

Reds Begin Viet Ceasefire

U.S. Loses 265 Men In Week

SAIGON (UPI)—The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese began a 48-hour truce for Buddha's 2,513rd birthday as promised today, with the U.S. Command reporting one minor violation.

Simultaneously, American headquarters released casualty figures showing the U.S. death toll has surpassed 5,000 this year, but is running 40 per cent lower than last year.

The report said 265 GIs died last week and 1,863 suffered wounds—a sharp dropoff from the 439 killed and 2,185 wounded the previous week in sharp fighting across South Vietnam.

According to their announcement last week, the Communists began their two-day ceasefire at 7 a.m. U.S. and South Vietnamese troops were pledged to a 24-hour truce beginning at 6 a.m. Friday which is the official national holiday.

Guerrilla gunners in the previous hours before the standdown shelled 30 towns and Allied camps, inflicting what U.S. spokesmen called "light losses," but followed up one of the barrages with ground attacks.

The first incident reported after 7 a.m. involved a group of Viet Cong troops, which a U.S. observation helicopter 20 miles northwest of Saigon. Military spokesmen said the "copter was hit."

Seven waves of B52s bombed a Communist bulldoze near Dak Tin in the Central Highlands overnight in one of their most concentrated strikes in recent weeks. Other Stratofortress Communist approaches to Saigon.

The latest fighting on a front southwest of Dak Tin Wednesday cost the North Vietnamese 46 men killed, bringing their losses in that area since Monday to 292 dead, Allied spokesmen said.

U.S. military spokesmen said such B52 raids and all Allied offensive operations would be halted for the one-day U.S. and South Vietnamese truce beginning Friday. It will be the first time the two sides have agreed to stop fighting at the same time.

South Vietnam's 17 million people are Buddhists. This is the first cease-fire for Buddha's birthday since 1967. Rarely do such standstills go without fighting on more than one front.

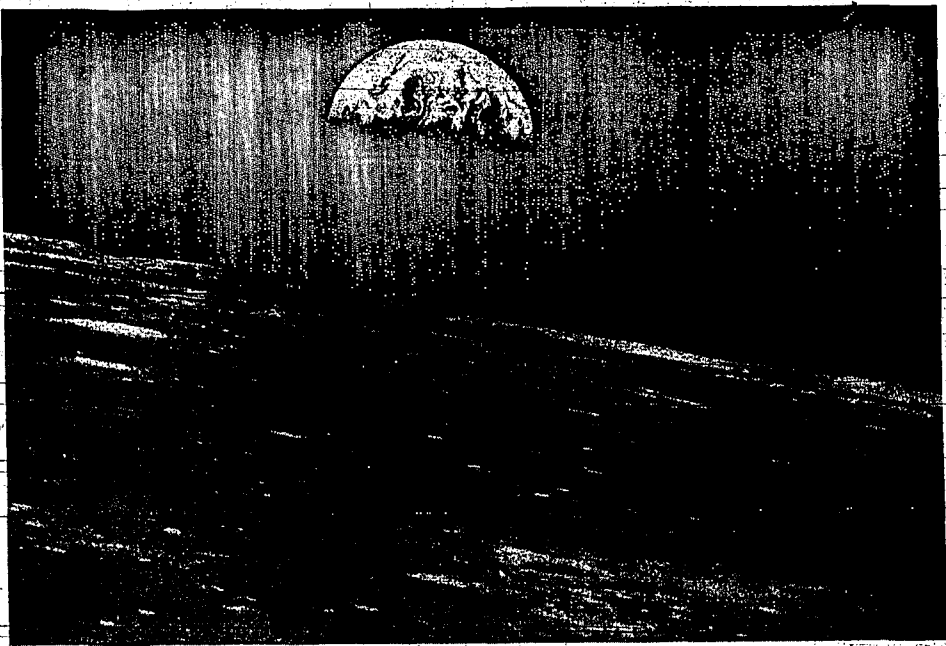
The level of fighting remained low Wednesday, with four skirmishes—two of them near Saigon—leaving a total of 11 Communist slain against eight American and South Vietnamese losses.

Rocky's Visit To Colombia Stirs Violence

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today wound up his visit to Colombia for the Nixon Administration and headed for Quito, Ecuador, where militant student and labor groups declared him unwelcome.

Anti-American demonstrations during Rockefeller's visit to Colombia left more than 50 persons injured. Rockefeller spent Wednesday in conference with President Carlos Lleras Restrepo and his cabinet to discuss the nation's problems.

Colombia is seeking a relaxation of controls on U.S. aid and a "billier" market price for its coffee export, coffee, along with a change to sell the United States other items, Rockefeller was told.

Student unrest erupted in the nation's four largest cities in the two days Rockefeller was in Colombia. Students firebombed the Colombian American Cultural Center in Bogota, and fought police in Bogota, Medellin and Barranquilla.

Rockefeller is on the second day of a visit which will take him to every Latin American nation except Cuba and Peru in the Nixon Administration's efforts to decide what changes are needed in U.S. policy toward Latin America.

Idaho Congressmen Query Foresters On White Clouds

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Sens. Frank Church and Len Jordan and Rep. Orval Hansen have released the text of a joint letter to the Forest Service regarding the proposed molybdenum mine at Castle Peak in Idaho's White Cloud mountains.

In the statement accompanying the release of the text of the letter, the three Idaho lawmakers said "we have posed a series of questions in order to accurately ascertain the limits imposed upon the Forest Service by federal mining laws in dealing with the American Smelting and Refining Co. applications until the present management study is completed."

"We seek the answers to these questions so we might have a better understanding of the extent of the administrative authority available to it under present mining laws."

"First, it is our understanding that regional Forest Service officials currently have under review the possibility of designating the White Cloud area for a special management program, which is a scenic or pioneer area."

"In view of this, is it the intention of the Forest Service to withhold acting upon the American Smelting and Refining Co. applications until the present management study is completed?"

"Second, if the company proceeds with its plans for further prospecting, what authority, if any, does the Forest Service have to control methods by which such prospecting is undertaken?"

"Third, if the company established a valid mining claim, does the Forest Service have authority under present law to: a) prohibit or restrict access to or from the claim; b) prohibit actual mining operations; c) regulate or control the type of mining involved, such as 'open pit,' strip, or subsurface; d) regulate or control the location on public land of mill buildings or slag piles?"

"Fourth, does the Forest Service possess administrative authority to withdraw the land in question from mineral entry?"

House Members Protect Pay Despite Shortage Of Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House voted with a payless raise already approved, Wednesday before going on Memorial Day recess.

During a short session, the House was told that because of the recent \$17,000 pay raise in salary, the amount at arms did not have enough funds to meet out their monthly checks on Saturday.

California Said 'Haven' Against Draft

WASHINGTON (UPI) — California has become a haven for young men seeking to escape the draft because of long delays in handling their appeals, according to Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of Selective Service.

In San Francisco youths seeking to avoid the draft can even count on help from more than 100 lawyers, Hershey says. "The problem was described by Hershey early this year during a closed session of the House Appropriations Committee in testimony not published until Tuesday.

Hershey said the large number of appeals was part of a campaign of "harassment" against draft boards, much of it by draft consulting committees who teach registrars to "take every possible appeal."

The Selective Service director said that in New York it had even been "advertised" that "if you want to escape service, go to San Francisco."

He said young men were advised that if they went to California they might get only three to six months probation for refusing to be inducted. During a recent six-month period, he said, 40 per cent of those refused to be inducted in San Francisco had come from out of state.

Hershey said the first step in seeking to avoid the draft was for the registrant to have his record transferred to San Francisco.

Then he gets tried at a place where the docket is so clogged that if a man is tried in a year or two we are lucky," Hershey said. "Then he starts making appeals. We have a hundred-some lawyers in San Francisco that offer service for nothing to any registrant who wants to fight it."

The legal help, Hershey said, came from the American Civil Liberties Union.

"Where the money is coming from I do not pretend to know," he said. "I do know it causes delay and some poor cuss has to be sent earlier than he should."

Gem Veterans Cautioned On Home Loans

M. W. Allen, director of the Boise Veterans Administration Center, cautioned Idaho veterans who will be transferring this summer to new jobs in new locations, to get releases in writing from the VA on their present G. I. home loans.

The VA official said private industry more and more, is following the long-standing practice of the military services and government agencies of transferring personnel during the summer to avoid disrupting their children's schooling.

"In the excitement of moving and concentration on the new job, it is easy to overlook the fact that even though a veteran sells his present home he is still liable for his G. I. loan unless the loan is paid in full or the VA releases him in writing from all future liability on the loan," Mr. Allen said.

He also pointed out that the veteran who sells his home because of a transfer to a new location will be entitled to restoration of the VA home loan guaranty in order to purchase a home in his new community if his old G. I. loan is paid off. Veterans may obtain additional information on release from their loan liability and restoration of their loan entitlement from the Boise VA Center, he said.

Twin Falls youngsters from ages 10 through 18 may strengthen their art skills and gain school credit this summer with a series of classes at the high school, according to George Wiltun.

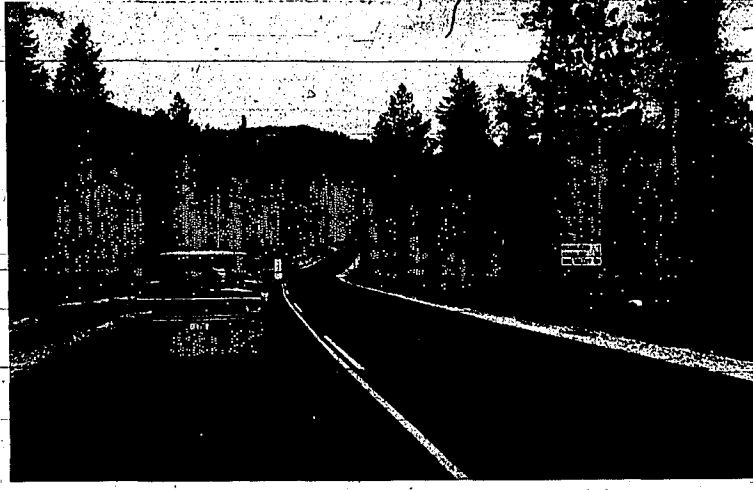

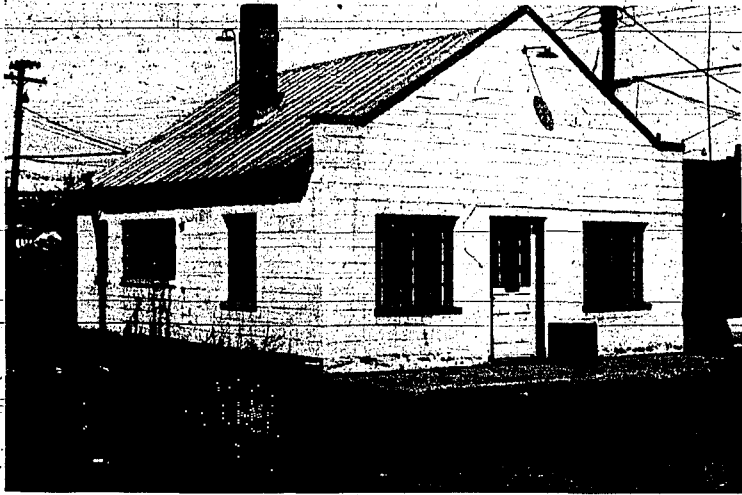

Camas County's Paul Cox Is A Friend Of The State Police

FAIRFIELD — If you are arrested for driving while under the influence in Camas County after 5 p.m. Friday you might just as well plan on spending the weekend in jail, says Sheriff Paul Cox.

Sheriff Cox, who was re-elected to office last November, is serving his second term as the county's only full-time law enforcement officer. Before he was elected the first time, he served half-year after being appointed to office.

Camas County is large in area but small in population. The county covers some 1,028 miles and the latest census lists 1,070 residents.

Sheriff Cox said those arrested for drunken driving after court hours on Friday are held in his tiny jail — maximum, five persons in law cells built for three inmates — until the judge comes on duty Monday morning.

"Knowledge of this confinement helps control the problem locally," the sheriff says. "Like many Idaho sheriffs, he is faced with a personnel problem. He has four part-time deputies who are subject to call and Fairfield, the county seat, has a town marshal.

"We just wouldn't have good

persons, often has held five or six, the sheriff said. Sheriff Cox has received a lot of help from the Idaho State Police and believes more troopers should be added to the state patrol.

"It would help," Sheriff Cox said, "if sufficient deputies could be appointed, but the counties can't raise the money for that purpose."

"A county can employ and equip a deputy for about half the cost of adding a state trooper, but the money just isn't there."

Recalling emergencies when heavy snows or floods plagued the area, Sheriff Cox said, "We were or would have been in serious trouble if the State Police hadn't come to our rescue."

The sheriff said he tries to handle all the vehicle accidents in his county and points with pride to the fact that Camas County hasn't had a traffic fatality since 1964.

"Those state troopers sure keep traffic honest around here," he said.

Even though he is the only full-time officer in the county, Sheriff Cox attends all the driving schools he can.

"There have been times," he said, "when one of the commissioners would take over so I could go to school."

Sheriff Cox hopes the state will be able to institute a police academy where training will be available to all officers and says, "A better communications system is the first requisite for better law enforcement."

Being sheriff, jailer and records keeper for Camas County is a full-time job and Lawman Cox feels fortunate in that he

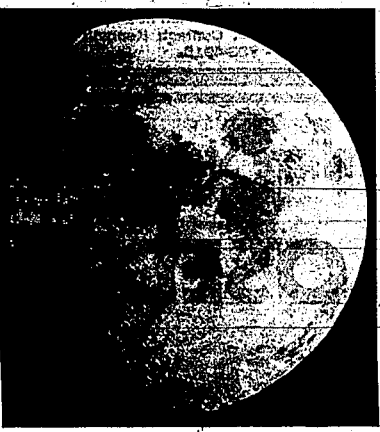

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—The pace of America's drive toward a July lunar landing quickened today with the Apollo 11 crew's first full-scale rehearsal of a moon-touchdown.

Astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin were to spend the day in a moon landing simulator at Cape Kennedy, practicing the final approach and landing with mission controllers in Houston, as though it really were taking place, a space agency spokesman said.

It is the first simulation linking mission control and the astronauts at the cape. Many others will follow, the spokesman said, going over every step in the flight to send Americans to walk the lunar seas.

In Houston, the crew of Apollo 10 who opened the door for the landing mission entered their second day of private debriefing sessions. The space agency planned a second release of pictures shot during Apollo 10's lunar orbit flight.

Astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, John W. Young and Eugene A. Cernan proved themselves excellent photographers during Apollo 10's eight-day mission. They orbited the moon 31 times and brought back photos in black-and-white and color, still and movie form, and some in three-dimensional stereo.

These pictures will serve as roadmaps for the Apollo 11 crew. And space agency geologist John Dietrich said nothing in the movies of the approach to the landing site reveals any surprises for the summer landing mission.

From the Apollo 10 photographs and tapes of the crew debriefing, the Apollo 11 crew hopes to learn much that will make the landing mission easier. Apollo 10 was a complete rehearsal of everything in Apollo 11 except the final touchdown.

The debriefing will last until June 7, when the Apollo 10 crewmen make their first report to the world on their flight.

'Comedy Of Errors' Blamed In Sinking

VALLEJO, Calif. (UPI)—The \$50 million nuclear submarine Guittaro sank at a Navy pier in a comedy of errors, during which one work crew pumped water into the bow to level the vessel while another poured water into the stern for an experiment, according to congressional investigators.

The submarine settled in 36 feet of water while undergoing final preparations for commissioning at Mare Island Naval Shipyard on May 18. Navy brass attended an Armed Forces Day dinner in Vallejo addressed by Assistant Navy Secretary James D. Little.

The Guittaro was refloated by shipyard workers in three days. Restoration work is under way.

A special three-member team of the House armed services subcommittee ended two days of closed hearings Wednesday and concluded the submarine sank as a result of "the concurrence of several wholly avoidable factors." Reps. Samuel Stratton, D-N.Y., John E. Hunt, R-N.J., and William J. Randolph, D-Mo., served as investigators.

The committee report said the "ultimate responsibility" for the accident must be borne by the Mare Island shipyard commander, Rear Adm. Robert Frankenberg—but the "proximate" cause of the catastrophe was "the deficient performance of the civilian supervisory personnel."

The congressman, from the testimony they took, worked out the following timetable for the accident:

—4 p.m. A civilian construction crew went aboard to begin calibrations which required pumping five tons of water into the aft tanks.

—5:30 p.m. Another crew of civilians went to the forward section to "trim" or level the ship by adding ballast water.

—4:30 to 7:30 p.m. Both crews poured water into separate ends, counteracting each other.

—7 p.m. and again at 7:30 p.m. A security watch advised the workers at the forward end that waves were washing into a manhole on the submarine's deck, but those warnings went entirely unheeded.

—7:45 p.m. Workmen in the forward end turned off their hoses and went to lunch.

—7:50 p.m. Workmen in the aft section finished their job and started emptying the tanks, but one noted the forward part of the ship was going down.

—8:50 p.m. The other crew returned from lunch as the Guittaro's bow dipped and water began pouring into open deck hatches. Efforts to close the hatches were unsuccessful because of numerous construction lines—and power—cables strung through the doorways.

—8:55 p.m. Everybody scrambled for the submarine, and it settled to the bottom, leaving only eight feet of its conning tower showing above the surface.

JFK Birthplace Dedicated As U. S. Historic Shrine

BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI)—The birthplace of John F. Kennedy was dedicated as a national historic site today, the 52nd anniversary of the slain President's birth.

Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, who gave birth to "Jack" on this date in 1917 in the master bedroom of the modest three-story house at 33 Beals St., presented the deed to the house to Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel in simple ceremonies.

The National Park Service will maintain the home and assist visitors at the shrine seven days a week.

The Kennedys, who sold the house in 1920 for a larger home nearby for their fast-growing family, repurchased it in 1965 and restored it to its condition when John was born.

Besides John Kennedy, his sisters, Rosemary and Kathleen were born in the gray-shingled, six-n-shuttered nine-room home.

The home, where the Kennedy children romped between 1914 and 1920, is distinguished now only by the city's historic plaque on the small front lawn and the 1917 vintage gas light in front. In other respects, it resembles most other dwellings on Beals Street—near Coolidge Corner.

Inside, the rooms are small, conservatively but smartly decorated, and reflective of Kennedy efficiency. Rose Kennedy's voice by tape recording echoes in each room as she recalls the childhood of her sons and daughters.

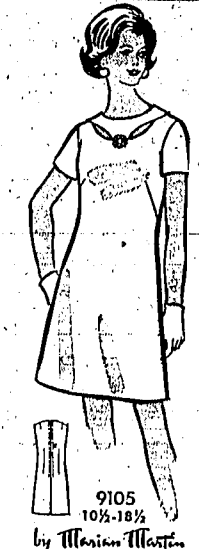
