North Koreans Gun Down Plane Carrying 31 Men

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A U.S. Navy spy plane with 31 men aboard was shot down today in the Far East and the North Koreans gleefully announced they shot it down "with a single shot at a high altitude."

The Defense Department said only that the plane was missing. It was identified as a version of the Air Force EC121, a four-engine, propeller-driven craft loaded with sophisticated intelligence-gathering equipment.

The plane was being used by North Korea radio saying the plane intruded North Korean airspace and was downed with one shot at high altitude. It was a high-altitude aircraft carrying a reconnaissance mission.

The Pentagon said a search was under way for the plane in the area of Japan-65 miles south of Cheju. That is a port city in North Korea's northeast panhandle only about 75 miles from Red China and about 150 miles from Vladivostok, the old Russian seaport.

The U.S. spy ship Pueblo was said to have operated in that same general area in the Sea of Japan before the plane was shot down. The North Korean broadcast said the plane "was reconnoitering after intruding deep into the territorial air of the northern half of the republic" when it was shot down.

The broadcast did not reveal whether any of the crew survived or where the plane went down. The Pentagon said a list of members of the crew was being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

In the case of the Pueblo, 31 of the 32 members of the crew survived and were held prisoner for a year by the Communists. They were released last December, just before Christmas.

The White House was being kept closely informed of the developments in President Nixon's first encounter with an incident of this type.

The Pentagon said the plane, which is said to be capable of carrying six tons of special electronic equipment, took off from the U.S. Navy base in Atsugi, Japan, at 5 p.m. EST Monday and was last heard from about midnight.

The missing plane was said to approach no closer than 30 miles to the North Korean coast. The White House said the mission was not disclosed, the statement did not go beyond calling the plane a "reconnaissance aircraft."

The plane carries so much sophisticated equipment, sources explained, that it takes an unusually large number of men to operate it. It has several different versions of the EC121, with different crew requirements and missions.

The defense plane was said to be capable of flying over 25,000 feet. The later models of the Russian-built MIGs that North Korea has are capable of flying much higher, but that "single shot" claim appeared to indicate a missile may have been the weapon.

Some May Have To Evacuate

GOODING — Some 35 ranches north of Gooding were advised to prepare for flood conditions from the rising Big Wood River, and some will probably have to evacuate.

Deputy Sheriff Bill Bunn, Gooding County civil defense director, said the runoff into Magic Reservoir is continuing to rise, and the Big Wood River will be in flood stage by Wednesday night or Thursday because of the runoff from the reservoir.

Ranchers are being warned personally and by phone to get their cattle and hay away from the river. Some homes probably will have to be evacuated.

Soil conservation Service officials, and county and city leaders met with Army Engineers Sunday to discuss the flood threat.

The Little Wood River, which runs through the towns of Shoshone and Gooding, was reported as "stable" Tuesday, and it is the Big Wood, which runs to the north of Gooding, where the current threat lies.

At Halley, Army engineers met with Blaine County commissioners Monday afternoon to report on current flood control measures on the upper portion of the Big Wood River in the Halley-Ketchum area.

Attending the meeting were representatives of the Soil Conservation Service, Fish and Game Department and Forest Service.

Vernon Thompson, of the Army Engineers, said representatives of these groups inspected the river and decided on seven or eight sites where flood control measures should be taken.

These included the William Myers ranch, south of Bellevue, north of the district canal; Star Valley, south of Halley and Broadford, on the Broadford road; Hawatha canal; Deer Creek bridge; Justus canal north of Halley; Trail End subdivision, and Thornley Williams Sub-division south of Ketchum community.

Heavy equipment is expected to be brought to the Halley area within the next few days, said Floyd Dorius, Soil conservation official.

It was added that heavy rocks are needed for rip-rapping and that officials are looking for a supply closer than Placerville where they have been backed up.

Cool nights have resulted in practically a normal runoff so far on Camas prairie.

Gama-Creek, which traverses the valley, is being banked but this is usual in the spring runoff. The swamp area south of Hill City has a lot of water that has been backed up by blocks of snow but the channels of most of the streams are opening up and running full.

\$277,976 Is Sought In Damage Suit

Two lawsuits asking \$277,976 in connection with an accident near Glens Ferry last fall that claimed the life of a Jerome man have been filed in Fifth District Court.

Defendants in both actions are the Idaho Highway Department and members of the highway board, Lloyd Barron, Howard Thompson and C. Ed Flinders. Doyle Simms, a former member of the board and Howard Johnson, the district highway engineer in the Glens Ferry area.

The suits claim a rock slipped down a ranswep hillside on Nov. 9, 1968, and came to rest on Highway 30 and there were no attempts to mark the area or remove the rock. The accident happened two and a half miles east of Glens Ferry, it is claimed.

The first suit was filed by Wayne and Mildred Rathbun and their children Carol and Philip Rathbun. The second was filed by Bernice Rathbun and her children Gary and Sharon Rathbun. Mildred Rathbun is the widow of Floyd Rathbun, killed in the accident.

The first suit claims Mildred Rathbun was a passenger in the car when Mrs. Bernice Rathbun brother-in-law, Carol and Philip Rathbun were passengers. They ask \$1,250 in lost earnings, \$475 for various costs, \$75,000 general damages for Mildred Rathbun, and \$100,000 in general damages for Carol and Philip Rathbun.

The second suit asks \$1,220 in lost earnings, \$225 for various expenses, \$5,000 for the loss of the car involved, \$75,000 for injuries and general damages to the widow of the driver, and \$100,000 for the death of Mr. Rathbun.

The accident happened about 6:30 p.m., the plaintiffs contend in each suit. Jury trials are asked.

Harvard Students Continue Protest Boycott Of Classes

Harvard students boycotted classes again today. Twenty-nine campus newspapers across the country today editorially trumpeting the cause of the Harvard demonstrators, elimination of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps.

About 6,000 students gathered at Harvard Stadium Monday and passed a resolution vowing to continue the strike through Thursday and longer if the school's ruling body, the Harvard Corp., does not respond to the students' demands.

The spokesman for Tulane University's Hullahaba, said 11 and 28 other campus newspapers across the nation were calling for an end to the school's ROTC program as an "unquestioning servant of the government" in offering military training to its students.

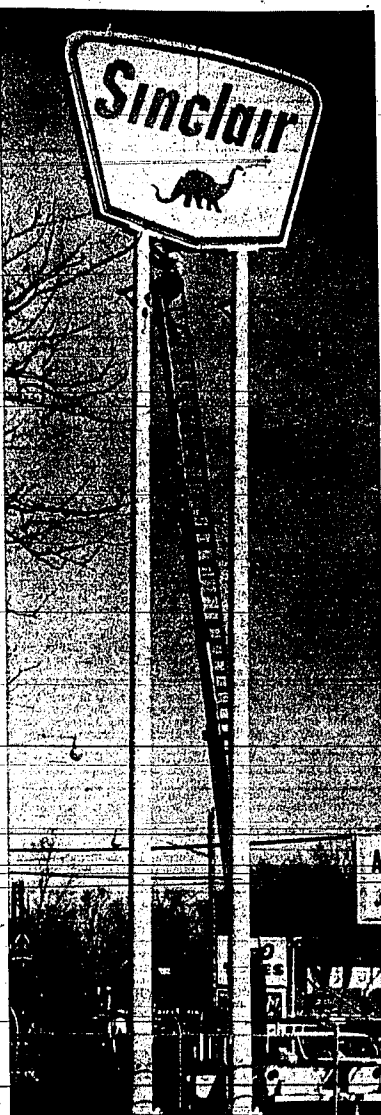
Sirhan Waits

A verdict of first or second degree murder — one carrying a possible death sentence and the other assuring life — was expected shortly.

The 15-week case went to the jury of seven men and five women Monday at 2:55 p.m. PST. After 63 minutes of deliberation they retired to their hotel rooms and were set to resume discussion today.

Attorneys for both sides declined to estimate how long the jury might be out. The jurors will deliberate during normal court hours of about 9:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. and then be locked up in their hotel rooms for the night.

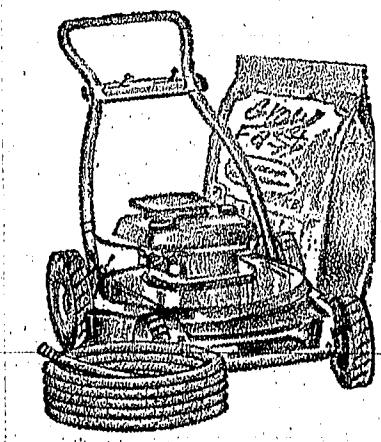

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2 Meetings Set On White Cloud Issue

The Forest Service will conduct two public meetings on proposed mining in the White Cloud Peaks in Boise and Idaho Falls, May 9 and 10.

In Boise, the meeting will be at the YMCA building on Tenth and State Streets on Friday, May 9, beginning at 2 p.m. and continuing until 5 p.m.

The second meeting will be held on Saturday, May 10, at the Bonneville Hotel in Idaho Falls. This meeting will also begin at 2 p.m. and continue until 5 p.m.

Regional Forester Floyd Iverson, in making this announcement, stated, "These meetings will be held to provide an opportunity for discussion of the American Smelting and Refining Company's recent proposal for road construction to serve its planned mining developments in the White Cloud Peaks area, within the Challis National Forest in South-Central Idaho."

The proposed road is reported to be a sizable body of molybdenum ore located in the Little Boulder Creek drainage, northeast of Castle Peak, in the White Cloud Peaks area, the Challis National Forest management plans for this area do not call for development of roads."

Iverson said, "Under the plans, management emphasis is being given to the area's exceptionally high recreation values."

Soviet Fleet Tops Allies In Atlantic

LONDON (UPI)—The Soviet Union's submarine fleet is now larger than the combined underwater fleets of all 15 members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), a British military expert said Monday.

The authority said the Soviets currently have approximately 380 submarines, 88 of them capable of firing nuclear warhead missiles. All NATO countries together have 292 submarines, but only a portion of these are attached to NATO units.

Of the approximately 150 submarines in the U.S. Navy, three Polaris missile vessels are assigned to NATO's European command. The U.S. has 41 Polaris submarines.

The report on Soviet submarine strength and other military capabilities was prepared by Alistair Buchan, director of Britain's Institute for Strategic Studies. It is part of a series of defense analyses entitled "The Soviet Threat To Europe" and was released Monday.

It is hoped that these two public informational meetings will provide a suitable way for those who are concerned or interested in the White Cloud Peaks area to present their ideas. Views both about the mining proposal and the future management of the White Cloud Peaks area will be heard.

"The public meetings will not be conducted as formal hearings," Mr. Iverson said, "but notes will be taken on all statements presented."

Written comments will also be welcome from those who wish to submit them either at the meetings or otherwise. Stockholders Locate Data In Annual Company Reports

NEW YORK (UPI)—This spring's crop of annual reports to stockholders a lot more than they were told only a year or so ago.

The 1968 reports also are more sophisticated, revealing great expertise in writing and goal orientation on the part of management. Bizarre formats virtually have disappeared. While there still are many extremely costly color printing jobs, these have a definite purpose. Unless a company has something that fancy color printing will help sell, it doesn't lavish—too—much—money—on plates and richly coated paper. Perhaps the most interesting aspect of the 1968 annual reports is that many companies carry over into them the new Securities and Exchange Commission registration requirement that sales of diversified companies be broken down to each division or product line constituting more than 10 per cent of sales.

"This information will interest investors and it is useful to security analysts too," said a representative of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc. Several analysts cautioned that, it would be easy to overestimate its value.

"After all," one said, "most good analysts can guess at these sales figures quite closely."

"What is needed is to know

how profitable each activity is about the company." Like a magazine, it has a definite purpose — to stress growth, to serve as a sales manual or to impress security analysts and professional investors.

Textron, Inc., has been showing profitability of different divisions and lines in recent reports and so do some of the conglomerates where there are large minority stockholders. But most companies still are secretive about such matters.

Two professional firms turning out sophisticated annual reports, William Kemsley Associates, Inc., and Corporate Annual Reports, Inc., agreed that nowadays the financial information is the least important part of the report. Stockholders who really are interested already have the figure long before the report is printed.

Kemsley said a modern annual report is "a magazine

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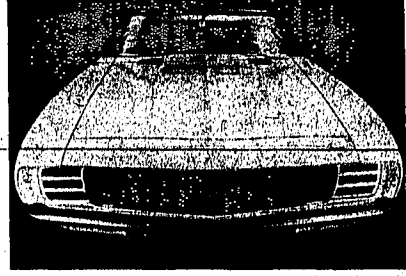

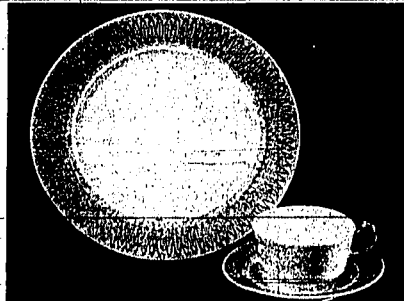

Moon's Shape Is Debated

HOUSTON (UPI) — A space center mathematician said Monday that the moon may be shaped like a squat, lumpy pear instead of a slightly flattened football as scientists in the past believed.

The pear shape, Emil Schlessor said, would explain the difficulties encountered in predicting a spacecraft's path around the moon.

Schlessor said his new "model" of the moon would be tested in May during the lunar orbit flight of Apollo 10. If it works, it could remove one of the last major uncertainties left in the way of an American moon landing.

The question of how the moon disturbs the path of a spacecraft orbiting around it is vital to landing men on the moon, Apollo 10 will be the last chance to gather data on this problem before Americans try a lunar touchdown with Apollo 11 this July.

Schlessor said his new concept deemphasizes the importance of seven heavy spots or "massons" detected beneath the lunar surface.

"Massons exist, and it was often supposed that they would have a large effect on determination of a spacecraft's position and velocities," Schlessor said.

"We do not believe that is the case, now."

Now it is the general shape of the moon, rather than massons, which we think cause lunar navigational uncertainties," Apollo 8, in which three astronauts orbited the moon last Christmas, proved there were uncertainties in predicting the craft's position. That flight was the first "footprint" of the moon for its orbital planning, but scientists generally blamed the uncertainties in its orbit of the "massons."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, said Wednesday the subcommittee on Veterans' Legislation of the Senate Committee on Finance will hold public hearings April 23 on benefits for survivors of servicemen and veterans.

Jordan, a member of the subcommittee, said three major bills have been introduced in the senate this year dealing with benefits for servicemen's survivors.

The bills would: liberalize dependency and indemnity compensation payments to widows and orphans; increase servicemen's group life insurance (for servicemen on active duty) from the present \$10,000 to \$15,000.

And provide double indemnity benefits under servicemen's group life insurance for servicemen on active duty in combat areas.

Jordan suggested interested groups or individuals wishing to testify on the bills, or on any other matters related to survivor benefits, should make their request to the Committee on Finance no later than April 18.

A spring snowstorm hit — as it frequently does in the Rockies — and the cabin owned by Denver patrolman Joe Breuch and told the officer: "My mother's sick and in snow."

When the snow stopped, Mrs. Schadler decided to walk back to the car to leave a note telling where she and her son were. However, she slipped and struck her head on a rock. Sean saw what happened, put on his cowboy boots — on the wrong feet — and started walking through the five-inch-deep snow. He was dressed only in a light sweater.

Minot Girds For Flooding: Homes Empty

Nearly one third the population of Minot, N.D., has been evacuated while preparations are under way to complete preparations for a second crest on the flood-swollen Mouse River.

A Wisconsin official told Gov. Warren E. Hearnes Monday that flooding in that state is largely under control. But parts of St. Paul, Minn., were under water, thousands were evacuated, and South Dakota, Iowa and Illinois instituted a flood watch at several points along the Mississippi River.

Flooding across the upper Midwest had forced evacuation of nearly 15,000 persons, caused about \$5 million damage, and was blamed for nine deaths.

Minot residents today kept a close eye on a mile-long ice jam on the Souris River in southern Saskatchewan. The jam of melting ice dammed millions of gallons of water, which eventually will have to be drawn down the Missouri and through Minot, to complete preparations for a second crest on the flood-swollen Mouse River.

Officials predicted the Mouse would crest Friday at 22 feet. The first peak was 17 feet last week—enough to nearly cut the community in half.
