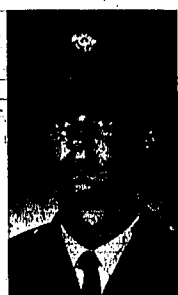

## Reagan Would Meet Students, Fears Outbreak Of Rioting

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — Gov. Ronald Reagan expressed willingness today to meet with students any time and at any campus for a discussion of grievances but voiced fear his appearance could trigger a riot. The Republican governor made the offer in the wake of a march on the state capitol Monday by an estimated 7,000 five-year-olds from colleges and universities throughout California. They demanded complete withdrawal of National Guard troops from Berkeley immediately and removal of a fence from around the bitterly disputed University of California — owned "People's Park."

Reagan's office. He did not appear and was not invited to do so. Police, alerted by a helicopter howl overhead, reported an incident. Security at the gold-domed Capitol rivaled safety precautions invoked when President Johnson campaigned in Sacramento in 1964. ## Hailey Meet Favors Control

HAILEY — Formation of a flood control district in Blaine county seemed almost a certainty Tuesday after the 100 persons attending a hearing in the courtroom district would include unanimously in favor of the plan. All of the 22 persons attending a districting hearing Tuesday afternoon, including county officials, and agency representatives and apartment. Kenneth Dunn, assistant State Reclamation engineer, said the proposed district would include 34,900 acres of land running from North Fork of the Big Lost River to Magic Reservoir. Persons involved in the district, which would provide a tax unit for flood control, would be limited to three categories: farmers owning property along the river, and farmers using water delivered through canals di-

verted from the river. It was attended by state reclamation officials at the hearing that only persons in these three categories will be taxed. The county commissioners could levy up to three mills, if a district is formed. Keith Higginson, Boise, State Reclamation engineer, said additional written testimony would be submitted to the reclamation office in Boise until June 6, at which time a decision will be made. If the district is formed, it will be the ninth in Idaho. The Reclamation Department will name three commissioners, representing the three categories of taxpayers, who will supervise flood control work. Each must be a property owner and voter. The county commissioners will be requested to submit names and names of volunteers also will be received. Vic Armacost, Walla Walla, Wash., Army engineer in charge of the emergency work

# Nixon Asks Formation Of Independent Corporation To Handle Nation's Mail

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon asked Congress today to scrap the Post Office Department as it now exists and to create in its place a government-owned but independent corporation to handle the nation's mail. Nixon told reporters that he considers the plan "one of the most significant" that he will make during his presidency. Such a move would do away with the most widespread and long established source of political patronage.

The architectural firm of Watson and Latham of Boise incorporated the ideas of the educational staff into the building to conform with special methods of teaching deaf children.

Since there are only two small windows in each classroom, the darkening of the room for projection of films or transparent drawings is a simple matter. Acoustic treatment of the floor, ceilings and walls reduces noise transmission in the classroom. Transmission loops were installed under the carpets and ceiling to provide wireless transmission of amplified speech and sounds.

Curtilment of noise and eue reduction by amplification of sound through hearing aids is an important factor in a classroom for children with usable hearing. Carpeted floors will also increase the enjoyment of tiny children whose activities are many times best performed on the floor.

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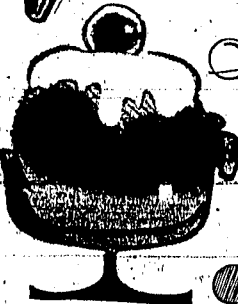
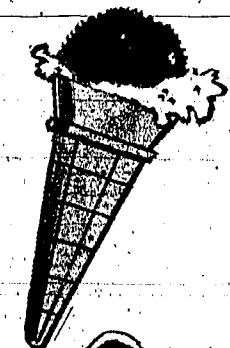
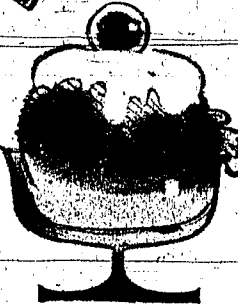
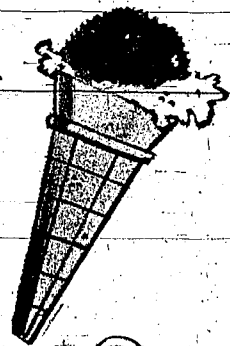
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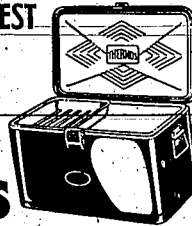
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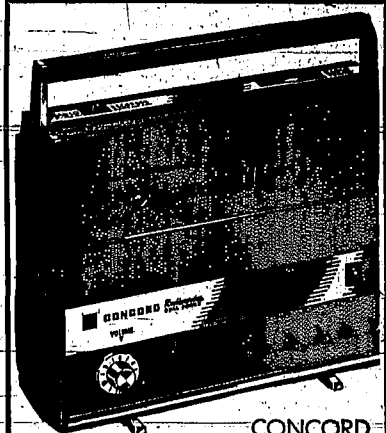
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WASHINGTON (NEA)—The image many Americans have of present-day Japan is most likely the one the television screen often shows—violent leftist armed with assorted weapons battling police wearing helmets and bearing shields on the streets of Tokyo.

But this flickering "portrait" is largely irrelevant. Behind the distraction of these periodic ugly characters, Japan is soaring to such incredible economic heights that it is beginning to threaten the Soviet Union's No. 2 world position. Japan's gross national product

collapsd that of Great Britain and France in 1967 and then surpassed the industrialized West German in 1968. Overall Japanese industrial output has more than tripled in a decade. The 100 million Japanese people today produce more goods than all the rest of Asia's 1.7

billion combined. Japan builds more than half of the world's merchant ships. It is the leading world producer of cameras, radios, motorcycles, watches, cotton yarn and other products. The United States in its output of automobiles, chemicals, television sets and man-made fibers. Only America and the Soviet Union have greater

of their households own television sets, and almost as many have refrigerators and washing machines. Family cars are becoming common. Author Peter Drucker, in his book "The Age of Discontinuity," offers a strong accolade: "The model of development today is that of Japan, not the United States or Russia or, indeed, any of the white countries."

All this economic activity leads to much exporting, which often gives the jittery to protectionist-minded Americans. The United States takes up to 30 per cent of Japan's total exports. But this is just one side of it. Japan is far and away America's biggest overseas customer, buying nearly \$3 billion in goods each year. This includes more than \$30 million in U.S. farm products.

Some experts like to explain Japan's success on the ground that the country is an island, whose total land area is only twice that of the state of Missouri. "It takes time to live" and thus is driven to extraordinary lengths by the survival instinct. Drucker scoffs that notion. Only 10 per cent of total Japanese output is exported and, despite the country's heavy reliance on imported raw materials, only 10 per cent of its national income is imported. By contrast, the figure on foreign dependence of the economy is 15 per cent for Britain and West Germany.

While the leftist uglies are playing their rough games in the streets, most of their fellow citizens are busy making the Japanese the most productive 100 million people on earth.

Notwithstanding this huge plowback into industry, the Japanese have become great savers. Their savings provide an immense amount of capital accumulation. The country's investment in new plants and equipment is the highest of any industrial power. A third of its gross national product finds its way into new plants and equipment in the United States.

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Teacher's Lot

The saddest commentary on the campus revolution that we have seen is voiced by a Harvard history professor as quoted by the Wall Street Journal. At Harvard, he said, a professor's two main duties—teaching and thinking—have pretty much gone by the boards. In their place are "terror and tension" among the faculty as a result of bomb scares, student strikes, office take-overs and police-student battles. "Most of us have taken our manuscripts (for new books) from our

university offices to our homes." This has been done, he explained, out of fear that student invaders might destroy them. "A student," says Webster, "is a person engaged in study; one devoted to learning; a learner; a scholar; esp., one who attends a school, or who seeks knowledge from teachers or books; as, the students of an academy or a university." Either Webster is obsolete, or Harvard is no longer a university, or a lot of young people are calling themselves by the wrong name.

They're Sick Of Sam Yorty

LOS ANGELES — The white majority of Los Angeles, though increasingly apprehensive about having a black man as mayor, is so sick of Sam Yorty it is likely to hastily — and perhaps narrowly — elect Negro City Councilman Tom Bradley today. That is the clear conclusion from interviews we conducted here in cooperation with the Oliver Quayle polling organization. However, the trend is in favor of Mayor Yorty, partly because of his hard-line campaigning (fanning racial fear). In 51 interviews with white voters largely in middle-income and lower middle-income neighborhoods of the San Fernando Valley, selected by Mrs. Beryl Winn, Quayle's expert supervisor in California, these were the results: 23 for Bradley, 22 for Yorty, 6 undecided. This represents a substantial gain for Yorty, who was favored by only 33 percent of these voters in the April 1 first-round runoff. Yorty stands to put most of the undecided in our survey and perhaps some shaky Bradley voters.

That Yorty will have to do much better than in his potential blackish areas such as the San Fernando Valley to win next Tuesday. The reason is a solid phalanx of black votes (around 17 percent of the electorate). As a test, we interviewed in the Watts ghetto and found a startling 32 out of 32 for Bradley. To overcome this bloc vote, Yorty needs white voters such as one young insurance agent who voted for Bradley April 1 because Yorty was "stiffing off on the job" but now has second thoughts. "More and more stuff about Bradley keeps coming out now," he told us. "I didn't realize at first how much he was having a party department." The result, he decided, is leaning toward Yorty. A similar case by a retired mailman, an employer who was appalled at a third Yorty term, then voted for TV newsmen Baxter Ward in the first-round runoff. "I'm just afraid of that black, by Yorty's re-balding. Nevertheless, he is today undecided and leaning to Yorty because 'I'm just afraid of that black.' He paved, grimed, then added: "Maybe Yorty got to me a little bit."

So far, however, such worries about Bradley seem insufficient to convert enough first-round undecided voters "frankly" into middle-aged lawyers told us. New Step In Space

A new assignment given Col. Frank Borman, commander of the first manned spaceship to orbit the moon, gives an insight into the exciting steps to be taken in space following the exploration of the moon's surface. Col. Borman has been assigned to supervising studies and design of space stations intended to be ready in the seventies for orbiting 50 scientists for a year or longer. When the first such space platform is put into orbit, it will mark a major change in U. S. space activities.

An intensive study of the earth's atmosphere and environment from space by a large crew of researchers and technicians can be expected to produce much additional knowledge about the planet useful to both military and civilian scientists. HIT THE SILK

It was just 50 years ago, on April 27, 1919, that a crowd gathered at McCook Field in Dayton, Ohio, to expect to see a nut named Leslie L. Irvin kill himself. The 23-year-old burgeoning balloonist and parachutist intended to make the first free-fall parachute jump out of an airplane. Many people had made jumps before, but always with a line attached to the aircraft or balloon which automatically opened the chute. Aeromedical experts of the day were unanimous in the opinion that a man falling through the air would lose consciousness before he could pull the ripcord. Irvin proved the experts wrong, though he did break an ankle. That same year he founded a parachute manufacturing company (now Irvin Industries, Inc.) and two years later organized the Caterpillar Club. Named after the little worm that made the silk of which early parachutes were made, the Caterpillar Club was opened to anyone whose life was saved by a parachute.

Today, that exclusive club has more than 250,000 members in 62 countries. Its members, none of whom really want to join, include such aviation heroes as Charles Lindbergh and Gen. James Doolittle. Ironically, Irvin, who died in 1960, never qualified for his own club. None of his more than 300 jumps was an emergency.

ABOUT THE WEED

Since 1964, when it was first brought into the state, the pesky water hyacinth has been choking Florida's rivers, lakes and canals. That and other aquatic weeds cost Florida more than \$60 million a year just in property depreciation, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Aquatic Weed Laboratory in Fort Lauderdale. In addition, it is throughout the rest of the nation could be more than a billion. Weapons to combat the menace in Florida have included everything from herbicides to underwater mowers to importing weed-eating manatees, or sea cows. It now appears that the odious hyacinth may have some use after all, since it thrives on such delicacies as sewage plant discharges, industrial and agricultural wastes and urban drainage.

In an experiment begun in 1967, hyacinths were planted in a two-acre, fenced-in area in a lake near Orlando. Within six weeks, the hyacinths had completely filled the area. Within three months, the weeds had removed the lake's pollution, reports the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

Floating Spots

Dear Dr. Hosteson: Please write about dark spots which float around in the eye. What causes them? What can be done to prevent them from becoming permanent damage to the eyes?—H.L.

These spots, variously called floaters, or vitreous floaters, or positive scotomata, are most common when a person is past 40. They are due primarily to chemical changes in the fluid in the eyeball. There may be one or several, and are seen most prominently when a person is looking toward the light. Very occasionally, they may indicate the beginning of an eye disease, so it is wise to have an eye examination. If — as is usually the case — the reply is, "They're just floaters," then forget them. Or try to. They can't be removed unless you let them. Actually, they do not really interfere with vision unless you are looking closely at something. They can be seen through a magnifying glass or microscope.

Even in such cases, looking at a slightly different angle will take care of the matter. Or, since these floaters may move about to some extent, that can take care of the matter. They do not obstruct enough to interfere with reading, for example. Sometimes the spots disappear; more often they don't, and you just have to get used to them. You can't do anything to prevent or remove them, but they are much more comfortable to live with once you know that they will not damage the eyes in any way.

Dear Dr. Hosteson: I went to an oculist to fit glasses and he said I had a white, sticky substance in my eye, and it is always wet. Can you tell me what it is and what can be done about it? I would like to find out what it really is before I go to an eye doctor. — A. C. K. I am constantly annoyed and irritated by a person who, after the excuse that they want to know what the trouble is before they will go to a doctor. The first purpose in going to a doctor is to find out if anything is ails you; the second is to be treated. So go to the eye doctor and find out. The white substance is probably pus resulting from infection.

Dear Dr. Hosteson: Why is it that couples who have always wanted a baby finally have one soon after they adopt a baby? I have known of cases where this happened a short time after they adopted a child.—D.M.

Note to T.E.K.: There is no remedy for color-blindness; it is an inherited trait that cannot be changed. The degree of color-blindness varies from person to person. Sometimes one group of colors is affected, sometimes another.

## Hysteria Is Blamed For Faintings

SHERMAN, Tex. (UP)—A form of mass hysteria has been blamed for the fainting spell which overcame about 30 women last week at the Texas Instruments plant here.

Dr. Tom Miller, who treated the women at Wilson Jones Hospital said Sunday that the sight of one woman fainting will often trigger a chain reaction—a sort of mass hysteria—and before long a number of women collapsed.

"When one gets sick or faints, it is normal for a bunch of women, especially young women, to feel simple fright and suddenly get the same symptoms," said Miller.

The women who work on classified military projects in the plant's framing department, felt sick or fainted Thursday night. The plant was evacuated and the midnight shift was told not to report to work, but the plant returned to its normal schedule Friday morning.

# Successful Investing

Q—My wife and I have \$10,000 to invest for retirement in nine to 10 years. What would be the best investment for us?—R.L.

A—In recent weeks several studies on an old theme have appeared in the financial press. They make satisfactory holdings over a period. As dividend increases follow earnings gains, share levels are likely to advance.

Five companies which have increased dividends annually for at least a decade are: Avon Products, Gulf Oil, Heublein, Magnavox and Warner-Lambert. Their current yields are not impressive—they average just over 2 per cent—but over a period of years when applied to the purchase price, the yield appears more generous. For instance, Avon shares bought 10



Do you advise changing these to H bonds, and how is this done? What are the denominations of H bonds?—H.S.

A—The exchange of H bonds can be made by your bank without charge. Their denominations are \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000. I don't recommend switching because your oldest bonds are accruing interest at the maximum rate of 4.25 per cent. The changeover would force you back to the lower end of the interest range for a year and a half.

# Business Today

By DEAN C. MILLER NEW YORK (UPI) — Help for the installment buyers of American-made automobiles arrives July 1 when the first part of the federal truth-in-lending bill goes into effect.

Some that day, department stores, automobile dealers, finance companies, banks, credit card issuers, savings and loan associations and the like must specify their finance charges in dollars and cents. Next year they also must tell the borrower or charger exactly how it figures out in annual percentage rate.

If the lenders or creditors fail to do this, and the borrower can prove it to be willful omission, the lender can be fined up to \$5,000 or jailed up to one year, or both.

Since U.S. consumers today are in for about \$90 billion in installment charges alone the new law affects virtually every family. It also is causing some apprehension among lending companies which resorted to technical, small-print ruse to confuse the borrower.

Most borrowers don't really know how much they pay for credit or that different lenders charge different rates. They either are too busy to read the fine print or not savvy enough to understand it. Some are confused when they try to comparison shop for credit or cash loans because lenders explain charges in different ways.

On and after July 1 the consumer will know beforehand exactly how much he's being charged — to the penny — for the credit he's getting. In checking around for the best credit bargain, he should remember that a dollar-for-dollar comparison works only when two loans, two installment purchases are for the exact same amount, or the same length of time and have the same methods of repayment.

When the percentile yardstick is available in 1970 the consumer will have two ways of checking. Take, for instance, cash loans. There are many sources and many rates for loans, a fact which will become more obvious to the borrower starting July 1. Small loan companies might charge anywhere from 24 to 42 per cent a year; credit unions usually charge about 12 per cent; and full service banks show a range of from about 9 to 16 per cent.

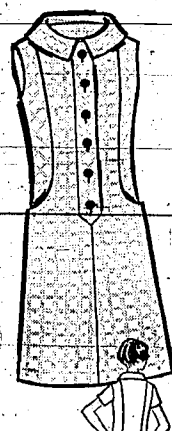

"To me," said Hughes, "the entire future of our party depends on our success or failure in reforming and revitalizing it. And it may well be that the future of the two-party system itself is in the balance."

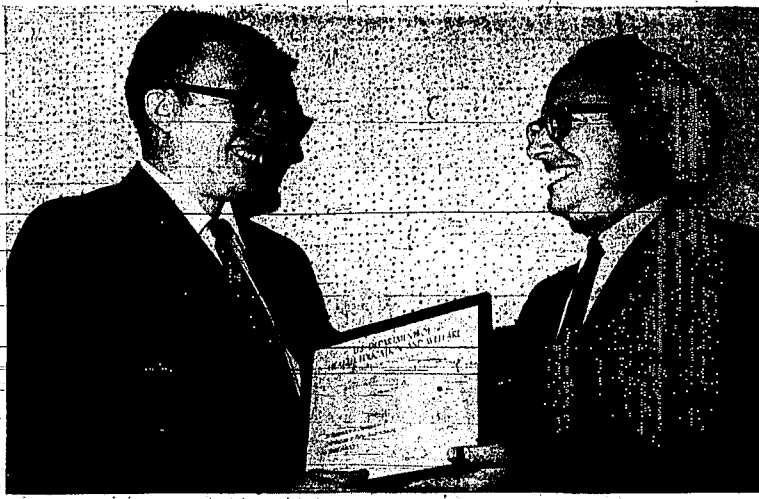

# Foyt Guns For Record Fourth Indy Win, Cites Trio As Likely Rivals For Prize

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—A. J. Foyt, accepting his role as favorite to win Friday's 500-mile auto race, pinpointed his major challengers Tuesday by listing Mario Andretti, Roger McCluskey and Bobby Unser as those in hot pursuit.

Foyt, however, a charger from Houston, Tex., has won the 500 three times and was

aiming not only to become the first driver ever to win a fourth time but also to become the eighth pole winner and the first since Parnelli Jones in 1963 to win the event.

Despite Foyt's near-record speed in qualifying the fastest to seize the pole, Andretti was second-fastest, Unser third, both sitting beside Foyt in the first row of starters and McCluskey sixth, and thus in the second row.

McCluskey is driving a car identical to that of Foyt, while another member of the Foyt team, George Snider, starting in the fifth row, has a machine almost alike—but a year old.

"I think Andretti, McCluskey and Unser all should make a good challenge," Foyt said. "I really thought Mario would get a shot at the pole."

Foyt figures that many in the field have a good shot at the top share of the purse expected to reach \$725,000 since his experience in the grueling test of more than three hours has shown him the varied mishaps that can happen.

One of them nearly put him out of the pole position this year. His engine developed an ailment on the second of his four qualifying laps and he nursed it the rest of the way.

"I wasn't going to gamble on the weather," he said. "Winning the pole doesn't make that much difference to me, but if you're going to be in front, you might as well sit on the pole. That way you can beat the rest of them into the first turn."

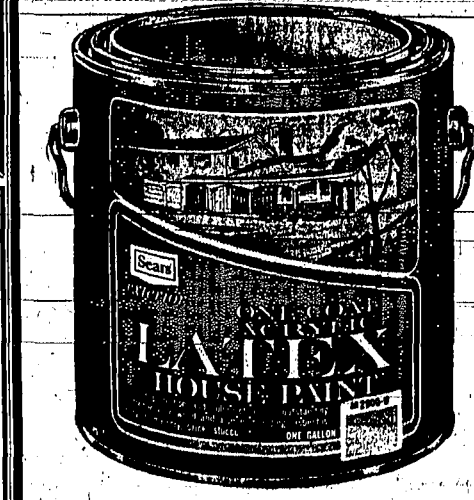

## SQUEEZE END PLAY TURNS THE TRICK

West's double of six trump was a typical rubber bridge bid. West didn't expect that South was going to make a slam against his hand but he should have been happy to pick up a small profit by setting his opponent unduly.

He almost surely would have set the hand without the double. With the double he told South how to make his contract.

South won the heart lead and had no trouble counting 11 tricks. He could make the 12th by leading a diamond toward his king provided that East held the diamond ace. That would have been the normal way to play the hand but the double had marked the diamond

ace in the West hand and it was up to South to find some other way to make 12 tricks.

It wasn't too difficult. South saw that a squeeze end play would develop almost automatically provided West held the jack and 10 of hearts in back of the queen that he had led.

There was no reason not to start by running off six clubs and discarding a spade and diamond from dummy. West had to make four discards and proceeded to jettison the eight of hearts, queen-six of diamonds and a spade.

Now South was sure that he had him in the vice. He ran off three spades and the unfortunate West had to throw away the jack of diamonds on the last spade. South let the nine of hearts go from dummy. It had done its work and could be spared.

Then South led his seven of diamonds. West had to take his ace and give South the last two tricks.
