## Floods Oust Thousands Through Midwest States

Sleep is not coming easy these days to many river communities in the Midwest.  
If the residents aren't lying in bed ready to bolt their homes at the slightest gurgle somewhere downstairs, they're outside holding candles to light the ground-floor vigil on flood-dikes.  
Thousands of persons, including residents, students and National Guardsmen continued their never-ending labor to fill sandbags, heighten the dikes and keep them in constant repair.  
More than 2,000 persons in Iowa, South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin have abandoned their homes as the threat of floods grew. Three persons may already have lost their lives in the flood.  
The threat of flash-flooding arise in southeast Kansas and southwest Missouri as torrential downpours fell. The storm system spawned at least one tornado at Hot Springs, Ark., Wednesday night, damaging an 11-unit apartment complex.  
The center of the flood (troubles in the Midwest today) was still along the Big Sioux River and his flooding continues along the western border of Iowa.  
The major battle scenes pitting man against the water were at Sioux City, Akron and Hawarden on the Big Sioux, at Cherokee on the Little Sioux and at Estherville on the Des Moines River.  
The Des Moines River was rising at the rate of a foot every 12 hours at Estherville and was expected to crest at 19 feet. To meet that, threat, officials ordered another 100 feet of height added to the dike.  
The Big Sioux was reported receding at Hawarden Wednesday, but officials said a new crest was expected later in the week as the high waters farther north in South Dakota arrived.  
At Akron, the 1,400 residents are seeing their worst flooding since 1962. Mayor John Earnest took a helicopter tour Wednesday and said the river had widened to three miles. About 100 families have been evacuated from Akron.  
Sioux City officials believe they had the necessary height on their dike, but they had completed Wednesday night.

### Camas Runoff Swells Magic

### City To Act On Kellwood Annexation

The Twin Falls City Council will act Friday morning on the annexation and zoning of property for the Kellwood plant on Washington Street South.  
At 10 a.m. the Twin Falls Zoning Commission will conduct a public hearing on the zoning of the property. It is proposed that the property be zoned industrial, while the portion of frontage land on the Stewart property, which will be used as a parking lot for the city, will be residential low density.  
Following the commission's public hearing it will make recommendations for the zoning and annexation. The council will then conduct a public hearing on the annexation and zoning.  
Bill Langley, city attorney, explained that the 1967 legislature enacted a measure which provides cities to use this new procedure. Previously the city had to go through a long and costly process to annex property and zone it in two separate procedures.  
An ordinance is being prepared for the zoning of the 20-acre site and will be acted upon following the hearing.  
H. (Derry) Derrick, city manager, said there has been little opposition to the annexation of the property. He said See ANNEXATION, P. 2, Col. 2

### Kellwood Plant Manager Here; Contract Switched

Robert Mathews, who will manage the Twin Falls division of the Kellwood Co., arrived in Twin Falls this week to pick personnel and maintenance supervisors for the hospital plant.  
It was reported that Ronald VanAuker, son of R. M. VanAuker, will take over the contract on the building, which will be constructed on a 20-acre site just south of Twin Falls. The elder Mr. VanAuker was shot to death last week while in Siler, N.C., where he was constructing a new plant.  
The new facility will cost about \$17,000.  
A group of Twin Falls parents voiced a desire to have a mental retardation center nearby two years ago. Since then the state has been working with a city and county officials on the plans. The city donated the 2.25 acres of land for the center.  
The center will be used as a diagnostic center for 150 to 200 children. The mentally retarded children who are not equipped will be trained and/or evaluated at the center.  
In addition, there will be facilities to train or teach 30 to 50 mentally retarded children. A center is also being planned at Lewiston, in addition to the ones at Idaho Falls and Twin Falls.

There was about \$250 damage done to the Goodwin car and \$200 damage to Mrs. Geyer's car, officers estimated.

### Increased Air West Schedules Planned To Eliminate Delays

Extended waiting periods for air passengers out of Twin Falls for connecting flights in both Salt Lake City and Boise should be eliminated with a schedule change announced Thursday by officials of Air West.  
The airline has announced plans to expand flight service in Idaho with a new schedule going into effect April 27.  
Max Hatch, acting manager for the line's Twin Falls operations, said he has not received complete details of the schedule change, but at this time it appears there will be six to eight flights out of Twin Falls daily, depending on what disposition is made of mid-line flights.  
Mr. Hatch said there will be three flights, the west making connections with Boise, Lewiston, Spokane, Seattle, and other northwest and north Idaho points.  
Three others will make east-west connections out of Salt Lake City and Boise. The airline will fly to Salt Lake City with flights to the south and California points.  
Twin Falls will have an earlier flight to Salt Lake City, scheduled to leave at 8:10 a.m. and arrive in Salt Lake City at 9 a.m. This also will better serve businessmen wishing to attend business conferences.  
Many persons are driving to Salt Lake City and Boise to catch flights to the east or northwest points because of long delays in these two cities to make connections with other airline flights.

### Nixon Slams Lid On Job Corpsmen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Nixon Administration has decided to close at least 57 Job Corps centers in 20 states as part of a planned \$100 million cut in the anti-poverty program budget, it was learned Wednesday.  
Among Job Corps centers on the phase-out list were the following: Utah's Castle Valley; Idaho centers at Cedar Bluffs, Marsing and Mountain Home; and Montana's Anaconda, Kicking Horse and Trapper Creek centers.  
Officials said all the closings would be between now and July 1, when the new fiscal year begins and new money year begins are required to continue the Office of Economic Opportunity's program.  
Earlier Wednesday Nixon created a new home for the popular Head Start pre-school program and said it would become the focus of his administration's determination to fight poverty before it marks the children of the poor.  
The new Office of Child Development under Secretary Robert J. Finch of the Health, Education and Welfare department (HEW) would take over the program.

### Cassia Teacher Pay Increased By \$325

BURLEY — Salary increases for Cassia County teachers have been approved by trustees of Cassia School District No. 151, bringing starting salaries for new teachers to \$12,000, an increase of \$325. The pay hike brings the 323 Cassia County teachers pay to \$12,000, an increase of \$325, compared to \$11,675 last year.  
New teachers will receive \$5,625, compared to \$5,300 last year. The new salary schedule ranges from \$7,481 as the top salary to \$11,675 as the lowest. The extra funds needed for the year's spending came from carryover money from previous years. He noted that because of the current spending, the figure in the breakdown of the budget for 1969 is below that of last year.  
Amount budgeted this year for administrative purposes is \$70,000, compared to \$70,000 last year; Instructional, \$1,709,835, compared to \$1,709,750; attendance and health services, \$4,125 compared to \$4,000 last year.

### Taxing Agencies In Turmoil Over New Law

Section 2 of the measure states that the State Tax Commission shall conduct a study of existing assessments, allocations and appraisal practices which have not been completed within reasonable time.  
The State Tax Commission should proceed through reassignment and reappointment of staff to insure that such property is assessed on an equal basis with other property by Jan. 1, 1969.

**Veteran Sky Diver To Give Exhibition**

One of the first men to introduce sky diving as a sport in the United States, George deTillot, now a resident of Twin Falls, will be making two exhibition jumps during a special airlift program at the local airport Sunday.

The exhibitions will highlight a Twin Falls Jaycees-sponsored program to raise funds for the Magic Valley YM-YWCA building program.

Activities begin at 1 p.m. and will continue until 5:30 p.m., when the second and final sky diving exhibition will be held. The airlift will include eight aircraft, donated by the owners, in service throughout the afternoon providing rides over the local area at a cost of two cents per pound of passenger weight.

"We will take their word for their weight," says Mr. deTillot, "but if they don't know their weight, we'll have a scale available."

Holland Houfburg will be master of ceremonies and a sound truck will be set up near the airport-administration building.

Approximately 20 merchants already have donated gifts to be given away or sold at auction during the afternoon program.

Tentatively, the program schedule will open at 1 p.m. with airlift operations continuing until 2:30 p.m. At that time Mr. deTillot will make his first sky dive over the airport from an elevation of between 3,000 and 4,000 feet.

Airlift activities will resume until 3:30 p.m., when they will be suspended for the arrival and departure of the regular Air West flight. Mayor Egon Kroll and other city and county officials will be introduced for brief comments on airport facilities and needs in the Magic Valley areas.

More airlift rides and the final sky diving performance at 5:30 p.m. will close the Sunday program.

Pilots who will be donating their time and aircraft for the benefit of the "Y" building, include Warren Barry, Robert Harney, Kirkman Brothers, Orla Florence Jr., Robert Villa, and Bill Powell. Reeder Flying Service will donate two aircraft,

Newly elected Jaycee officials, including Denis Vollmer, president, will be in charge of the day's activities.

Mr. deTillot said more merchants are expected to join the project by donating merchandise and gift certificates. Those contributing are Zimmerman's, Singer Sewing

Mr. deTillot, who began sky diving in his native France at the age of 14, came to the United States as a performer in aerial stunt shows. At that time sky diving was popular as a sport in Europe, but was known in the United States only in exhibition form.

The first sky-diving club in the United States was organized under his direction in Des Moines, Iowa.

Because sky diving had never been done before, it was necessary to obtain a waiver from the CAA regulation which prohibited dropping any objects from a plane.

"We obtained permission to drop an object from a moving airplane and our first sky dive was legal," Mr. deTillot recalls,

In 1958, Mr. deTillot took a world record away from Russian sky divers when he made a successful jump, opening his small stunt chute at only 120 feet above the ground. The previous record has been 300 feet, set by the Russians a year earlier.

The record will probably stand, says the local sky diver, in that FAA officials who regulate such activities have become more sensible and no longer permit such dangerous jumps.

"I'm not interested in setting records any more," says the local sky diver, "I'm more interested in living a little longer."

The jump that set the record left only 7 of a second for the chute to open and fall before the diver hit the ground.

Each time a sky diver plans a jump, he must clear it with FAA officials in his area and, if conditions are not considered safe, the jump may be prohibited.

All of the Sunday events hinge on suitable weather, Mr. deTillot said, and if it is stormy, the merchandise prizes will be donated to the "Y" for auction to raise funds.

**Student Held For Owing Explosives**

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Stephen Fraser, 23, a student demonstration leader at Temple University, and three companions were arrested Wednesday night by police who said they found explosives in his apartment.

Taken into custody with Fraser were Richard H. Borzeman, 20, who occupies the same apartment; Jane D. Friendman, 19, a sophomore at the University of Pennsylvania; and Alan P. Milkman, 20, of New York, who described himself as an employee of the Columbia University Library.

All were charged with possession of explosives, violation of a city ordinance governing the storage of explosives and conspiracy.

L. Gorge Fencil, head of the police civil disobedience unit, and five members of his squad conducted the raid of the apartment which comprises the third and fourth floors of a west Philadelphia building.

Fencil said the explosives, found under a refrigerator on the third floor, included three 8-inch lengths of pipe containing a black powder believed to be an explosive, a one-half pound ball believed to be C-2 plastic explosive, an eight ounce can of black powder believed to be explosive and an eight inch length of fuse.

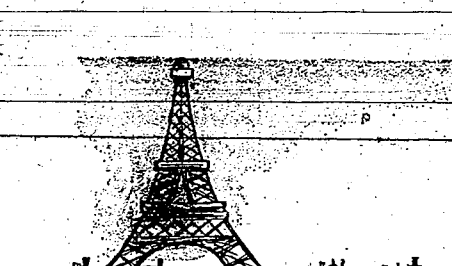

 She will be a full-time White House employee with a salary of \$28,000 a year.  
 Nixon earlier had tried to get a part-time "consultant" on consumer affairs, Miss Willie Mae Rogers, director of the Good Housekeeping Institute. But she quit after four days when she was criticized for planning to keep her private job while reviewing federal consumer programs.  
 Mrs. Knauer, wife of Philadelphia lawyer Wilhelm Knauer, told a White House news conference "the consumer needs a great deal of protection, a great deal of information. She warned of 'the pitfalls of the marketplace' and said the poor and the uneducated particularly need more consumer protection."  
 Mrs. Knauer, who has two children and one 7-year-old grandchild, had high praise for her predecessor, Miss Furness, and said they visited as "one girl to another."  
 "I think she did a fantastic job of communicating to the public at large that the administration was concerned with consumer problems," Mrs. Knauer said.  
 She spoke of dealing with "fraudulent situations" in Pennsylvania and vowed to continue her attack on a national basis. Such situations in Pennsylvania, she told newsmen, involved the home improvement industry and automobile repair shops.



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# Nixon Creates New Agency To Control Head Start Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon's new plan for the popular Head Start preschool program, which is aimed at child development and avoids a nasty controversy within his administration and in the House, is to be announced in a speech across the nation.

Nixon said Feb. 19 he planned to shift Head Start by July 1 from its birthplace agency, the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO), to the Health, Education and Welfare Department (HEW).

He said then his administration intended to place emphasis on early childhood development and preservation of Head Start would only be the spearhead of his plans.

Nixon followed through Wednesday with an announcement that Head Start would be lodged in a newly created HEW agency, the Office of Child Development, directed under Secretary Robert H. Finch.

Supporters of the children's bureau, including top OEO officials now running the program, argued that Head Start would be swallowed up and stripped of its flavor of community participation if it went to the massive, organization-conscious Office of Education.

Supporters of the Office of Education contended that Head Start should be brought into the mainstream of the federal educational effort and guided by schooling.

The controversy also threatens to invade poor neighborhoods where Head Start has been operating since 1965.

The day after Nixon first announced his intention to shift the program, a busload of Head Start mothers showed up in Washington to protest, both to OEO and HEW. They expressed the fear that the Head Start's emphasis on parent participation and other noneducational factors would be lost in the shuffle.

# Union Halts Attempts To Force Parley

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United Steelworkers' Union has halted its effort to force company-wide bargaining on the nation's copper industry, the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) disclosed Wednesday.

The NLRB announced the union action in a brief, one-page statement ending more than two years of legal hassling over the issue.

The board said the union had failed to challenge the ruling of its trial examiner that it was illegal for the union to force the company firms into company-wide contracts.

As a result of the union's failure to challenge the trial examiner's ruling, the board said it was upholding the decision without further hearings.

The case directly involved the Kennecott Copper Co. and its subsidiaries. The union had been months last year along with the nation's other major copper producers primarily over the issue of company-wide bargaining.

The company insisted that there was no community of interest between its Western mining operations and its Eastern subsidiaries and therefore it should not be forced to bargain for all its properties and under a single contract.

# Projects For Highways Set To Begin

Three major spring highway maintenance projects will get under way in the near future in Twin Falls and Jerome Counties, the Idaho Department of Highways reported Thursday.

Carl E. Nelson, Construction Director, said the department submitted an apparent low bid of \$133,410 for all three separate items of work.

These include resurfacing of 6.71 miles of U.S. Highway 30 from Filer to Cedar Crossing, another 2.58 miles in the vicinity of Deadman's Gulch and the third project of 0.21 miles on U.S. 93 from East 5-point intersection in Twin Falls to the junction with Highway 90-N in Jerome County, Howard Johnson, district highway engineer, Shoshone, said all three involve new seal coating and are classed as maintenance with no new construction involved.

# Justice Agency Endorses Ruling On CATV Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department Wednesday endorsed the Federal Communications Commission's proposal to limit any local television station from owning a Community Antenna Television system (CATV) in the same area.

It suggested the limitation should also be applied to newspaper ownership of the fast-growing cable television industry and urged the FCC to investigate the possible prohibition of radio station cross-ownership.

But Assistant Atty. Gen. Richard W. McLaren said in comments filed with the FCC: "It must, however, be recognized that such limitations on ownership are unusual restrictions on business activity. They therefore should be applied only to CATV ownership by directly competing media in the same market."

The anti-trust chief said nothing should prohibit television stations, except perhaps the three networks, or newspapers from owning CATV systems in other markets where they have no communications interests subject to any group ownership limitations by the commission.

# Sirhan Prosecutor Describes 'Illness'

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The prosecutor's voice never lost its soft key, but when he was finished he had painted Sirhan B. Sirhan as a liar trying desperately to duck the crime of murder.

"We concede he is sick," said Deputy Dist. Atty. David Fitts. "But how sick?"

A tall, grey-haired man with a craggy countenance, Fitts was demanding a verdict of first degree murder for the slaying of Robert F. Kennedy.

"He has left a bad taste in your mouth—the whole subject of clinical psychology," Fitts said.

The prosecutor did not mention the penalty, and the state had said earlier it would not seek a death sentence. If the jury finds Sirhan guilty of first degree murder, it must then decide on a sentence of life or death. If it brings in a verdict of second degree murder, it would mean an automatic life sentence.

"I have dealt in criminal responsibility for 15 years and I haven't learned a great deal," Fitts said.

"We are on the verge of putting a man on the moon. Incredibly, we haven't found a better way of determining what should be done with a criminal than 12 people in a jury box."

Fitts called Sirhan a liar over and over again and finally the 25-year-old Arab rose cursing and had to be pulled once again from the courtroom. After a recess, Sirhan was all smiles and composure when he entered again.

The defense today began its

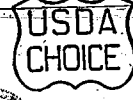

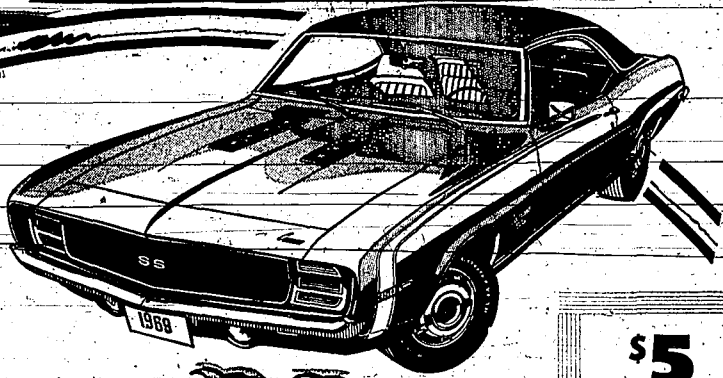

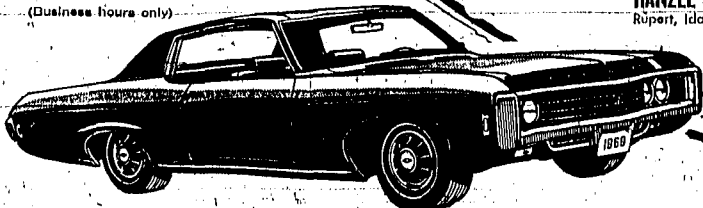

male classes taught by male teachers are different, according to a report in "Nation's Schools," a Journal.

**TAKE-OUT TOPS DOUBLED SIX**

Some experts play the double of an opening four-heart bid as strictly business. Others play it as take-out and still others as a business but willing to play spades.

In a recent team match both sides played the double this way. At the first table South by left his partner's double in North opened the king of clubs and set the contract. North was happy until he saw the result at the other table.

That South took the double out to four spades. East doubled like the crack of doom and West opened the king of hearts. South discarded a club on dummy's ace and led the singleton diamond from dummy. East went up with the ace and led another heart.

At this point South went into one of those five-minute huddles. He finally decided that East held all missing trumps business but willing to play spades.

At that assumption, he ruffed a diamond first, ran three rounds of clubs winding up in his hand and ruffed another diamond. Now East was down to five trumps but there was no way he could make more than two tricks with the king and the ace to do as to lead a heart from dummy. If East trumped low South would score his 10. Accidentally East ruffed with the jack and led a trump—but this put dummy on lead again. Another heart was led. East could take East with an aces and East was not in with the diamond ace he might have led—the seven-of-trumps right then and beaten the hand.

**Russians Move 7 Warships**  
NAPLES, Italy (UPI)—Seven Soviet warships sailed from the Strait of Gibraltar from the Atlantic Ocean into the Mediterranean today, the U.S. Navy said.

They said it was the first time the Russians had reinforced in strength their Mediterranean fleet from the Atlantic. The U.S. 6th Fleet watched the buildup.

"There has been no change in the readiness position of the 6th Fleet. Routine surveillance and training exercises continue," said Vice Adm. David C. Richardson, the 6th fleet commander who has headquarters here.

Richardson said the seven warships formed part of the Soviet northern fleet that had been exercising recently in the Atlantic.

Earlier, there had been diplomatic reports in London and other western capitals that the Soviet Atlantic exercise ships were headed for the Pacific to show Moscow muscle in the face of China. The Soviet Union denied the reports.

Sixth fleet sources said they did not know if other ships from the Soviet Atlantic force would come to the Mediterranean.

Even with this buildup, the Soviet fleet in the Mediterranean is still far below the peak of more than 50 ships reached early last fall. Before today's reinforcement, about 30 Soviet ships were currently in the Mediterranean.

It is far below that of the west. The 6th Fleet alone has 50 ships, 200 planes and 25,000 men in the Mediterranean.

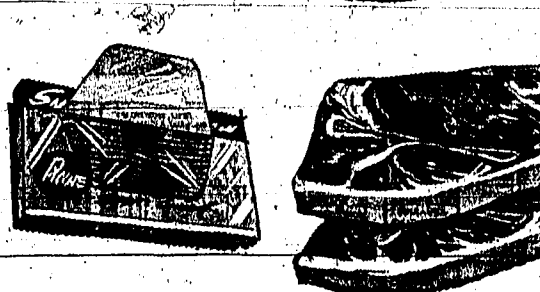
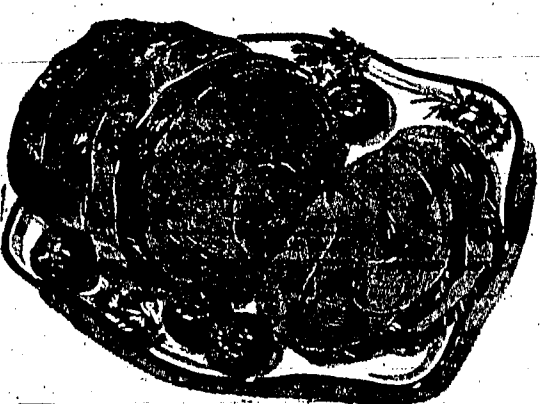

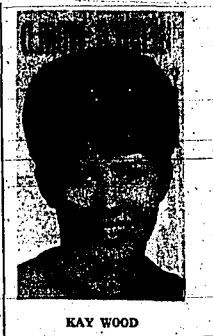

**Milan Battles Pollution**

MILAN, Italy—Milan seems to have taken over from Los Angeles as the smog capital of the world.

During a few days at the end of January, smog conditions in Milan, according to official measurement, were the equivalent of a second stage alert, as defined by the Los Angeles pollution control board. Los Angeles itself almost never gets to that stage-of-pollution—any more. It is a very uncomfortable condition, mentally as well as physically.

As a start, a campaign under the slogan "Air for Milan" has recently been launched with the backing of three prominent local organizations, Italia-Northern, the Center for Studies and Political Activity, a local research and action group; and the Tourist Office of the Province of Lombardy.

But the Milanese really are mainly thinking about themselves. They have seen what can be done in London, for example, where the dramatic revolution of the smokeless fuel campaign has turned the smoggiest city in the world into one of the fairest. They are impressed by what Los Angeles has accomplished under climatic conditions which, basically, are much less favorable than at Milan.

Italy does have an anti-smog law enacted in 1956 under pressure particularly by the citizens of Milan. This comes into full operation in 1970, and meanwhile is being enforced on a progressive scale. It seeks to eliminate the chief cause of smog, Italian-style, low sulphur emissions from burning heavy fuel oil in home central heating and factory furnace installations.

But the biggest flaw in the whole anti-smog program so far is that it makes no attempt to control pollution by motor vehicles. These are said to cause only about 20 per cent of Milan-type smog, compared with 70 per cent in Los Angeles. On the other hand, the percentage in the California city is so high, probably, because the other types of pollutants have already been severely restricted.

DEAR DARLENE: Nor as long as you hold the noise down.

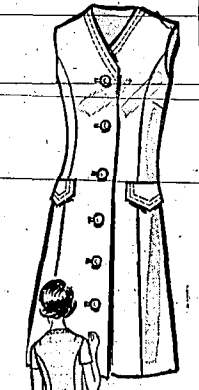
