Oil Refineries Set Ablaze

Egypt, Israel Fight Near Canal

Egyptian and Israeli artillery and tanks battled along a 72-mile stretch of the Suez Canal today. Israeli military sources said Arab oil refineries were set ablaze and Egyptian artillery emplacements knocked out.

It was the first major fight across the Suez Canal in six days and an Israeli military spokesman said the Egyptians started the shooting, taking advantage of the first clear weather in several days to open up on the heavily sandbagged Israeli bunkers constructed along the east bank of the canal on the fringes of the Sinai Desert.

The area has been blanketed by heavy sand storms but the winds subsided today and Egyptian troops in the Sinai began shooting. The big guns of both sides

blazed all the way from Qantara, about 20 miles below Port Said, at the northern end of the canal, to Suez City at the south end. An Israeli spokesman said "numerous" Egyptian oil refineries and artillery positions were hit. Most of them are at the Suez end of the canal and they were set on fire in a battle a few weeks ago.

The United Nations finally arranged a cease-fire after one abortive attempt. While fighting raged across the 103-mile-long waterway, major political upheavals were taking place in Jordan and in Syria.

Nixon Administration Urges Approval Of Debt Limit Boost

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Nixon administration, resigned to the political embarrassment of having to request annual increases in the national debt limit, today urged the Senate Finance Committee to approve the first such boost.

The House passed \$12 billion temporary increases, even though it contains a built-in crisis for next year. Senate Republican Whip Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania said the Democratic-controlled Congress could not be expected to approve Nixon's original request to rejigger the debt bookkeeping which probably would have avoided the need for additional increases for several years.

The House rejected the bookkeeping change. The President asked for a permanent \$300 billion limit on the revised books. That amounted to a \$17 billion increase but it looked on paper like a cut.

The plan probably would have given Nixon debt-breathing room for the rest of his four-year term because the trust funds have been taking in more than they pay out and their surpluses could close over temporary slumps in general revenue.

Hansen Asks Reversal Of Order

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Orval Hansen, R-Idaho, has asked the Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Robert H. Finch to reverse the former administration's order to close the Rocky Mountain Educational Laboratory.

Hansen said three million school children in the Rocky Mountain states could be adversely affected by closure of the Greeley, Colo., experimental laboratory.

Hansen said he has contacted all members of Congress in the region asking that they also support retention of the laboratory.

"The laboratory has appealed for an operational status for six additional months, without federal appropriations to prove its program to help teachers develop new teaching skills and materials could be successful," Hansen said. He says not only in agreement that the laboratory and four similar ones in other regions be closed.

In a letter to Finch, Hansen said, "The arbitrary decision to close this laboratory ignores the needs of the children living in the area now being served."

Wilson Claims Britain Saves \$4.8 Billion

PENZANCE, England (UPI)—British Prime Minister Harold Wilson said Saturday his government has saved \$4.8 billion—in defense spending despite "the vainglorious and bloated programs we inherited."

Wilson said that in government spending the "single basic choice" was between military needs and education. The money his Labor party government has saved in military outlays in the five years it has been in office, he said, has gone into education and other social services.

His Conservative party opponents "have this challenge to government—do you will," he told a Labor party reception in this Cornwall town.

Wilson said Britain's choice for the future lay between his government's planned continuation of reduced defense spending and the Conservative program of increased military expenditure at the expense of the social services.

"They want... a mean Britain, grudgingly doling out what, when in office, they called 'donations,' to those in distress," Wilson said. "We want a compassionate Britain where our citizens receive as a right the benefits they have paid for and earned, where the weak are supported by the strong."

Peru Bishop Marries Policewoman

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—The Auxiliary Roman Catholic Bishop of Lima, Peru, has married a former Argentine policewoman, the bride's father said Sunday. Official Church reports said the cleric had resigned out of a crisis of faith but did not confirm the marriage.

Ramon Fernandez Trevino said his daughter, Maria married former Bishop Mario Renato Cornejo Rava de R March 10. He was confirming a report to that effect in a newspaper La Razon of Buenos Aires.

"I can tell you it's true, they have married," Fernandez told reporters at his apartment. My daughter has gone out and I don't know when she's coming back.

"I'm very pleased with her choice of a husband," he said.

The CED, a nonprofit and nonpartisan research organization, said Schiff, who has been an undersecretary for monetary affairs since February 1968, would resign soon after leaving the government.

De Murville Poses Image Of Austerity

PARIS (NEA)—To the majority of Frenchmen, Maurice Couve de Murville is cold, phlegmatic, unimaginative—a great public servant who carries out policies but does not initiate them. As prime minister, he occupies second place in the "French Republic."

He also is called the most British of French politicians and has never attempted to change this public portrait of himself. When he left the foreign ministry, he said simply, "This is an agonizing moment." Not quite the iceberg that he's portrayed to be.

He is also far removed from the air of leisure, of apparent indolence, which hung around George Pompidou, the former prime minister. President de Gaulle and Couve de Murville are two aloof, dedicated machines. But for all their dedication, they are machines of another generation. De Gaulle is past 70 and his prime minister is 61. Meanwhile, France is in the throes of a youth crisis and has been struggling the last six months in the disastrous wake of the student uprisings and the great strike of May 1968. Couve de Murville appears confident he can solve the problems posed by the generation gap, but he hasn't spelled out the answers.

He is not, however, a "yes-man" for De Gaulle. He opposed the French leader's decision to take his country out of NATO and as finance minister enjoyed the boss' confidence without following his dictates.

De Gaulle and Couve (as he's known to select friends) have two common points of view—a lofty idea of France's place in the world and high appreciation for their own personalities and power.

Yet, unlike De Gaulle, Couve de Murville is rated one of the most astute diplomats in the world, a fine negotiator, a man who is fluent in both English and German (he was an ambassador to Great Britain and West Germany). He is also a meticulous detail man.

"With the boss," explained an aide, "it is essential to work hard, use one's imagination, look ahead and know." He is at his desk every day at 8:30 in the morning, generally stays past 8 o'clock at night, and always goes home with a stack of papers in his attache case. He shows public appearances, feeling he doesn't have time for much functions.

To television viewers, he's an austere character, precise in his delivery and in his feeling, wary smiles. But in private he knows how to relax. He plays golf, is an avid comic strip fan and a great mimick. He even relents sometimes and takes his de-

shund, Jason, to the office with him. The "Coves" have three daughters and six grandchildren they've lived in the same

room apartment on the Left Bank for 35 years. But he's not just another man commuting to the office. Couve should be run.

Two Men Are Killed In East Chicago Gun-Battle

EAST CHICAGO, Ill. (UPI)—Two men were killed but a third escaped Saturday night after they forced their way into the home of an elderly woman in Chicago, a gun battle later engaged two private citizens in a gun battle. Police identified one of the dead as Harold Lee Simpson, Jr., 27, address unknown. Authorities said they had no positive identification on the second dead, but the woman's body wasn't found until Sunday, a block from the shooting scene. Police theorize the three gunmen, wearing ski masks and masks, planned to crack a supermarket safe, but first decided to incapacitate the elderly couple who opened the door for fear they could hear the noise and call police. The three, equipped with burglar tools and armed with a shotgun and two pistols, knocked on the door of John Nauracy, 79, and rendered his wife, Mary, 70, helpless with a chemical spray which she answered the door. The slugged Nauracy unconscious when he tried to resist them. A passerby saw the trio forcing their way into the home and called the Nauracy's son-in-law George Almanson, 43, who lives in the next block. Almanson and friend, Andrew Gora, 51, armed themselves with shotguns and headed for the Nauracy home, police said. Authorities said Almanson opened fire when he was confronted by the trio at the front door. Police said a shotgun blast apparently struck one of the three and injured him fatally, although he didn't die until after limping to a block away and across the city limits into adjoining Hammond. The trio returned Almanson's fire, police said, and Gora raced around to the rear of the house as the three inside tried to leave through the back door. Police said Gora tried to hold the door shut with his body and was wounded in the left shoulder when a revolver was fired through the door. Meanwhile, police say, Almanson reached the rear of the house and there was another exchange of gunfire as the trio tried to flee. Police said a shotgun blast apparently struck Simpson at that point and he fell backward, down a flight of stairs into the basement where officers later found him dying in a pool of blood, his stocking mask still on his face and his pistol beside him. There also was a walkie-talkie strapped to his leg. Almanson was struck in the left hand and left side of the face by shotgun pellets as he exchanged fire with the bandits as they fled the modest Nauracy home. Almanson operates a towing service and auto repair shop in East Chicago.

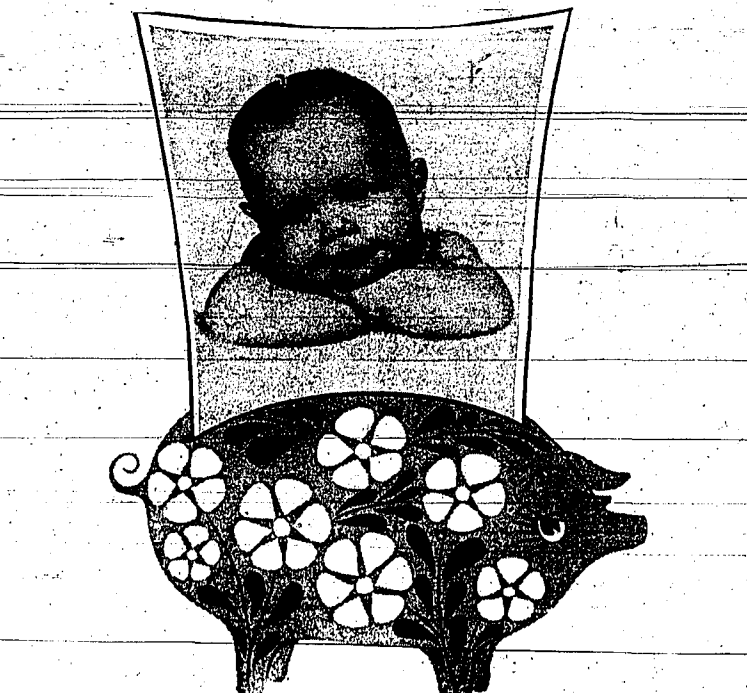

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Injured Widow Finds Healing, Founds Controversial Church

By LOUIS CASSELS, UPI Religion Writer. On a winter evening in February, 1966, a frail young widow named Mary Baker Eddy was seriously injured by a fall on an icy sidewalk in Lynn, Mass. She was carried unconscious to a nearby home. For two days she remained in critical condition and her friends despaired of her life. On the third day she asked for a Bible. She read the ninth chapter of Matthew the account of Christ's healing of a man bedridden with palsy. Although she had read the familiar passage many times before, on this occasion Mrs. Eddy found in it a new significance. After a brief prayer, she closed the Bible, arose from bed, dressed herself, and walked into the parlor to greet her startled friends. Out of this event, and Mrs. Eddy's subsequent reflections, grew one of America's least-understood religious denominations—the Christian Science Church. Formally established in Boston in 1879, it now has more than 2,200 branches in 48 countries. In accordance with a rule laid down by Mrs. Eddy, it does not publish membership statistics, but it is known to have several hundred thousand adherents. Christian Science usually is identified in the public mind with spiritual healing. But the church's distinctive teachings about health can be understood only in the context of its basic theology, which is outlined in Mrs. Eddy's book "Science and Health, With Key to the Scriptures." All local churches are branches of the original "Mother Church" in Boston. In each of them, worship services are conducted every Sunday morning by "readers" elected by the congregation. Passages from the Bible and from Mrs. Eddy's writings are read at Sunday services. At midweek, usually on Wednesday evening, Christian Science churches conduct testimonial meetings at which persons healed of illness relate their experiences. Most local churches also sponsor one or more "reading rooms" at which interested persons may find extensive literature on Christian Science. Mrs. Eddy did not originally set out to establish a new denomination. She hoped to work through existing churches. She set up a separate organization only after she became convinced (like Martin Luther more than three centuries earlier) that "new wine cannot be put in old wine skins." Local churches enjoy a considerable degree of autonomy in the management of their affairs, but all must function within the framework of by-laws laid down by Mrs. Eddy and interpreted by a self-perpetuating board of directors of the Mother Church in Boston. One of the most important units of the church is the Christian Science Publishing Society, which publishes Christian Science literature in many languages, as well as one of the world's most respected newspapers, the Christian Science Monitor. Trash Disposal Business Grows To Gigantic Size

By LEROY POPE UPI Business Writer NEW YORK (UPI) — Whether it continues to be done mainly by municipalities or is increasingly turned over to private contractors, garbage and trash disposal is going to be an ever growing business.

The trash disposal burden of 340 billion pounds a year and increasing by possibly 40 billion pounds a year. That's more than a ton for every man, woman and child right now.

"More money must be devoted to disposal because incineration contributes too much to air pollution," says Felix Bruch of Scientific Pollution Control Corp. of New York.

In many American cities, garbage and trash now are compacted in bales. A pneumatic compacting unit mounted on a carousel in apartment house basements made for Hirsch's firm compact garbage into a quarter of its bulk and seals it in cheap kraft paper or plastic bags.

by a Brooklyn firm, Hirsch says compacting ultimately will doom the cluttering metal garbage can that costs city dwellers so much early morning sleep.

A Louisville firm, Industrial Services of America, Inc., has built integrated trash disposal and compacting plants in three cities—Louisville, Detroit and Atlanta.

Harry Kleiter, president of Industrial Services, says salvage from trash can save as much as \$8,500 monthly for a community that collects 400 tons daily.

These plants salvage paper, metal and other reusable materials from trash before compacting the remainder for burial in sanitary landfills. Dry trash can be compacted into one-tenth of its bulk.

Historical Society Organizing Exhibits In County Museum

Members of the Twin Falls County Historical Society will begin to organize antiques which have recently been moved into the county museum, on U. S. Highway 20, according to Helen Porterfield, society secretary.

Items which have been stored at the fairgrounds at Ellier recently were moved into the remodeled museum, and Tuesday members of the society will begin preparing historical displays.

It is expected that the museum housed in the converted Union School building, will be open by early summer.

All major remodeling on the main floor of the building has been finished, Miss Porterfield said, and display cases used at Ellier during fair time will be used for display of the club's collection.

The collection includes farm implements, clothing, dishes, photographs, Indian artifacts and other items, mostly received from Twin Falls County and surrounding areas.

The county purchased the Union School property several months ago from the school district for \$7,500, after the school was closed and students there were bused into Twin Falls.

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
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
