-year-old case involving a child's death.

Olympic Champion Finds Joy In Helping Youth

Twenty years ago, my wife Ruth and I were by my humble childhood standards, well-to-do. We had a big ranch in Kansas, a herd of fine cattle, a new car and quite a substantial nestegg in the bank. Today that's all gone—or more or less—gone to the hills.

What happened to us? The most exciting thing that happened to us was that we found a purpose for living, a reason to justify our existence. It's a strange story, I suppose, because it's just happened to us, rather than our conceiving a grand plan and then carrying it out.

After World War II, I was expected to return to teaching at Cornell College in Iowa where I had earned my doctorate in physical education. Instead, we headed for Kansas with our family (which was to grow to 12 children) and settled on a 2,000-acre ranch.

Though not sure exactly what I was going to do, I knew it would be somehow related to the so-called juvenile delinquency "problem" of which I had become more and more aware. Meanwhile, I ran the farm and traveled around the country speaking on the problem.

On one of these trips in 1947, a minister called me as I drove home. He began, "there's a girl who's a heart-breaking case. His parents had five children before he came along and he was an unwealome s.i.x.t.h. What's more, he knows that he's not wanted. The result is a boy who can't be reached by anyone."

I was intrigued by the story and went to the family, not Billy and I, but I was asked if Billy would like to visit my ranch. The parents thought it was a fine idea. Shortly afterwards Billy and I were off together. I spent hours talking with him, trying to establish rapport, but he would just stare off into space without any indication that he heard me. One night, I told him that we all have problems in our lives which we must overcome.

"When I was a boy," about your age," I told Billy, "I was hurt so bad I didn't expect me ever to walk again."

"How did it happen?" he asked. "I told him the story of the schoolroom explosion that took my brother's life and left me horribly burned. I was miserable and thought of being an invalid all my life. And I might have been had I not had a mother who was filled with such great hope and faith that she wouldn't let me give up. For hours each day—until her hands and arms were numb from the masses of bandages and his efforts to save her—she would say, 'And I did. Six months later I was walking in a few months. I was able to trot a little. Soon a slight limp was the only result of the accident and, at age 12, I ran and won a schoolboy race. Maybe it was this early triumph that gave me the faith that I could run—I ran in some big races but no race was more important than that race I ran at 12."

"Trade union leaders, egged by groups of young anarchists, were looking off into the darkness again. At that time I didn't know whether or not I had reached him."

A few days later I saw him out by the coral feeding grass to one of the horses.

"Billy," I asked, "how would you like to have that horse for your very own?" He looked at me as if I were joking.

"If you want him, he's yours as long as you can take care of him. You're responsible for his grooming, feeding and cleaning up. Is it a deal?" He nodded and that was the beginning of Billy's healing.

The horse got through to the boy in a way I am convinced no human could. Some children like to respond to our affection. I am a 11 therapy was the "Open Sesame" for the most every problem child who followed him. Since Billy, every child who has come to us has been given an animal to care for. Some 8,300 children have come to us in the last 20 years, staying from a week to years. Our waiting list is 650 at present.

When people ask me what we do, that is different from other animal care operations. I'm never quite sure what to tell them.

We try to strengthen each youngster's self-esteem. I believe there are two kinds of hunger in life. One is physical, the other emotional. Both must be satisfied.

Not long ago, a freckle-faced youngster named Tommy came to us from a terrible home situation.

In addition to a monumental inferiority complex, the boy was hungry and underweight. He was a game one and this particular day he was trying to lift a bale of hay. It was heavy and I moved in to help, much to his embarrassment.

Just then Billy, one of our first boys, drove up and walked out to where we were working. Billy had made a complete about-face from the child who had been the "shoulder" boy who left the "shoulder" boy who had developed a fine physique.

"See that guy there, Tommy," I said pointing to the 200-pounder. "Once he got under that pitchfork, let alone a bale of hay. But he kept trying, and look at him today!"

Together, Tommy and I picked up the next bale and I heard myself saying, "You just keep working at it, Son."

Frenchmen Disregard Chief, Prepare For Test Of Strength

Nine million Frenchmen said they were ready for a repetition of last May's test of strength which almost brought down the De Gaulle government.

The day before the general strike which sent nine million Frenchmen off their jobs and thousands surging through Paris streets toward the Place de la Bastille, gold prices advanced for the fifth straight day. For the Gaulle to resist his third major crisis within less than a year.

The first came in the May "revolution" which was settled only after agreement on 10 to 15 per cent wage increases across the board and a promise that government employers and workers would meet again in March for an assessment of needed new action in the light of inflation.

Then, the November franc crisis, triggered partly by inflation and new rumors of devaluation. Frenchmen again began selling their francs for gold. De Gaulle decreed austerity and acted to halt the flow of money. For awhile it seemed to work.

March arrived and workers presented the government and employers with a demand for a 16 per cent increase in wages. When those demands were refused, the workers charged a sellout.

Workers charge he's the only unionist in the government. Small shopkeepers across the nation shuttered their windows for five hours during the first of March in protest against high taxes.

Employers voiced the same objections during their rendez-vous with government and labor.

De Gaulle, as he had in November, remained adamant against devaluation and world bankers believed he had the crisis present strength to back him up.

He had \$4 billion in reserves, plus other untapped resources placed at his disposal by world bankers during the November crisis.

Army Girds For Flooding In Midwest

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI) — More than 100 Army engineers are spreading out through the upper Midwest in preparation for the worst flood seasons on record.

Col. Richard J. Hesse, district engineer for the Army's flood fighters at Ft. Belknap, said engineers are pointing out potential hazards to state and local emergency officials.

Many communities are improving dikes and levees constructed after the last big flood in 1965, he said.

The massive effort was ordered by President Nixon.

Agencies involved besides the Army engineers are the Departments of Defense, Interior, Agriculture, Housing and Urban Development, Transportation, Commerce, Health, Education and Welfare, and the Small Business Administration, Interstate Commerce Commission and American Red Cross.

The weather bureau reports that the snow melt this spring will have the biggest flood potential since the bureau began keeping records nearly a century ago.

In Minnesota, Wisconsin and the Dakotas, the Army engineers and other agencies are making aerial surveys to trace the course of major waterways. When obstructions are found, they will be dynamited or bulldozed away.

Contracts for emergency construction of levees have been let for threatened areas in Minnesota, Missouri, Montana and Iowa.

Hesse has ordered a million sandbags which may be made available to local, state or federal flood fighting forces. Sand pumps are being scooped out. Lumber and 450,000 work bags are being hauled to threatened areas.

Senate Panel Votes To Back Nominations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved Wednesday the nominations of Walter Annenberg to be ambassador to the Kingdom of Belgium, and John Eleonhor to be ambassador to the Netherlands.

Chairman J. William Fulbright was the only vote against Annenberg, but he later told reporters he preferred not to join his reasons. The other votes were unanimous.

Annenberg is the publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer and head of Triangle Press, which publishes a racing form, The Guide, Seivente, and several other newspapers.

Land Board OKs Acreage Swap

HAND WINS OR GOES DOWN TWO In "Winning Declarer Play" there is a most interesting chapter on bridge mathematics. David Hayden points out that you must consider all possibilities, not just one or two, in comparing the chance of success of various plays.

Percy was a mathematical defense. He refused the finesse in spades and ran off all his diamonds and clubs. He made sure he played the clubs last from his own hand. This put West in a squeeze. Then our hero would run off his high hearts—and eventually take the spade finesse to lose the last two tricks to West.

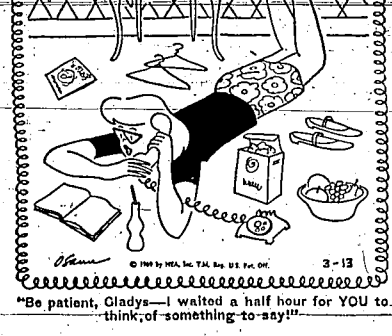

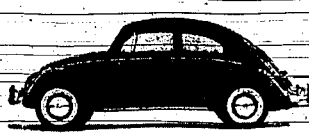
