Pekingese Is Best Of Show At Kennel Club All-Breed Event

FILER — A two-year-old male Pekingese was named best in show Tuesday during judging at the annual Twin Falls, Idaho, Kennel Club All-Breed Dog Show.

The animal, owned by Constance Shuman, Arcadia, Calif., was handled by Frank Sabella, Granada Hills, Calif. He was British import and was born in Jan. 1967.

The Pekingese competed with 441 other dogs during the show at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds at Filer. Dogs from all the western states and several eastern states, including Indiana and New York, competed in the show.

The only local dogs to receive prizes were two owned by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Heard, Twin Falls. Heard's Henry, a 15-inch Beagle, second in class, and Mrs. John Heard's Gobber, a 12-inch Beagle, received best of breed and third in the hound group.

Mr. Heard was chairman of the one-day show.

Bids Called On Shoshone Post Office

SHOSHONE — Bids are being solicited for construction of a new post office in Shoshone, reports Rep. Orval Hansen.

The bids will be opened June 19 and may be submitted to the Post Office Department in the Federal Building in Spokane.

The new post office, which will be built by a private individual and then leased to the Post Office Department, will be located on the south side of West A Street, and the location will allow for more adequate parking space, city officials note.

Various civic groups here have long urged the building of "new facilities" for the post office. In past years the facility has been located in various odd buildings in the town.

For the past several years the post office has been in a building owned by A. F. Onelda on North Kail Street.

Barry Heads State Aviation Program

Warren Barry, Twin Falls, was elected chairman of a 14-man state-wide committee for aviation financing and development when the group met Tuesday night at the Holiday Inn in Twin Falls.

The group, holding its second meeting, is composed of representatives from seven Idaho air carrier airports.

Present were delegations from Twin Falls, Moscow-Pullman, Lewiston, Boise, Burley-Rupert, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

Mr. Barry, said all air carrier airports now involved in the association are either in the process of, or in need of, expansion programs.

The committee is investigating the possibility of some state assistance in funding improvement programs at the state's major airports.

Mr. Barry said the purpose of the committee is to create a unified voice and opinion on where funds might come from and how such funds might be administered or handled.

The committee also adopted a resolution recommending establishment of a trust fund concept for fostering aviation development. Both recommendations will be sent to Rep. Jay Webb, R-Boise, chairman of the revenue and taxation's subcommittee studying aviation with an eye toward aviation development.

The committee expressed unhappiness with the Idaho Department of Aeronautics' apparent lack of interest in the concept.

Governor Defends Stand On White Clouds

Gov. Don Samuelson has defended his backing of a proposed mining operation in the White Clouds area and has taken exception to an editorial which appeared in the May 11 issue of the Times-News and which was critical of his position.

In a communication to O. A. (Aus) Kelter, Times-News editor, which was received Wednesday, the governor wrote that the project would involve considerably less than 3,000 acres and yet will have a "significant impact" on the state's economy.

"I have no narrow-minded, single-track opinion, as do some, that all areas of Idaho should either be locked up on the one hand, or fully developed on the other," Gov. Samuelson wrote. "Each situation must be judged on its own merits and own features."

In the editorial titled "Ah, Wilderness" to which the governor took exception, the Times-News was critical of the mining operation in the White Clouds area and has taken exception to an editorial which appeared in the May 11 issue of the Times-News and which was critical of his position.

"Millions of acres of Idaho beauty are encompassed by these regions preserved for recreation for the people of ours and other states, and I have strongly and actively supported this concept."

"Significantly, just about as many millions of acres have been proposed or set aside for single recreation use as there are acres under dry land and irrigated farming, Idaho's number one industry."

"But, rashly and unemotionally, the lack of economic life have to be faced squarely. The No. 1 natural resource in Idaho is the taxpayer, and if we don't find relief or a greater or sharing of the burden the taxpayer is going to be depleted and exhausted," he wrote.

"It is at the proposed White Cloud mining project in located in Custer county and that the federal government owns about 95 per cent of the lands in that county, leaving five per cent to a tax base."

He wrote that "if the proposed mining project is authorized, the benefits would be shared by the taxpayer, besides being of massive assistance to Custer County."

"This is why I wonder if a lot of people have considered the White Clouds development from a realistic and economic standpoint," the governor said in the communication.

"The total proposed expenditure would top \$40 million over the next five years and some 350 persons would be employed. Millions in taxes will result in the long run, he wrote."

"From such a tiny region, the contribution would be king-sized benefits, in areas of multiple use potential, where one source does not destroy another. It is only logical to take full advantage of the opportunity."

Audit Of J.P. Fund Finished

An audit of books of the Buhl Justice of the Peace and city police judge, ordered by Twin Falls county and Buhl city officials, has been completed and a written report is expected within the next few days.

County Commissioners said they were informed Tuesday by the firm of Martin, Olsen and Associates, Boise, that the report is being prepared and will be mailed.

As a result, county officials asked for postponement of a hearing scheduled in justice court before Justice of the Peace Reed P. Mathison Wednesday. The hearing will be rescheduled for the following Wednesday.

The hearing was set for Justice of the Peace and City Judge Karl R. (Jack) Lewis, Buhl, on a complaint filed against county clerk and auditor Harold Lancaster.

The complaint charges him with writing an invoice for funds check to the cover the report and fees from his justice court for the month of April. The check was returned from the bank marked "insufficient funds," Mr. Lancaster said.

T.F. Coroner Gets Post For Civil Defense

Clyce Edwards Tuesday was named civil defense director for Twin Falls County.

Mr. Edwards, county coroner and operator of Magic Valley Ambulance Service, was appointed by the county commissioners during a meeting Tuesday. Local officials and state civil defense personnel from Boise.

Twin Falls County has been operating for several years without a full-time director. County Commission Chairman Heber Loughmiller has been filling the position until Mr. Edwards' appointment.

The new director will work closely with state civil defense officials and will attend training schools. Mr. Edwards said he is planning to be organized to handle even small-scale emergencies involving a number of people, much less equipped to handle a national emergency.

He said Twin Falls County is one of the last counties in the state to get started in a direct civil defense program.

New Sign Highway Signing Crews

Highway signing crews were erecting a new sign Wednesday morning at the junction of U.S. High 93 and State Highway 74 southwest of Twin Falls.

The sign was requested by Twin Falls officials. The complaint was from businesses on Addison Avenue West noting the existing sign was misleading.

Ron Dehlin, district traffic engineer, said the new sign will direct Twin Falls traffic over U.S. 93, instead of the state route, and will direct "south" Twin Falls traffic via State 74.

Kellwood Co. Personnel Head Hired

Royce Williams, Twin Falls, has been announced as the personnel manager for the Kellwood Co. plant which is being constructed here.

Ed Woods previously was announced as the maintenance superintendent for the plant. Mr. Williams recently returned from the Kellwood Co. factory at Siler City, N. C., and will be attending a recruitment orientation school June 1-4 at Nashville, Tenn.

The personnel manager hopes to hire an office manager shortly, but no name of that person has been chosen until after June 1. Bob Mathews, plant manager, will be in Twin Falls in June.

Mr. Williams said the plant will employ 550 people when in full production. He said the training classes will be conducted by the College of Southern Idaho Vocational School when all the necessary equipment arrives. Class instructors will be from the Siler City operation.

Mr. Woods and Mr. Williams will have offices in the C. C. Anderson building. They said it is difficult to say when the factory plant will open since it is such a complex operation. But, they said they hoped to begin work shortly after the first of the month.

Mr. Williams was graduated from Idaho State University, Pocatello, in 1966 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. Following his graduation he was an All-State Insurance Co. underwriter in Salem, Ore. He was transferred to the Twin Falls office in February, 1968. He, his wife, Janet, and 1-year-old son, live at 1705 Poplar Ave.

Apollo Spacemen End 'Vacation,' Enter Moon Orbit

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — For Apollo 10's astronauts, the easy part was over today.

Commander Thomas P. Stafford and crewmen John W. Young and Eugene A. Cernan slept late as they finished their third day in space. They were less than 20,000 miles from the moon, their destination for 61 dangerous hours of scouting the terrain.

The three astronauts, hurtling faster and faster in the grip of lunar gravity, passed behind the moon at 4:37 p.m. EDT. They then fired a blast of their rocket engine to drop into orbit around it at 4:45 p.m.

"Their mission is to spend 2 1/2 days circling the moon in the Apollo spacecraft nicknamed 'Charlie Brown.'"

Stafford and Cernan will cut loose Thursday in the "Snoopy" lunar landing machine and skim twice within 10 miles of the lunar surface, carefully studying possible landing sites for the Apollo 11 which hopes to touch down on the lunar surface in July.

At 10 a.m. EDT, Apollo 10 was 19,879 miles from the moon, more than 230,000 miles from earth, and closing on the moon at 2,699 mph. The See APOLLO, Page 2, Col. 4

U.S. Troops End Red Resistance

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. paratroopers today snuffed out the last pocket of North Vietnamese resistance atop Hamburger Hill, killing 19 guerrilla snipers left behind from the Communist regiment that surrendered the peak Tuesday.

The Communists shelled 21 towns and Allied camps overnight, sending a 12-round rocket salvo into the town of Tam Ky on the northern coast in the costliest attack. Saigon government spokesmen listed four civilians dead and eight wounded.

Paratroopers searching the abandoned Communist bunkers atop the hill found three-inch communications wires leading through it from Laos to other Communist positions in South Vietnam, indicating it was indeed a major North Vietnamese headquarters.

The fights along the DMZ and near Saigon were the only other actions reported.

Helicopter Spews Tear Gas On Students In Campus Fuss

A National Guard helicopter spewed tear gas on student demonstrators and onlookers at the University of California, Berkeley campus Tuesday.

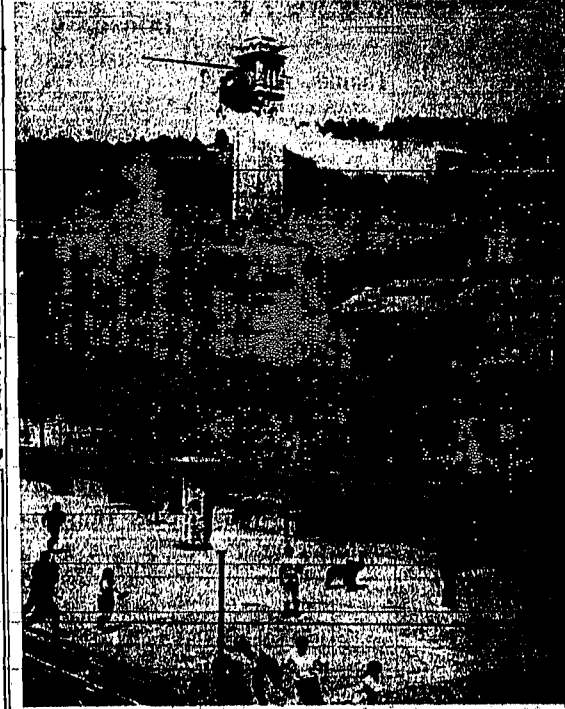
The gas seeped into the 27,000-student schools' Union Building and hospital, forcing evacuation of some patients.

Case Western students claimed victory when university officials agreed to discuss passage of a "Report on acts of violence in Cleveland."

Earlier Tuesday, 200 students crowded into the 8,000-student school's administration building and tried to break down the door of the president's office. They were repelled by campus police and Vice President Eric Green, a Cleveland Browns football player.

The students said the report they want released contains information vital to the defense of black militant Fred "Ahmed" Evans, sentenced to death for the slaying deaths of four persons in last summer's violence.

Some 60 members of a black student organization at the University of Cincinnati tossed chairs through classroom windows Tuesday and said they would continue such disruptions until a list of demands is met. Four persons were reported injured during the disorder at the 30,000-student school.

Cut 1 Table/Plate round steak 1/4 inch thick into six servings. Sprinkle each with mixture of 1/4 cup flour, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. Accent, 1/4 tsp. pepper and pound to 1/4 inch thickness; set aside while preparing next step. Remove caps from stems of 1/2 lb. mushrooms. Chop stems and blend with 1/2 cup each poultry bread stuffing, chopped onion, chopped parsley and grated cheese. Add 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. Accent and mix together. 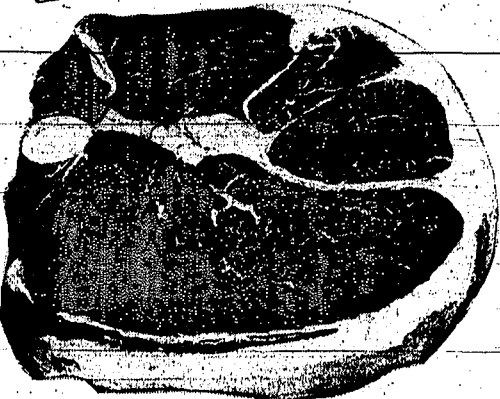

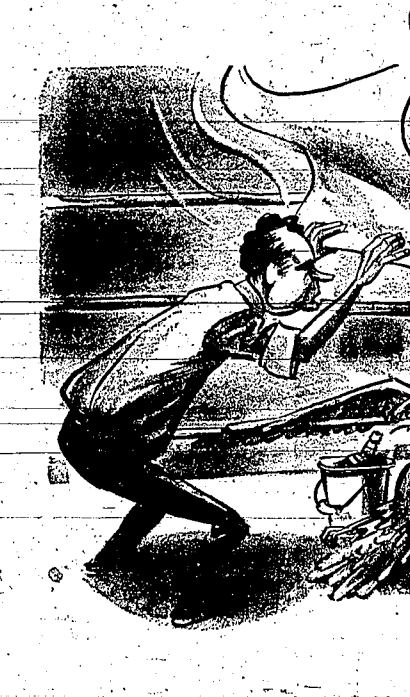

WASHINGTON — Fortunately, our lords on Capitol Hill appear a touch queasy about the Pentagon's budget these days. Specifically, Congress finally is about to launch a series of full-scale investigations of reports of the wastage of hundreds of millions of dollars on assorted military hardware.

The nationwide bedlam and disorders in colleges to be extended to high schools... One SDS leaflet, on the importance of expanding "student radicalization" to high schools, emphasizes the need for militancy...

Another widely circulated pamphlet lately advocates recourse to violence, sabotage and the use of "fire bombs." It is titled "What Must We Do Now? An Argument for Sabotage as the Next Logical Step Towards Abolition of the U.S. War Machine."

Dear Dr. Thosteson: When a person has a stomach X-ray and is given a barium solution to drink, and is told that the barium hardens in the body and causes serious trouble unless the person is given mineral oil.

The white material is a solution of a barium compound. Given, of course, so it will outline the stomach sharply enough to be seen in the X-ray.

Therefore, to be on the safe side, it is wise to give patients mineral oil to keep the barium material soft and loose, so it will not harden in the stomach.

Cowboy Artist To Exhibit Paintings

Sherman Carter, an artist and writer who lives at the E. H. Boles ranch near Contact, Nev., was running an errand for Mr. Boles. He stopped at the club to deliver the eggs, and when they could not arrive on a price, the conversation turned to Mr. Carter's art work.

A self-styled young man, Mr. Carter has been drawing since he was a small boy. He has never had any professional lessons, but has been offered good prices for some of his paintings and drawings.

A year ago Mr. Carter began searching for material to write a book on Will James. On his way through Nevada he stopped at the Boles ranch to get water for his horse. Mr. Boles invited him for a week stay to study the life of the Nevada cowboy.

Mr. Carter is now writing a book on the transition of the old-time cowboy and the cowboy of today, which he plans to call, "Cowboy Boos." He expects to finish this book before going on with the Will James story. It will be printed at Contact's late this year.

After seeing Mr. Carter's art work, it is hard to understand why he would pursue a writing career. He said, however, he has had a slight aversion since birth and may someday not be able to draw and paint.

He has shown his art work to school friends, at rest homes and had a special showing at the 1968 Nevada Cattlemen and Woolgrowers convention in Elko last fall.

Mr. Carter's paintings are water colors, pen and ink and oils. The scenes depict the rounding up of horses, wildlife, and Native Indians. He has several original ideas in his work. He has done some paintings in a religious western theme.

Pandas Shun Romantic Encounter

LONDON (UPI)—The Anglo-Soviet giant panda love match has ended, An-An and Chi-Chi said by-bye.

It was not a particularly emotional farewell between the Russian male and the British female of the rare species.

An-An said "Nyel" to all but the plate of mash — it resembles drained borscht — that was his goodbye dinner before flying home to the Moscow Zoo.

Chi-Chi showed no more concern over An-An's going than she has in the 10 months of his presence. Chi-Chi merely poked her nose up at the cloudy sky, scratched herself and ambled away.

It was love's labor lost for the London and Moscow Zoos which, with solid backing of 10 Downing St. and the Kremlin, tried to end Communist China's monopoly of giant panda offspring.

At no time during the 10 months did Chi-Chi succumb to the Russian's charms. An-An had to content himself with the mash.

The scientific observers sent by the Kremlin went home months ago.

Chi-Chi is 13. An-An is six months younger. A giant panda — all the rest are in Peking's hands — lives to about 16.

"We think this is probably the end of the possibility of mating between these two animals," a London Zoo official said.

University To Get Athletic Complex For \$8.1 Million

BOISE (UPI) — The State Board of Regents Tuesday gave the University of Idaho permission to hire the firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill of Portland, Ore. to start preliminary plans for what will eventually be an \$8,157,150 athletic complex at the Moscow institution.

The regents in 1967 approved a program for construction of athletic plant facilities at the university to cost \$8.1 million. Student fees were increased \$37.50 per semester and \$18.50 for the summer session.

Construction on the stadium, which will be due to start in the spring of 1971 and is due to be completed in the fall of 1972.

The regents declined to act on the policy on alcoholic beverages in dormitories at the University of Idaho as part of a new dormitory policy change.

Under the proposed change, which will be brought up again at the board's next meeting, students of legal age would be permitted to consume alcoholic beverages in approved areas in certain dormitories.

Dormitory policy changes for the University of Idaho that were adopted would:

- Determine the feasibility of charging students living in residence halls for only the meals they eat.
- Allow a controlled program for students to visit in rooms of students of the opposite sex.
- Assign only graduate students, law students, international students or senior men over 20 years of age to Shoup Hall.
- Develop French House, Foreney Hall and Hays Hall for "over-21 occupancy."
- And discontinue using Willis Sweet and Christian Halls as men's dormitories.

The regents also received a \$215 million bid from the Housing and Urban Development Agency for revenue bonds for the Theophilus Tower project.

Tuesday morning the board met behind closed doors with Gov. Don Samuelson in the governor's office.

It was learned that Samuelson had received complaints about Idaho State University holding its graduation exercises on Memorial Day.

The topic was later discussed with Dr. William F. Davis, president of ISU.

Davis said he in no way intended for the graduation ceremonies to detract from the importance of Memorial Day.

The graduation will be held at 3 p.m.

Shrimp Processor Defends Navigability Of Salt Lake

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — A witness called by Utah's Attorney General today in a Supreme Court hearing that his "well-bred" depends upon the use of boats on the Great Salt Lake.

Dale Sanders, president of Sanders-Brune-Shrimp Co., Riverside, told the court Tuesday that his company has harvested as much as 90,000 lbs. of shrimp from the lake in one year, an operation dependent upon the use of boats.

Sanders was one of the final witnesses called upon to testify before the state completed its presentation in the case of Utah vs the United States of America.

The hearing, which began Monday and is expected to adjourn today, is to determine whether Utah or the federal government is the legal owner of the mineral-rich floor of the Great Salt Lake.

To establish ownership, Utah must prove that the lake was "navigable or susceptible to navigation" when Utah was officially granted statehood in 1896. If the Supreme Court rules the lake not navigable, title will pass to the United States.

In two full days of legal activity, the state introduced 33 witnesses and submitted 38 items into evidence.

Many of those called to testify were longtime residents of the Salt Lake area able to offer first-hand knowledge of vessels plying the lake before and after statehood.

Dr. Francis Kirkham, a 92-year-old gentleman who received a Ph. D. degree from the University of Calif. around the turn of the century, told the court he took many excursions on paddle wheel boats that operated on the lake before statehood.

Mrs. Zella W. Manning, a resident of Utah since 1891, said she was raised for the first 12 years of her life on Antelope Island in the Great Salt Lake.

"My father sailed on that lake many years before Utah became a state," she said, "and I was on it."

Towed Truck Demolished In Accident

JACKPOT — A 1964 Chevrolet pickup truck was demolished early Wednesday morning near here when the hitch between it and a car towing it broke, Twin Falls County Sheriff's officers said.

Deputies said the vehicle was being towed by a 1968 Plymouth driven by Robert A. Wright, 18, Rupert. The pickup truck swayed around in the road several times, dragging the car with it. Both went off the highway and the truck rolled into the ditch.

There was no damage to the car, officers said. Neither Mr. Wright nor passengers in the car, Tony Mayer, 17, Roger Wright, 14, and Damian Wright, 39, all Rupert, were injured.

The accident was at 1:25 a.m. about two miles north of Jackpot.

Smoking Foes Seek Tough Ad Controls

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Bolstered by a tough Federal Trade Commission (FTC) proposed regulation, Senate smoking foes raised the possibility today cigarette advertising may vanish from the American scene by year's end.

Sen. Frank E. Moss, D-Utah, chairman of the Senate commerce subcommittee that must consider any cigarette legislation, promised to block any bill helpful to the cigarette industry.

Other Senate sources said antismoking sentiment was so strong the tobacco industry has not even started to lobby for legislation to extend the present ban on government restrictions of cigarette advertising.

The FTC proposed Tuesday every cigarette advertisement and package be required to include the warning: "Cigarette smoking is dangerous to health, may cause death from cancer, coronary heart disease, chronic bronchitis, pulmonary emphysema and other diseases."

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) notified Congress earlier this year it plans to ban all cigarette advertising from radio and television.

Under a four-year law passed in 1965, cigarette packs must carry the words, "Caution: Cigarette Smoking May Be Hazardous to Your Health." But the law prohibited further

Leary said if he won he would hire out the actual administration of the job to present Gov. Ronald Reagan or Democratic aspirant Jess Unruh and he and his wife would live in a house on the lawn of the executive mansion.

ISU Specialist Helps Physicians Control Disease

POCATELLO (UPI)—An Idaho State University specialist in viruses is helping local physicians diagnose disease.
Because Rubella, commonly known as German measles, is difficult to diagnose with certainty due to vague symptoms, Dr. Roger W. Boe, a Pocatello pediatrician, recently sought the help of Dr. Gyaneshwar Khare, an ISU professor engaged in virus research.
Khare discovered live German measles virus in swabs taken from the throat of a 17-month-old Pocatello child.
"We now have a documented case of German measles in the community for the first time in several years," Boe said. "It is a difficult virus to isolate without sophisticated techniques."
Boe cautioned pregnant women who develop a rash or fever with a headache and muscular pains to see their physicians. The disease is contagious and particularly hazardous to unborn babies in the first three months of their mothers' pregnancies.

A record \$516,000 in monthly Social Security benefits has been paid to residents of Twin Falls County at the end of December, 1968. Payments increased five per cent above the amount payable at the end of February, 1968, according to Pat O'Marra, district manager for social security.

Official Says Mayor Aided 'Hooligans'

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—Indiana's attorney general has called for federal investigation of his charge that the mayor of Gary encouraged a raid by demonstrators on a weekend state banquet.
Atty. Gen. Theodore Sendak Monday charged that members of Gary Mayor Richard G. Hatcher's "own staff helped organize and direct the vandals who committed violence in broad view of citizens and officials alike."
Sendak said he has asked the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Justice Department and congressional committee to investigate the raid which he said was "a graphic example of officially encouraged hoodlumism in the city of Gary."
Gary officials denied the charges and accused Sendak of playing politics. Hatcher, one of the first Negroes elected mayor of a major U.S. city, is a Democrat. Sendak and Gov. Edgar Whitcomb are Republicans.
Hatcher said he already had ordered an investigation of the incident at the Gary National Guard's Armory where dishes were broken and food was thrown just prior to an appearance Saturday night by William Branch, Sen. at dinner honoring them. Programs for the event also were destroyed, it was charged.
Sendak and Whitcomb, deputy chief of police for 12 hours after the demonstrators had left the building, Sendak said, Hatcher showed up at the armory after the demonstrators had entered the building.

State Examiners Approve Disputed Claim Of Pay For Prison Board Member

By RICHARD CHARNOCK

BOISE (UPI) — Members of the State Board of Examiners agreed Tuesday that William J. Dee should be compensated for work on the new Board of Corrections — work performed before he officially was a member.

Board members approved Dee's claim for \$400 in salary plus \$182.15 in travel and other expenses for the eight days he assisted the board between March 11 and April 12.

Although Gov. Don Samuelson named Dee as the Democratic member of the new board, he

did so before C.L. (Doc) House resigned to take another job in state government.

Because a Board of Corrections as such is a constitutional board with constitutionally set terms of six years, Dee could not take over from House on the new, part-time board until House resigned.

Compensation claimed by Dee was at the rate of \$50 per day for the time he worked with the board plus travel expenses from his home at Grangeville to board meetings at Boise.

Meantime, Samuelson disclosed the state is planning to set up a rental-type agency in the

Department of Administrative Services' division of building services to make use of usable but surplus state equipment.

He told fellow board members the state also is contemplating use of professional auctioneers to dispose of surplus equipment the state no longer can use.

The two programs, he said, would help the state to get top dollar for its unneeded surplus while at the same time prevent purchase of new equipment for only temporary use and their subsequent disposal at a loss.

Rental fees charged agencies for using the surplus goods — such as typewriters and desks

— can be used for maintenance of those items and to compensate the agencies from which they originally are acquired as surplus.

Discussion of surplus came up when the board held up for the third time a request from the Department of Corrections to sell 64 guns in its arsenal.

Many of them are antique or collector's items, Samuelson asked the examiners to hold up the proposed sale so the weapons could be well advertised. The state could realize the real worth from them.

In other action, the board: — Okayed purchase by the

Department of Aeronautics of 1/2 acres at \$700 per acre from Mrs. Ken J. Wuehoff for land needed at Cavanaugh Bay Airport near Coolin at Priest Lake.

— Approved a State Aeronautics Department grant of \$1,017.50 to Bonner County for upgrading of the Priest River Municipal Airport.

— Agreed to reimburse Raymond M. May, Idaho's new director of corrections, \$1,744.30 for moving expenses to Boise from Alaska.

— Approved transfer of \$187,000 to the Department of Law Enforcement from the highway

fund to man platform scales designed to catch overloaded trucks who are damaging state roads and attendant structures.

— Gave State Budget Director James A. Defenbach and Daniel L. Rode, an employee of the Health Department at the Idaho State School and Hospital, authority to moonlight by teaching night courses at Boise State College.

— Denied a request by the Health Department to spend \$41.97 for a coffee maker, contending this should not be a public purchase.

— Declines to become involv-

ed in litigation John F. Helms, Coeur d'Alene, brought to force a school board to give him a specified teaching assignment on grounds the matter is before the Supreme Court and the board therefore lacks jurisdiction.

— Authorized transfer of \$75,000 from the Agriculture Department budget for the next biennium to fulfill the state's agreement with the federal government for fruit and vegetable inspection.

Spoons, Bowls Make Space 'Like Home'

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Spoons and bowls are making meals in space a little more like eating at home.

The Apollo 10 astronauts are using two new food packages, one of them a foiled-wrapped "wet pack" for earth type foods and the other a spoon-bowl for rehydratable foods like spaghetti and meat sauce.

The old space feeding tube has been replaced for several foods by a package which zips open and turns into a bowl. By holding it close to his mouth, the astronaut can then eat with a spoon.

The new foil-wrapped "wet packs" include earth-type foods such as chicken and rice, spaghetti with meat sauce, beef stew and pork and scalloped potatoes.

Each astronaut has one "spoon-bowl" package and one "wet pack" meal per day. It allows them to have the most varied menu ever on a space mission.

The packages, designed by Whirlpool Corp. of Benton Harbor, Mich., are getting their first extensive space use aboard Apollo 10.

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Kuhn Must Solve Casino Problem With Owners

NEW YORK (UPI)—Baseball commissioner Bowie Kuhn, who in his short term in office has had to handle two delicate matters involving player trades, is faced with his first exclusively owner problem.

At issue is the revelation that Charles Finley of the Oakland Athletics and three owners of the Atlanta Braves have become stock holders in Las Vegas gambling casinos.

Finley is holding a series of personal interviews with Finley, per the Atlanta Braves, Delbert Coleman, and John J. Louis Jr. of the Braves. The Atlanta men are on the board of directors of the Marvin-Dobman Corporation, which operates the Aladdin Hotel and Casino on the Las Vegas Strip and the downtown Vegas mecca, the Fremont Hotel.

Finley has purchased 30,000 shares of corporation stock. Details of the transactions and the operations of the gambling sites are being sifted by Kuhn through talks with the baseball men involved, with the Federal Reserve, the Securities and Exchange Commission and the American Stock Exchange.

"The commissioner has been on the phone all the time since the disclosure of the stock holdings," said Joe Reichler, his assistant. "It is something you just can't make a decision on quickly. He is checking out a lot of things and hopefully will come up with some sort of decision on it."

Since taking office, Kuhn has resolved the trade dispute between the Houston Astros and the Montreal Expos over Rusty Staub and Donn Clendenon, and also persuaded Ken Herrington to accept the trade that sent him from Boston to Cleveland.

In both cases, Kuhn was able to get the owners involved in the deal to accept his verdict, but the present situation is the first concerning owners only.

Sampling Of Mackay Yields Fish Bonanza

MACKAY — "There are no fish in Mackay Reservoir." That statement has been making the rounds of fishermen from Southeastern and Eastern Idaho much of the spring and it came so often that even the Idaho Fish and Game Department started wondering — although Mackay and its prime supplier, Big Lost River, are considered blue ribbon trout waters.

So Bob Bell and Jim Dayley, Mackay hatchery superintendent, took a sampling and found that contrary to the opinion of fishermen, the reservoir still is loaded with trout. In one night's net of a gillnet the department came up with 101 rainbow, one Eastern Brook, one whitefish and one kokanee. This would compare to similar operations on Morrison Reservoir last year which yielded about 50 trout and 12 Coho; Salmon Reservoir, about 25 trout and a mess of trout fish; and Miglic which had dozens of perch and only a few trout.

"We had heard the report so often that we began worrying ourselves," says Regional Biologist Robert Bell. "The reservoir was pulled down to about one-fourth its capacity in anticipation of heavy runoff and sometimes this causes the fish to leave, too. But I was amazed when we pulled the net up."

Bell said the department had planned a heavy restocking with catch-sized fish if the sampling had been poor. One aspect also showed that Mackay has proved to more effective in holding Coho than other Idaho waters. None was found in the net, indicating at least most of them went down stream. Bell reports crew checks in the year-round open waters of the Big Lost River had turned up several Coho.

DETROIT (UPI) — Bill van Breda Kolff made the big switch in the National Basketball Association today with his move from coach of the winning Los Angeles Lakers to the losing Detroit Pistons.

Official announcement of van Breda Kolff's signing by Detroit was scheduled for a morning news conference today.

In his two years with the Lakers, Los Angeles made the NBA playoffs both years. The Pistons have made the playoffs only once in six years and have not had a winning season in 12 years.

It was no secret why the 47-year-old coach would leave a winning ball club to take up with a loser. He's had a running feud with Laker star Wilt Chamberlain.

He would explain how he wanted Chamberlain to play and then the superstar would go on the court and play the way he wanted to play.

When he finally quit the Lakers Tuesday, general manager Fred Schauss said van Breda Kolff's decision "was his own idea," but he added it was "in the best interests of all concerned."

"It's very definitely was not a forced resignation," Schauss said.

His new position as coach of the Pistons will make him the ninth in the 12 years, Paul Seymour, who guided the Pistons in the final 60 games last season, said he wanted out of the coaching job so he could devote more time to his family and business interests in Syracuse, N.Y.

A college basketball coach for 16 years at Loyola University, Hofstra and Princeton, van Breda Kolff compiled a 307-109 record before moving on to Los Angeles where the Lakers won 107 games and lost 57 during regular season play in two years. In playoffs, he built up a 22-12 mark, losing to the Boston Celtics in the NBA championship each time.

The 6-foot-3 van Breda Kolff, a member of the New York Knicks for four years after his graduation from New York University, is a staunch believer in team play, one of the reasons Chamberlain's actions disturbed him.

Airlines Ponder Handling Of Ever-Mounting Baggage Flood

By LEROY POPE, I.D.L. Business Writer

NEW YORK (UPI) — If you intend to fly on your vacation this year it would be wise to take some precautions of your own to protect your baggage, airline officials agree.

The big airlines still are several years away from an ideal solution to the lost baggage headache. Many passengers still arrive at New York's Kennedy Airport to find their baggage has been misdirected to Rio de Janeiro or Buenos Aires. Even on domestic flights, luggage gets routed to the wrong city.

Overall, the airlines estimate that about 1.5 per cent of baggage gets misdirected—that's a staggering two million cases a year.

Vacationers are more apt to have baggage trouble than business travelers because they have more luggage, they travel in the most congested season and they are not as travel wise as business passengers.

"Having your luggage in a distinctive color helps greatly," said a man in Eastern Airlines' public relations office. "Or put big unique decorative decals on it that can be seen from far away."

And be vigilant. Claim your bags promptly at every stop and put a tracer on instantly if they don't turn up.

"The lost baggage headache, of course, is a product of rapid growth of the business," said a spokesman at Pan Am. "It results from human failure, failure of a baggage clerk to read a tag properly or to stow bags correctly in the plane so they are sure to be taken out at the right destination."

Better systematic safeguards will take time to develop because problems get bigger as planes get bigger. When the new Boeing 747 airliner goes into service, it will be necessary to handle in about half an hour the baggage of 369 passengers instead of 140.

Automated systems employing containers, carousels and the electronic computer eventually will solve most of the problem, but it takes time to build these.

started to put the bag in the wrong container, the water's code would cause a light to flash or ring a bell as the bag passed through a light beam.

A Trans World Airlines official said radioactive wafers also could make it possible to sort baggage rapidly by electronic devices.

The electronic computer would be used both to control the sorting of baggage on carousel devices and to make tracing of lost baggage almost instantaneous. At every stop an inventory of the baggage put aboard, taken off and left aboard the plane could be transmitted to the computer for virtually instantaneous retrieval from any point on the world's airways.

PUC Allows Valley Airline To Trim Rates

BOISE (UPI) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has granted Trans Magic Airlines authority to reduce its fare charges between Boise and Ida-

no Falls to \$23 one way and \$46 round-trip.

The new rates will become effective today.

The airlines was the first to be granted a temporary permit by the PUC under a new law passed by the 40th session of the legislature which gave the commission power to regulate intrastate airlines.

T.F. Student At ISU Helps Build Training Computer

IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY, Pocatello—Three types of teaching aids have been constructed by students at Idaho State University's School of Vocational Technical Education.

One of them, an adding computer for teaching mathematics,

was the project of a Twin Falls student, Jerry Whiteley, and Jerry Hoggan, Idaho Falls, and James Whiteley, Pocatello.

By means of light, students can see figures in the binary system converted to figures in the decimal system. John Christofferson, vocational-technical instructor, plans to use the machine to teach summer classes in the public schools.

Another of the machines is an instrument on which a meter indicates visually a child's attempts to produce specific consonants. The other instrument was devised for work with deaf children. It has a red light which turns on when a child utters a sound into the microphone.



Inflated Bags Could Replace Car Seat Belt

WANGTON. (UPI) — Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe is being urged to approve inflated nylon bags as an automobile safety device for drivers who won't wear safety belts.

The National Motor Vehicle Safety Advisory Council has sent Volpe a resolution urging the balloon-like bags be made a part of the government's safety standards for automobiles.

The crash bags would be triggered by a "crash sensor" that would be regulated to go off under a specific impact. The bags would be inflated by nitrogen gas in about one fourth of a second—fast enough to cushion the forward motion of a driver involved in an accident, said Robert Carter, an official of the National Highway Safety Bureau.

The driver would be protected by a bag stored in the steering wheel assembly. Another bag in the dashboard would protect the front seat passenger, and a third, installed in the back of the front seat, would protect passengers in the rear.

Safety experts argue that if effective, the bag system would avert the one serious defect of the safety belt system—the failure of up to 70 per cent of the drivers to make use of them.

In its resolution, the 23-member council, made up of delegates from business, industry and consumer fields, urged Volpe to issue a notice of proposed rule making—the first step needed to make the safety bags mandatory.

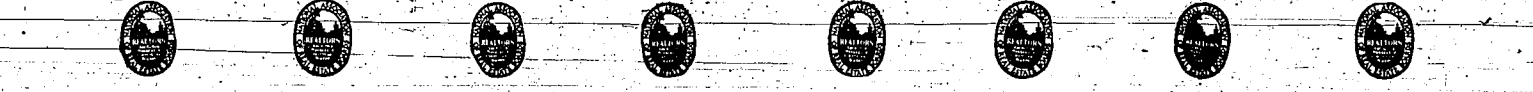

Utility Chief Cites Need Of Resource Plans

SALMON (UPI)—Albert Carlson, president of Idaho Power Co., has told a group here that without dams, reservoirs and power plans and men with vision, courage and incentive to build them "Idaho would still be in sagobrush."

Carlson told a company dinner, "There are a number of people in places of authority, no doubt well meaning but naive, who in the name of conservation would lock up our natural resources and make common sense development all but impossible."

He said, "If the kind of thinking that seems to prevail in the minds of a small but vocal minority of our students, professional conservators and so-called intellectuals had prevailed in the past you and I would not be here today—neither would they."

It was Carlson's first visit to Salmon since taking over as president of Idaho Power.

Pentagon Trims Plane Work In New 'Get-Tough' Policy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Pentagon has halted production of its \$75 million Cheyenne helicopter project in a new "get tough" policy with defense contractors. Other such cancellations may be in the wind.

Nixon administration sources said the aim is to crack down on the price spiral which has sent the cost of planes, ships and other weapons soaring above original estimates.

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Credit Data Could Injure Reputations, Educator Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Credit data on employment information bureaus can—and sometimes do—destroy a person's reputation by spreading malicious gossip or faulty information.

A Columbia University professor told a Senate subcommittee today.

Alan F. Westin told the committee about an unidentified salesman who was turned down for job after job for six years because a typographical error—and the unconfirmed gossip of an angry neighbor appeared in the dossier a firm compiled on him.

Westin said personnel managers refused to give the salesman a chance to answer the charges against him because the preemployment report was confidential and could not be shown to the "subject."

The professor, author of a book on invasions of privacy, supported legislation by Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., to give individuals a chance to correct inaccurate credit bureau reports.

He urged the financial institutions subcommittee to broaden the bill to include preemployment reporting, a sideline for many of the nation's 2,200 retail credit bureaus.

"This industry has let itself become both error-rich and hostile to error-correction," Westin said.

The bill would require credit bureaus to inform the person involved when potentially damaging information is added to

Swiss Accuse Mrs. Roosevelt Of Knife Attack

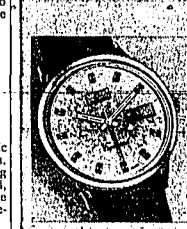
GENEVA (UPI)—The public prosecutor today accused Mrs. James F. Roosevelt of causing bodily injury to her husband, the eldest son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Roosevelt, 61, was stabbed in the back at his Geneva villa May 15. The wound was not severe, however, and he said today he will leave the hospital Thursday.

Mrs. Roosevelt, 48, the former Gladys Irene Owens, was taken to a psychiatric clinic following the stabbing and is still under observation.

The public prosecutor's office said that "depending on the medical report on Mrs. Roosevelt, she will be charged either with attempted murder or with causing grievous bodily harm with full or partial responsibility."

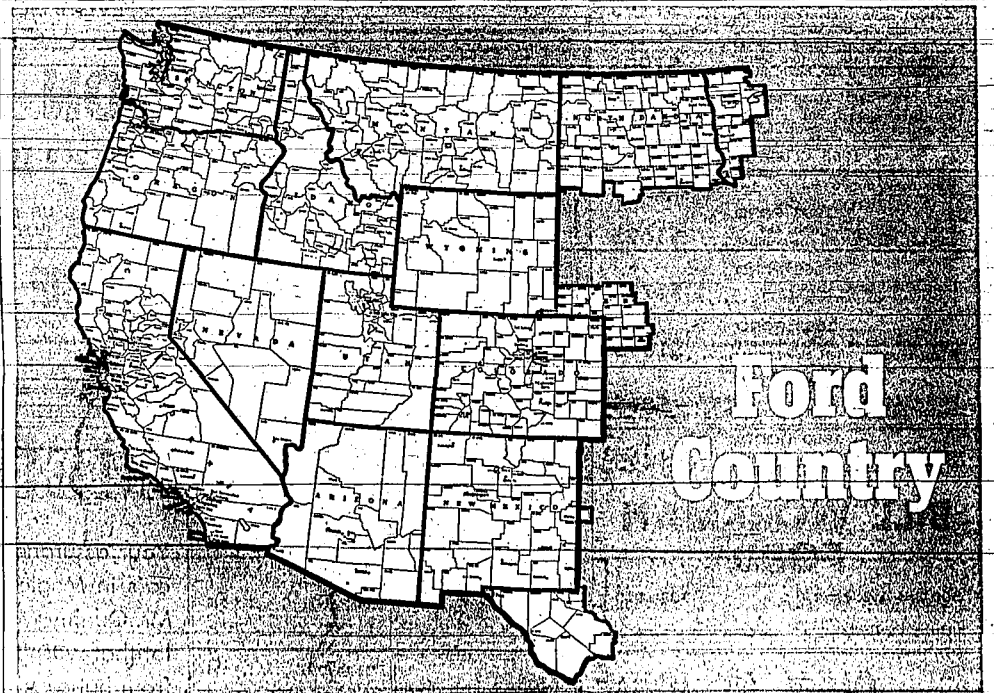
