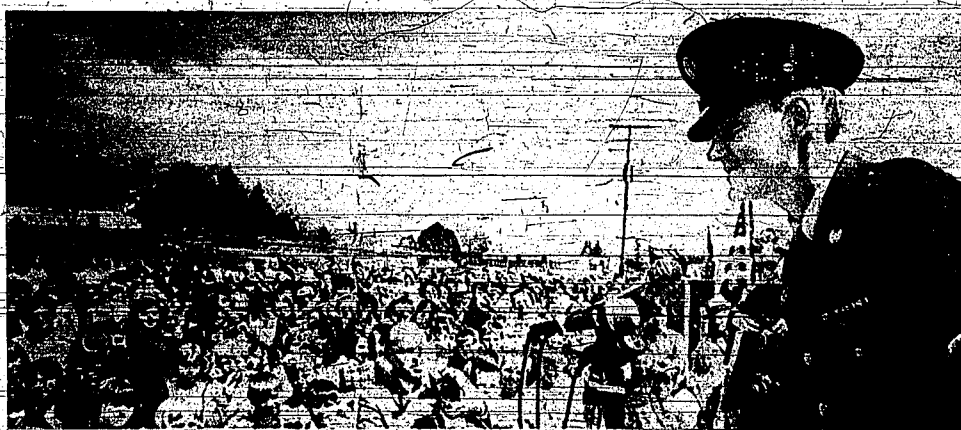

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Brig. Gen. S. L. Marshall said Wednesday a 40 per cent of American combat losses in Vietnam are the result of "our own mistakes."

He blamed these casualties on foolishness, impatience and heresies by U.S. troops, and singled out lieutenant colonels (and) platoon sergeants as the weakest cog in the American war machine in Vietnam.

Marshall, a well-known military historian and combat journalist, made his comments in an interview with UPI in connection with the publication of his new book, "Ambush."

U. S. Endorses

'Hijacking' Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The State Department has today urged Senate approval of a six-year-old international agreement dealing with crimes aboard airplanes and seas. It was trying to strengthen it to stop hijacking.

The agreement, known as the Tokyo Convention, 1970, down broad rules for hijacking which nation is responsible for prosecuting passengers who commit crimes on international flights. It would be effective in the United States and two other nations ratify it.

Cuba is not a signatory and has shown no interest in the agreement.

The Tokyo Convention was signed in 1963 but the United States has not moved to join it until now.

Pressure Test

To Determine Fuel Loss Harm

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The Space Agency said Wednesday night it will put the Apollo 10 booster rocket through a pressure proof test next week to make certain it was not damaged by an inadvertent fuel loss Sunday.

Two days of detailed inspection of the outside of the booster fuel tank at the final stage of the moon rocket showed no damage as a result of the sudden fuel loss and an inside examination was underway Wednesday night.

A spokesman said it was decided to fully fuel the 300,000-gallon tank next week and put it under above-normal pressure as a "final proof test."

Increase In Sierra Life Income Noted

Stockholders of Sierra Life Insurance Co. of Twin Falls were told the firm's income increased to \$3,025,211 in 1968. It was reported Thursday.

The annual meeting was held at the Holiday Inn.

Fred M. Frazier, president of the company since it was started in 1953, presented the annual report.

He said general expenses were reduced 16 per cent of total income in this period with living benefits paid by the company amounting to \$1,088,090, and death benefits totaling \$2,528,000.

In the Monday meeting, Mr. Frazier told the stockholders the company has more than 599 million worth of life insurance in force, \$650 million in 1968, and the operating profit was \$34,354.

Kill 3 Persons

Three persons died in two separate accidents in northern Idaho Wednesday night, according to the Idaho State Police.

Killed in a car-pedestrian accident were Richard Howard, 25, Coeur d'Alene, and Dolphine M. Palmer, 35, Hayden Lake.

The ISP said Robert M. Johnson, 44, Spokane, Wash., was driving south on Highway 95 when he spotted a parked car on the right shoulder of the road. As he was looking to see if anyone needed help, he struck the couple.

In a second accident, Robert F. Sexton, 40, Gooding, Idaho, died when his pickup collided with a semi-truck driven by Judge Ross, 37, Spokane, three miles south of Gooding.

Investigating officers said the two trucks smashed into each other almost head on, with the pickup carrying Sexton skidding several feet away from the semi and bursting into flames.

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Nixon Orders Delay In Welfare Change

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Nixon administration has postponed a Johnson administration ordered program that would permit welfare applicants to start drawing benefits without an investigation of their eligibility.

The program to abandon prior checks of welfare applicants, substituting an affidavit by the applicant was ordered by the Johnson administration. It was scheduled to go into effect on an experimental basis July 1. If then would go into permanent effect for those applying for old age assistance on Oct. 1, for the blind and disabled and Medicaid clients on Jan. 1, 1970, and for those receiving aid because of minor children in the year, the system would take effect on April 1, 1970.

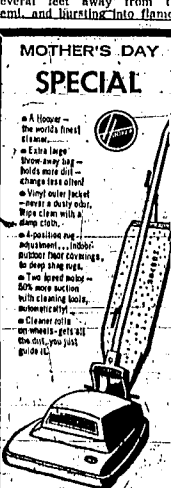

Nixon Fails To Solve Problems

LONDON (UPI)—Robert H. Humphrey said today the Nixon administration lacks a sound program to solve the massive unemployment problems and has failed to provide a program of action.

The Democratic loser in the 1968 presidential election, Nixon, has 100 days in office in a news conference.

He criticized Nixon's decision to go ahead with the \$1.5-billion missile system.

"The Nixon administration has not presented a program of action," he said, "and the administration senses the urgency of the urban crisis or that it is dealing effectively with innovation and imagination of problems which are the real relations," Humphrey said.

The former vice president "attracted" a group of students on campuses and advised U.S. university authorities to dismiss, suspend or "kick out" offending students.

Communist Chief Backed Invasion

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gus Hall, general secretary of the U.S. Communist party, said Wednesday American Communist administration backed Russian intervention in Czechoslovakia because there was a danger of a "counter-revolutionary coup."

Hall spoke at a U.S. Communist party convention in three cities. The "convention" was closed to newsmen.

Hall said, "The Warsaw Pact powers were right in their action in Czechoslovakia. It was a danger to socialism and a danger of a counter-revolutionary coup."

Hall said there were 12,000 to 13,000 members in the American Communist party, adding "we are very dissatisfied with the rate of growth."

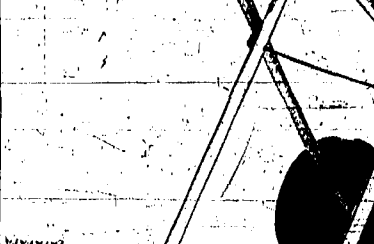

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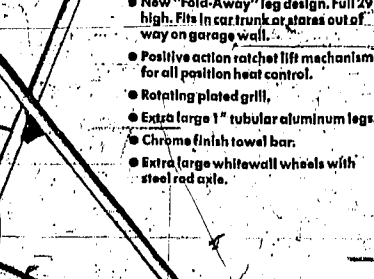

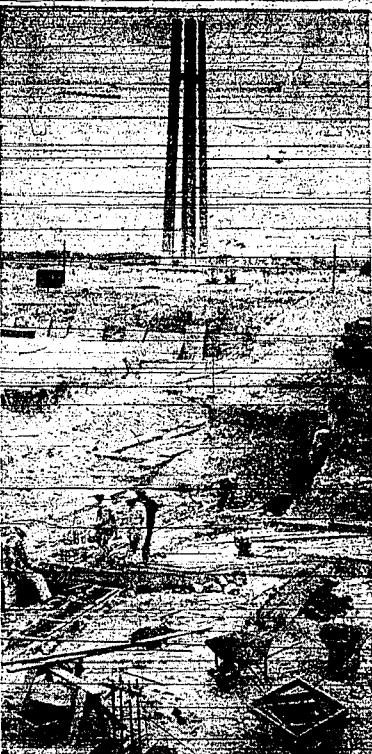
Dr. Jones is conducting the survey under an NPS research contract.

The areas are the levees of the St. Joe River in Heyburn State Park northwest of St. Maries; dunes area of the Bruneau Sand Dunes; crater-rings northwest of Mountain Home; Malin Gulch petrified forest south of Challis; great rift zone crystal ice caves extending from Craters of the Moon National Monument southwest of Arco to the vicinity of American Falls; Menan Butte southwest of Robbers' and dry canyons of the Snake River near Twin Falls.

Physicians Dispute Belief That Smoking Is Harmful

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two physicians have taken issue with the conclusion that cigarette smoking is harmful, prompting one congressman to suggest "an investigation of the investigators."

"Who are we going to believe?" Pickle asked. "I wonder if we shouldn't have an investigation of the investigators to find some facts of our own."

The exchange came in testimony before the House Commerce Committee which is nearing the end of hearings on whether to tighten restrictions on cigarette advertising.

Dr. Thomas H. Brim, head of the University of Southern California department of medicine, joined Dr. Sheldon C. Sommers, professor of pathology at Columbia University, in rebutting previous testimony linking smoking to lung cancer and other diseases.

Sommers is on the scientific advisory board of the Council for Tobacco Research, an organization the tobacco industry sponsors for research on smoking and health.

"Scientifically, cigarette smoking has not been proved to be a health hazard at all," Sommers testified.

He said statistics associating smoking and lung cancer "oversimplified" the matter and failed to take into account other environmental factors such as air pollution.

Brim said doctors who concluded the rising incidence of lung cancer is an indication of smoking failed to note that the rate of increase is lessening.

Rep. J. J. Pickle, D-Tex., said these statements contradicted the majority of testimony the committee had received from the medical profession.

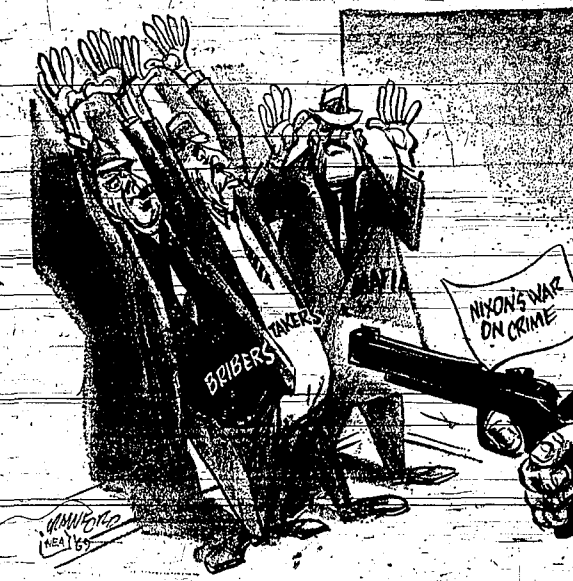

WASHINGTON (NEA) — A close study of price gains in the past decade indicates President Nixon's major anti-inflation tax proposal to Congress will be inflationary over the long run, whatever its short-term benefits.

Idaho Sues Auditor, Four Companies In \$484,326 Damage Action

BY RICHARD CHARNOCK BOISE (UPI)—The State of Idaho brought civil action Wednesday against a highway department road auditor to collect \$484,326.83 it claims he took in a "large, dishonest, systematic fraud."

Filed in the name of the state and its highway department, the complaint names John J. Turner, Boise, his wife, Betty, their daughter, Pat, two businesses and two insurance companies as defendants.

It seeks recovery of the amount the state alleges Turner

stole plus interest. It also asks the insurance companies to pay off on \$165,000 in bonds.

Turner was arrested last Friday on 19 counts after a Bureau of Public Accounts auditor discovered the alleged defalcations. He is being held in the Ada County Jail in lieu of \$95,000 bond, although a hearing of Public Accounts auditor discovered the alleged defalcations. He is being held in the Ada County Jail in lieu of \$95,000 bond although a hearing scheduled for Fourth District Court Thursday on a petition to

reduce his bond. In this civil action, the state is attempting to have a constructive trust be declared against all the real and personal property of each of the defendants. This would enable the state to attach the property.

Also named as defendants in the suit are Lake Bowl, Inc., operator of a McCall bowling alley, and Italian Gardens, Inc., a Boise restaurant. The state alleges Turner, his wife and daughter own the stock in the two businesses.

Insurance companies named

in the suit are Transamerica Insurance Company which had a blanket bond of \$100,000 covering Turner since April 1, 1963, and a \$2,500 on him from Oct. 1, 1967, until April 1, 1968, and American Insurance Company which bonded him for \$2,500 from Oct. 1, 1961, until Oct. 1, 1967.

It was only last year that State Insurance Commissioner John R. Blaine persuaded state officials to get a large blanket bond on their employees. Until April 1, 1969, Turner was not bonded for more than \$2,500.

Atty. Gen. Robert M. Robson, Faber-Twy, chief legal counsel, for the highway department, and three other state attorneys signed the complaint which was filed in Fourth District Court.

In it, they accused Turner of carrying on "a single, continuous, systematic course of fraud and false pretenses by falsifying accounts, vouchers and other documents, and during same period, falsified, stolen and obtained by false pretenses from plaintiff the sum of \$484,326.83, which monies have been transferred by said defendant

into various bank accounts, savings accounts and various diverse real and personal property unknown to plaintiff at this time."

The complaint lists by date, number and type of state warrants drawn on highway funds for payment to companies the state alleges in the suit, were issued and not existent. The complaint alleges Turner and the companies were one and the same.

The complaint contends Turner did business under the fictitious name of B. & O. Invest-

ment Company.

Of the 40 warrants mentioned in the complaint, 13 were in the amount of \$16,786.99 and \$10,000 payable to the same company.

The first was for \$3,000.50, the complaint said, and was issued July 16, 1967. The last was issued April 22, 1968.

The smallest, \$2,927.06 was issued Sept. 6, 1967, the civil complaint said, and the largest, \$17,493.83 was issued March 25, 1968.

Besides the principal sum, the state contends Turner took the complaint also asks for interest on the amount.

Red Hats Given Cardinals

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI presented the red hat of cardinalship to 33 new princes of the Catholic church Wednesday and accepted the resignation of another, Vatican Secretary of State Amleto Cardinal Cicognani.

The pontiff announced both the resignations of Cicognani, 82, and the appointment of Jean Cardinal Villot, 63, of France as his successor during installation ceremonies for the largest class of new cardinals in the church's history. Four of them were Americans.

Age and the fact he has falling eyesight apparently were factors in Cicognani's resignation.

The office of secretary of state is the Vatican's second most powerful, a combination of premier and foreign minister.

Villot is the first non-Italian secretary of state since Rafael Cardinal Merry del Val, 74, Spain held the post from 1903 to 1914.

The central point of Wednesday night's ceremony, however, was the presentation of the red square mitre with three ridges on top, to the 33 new cardinals from 20 countries.

Their installation—along with the appointment of two cardinals named in secret—and whose identities may never be known—raised the College of Cardinals membership to its highest in 2,000 years of church history.

The four new American cardinals receiving the red hats were Archbishop Terence J. Cooke of New York, John J. Dearden of Detroit, John J. Carberry of St. Louis, and William J. Levada of Pittsburgh. They raise the number of cardinals in the United States to 10.

Labor Unions Reduce Demands

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Major unions settled for slightly smaller increases in wages and benefits during the first quarter of 1969, the Labor Department reported.

The department said the first quarter settlements covering more than 750,000 workers showed a median wage and benefit package increase of 3.9 per cent a year, compared with a 6 per cent median for all of 1968.

Wage increases, not including fringe benefits, showed an average increase of 4.5 per cent, a slight rise from the 6.2 per cent annual rate of increase during 1968.

Major Post Office Changes Appear Doomed For Session

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Post Office Department, whatever its faults, is here to stay; at least for the next few years.

Sponsors of legislation to abolish it and turn the mails over to a government corporation conceded this today, but contended the idea isn't dead.

"It will take an incubation of two or three years," said Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., a principal House sponsor of the postal corporation plan evolved last year by a presidential commission.

"Nobody thinks it can be enacted, this year—or even next year."

But Udall, in an unusual role as a witness before the Post Office Committee of which he is a key member, said he is satisfied that in the end Congress will conclude there is no other solution to the Post Office's problems, which include obsolete plants, old-fashioned

equipment, and critics say—a bureaucratic straitjacket on management.

Former Postmasters General Lawrence C. O'Brien and Marvin Watson endorsed the corporation plan, which grew out of an O'Brien proposal to abolish the job. President Nixon's postmaster general, Winton M. Blount, still is studying what he feels ought to be done.

Other key committee members, including Chairman Theodore J. Dulski, D-N.Y., demonstrated what Udall meant when he said that in this Congress, at least, the postal reform plan will almost surely be routed to the Dead Letter Office.

The theory of the corporate operation is that under management of a board of directors the postal service would be modernized, made more efficient and operated within available income from mail rates, at whatever level was necessary.

Either way, members agreed, postal rates, frequently raised in the past, can be expected to be further increased. And as for labor problems, Udall contended, a postal strike is not "out of the question" even under the present arrangement although government employees are not supposed to strike.

Udall commented, "I think we may be flying in a fool's paradise."

Californians Escape 'Doomsday' As April With Its Threats Fades Into May

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Hoary, hoary, it's the first of May. California was shaken, but escaped Doomsday.

If the 20 million residents of the Golden State walked with an

extra bounce in their step Thursday, perhaps it is because the state is still a going concern.

It would be cracked off from the rest of the country by an earthquake in April and sink into the sea.

A sharp quake swayed tall buildings from Los Angeles to San Diego Monday but the only thing to sink was the contents of 30 bottles shaken off liquor store shelves at Borrego Springs, the Southern California desert town where the tremor was centered.

The state's earthquake jitters began when seismologists, geophysicists and 36 appointed prophets of gloom and doom predicted a tremor worse than the 1967 disaster that leveled San Francisco.

By the end of the month, Californians were not only talking about earthquakes, but singing about them, thanks to a catchy calypso ditty that caught on with disc jockeys.

One of the most popular special party giveaways the one about Howard Hughes buying up the desert state of Nevada so he would own the largest ocean beach in the world.

And some 5,000 San Franciscans turned out at the early hour of 5:13 a.m. to attend a party in front of City Hall on the 16th disaster that leveled San Francisco.

Despite the failure of a "big one" to crack California, geologists are not too early to celebrate.

Geologists are horrified to see the rows of houses which land developers have built right over the San Andreas Fault—a huge fracture that is at least 500 miles long and extends some 20 miles into the earth.

Says Louis C. Parker, chief of the National Center for Earthquake Research in Menlo Park:

"No one yet knows how to predict exactly when the next earthquake will occur along the San Andreas Fault, but there is every reason to believe that the fault will continue to be as active as it has been for millions of years in the past.

"Another earthquake as strong as that of 1906 could happen at any time."

With that kind of prediction, who needs atom-bombs?

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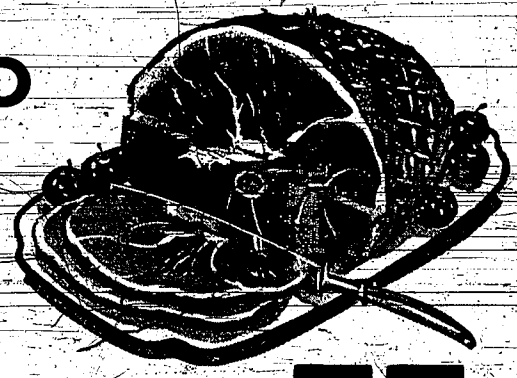

County Finds Ordinance Doesn't Exist

Defense attorney Robert Suller of Reno said a federal court ruled last year that the McDermitt Paiutes and Shoshones still have good title to the lands in Humboldt County. He said the title included the right of Indians to hunt for food for their families.

Dist. Judge Thomas O'Donnell did not rule on that issue, but dismissed the case on grounds there was no county ordinance covering the alleged offense.

There is a state statute, but the charges were brought under an assumed county ordinance instead.

The judge's action brought murmurs of satisfaction from the Indians who jammed the courtroom. They include Smart's wife, who was dressed in traditional buckskin and beads and wore a feather head band.

E. Allan Hunter Is Named Director Of First Security

The president and general manager of Utah Power and Light Co. was elected director of the First Security Corp. Monday during a stockholders meeting in Salt Lake City.

E. Allan Hunter, a native of Grantsville, Utah, joined Utah Power and Light Co. in 1937. In 1968, he was elected a director and assistant manager and in January, 1969, he was named to his present position.

All other directors of the First Security Corp. were re-elected during the meeting.

Stockholders were officially advised of the regional banking system's status as a billion dollar organization, which was elected, president and general manager, gave a detailed analysis of 1968 operations during his annual report to shareholders.

He said total resources of the banks in the First Security system reached \$1,018,204,250 at year end, an increase of \$100 million over the 1967 year-end report.

Mr. Eccles said earnings for 1968 were achieved after record expenses totaling \$42,722,658, of which the largest percentage, \$20,543,305, was paid in interest on savings and other time deposits.

Shareholders were advised of a regular dividend declaration of 75 cents per share, payable June 10, to stockholders of record May 26, 1969.

Therefore he cashed his ace of diamonds and led a second diamond toward dummy. The Unlucky Expert went up with his king and led a third trump. South was in his own hand. He cashed his "other" high club

and the ace and king of spades. He cashed dummy's ace of hearts and queen of clubs with a hand of hearts and queen of spades, dummy the king and jack of hearts and South the 10 of spades and nine of hearts. South knew all of this except he didn't know which opponent held the heart-queen. He had noted the drop of the heart 10 from East, but East was smart enough to have chucked the 10 and hung on to a low one, so South could not be sure. What he could be sure of was that an unsuccessful heart finesse at this point would put him down. Anyway, South wasn't a finesseer by nature so he went up with dummy's king of hearts and the Unlucky Expert had his usual unlucky result.
