Continued From Page One. . . argued further that if the act were applied, it is unconstitutional. . . The court will not announce for some weeks whether it will hear the Welsh case. . . In his 21-page ruling, the judge said: . . . "In short, in the draft act, Congress unconstitutionally discriminated against atheists, agnostics and men like Sisson who, whether they be religious or not, are motivated in their conscientious objection to the draft by profound moral beliefs which constitute the central convictions of their beliefs. . . Thus, the court, therefore, concludes that in granting to the religious conscientious objector, but not to Sisson, a special conscientious objector status, the act, as applied to Sisson, violates the provisions of the first amendment that 'Congress shall make no law respecting of freedom of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof.' . . .

McClure Suggests Congressmen For Federal District

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. James McClure, R-Idaho, introduced legislation Tuesday to provide congressional representation for the District of Columbia. . . The bill, in the form of a constitutional amendment, provides for representation "in such measure as the Congress may direct." . . . McClure said, "It is one of the real ironies of our times that the residents living in the District of Columbia are not represented in Congress."

Nevada Jury Acquits Lucas Of Slaying Two Businessmen

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Clean Lucas has been acquitted of killing two Wyoming businessmen but the road to freedom for the 47-year-old Reno man is still blocked. Lucas Tuesday night was cleared of killing Robert Stucker, 30, and Larry Olinger, 33, both of Jackson, Wyo., but remained in Clark County Jail for delivery to northern Nevada to face another murder charge. The latter case involves the slaying of Glen Belt, 45, Susanville, Calif. Belt, believed to be a member of a burglary-gang, was found buried two miles from where the bodies of Stucker and Olinger were found. At the Tuesday trial, when jury foreman Nolan Mitchell read the acquittal verdict, both Lucas and defense attorney Carl Martillano wept and embraced each other. The seven-woman, five-man jury received the case after a hearing more than three weeks of testimony. It reached a verdict several hours after resuming deliberations after a dinner break. Following the acquittal, Mrs. E. H. Olinger, Davenport, Iowa, mother of one of the victims, told Martillano, "If you're going to commit murder, you have to come to Nevada."

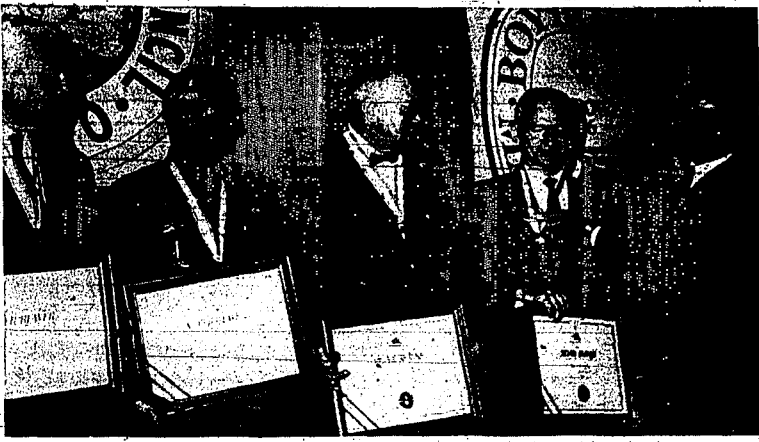

Hypnotists Offer New Hope To Many In Surgical Work

NEW YORK (NEA) — Dr. David Johnston has helped deliver more than 2,000 babies in the past 13 years. Many obstetricians have delivered twice as many. But Dr. Johnston isn't an obstetrician. He's a hypnotist. Dr. Johnston is president of the Southern California Society for Clinical Hypnosis. Though he uses hypnosis in many aspects of his psychiatric practice, it is most effective, and most popular, in easing the discomforts of childbirth. "Hypnosis is an excellent anesthetic for the expectant mother," Dr. Johnston says. "It eliminates fear, pain, tension and anxiety, but leaves the patient conscious and aware of everything that's happening."

Dr. Johnston wears sportcoats instead of the traditional white or pale green gown, and has his floors carpeted instead of tiled. "That tells the patient there will be no blood," he says. "Hypnotic recipients are trained in the 'correct voice and words to use.' Coffee cups in his waiting room bear the word 'relax.' The room itself has a fireplace, several floral displays and magazines filled with pleasant things."

When Dr. Burt fits a new denture on a patient, instead of giving the patient a prescription for pain pills, a warning about bleeding, swelling and discoloration and an order to eat only liquid foods for a couple of days, he tells him there will be no "postoperative complications," and goes out to a steak-and-salad dinner with him. "As with other surgery, hypnosis vastly reduces bleeding, as well as pain and anxiety. Though most patients who ask for hypnosis in medical work do so because of this freedom from discomfort, some have hypnosis thrust upon them because allergies or other physiological conditions prevent the use of conventional anesthesia. In these situations, patients long burdened by pain or disabling handicaps because they thought corrective surgery impossible, become free of pain with their experience under hypnosis that, in their zeal, they credit hypnosis with actually curing them."

But, as Dr. Ralph Winn writes in "Scientific Hypnotism": "Suggestion does not perform miracles. It is completely helpless in maladies rooted in anatomical physiological defects." Just as a patient's loose talk, the curative powers of hypnosis creates problems for doctors and hypnologists as another kind of loose talk, by the doctors themselves, often creates problems for the patient and other hypnotists. Any mention of pain to a patient under hypnosis suggests to him to feel no "discomfort"

Board Of Corrections To Await New Director For Further Action

BOISE (UPI)—A. W. (Tony) Naegle, chairman of the part-time Board of Corrections said Tuesday, most of the decisions concerning the state penitentiary are being held until Raymond May, new warden, arrives.

But he struck a hard line as he added that while "it has been natural for those at the prison to seek the warden's ear, I think any board worth its salt would stand on its feet and resist any outside influences."

Naegle told the State Press Club "my only experience has been that of a legislator." He said he and the other board members "appreciated the confidence the legislature had to give us a lump sum appropriation" and said the building program at the new site for the penitentiary would be pushed ahead as fast as possible.

"But we don't propose to move a shovelful of dirt until our new director of corrections looks at our plans."

Naegle said May, who is scheduled to arrive in Boise May 21, has been highly recommended by other penitentiologists. May, 61, has already retired from the federal

penitentiary system and is now serving as director of corrections in Alaska.

"But if he were available only two or three years we'd still hire him for his knowledge," Naegle said.

The chairman of the board emphasized that the new prison program will be a rehabilitative one, and added that May felt 80 to 90 per cent of those in prison could be rehabilitated.

Naegle said May had the rapport with other federal agencies to help us eliminate those who ought not to be in a penitentiary. One of the problems, Naegle added, was that there are no facilities at the penitentiary for the criminally insane and he felt May could help to place these men in other institutions.

Naegle said there were no plans at the present to bring Idaho's women prisoners back from Nevada, although he said "We've been receiving mail from the women and they want to get back to Idaho."

He said of the nine women who were sent to Nevada six months ago, "I don't think it would be economical to employ matrons to care for the six."

But May, Naegle said, pointed out that the trend nationally "is to move women in prison as a result of narcotics," and if the trend continues, "we'll be in the ballpark" with the existing facilities for 50 women prisoners.

Naegle had the highest praise for the other members of the part-time board, Bob Rice and William Dee. He said he could foresee no problem with C. L. (Doc) House, full-time board member who has not resigned, since "with even two members on the board we'd have a quorum."

Earlier Tuesday, Deputy Attorney General Mack A. Redford told State Auditor Joe Williams William Dee cannot be paid until House resigns from the board since there may be a question as to whether the new board was constitutionally created or whether they succeeded to the positions of the old.

'Craters' Designation Asked

"I think it is highly appropriate in this year of 1969 when American astronauts plan an actual landing on the moon that Congress take action to preserve as wilderness a large portion of this fabulous lunar-like landscape on our own planet," Church said.

Drugs Banned

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Food and Drug Administration served notice Tuesday it intends to act to stop the marketing of 78 drug products containing antibiotics on the ground that they expose patients to "an unnecessary risk."

Under the FDA's ground rules that a drug product must be judged on the basis of safety and efficacy—whether or not it works as claimed—the 78 products were found to be ineffective because each contained added ingredients not required to treat the intended ailment.

"The use of two or more active ingredients in the treatment of a patient who can be cured by one is irrational therapy," said Dr. Herbert L. Ley Jr., commissioner of food and drugs, in a statement.

"It exposes the patient to an unnecessary risk," Ley added. "Antibiotics should be used like a life rather than a shotgun."

QUAKE JOLTS MONTANA

KALISPELL, Mont. (UPI)—An earthquake struck northwestern Montana Tuesday.

Located in Butte and Blaine Counties in southcentral Idaho, the monument has been a major attraction to Idaho since it was established by presidential proclamation in 1924. As now constituted, the monument includes 53,845 acres.

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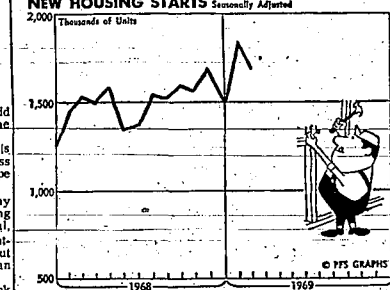

The Bureau, whose job it is to guard against the growth of monopoly and to protect the interest in the aviation industry, said Tuesday Air West has a dire need for cash to continue operating and it would be unable to raise the money without Hughes' backing.

The stockholders of Air West, by the merger of Bonanza, West Coast, and Pacific Northwest, approved the sale of the airline to Hughes. But Hughes must obtain CAB approval before he can take over the airline.

In a statement to hearing examiner Rosa I. Newman, the bureau attached conditions to its approval, including the fact Air West should be ineligible for a subsidy.

Mariner Answers Radioed Orders For Navigation

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—The Mariner 7 spacecraft, responding to a radio command sent through 1.12 million miles of space, obediently obtained a navigational fix Tuesday on the Air Canopy.

An electronic sensor aboard the Mars television scout locked on to the bright star so its camera will be pointing in the right direction when the craft whizzes past the planet the night of Aug. 4.

The next major maneuver planned—at Jet Propulsion Laboratory—is a slight change in the trajectory of the Mars probe. The course change is scheduled sometime next week, possibly as early as Monday.

The change will bring it to an altitude of about 2,000 miles so it can take relatively close-up pictures of the planet's surface.

More Waiting Cenarrusa Files 345 New Laws

BOISE (UPI)—The office of Secy. of State Pete Cenarrusa has received and filed the 345th bill that Gov. Don Samuelson has signed into law.

The governor, who returns from a business trip to Hawaii Sunday, still has an estimated 150 measures to act on.

The bill was introduced Tuesday by Sens. James E. Injovis, R-N.Y., Walter F. Mondale, D-Wis., Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., Richard S. Schweiker, R-Pa., and Harrison A. Williams, D-N.J., all members of the subcommittee on education.

It provides authorizations for \$10 million for fiscal 1970 and \$15 million for fiscal 1971 and 1972.

Bomb Threats Stir Police In Johnstown

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. (UPI) — Johnstown police are investigating a series of firebombings he would hold the fire drill as bomb threats and false fire alarms.

The outbreaks have followed the weekend fatal shooting of a 14-year-old Negro boy by a policeman. The policeman, who said he came upon several youths drinking in a downtown alley, has been charged with manslaughter.

At Conemaugh Twp. High School, pupils were due for a 45-minute fire drill over their lunch hour today after both police and the supervising principal received telephoned bomb threats.

Two businesses and a state office were damaged in three firebombings Monday night in the business district of nearby Davidsville.

About 100 police and firemen searched the Conemaugh Twp. school for two hours Tuesday night but found no evidence of explosives. Still, Supervising Principal James Herdman said he would hold the fire drill as a precaution.

Mayor Kenneth O. Tomkins of Johnstown ordered extra police and firemen on duty Tuesday night and slapped an 8 p.m. curfew on minors in the wake of the incidents. It applied to all persons under 21 years old and prohibited gatherings of more than two persons of any age on city streets.

Police said a fire was reported shortly before the start of the curfew in the city's Woodvale section. Fire officials, which said the blaze caused only minor damage, suspected arson. An unusual number of false alarms also were reported Tuesday night, authorities said.

Lovelace was named to the post by Gov. Don Samuelson. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the U. S. House of Representatives in the last general election.

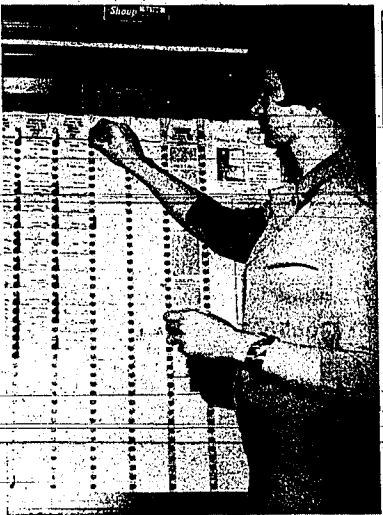

Many Approach Dentist's Chair With Great Fear

By PATRICIA McCORMACK NEW YORK (UPI) - You might as well have 20-pound weights on each foot when you approach the dental chair.

Once situated, you open mouth, close eyes and grip the handrests. You'd like to grip your teeth but you can't well while the dentist probes with what seems like a two-by-four.

Doing the next best thing, you become helpless, passive, frightened.

If you are typical and so is the dentist, that's the usual situation, according to Dr. Lucille Hollander Blum, authority in psychological aspects of the dentist-patient relationship.

But there are other kinds of dentists. These approach you informally and tend to explain. They take time to quiet the trembling within.

As a result, they have less fearful patients. Dr. Blum notes in a report in the "New York Journal of Dentistry."

She advises dentists to extend interest beyond the limited part.

even though the mouth and oral cavity need particular attention. "The dental experience, you see, sends some patients all the way back to the dependency state of infancy. This is because the mouth and oral cavity may be viewed as the gateway to total personality with its countless experiences, past as well as current."

Dr. Blum, who trains psychoanalysts at the Postgraduate Center for Mental Health in New York, said fear also comes from the patient viewing the dentist as one in a position of power with potential to injure.

Some authorities state that in adult life, teeth may represent aggressive weapons, strength, sexual attractiveness, health or decay.

"Thus," said Dr. Blum, "teeth are used as symbolic expressions of loss, separation or any other danger (threatening the individual)."

Some patients consider an extraction "loss" of a body part. "The tooth is replaced with one that looks and works almost as well as the natural one. But still to some patients, it's "a little tombstone."

Dr. Blum recommends to dentists that they take off the blinders and see more than the cavity or dental problem at hand.

"If he takes time to understand what a human being is like, and the implications of dental work, he will know how to respond," she said.

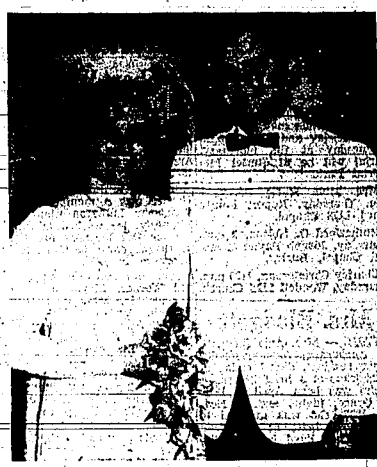

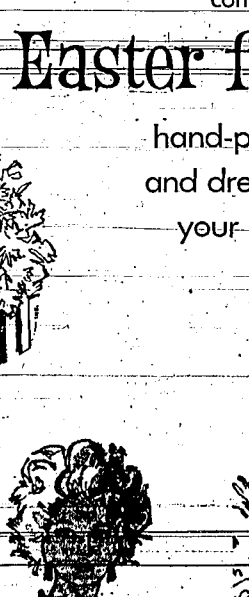

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Questions And Answers Are Posed On 1968 Tax Matters

These questions and answers on Internal Revenue Service matters have been submitted by the Twin Falls office of the IRS.

Q—My refund came and it was lower than I expected. How can I find out why it was reduced?
A—In cases such as these, mistakes in arithmetic account for most of the adjustments. You should receive an explanation from us shortly after your refund check arrives explaining the adjustment.

Q—This year, many mistakes in arithmetic are being made on either reading the surcharge tabs included on the return or taking by not adding it to their tax or making a mistake when they multiply by .075 to determine the amount of the surcharge.
A—When do I have to file my estimated tax declaration?
A—Estimated declarations and first quarter payments are due April 15. Use the pre-addressed 1040-ES voucher form you received in the mail when you filed. It can assure the proper crediting of payments to your account.

Q—How does the \$100 limit on casualty losses?
A—Your tax liability depends on how much you contributed to the pension fund. This is explained in the instructions for Schedule B of Form 1040. Copies of these schedules and the instructions are available at many banks and post offices as well as local offices of the IRS.

Q—Can I add the medical insurance premiums I pay for my dependent mother to my return for the purpose of tax deductions?
A—Premiums paid for medical care insurance for yourself, your spouse and your dependents are deductible. Total all of these premiums you paid last year and deduct one-half of them up to \$150 without regard to the three per cent rule. The balance of the premiums should be included with your other medical expenses which are subject to the three per cent limitation.

Q—You must itemize your deductions to use this rule.
A—If I'm due a refund, where should I send my return?
A—Send your return to the IRS Service Center. An envelope was enclosed with Form 1040 tax package. If you don't have one, look on page 9 on the instructions for the address of your Service Center.

Q—When does a person have to pay self-employment tax?
A—To be liable for self-employment tax, a person must have income from a business or trade or profession which he conducts as an independent contractor or as a member of a partnership. To be subject to the tax net earnings from self-employment must be at least \$400. For additional information see Schedule C-3.

Q—My wife died last year. I have not remarried, can I still file a joint return?
A—You can file a joint return for the year of death. You may also file as a "surviving spouse" using joint return rates for the two years succeeding the year of your wife's death if you meet certain requirements. Check page 3 of the 1968 instructions for details.

Q—Do you need to keep tax records after your refund comes?
A—Yes. Records should be kept as long as they are needed to substantiate information shown on Federal tax returns. Generally, this is a minimum of three years from the date the return was due to be filed. Some records, like those on the purchase of a home or stock, may have to be kept indefinitely.

AEC Says Gravity Proves 'Weighty Problem' In Space

Testing Essential

By NOEL GROVE

WASHINGTON (NEA) — These are the little things about gravity that you've probably been taking for granted.

Like, the last time you took a shower, did the water come out of the nozzle and just float aimlessly around the room?

The last time you got a haircut, did the trimmings hang in the air and get in your eyes, nose and mouth?

Those are just a few of the problems facing the men who engineer America's space travel plans. And so far they've only scratched the surface in dealing with them, due to the brevity of space flights to date.

The personal comforts of space travel will get new attention in the next phase of exploration — the Apollo Applications Program. It involves placing space stations in earth orbit with crews that will serve tours up to two months in length. Unless some improvements in personal comfort are made, it will be like circling the world non-stop in a Spad.

Take it from a man who

knows, Col. Frank Borman, who commanded the Apollo 8 flight around the moon. "We have to realize that when you put a man in orbit for 60 days or longer, you have to pay more attention than we have in the past to the basic creature comforts."

"I think we need to concern ourselves with proper engineering for better body waste disposal systems. We have to provide showers, and some form of entertainment — television or canned tapes. We have to look into better food."

Astronauts can be very stoic for limited periods of time. But over extended periods certain discomforts can not irritate them, it can affect their actual performance.

Creating an artificial gravity in a space vehicle would solve many of the problems, but it would also complicate construction and increase weight greatly. "I think the consensus is that we have not yet identified any physiological requirement for artificial gravity," said Dr. Edward McLaughlin of the Space Medicine section of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

say we just don't have that many good ideas going for us."

You won't read or hear much about one of the biggest problems of all — the handling of body waste. Suffice to say that astronauts are very dissatisfied with the way it is handled now.

But NASA is coming up with some solutions, some of which elicit the trace of a smile.

A whisker remover is being developed that works like a combination razor and vacuum cleaner. "I like a straight edge," wailed a NASA man in a recent discussion session. Sorry pal, no floating lather.

A zero-gravity shower has been designed, with the usual nozzle at the top and a strong vacuum at the bottom to pull down the water before it floats away. Enter the astronaut, singing.

Weight-watching? An ingenious scale has been designed that measures a man's mass by swinging him back and forth like a pendulum.

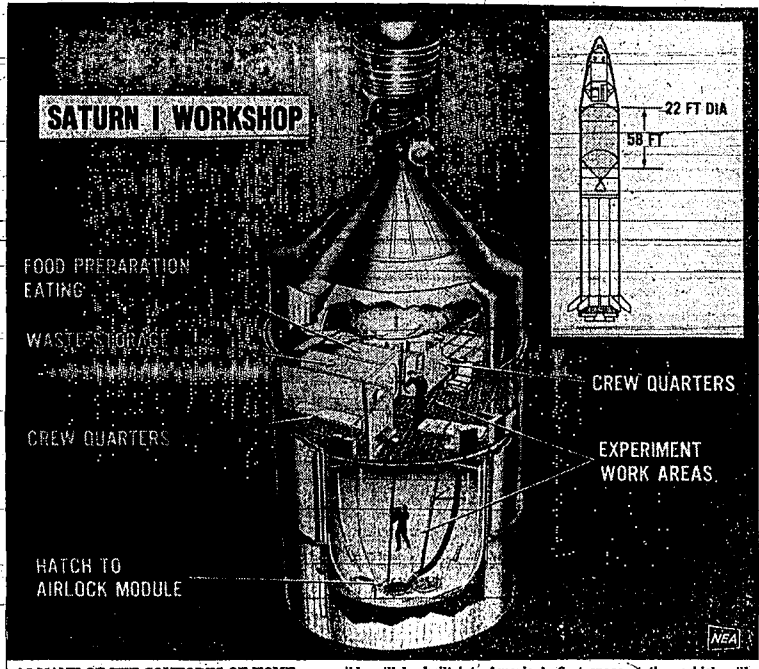
Motivation? The first space station crew will try out jet shoes.

Entertainment? How about

some bad movies? There'll be good ones, too, but one isolation study indicates that throwing in some bad ones makes the good ones enjoyable by contrast, besides causing a healthy release of hostility.

These are just a few answers to the many problems scientists have to address in the Apollo Applications Program, which is, after all, just a stepping stone to the next big project of interplanetary travel that may last a year or more.

And that's a long time to go without a haircut.

The second part of Idaho State University's program to examine radical elements in American political thinking will feature a well-known Marxist, the founder of the John Birch Society and a writer-critic of fringe movements.

The three lecturers will be Dr. Herbert Aptheker, Robert Welch and Gordon Hall.

Aptheker was educated at Columbia University, and has since been active in radical and anti-war struggles. He was the chief founder, in 1964, of the American Institute for Marxist Studies and has been its director since then.

In 1939 he was awarded the History Prize by the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. He fought during World War II in the field artillery with the U. S. Army in the European theatre. He was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1946 and was editor of Political Affairs magazine from 1953 to 1963.

Aptheker will speak April 10, to be followed on April 11 by Robert Welch, founder of the John Birch Society.

In 1957 Welch gave up most of his business responsibilities to devote more of his time to the anti-communist cause. He is now a student of history, poetry, chess, and has authored three books. He is a former national director of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The final speaker on April 14 will be Gordon Hall. Hall has been a student of fringe movements for the past 20 years and believes that there is no room for extremism in the American political system. His research ranges from the Marxist extreme left to the Ku Klux Klan on the radical right. The "Saturday Evening Post" published his life story and in 1964 he was the special guest of Walter Cronkite on "The Twentieth Century."

Hall, no relation to Gus Hall, has been attacked by radical leaders including Robert Welch, and Gus Hall of the American Communist Party.

McClure said, "I am tired of seeing potatoes grown in other states referred to as Idaho potatoes."

"For instance," the Idaho Republican said, "those which are passed off as Idaho-grown in Washington, D.C.; supermarkets are an insult to every Idaho farmer. We grow the world's finest because of the unique conditions present in our state and they should be so recognized."

European Space Research Soars After Lengthy Slump

By DAVID FISHLOCK - London Financial Times-UPI LONDON—Only a few months ago the European Space Research Organization (ESRO) in Paris was in the doldrums, political, technical and financial conflicts.

Today its director-general, Prof. Hermann Bondi, bounds in and out of European capitals, exciting that ESRO now has three satellites aloft, a worldwide tracking network that is demonstrably good, and above all a \$40 million project well supported by his \$50 million a

year research program. When in 1964 ESRO came into being... to provide for, and to promote, collaboration among European states in space research and technology exclusively for peaceful purposes. It required a unanimous vote of its council to ratify each three-year plan. But, as Bondi points out, unanimity in an international council is not easily secured. By 1967, when Bondi took over, the confidence of its member states had evaporated to a level where ESRO's council had to adopt "illegal" tactics to push through a program for the following year. And things grew still worse until the autumn of 1968. Then, quite abruptly, the situation began to change, first when the ESRO 1 (Aurorac) satellite was successfully launched, and the data began to flow back. This was followed by an acceptable resolution of the many problems—political as well as financial—and technical—that beset the proposal for the big TDI project.

Psychiatrist Denies Sirhan 'Psychotic' In RFK Killing

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The chief prosecution psychiatrist said Tuesday it was his opinion Sirhan, B. Sirhan was not suffering from a psychotic delusion when he fatally shot Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

Dr. Seymour Pollack, a professor at the University of Southern California, said Sirhan was motivated by beliefs which are shared by thousands of persons throughout the United States and the world.

Pollack said those beliefs included a feeling the American government was and is hypocritical, that its policies are anti-Arab and pro-Israeli, and that Kennedy himself was a "bad person" who favored Israel.

"There are various degrees of mental illness or psychosis," Pollack said and he felt Sirhan was not "clinically psychotic" but showed a minimal evidence of mental illness.

Sirhan's trial for murder will cost \$1 million and be "worth every penny," County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said Monday.

"If it reveals the truth of what happened that night last June, if it guarantees Sirhan justice, then who can say the cost is not justified?" Hahn said.

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Government Blamed For Soaring Prices Of Timber

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Spokesmen for the West Coast lumber industry have laid most of the blame for soaring timber costs squarely on the federal government's doorstep.

Federal timber policies, they told the House Banking Committee, resulted in shortages of raw material for lumber and plywood producers.

Rep. John Dellenback, R-Ore., joined lumbermen in asking for action by both the executive branch and Congress to open up more government-owned timber lands to logging.

Dellenback proposed that Congress enact legislation to permit income from the sale of timber from national forests to go into a special fund to be used by the Forest Service for managing the timberlands.

The Oregon Republican also called for appropriation of up to \$205 million a year for roads and trails to provide access to government-owned timber stands. He said this was the "most critical need" and that increased appropriations were needed to fill the gap until the special fund is built up through timber sales.

Other recommendations by Dellenback included tighter controls to prevent replacement of

plywood Association, Tacoma, Wash., said the plywood industry was financing research to cut costs but that more was needed.

"It is quite a paradox that very little of this research has been financed by the federal government, even though the government is by far the largest owner of timber," Turnbull said.

John C. Zalaha, chairman of the Economic Services and Market Research Committee of the Western Wood Products Association, Portland, Ore., said the record of federal timber sales showed "that much more timber could have been made available."

Some companies, he said, were paying more for federal timber than they could recover in sales.

Charitable Co-Worker Helps Woman Curb Gripes

Several years ago when my husband was laid off his job for a few months, we were forced to make a painful decision. He would stay home and care for the house and children while I took a job.

With no training or work experience I was lucky to get a job in a nearby factory office. During those first few weeks, however, I found much to complain about and this "gripping" attitude of mine might have damaged a number of relationships if I hadn't met Martha MORRIS.

Martha was private secretary to the head of the sales department where I worked. Since her boss spent three weeks out of every four on the road, Martha had a greater degree of privacy than the rest of us.

Because of her open friendliness, I found myself in a bit of a gripes to the point of complaining to Martha about my boss, my job, the children, and all the work I had to do.

Suddenly I realized that the answers I was getting were different from the ones I was used to hearing. When I complained to Martha about my boss, she would say, "Yes, but remember he has a lot of responsibility."

When I griped about my job, her response was, "Yes, but they will never re-assign you to a job where you can learn so many things."

When I griped about the children, "Yes, I know they are noisy, but they are so young (3 and 6) and they are so pleased to see you come home. Maybe they yell because you do. Why don't you make a real effort to see how softly you can talk to them, just one evening, and see what happens?"

When I griped about all the work I had to do, "Yes, it is

lot, but do all you can as well as you can. You'll be amazed at how much you can accomplish when you try."

She made these statements with such warmth and concern that it didn't sound like preaching or "Polynesian" platitudes. And for each complaint the answer always came back, "Yes, but..."

Soon Martha's "yes, but..." began to take hold on my life. Often when I was about ready to lose my temper or to complain, I'd find myself subconsciously looking on the other side of the question, saying with Martha, "Yes, but..."

And, gradually, I found myself changing.

I began to see that things were not as black as they had seemed for so long. I began to learn to expect more from myself and less from everyone else.

I tried the "soft" approach at home and almost miraculously, evening-mealtime which had formerly been a virtual battlefield, now became a time of scintillating exchanges of life's day's experiences.

Even the work load in the office seemed lightened when I began to take pride in the amount of work I was able to accomplish rather than dwelling on how much more I was doing than the girl next to me.

At lunch where the custom was to "chew over" any absent member along with the meat, Martha never hesitated to speak her mind.

"Yes, Jean has worn that same dress three times this week, but did any of you know that she has been staying with her aunt and uncle who are ill, taking care of them after work all this week?" I never heard Martha say an unkind word about anyone.

And this was the woman who had seen her husband off to war, who had lost two babies and later lost her beloved father in a tragic and senseless automobile accident, and who still had the strength to be an inspiration to everyone she met.

Martha's two-word philosophy "yes, but..." is a simple device, yet it came out of deep conviction and belief that God can take any bad situation and somehow reveal His goodness through it. While so many people just talk about faith, Martha lives hers.

General Asks Laos Attacks

DONG HA, South Vietnam (UPI)—A U.S. Marine general said Tuesday allied troops could win the Vietnam war by attacking Communist bases in Laos and the southern fringes of North Vietnam.

Expanding on his advocacy of you answered that the enemy should be allowed to operate freely in Laos and DMZ areas at the war college what sanctuaries, you'd flunk the course."

"It makes no sense to watch 400 trucks a day moving through Laos with ammunition to kill Americans," said Maj. Gen. Raymond Davis, commander of the 3rd Marine Division. "The quickest way to shorten this war is to destroy these sanctuaries," he said.

"I'm not trying to raise the ante. But we came here to secure the freedom of South Vietnam and I don't think that can be accomplished with anything less than the defeat of the North Vietnamese army."

Davis, 54, leaves Vietnam April 14 to become commandant of Marine Corps schools in Quantico, Va.

In an interview with UPI Tuesday, Davis said allied forces into Laos and the southern end of North Vietnam would be more effective than a resumption of bombing against the North Vietnam, because the Communists had learned to live with the air raids.

"We could win the war with the same tactics the enemy uses. We could run across the Laotian border, destroy his supply depots and pull out," Davis said.

"We could grab a chunk of real estate north of the DMZ and tell him that's all we're going to take for now. Pretty soon he's going to get the picture."

Some modern scientists would get to slam somewhat differently. South would make a negative double over the one heart overcall. This modern gadget shows at least seven points, including four spades and his hand and proceed to either cue bid hearts or jump in spades.

Of course, a modern East might not overcall with his high suit, but in that case South would still respond one spade and get to the slam.
