Air West Asked To Start Jet Service



TWO MEN KICK through the wreckage when a car driven by Kenneth L. Scherbinske, 27, 1038 Sunrise Blvd. slammed into this garage behind 1337 Sixth Ave. E. at 7:55 a.m. Wednesday.

The car went across the lawn behind seven homes, knocking over fences and garbage cans, before ramming through the side of this garage. Two men in the neighborhood thought there had been an explosion when they heard the sound of the car smashing into the garage.

Start Of Runway Work Set

Construction of the main runway extension at Twin Falls City-County Airport is expected to start Aug. 1.

As a result, formal application has been made to Air West to start pure jet service into and out of this area as soon after Oct. 15 as practical.

At a meeting Tuesday afternoon, members of the airport commission announced advertising bids for the improvement project is slated to start July 10. Bid opening is scheduled July 24. Completion of the job would be pinpointed at Oct. 15.

Runway improvement, including lengthening the present base-west runway to more than 7,000 feet and installing high intensity landing lights, has been approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and the federal-aid program.

City and county funds will be used to match federal grants for the improvement work which will permit the DC-8, now used by Air West, to utilize the local field.

In addition, the runway would be long enough and heavy enough structure to permit certain type four-engine planes to land and take off here.

At the Tuesday meeting, City Engineer Jean Millar said much of the preparation work is running from one to three months ahead of schedule and Dale L. Riedesel, consulting engineer, was maintaining a very similar schedule.

Communications relative to the time schedule planned for the improvement were read by City Manager Hugh Derrick and W. J. Taylor, airport commission chairman.

Mr. Barry also read a letter from Sen. Frank Church pointing out that the airport has applied for federal aid under the program and that only 177, including Twin Falls, were approved.

Harry Merriek, new airport manager, told commission members and city and county officials that work on the enlargement of the terminal building is progressing, with completion expected about July 12. Earl Peck is the contractor.

Attending Tuesday session, in addition to Mr. Derrick, Mr. Barry, Mr. Millar and Mr. Merriek, were airport commission members: Mayor Robert O. A. (Gus) Keltner, Gary Bluck and George Cojner; City Commissioner Bob Warburg; County Commissioner Heber Loughmiller, chairman; Bill Chancey and Morris Carlson.

Car Crosses Seven Lawns; Hits Garage

Anyone living in homes between Sixth Avenue East and Elizabeth Boulevard in the 1400 and 1300 block had a rude awakening this morning.

The loud sound of a car swooping low across the back lawns, seven of them in all, was bad enough. But when that noise stopped with a crash, that was something else.

"D. A. Heider and Jack Stanger, working in a shop at 1344 Elizabeth Blvd., heard the noise. Jack, that sounds like an explosion to me," Mr. Heider shouted. They looked next door and saw a car sticking through a garage.

Kenneth L. Scherbinske, 20, 1038 Sunrise Blvd., jumped out of the wrecked car.

Police arrived on the scene at 7:55 a.m.

Officers said Mr. Scherbinske's car, headed toward downtown from the Joyce Ball Park, crossed Locust Street and slammed into a large hedge from there the car tore its way across seven lawns, knocking down several fences and garbage cans in its flight.

It hit a garage behind Mr. Stanger's house at 1337 Sixth Ave. A large section of the garage was torn away and the car Mr. Scherbinske was driving was damaged extensively.

Charges are pending as the investigation continues.

No one was hurt.

T.F. Trustees OK 2 Portable Classrooms

Plans and specifications were completed Wednesday for two portable classrooms to be built at Twin Falls High School and Bickel Elementary School.

The classrooms, which will accommodate from 20 to 25 students each, are needed to take care of increased enrollment in the school system. The school board authorized their construction at their regular meeting this week.

Yanks Repel Red Flamethrower Attack

SAIGON (UPI) — A force of 100 North Vietnamese wielding flamethrowers and burning explosives overran the defenses of a U.S. artillery base 40 miles south of Da Nang today but were driven back by the outnumbered defenders in hand-to-hand fighting.

It was the most spectacular of four such attacks by Communist forces and followed a night of 40 rockets and mortar barrages into South Vietnamese towns and Allied military camps, the U.S. Command reported in Saigon.

The attack against a 60-man unit of the 10th Light Infantry Brigade of the American Division at the American 11 dead and 22 wounded.

When the battle ended they found the bodies of 27 North Vietnamese inside their defense perimeters.

The battle took place west of Tam Ky, 40 miles down the coast from Da Nang. It was for S-55, William Cruise of 1st Airborne, took charge of the defense of the camp and refused to be evacuated although he was wounded in the fighting.

Later in the day he was awarded a Silver Star for valor on special directions from Maj. Gen. Charles M. Gettys, commander of the 11th Airborne Division. The award was reflected in the heroic action of the other men in the camp who cranked down their artillery and fired point-blank into the charging

Removal Of Books By MVCC Flayed

ALBION—Cassia County residents Tuesday were harshly critical of a proposal by Magic Valley Christian College officials to permit the college to take \$16,224 worth of state-owned books and equipment to its new campus at Baker, Ore.

Officials of the state-leased school made the proposal Tuesday at a meeting of the Idaho State Land Board in Boise. The board declined to immediately act on the proposal.

Dr. Donald R. Neilson, president of MVCC, was harshly criticized Tuesday after returning from Boise that the college feels this amount of state property is due it because of expenditures made on improvements by the college at the Albion campus.

Dr. Neilson said the college is asking permission to take the library—10,000 volumes—furniture, laboratory equipment and other items to use at the Baker campus where the college will move its operations.

State Sen. Joe Preston, R-Cassia, said Tuesday the land board had an inventory of all property at the college when MVCC leased it. The inventory, he said, included books in the library, some of which "could very possibly be the oldest in the state."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — History tells us the first thing Columbus did on wading ashore in the new world was to raise the flag of Spain.

Trans Magic Airlines Asks For Base At Airport In Twin Falls

Twin Falls City County Airport commission members Wednesday announced they have under consideration the application of Trans Magic Airlines to establish a base of operations at the local field.

The Intrastate airline, which is now based at Jerome, would enter into a full operation in Twin Falls if the application is approved. The application was made by Ross C. Lee, airline president.

In a "letter of intent," the airline head said the application was a formal request "to move the Trans Magic Airlines base to the Twin Falls Airport."

He pointed out that, merely a shift in point of operation would not be financially satisfactory for the airline. Therefore, he is applying for your No. 1 fixed base operation.

His application contained: "We would like to incorporate Trans Magic Airlines headquarters into this fixed base operation including complete fuel service, hangar and storage facilities, aircraft service department, aircraft sales and a complete pilot training school which would include instrument and multi-engine instruction."

"If our proposal is acted on favorably, we will develop first-class, red-carpet service at the Twin Falls Airport. Our hangar and flight school facilities will also be most attractive and will have an asset to your airport community."

"It is my intention to have the hangar constructed before winter which would coincide with the completion plans of your new facilities."

Firefighters will return for another board meeting Saturday, followed by general meetings in the morning and afternoon.

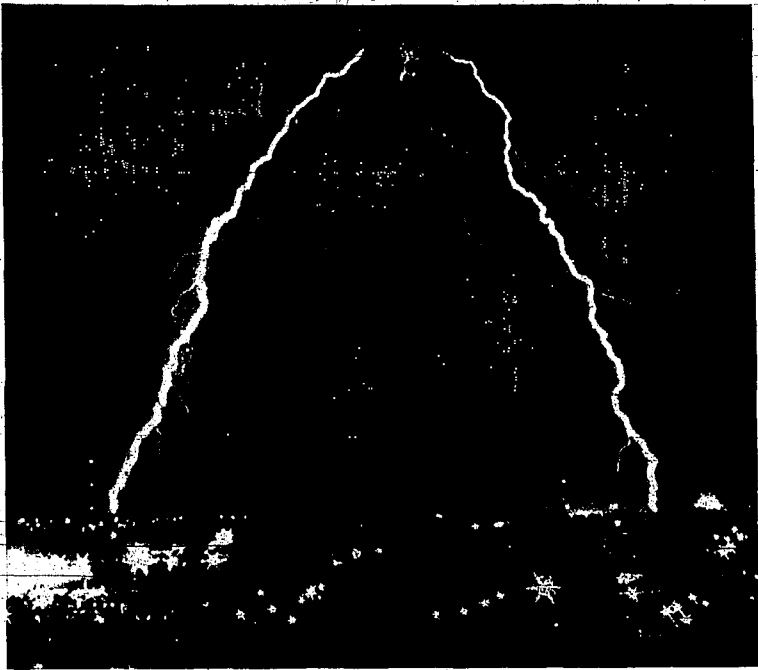

\$60,000 Grant To Aid Teachers

Twin Falls schools have been awarded a \$60,000 federal grant to help meet a "critical shortage of teachers," according to a Wednesday announcement by Assistant Schools Superintendent George Staudaher.

The funds were made available to the state by the U. S. Office of Education under a new State Grants Program authorized under the Education Professions Development Act.

Magic Valley is one of two school areas in the state to receive funds under this program. Selection was made on the basis of proposals submitted to the State Department of Education last April.

Staudaher said the money will be used to start an immediate recruitment drive for 20 prospective teachers to provide the high quality instruction and services consistent with its needs.

Coroner Reports On Crash Investigation

Investigations into two traffic deaths during the weekend have been completed.

Twin Falls County Coroner Clyde Edwards said his findings are based on an autopsy report on one person and x-rays on the second.

Ramando Rico, 25, Hidalgo, Tex., died at 6 p.m. Saturday of internal injuries and a blood clot on the brain, Mr. Edwards said. The car Mr. Rico was driving ran off the shoulder of Interstate 80N two miles east of the Hansen Bridge nine hours before he died.

Mrs. James Bowen, 50, Filer, died of neck and chest injuries, the coroner said. This was confirmed by x-rays after death, he said.

Mrs. Bowen's car went out of control near the KYFI radio tower on Highway 30 west of Twin Falls at 6 p.m. Saturday. Her car fishtailed out of control for about 500 feet before slamming through a billboard and coming to rest on its top. She was thrown from her car. Her husband witnessed the accident through the rear view mirror of his car.

He was driving just in front of her at the time of the accident, Mr. Edwards said.

"It appears she hit the curb with her right front wheel. This made the car bounce out of control, skid, hit the curb two more times, then run over the curb into the billboard," Mr. Edwards said. He said it's possible the steering might have broken when she first hit the curb.

Mrs. Bowen died about an hour after she was taken to Magic Valley Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Edwards said he investigated both deaths because both people died in the county, and he said that both deaths were accidental and at the time it was not known what circumstances led to the deaths.

In Mr. Rico's case, it was not readily apparent what injuries he suffered that might have caused death, Mr. Edwards said. In Mrs. Bowen's case it was the matter of the car going out of control without apparent reason, he reported.

Eye Surgeon Expelled By Texas Society

HOUSTON (UPI)—Dr. Conrad D. Moore, who claimed to have performed the world's first total eye-transplant April 22, has been expelled from the Houston Ophthalmological Society.

He made no comment.

Moore was kicked out of his professional society for what it called "unethical practice not in keeping with the standards of the community."

The society earlier had voted against accepting Moore's resignation.

The expulsion was the first action against Moore after he created a sensation in the medical community by first claiming, then denying, he had transplanted an entire eye.

The operation was performed April 22 on the right eye of a Corrae, Tex., photography shop owner, John Madden. He checked out of Methodist Hospital in Houston three weeks after the operation.

His wife said he could not see out of the eye but it had

"perfect movement and has feeling in it."

An American eye specialist said a successful total eye transplant would be "the miracle of the day." European specialists said such an operation was impossible at this time.

Immediately after the transplant, Moore spoke of it as "total" and discussed trying to unite the millions of nerve fibers of the donor eye to the recipient.

Three days later, Moore said it was an "anterior" transplant, meaning that only the front part of the eye was transplanted.

Boise Council Trims Increase In Salaries

BOISE (UPI)—Members of the Boise City Council voted Monday night to reduce the proposed salary increases for the mayor and the city council.

Councilman William Onweller moved to postpone action on the pay raise ordinance indefinitely, but his motion failed when Mayor Jay S. Amos cast a breaking vote.

A motion by council President Sherm Perry to lower the pay raises proposed in the ordinance, however, passed. This would mean annual salaries of \$16,500 for the mayor and \$14,000 for the council members—effective Jan. 1.

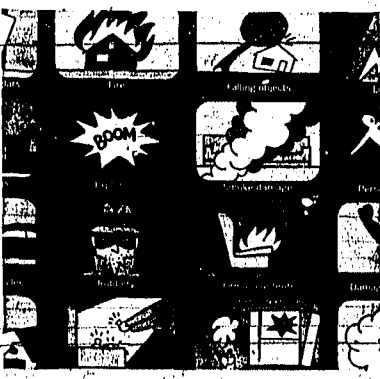
Just a week ago the council voted to raise the salaries of the mayor and council to \$17,500 and \$5,400 per year, respectively.

The Goals

How difficult it is to undermine the psychology of inflation has been pointed out anew by Albert T. Sommers, director of the economic research division of the National Industrial Conference Board.
After a year of war against inflation, Sommers said, "it is still pretty hard to find a genuine bear on the business outlook. And where there are no bears, there is inflation care of that too."
Experience thus far in 1969 indicates it is next to impossible to instill a spirit of inflation control when the government announces such fiscal relaxations as a cut in the tax surcharge early next year and its complete elimination sometime in 1971.
Higher interest rates and other anti-inflation measures now are causing business to slow its short-

WAS IT CEDAR?
A University of Pennsylvania scientist, Dr. Evelyn R. Rainey, put something of a damper on the attempt by Thor Heyerdahl to sail the Atlantic in a papyrus boat. Dr. Rainey says the adventurer is using the wrong kind of boat.

True, he says, the Egyptians did have papyrus boats 3,000 years ago. But he says they also made handsome craft from Lebanese cedar, and that is the construction he contends the Egyptians would have used had they decided to make such an extensive voyage.

"If I were going to sail the Atlantic," added Dr. Rainey, "I certainly wouldn't do it in a papyrus boat."
Perhaps not. But there is only one Thor Heyerdahl. Despite the likes of the cynics, if any man can sail the Atlantic in such an unlikely craft, it is he.

Fulbright: Foolish-Dangerous

WASHINGTON — That long-pending "sense of the Senate" resolution to hobble presidential authority over foreign policy faces vigorous opposition when it is finally taken up next week.
President Nixon is privately strongly against the politics-loaded measure.
Senator Gale McGee, D-Wyo., member of the Foreign Relations Committee who is leading the fight against the resolution, is urging the President to publicly assent to it. That is being considered by the President and his advisers.

Sponsored last year by Senator J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., "peace" chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, the resolution initially was aimed at President Johnson's Senate cloakrooms. It was generally deemed a "split" move by Fulbright because of pique at not being named secretary of state.

Despite Fulbright's strenuous efforts, he was unable to get the Senate to act on his resolution last year. So he offered it this year and after numerous one-sided hearings, in which his zealously recruited supporters greatly outnumbered opponents, the Foreign Relations Committee approved the scheme.

"This committee is a very lively peace" although, like Fulbright, he is not a peace man. He is for the historic Tonkin Gulf resolution authorizing President Johnson to retaliate against Communist attacks.

The Fulbright resolution, notoriously called by its backers "the national commitment resolution," in effect asserts that the President must not take military measures or make foreign policy decisions without prior approval of the committee.

In other words the purpose of the Fulbright declaration is to affirm that the Congress has equal power with the President in the field of foreign policy.

The Constitution places all authority over foreign affairs in the hands of the President. There are no ifs, ands or buts about that, even Fulbright and his cohorts admit.

They also concede that their so-called "national commitment" resolution is wholly unconstitutional and unwise.

It is purely a statement of opinion. The President is completely free in disregard of it. He is not bound by it. Privately, both Nixon and his Democratic predecessor, Lyndon B. Johnson, made that emphatically clear.

As far as Fulbright is concerned, the primary purpose of the resolution is to vent his egotistical spleen at Johnson, indignantly and justly.

tration jobs, is freshman Sen. Charles E. Goodell of New York. Goodell was incensed when, in mid-May, Dirksen spent 40 minutes attacking the absent Goodell behind the closed doors of a Senate Republican Policy Committee meeting.
Now Goodell is preparing a reply which, say friends, will be the sharpest criticism of Dirksen by a Republican since he became party leader in 1959.

Goodell is angry at Dirksen for holding up the appointment of Dr. John Knowles as Assistant Secretary for Health in the Health, Education and Welfare Department. He claims that Dirksen's threat to defeat the nomination on the floor of the Senate has the effect of forcing President Nixon to give a small clique within the American Medi-

cal Association (AMA) a veto power. Goodell is convinced that if Mr. Nixon sends Dr. Knowles to the Senate (as HEW Secretary Robert Finch wants) Dirksen will also chastise Dirksen for forcing President Nixon to oust William J. Brennan head of the Veterans Administration and for demanding the replacement of Clifford Alexander Jr., the then chairman of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, at a time when Dirksen, knew very well that the President had already made his decision to replace Alexander.

A footnote: This public rebuke of Dirksen, who is hawkish on the war and on the college campus revolution, might hurt Goodell in New York state, where he faces an uphill fight to retain his Senate seat in the 1970 Senatorial election.

The deep seriousness of President Nixon's growing tax problems was forcibly driven home Goodell by Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for tax policy, at Thursday's meeting of the House Ways and Means (tax-writing) Committee.

A prominent Democrat who perted to Nolan that no bill extending the 10 per cent surtax (due to expire June 30) could possibly pass the House today without a major "sweetener" tacked on. Even then there would be no smooth sailing.

Rep. Dear Dr. Thosteson: Although malocclusions are usually corrected by an orthodontist, I would like to know if protruding front teeth can be corrected by surgery. Plastic surgeons perform these jobs. Can they do something similar with teeth? — F.F.O.

In particularly severe cases, a plastic surgeon and orthodontist may work together to correct the situation.

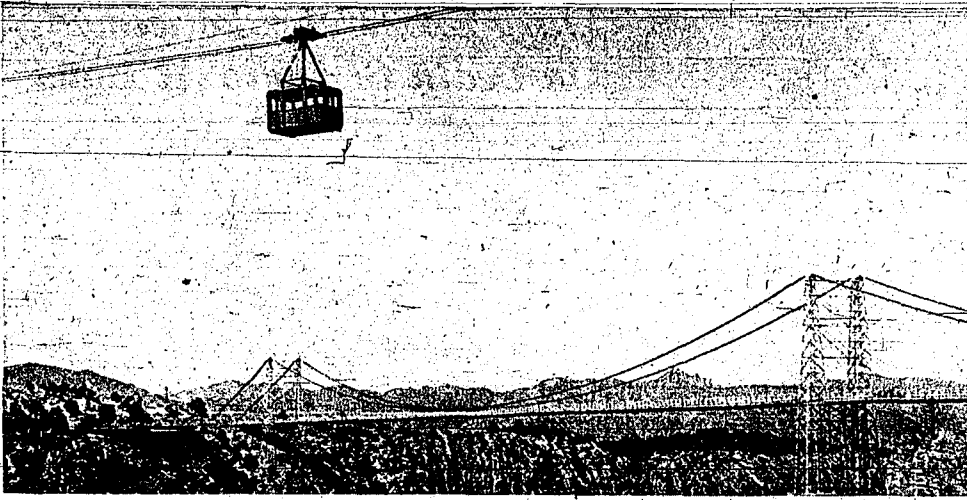

Preliminary Hearing Scheduled For 3 Who Escaped Jail Here

The first of several preliminary hearings for three men accused of escaping from Twin Falls County jail last Sunday will be held Thursday. None of the three will be represented by counsel.

Kenneth Moon, 35, and Patrick J. Kinner, 31, both of Seattle, and Earl S. Carver, 44, Marysville, are the accused in order. They are charged with armed robbery, destruction of county property, escape and first degree burglary.

The hearing Thursday, set at 10 a.m. in Twin Falls County Probate Court, is on the armed robbery complaint.

They will not be represented by an attorney, court records show, because they refused to sign a statement of financial condition.

Idaho law requires this to determine if a defendant can pay for his own attorney or if the county should furnish an attorney. Defendants can ask that counsel be appointed, but they must swear under oath they are not able to pay for an attorney's services.

According to court records, the three defendants in this case have refused to sign any such oath.

The three men were arrested Monday morning at the Twin Falls golf course clubhouse and charged with first degree burglary.

They were arraigned in City Police Court on the charges, and all three asked for a preliminary hearing. Bond was set at \$2,500 each. The hearing date has not been set in this case.

Then, Tuesday they were arraigned in Twin Falls County Justice Court on the charges of escape and destruction of county property.

Again, they asked for preliminary hearings, and for court-appointed counsel. The hearing for all three is set for 9 a.m. June 16. Judge Reed Maughan refused to appoint counsel because each of the three refused to sign a financial statement.

Bond was set at \$5,000 each on the escape and destruction of property charges.

Former-Grid Star Organizes Negro-Oriented Franchise

NEW YORK (UPI) — The black man needs to achieve success in business as outstanding as his performance in sports, believes Brandy Keys, ex-defensive backfield star in the National Football League.

Keys has launched a bi-racial company he expects to grow so fast it will make white American sit up and take notice.

It's called All-Pro Chicken, Inc., and is a franchised fast-food restaurant. It presently is based on a special batter for fried chicken developed by Keys who says he is an expert in the kitchen as on the gridiron — "but what I'm really depending on is sound business methods, not fried chicken batter."

All-Pro Chicken already has 10 stores in San Diego, where Keys started. Rochester, Pittsburgh and New York and expects to have 40 by year end.

A number of Negro athletes are investors in franchises, including actor Jim Brown, Lou Brock of the St. Louis Cardinals, Mat Snell of the New York Jets and Ernie Ladd, Ole Taylor and Buck Buchanan of the Kansas City Chiefs.

Keys' first New York City franchise was opened in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn by Walter Jeff, a Negro counselor at Queens College.

"We expect to have a lot more black franchisees and have made arrangements that can provide almost 100 per cent leverage for the \$40,000 required to open a franchise," said Keys.

He emphasized that All-Pro is a bi-racial company. Chairman of the board is Walter E. Gregg, a former executive vice president of Crumble's Grocery, Inc. Says Keys, "We intend to demonstrate that a company with a black president and a substantial number of black franchisees can make it big in the business world just as black athletes have done in the big leagues and the Olympics."

Principal financial backer of All-Pro Chicken is a small business subsidiary of New York's huge First National City Bank. Philip C. Smith, president of the subsidiary, decided to lend Keys \$250,000 after other bankers told him bluntly, "You have an excellent franchising idea, but we're afraid to risk the money on a Negro management."

"I don't really blame them for refusing," said Keys, "because bankers are conservative by nature and they had no model or precedent to go by. I intend to give American bankers the model of the company with successful black leadership."

One important figure in All-Pro Chicken is Keith Williams, a youngish Negro graduate of Harvard Business School who raised \$80,000 to buy New England territorial rights.

Some years ago, the Negro scholar, Dr. W.E.B. Dubois, said that the great contribution of the Negro athlete was that he destroyed a smug philosophy that afflicted too many educated black men, the feeling that "I'm doing pretty good for a Negro."

Czechs Face Stiff Increase In Already High Living Cost

PRAGUE (UPI)—Under new price increases effective Tuesday, the average Czechoslovak wage earner would have to work four years—without spending a penny—to make enough money to buy one of the cheapest cars sold in the nation.

Before Tuesday, it would have taken him two and one-half years to buy the same car.

The increases were part of a series of new regulations announced Monday by the Communist government, apparently aimed at pulling money out of the nation's overheated economy and relieving at least some of the inflationary pressures which have developed in the past year.

Also announced was an increase in the resale tax—in some cases up 60 times. By

raising the tax, the government also eliminated a prime source of private enterprise in the country.

Officially the new measures were designed to reduce "highly profitable speculation," according to the CTK news agency.

Before Tuesday, it was possible for a citizen to wait several produced cars at the government fixed price, then sell it within a few weeks to someone not willing to wait. In this way, the seller could make as much as a 60 per cent net profit.

The transfer tax was expected to be felt especially by emigrants who had planned to sell their car for a sizable profit before leaving the country.

Economic sources noted the government by imposing the

new measures also hoped to harden Western currency from residents who want a car but do not want to pay the high prices in local currency.

Prague Radio Monday announced a series of changes in the Prague city Communist Party Committee which indicated a major shakeup in the liberal party organization.

At a plenary session the committee elected a new nine-member presidium to replace the one which resigned June 2. Two of the "old" presidium members were re-elected.

The Czechoslovak interior ministry said Vera Blackwell, a U.S. citizen now living in London, was expelled from Czechoslovakia Saturday "for work against the interests of the republic."

CTK said she had gone to Prague and "mediated" between Czechoslovak and Czech emigre Pavel Tigrid, publisher of the newspaper "Svedectvi" in Paris.

The agency also said Miss Blackwell had written "propaganda" broadcasts hostile to Czechoslovakia for Radio Free Europe in Munich under the alias "Vera Lunackova."

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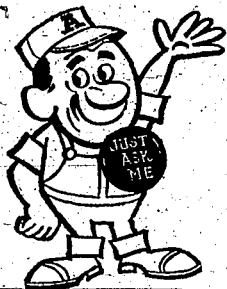

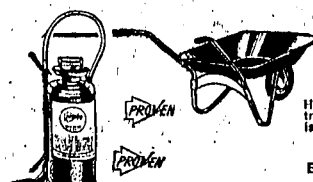

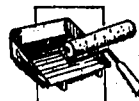

Child Development Center Staff Being Assembled

Paul Burnett, director of the Child Development Center which will be constructed here, has established his office at 1043 Blue Lakes Blvd. N., and has begun assembling his staff. Mrs. Jado Addington has been hired as office secretary. Paul Thorpe, Springdale, Utah, who has a master's degree in sociology, will also be coming to the center in a few weeks. He will be the center's social worker. Mr. Burnett said he hopes to hire a psychologist and nurse shortly. He said the qualifications set for the positions are higher than those for other similar jobs.

For instance, a social worker must have a M.A. degree and two years experience in public health nursing. Mr. Burnett said he also has a commitment from a majority to the center in a few weeks. The director said the actual construction of the center has been held up somewhat due to the number of state and federal agencies which must approve the plans. The regional Health, Education and Welfare office in Denver, Colo., had questioned an easement on a ditch on city property in the area. This matter was cleared up and the Department of Labor is now reviewing the wage scale paid by contractors in this area.

Mr. Burnett said as soon as these forms are returned, the state will advertise the bid opening date. The building will be built on Harrison Street near Falls Avenue. The property was given to the state by the City of Twin Falls for the construction of such a facility.

Mr. Burnett said the center plans to concentrate mainly on pre-school children, since this is where the lack of service seems to be. He said the earlier the problems can be diagnosed in the person, the better the chance he can be treated and helped to live up to his capacity. Mr. Burnett said the center services will not intrude on the existing agencies in the community for aiding the retarded. Idaho Chief Ponders Ties With Council

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gov. Don Samuelson told the Federation of Rocky Mountain States that if Idaho business and industrial leaders do not show more interest in it, he should reconsider membership in the federation.

Samuelson told the federation at a special meeting in the nation's capital that Idaho is really torn between two regions—the Pacific Northwest and the Rocky Mountain Region.

"We have substantial economic, financial and transportation ties with the Pacific Northwest," he said. "Water planning and development is vital to our state and we are in the Pacific Northwest River Basin Commission."

"The Pacific Coast forms the great market for our agricultural products and we are very compatible with the northwest in terms of forest and land problems."

"On the other hand," he said, "we also have substantial compatibility and common interests with the states of the Rocky Mountain Region."

"This is particularly true in the areas of transportation problems, small populations with great potential for development and, again, public land matters."

He said whether Idaho continues its participation in the federation, however, basically is up to members of the Idaho board of directors.

"It is vital to the success of the federation that we have continued active participation from Idaho business and industrial leaders of the state," he said. (Includes earlier)

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Land Board Considers Plan To Stimulate Desert-Entry Efforts

BOISE (UPI)—The State Land Board is considering a proposal made by the Idaho Water Resource Board to stimulate desert land development under the Desert Land Act through a four-pronged program.

The proposal would require a prearranged agreement between the Water Resource Board, financial institutions, the Bureau of Land Management and the Land Board.

"We need to know if you are sympathetic and interested in this approach," Resource Board Director Robert Lee told the Land Board.

Atty. Gen. Robert Robson said the approach was interesting but added he feared "there might be some real problems in lending the state's credit."

Robson also pointed out several other legal problems with the proposal but agreed to meet with Resource Board representatives later this week to discuss the legal difficulties.

Under the proposal it was pointed out that entrymen under the Desert Land Act are faced with the problem of interim financing since long-term loans are not available until they have the patent to the land.

Lee said in order to obtain a patent, an irrigation system must be developed and the hang-up comes in obtaining money.

The proposal by the Resource Board would provide for the location and sale of the entryman's assignment as state land in lieu of land worth \$400 an acre in timber.

"The banks have indicated a willingness to provide loans in cooperation with the Water Resource Board for the interim period if the loan is backed by pre-arranged agreement," Lee told the Land Board.

But Robson said, "As trustees of the endowment fund we must get the highest value for our in-lieu lands . . . If we were to take desert land worth \$100 an acre in lieu of land worth \$400 an acre in timber, we wouldn't be fulfilling our duty."

Acting Gov. Jack Murphy told Lee, "The legislature spoke loud and clear in telling the Water Resource Board to develop the state's water and land resources. You are to be commended for working in the right direction."

The board, however, declined to put any immediate stamp of approval on the proposal.

Also on hand for the presentation by Lee were representatives of the banking institutions and the Bureau of Land Management.

The board also wrestled for more than an hour with two problems stemming from the Bureau of Land Management takeover of leased farm land in Madison County for the Teton Dam project.

Two Rexburg men, Clyde P. Parker and Robert Ricks, both longtime farmers and owners of state land, poured out their problems to board members but walked out of the meeting room in much the same shape as they walked in.

Ricks wanted the state to trade a piece of land with the federal government and then allow him to lease the newly acquired state land. He said he had tried earlier to buy the land in question.

A state landowner and leaseholder since 1934, Ricks used a map and aerial photos to show the board the 200 acres.

A statement by Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler said President Nixon had ruled out the possibility of wage-price controls. Ziegler said no such controls will be imposed even if Congress fails to approve extension of the executive order charge expiring June 30. The possible alternative to Congressional inaction had been raised Tuesday by Treasury Secretary David M. Kennedy.

Nicklaus, Palmer Admit They Have Problems On Eve Of U. S. Open Meet

HOUSTON (UPI)—Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer aren't scaring anybody these days—on the eve of the 1969 U. S. Open Golf Championship, both of them admit they have problems.

"I know what I'm doing wrong," admitted Golden Bear Nicklaus after playing an 18-hole practice round over the steaming Cypress Creek course where a field of 139 pros and 11 amateurs open battle Thursday in the 72-hole contest for the title won last year by Texan Lee Trevino.

"I just haven't been able to correct it," said Nicklaus. The two-time U. S. Open champion from Ohio didn't disclose what his problem is, but he hasn't won a tournament since San Diego back in January and on Tuesday, he dropped a little Nassau money to Palmer's two.

Palmer, getting ready for the last Open he'll play under the age of 40, also knows what he

has been doing wrong in recent years and he thinks he may be correcting it. It's his "concentration."

And strangely enough, being forced to qualify in sectional competition to earn a spot in this year's Open may have been helping him in disguise that helped him find the cure.

"I went out there knowing I had to play well to qualify," explained the Latrobe, Pa., star, whose eligibility for an automatic starting berth expired this year. "It forced me to concentrate. It was like in the old days when more about I was going to get to the next stop on the tour."

"In tournaments I have been going out there trying to win, but then when I would play a bad shot it would start me thinking I had shot myself out of it," Palmer continued. "In the qualifying, I went out there not-trying-to-finish-first-but-trying-to-finish-in-the-top-eight. As a result, I finished first."

"As you get a little older you have a tendency to let up just a little," Palmer said. "And you think little more about the things that can go wrong. You say about a shot, 'Uh-oh, I've missed that shot before.'"

Palmer, now nine years past his only Open triumph, qualified with a 70-68 in Pennsylvania. Both he and Nicklaus have been getting into their practice here and after their 18-hole workout Tuesday, they spent time on the practice tee and then went right back out for another nine holes despite the 93-degree heat and 41 percent humidity which combined to make it hot going over.

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Pope Says Catholic Church 'Not Ready' To Join Council

GENEVA (UPI)—Pope Paul VI told the Protestant-dominated World Council of Churches (WCC) today he was praying for an end to what the WCC called the "scandal" of a divided Christianity. But he said the time was not ripe for Catholics to join the council.

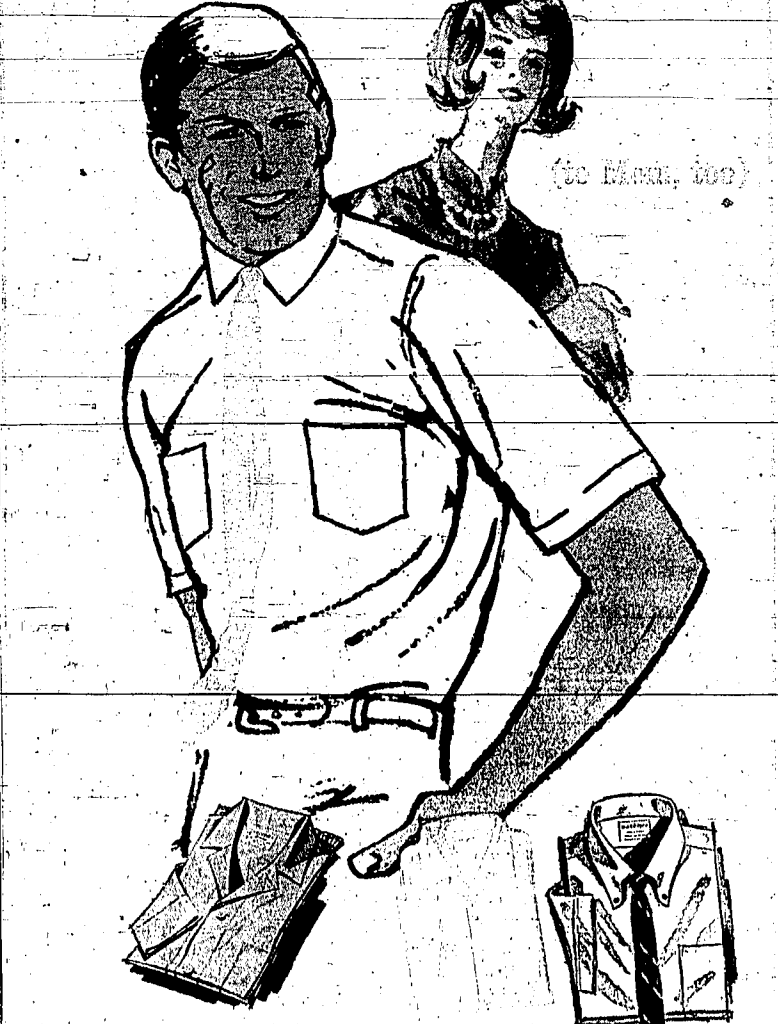
The pontiff, 71, came to this "Rome of Protestantism" today at invitation of the International Labor Organization (ILO) to observe its 50th birthday. He received the smallest welcome of any of his seven trips abroad since he became Pope.

In a 3,500-word address to the ILO, the Pope made an impassioned plea for social justice for working men. He also warned that "the peace of the world is at stake" and "Should the Catholic Church become a member of the World Council?"

"In fraternal frankness, we do not consider that the question of the membership of the Catholic Church in the World Council is so mature that a positive answer could or should be given," he said. "The question... contains serious theological and pastoral implications."

Radio Net For Doctors Studied

Dr. John Doe might, in the near future, hear a crackling noise then the pleasant voice of a receptionist, and he will be on his way to the hospital, thoughts and energy aimed at saving a life.

The voice he will hear won't come over a telephone line, it will come by radio.

What is being studied now by members of the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital board of directors is straight out of Dick Tracy, but in this age of electronic miracles anything is possible.

Just how possible is the problem being given close attention by the board members and a special committee.

The proposal is to have all Twin Falls physicians carry with them a small radio receiver — a receiver that will pick up a transmission from a base station up to 18 miles away.

This doesn't mean the physician will have to carry the receiver with him all the time. It could be a little uncomfortable in the shower, for instance. But it does mean the physician can be contacted when he is away from a telephone.

On-call physicians also will have their radios available in case they are needed in a few minutes' time.

The system employed by the hospital now is effective. The study being made is to see how this present system can be improved to its maximum.

Right now the hospital keeps a list of on-duty physicians, in cases of emergency. If a patient comes in and the regular family physician can't be reached, the nurse may, with the consent of the family, call in a physician who can treat the case.

On-call physicians leave a telephone number where he can be reached at any time of the day or night.

Several physicians interviewed about this method have said it is the best system available in the area, considering Idaho does not have a program for interns and resident physicians.

And, even where there are interns and residents, a patient's family physician is consulted first. Only when the family physician can't be contacted does the resident or intern act, and then only under the supervision of another physician certified by that hospital.

Although a broken leg may seem like a dire emergency to a worried mother, the patient is in little real danger.

And emergency cases at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital for which the immediate attention of a physician is required are very rare.

Nearly 90 per cent of the ambulance calls made by Magic Valley Ambulance Service are of a non-emergency type nature. These calls include moving a real home patient from one place to another.

Of the remaining 10 per cent, according to Cloyce Edwards,

owner of the service, a small percentage are critical emergency cases. The critical cases include

ambulance personnel and nurses at the hospital are capable of taking care of these cases until a physician arrives.

Despite the technicalities involved in emergency treatment, the determination of each case as it comes in, and the organization of the present system, there has been criticism.

Some complain physicians are too slow in getting to the hospital; others allege physicians don't show up.

The controversy rages, back and forth. It is a problem heard nationwide, in states that have complete medical programs and staffs, and in states that don't.

Each case has to be considered individually at Magic Valley Memorial, but in the end, the chances are excellent there will be a physician available if you need him.

The board is just studying an approach that may make the present system better.

What it involves is putting in a base radio station at the hospital, another small station in ambulances in the area, and furnishing physicians with radio receivers.

An emergency comes in. The hospital is notified, usually by telephone from the police station or sheriff's office. The ambulance attendant can then call the hospital and inform the radio operator of the nature of the emergency.

A call could then be put out to a specific physician, say a

friend.
