Search Continues For Murderer Of Idaho Contractor

SILER CITY, N. C. — The search for the murderer of Caldwell businessman R. W. VanAuker, shot to death here Wednesday, went on Thursday.

Mr. VanAuker was in Siler City conferring with Kellwood Co. officials on the construction of a new hosiery plant in Twin Falls. Mr. VanAuker was building the plant himself, then planned to lease it to Kellwood.

Because of the death, construction of the building has been halted temporarily.

Enforcement officials in North Carolina Thursday said they learned an intensive investigation is under way under the direction of Sheriff C. A. Simmons. Two agents of the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation are helping.

It was learned officials have a suspect in the case but further comment on this was declined, pending additional investigation. There is no known motive for the shooting at this time.

North Carolina FBI officials said evidence found at the scene of the murder has been sent to Raleigh for study. A weapon has not been found, it was learned.

Mr. VanAuker was found in a pool of blood just outside his room at the Siler City Motel.

Airport Panel Asks Unity For Progress

Sectionalism in Idaho has no place in the aviation picture, and all major areas must work together to keep abreast of fast-moving developments.

This was the opinion expressed by members of the Boise airport commission, the Twin Falls airport commission, and the Twin Falls county commissioners as they met in the Capital City for an "exploratory session."

As a result of this initial session, aviation leaders from Lewiston, Moscow, Boise, Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Twin Falls will meet in Boise next week for three weeks to pool ideas. The plan is to discuss ideas which would be of value for presentation to the Idaho House of Representatives revenue and taxation committee between now and the next legislative session.

Officials attending the session declared the problem and the answer to the problem is the same to all communities in Idaho. They must work together.

Officials at the Boise session also explored possibility of some sort of revolving fund to be used by various communities to borrow for airport construction or improvement and which could be paid back over a period of years. Such a fund would allow the communities to take advantage of federal government matching funds.

Idaho Firm Wins \$10 Million Pact

BOISE (UPI) — Morrison-Knudsen Co., Inc., announced it has received a \$10,430,000 contract to construct a major dam in northern Idaho.

Company President H.L. Parkins said the contract was awarded by the Puerto Rico Water Resources Authority. It was identified as Ulica Zenteno high Tota Vacca Dam on the Tota Vacca River near the city of Ponce.

The dam is the first step in a five stage development to increase supplies of irrigation, and industrial and domestic water in southern Puerto Rico's coast.

The dam will require more than three million cubic yards of fill material. It will be 1,900 feet in crest length.

Tornado

HIAGERMAN — A frank tornado totally demolished a building in a field and scattered three miles south of here, but left two nearby homes unscathed. No injuries were reported.

The tornado, estimated to be about 200 feet across, demolished a building and scattered it a mile and a half directly above the 20-by-30-foot shed on the Salmon Ingle Sheep Co. ranch, destroying a large amount of property, extensively a pickup truck and two tractors inside the shed.

According to Frank Honeco, owner of the ranch, the tornado was visible for about five minutes.

The frank tornado, while it raged in the field, struck a canvas tarpaulin lying atop a pile of bricks only 10 feet away from the building.

Shortly before the twister struck several ranch hands had decided to repair a water truck in the field instead of bringing the truck into the shed for repairs. According to Honeco, this chance decision kept the truck from being killed inside the shed.

Kellwood Plant Brings Surge Of Interest In T.F.

Interest in Twin Falls as a site for industry has increased since the Kellwood Co. announced that it will locate a \$2 million plant here.

Herb Derrick, city manager, said that the number of inquiries he has had about Twin Falls has increased in the past two weeks.

He said he has showed the area to a firm, which did not reveal its name or product, and that the representatives seen there by the firm seemed favorably impressed with Twin Falls.

Mr. Derrick and Ray Rostron, chamber manager, said that many of the industries keep their identities secret from local officials for several reasons.

The industry of which Mr. Derrick was speaking is one of two which have been interested enough in Twin Falls during recent weeks to send representatives to view the area.

Mr. Rostron said that officials from the Chamber of Commerce, the City of Twin Falls and the Industrial Development Corp. are aware of this possibility and probably will be working closely with other industrial representatives.

Construction at the Kellwood plant site on the airport road was begun this week by VanAuker Construction Co., Caldwell.

Construction was temporarily halted Wednesday when R. VanAuker, head of the construction firm, was shot to death in North Carolina.

Rescue Teams Fight Poisonous Mine Gas

BARROTERRAN, Mexico (UPI) — Recovery teams battled new waves of poisonous gas and possible cave-ins today in their search for bodies in Mexico's worst mine disaster.

Kentucky State Mining Commission; H. M. Kitchpatrick, member of the U.S. team of experts sent to help at the time, said there was a "very, very small" chance some miners had barricaded themselves some place in the mine, but other officials held almost no hope for survivors.

Explosions, cave-ins and deadly gas rumbled through the Alois Hornos coal mines Monday evening. Thirty-four bodies have been found since then. Some "12-15 men" still were missing.

Fresh clouds of gas Wednesday forced recovery teams to dig up bodies from the underground. There also was the possibility of further cave-ins.

With almost all hope gone, officials began the job of sorting out benefits for the miners' families.

2 Americans Die In Crash Fatal To 53

WARSAW (UPI) — A Polish Airlines two-engine turboprop loaded to capacity crashed near the city of Cracow Wednesday, killing all 53 persons aboard.

Two of the passengers were Americans.

The Soviet-built high-wing AN24 went down in the foothills of the Tatra Mountains near the village of Popolice, about 23 miles southwest of Cracow, the Polish news agency PAP said.

The Americans were identified as Richard Andrew, 45, of Forest Hills, N.Y., and Janet Irwin, 25, of Los Angeles, Calif.

An official of the KLM Royal Dutch airlines said Andrews worked in KLM's passenger handling department at Kennedy International Airport and was on a family visit to Poland.

Irwin was a student at a dancing and drama at Warsaw's Grand Theater. She had spent about 18 months in Poland.

Three other foreigners aboard were identified as Ulica Zenteno, 26, Paul Turner, 37, both of England, and G. Barilli, 38, of Italy.

Polish victims included four children and Cracow University Professor Zenon Klemensiewicz, a member of the Polish Academy of Sciences.

World Travel On Tap

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 3-month-old first Congress starts today its second 10-day recess and its first big round of world travel.

After routine no-business sessions at noon the House and Senate were to quit until Wednesday, April 9, in their annual observation of Easter.

Some members headed home for fence-mending and other bits, but many are planning to run to points-all over the globe-an "official business."

Planned targets included Mexico City, Manila, Honolulu, and, almost inevitably in the spring, Paris and Rome.

Since convening Jan. 3 the members have raised the President's pay, raised their own pay, raised other high government officials' pay, raised the ceiling on the national debt, affirmed a treaty against the spread of nuclear weapons, and not much else.

Committees, however, have been busy laying the ground work for tax, welfare and other legislation.

The traditional Easter recess is considered prime time for its paid foreign trips. The trip usually lasts for a week or more.

The lawmakers contend their trips cost little in American dollars, because most reported outlays are in so-called "counterpart" funds—foreign currencies in the hands of the U.S. government which presumably unless spent, would be wasted.

Actually, the government no longer holds much "counterpart" except in some of the undeveloped nations, not popular with congressional inspection teams. So in the end, most of the foreign currency has to be purchased with dollars.

Anyway, the springing travel boom was on.

Black Panther Plot To Bomb Stores Smashed By Police

NEW YORK (UPI) — Police here followed an elaborate Black Panther plot to bomb in Bronx as a diversionary action. Snipers with high powered rifles today and to carry out a number of other "coordinated acts of violence" aimed at destroying the "power structure" of the white community.

Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan, announcing details of the plot Wednesday, said 21 persons including two women have been indicted. Twelve were arrested Wednesday and three were in jail in Newark, N.J., facing robbery charges, and the other seven were still at large.

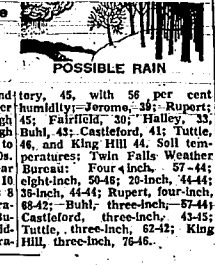

Fairfield Man Believed Electrocut

FAIRFIELD — David Arthur Howard, 35, Fairfield, was found dead under a high-voltage power line on Tuesday afternoon at about 3 p.m. his home.

He had been drilling a hole in the floor of his home with a electric drill. An electric plug cord said Mr. Howard probably died from electrocution, but the cause of death is still being investigated.

Sheriff Paul Cox was called to the home at about noon to investigate Mr. Howard's disappearance. The property was searched.

Finally Ralph Gibbons of the Prairie Power Corp found a cord leading under the house and found the body of Mr. Howard.

He was born Jan. 20, 1934, in Pawhuska, Okla., and came with his parents to Camas Prairie in 1956, attending school in Fairfield. He is married Agnes Gerke at Richfield.

Mr. Howard farmed at Corral until 1958, when he retired and moved into Fairfield. He then worked as a painter until the time of his death.

Mr. Howard belonged to Odd Fellows Orient Lodge No. 15 of which he was a past noble grand and a Fairfield Community Methodist church.

Survivors include his widow, Fairfield; two daughters, Mrs. George (Betty) Shambrook, Otthello, Wash., and Mrs. Don (Marjorie) L. J. Caution To Idaho Pilots Is Issued

The next 30 days will be a critical operational period for many of Idaho's airports, which, like thousands of miles of roads, are not kept open during the winter months, Chet Moulton, Idaho director of the Department of Aeronautics, said recently.

"Most aircraft users live in the lower elevations where the snow is gone and the countryside is greenening up for spring. They forget this is not so in the higher elevations or over the hills toward the back country."

"The spring fever enthusiasm to catch a steelhead, to check on the mountain-retreat cabin, or just get out for a day in the sky, prompts many to still the good judgment warning that would be heeded normally."

"More than 50 inches of snow remains in the Henry's Lake region, more than 20 inches remains at Sulphur Creek and Morgan's Ranch, and only the top strand of wire is showing on the fences at Yellow Pine and Big Creek."

Cabin Creek is closed until further notice. Garden Valley is showing base spots and should not be used until dry. At least half the airports in Idaho will be thawing and muddy during the next 30 days with damage occurring to both the aircraft and landing area if used prematurely.

Every pilot is urged to know his destination airport conditions prior to use as well as promptly report winter damage to fields to assure quick repairs.

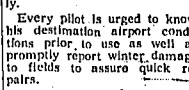

Saigon Agrees To Vote Test Of Reds

PARIS (UPI)—South Vietnam's government is willing to challenge the Viet Cong to a popularity test at the polls providing the guerrillas renounce their Communist allegiance, allied sources said today.

The Saigon government's challenge came a day after it announced that more than 1.5 million peasants in recent elections for local chiefs and governing councils in 80 per cent of South Vietnam's villages.

South Vietnamese officials said the elections showed the Communists had failed in their campaign to take over South Vietnam's rural population.

Allied sources in Paris pointed out that the Viet Cong have never officially declared themselves. Communists who the Allies consider their instruments of Communist Vietnam.

If the Viet Cong were to declare themselves non-Communists, they would get a chance to test their support in an open democratic election in South Vietnam, the sources indicated.

But they said South Vietnam's constitution which outlawes communism, would not be changed. The 11th session of negotiations aimed at ending the war in Vietnam is scheduled for Thursday.

The Saigon government's challenge followed an announcement of elections by Deputy Prime Minister Tran Thieu Kien said the figures were the result of a recent, stepped-up pacification drive that was held despite a Communist offensive.

One South Vietnamese election expert said the elections' main value was counteracting the propaganda of the 1968 Viet Cong campaign to try to elect village and hamlet "liberation committees."

Nampa Mayor Criticizes Levy Measure

NAMPA (UPI) — Nampa Mayor Ernest Starr has criticized the Legislature's approval of a bill extending from 1977 to 1982 the period for equalization of property tax assessments.

Starr said, "This is a good example for how the counties and cities of Idaho are losing the right to govern themselves."

He said such legislation will seriously handicap all taxing units in the state.

The bill also limits to four percent annually the amount of increase local branches of government can receive from property taxes.

The Nampa mayor said, "this 4th session imposed a statute on all political subdivisions that will limit them to a four percent increase over their previous annual budget. This is retroactive to Jan. 1, 1969."

A quick survey indicates that about 50 per cent of the taxing units have passed budgets in excess of the four percent limit," he said.

Starr hinted that local governments will appeal to the State Tax Commission which then would make the final determination of their budgets rather than the elected county and city administrations.

Charity Giving Soars In America

NEW YORK (UPI)—In recent days—hundreds-of-thousands of Americans have affixed Easter seals to holiday notes and cards. This simple act made them part of a multi-billion dollar business called philanthropy.

Despite a reputation for materialism and self service, American citizens and business firms gave an estimated \$15.5 billion to charities last year, almost double what they gave in 1960. One out of every four Americans also performed some kind of volunteer work in 1968 as the number of charities doubled from the 1950 figure.

Official 1967 figures pegged the business of giving at \$14.6 billion, \$11.1 billion coming from individuals. Foundations and bequests each pumped another \$1.2 billion into the charitable stream, and corporations gave \$3 billion.

That corporate figure doesn't include contributions of executive time in support of volunteer organizations. In the Easter Seal Society alone, 25,000 businessmen help guide the local, state and national programs.

Businesses, large and small, have a big problem when it comes to contributing. If they give heavily to one charity, others might be miffed. If the charity to which they give comes up with a poor operating record the directors could be criticized for their choice. Little wonder then that corporations want facts and figures before they give heavily to one charity—figures are hastening to oblige.

Five years ago the National Easter Seal Society for the Children and Adults took a corporate tack to examine itself. It asked the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to do a business study. Dr. David E. Reiley of MIT Sloan School of Management headed up the committee.

"We literally lived in airports, there were so many meetings packed into a couple of months," said one committee member.

Two thousand members of the society were involved in the 32 meetings at local levels. These meetings were repeated a month later to implement suggestions for change. Then came four regional meetings—finally, 162 representatives from each region met in national session to hammer changes together.

Summer—Winter—former administrator of the veterans administration, was brought in as executive director. The society's governing apparatus was reorganized. Goals were redefined and consolidated. Electronic data processing systems for mailing and accounting were set up.

In short, the society, like any big business anxious to keep pace with the times, underwent a housecleaning change to give it more for each dollar spent.

FBI Seeks Suspect In Fraud Scheme

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—A seventh man indicted for conspiracy to defraud, the government in supplying parts for critical military hardware was sought by the FBI today.

The first six suspects, arrested Wednesday, were identified as Nathan Bywless, Sidney Perkins, Alfred Muller, Robert Greenberg and Mark Greenberg, all of Philadelphia, and Samuel Kofsky of Jenkintown, Pa.

U.S. Atty. Jerome B. Richter said the seventh man, Harold Coffin, Philadelphia, still was being sought.

Bywless, a retired government employee, was president of P-E-C, Inc. and Coffin, Fenwick and Kofsky were employees of the firm. Perkins, another former government employee, is president of D. Richter Inc., Philadelphia.

Richter said the seven "entered into contracts to provide certain parts—nuts, bolts, fasteners and clips—for use in missiles, submarines, airplanes, helicopters, tanks, ships, radar, etc."

"These firms would order a few parts from a manufacturer, contract with the government to deliver 600 to 1,000 parts and have them made by a little jobber in a basement," Richter said. "They used hundreds of national companies' letterheads and we found all letterheads were printed here locally."

The government said the jobber-made products did not conform to specifications, were made of inferior materials and failed to meet other requirements.

The indictment charged the conspiracy existed from October, 1966, and involved from \$1 and \$2 million in contracts.

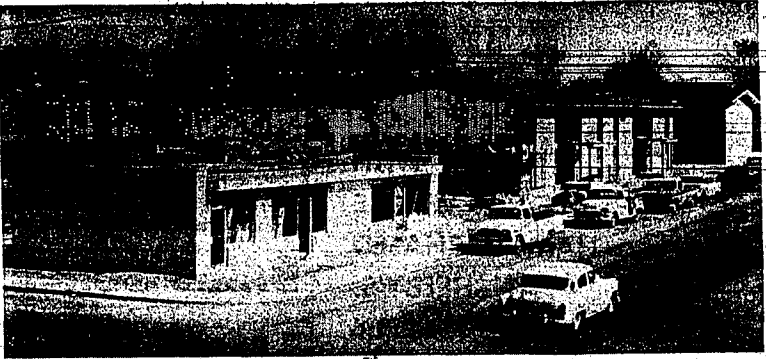

Officials Fear Atomic Arms On Sea Floor

GENEVA (UPI)—Western disarmament officials warned today it may be possible to install nuclear weapons on the ocean floor within 10 years.

They said such weapon bases could be ordered by remote control to move around underwater to avoid detection.

Faced with this possibility, the officials said, no one should disregard U.S. and Soviet proposals for a treaty banning nuclear and other mass-destruction weapons from the seabed.

There has been private criticism from neutral nations of the Geneva Disarmament Conference that the major powers are evading other important issues with the idea of a seabed ban.

The Swedish negotiator, Mrs. Alva Myrdal, Tuesday presented the conference with Sweden's version of a proposed treaty to ban underground nuclear tests.

Her move was said by conference officials to be a direct challenge to America and the Soviet Union to get down to concrete discussion of a comprehensive nuclear test ban.

U.S. officials said a nuclear-free seabed treaty is the one issue on which both sides are ready to negotiate soon.

They said all countries should welcome even partial arms control measures.

"In another 10 years it may be regretted that we did not—if we do not agree on a nuclear-free seabed pact," one official said.

Open House For Apartment Complex Set This Weekend

An open house will be held from 1 to 5:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at Towncrest Manor in the 400 block of Second Ave. E.

The announcement was made by Robert C. Wills of Wills, Inc. This is a federally financed housing project designed to provide adequate housing for people with modest incomes. The income and occupancy rate is set by Housing and Urban Development.

The project is currently 75 per cent complete. Mr. Wills said that part of the apartments will be ready for occupancy May 1. He said he has a good number of applications to date.

The apartments rent for \$102 per month with all utilities provided. They will be electrically heated and stove, refrigerator and garbage disposal, carpeting and drapes will be furnished. There are 32 apartments and there must be between two and four occupants in each. Mr. Wills also noted that people living in the apartments must have a common family identity.

The business building on the corner of the property will house a laundromat, barber shop and beauty salon. Mr. Wills plans to have the laundromat open when the apartments are ready. Mediator Joseph Kirkham refused to say what if any progress was being made.

The walkout began Feb. 4 when the union's contract with the company expired. A proposed settlement was negotiated but the workers rejected it overwhelmingly, 863 to 338.

Plants affected include two at Milton, Pa., and one each at Huntington and Red House, W. Va., St. Charles, Mo., and East St. Louis, Ill.

BOISE (UPI)—The 62nd annual Idaho State Council Knights of Columbus convention will be held April 25-27 in Boise, state officials of the organization have announced.

The activities will include banquets, a presentation of the transplant patient, dictation of new form of initiation to the third degree, the first bestowal of the new "Knight of the Year" award, and special programs for the wives of delegates attending.

Chinese Ponder Missiles

HONG KONG (UPI)—Chiang Kai-shek's Chinese Communist party into the second day of its ninth congress in Peking today amid indications missile and nuclear development had a high priority.

Among the topics to be discussed today were a new proposed constitution and a political platform that emphasizes hard-line communism. This is the second congress since the Communists took control of the mainland in 1949.

Peking Radio reported the opening Tuesday of the first congress since 1958 for a party seriously weakened by purges and the effects of the cultural revolution Mao began in 1966 against "revisionism."

Communist accounts of the meeting emphasized the absence of apparently deposed President Liu Shao-chi, once considered Mao's heir apparent but of late the man most scorned in Mao's propaganda press.

One of the first orders of business was electing 178 persons to the ruling Politburo to perpetuate Mao's military-dominated bureaucracy. As expected, Defense Minister Lin Biao, 70, lined up as heir apparent to Mao, 75.

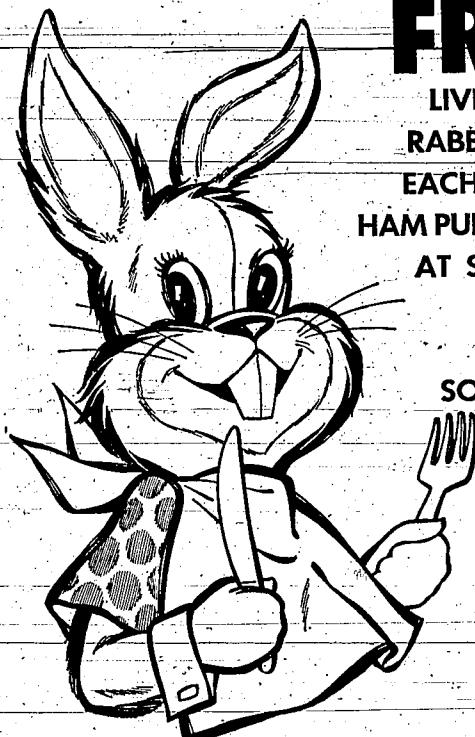
The election list presented to 1,512 delegates was associated with Mao's closest comrades and even his wife, Chiang Ching, who was No. 5.

Of major import to the United States were the enhanced positions of two top missile and nuclear scientists, indicating high priority for China's missile and nuclear bomb program.

One of the scientists was Chen Tsueh-shen, who once served as a colonel in the U.S. Air Force, taught at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and attended the Jet Propulsion Laboratory at the California Institute of Technology. He was listed 142nd in the 176-member Politburo.

He was appointed from the United States to China in 1953 and is now Mao's top rocket expert.

The second scientist was Marshal Nieh Jung-chun, believed in charge of both the missile and nuclear development programs for Mao. In the Politburo listing, he ranked 23rd.

Criminal Court Clerk James A. Blackwell revealed Tuesday that two letters found in Battle's desk shortly after he died of a heart attack in his office, had been filed as legal documents.

Blackwell said the first letter, dated March 13, indicated Ray's intent to seek a post-conviction hearing and dismissal of his attorney Percy Foreman.

Foreman represented Ray guilty before Battle to the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and received a 99-year sentence in the state penitentiary at Nashville.

Blackwell said the second letter, dated March 25, was a request for a review and reversal of his sentence.

Chief Justice Hamilton Burnett of the Tennessee Supreme Court said under state law, any motion pending before a deceased judge is automatically granted, but he added that does not apply to Ray.

Percy Foreman, who pleaded guilty and then decide they want to change their plea, file what they called jail-house lawyers' term motions for a new trial, said Burnett.

Blackwell said that they were normal appeal rights and they must seek release under the new post-conviction law through a habeas corpus petition must show that Ray's conviction rights were violated in some way.

Sources in the Shelby county attorney general's office said a motion pending before a deceased judge would be held in about two weeks for Ray.

Burnett said, however, that a judicial decision on the letters could not be rendered until a successor was appointed to Battle by Gov. Buford Ellington or a special judge named by Burnett to consider the case.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Mayor Joseph Alioto's anti-earthquake party is coming as you are. Bring your own water wings.

The San Francisco mayor tired of listening to rumors the Golden State is about to crack like a stale brownie and drop into the sea—has decided on a giant public celebration to dispel the gloom.

On April 18—the 63rd anniversary of the quake and fire that

actually leveled the city—coffee will be served from Army field kitchens in downtown Union Square.

"We'll play Caruso records," says Alioto. "Maybe I'll even arrange for a special showing of the movie 'San Francisco,' and join in a chorus or two with Jennette MacDonald as she stands there in the ruins singing about the city that was.

Only partially hidden by Alioto's levity, however, is the fact some Californians are

absolutely a quake will strike. That's the catch. For a while it may be logical to assume the probability of a big "rocker in the immediate future, no one can be positive it won't happen.

In at least one respect, the predictions of earthquake during April are accurate. Scientists say some 200 to 300 tremors are recorded every month in the San Francisco area alone. None is strong

Courtroom 'Duel' Flares

Sirhan's Sanity Stirs Bitter Dispute

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—It was a classic courtroom duel: The shrewd common-sense attorney and the pedantic professor of psychiatry.

Dr. Seymour Pollack had been the most damning witness for the prosecution—his testimony would carry the most weight in deciding whether Sirhan B. Sirhan is sentenced to the gas chamber.

Pollack and chief defense counsel Grant Cooper are friends. They have lectured

jointly on the law and psychiatry. But they were at sword-point and Cooper was trying to break Pollack's simplification that Sirhan killed Sen. Robert F. Kennedy "because he hated him."

Pollack had said confidently that yes, Sirhan was mentally ill but had the mental capacity to premeditate and plan the slaying of Kennedy and was trying to escape afterwards.

Then Cooper, 66 years old Tuesday, went on the offensive. Hadn't Pollack sent a confidential report on Sirhan to the Los Angeles district attorney?

Yes, he had had 250 hours with Sirhan instead of 25 he probably would have found signs of psychosis.

An explosion and fire last November at Mannington, W. Va., killed 78 miners. The mine was sealed off after several days of futile rescue efforts and the bodies still have not been recovered.

"I have told the House of Representatives—as I previously told the Senate—that the American coal industry would either have to control dust in the mines or the United Mine Workers will have to re-evaluate its position on mechanical mining equipment and revert to more conventional mining methods," Boyle said.

He added:

"This is not a threat. This union cannot and will not tolerate the coal industry continuing to ignore the dust problem."

Boyle scored the idea that the union has proposed with mine owners to condone safety laws. "I resent any implication that you (miners) and your union are responsible for the failure of Congress to pass adequate legislation," Boyle said. "You should express your indignation."

Boyle outlined five areas where he wanted improved federal legislation:

—We want underground safety chambers where men can flee to safety in the event of a mine disaster.

—We want federal mine inspectors permanently stationed at any mine that liberates excessive quantities of explosive methane gas.

—We want all coal miners in this nation classified as gassy.

You and I know there is no such thing as a non-gassy coal mine.

—We want federal control over roof support plans to cover

Growing Soviet Naval Power Said Threat To U.S. Control Of Seas

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Navy Secretary John H. Chafee warned Congress Tuesday that increasing Russian naval power, particularly in the nuclear field, was threatening America's control of the high seas.

The former Rhode Island governor, in his first detailed report on U.S. Naval posture since he took office in January, said the Soviet strategic nuclear force "has grown more rapidly than expected, both in quality and in number."

"It has grown so fast, Chafee

told the Senate Armed Services Committee, that it now poses "a serious and growing threat to our continued supremacy of the high seas."

His private report to the committee, his declassified statement was made public later—was another in a series of Pentagon warnings about increasing Russian capability to challenge U.S. strategic power.

Chafee said new classes of Soviet ballistic missile submarines and nuclear attack vessels were becoming operational and "more of these new types have been launched than foreseen a year ago."

Chafee's declassified statement did not go into detail on defense Secretary Melvin Laird's warning two weeks ago that the U.S. Polaris submarines, which launch ballistic missiles while submerged and which once were considered invulnerable, may be challenged by Soviet weapons in the 1970s.

Chafee said the Russians were also trying to counter the U.S. surface fleet by "develop-

ing the capabilities of the terminal-homing cruise missile which may be launched from aircraft, surface units, surfaced submarines, or land sites, at short or long ranges."

Because of this threat, Chafee told the committee, "our missile defense has been assigned a place of high priority, alongside our ASW (antisubmarine warfare) efforts."

Chafee said the "primary Soviet offensive force at sea is force consisting of over 350 submarines, one-sixth of which are nuclear powered."

Riches Await

MADRID (UPI) — Spinasse Marin, Francisco Monnegro died three years ago in a remote village in North-western Spain at the age of 72, leaving \$2.2 million, most of it in land holdings.

Tribunal Shuns Strike Ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court sidestepped an opportunity Tuesday to hear a case and decide the legality of state laws prohibiting public employees from striking.

With only brief comment, the justices rejected an appeal by New York Sanitation workers union and its president who were found guilty of contempt of court for conducting a garbage strike in defiance of state law in 1968.

"The appeal is dismissed for want of a properly presented federal question," the court said of its action.

The court held only a ceremonial session Monday because of the official day of mourning for Dwight D. Eisenhower, and it arranged to convene both Tuesday and Wednesday to handle the case.

Twenty states have specific laws prohibiting strike by police, teachers and other public employes while another seven follow common law precepts which accomplish the same thing.

In their appeal, local 831 of the Uniformed Sanitationmen's Association and President John Delury claimed that New York's Taylor Law against public strikes violates the constitution's guarantee of "equal protection under law" for state, county and city workers.

Employees of private firms doing identical work are entitled to strike, their brief noted.

When New York garbage collectors walked out on their jobs in February, 1968, the union and Delury were convicted of contempt for refusing to obey a court order that they return to work.

The union was fined \$80,000 and lost its dues-check-off privilege for 18 months. Delury was fined \$250 and sentenced to 30 days in jail.

In the New York Court of Appeals, the contempt convictions and the basic constitutionality of the law was upheld.

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Vacationing Youths By Thousands Spread Havoc In Palm Springs

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI) — An estimated 10,000 college and high school youths invaded this week for Easter vacation. Police said nearly 100 of them already had been arrested. A drive-in movie theater at the eastern end of the city was the scene of a rock concert Tuesday night, officers said. But when the event was over at midnight, about 4,000 of the 5,000 youths attending it refused to leave the area.

Police Chief Robert White said arrests were up 25 per cent from last year, complaints were up 40 per cent and traffic accidents were up 50 per cent and involved mostly minors.

White called the invasion "unprecedented," and Police Lt. Marvin Rudin said "It's the biggest influx during the Easter

vacation we've had in my years here."

Authorities said the youths had virtually taken over part of the west side of the city for a hobo jungle, arriving in buses, panel trucks, station wagons and various other types of vehicles to carry large groups.

For sleeping quarters, the invaders were using bed rolls, sleeping bags, the ground or the insides of vehicles. Officers reported various acts of vandalism, such as tearing down wooden fences and the sides from a snack bar, to obtain firewood for bonfires.

Just west of the city, youths were scattered throughout the rocks and over the grounds of Tabique Canyon. A police helicopter was dispatched to the canyon to search for a youth who had reportedly fallen from a cliff.

Officers said that as the paper scanned the area, great numbers of youths emerged virtually from out of nowhere along the sides of the canyon to see what was happening.

White said he has requested aid from the neighboring area to help his force handle those youths already here and the

estimated 5,000 more anticipated by the end of the week.

He said units from the Riverside County sheriff's office, the California Highway Patrol and from the police departments of nearby communities had been requested to bolster his office.

One police officer suffered two broken vertebrae and lacerations on the hands and face when he was dragged after being hit by a stolen car.
