## 3rd Gem Airline Planned

The formation of a new intrastate airline to be called Gem Airlines was announced Monday by two Magic Valley men.

The new line is the third commuter airline to announce Idaho service following the Jan. 20 collapse of Sun Valley Airlines. It will join Trans-Magic Airlines and Air Utah in area service.

K. Ray-Barlow, Burley, and D. J. Wilkins, Gooding, said the new airline will have a capitalization of \$1 million. It will be a publicly-held corporation with a "wide distribution" of stockholders within the state.

Barlow and Wilkins said they are "actually setting up financial, general, and executive operating schedules" based on their experience as stockholders of the now-defunct Sun Valley Airlines.

"The two said they were 'bitterly disappointed' when major shareholders of Sun Valley Airlines in New York withdrew their support for the venture.

"We feel that for an airline to adequately serve the state and to furnish flight frequency that Air West is unable to provide will require aircraft of at least 15-seat capacity, and daily flights to the major communities of Idaho," Wilkins said.

Tentative date for full-time state-wide operation from Coeur d'Alene to Idaho Falls is Sept. 1.

## U.S. Opposes Rule Banning Wiretaps

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department was expected today to ask the Supreme Court to restrict government wiretapping. The department contends the decision could endanger the national security.

The Supreme Court rarely is asked to reconsider a decision.

Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell Tuesday told a Senate Judiciary subcommittee the decision might "in some instances involve the very life of a witness." He did not elaborate.

Though Mitchell did not say so, it is known a chief concern of the government is that blanket disclosures will reveal its bugging of foreign embassies in Washington.

The court ruled in the Alderisio case one week ago the government must allow a criminal defendant to see all transcripts of conversations he had acquired through any type of "illegal government listening devices." The transcripts would have to be provided even if national security cases and even though it might be totally irrelevant to the case.

Butter than do this, the government might drop its case against a criminal suspect.

Mitchell admitted the decision "has been a great disappointment" to the department, obviously. We are hopeful of filing a petition for rehearing. And we hope for a different outcome."

The Justice Department feels that before evidence material is given the defense it should be given to a trial judge in closed chambers for him to consider whether it is relevant to the case.

If the court fails to grant the unusual government request for reconsideration of its decision, there are 23 other cases involving wiretapping on the court's docket in which the government could seek clarification or review of the Alderisio decision.

## Envoy's Cook Attacks Family

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—A 15.20 a night flophouse airshaft, cook-houseboy went on a savage killing spree in the Ethiopian Embassy here today, slaying the ambassador's wife and two women servants. Police found him hanged today, a suicide.

Three of the four children of Ambassador Gaitachev Bekeke lay in the "delicate" condition at the Red Cross Clinic with severe head wounds sustained in the rampage of Berhanu Heewan.

Their governess, Joe Clever, escaped in good condition with knife slashes on her neck, hand and forearm.

"I trusted him and he killed my wife... he killed my wife," Bekeke wept leaving the embassy early today after surviving the bloody scene and identifying his wife, Belaynes, shot through the head in her bed.

The Bekeke family had brought Heewan from Ethiopia to work in the embassy. Earlier that day he never would to escape an army of police who raced to the embassy Tuesday night and hanged himself in a

Another governess, Maria del Carmen Mendez, swept the fourth Bekeke child, 16-month-old Tobias, into her arms and fled through a window as Heewan hunted her down in the embassy.

Her boyfriend, Arturo Dimas, arrived at the end of the carnage and helped Miss Mendez out of the building. They raced for safety with bullets from Heewan's revolver whistling past them.

Dimas said Heewan was angry "because he was always hanging around the servant girls and annoying them, and the ambassador's wife told him to get out of the embassy."

Bekeke was not home when Heewan was hanged.

## Detectives, Marines Present Pamphlets Instead Of Weapons

THE VALLEY, Anguilla (UPI)—A force of British Red Devils paratroopers, Royal Marines and Scotland Yard detectives waving peace pamphlets today invaded this 15-mile-long Caribbean coral island to force its return to the British Commonwealth.

There was no resistance from the 6,000 residents, most of them women and children dependents of Anguillians working abroad, as the task force ushered in the unpopular Anthony Lee and restored him as British governor of the colony.

Wallace Rey, an elder statesman in the government of St. Kitts, Webster was less than pleased to see him doing that again.

Anguilla broke away from the three-island federation of St. Kitts, Nevis and Anguilla in 1967 and declared its independence. Lee, once the most popular man on the island, was ousted Jan. 9 and British representatives were chased away last week at gunpoint, by gangsters, he said.

Though angered, the Anguillians, most colored descendants of slaves, Indians and wrecked sailors, could hardly resist. Their only armament were a brace of rifles, a few old Napoleonic-era cannon that looked as though they might explode if fired and flocks of geese which some had thought of using to block the only airstrip.

The paratroops with their red berets and the Royal Marines in battle gear quickly seized the airstrip which is two parts dirt and one part macadam and

which was built by the United States during World War II as a busy airbase from which planes sought out German submarines.

Airport officials said the airport would be closed to commercial traffic, cutting off the flow of Anguillians back to their home island aboard two tiny Piper Aztec planes from the Virgin Islands, 90 miles away, where they work.

Scores of them moored at Harry S. Truman Airport in St. Thomas today with transistor radios held fast to their ears. They were unanimous in resentment at the invasion and were particularly bitter to hear that Lee had been restored as governor.

"Anybody but Lee," said one man. "They'll have to keep troops there if they want to keep him there. He will never live there."

## Laird Doubts U.S. Can Trim Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird certified today U.S. commanders in Vietnam do not believe it will be possible to reduce American forces until Hanoi pulls out all its troops.

Laird, who returned from a trip to the Vietnam war zone last week, told the Senate Armed Services committee.

"The presentation given me by the U.S. Vietnam command staff was based on the premise that no reduction in U.S. personnel would be possible in the absence of total withdrawal of North Vietnamese troops."

Laird also said the top Marine commander in Vietnam, Lt. Gen. Robert Cushman, told him during his trip that it will take an additional two years' before the military situation is under control.

The United States currently has about 540,000 troops in South Vietnam. The Defense Department estimates that North Vietnam has infiltrated about 100,000 men into the South.

Laird appeared at a closed hearing of the Armed Services Committee. His testimony was released by the Pentagon.

Laird was critical of past U.S. war policies and appealed for more money to bolster South Vietnamese troops, using a revised military budget.

Referring to past policies, he said: "Our orientation seems to have been more on operations than assisting the South Vietnamese to acquire the means to defend themselves."

## 365 Communists Killed Viet Ground Fighting Flares

SAIGON (UPI)—Ground fighting in Vietnam reached its highest peak in six months today with 365 Communists reported killed, most of them in the Allies' massive counteroffensive to prevent an attack on Saigon.

U.S. military spokesmen announcing the upturn in combat said the guerrillas early today shelled Da Nang, killing 10 civilians and wounding 23 persons, but were thwarted in an apparent attempt to rocket Saigon.

Da Nang, Hue and Saigon—the three biggest cities in South Vietnam—had been declared off limits to Communist bargages under the so-called agreement that halted the bombing of North Vietnam last Nov. 1.

But in their nationwide offensive the Reds have hit Da Nang three times, Saigon five times and Hue twice. Overnight they bombed 30 cities and bus camps, causing overall flight losses, American headquarters said.

An American patrol on Saigon's eastern fringe found five 100-pound rockets on launchers aimed at the city. They were fused and read to go, the announcement said, but Communist gunners had fled.

The Allies' Operation Atlas Wedge counteroffensive into jungles hiding 20,000 guerrillas northwest of Saigon accounted for 224 Communist slain late Monday and Tuesday, war communiques said.

In clashes outside the Atlas Wedge spearhead, American forces on infiltration routes to Saigon threw back two ground attacks late Tuesday, killing 32 Reds 20 miles northwest of the capital and 35 guerrillas 25 miles west of the city.

Total U.S. losses in these two battles were four killed and three wounded, while overall casualties, including Atlas Wedge, were light.

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## State Financing Of Airports Is Backed

Members of the Twin Falls city council and county commission Wednesday were on record favoring a study which would develop plans and programs for financing operation and maintenance of aviation facilities in Idaho.

By resolution, the commission members urged passage of House of Representatives concurrent resolution No. 16 which has sponsorship of the revenue and taxation committee.

With the Senate concurring, the proposal would study and develop plans or programs which would provide for financing the operation of the aviation facilities, maintenance of aviation facilities and improvement and betterment of present facilities including airports.

Terms of the resolution call for the revenue and taxation committee to conduct meetings and hearings throughout the state and that the findings be reported to the second regular session of the 40th legislature.

At the regular business session held at the airport, commission members were joined by representatives of the city council and the county commission. Among business items were reports by Ed Woods, airport manager, and Jenn Milar, city engineer. The latter reported on the current status of contemplated runway extension.

This work is expected to get under way about mid-summer.

### Idahoans Favor More Patrolmen On State Routes

Vatican Envoy

Old controversies, at least unresolved ones, never die. They merely lie dormant for a time until new developments allow them to flare into the open again, as divisive as ever.

This seems to be the lesson, or one of them, in the renewed discussion of U.S. relations with the Vatican as a development of President Nixon's recent quick tour of Europe.

The desire for "the very closest consultation and discussion with the Vatican" expressed by the President upon his return, and speculation that this might be pointing toward some form of official diplomatic representation, immediately brought forth the familiar arguments pro and con last aired extensively almost 20 years ago.

That was when President Truman, facing a widespread protest, canceled plans to name Gen. Mark W. Clark ambassador to the Vatican.

Jobs Plentiful

It is a sign of something that economists now are worried because the unemployment rate last month, at a 15-year low. Even an affluent society, it seems, can overdo it.

Obviously, it isn't the high employment which causes concern, but the inflationary push that goes with it. Along with February's pleasant employment report came another increase in the cost of living.

WASHINGTON — Nabobs of the television industry are working all the way to the bank over what seems to be clear evidence that the Nixon administration will make "clean" TV one of its top priorities.

What concerns the industry is not the bare announcement by Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Robert Finch that he has ordered a government study into the possible harmful effect of TV violence on viewers and society.

After that, little was heard on the subject. President Eisenhower made no move to revive it; President Kennedy declared himself "flatly unopposed" and President Johnson tentatively considered the matter, but dropped it.

Currently, Washington maintains discreet touch with the Vatican via a secretary attached to the U.S. embassy in Rome.

Despite reiteration of continuing interest, President Nixon is not expected to move, immediately and reaction being as immediate and outspoken as it has been, may very well decide to carry on indefinitely with the present arrangement.

As a controversy, it may very well be in the unresolvable category. If so, it serves to point up again the curious fact that in our supposedly so thoroughly secular society, few issues are so sure-fire in arousing public response and fighting spirit than those involving religion.

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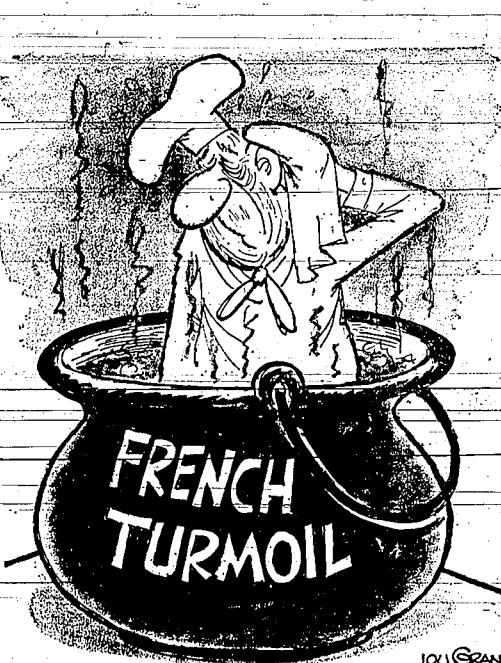

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is your opinion of high school boys dieting strenuously to get down to a lower-weight class in wrestling? I have boys doing this and it worries me.

Good question. The answer depends on what you mean by "strenuously." If it means a certain amount of weight reduction can be achieved safely by some boys, not by others.

To do it safely and effectively, the rules should apply: 1—Regular meals, three meals a day.

2—No in-between nibbling. 3—No fruits—candy and sweet stuff.

4—Cut down on fatty foods—fat meat, fried foods, pastries, ice cream. Go easy on butter and margarine.

5—But do be certain to get adequate protein — eggs, meat, fowl, fish, cheese, milk. Protein is important to maintain muscle strength.

6—A boy should not be in too much hurry. Conditioning takes time, and rushing can be harmful and working off excess weight.

When water retention and congestion in the pelvic area is part of the problem, reduction of salt intake can be helpful. In some instances physicians find it necessary to use medication to reduce fluid retention.

In some cases one of the standard anti-edema medications may be tried, with or without anti-spasmodic drugs to minimize cramping.

Some women resent the menstrual phenomenon to a degree that brings discomfort because, for them, it is a time that a woman is "sick" at this time is an old-fashioned notion.

### Nixon Agrees To Trim Aid In Disorders

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon has decided to enforce more strictly existing laws authorizing the cutoff of federal funds to students who create campus disorders. Republican congressional leaders said.

Emerging from a meeting with the President at the White House, House GOP Leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan and Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen said they expected Nixon to take firm action.

Both Ford and Dirksen said they did not think additional legislation would be needed.

The previous administration did not implement the laws Congress passed last year, Ford said.

Under a law passed by the 90th Congress, colleges and universities may withhold federal funds from students involved in campus violence. But the law has not been widely enforced.

Ford asserted: "Our general impression is that these militants, small in number, are really using Fascist tactics to deprive most students their opportunity to get an education."

### Young Pianist To Play At Burley Community Concert

BURLEY — Thomas Uchtmann, 25 year old concert pianist from Trenton, N.J., and most graduate of the Juillard School of Music, New York, will give a concert at 8:15 p.m. Thursday at Burley High School Auditorium sponsored by the Mini-Cassia Community Concert Association.

Mr. Uchtmann with his remarkably mature musicianship and prodigious technique, is emerging as one of the truly bright stars among the younger generation of American pianists according to press reviews. He dropped out of regular high school in September, 1968, when he entered the University of California at Santa Barbara to work for a Master of Arts degree with a double major, special performance and composition.

Very early in his life young Uchtmann developed an avid interest in music. At the age of 12 after only one and one-half years of piano lessons, he made his public debut performing Beethoven's "Tempest" Sonata at the Kieckhefer School in Trenton, N.J.

In order to devote more time to music when he was 16, he dropped out of regular high school. A year later his father died and Uchtmann went to work as a carpenter's apprentice at the Clinton School in Princeton, practicing the piano in his lunch hours in the school music room, and attending night classes at Trenton Central High to get his diploma.

During one of those lunch time practice sessions, the headmistress, Mrs. Olga Smith, heard him from a nearby room playing Beethoven's "Appassionata" and impressed with his technique, she introduced him to John Ellis, then a teacher at the famous Juillard School of Music in New York.

Uchtmann studied privately with Mr. Ellis for a year, and at the age of 19 was accepted at Juillard with a tuition scholarship awarded by the school. His teacher at Juillard was Josef Riefel, and in May, 1967, after five years of study, he graduated with a B.S. Degree in piano.

In 1969 and 1968 Uchtmann gave a number of recitals in Princeton and Trenton in private homes for invited guests. Later, during his year at Juillard, there were opportunities for public recitals at the school and in various parts of his home state of New Jersey and in New York State.

On these occasions his rapidly maturing talents were very impressive, particularly his piano technique and his interpretations of the works of Bach, Liszt and Scriabin. His most noteworthy appearance was made at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, at Princeton University and at Town Hall, N.Y.

Uchtmann has some original composition to his credit including several for piano and for chamber groups. In addition he composed the music for the play "Jezebel" by Fred Ollast which was performed at the New York State Cultural Center in Trenton in May, 1967.

Young Uchtmann has a gift for improvisation, and is most noted in this capacity for his daring and imaginative improvisations in collaboration with the vocalists — the work of Shakespeare, Ives, E. E. Cummings and others.

He recently improved on the piano with a vocalist and percussionist — the music for two plays by Ollast, "Orpheus" and "Phaedra", and on another occasion improvised the music for a modern dance program.

With his base now in Santa Barbara, Uchtmann is accepting a limited number of concert engagements on the West Coast during the 1968-69 season.

### General Electric Settles Dispute

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. (UPI) — A dispute over closed circuit television monitoring of work areas at the General Electric AC Motor plant was settled when GE agreed not to use the electronic surveillance without union permission.

About 700 workers at the plant voted to accept the compromise following a week's strike. A vote by the rest of the 12,000 members of Local 301 of the International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machine workers was overwhelmingly in favor of accepting the compromise.

### Gang Rivalry Brings Death To Youth, 20

NEW YORK (UPI)—A man who was believed to die in what police suspected may have been a rivalry between two motorcycle gangs was identified Tuesday as Ed White, 20, of Dayton, Ohio.

Identification through an FBI fingerprint check came almost 24 hours after White's chatted body, bound and trussed, was found amid burning rubbish in a tenement in Manhattan's hippie-haunted East Village.

He apparently had been bound with a rope from around his neck to his hands tied behind him and then sprayed with a flammable liquid and set afire. In police custody were 14 men and five women described as members of the Alton Nomads motorcycle gang. They were arrested on narcotics charges but police suspected that White's slayer or slayers might be among them.

The majority of those arrested ranged in age from 18 to 21, and the bearded men, according to police, wore jackets of the Alton Nomads.

Police speculated that the slaying was related to rivalry between the Nomads and another hard-riding group, the Pagans. They said, however, they were not sure if White was a member of either group.

LAUNCHING PLANNED ROME (UPI) — The Italian Space Research Center Tuesday said it will launch the third in a series of scientific satellites in the coast of Kenya late this year. Officials said the satellite, designed to test air density and composition, probably will be launched in November or December.

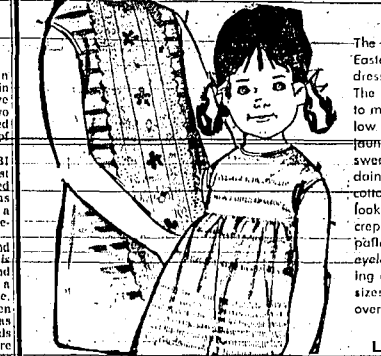

## Brave Dad 'Throws' Son Out Of House, Into Life

"Harold, you've been home from the service six weeks. Don't you think it's about time you looked for a job—and found something you want to do in life?"

"I don't feel like going to work yet," I retorted. "Besides, I don't know what I want to do."

"Like many young men of that day, I today had returned from service in World War I disturbed and unsettled in mind. I had no desire to battle for my place in the world. What was the rush, anyway? Why was Dad pushing me?"

One night when he came home from the store and saw me lounging on the front porch, Dad said "Still doing nothing?"

"That's right!" I rejoined.

Have you been thinking about what you might like to do?"

"Yes, but there's nothing in this town that appeals to me," I answered.

Dad looked at me for a long moment and then said "Well, I guess if that's the case you'll have to leave town to find what does appeal."

A glint in the face could not have hurt me as much—so now it was out. Dad was really trying to get rid of me.

"All right," I said, "I'll get out. I'll go to Detroit and get work with Henry Ford."

"That's a good idea," said Dad. "But I'm not sure you can ever feel compelled to do it. He had to force me, as gently but as persistently as possible, to get out on my own."

It wasn't many months, after my employment at the Ford Motor Co. in Highland Park, Detroit, that another reason for Dad's action was revealed. For some time he had been suffering from severe headaches. An examination disclosed a tumor on the brain.

It was now obvious that Dad had known something serious was wrong and had wanted me, the eldest son, to be prepared not only to take care of myself but to assume a greater family responsibility.

I thank God every night for my wonderful parents. My hope is that other sons and daughters of today, when their time comes to leave home, that their fathers and mothers do not love them any less than I was loved, and even anxious for their own good, to let them go.

### Flush Line Conversion Work Begins

The city water and sewer department has begun work to convert the old filter plant flush line into a sanitary sewer, according to Jean Millar, city engineer.

Mr. Millar said he could not be certain when the work will be completed because the crews must coordinate this project in with their regularly scheduled work. He said, however, the conversion should be completed in two or three weeks.

He said the conversion involves the installation of about 20 feet of pipe to connect to the existing line. Valves and fittings must be installed at the old reservoir and at the old filter plant building.

When completed, the sanitary sewer line will serve residents along Washington Street South. The area that could ultimately be served is approximately 500 acres. There are 100 existing buildings and a 1,000 man labor camp in the area that can utilize the line. The engineering department feels the capacity will be more than adequate.

### Viet President Says Monk Will Be Treated Well

SAIGON (UPI)—President Nguyen Van Thieu announced Tuesday that the Buddhist monk sentenced by the government to 10 years at hard labor last Saturday would not serve his time in a prison and would receive "special treatment."

The announcement came on the heels of strong protests from the Buddhist Church, charging the government with carrying out "illegal and unconstitutional court martials" and exploiting the war to repress the Buddhist Church.

The monk, Thich Thien Minh,

48, was sentenced to two military courts Saturday and Monday to the hard labor and five years of confinement on charges of harboring deserters and rebels, and being in possession of weapons and illegal documents. He denied the charges, saying he was not present at the police search which uncovered the documents and weapons.

# Senate Bill Alters Ratio Of Funding

BOISE (UPI)—A bill which would increase the ratio of certain school districts under the education foundation program by applying either 25 or 30 per cent of average daily attendance was introduced in the Senate Tuesday.

Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl, sponsor of the new revision, told the Senate Education Committee that he thought it would do less violence to any school district due to changes in assessment ratios.

He said the bill would provide that for full appointment each district must maintain a 20 mill or equivalent levy each year of the 1968-70 and 1970-71 school years.

Under the measure, a school district making such levy would receive at least as much state and county aid as it did in the 1968-69 year plus 25 per cent of ADA if the district's total weighted ADA is more than 90 and 30 per cent weighted ADA if the weighted ADA attendance is less than 90.

Barker said school districts not making the 30 mill or equivalent levy shall have the state appropriation reduced in proportion to the levy.

# Agnew Develops New Image; Could Become Party Asset

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew is developing a new image in Washington, and if the process continues, he could develop into quite an asset for the Nixon administration.

During the campaign he made the idea that the vice president is little more than a glorified staff board, Agnew faces a more subtle, difficult task of letting the rest of Washington—and the country—know more about his serious duties.

Nixon apparently is more than willing to help in this phase of Agnew's career. The vice president has begun to make public statements from the White House about serious matters to which the President has assigned him.

Maybe the day will come when he feels no need to kid about the vice presidency. His phony, never-made-it-to-that-point-not-until-he-became-a-party-presidential-candidate

# Grazing Rule Delay Seen For 1 Month

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)—A decision on a suit filed protesting recent grazing fee hikes for stockmen may not be handed down for at least a month, it was learned Tuesday.

Dist. Judge Howard C. Bratton Tuesday ordered attorneys representing both the Pankey Land and Cattle Co. and the government to file briefs on the case after testimony in the non-jury trial ended Tuesday. A decision on this case is not expected until mid-April, Bratton indicated.

The Pankey Land and Cattle Co. is protesting the recent increases from 33 cents per animal per month to 51.23 per animal per month over the next 10 years.

Testimony from two federal officials wound up the hearing Tuesday.

The two—George L. Turcott, deputy assistant director for recall of the Bureau of Land Management, and Reginald Denle, forest service director of range management—said they helped in the study of grazing on public lands in 11 Western states.

They said, however, they did not have anything to do with the administrative decisions to increase the grazing fees.

The livestock growers will have until March 28 to file a brief on the issues of the case and the government must file an answer brief by April 4. A response brief from the plaintiffs must be filed April 11.

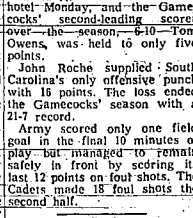

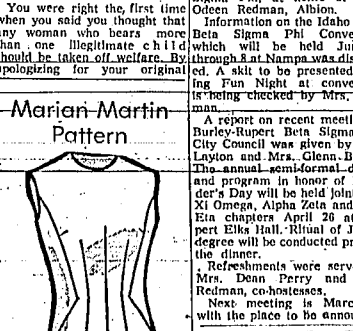
**DEAR ABBY:** My father-in-law has been a widower for some time in his life he made a mistake, and that was when he "thought" he was wrong, and then found out he was right.
