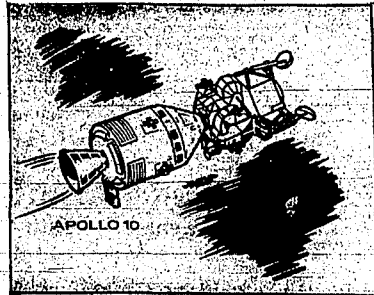

Astronauts Plan More TV Transmissions Today

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Apollo 10's astronauts, blazing the trail for America's manned landing on the moon, awoke to breakfast on fruit cocktail and cereals today 106,000 miles in space.

They said they had a good night's sleep despite some noisy thumps and "dull thuds" caused by a thruster rocket. It was irritating but, like the homeowner bothered by a leaking faucet, they managed to ignore it and sleep.

"We had a real great night's sleep," Commander Thomas P. Stafford reported. "All three of us feel tremendous this morning."

Stafford, John W. Young and Eugene A. Cernan were "coast-

ing" along toward the moon in their "Charlie Brown" spacecraft, with the lunar lander they nicknamed "the pig" hooked nose-to-nose on the front.

The astronauts planned to transmit more of the spectacular color television late today. Sunday's transmissions were seen by more than 100 million persons around the world.

Stafford, Cernan and Young were giving the final test to the equipment and techniques which will be used in the first U.S. manned lunar landing slated for July. They will go through every phase of the lunar landing mission except the actual touchdown.

As the spacecraft pushed on toward the moon against the pull of earth gravity, its speed steadily fell from the peak of

more than 24,000 miles per hour it attained Sunday when it blasted out of earth orbit.

The velocity dropped below 4,000 mph as the spacecraft passed over the 100,000-mile mark. The veteran spacemen will reach halfway mark on their 237,000-mile trip to the moon at about 7 p.m. EDT tonight.

During their sleep period early today, the astronauts were bothered by a thruster rocket firing to keep the spacecraft in the proper position in space. Each time it caused a dull-thud-and-the-spacecraft shook slightly.

"Every time the engine fires, it wakes you up," Cernan complained. Stafford said he was "amazed" by how flexible the spacecraft and its linked-up lunar lander were in space.

"The whole thing shakes and goes" through about three pulses," he said.

As usual, the astronauts complained about the strongly chlorinated drinking water. Asked if they could taste the chlorine Sunday, Young retorted: "You bet your sweet bippy we could."

"This morning, everyone took a drink and it was fine and then I took a drink and it was absolutely horrible," Stafford radioed today. "I thought I'd get it on the record."

Ground controllers promised to send instructions on making the water more palatable. Stafford, who "pushed and did a little kicking" to get a color TV camera aboard his craft, presented 72 minutes of the first live color telecasts ever sent back from space

Sunday afternoon.

It was more than four times the amount of television officially scheduled—a single show lasting 15 minutes. Again today only one show was officially scheduled, at 4:04 p.m. for 15 minutes, but Stafford said he would leave the camera on as much as possible.

The three TV shows Sunday concentrated mainly on the planet Apollo 10 had left behind—a bright blue earth marbled by white clouds and yellow-brown or orange continents, sharply etched against the ink blackness of space.

The astronauts blasted away from Cape Kennedy at 12:39 p.m. Sunday night on their setting a record for Stafford, a veteran of two Gemini flights, he had never launched in space on schedule before.

U.S. Paratroopers Get Within 150 Feet Of Enemy

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. paratroopers fought to within 150 feet of North Vietnamese troops dug in atop 3,000-foot "Hamburger Hill" Sunday before being forced to pull back by heavy mortar and machinegun fire.

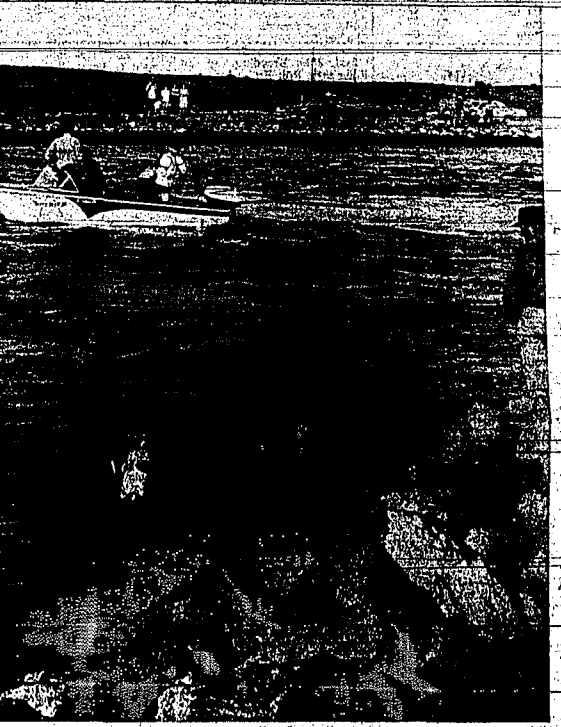

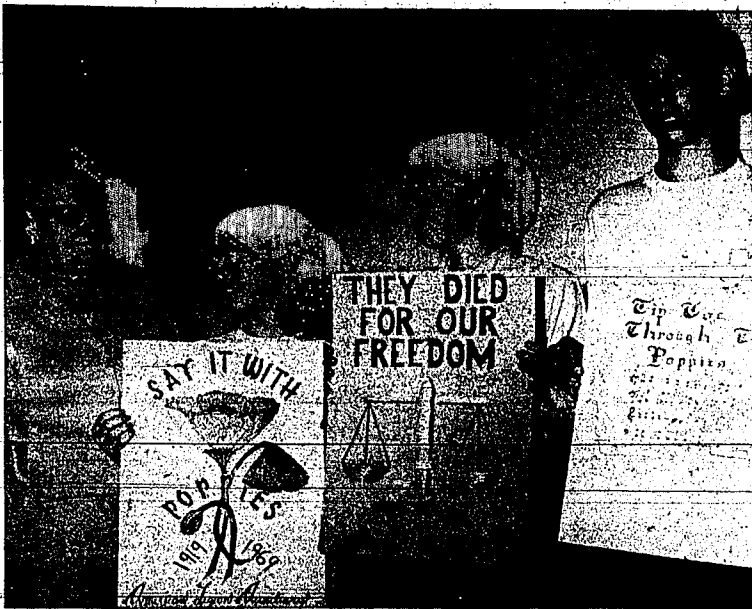

Law Commission Will Consider Police Academy

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's new Law Enforcement Planning Commission will consider appointment of an advisory council to study establishment of a Police Training Academy when it meets May 22 at Pocatello.

Director David J. DeHill said the commission hopes such a council will be able to present its recommendations in time to form the statewide training program by Sept. 1.

Other matters up for consideration at the commission meeting on the Idaho State University campus, will include review and approval of task force reports from all state law enforcement agencies.

Comprehensive plans from the three local regional commissions also will be up for review and approval. So, said DeHill, will be the statewide comprehensive plan.

High Court Opens With Empty Chair

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court returned to the bench today after a two-week recess with an empty chair at Chief Justice Earl Warren's far right.

Justice Abe Fortas' resignation under public criticism left the remaining eight justices with more than 50 cases to decide. Whichever opinions Fortas had written or was writing at the time he yielded to clamor to step-down must now be taken over by other members of the court.

Should his departure result in a 4 to 4 vote in some cases, the court will have the choice of hearing them again next term or merely affirming the lower court by a tie vote. Such an affirmation does not set a precedent in the law.

Leading issues now under advisement include the lawsuit of Rep. Adam Clayton Powell against the House of Representatives; proper standards for teacher disqualification in public schools; a racial challenge to private recreation "clubs"; the criminal anarchy laws of New York and Ohio; and important procedural matters relating to capital punishment.

The court usually closes its term about the second Monday in June. Fortas' departure could delay adjournment. Arguments ended in late April.

Thieu Indicates Problems May Hinder Viet Peace Pact

SAIGON (UPI)—A call by South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu for an early meeting with President Nixon was regarded here Sunday as clear evidence that a number of critical issues remain to be decided before the allies have a truly coordinated negotiating position at the Paris talks.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers, in his one conference here with Thieu, discussed Nixon's eight-point peace plan in general terms but obviously left a lot of loose ends dangling. Rogers' mission thus far has a success from a public relations standpoint.

Rogers' objective, in addition to getting a firsthand look at the situation, was to improve Saigon-Washington relations and reassure the South Vietnamese that Nixon has no intention of abandoning them. He apparently made good on both points.

But Rogers had neither the time nor the intention to settle down and discuss views which must be reconciled by the two countries as they deal with the Communists across the table in Paris.

In calling for the meeting with Nixon, Thieu said its object was "to set up a common policy."

Thieu's kind words last Thursday about Nixon's Vietnam policy speech were initially misinterpreted in some quarters as an endorsement of his anti-eight-point program.

Actually, Thieu's praise was for Nixon's "goodwill and real desire for serious and productive discussions with the Communist side in order to restore peace in Vietnam."

Vietnam Service Earns Honors For Utah Doctor

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—The work of Dr. Mark H. Green in "advancement of world wide medical assistance" through service with CARE in Vietnam was to be honored Monday.

Maurice Warshaw, Intermountain Area CARE chairman said the Salt Lake orthopedic physician would be honored at a luncheon at Ft. Douglas Club.

Warshaw said a number of international CARE officials will attend the luncheon for Dr. Green.

So far as concerned the eight points, Thieu said only that his government "will study them carefully with the government of the United States."

"One of the differences between Nixon's plan and the six-point peace formula put forward by Thieu on April 6 involves troop withdrawals. Nixon proposes a staged withdrawal of American and North Vietnamese forces on a mutual basis. Thieu's plan provides that the allies pull out of the South only after all the North Vietnamese have gone.

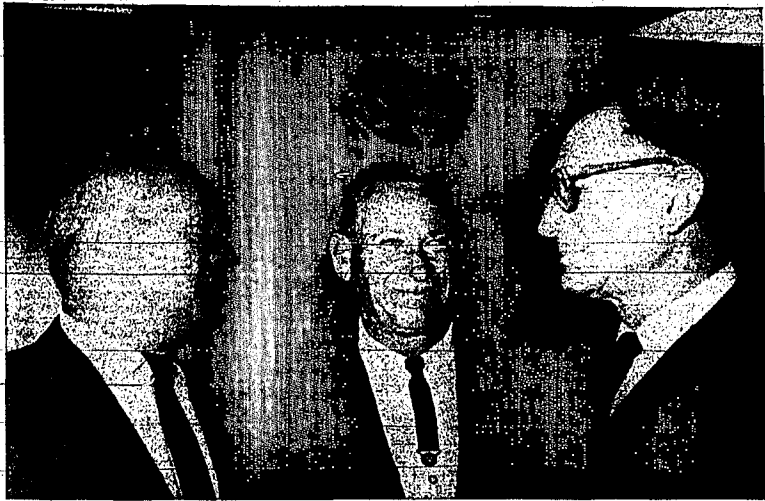

'Coffin-Box' Kidnap Trial Features Suspect's Friend As Star Witness

DECATUR, Ga. (UPI)—The green-eyed girl friend of Gary Steven Krist will be the state's star witness when he goes on trial Monday for the "Coffin Box" kidnaping of Florida heiress Barbara Jane Mackle.

James Venable, Krist's court-appointed attorney, said the name of Ruth Elsemann-Schler was on the list of 250 witnesses the state had ready to testify against the 23-year-old Krist.

"The blonde Miss Elsemann-Schler, 26, of Honduras, is a co-defendant in the \$500,000 kidnaping of Miss Mackle, 20, daughter of millionaire land developer Robert F. Mackle of Miami.

"It's my personal opinion the state's going to use her," Venable said, adding that Krist will plead not-guilty.

Dist. Atty. Richard Bell pointed out that the penalty for kidnaping for ransom in Georgia is life imprisonment or death in the electric chair. He said he would leave it to the jury to decide between the two if the verdict is guilty.

The attractive dark-haired Miss Mackle, a coed at Emory University in Atlanta, was kidnaped at gunpoint from her motel room near the campus at 4 a.m. last Dec. 17 where she was staying with her mother in a rural area about 20 miles northeast of Atlanta.

"When she was found, a light in the box had failed, leaving Miss Mackle in darkness. But despite her 80-hour ordeal, she recovered after a long rest and returned to her studies at Emory."

Krist was captured in a Florida west coast swamp near Punta Gorda on Dec. 22 after an intense manhunt. Nearly all white recuperating from an attack of flu.

FBI agents found her 3 1/2 days later, buried in a coffin-like box in a rural area, where she was working as a car-hop at a drive-in restaurant. She was the first woman ever put in the FBI's "10 Most Wanted" list of fugitives.

Rogers Says Hanoi Holds Vietnam Fate

BANGKOK (UPI)—U.S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers said today it was up to the Hanoi regime to decide if Vietnam lives in "peace or a continued conflict."

Rogers arrived in Bangkok to attend a ministerial meeting of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) and a similar meeting of Vietnam Allies afterward.

He scheduled preliminary talks today with SEATO Secretary General Jesus Vargas and such conference delegates as Philippine Foreign Secretary Carlos P. Romulo, Britain's Lord Shepherd and Thai Foreign Minister Thanat Khoman.

In an airport statement Rogers said: "It's up to Hanoi to decide whether they're going to be peace or a continued conflict in Vietnam. We all hope the need for collective military action will soon be eliminated."

This mahout, so the story goes, habitually visited the village pub every evening where he would drink himself into a stupor, and fall asleep at the doorstep. Without fail, the elephant went to the pub at a specific hour and carried the mahout home with his trunk and put him to bed.

Budget Director Assails Proposed \$192 Billion Fund

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon's budget director says an attempt by Congress to require the administration to live within its \$192.9 billion budget is "unnecessary—and possibly dangerous."

Roger P. Mayo's effort to torpedo a spending ceiling plan drafted with the support of House Republican leaders may indicate a split in the GOP administration over expenditures.

"The House is scheduled to begin debate Tuesday on the plan to clamp a tight lid on administration spending at the level proposed by Nixon in his revised budget April 12. Congress, however, would be permitted to increase the spending if it wished."

The action was seen as an attempt by Congress to regain more power over government spending.

But Mayo has urged a Senate appropriations subcommittee to relax the ceiling by exempting the costs of the Vietnam War, interest on the national debt, farm support payments and other "uncontrollable" items.

Mayo's proposal would lift the lid on \$106.3 billion worth of programs, well over half of the budget.

Boat Capsizes

CALCUTTA, India (UPI)—Authorities said Sunday 41 persons were feared to have drowned in a river about 15 miles from Calcutta when a boat carrying 50 passengers capsized in a storm Saturday. Ten persons were rescued but one died later. The remainder of the passengers were missing, police said.

Congress To View Surtax

By FRANK ELEAZER
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress has voted a \$1-billion surtax increase that took an extra bite out of paychecks last year should continue nibbling at savings for the last six months of this year.

The surcharge—the extra 10 per cent tax individuals and corporations had to pay on their regular tax when they filed their returns earlier this year—expires July 1. President Nixon wants it to remain in effect until Dec. 31, so that it will cover all income earned during the calendar year.

Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, said a provision in the House unless there is a provision attached to it for tax relief for the poor. Mills made the comment in a copyrighted interview in the current issues of U.S. News and World Report.

In the Senate, Democratic Leader Charles McNair said the surtax extension should be tied to a spending limit tighter than the one Nixon has already proposed as too severe.

Judge Director Robert P. May told Congress last week the administration has already put the budget "through the wringer" and there is little room left for taxmakers who have hinted any reduction demanded by Congress might come in programs such as construction projects, popular with the public.

On the same day the Ways and Means Committee takes up the surcharge, it will also look at a \$1.5-billion revenue bill which has been attached to a new-style spending limit to make the President stick to his promise to cut spending.

The money measure, coming up this week also carries a rider which provides for \$1.5 billion to cover the 41 per cent pay raise for the taxmakers voting themselves, effective March 1.

Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., who feels the \$12,500 increase is excessive, is already with an amendment that would specify only half of the raise should be paid.

Findley admitted his chances of success are minimal. No roll call vote on his proposal, he said, and it appeared unlikely he could win approval for a teler vote.

Progress Whittles On English Tradition In Magna Carta

LONDON (UPI)—First, they dismantled London Bridge and abolished the farthing. Now progress is whittling that oak of English tradition, the Magna Carta.

The Magna Carta? Yes. The House of Lords receives the draft of a bill Tuesday that would repeal all but two of the original 37 articles forced upon King John 754 years ago by rebellious noblemen.

The bill would also remove from the records a 300-year-old act ordering a search for the murderers of King Charles I.

The streamlining tool is known as the Statute Repeals Bill. It would also do away with 200 ancient laws considered obsolete.

King John signed the original Magna Carta, or Great Charter of Liberties and Privileges, in 1215 under threat of civil war.

The 1225 version issued in the reign of King Henry III is the document upon which English law has been based.

But over the past 100 years, Parliament has repealed 27 of the original 37 provisions. And if the lawmakers approve the new Statute Repeals Bill, they will unmake in one stroke eight of the remaining 10 articles.

The surviving articles will be the declaration of liberties and the preservation of the rights and privileges of cities, boroughs and towns.

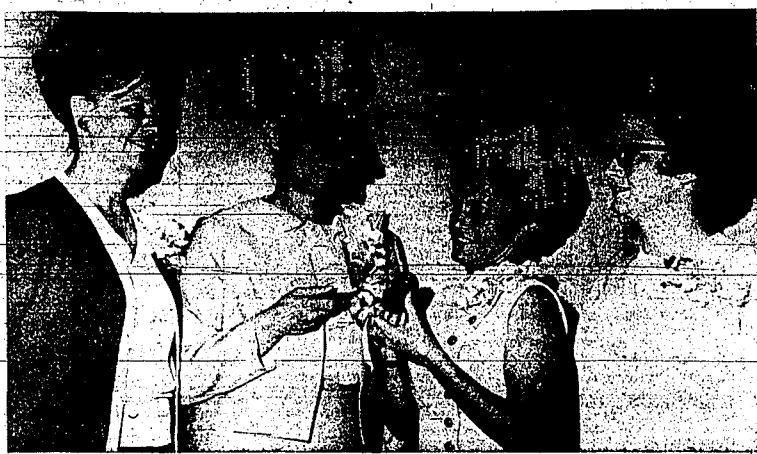

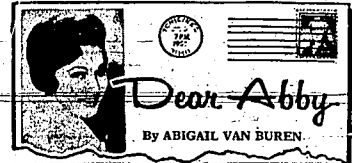

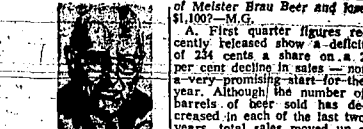

Government Sets Limit On Amount Of Hot Dog 'Fat'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Nixon administration has announced a tentative requirement that hot dogs contain no more than 33 per cent of fat.

Officials said a public hearing on the proposal will be held June 18-20 prior to a final decision.

Officials said studies show 33 per cent is now the normal maximum fat content for sausage products and no changes would be required in most sausage formulas.

One expert estimated, however, that nearly a third of hot dogs and similar products contain more than 33 per cent fat, so would be subject to a fat "rollback" under the proposal.

The Johnson administration had proposed a 30 per cent limit on fat content of such products.

Self-Ordained 'Preacher' Makes Big Hit With Students

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — "By the power invested in me I ordain everyone on this campus to the Universal Life Church."

So spoke the "Reverend" Kirby Hensley as he handed out hundreds of ministerial certificates to students at San Francisco State College.

Hensley has been high-touting it around the colleges-to drum up support for his freestyle priesthood.

"Let's jam—pact that old courthouse," he tells his new followers in a heavy "hillbilly" accent.

The 57-year-old former North Dakotan faces a jury-trial in San Jose. He is charged with issuing ministerial credentials through a non-accredited institution in violation of the California education code.

Recently he has been at San Jose State College, San Francisco State and Stanford. He claims he ordained 5,000 students, boosting his number of "ministers" over 100,000.

Although claiming he can't read or write, Hensley has a way with the students.

He offers them a way to beat the draft—get reduced airline tickets, perform marriages, and collect tax-exempt money. And they like the way he answers questions, such as:

"Can you drink in this church?"

"We don't care what you do," Hensley replies as his wife Lida scurries around passing out the official looking certificates.

How much can you charge for marriages?

"As much as you can get."

What if you're not religious?

"It's no religion, it's a way of life. We don't believe in Christians cause we don't be-


