Nixon To Ask Extension Of Food Stamps

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Nixon administration plans to ask Congress for a major expansion of the federal food stamp program. It was announced today.

House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford said following a GOP strategy session at the White House that the administration's proposals would be submitted Wednesday to the Senate Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs.

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen and other Republican lawmakers met with Nixon for more than an hour. Ford said Agriculture Secretary Lyndon Johnson had proposed nearly doubling the current annual outlay for the stamps, which are sold to needy at a sharp discount and are spent at face value in grocery stores.

Food stamp appropriations total about \$289 million this fiscal year, but at the present rate of spending, the outlay for stamps will be at the rate of \$340 million annually by July 1, Ford said.

For the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, Hardin will ask that the appropriation be boosted to \$65 million annually.

## Guards Of Pope Add 24 Recruits

### VATICAN CITY (UPI)

Twenty-four recruits were sworn-in Tuesday for two-year stints in the world's smallest, most old-fashioned and most photographed, army—the Pope's 75-man-strong Swiss Guards.

## Tobacco Dilemma Continues

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress is getting closer to the deadline for decisions on health and cigarette smoking—but is understanding the problem less.

A summation of the situation has come out of a recent hearing before the House Commerce Committee is that Congress has about the same information it had five years ago.

In 1964 the surgeon general issued his much-debated report on statistics showing correlation between smoking and cancer deaths. Tobacco industry experts challenged the findings.

The same law provided for the statement that now appears on every cigarette pack: Cigarette Smoking May Be Hazardous to Your Health.

If Congress fails to extend its own controls over tobacco advertising, the Federal Trade Commission and the Federal Communications Commission would be free to impose such restrictions on their own.

It is up to Congress to decide whether to restrict or protect cigarette advertising. Congress also must consider economic consequences.

## Authorities Deny Rumors Of New Sea Queen Jury To Probe Fortas Firm

"We never know what they're investigating," he said. "We don't ask. They don't tell us. We prefer it that way."

The New York Times reported in a Washington dispatch

that Justice Department executives were indicted at Toledo in 1967 on charges of the Franklin Steel Co. was convicted. Arnold and Porter represented the Donovan Steel and Wire Co.







# British Teachers Face Major Crisis As "Backlash" Threatens Education

By MARIS ROSS  
LONDON (UPI)—British teachers face probably their greatest crisis of this century because society has taken a massive lurch toward reaction, resulting in a general attack on "liberal" ideas in education.

Edward Short, the education minister, has said teachers face one of the blackest days for education in the past century. They dispute the assumptions on which modern educational methods are based. The backlash stems from two main roots: the student agitation and the Labor government's policy of running selective schools for brighter children with comprehensive schools catering to everyone.

The bible of the backlash is a pamphlet called "Fight for Education," the "Black Paper," containing the motley thoughts of a group of individuals in the East Anglia protests that worshipping of standards. Anglia must be something "badly wrong."

In my view the publication of the Black Paper is becoming fashionable.

Their target is liberalism. Rather than the word "backlash" they dispute the assumption that discipline and hard work are treated with contempt. We should be extremely foolish if we ignored it—or like the free grammar schools underestimated the impact it may make because it is so with their traditionally more conservative supporters.

It is the free grammar schools that are so outrageously behind the times. The very innocence of some of its contributors alone will ensure equality to make way for the comprehensives which, they claim, hold the brighter students down to the level of the rest.

Among the contributors, novelist Kingsley Amis said most contributes mean a "terrible end product," says factor in what he thinks is irreducible racial and ethnic differences between them.

## Fortas Faces New Attack On Integrity

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Supreme Court Justice Abe Fortas, facing new congressional criticism Tuesday over his receipt of outside fees less than one year after the same thing helped to stop him from becoming chief justice.

Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., who led last year's successful fight-against-Fortas' nomination for chief justice, said the latest information about the off-the-bench activities prompted most serious questions which need to be resolved."

There were scattered calls for Fortas to resign, and Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Texas, even called for his impeachment. The reactions came after Fortas admitted receiving but not returning to him or his family a foundation donation of Louis E. Wolson, now serving a one-year sentence for stock manipulation.

As an associate justice, Fortas is now paid \$60,000 a year. There is, however, no regulation prohibiting him or the other members of the court from engaging in activities that would bring in an additional income. The canons of judicial ethics prescribed by the American Bar Association apply to all judges but do not have the force of law.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the Senate Judiciary Committee should "make itself available to the Justice desires a forum to answer the questions raised in this week's issue of Life magazine.







If there is a bridge-player's way of working, trumps behaving like angels and when there is a right play, the right play and a wrong play, the right play will succeed and the wrong play will fail.
