## Viet Cong Agree To Discuss Peace With South Viets

PARIS (UPI)—The Viet Cong announced today it is ready for "discussions with the other parties" to get the Vietnam peace talks moving again. Until now the Viet Cong has refused to hold side talks with the South Vietnamese government. The Allies had called that refusal a major stumbling block to peace.

## Major Battle Flares

SAIGON (UPI)—Allied forces killed 149 Communists in battles near the Cambodian border in the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ), U.S. military spokesmen said today. In the major battle, American tanks and infantrymen routed a North Vietnamese unit from a bunker complex, killing 64 of them.

GIs of the 11th Armored Cavalry drove into the fight atop more than 30 new M48 tanks. U.S. 1st Air Cavalrymen dropped into battle in helicopters.

U.S. casualties were four killed and 29 wounded, spokesmen said. The Americans killed 57 Communists in the first 3 1/2 hours of fighting Tuesday, then killed seven more a few hours later, spokesmen said.

U.S. B-52 bombers have carried out 33 raids in the area near the Cambodian border in the past few days to try to head off a possible new wave of attacks by the 1st and 7th North Vietnamese divisions, spokesmen said.

## New Migrant Center Program Planned

A representative of the Office of Economic Opportunity was in Twin Falls Monday to discuss a possible new program for the South Central Community Action Agency.

Willard Smith, Boise, met with Larry Mack, director of the SCAA, to review a proposal for a migrant service center. The center would serve the three-county area which includes Jerome, Twin Falls and Cassia counties. An estimated 1,200 migrant workers would be involved.

## Absentee Vote In School Election Set

Absentee voting will begin Saturday for the Twin Falls School District No. 411 trustee election, said Dr. Ernest Ragland, school superintendent.

The election will be from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. May 13, at Dinkel and Lincoln schools. No registration is necessary, but voters must sign electors cards, affirming they are qualified voters from either Zone 2 or 5.

No contests will be held in either zone as only the incumbent trustees filed nominating petitions by the Thursday deadline. Elmer Sommer, present board chairman, has filed for Zone 5, and Frank DeLuca, for Zone 2.

## CSI Professor Gets Science Board Post

A College of Southern Idaho science professor has been named the only woman executive of the Idaho Academy of Sciences.

Prof. Ruthann LeBaron, an associate professor of biological sciences and is chairman of the science department of CSI. Her husband, Marshall LeBaron, is superintendent of the University of Idaho branch experiment station at Twin Falls.

Prof. LeBaron was elected to three-year term on the four-member executive board of the academy. She is the only female on the 12-member executive branch of the academy. She was selected at a state meeting over the weekend at Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa.

## Gooding Sets School Bond Vote May 13

GOODING — Voters in Gooding Joint School District No. 231 are being asked to vote in a bond election May 13 to build a new high school in Gooding.

Trustees hope to replace the present 67-year old structure, which is becoming unsafe in many ways.

The bond issue is for \$1,110,000 which would be used for construction of the new school. In addition, the district has collected, over the last five years, about \$240,000, which would be added to the amount of the bond.

The district already owns the 21 acre site, where trustees hope to locate the school.

Officials point out that building costs are climbing at a dizzying rate, and that a one-year postponement of the bond would be an asset to Gooding, and also that an economic factor is involved, since construction workers would be in the area for some time.

## Guardsmen Oust Negroes From Voorhees Campus; Tulane Protest Flares

National Guardsmen and state police manned roadblocks near the campus of Voorhees College in Denmark, S.C., early today after routing 25 gun-toting black militants from three buildings Tuesday.

Seventeen students and faculty members were taken into custody by Tulane University officials Tuesday after attempting to disrupt student military training exercises.

Some 600 coeds staged a five-hour sit-in at the Rider College Library in Trenton, N.J. in a campaign to win dormitory keys then sequestered for all-night vigils in the gymnasium.

The Voorhees occupation was ended without a shot being fired as a professor ran to the student-held buildings and urged the militants to surrender.

Prof. Bernie Dingle led the blacks, without their guns, to the home of President John F. Potts, shouting, "get those white racist cops out there."

The troops then surrounded the home and arrested the students.

The campus was closed indefinitely and students were ordered to leave.

Demonstrators on the New Orleans campus of Tulane University, chanting "ROTC-Nazi" and "Kill, Kill," refused orders to leave the drill field where ROTC members were marching.

Campus police moved in and chained the demonstrators to a fire hydrant. They were released after surrendering their identification cards.

Students at Indiana's four state-supported universities continued their protest of planned

tuition increases. Police broke up a mill-in outside a Purdue University building but protesters inside left voluntarily just before police entered to evict them.

On other campuses: New York—A sit-in at Queensborough College entered its 11th day today. City College of New York remained closed indefinitely, and several classes were canceled at the University of Rochester.

North Carolina—Seven of the 12 blacks enrolled in Belmont Abbey College in Belmont occupied the Science Building Tuesday for 10 hours. The president of the 818-student Roman Catholic school said a negotiating committee had "succeeded in bringing back into the realm of intelligent and organized discussion the problems the students had raised."

## Israelis Strike Three Magic Valley Students Are National Merit Scholars

Israeli commando units struck Nile River dams, bridges and electric power pylons nearly 400 miles inside Egypt today, disrupting Cairo's electric supplies and flooding areas of Egyptian farmland, Israel announced in Tel Aviv.

Francis Golda Meir said the commando raids, which the Israelis said met no resistance, were in retaliation for Egyptian attacks across the Suez Canal. A spokesman said the raids were within 60 miles of Egypt's Aswan dam.

## French Curb Gatherings For May Day

PARIS (UPI)—The French government, afraid of "revolutionary combat" in the streets, today banned a public demonstration during the Communist May Day holiday Thursday.

"Extremist groups have announced their intention of making May 1st a day of revolutionary combat in the public thoroughfares," the government announcement said.

"For this reason the Ministry of Interior has decided to ban these demonstrations."

The Communist-led General Confederation of Labor (CGT) led the traditional May Day marches of workers through the east end of Paris from the Place de la Bastille to the Place de la Republique.

## Thieves Get \$900 From School Safe

SIHOONE — Safecrackers stole \$900 in student organization funds from the Shoshone High School sometime Monday night, according to school officials.

Intruders apparently broke into the building through the furnace room and went straight to the principal's office where the walk-in vault was located.

According to School Supt. Kenneth Crothers, the money was taken from separate student funds which had been accumulated during the past three days from a number of student fundraising activities.

The Student Council fund was hardest hit, losing about \$300. Other funds rifled were Universal Gymnasium Project Fund, Future Farmers and Senior Class funds.

According to investigating officers and school officials the break-in apparently was done by expert safecrackers who also had a clear idea of where the safe was located. The safe was "brutally" opened, while the intruders broke locks on only the doors necessary for access to the safe.

## Attack Fatal For Hagerman Mayor

HAGERMAN — Frank West, mayor of Hagerman, died at 11 a.m. Wednesday of a heart attack at St. Benedict's Hospital.

It was reported he awoke about 2 a.m. complaining of pains in his chest and his family took him to the hospital. Mr. West operated a grocery business here for the past four years.

## Kellwood Training Applicants Sought

The College of Southern Idaho will begin accepting applications for training for the Twin Falls Division of the Kellwood Co. hosiery plant by about mid-May, according to Orval Bradley, CSI vocational school director.

Mr. Bradley said those interested in taking the training must go through regular college enrollment procedures even though they registered in the labor survey.

The knitting industry programs will be instructed, at least by employees of the Kellwood Co.

Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president, has conferred with

Gov. Don Samuelson on funding of the programs. Dr. Taylor said the governor has given assurance that if adequate funds are not available through existing state agencies, facilities of his office will be exerted to provide the necessary funding.

While conferring in Boise with the governor, Dr. Taylor also met with Sam Burke, representative of Allied Industries, Inc., to negotiate a lease on the C. C. Anderson building in Twin Falls.

The building will be the site of the Kellwood training program.

## Teams Kick Off YM-YWCA Fund Drive

The Twin Falls Jaycees turned over nearly \$700 Tuesday night to the YM-YWCA capital funds drive at a campaign kickoff banquet at the American Legion Hall.

About 250 of the 375 campaign workers attended. The \$300,000 which the drive is expected to raise will expand Y facilities by building a year-around swimming facility, locker area and shower rooms, handball courts and a health club.

Jaycees president Douglas Vollmer presided at presentation of the check for \$300, which was raised with an airlift Sunday at the city-county airport. Assisting with the check was George DeTillot, sky diver, who assisted with the air show operation.

Hamilton, YMCA board president, accepted the check on behalf of the campaign.

Mr. Hamilton said it is not known at this point just how much money has been collected, because a report meeting has not been held for a week. He said, however, that big gifts and top level contributions workers have been soliciting funds for some time.

Guest speaker at the kickoff banquet was Ray Arnold, Salt Lake City, a member of the National YMCA Board of Directors. Chet Bartlett and Sally Moberg were in attendance at the local YMCA and YWCA programs, gave short speeches.

## Idaho Senator

**Sponsors Law On Alcoholism**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Frank Church said Tuesday he is co-sponsoring legislation to increase the fight against alcoholism in the United States.

Church said alcoholism is the fourth largest health problem in the United States and added, "We must act now to stop the increase of alcoholism, cure its victims, and teach our young people to avoid this affliction."

The bill would authorize creation of a division of alcoholism and alcohol problems within the National Institute of Mental Health to launch a coordinated attack on the problem of alcoholism.

The measure would also authorize incentive grants for facilities both to prevent and to treat alcoholism.

## Rupert Lions To Sell Light Bulbs

RUPERT — Plans for the annual Rupert Lions Club light bulb sale were unveiled during the regular meeting of the group this week in Rupert.

The event will get under way at 7:30 p.m. Friday with a door-to-door canvass of the Rupert city area. A stand will also be set up along the square for the sale of light bulbs purchased over the phone.

Proceeds from the event will be put in the group's general fund. The group's president, Hjalma Elmo, Japanese trainee who is making his home with the Joe Studer family, in Rupert, stressed the differences in agriculture in America and Japan.

## Youth, 12; Ends Battle With Police

NORWALK, Calif. (UPI)—A 12-year-old boy, sporting a satchel full of a variety of goods, was arrested Tuesday, held off two stations of sheriff's deputies, armed with tear gas and shotguns, for 35 minutes.

After the youngster was finally talked into surrendering, he was taken to the station. He told deputies he had gone into the United Sporting Goods store shortly before it closed Monday night. He was locked in a back room and when he woke up early Tuesday loaded ammunition into guns to try to shoot his way out of the store by blasting holes in the door.

"I used a .22," he said. "Coboy guns must be stronger because mine didn't blow holes in the door."

What he did succeed in doing was setting off a wailing burglar alarm which brought officers to the scene.

During the 35-minute battle the boy fired 15 to 20 shots at deputies, but they held their fire.

The boy said, "I shot at the guys by the corner, the ones who were tapping me. I hit me, I had on silver helmet so they couldn't hit me."

## Cassia Ranks Well In Pay Schedules

BURLEY — Cassia County teachers salaries adopted for the 1938-39 year compare favorably with salary schedules throughout Magic Valley, says Supt. Dale L. Nelson.

Teachers with a bachelor's degree will receive \$5,881, Mr. Nelson said. Of that amount approximately \$1,000 is for state retirement. He explained that the district participants in the Retirement system for the teachers at an average salary of approximately 3.75 per cent, an amount that does not show on the schedule.

It was previously stated the district salary increment in the district is \$300.

"This is the minimum increment on the bottom of the schedule," said Supt. Nelson. "The majority of teachers are experienced and they are classified in the upper end of the salary schedule where percentage increments provide higher salary indexes."

Mr. Nelson said the average teacher increments this year will exceed substantially the minimum beginning salary.

Comparisons of salaries for beginning teachers on the higher end of the schedule are as follows: Twin Falls, \$5,850; Gooding, \$5,800; Filer, \$5,800; Wendell, \$5,800; Burley, \$5,800; Buhl, \$5,800; District, \$5,500; Shoshone, \$5,600; Glens Ferry, \$5,400; Hansen, \$5,700; and Murtaugh, \$5,700.

## Grazing Fees May Regain Lower Level

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Signs are encouraging that the Interior Department may change the grazing fee increases on public lands, Rep. Walter S. Baring, D-New York, said Tuesday.

Baring said he and Rep. Lawrence Burton of Utah have protested the grazing fee increases.

The man whose Interior Department job covers that topic, Harrison Loesch, has hinted at some relief.

"Loesch is assistant secretary of Interior for public land management," Baring said. "He recalled that in a recent Congressional hearing 'the western livestock industry might be real surprised at our decision.'"

Loesch said there is an optimistic feeling among members of his Public Lands Subcommittee that some form of an agreement report from the Interior Department may be filed soon.

## Rogerson Hotel Cited For Value In Travel Guide

The Rogerson Hotel, Twin Falls, was recently awarded a special citation for exceptional value by the editors of the Motor Travel Guide, the country's top selling national guidebook.

Out of 23,000 motels, restaurants, hotels and resorts listed in the guide only 296 won the special checkmark rating, indicating "unusually good value."

The check mark ratings were intended to aid vacationers traveling on limited budgets.

### New Clerics Vow Loyalty To Vatican

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—One by one each new cardinal pledged his faith and obedience "for the duration of his life." Pope Paul VI then charged them to advance the Roman Catholic faith fearlessly "up to the shedding of your blood."

With solemnity and ritual, 33 men, including four Americans, today were receiving the outward symbols of their new rank: Prince of the church.

Pope Paul was conducting the ceremony, an ancient ritual changed only slightly through the years. It was the high point in the four-day consistory that enlarged the College of Cardinals to a record size.

The Americans receiving their biretta, or square red hat, before the pontiff's gilded throne were Terence J. Cooke of New York, John J. Wright of Pittsburgh, John F. Dearden of Detroit and John J. Carberry of St. Louis.

The entire diplomatic corps accredited to the Vatican was invited to attend the pageant in the Hall of Benedictions.

Until this year the consistory occurred in the splendor of the Sistine Chapel, but the spate of cardinals named by Pope Paul a month ago was unprecedented in its size and could not be accommodated in the chapel.

Shortly before leading the ceremony, Pope Paul made known members of a new theological commission that will study the great doctrinal disputes within the church today. Thirty men, including two Americans, were named, but none was designated the board's president.

The Americans are the Rev. Barnabas Ahern, now a member of the Vatican Commission for the New Vulgate, and The Rev. Walter Burghardt, of Woodstock, Md., a member of the Secretariat for Christian Unity.

There was speculation that Cardinal Wright might lead the commission.

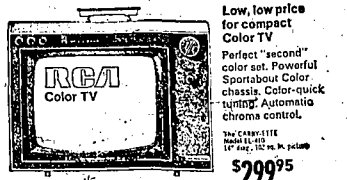
An inspection was underway to see if any cracks occurred.

Apollo 10 is scheduled to orbit the moon for 2 1/2 days in the final flight test before Apollo 11 sets out on a moon landing mission in July.

### Rickover Says Soviets Boost Naval Might

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice Adm. Hyman Rickover warned Tuesday that the Soviet Union was on the verge of catching and surpassing the United States in the strength of its nuclear submarine fleet.

Rickover, in a strongly worded letter to Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., said the Soviets "are surging forward with a naval and maritime program that is a technological marvel."

He estimated that "by the end of 1970 they will have a numerical lead in nuclear submarines" and "by the end of this year we face the prospect of losing the superiority in nuclear submarines we have held for many years."

The prospect of Soviet naval superiority "should worry every American," said Rickover, developer of the nuclear-powered submarine and now head of the Navy's nuclear propulsion branch.

"The Soviets have frequently announced their intent to be the pre-eminent world power," he said. "Why do we not believe them? Hitler in Mein Kampf plainly announced his intent to dominate the world. We did not believe him either—until it was nearly too late."

# Senators Ponder Germ War

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., called a one-day closed meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today to hear a prize-winning biologist and an irate congressman on germ warfare.

Rep. Richard D. McCarthy, D-N.Y., said he would urge the committee to investigate chemical and biological warfare developments in U.S. laboratories. McCarthy said such weapons are being transported and stockpiled in the United States at a dangerous rate. He said the Soviet Union also has made advances in the weapons.

The other witness was Matthew Meselson, Harvard University biologist and 1963 recipient of the National Academy of Science prize for molecular biology.

Meanwhile, Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., introduced a resolution calling for an outright ban on all further development of biological agents.

He said the United States contends that the work in this area is of a defensive nature. "It is ironic that we also seem to be working in the field of offensive delivery systems, the sole purpose of which would enable us to use the biological agents as weapons of war," Nelson told the Senate Tuesday.

McCarthy told President Nixon Tuesday the United States had quietly begun practicing a policy of germ warfare.

McCarthy said the change had taken place gradually over the years without the knowledge of the American people and lacking a conscious decision on the part of elected officials.

To clarify the situation, McCarthy suggested Nixon re-submit for Senate ratification the 1952 Geneva Protocol banning the use of gas and bacteriological warfare.

Although the United States never ratified the protocol, McCarthy recalled that the United States initiated it and said it supports the treaty fully in principle.

# Young Barry Gains Seat In Congress

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Barry Goldwater Jr., a physician and political carbon-copy of his famous father, won election to Congress Tuesday by defeating McCarthy in a runoff election in his first try for political office.

Goldwater, a 30-year-old bachelor stockbroker, built up a steady lead over Democrat John K. Van de Kamp in Southern California's sprawling 27th Congressional District.

With 175 of the district's 312 precincts reported, the son of the 1964 Republican presidential nominee had 59,192 votes to 28,252 for Van de Kamp, 33, a former U.S. Justice Department official.

Goldwater voted for the first time in California last fall and Van de Kamp, although a member of the founding family of a California-based bakery chain, could not vote for himself. His residence is in suburban Pasadena, outside the congressional district.

# Cable Car Fees Rise 10 Cents

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Beginning this summer tourists will pay an up-in-date price for a 19th Century ride on San Francisco's famed cable cars.

The board of supervisors Tuesday approved a hike to 25 cents in the fare, a 10 cent increase. A regular streetcar or bus ride goes up only 5 cents, to 20 cents.

# Nixon Gives Medal To Ellington

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon played happy birthday on the piano to Duke Ellington at a White House party Tuesday night and presented the Medal of Freedom to the jazz musician on his 70th birthday.

The White House hadn't seen such a swinging party in years as other musicians and distinguished guests paid tribute to the noted composer-pianist whose father once served as a White House butler.

Nixon, in presenting the medal to Edward Kennedy (Duke) Ellington, said, "In the royalty of American music, no man swings more or stands higher than the duke."

The medal presented by Nixon, a longtime Ellington fan, was intended to recognize exceptional contributions to the national interest, to world peace or to cultural endeavors.

An hour-long, all-Ellington musical program followed the presentation.

Samuelson said he would name the other representatives to the commission, the one for cities and counties, in the near future.

He said he has appointed John H. Brandt, Nampa, to the Endowment Investment Advisory Board. Brandt will represent education on the board.

A former school superintendent and school board chairman, Brandt has been a director of Provident Federal Savings and Loan since 1936.

# Young Rep. McCarthy Offers New Challenge To Capital

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A new McCarthy has achieved national political prominence, vaulted there from the White House by the damning words of Rep. Gerald R. Ford, R-Mich.

Rep. Richard D. McCarthy, D-N.Y., has a long way to go before he shakes up Washington in the flamboyant style of the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., or the coldly determined manner of Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn.

But in his own boyish way, the former public relations man from Buffalo has stirred the House Republican leader, aroused the Pentagon and inflamed supporters of the National Rifle Association (NRA). McCarthy was elected to Congress at 27 and is in his third term.

Ford Tuesday emerged from a weekly meeting of GOP leaders with President Nixon and scolded congressional critics of the military. He asked whether they wanted "to unilaterally disarm America" and suggested they might be acting in "concert."

When pressed, the only name Ford came up with was McCarthy. The GOP leader singled him out for his campaign against the Pentagon's chemical and germ warfare program.

McCarthy is not new to controversy. He has tangled with the NRA in urging strong federal gun control, high interests in battling for road broadening and the trucking lobby in successfully blocking a bill that would have allowed huge trailers on the nation's turnpikes.

But unlike either Joe or Gene McCarthy, "Max" McCarthy has not acquired notoriety through design.

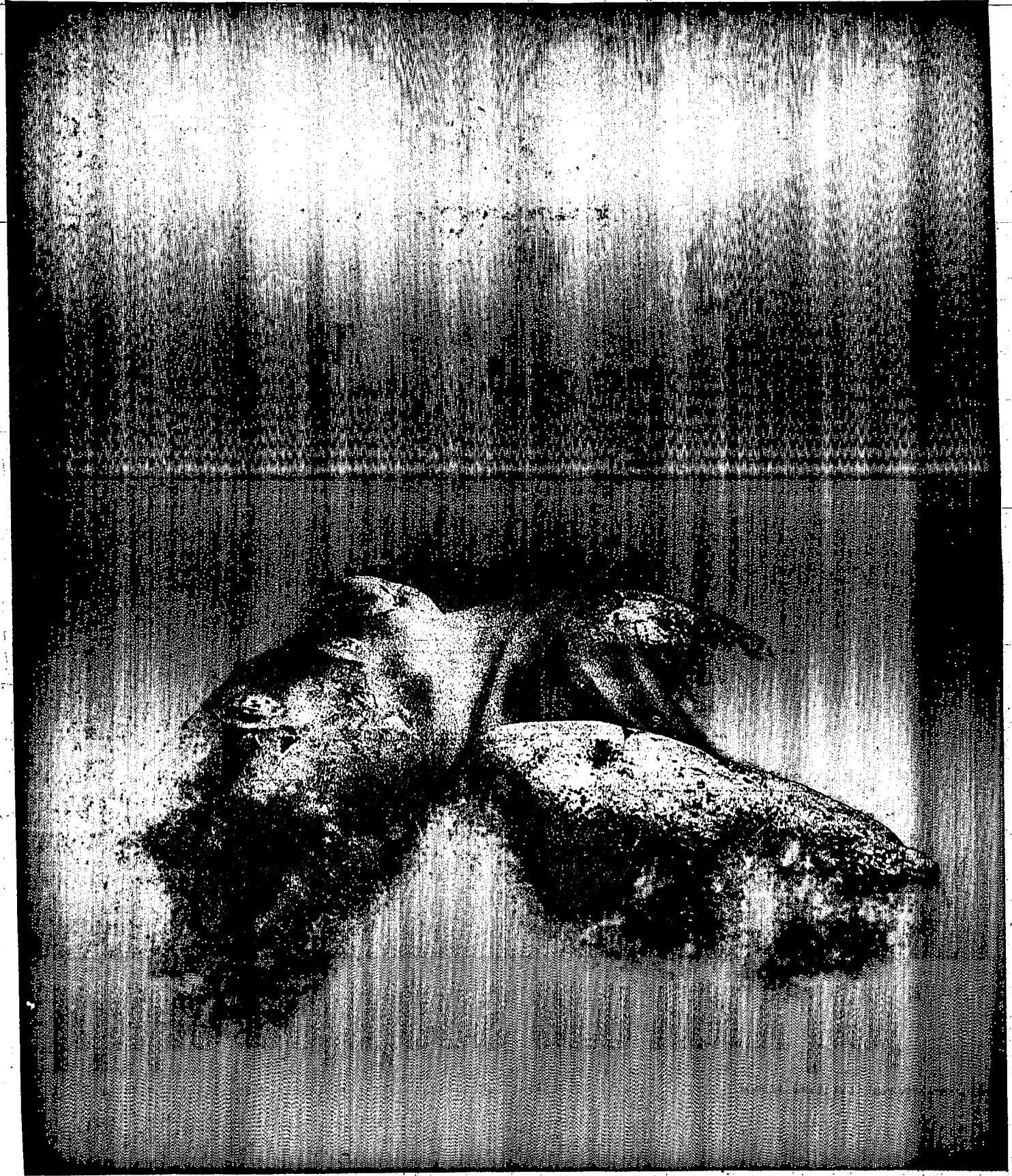

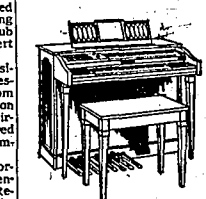

# Pro Grid Loops Meet To Discuss 1969 Alignment

NEW YORK (UPI)—The National and American Football Leagues, hoping to reach an agreement this week on their new realignment for the 1970 season, met separately Tuesday to discuss their proposals on how the joint leagues will conduct play next year.

The two leagues will meet jointly Wednesday to resume the discussions.

All three proposals before the owners involve a 4-4-5 divisional structure, with the NFL and AFL each having two divisions. The NFL's two divisions would be the AFC and AFC West, while the AFL's two divisions would be the AFC and AFC West.

Under each setup the two leagues would be called the National Conference and the American Conference.

The AFL, hoping to keep the identity it took 10 years to create, favors the shifting of three NFL teams to the AFL. But while this plan would enable each league to maintain its rivalry, the problem is finding three NFL teams to volunteer to move to the AFL.

The NFL, which did not meet until late in the evening, was non-committal but Commissioner Pete Rozelle came out in favor of Plan No. 2.

"I put a great deal of value on identity," Rozelle said. "There's also the added element of inter-league rivalry. Ten years has gone into this and if we can't maintain it, we've added something to the sport."

Rozelle added, however, that no matter what the owners decide to do, the identity will be inter-league play beginning in 1970.

Rozelle said the owners discussed thoroughly the scheduling patterns which might be employed under each system. They also went into detail on how the playoffs would be set up and agreed that the winners of each division plus the runnerup with the best record would qualify for the league playoffs.

## Nebraska Firm To Run Rupert Hospital

**RUPERT** — The Bethesda Geriatrics Foundation, a Nebraska-based firm, will assume operation of the Minidoka Memorial Hospital July 1, the date the lease with the Minidoka County Commissioners and the Idaho Falls LDS Hospital system is terminated.

The announcement was made during a public meeting Monday night in Rupert conducted by Deputy Prosecutor Larry Duff and called to discuss appointment of a hospital board. The hospital originally had been served by a joint hospital board with the Cassia Memorial Hospital.

A group of about 40 interested citizens, mostly hospital staff members, met with the commission concerning the appointment of the board and none voiced opposition to the plan.

Mr. Duff explained that even if the Bethesda Foundation continues to operate the hospital, the board will be retained. He said the main service of the board will be to keep an eye on the function of the facilities and see that they are kept up to date.

Nominations for the seven to nine member group should be left with County Clerk Gus Belke within the next few days. Mr. Duff said, and the commissioners will then review the suggestions. He said it is hoped a board will be appointed by early next week.

In addition to the regular board members, at least two ex-officio members will be appointed to meet with the group, although they will have no vote. Included will be a county commissioner, the hospital administrator and possibly a physician. Mr. Duff explained that no physicians are allowed to serve on the regular board, or persons holding any political office.

The Bethesda firm will operate the hospital on the condition that a 56-bed nursing home unit is built for the firm to also operate. If the home is built, the non-profit organization will lease the hospital and operate the nursing home on a managerial contract.

The \$500,000 nursing home will be located on county land just north of the present hospital site and adjacent to it. The county will deed the land to the firm with the provision that after a certain length of time, it will revert to the county.

Mr. Duff explained that the Bethesda Foundation is a non-profit making organization, but in order for the Rupert Development Corporation to obtain a loan for the nursing home construction from the Small Business Administration, the unit must be profit making.

Therefore, the firm will lease the non-profit hospital, and only manage the nursing home. The transaction will be done on separate contracts to keep legal the use of Hill-Burton funds used to originally finance the construction of the hospital.

The nursing home construction will be financed by means of selling from \$45,000 to \$50,000 in debenture bonds in the area, obtaining \$200,000 from a first mortgage, and the remaining \$250,000 from a second mortgage from the SBA.

"By financing the construction in this manner," Mr. Duff said, "the county taxpayers will save

about \$50,000 a year in taxes.

The maximum that can be levied for hospital operation is five mills, which in this county is about \$50,000 a year. Even though the Bethesda people may operate the hospital, the county will still need to levy some of that five mills," he noted.

Among the first improvements to be made in the hospital will be the installation of air conditioning to the rooms and a monitoring system throughout.

Mr. Duff noted that the improvements will be made whether or not the nursing home proposal materializes.

## Journalistic Wits Torment Official 'Sportsmanship'

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — Backstairs at the White House: This is the time of year when by tradition President Nixon and leaders of his administration, plus opposition bigwigs, must be dreadfully good sports. This curious sportsmanship involves going to so-called press banquets, each of which lasts from three to five hours, plus time devoted to before-and-after "receptions" which is a polite word for drinking parties.

There must be at least a half dozen of these affairs, hosted by one journalistic organization after another, to which the President, his Cabinet, the Supreme Court, the Joint Chiefs of Staff and congressional leaders are invited and expected to attend.

Nixon is starting out bravely in this opening era of his administration, but presidential enjoyment derived from dining out en masse is debatable and largely a matter of politeness and stoicism.

One thing is truly new about this administration. Nixon and his vice president, Spiro T. Agnew, show up at the same affairs together, even speak on the same program which has the effect of putting the vice president in the position of a tightrope walker. He does not dare overdo; he can be funny but not too funny, but if he knocks the ball out of the ceremonial party, the number one man cannot help but be in an awkward position.

Part of the sportsmanship involves the President and other government figures sitting at a head table to respond with polite chuckles as comedians, professors and amateur liners in their direction.

Comedically, it is fair game to be satirical or theoretically funny about a government figure present. When shots are boomed at absent notables, however, the impact softens and can turn into questionable taste. The other night, both Nixon and Agnew were present and spoke at the annual banquet of the White House Photographers Association at the Sheraton Park Hotel. The show featured two stars, Ray Bolger who, in addition to marvelous dancing and singing, is an ardent Nixon friend and supporter; plus Eddie Adams, singer, comedian and strong asset of the cigar industry.

Miss Adams is one of the better satirists around, in her impression of famous women and her comments about leading public figures. One of her chief targets the other night was Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis who, as far as comedians and satirists are concerned, lost some of her hero-madonna image when she married the Greek zillionaire.

Political considerations aside, Nixon cannot be in the position of laughing at satirical remarks about the widow of the assassinated president. Therefore, he sat motionless and laughless while Miss Adams poured it on Jackie and her present husband.

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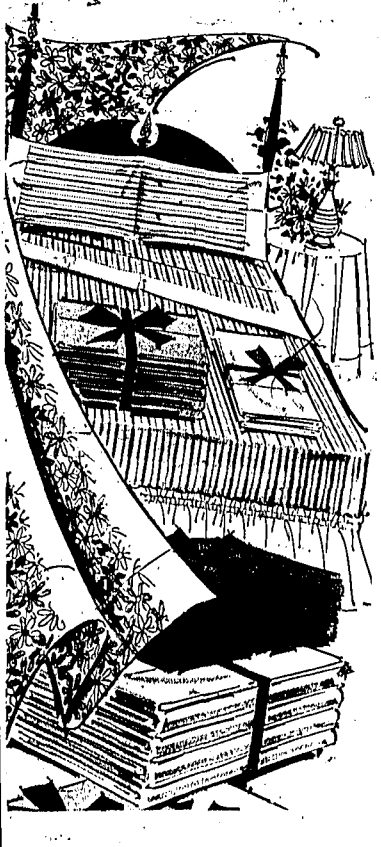

Dale Harding, Shoshone, district highway official, said the patchwork will be followed by a plant mix overlay that will seal the road surface against weather.

During the past two years the "open graded" plant mix overlay that was used previously has completely broken up, Mr. Harding said. This was a new

type of overlay being used for the first time in this area, but is no longer used. It is not suitable to the Idaho climate, Mr. Harding said.

Work on U. S. 30 between Twin Falls and Filer was scheduled last summer, but the contractor was not able to get to the project.

Within about a week, depending on the weather, state crews will complete the asphalt patching and a new contractor, Carl Utah, will begin the plant mix overlay.

Within about two weeks the new surface should be complete from the west entrance of Twin Falls to the Filer area. Work is later planned from there to Cedar Crossing, Mr. Harding said.

It will not be necessary to close the road to traffic and at least two-lanes will remain open throughout the resurfacing, the official said. It is customary for state crews and equipment to do the patching work, he added.

In the case of Highway 30 the upper surface of the highway is so badly broken up that in most of the area a complete covering is being spread over the four travel lanes.

Several condemnation cases are expected to come to court yet this spring or summer for right of way that will take U.S. Highway 30 straight west from Filer, eliminating the Cedar Crossing.

Mr. Harding said work could get under way on construction yet this year, depending on court proceedings.

# Veteran Threatened For Burglar's Death

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Clinton Funk, who shot to death a burglar in his warehouse today, shrugged off 11 telephone threats on his life and said he regretted that the narcotics addiction led the victim to his death.

The 38-year-old Korean War veteran said both the man he shot and the suspect he captured Sunday night were dope addicts.

"Frankly, I would like to have the person that put them on dope," he said. "Give me the man that put them on dope. I would get pleasure out of strangling him to death. I got no pleasure out of what happened Sunday night."

Funk and an employee, David Wegner, 23, had set up a vigil at his hauling service warehouse during the weekend because of a series of "at least 34 burglaries recently, Sunday night, they caught James Boyd, 28, opening a sliding door and entering."

Funk rushed up to the burglar and pointed a .45 caliber revolver. The burglar slammed the door, knocking the owner down. Funk fired low through the door. A bullet struck Boyd above the knee, severing an artery. He died of loss of blood.

Funk then ran outside and captured Robert Vanperny, 39, in an automobile. A third man escaped.

Funk said Monday he received "11 telephone calls threatening my life and my family."

"The people that threaten my life... these people that would like to take my life... why don't they join me and help catch the dope peddlers?" he asked in an interview.

"This would never happen if it wasn't for dope," he said. "If somebody hadn't pushed the dope, this would not have happened."

"If they're going to get me, I could care less," Funk also blamed the courts for the tragedy.

"The man I killed had 35 arrests and only served 18 months in jail," he said. "The police have done their job, —

## House Committee Endorses Change In Election Law

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Judiciary Committee today approved a proposed constitutional amendment to provide for election of America's presidents by direct popular vote.

By a vote of 28 to 6, the committee adopted a proposal to do away with the Electoral College and establish nationwide popular election of a president, with a runoff election if no candidate got 40 per cent of the vote in the general election.

The Judiciary Committee's veteran chairman, Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N. Y., said, "this is a real letter day." He added that "the first bold step has been taken" toward election reform.

Celler and Rep. William M. McCulloch, Ohio, ranking committee Republican, said they were confident the direct election plan would win necessary approval of 33 states—the two thirds required for ratification of constitutional amendments.

The plan drew bipartisan support, with 12 of 15 committee Republicans joining 16 of 29 Democrats in favor of it. Three Republicans and three Democrats voted against it. One Democrat was absent.

### PLAY DESTROYS EXPERT BIDDING

Another modern bidding gadget is the fragment bid. Almost every expert uses some form of it today. Some use it rather simply, others complicate it so far that they confuse themselves.

North's jump to four clubs was an example of the simplest form of fragmentation. His bid said, "Partner, hearts are our suit and I could have just bid four hearts but I want you to know that part of my strength is a club singleton."

Specifically this jump in the suit with a simple bid in that suit would not have been passed shows exactly this. Game-going support for partner and a singleton in that third suit.

South used Blackwood to check aces and kings and bid seven even though he knew that one king was missing. The odds were that the missing king would be in clubs.

The bidding was excellent indeed. We regret to report that expert bidder South played the hand like an apprentice. All he had to do to make the contract would have been to trump a club at trick two, come back to his hand with a trump, trump his last club, draw trumps and claim his contract. But South was in too much of a hurry.

Instead of using two of dummy's trumps that way South drew three rounds of trumps before counting to 13. Then he went after the spades but since East had hung on to all five of his, South could not set up dummy's last spade for a discard. He did get rid of one club on the king of spades and was still able to ruff the last one. When he finally went after diamonds, it turned out West had been unkind enough to hang on to all four of his, and the fine bidding merely led to a set.

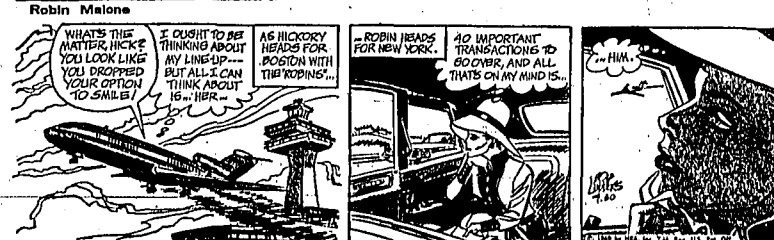
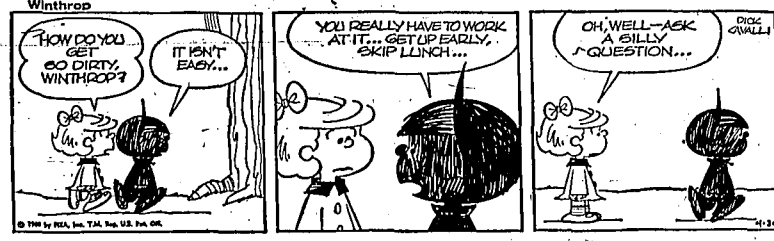
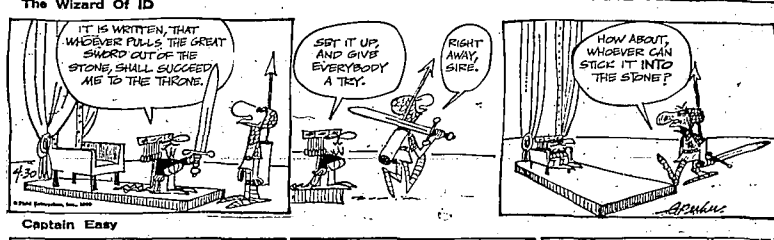

## Innocent College Of Cardinals Speculates On New Theological Commission

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—The old and the new in the Roman Catholic Sacred College of Cardinals conferred and speculated Tuesday on the makeup of a new theological commission in the church.

Pope Paul VI announced the creation of the commission as 33 new cardinals were installed. The pontiff named none

of the commission members nor revealed the precise role they would take.

He only said the members would be "outstanding experts in theological doctrine" and added, perhaps significantly, they would be "faithful to the true doctrine of the teaching church."

That comment led church observers to conclude that the commission may not become an outlet for liberals who disagree with the conservative-dominated Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith.

Because of the ferment in the church now—over priestly celibacy, birth control for the faithful and other social questions—some liberals hoped that Pope Paul would allow the new commission to counterbalance the powerful congregation.

## Senate Committee Endorses Resolution On Job Corps

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Senate subcommittee approved on a party line vote a sense-of-the-Senate resolution asking the administration to delay a scheduled closure of 59 Job Corps camps.

The resolution by Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., asked that the closure be delayed until Congress acts on a bill extending the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The vote was 74 to send the resolution to the Labor and Public Welfare Committee, which will consider it Wednesday.

Sen. Jacob Javits of New York was the only Republican present at the closed-door meeting, but he cast his vote and the dissenting proxies of Sens. George Murphy of California, Winston L. Prouty of Vermont and Peter H. Domi-
