Mr. VanAuker said the 131,393 square foot building on a 15-acre site on the Airport Road. Mr. VanAuker and Reed Good, owner of the property, met Wednesday afternoon to negotiate terms of the land sale.

The city has received a letter from Mrs. Jenny Stewart stating she is agreeable to having the front portion of her property annexed into the city to permit the annexation of the Kellwood property.

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"As far as I can find out, Kellwood will become the first garment manufacturer in the state, and this is a significant and tremendous move forward towards more diversification."

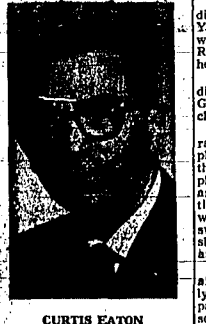

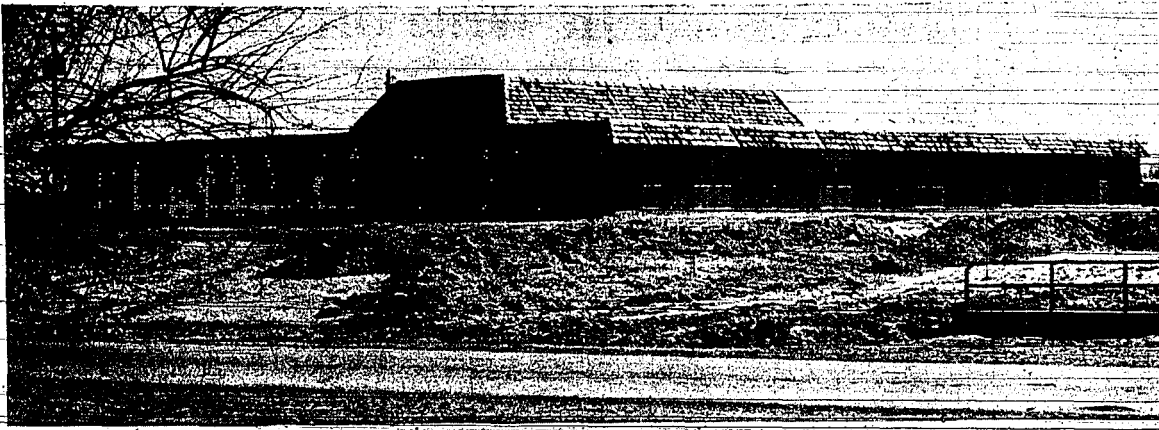

Tubist Has Answer For Those Casting Aspersions On His Horn

By MARGARET MCGOVERN

WEST HARTFORD, Conn. (UPI)—A long-suffering tubist has the perfect answer for those who cast aspersions on his horn. He says the tuba may be responsible for the "boom" but the "pah" belongs to the French horn.

Ronald Apperson, who is the tuba faculty at Hart School of Music of the University of Hartford, said most people mistake the tuba for the Sousaphone, which renders the "boom-pah" in marching parades although the difference is like that between Fillet of Sole Cleopatra and tuna on toast.

Apperson, 32, lives in suburban Granby in a split-level house especially chosen so he could play his tuba in the basement without disturbing his wife and infant daughter. He said he doesn't disturb the neighbors, but it wasn't always like that.

In 1965 Apperson, who was then living in a Hartford apartment was ordered by his baggage-playing superintendent to cut out the tooting or take his brass elsewhere because of complaints from irate neighbors. He relocated rather than hang up his tuba which he regards as a "serious instrument" and "no joke."

"A lot of music has been written for the tuba but not much of it is very good because it makes a joke out of an instrument," he said. However, he said you can have "a lot of good music" in pieces such as the "ones" written by Leroy Anderson, who composes primarily for trumpet and has a horse whinny at the end of "Sleigh Ride."

Because there is a lack of good literature for the tuba, the music student is faced with inferior arrangements and there is no challenge so he gives up," Apperson said.

Many people just don't know what it can do musically, which is a lot, he said. "Although it has the same range as the Sousaphone, named after the march king, John Philip Sousa, one is a delicate instrument that you can be musical on and the other is not a very thankful instrument at all," he said.

A native of Portland, Ore., Apperson has fully manned the Hartford staff since 1964. He plays full time with the Hartford Symphony and part-time with the Springfield (Mass.) Symphony.

He describes the horn as exuding a mellow sound, similar to the French horn but lower in pitch. The tuba, which retails in the United States at \$1,200, according to the teacher, is the youngest of the brass instruments.

It evolved in 1835 when craftsmen learned how to manufacture and mold brass in a thinner way and produce better valves. It is really a

Poll Reveals Viewers Agree On TV Violence

NEW YORK (UPI)—More than two-thirds of the Americans interviewed in a nationwide poll agreed either fully or in part with the idea that television and movie violence causes violence in real life.

Stoddinger & Company, a market research firm that conducts daily public opinion polls, reported that 67.5 per cent of the 1,554 Americans polled from March 20 to March 24 said they agreed either fully or partially with the idea.

By comparison, Stoddinger said only 49.8 per cent of the respondents agreed either fully or partially with the same idea in a similar poll conducted last June, following the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy Jr.

The findings, released Wednesday, are part of Stoddinger's daily report series, a service that provides the firm's clients with a daily account of consumer activity and public opinion on current topics in the news.

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U.S. Aids Soviet Research

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (UPI)—A Soviet trawler with the most sophisticated electronic gear sailed from this port Wednesday for weeks of sweeping along the Pacific Coast from San Diego to San Francisco.

It does so not only with the blessing of the U.S. government but also with an American scientist aboard.

The Soviet vessel, Professor Derygin, is out to count fish, specifically the hake, a member of the cod family, to insure this marine resource off the Pacific shores is not being depleted faster than it reproduces.

With the memory of the USS Pueblo in the background, it was particularly demonstrative of the trust the Soviet Union and the United States are now showing "one another" at lower levels of collecting data.

Dr. Paul Smith of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography in La Jolla, Calif., sailed with the Derygin this afternoon to insure the Soviets use the same equipment three American ships have used in counting the fish eggs in the plankton that lies off the Coast of the United States.

The point of the joint scientific experiment was to measure whether the fish is being taken too rapidly from the seas.

In San Pedro Harbor Tuesday Capt. Nicholas Shikhanov and chief scientist Yuri Yermakov welcomed American visitors aboard the trim 297-foot, 4,000-ton, white trawler.

The vessel, sailing from Vladivostok, carries delicate electronic equipment to measure the ocean depths and to scan the adjacent shores. The only crew of the ship out of bounds to visitors was the radio room. One of the mates on the ship said the Derygin had the capability of maintaining Morse and radio teletype contact with Vladivostok but did not have voice communications.

The ship has a crew of 84 men and 10 women. Two of the women are oceanographic scientists and the other eight are stewardesses.

Smith said it was not unique that an American scientist was aboard a Soviet ship. The important thing about this voyage was that the Soviets agreed to use American equipment and standards in taking the census of the hake population.

Smith will be brought back to San Pedro on Friday. From that time on the Soviet vessel will range the West Coast from Baja California to San Francisco, moving out as far as 400 miles and in as close as 9 miles.

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
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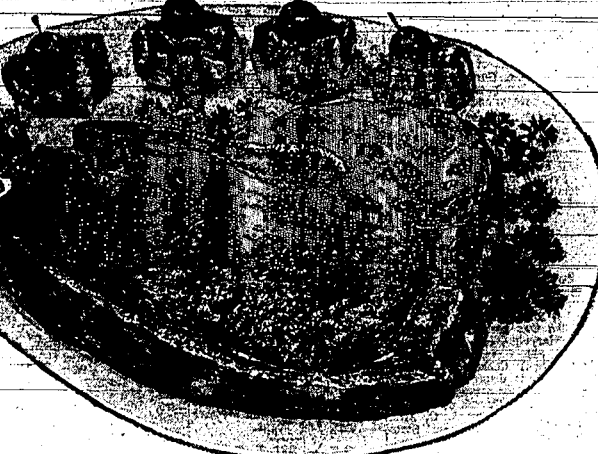

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
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Four Girls Found Murdered

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI)—All four girls were slightly built and had long, light brown hair.

All have been found murdered in the last 21 months in Michigan. The third was found six days ago. The fourth was found Tuesday.

Three were coeds; two attended the same university. The fourth—the last—was a 16-year-old runaway.

The clothes of three were piled neatly next to their bodies. One, the third, was found lying on a grave.

There's someone mentally deranged around here who's got to be caught, says Washaw County Sheriff Douglas Harvey.

The critically beaten, nude body of Marilyn Skelton, 16, a runaway from Flint, was found by a surveyor Tuesday in a wooded area near a love nest used by students of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. Last July, the body of Joan Schell, 21, a coed at Eastern Michigan University, was found less than a quarter-mile away.

Last Friday, the body of University of Michigan coed Jane Louise Mixer, 23, was found on a grave in a cemetery east of Ypsilanti—where Eastern Michigan is. In August of 1967, Eastern Michigan coed Mary Fieszar, 19, was found in underbrush northeast of Ypsilanti, about 10 miles east of Ann Arbor.

The latest slaying was by far the most sadistic, says Walter Krasny, chief of the Ann Arbor Police Department.

"She was unmercifully beaten about the face," said Krasny. An autopsy revealed she died of a fractured skull, probably caused by a blunt instrument. It was believed she was sexually assaulted.

Marilyn was reported missing Monday by her mother, Mrs. Archie Skelton, who said she last saw her daughter Saturday when she left Flint bound for Ann Arbor. The family was in the process of moving from the Detroit suburb of Romulus to Flint and it was believed Marilyn planned to visit friends.

Mrs. Skelton said her daughter had recently been keeping company with a 17-year-old "traveller" type and with known marijuana users. The young girl had two contacts with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, both in connection with marijuana.

Within hours of the latest slaying, Dr. Harold Spengler, president of Eastern Michigan, issued a warning to coeds at his school not to venture out alone at night and above all not to hitchhike.

"That warning won't do much good," said Krasny. "We warn them about it all the time, but they still get into cars with men they don't know."

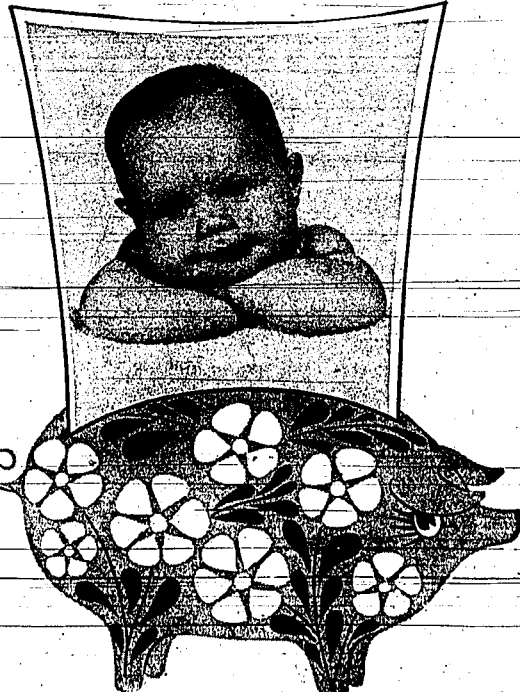

Private police hired by the school board excluded about 80 young persons who tried to push in and support the persons issuing the demands. Guards said city fire marshals considered the room already filled to capacity.

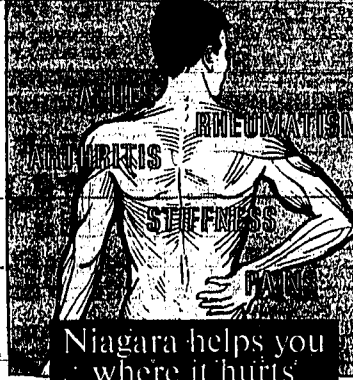

Albion Phone Firm Asks Rate Increase

ALBION—A letter requesting authority to increase the Albion Telephone Co. rates has been filed with the Idaho Public Utilities. A public hearing will be held May 27 in the Albion Grange Hall on the request, which will be the first rate increase in 12 years.

The proposed increase ranges from 50 cents to \$2, according to ODeen Redman, manager of the Albion Telephone Co.

The increase proposed for one party business phone is from the present \$8 per month to \$9.50; a two-party business phone would increase from \$7 to \$9; rural business phone rates would increase from \$8 to \$7 and all business extension phones would be increased from \$1.50 to \$2, reported Mr. Redman.

Private telephone rates will be increased if the Public Utility Commission approves rate increase request of the company. Proposed are one party rates increase from \$5.50 per month to \$7.25; two party lines increase from \$6 per month to \$6.50; four party lines will increase from \$4.50 to \$5.75; rural rates will increase from \$4 to \$5.25, and all non-business extension phones will increase from \$1 to \$1.50.

Presently Mountain States Telephone rates for similar service are all higher than the present Albion Telephone Co. rate. If the Albion Telephone Co. rates increase it is approved they will be higher than existing Burley rates.

This is the first rate increase the Albion Telephone Co. has proposed for its 500 customers since 1956 when the system was converted to dial phones, stated Mr. Redman.

The company has held off on rate increases until the company felt that service had been upgraded enough to justify a rate increase," he said.

Since 1956 the Albion Telephone Co. has increased plant facilities by \$265,000 and the company officials feel this is more than enough to justify an increase.

Presently the Albion Telephone Co. is maintaining 250 miles of pole line and 784 miles of aerial line.

One of the problems the Albion Telephone Co. has involves the extremely low density of its service area, a 1.8 subscriber per wire mile. Residents at Albion, Malta, Eiba and Almo are served by the Albion Telephone.

The Albion Telephone Co. has been in business for the past 62 years and it is a family-owned corporation.

The gold award, 77th presentation of the medal for heroism in Vietnam, was made posthumously to Sgt. Rodney M. Davis, 25, of Macon, Ga.

In addition to the widow, others present at the award ceremony included Davis' children, Nichola, 3, and Samantha, 2, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon M. Davis of Macon.
