Antiwar Move Sets Off Biggest Round Of Marches Since Election

By United Press International The antiwar movement Eastward stepped off its biggest round of marches since Richard M. Nixon was elected President.

Presidents to protest soldiers who ended the war?—referring to Nixon's campaign promise that he had a plan for ending the Vietnam War—and "where as they were injured about 150 of the San Francisco marchers tried to storm the grounds of the military base. Nixon Warns Peru To Expect Cutoff Of U.S. Foreign Aid

By HELEN THOMAS WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon today ordered a cutoff of U.S. foreign aid and broad economic sanctions unless it agrees in three days to pay for an American-owned refinery.

He was instructed to advise them that the White House is obliged by law to halt foreign aid and impose economic sanctions against any nation which seizes American-owned property and refuses to pay for it within six months.

Saigon Offers Viet Cong Plan Of Reconciliation

By MICHAEL DENNIGAN PARIS (UPI)—The Saigon government today offered the Viet Cong a plan of national reconciliation which would permit Communist leaders to enter the political affairs of South Vietnam as an opposition political party and not as a Communist force.

The Communists are not ready for serious Vietnam peace talks because they are still "counting on the impotence of the American public for an advantageous settlement."

U.S. And Allies Conquer Superstition Mountain

SAIGON (UPI)—A Vietnamese mercenary led by U. S. Green Berets today reported conquering Superstition Mountain and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, addressing the crowd and the nation:

On the 4th morning of the guerrillas' nationwide offensive, Red gunners shelled 15 towns and camps, inflicting light losses. Two civilians were wounded in the barrage into the Hung hamlet 60 miles northwest of Saigon.

Man-Made Heart Replaced With God-Given Heart

HOUSTON (UPI)—Dr. Denton A. Cooley today began another "heart transplant" by replacing an unprecedented man-made heart in an Illinois man with a "God-given" heart from the body of a 45-year-old Lawrence, Mass., widow.

The operation was the 19th human heart transplant performed by Dr. Cooley and the 20th such operation if the one he performed Friday with the synthetic heart was counted.

The spokesman said, "The donor's brain damage was not caused by injury, but was the outgrowth of a medical problem—they were not aware of the exact cause of the ailment."

Gem Highway Engineer Is Transferred

Ellis T. Mathes, state highway engineer, has announced that James L. Pline, former assistant district engineer at Shoshone, has been promoted to traffic engineer for the Highway Department, with headquarters in Boise.

Mr. Pline replaces Marvin W. Luptech, who is now serving as district engineer at Lewiston. The new traffic engineer was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1954 with a degree in civil engineering. He began working for the State Highway Department as an engineer-in-training. He served two years in the U. S. Air Force and presently holds the rank of major with the Idaho Air National Guard.

He rejoined the Highway Department in 1956 and held the positions of assistant traffic engineer and assistant district engineer.

Mr. Pline will be responsible for coordinating signing, traffic signals, lighting and geometrical design relating to the operational adequacy of all highways on the 4,920-mile State Highway System in the Gem State.

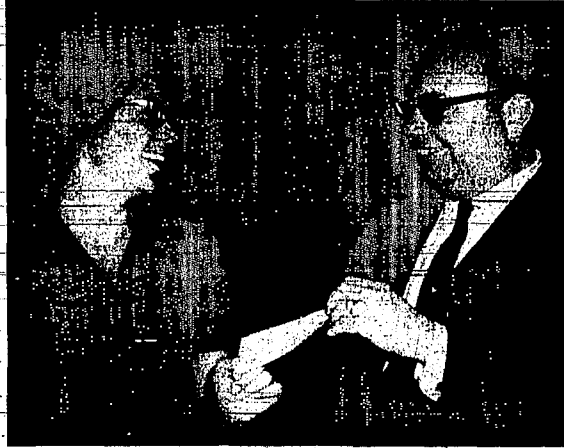

Liberian Tanker Still Burning

NEW YORK (UPI)—The molasses-filled Liberian tanker Dorali was reported still burning early today from a fire which swept through her engine room Sunday night. There were no reports of injuries to the 42 on board according to the Coast Guard. Coast Guard planes from Floyd Bennett Field in Brooklyn reported flames and smoke aft on the 12,000-ton ship. Voice contact with the vessel was lost at 10:30 p.m. Sunday. Located off the Norfolk, Va. coast, and listing slightly, the Dorali's emergency generators failed early today, and Coast Guard attempts to drop emergency radio transmitters to the vessel were unsuccessful. The U.S. submarine Trex and the oil tanker Gulf Jaguar were within visual range of the Dorali, but had not been able to establish contact. The first reports of fire came from the vessel shortly after 6 p.m. Sunday. The ship was reported 275 miles southeast of New York and 225 miles east of Norfolk, Va. Three emergency pumps were dropped to the ship during the night, but there was no confirmation that they had been picked up by the tanker, en route to the South American port of Georgetown, Guyana, from Grotto, Conn.

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Largest Pearl Put On Sale As 'Bargain'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Wilburn D. Cobb has offered to sell the world's largest pearl for the bargain price of \$3.5 million.

Since the pearl, approximately the size of a cauliflower, weighs 17.274 pearl grains and pearls usually sell for about \$32 per grain, Cobb said, the normal price for the object would be \$4,082,288.

"But I'm pressed for time. I'm 65 years old," Cobb said at a news conference in explaining why he was offering for sale the pearl he acquired in 1938. Cobb said he did not sell it at first because the native chief from whom he got it said "a terrible disaster would befall his family if he did not keep the gift pearl," three times seven years.

He said the chief explained the disaster would be the death of Cobb's son before he reached 21 years. The son is now 30 and Cobb said he is able to sell the pearl.

Cobb's story of the acquisition is that it was found in 1934 by the Dwak natives on the island of Palawan near the Philippines. He said a boy drowned when his arm was caught in the shell of a giant clam, which was brought up and later found to contain the pearl, which weighs 17.274 grains.

He said he received it as a gift for curing the chief's son of malaria with what was then the best drug—quinine. Cobb said he would like to use the money to buy a plantation for the natives who found the pearl and that he would spend the rest of his life supervising the plantation. He said he had turned down offers of \$1 million for the pearl. His agent, Frank Forster of Santa Cruz, Calif., said he recently wrote letters offering it to H. I. Hansen Bill To Assist Honeymakers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressman Orval Hansen, R-Idaho, is a co-sponsor of a bill recently introduced in the House to assist honeymakers in a new, market research and promotion program.

The bill, the Honey Promotion and Research Act of 1969, has been approved by the Honey Industry Council of America.

Hansen said, "The purpose of the legislation is to assist honey producers in the development and operation of a self-help program to expand the market for honey to strengthen the competitive position of the industry."

"The program will become operative upon a vote of two-thirds of those representing two-thirds of the honey producers," Hansen said. "Producers who do not wish to participate may obtain a refund of any assessment paid."

'Quake Expert Notes Chance Of Major Shock In Bay Area

STORRS, Conn. (UPI)—An earthquake expert says there is a "strong possibility" the San Francisco Bay area will be struck by a major earthquake within 40 years. "Usually in California a serious earthquake can be expected from 60 to 100 years after a major quake. The last major quake in San Francisco was 1906, so we are in the time period to expect a quake," Dr. Peter Delinger said.

Delinger, head of the University of Connecticut's Institute of Marine Science, is also a geophysicist and earthquake expert who recently visited the U.S. Geological Survey's Earthquake Prediction Center in Menlo Park, Calif. He said Menlo Park scientists are studying strains along the San Andreas Fault in California and have detected a "creep" motion along the fault in the area of Hollister, south of San Francisco. "People at the center interpret this to mean a slow strain release and thus a decreased strain buildup," Delinger said. The scientist also mentioned that concern has been expressed over lack of precautions being taken to guard against deaths and injuries that might result from a California earthquake.

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

HOW CROSS-RUFF RESCUES CONTRACT

Jim: "Here is a letter from Mantulaw, Wis. We are asked to show a very simple cross-ruff hand and discuss that play."

Oswald: "The cross-ruff, as the name implies, consists of ruffing in both hands. This gives a chance to make his and dummy's trump-tricks separately."

Jim: "Here is a nice, easy one to watch. South is in four spades. He wins the first trick with the ace of clubs. He is looking at five spade-tricks in

one trump in dummy. He will be able to ruff a diamond with his hand and then ruff two losing clubs."

Jim: "The cross-ruff will enable him to get out without the loss of any diamonds at all."

Jim: "In some cross-ruff situations a declarer has to worry about an unkind opponent overruffing. He does not with this hand because once he has played a three spot, the rest of his trumps and dummy's are high."

Oswald: "He winds up with an overtrick since the cross-ruff has allowed him to make eight trump-tricks plus the three side-aces."

NEW YORK (UPI)—Traders, more strongly aware of the Nixon administration determination to lick inflation, drove the stock market sharply lower Monday in moderately active trading.

Thursday's hike in the Federal Reserve discount rate to a 40-year high of 6 percent was not unexpected. But the Nixon administration requirements, which is designed primarily to restrict the funds available for expansion-minded corporations, seemed to catch the market by surprise.

Plans for sharply increased capital spending by business this year has been a major concern of Washington investors and traders viewed the Fed's latest action as a further sign that government intends to go "all out" to slow the economy.

After three hours of trading, the UPI market indicator, measuring all stocks traded, showed a loss of 0.77 percent over a 100 stock, 272 gainers, 100 decliners, 272 losers.

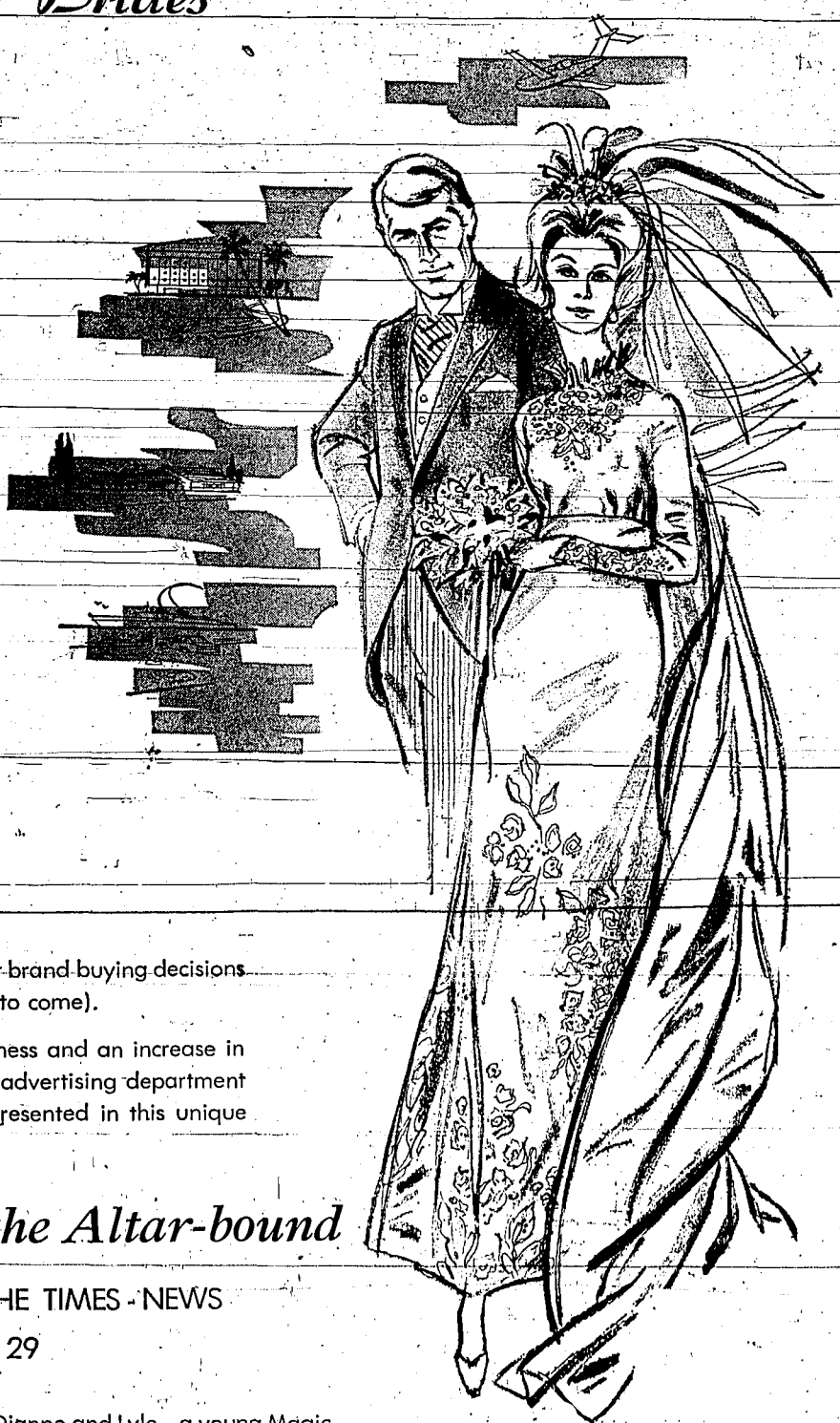

Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour Presented In Canada

TORONTO (UPI)—The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour segment which was banned from U.S. home screens by CBS went on in Canada Sunday night, uncut and uncensored.

"I have an irrevocable contract for this year and next year for the Smothers show and options for any future ones," Murray Chover, president of the Canadian Television (CTV) said. "Furthermore, I am prepared to film the entire show right here in Toronto."

Chover made the state-

ment after a meeting with Tommy Smothers who was in Toronto. He and his brother, Dick, were scheduled to arrive in New York late Sunday night and have scheduled an 11 a.m. news conference Monday at a restaurant.

Tommy Smothers said Chover's offer was "very plausible." "We discussed it briefly but it is far too premature to consider at this stage...in view of all the options that are still open to CBS and ourselves."

Smothers said he could not understand "what on earth is offensively" about a skit by comedian David Steinberg about an imaginary conversation between Solomon and Jonah. "Earlier CBS had objected to Smothers' shows containing segments with folk singer Pete Seeger and with comedian Jackie Mason and after the Steinberg incident, announced it was cancelling its contract with the Smothers brothers." Tommy Smothers said the latest trouble with CBS began after he returned from a two-day meeting in Washington where he discussed television censorship before the National Association of Broadcasters. When he returned to the coast March 25, he said he received a telegram that CBS was "favorably" considering an earlier Smothers' brothers request for a release from the contract. Smothers said he sent a telegram the next day which rescinded the release request. Dennis Shanahan, the Smothers' press officer, said the cancellation by CBS was a "clear breach of contract." The \$4.5 million contract signed March 14 called for 26 shows. "They will pay whether they play the shows or not," Smothers said. If Smothers' did decide to make the shows in Canada they could be sold independently in the U.S.—provided a "black-balling agreement" does not suddenly spring up on American airwaves, Smothers said.

McCormack Prods Nixon To Get Rolling With Proposals

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Speaker John W. McCormack prodded President Nixon today to get rolling with his legislative proposals.

While saying he was still not prepared to criticize Nixon "at this time," McCormack nonetheless issued a statement saying Nixon's legislative performance does not compare favorably with that of his predecessor—Lyndon B. Johnson.

The veteran Massachusetts Democrat criticized Nixon on his performance as "satisfactory plus." But today he said the Republican President's delay in sending recommendations to Capitol Hill has made it "exceedingly difficult" for Dem-

ocratic congressional leaders to work out a plan for the 91st Congress.

The annual appropriations process also has been slowed by Nixon's failure to submit to Congress his recommended changes in the budget proposed by Johnson, McCormack said.

Most lawmakers were visiting home districts, vacation resorts or points-abroad during the session's 10-day Easter recess that will run through Sunday.

McCormack's statement pointed up a growing feeling among Democrats the grace period traditionally allowed a new president by political opponents has about run its course. "Except for his decision to

deploy a new antiballistic missile system, Nixon in a little less than three months in office has escaped heavy attack in the Democratic-controlled Congress.

Nixon, who took office Jan. 20, has deferred action on major recommendations while assessing existing programs. House GOP Leader Gerald R. Ford has praised this course, saying it displays the thoughtful approach desired by the American people.

Fields in which Nixon has made some recommendations include electoral reform, the poverty war, postal reorganization, coal mine safety, extension of the surtax and timing of the calling on the national debt.

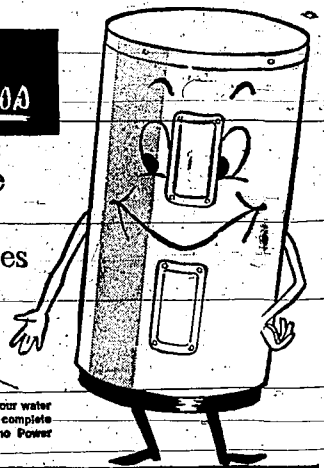

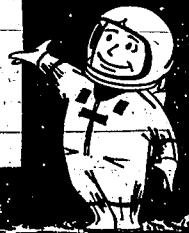
