## Committee Votes To Authorize Sawtooth Bill

WASHINGTON (Special)—The Senate Interior Committee Wednesday approved legislation to authorize the National Recreation Area in the heart of the Sawtooth area.

The action by the committee, on which Idaho Sens. Frank Church and Len Jordan hold senior positions, was unanimous.

The legislation is expected to be brought up for a Senate vote in the near future.

Sen. Church said the national recreation area "is designed to preserve one of the most beautiful mountain and valley settings in the west. It is the distillation of years of study and effort by the people of Idaho, their elected senators and congressmen, and agencies of the government."

Sen. Jordan termed the measure "a unique and coordinated program for diversified outdoor enjoyment."

The legislation, which grew out of extensive hearings in both Idaho and Washington was first approved by the Senate in the 90th Congress, but did not reach House consideration at that time.

The recreation area will encompass more than 350,000 acres. Of this, 200,000 acres are in the National Forest Primitive Area; 117,000 acres are in National Forest lands; 23,000 acres are in private ownership; 10,900 acres are in federal unreserved public domain lands, and 1,600 acres are in state ownership.

Sen. Church noted the measure "cannot be the secretary of agriculture to expedite studies for the inclusion of the high mountain country — now the Sawtooth Primitive Area — in the national wilderness system."

He stressed that creation of the recreation area would assure the additional facilities needed to accommodate the increasing number of visitors who come to the area every year.

Sen. Jordan noted that the legislation enabled private landowners to cooperate in establishing the recreation area.

Scenic easements will be used to preserve the character of the area, rather than purchase of private land, he said.

"Landowners will be compensated for keeping their operations," he said.

## CSI Gets Grant To Buy Library Books

The College of Southern Idaho is among eight Idaho institutions receiving basic and supplemental grants for the purchase of library materials, the announcement was made Wednesday by Rep. James A. McClure and Sen. Len B. Jordan.

The CSI grant is for \$7,787. Dr. James L. Taylor, college president, said, "We are thrilled to receive a grant of this amount." He said the \$7,787 was what the college had requested.

The grant will be used for the acquisition of books for the library—primarily reference books.

The Office of Education has approved 4,646 grants nationally totaling approximately \$25 million for the purchase of library materials. Other Idaho schools receiving funds were Boise State College, \$15,943; College of Idaho, \$6,134; Idaho State University, \$3,142; Lewis-Clark Normal School, \$6,349; North Idaho Junior College, \$3,832; Northwest Nazarene College, \$6,481; and the University of Idaho, \$18,158.

Basic grants are limited by the Higher Education Act to \$5,000 to each institution and each branch of such institutions. Recipients are required to match the basic grant with an equal amount of non-federal funds.

## Airline Backed

Norm Turner, a member of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Airport Committee, appeared in Boise Thursday afternoon at a public hearing on the Trans-Magic Airlines application for a permanent appointment for operation of an intrastate air service.

In a special meeting Wednesday the Chamber committee adopted a resolution backing the application. The resolution had previously been adopted by the chamber board of directors.

The resolution recognizes the need for an intrastate airline and said it seems economically providing air services to a number of cities in Idaho.

## Airport Work Plans Studied

Nance Early, a representative of the Federal Aviation Agency, Salt Lake City, was in Twin Falls Thursday to discuss and review specifications for the runway extension at Twin Falls City-County Airport.

He met with Jean Miller, city engineer, and Dale Riedel, consulting engineer for the project. Mr. Riedel has already submitted some plans to the FAA. These plans were being studied and Mr. Early was expected to make some suggestions or approve the specifications.

Mr. Miller said this is one of the steps necessary before beginning the actual work on the runway.

## Israeli Jets Pound Jordanian Foes In Retaliation Raids

By United Press International—Israeli government officials said today the death of an American tourist during an Israeli-Jordanian border clash earlier this week triggered a series of massive air strikes against Jordan on Wednesday—the heaviest since the end of the 1967 Six-Day War.

They said the raids carried out by twin-engine bombers and fighter-bombers along the Jordan River were to punish the Arabs for 589 cease-fire violations since January but the death Tuesday of an American tourist, Shirley L. Anderson, 25, near the Dead Sea, brought the decision to attack across the Jordan River.

Israel reported two more major treaty violations today and said eight Arab guerrillas were killed in two firings in the occupied Golan Heights area of Syria and the other in the Gaza Strip. They said there were no Israeli losses.

The first clash took place about nine miles south of Quneitra on the road to Damascus and the Israelis captured four Soviet-made rifles and a number of hand grenades. The other clash took place near Mefalim in the Gaza Strip.

In still another incident an Israeli soldier was slightly wounded this morning when his jeep hit a mine near Quneitra.

Jordanian military sources in Amman agreed Miss Anderson's death was the immediate cause of the Israeli attack. But they also cited the "increasing effectiveness" of their army's long-range artillery against Israeli positions.

A military communique distributed to newsmen in Tel Aviv said that since May 13, Israel had become an almost daily occurrence, with Jordanian salvos concentrated mainly in the sector north of the Dead Sea.

The target area for the air strikes Wednesday ranged from the north coast of the Dead Sea to 38 miles north of it.

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## Woman Shot In Hip, Four Juveniles Held

A 22-year-old Twin Falls woman was shot in the hip early Thursday and county sheriff's officers are trying to determine the circumstances of the shooting.

Four juveniles are being held in connection with the shooting, but are charged only with curfew violation. Sheriff Paul Cordery said they probably will face court action on the charges of curfew violation.

"They've given different stories of what happened, so we're still investigating this case."

It all started at 3:30 a.m. Thursday when two youths stopped at a house at the junction of Highways 74 and 93 south of Twin Falls.

"A woman's been shot," one of the youths told the home owner.

The home owner, identified by officers only as Mrs. Midlock, called police. The youths got in their car and left.

They next were seen at the hospital. Deputy Sheriff Jim Turner took them into custody.

The sheriff said the juveniles were interviewed again at an attempt to piece together the puzzle surrounding the shooting.

## Two Die

SHELLEY, Idaho (UPI)—Two teenagers were killed in a Wednesday afternoon, police said, when a car in which they were passengers ran a stop sign and collided with an animal products truck.

Dead were Sandy Talford, 14, rural Shelley, and Ricky Talford, 16, Shelley. Passengers in an auto driven by Earl Mallory Snarr Jr., 18, Shelley.

Idaho state police said Snarr reported the sign at County and Munro roads, three miles south of here, colliding with a truck driven by Thomas Rawson, 32, Idaho Falls.

## North-Viets Seize Homes In Tay Ninh

SAIGON (UPI)—About 180 North Vietnamese troops burst into Tay Ninh City northwest of Saigon on dawn today, seized homes around a temple and held off Allied counterattacks through the day, U.S. military sources said.

American infantrymen and South Vietnamese paratroopers and militiamen failed in efforts to rout the Communists from the city, which has 150,000 persons.

U.S. and South Vietnamese forces were put at light with no results, the Allied command. American headquarters reported only that the action was continuing.

In other developments reported by the U.S. command:

—33 American soldiers were killed in action last week, while Communist deaths were put at 4,360, subject to revision upward next week.

Construction on the College of Southern Idaho's physical education plant remained at a standstill Thursday, making it nearly the third week work has been idle there.

Ironworkers are on strike for more money. Negotiations are going on in Boise but there has been little headway. It was reported Thursday, since the ironworkers are on strike, members of other unions working on the CSI project have refused to work.

The building was to be opened next spring, but it could be delayed because of the strike, college officials report.

Meanwhile, work goes on at the Band of Idaho and at the Kellwood sale south of Twin Falls. The strike has not affected either project.

## Air Controllers Stage Slowdown

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Air traffic controllers protesting congestion over the nation's airports are conducting a nationwide slowdown similar to one last summer that led to take-off and landing delays of up to three hours.

"We are telling our people to operate safely but to operate by the book," John Maher, national coordinator of the Professional Traffic Controllers Association (PATCA), said Wednesday as the slowdown began.

"It really was the governor," Mr. Houburg said. "He just wanted to wish me a speedy recovery."

# Agnew Says Surtax Is 'Essential'

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew said Wednesday retention of the income surtax and repeal of the investment tax credit were necessary to protect the integrity of the dollar and provide funds to cure urban ills.

In a speech before the closing session of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, Agnew said the nation was facing a fiscal crisis "which stands squarely in the path of any solutions to the difficult, domestic problems we face."

He said the problem can be averted by "timely and sensible action."

"We must continue the surtax, and repeal the seven percent investment tax credit, and continue specific excise taxes, and cut the budget," Agnew said.

"These are critical steps to contract the economy. These are measures not to curtail prosperity but to preserve it. These are not over-reactive measures to cause recession, but sound ones to restore normal conditions."

His comments came a day after the House Ways and Means Committee approved a \$9 billion revenue measure that provided a 12-month extension of the surtax, permanent repeal of the investment tax credit, added 12 months to the life of the 10 per cent telephone and 7 per cent auto excise taxes, and cut taxes for low income families.

The measure is expected to be approved by the House next week.

# Canadian Authorities Hold Suspected U.S. Mutineer

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Army authorities said that the long series of mutiny trials resulting from a sit-down demonstration in the Presidio stockade may be extended by one with arrest in Canada of another defendant.

Pvt. Walter Polowski — accused of being the ringleader of the alleged mutiny last Oct. 14 — was arrested in Vancouver on a charge of shoplifting.

Polowski and another prisoner escaped from the stockade Christmas Eve by picking up a desk, walking right by watch-

# Negro Ousts Councilman In Test Vote

NEWARK, N. J. (UPI) — A Negro candidate has ousted a white city councilman in a recall election launched by the victor and fought by the incumbent all the way to the state Supreme Court.

The Rev. Horace — Sharpe — ousted councilman — Lee — Bernstein from the south ward seat which he had held for seven years.

The district voted 3-1 to remove Bernstein, then elected the Rev. Sharpe from among three other Negro candidates, one of them a policeman.

Bernstein was elected in 1962 when the district was predominantly white. In the past seven years its population has become 70 per cent black.

"I am happy tonight . . . more happy and proud than I have ever been before in my entire life," said the Rev. Sharpe, who becomes the third Negro member of Newark's nine-man council.

"Today, the people beat City Hall. Today, we took the first step towards a new Newark."

He said his election was the first step toward "the great day in 1970 when we shall elect a talented, progressive and imaginative black mayor."

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SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Army authorities said that the long series of mutiny trials resulting from a sit-down demonstration in the Presidio stockade may be extended by one with arrest in Canada of another defendant.

Pvt. Walter Polowski — accused of being the ringleader of the alleged mutiny last Oct. 14 — was arrested in Vancouver on a charge of shoplifting.

Polowski and another prisoner escaped from the stockade Christmas Eve by picking up a desk, walking right by watch-

guards and strolling off the San Francisco post.

The army said Presidio officials are attempting to have Canadian authorities return Polowski so he can be court-martialed.

Four previous courts-martial resulted in conviction of 22 GI's who participated in the demonstration. In addition to Polowski, two others escaped and are at large. Two defendants are currently on trial.

The prosecution had hoped to wind up its case against the 23rd and 24th defendants on Wednesday. They are Pvt. Lawrence Zaino, 21, Toledo, Ohio, and Pvt. Michael E. Murphy, 19, Concord, Calif.

During Tuesday's session, SFC Thomas Wooding, the assistant stockade provost sergeant at the time of the alleged mutiny, described events in the compound during the protest.

He said the 27 men broke formation, sat on the grass and sang "We Shall Overcome" and refused to go on their regular work details.

The defense has maintained the men were not staging a mutiny but merely protesting substandard stockade conditions and the shooting three days earlier of a fellow prisoner, Pvt. Richard Bunch, who was killed by a guard while fleeing a work detail.

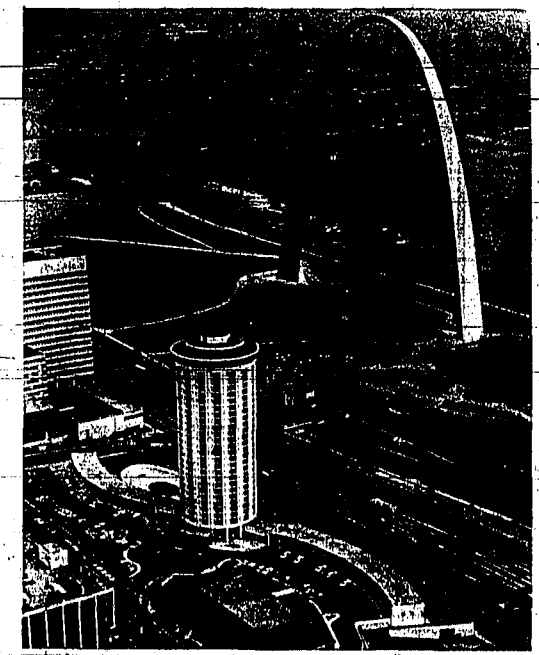

### Former 'Panther' Aides Say Leaders Order Foes Killed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A bereaved husband and wife spoke to investigators Wednesday of their adventures in the Black Panther party including assassinations, beatings and armed robberies by "ripoff squads" assigned to raise money for the militant Negro organization.

Larry Clayton Powell, 35, and his wife, Jean, 34, said they broke with the Panthers because it abandoned its original purpose of Negro betterment and became a club run for the selfish aims of its chief of staff, David Hilliard.

Powell said the Panthers "had a contract out to kill me" and had attempted to after he was bailed from jail after being arrested in the Oakland, Calif., area for an armed robbery.

Mrs. Powell told of the slaying of Ron Black, a former Panther, and said he was assassinated at the direction of Panther leaders.

The Powells, testifying before John L. McClellan's investigations subcommittee, said they worked for the Panthers in Los Angeles and Oakland from early 1965 until last year.

"The party began with the idea of helping black people," Mrs. Powell testified. "It originally began with approximately 200 members. At that time, only one is left of the original Huey P. Newton party. The members have either been assassinated, set up to be killed, arrested, or expelled, or expelled, which leaves only one person to run the Black Panther party at present, David Hilliard."

"Bobby Seals (Panther chairman) is the only original member left. Yet... Bobby began to deteriorate and depend solely on David Hilliard. After this dependence began, Bobby was all of a sudden drugged day by day with scotch... to the point that David got full control of the Panther party."

"The only thing that Bobby Seals does now is speak and even his speeches are now being written for him by David."

"The entire Panther party has been changed—its ideology, its technique and its functioning."

Mrs. Powell said she volunteered to testify so other Negroes would learn the truth about the Panthers.

Capt. John E. Drass, a Washington, D.C., police captain on loan to McClellan's subcommittee, testified that "the biggest bulk of their (Panther's) financing comes from commissioning of armed robberies."

Drass said when Panther leaders detail a "ripoff squad" for a robbery—the handlers must give one third of their loot to national Panther headquarters. The robbers divide the other two-thirds.

PIONEER IDAHOAN DIES CALDWELL (UPI) — George L. Crookham Sr., 86, a pioneer seed producer, died Wednesday in Caldwell Memorial Hospital after a brief illness. Crookham was born in 1873 in High Bank, Ohio, and came to Caldwell in 1900. In 1911 he undertook the Caldwell contract growing of popcorn and established the Crookham Co. Sweet corn and seed production were added to the business in 1914.

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# Freshman Senator Castigates Dirksen Over Nixon Nominee

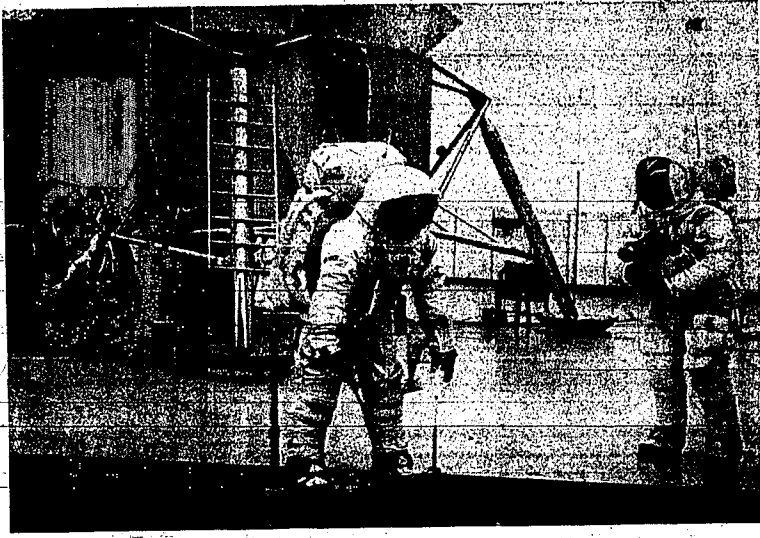
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen was accused by a fellow Republican senator Wednesday of exercising a one-man veto of President Nixon's choice for the government's highest medical position.

In a rare attack on Dirksen on the Senate floor by a member of his own party, Sen. Charles Goodell, of New York, challenged Dirksen to end his opposition to the appointment of Dr. John H. Knowles as assistant secretary for Health and Scientific Affairs in the Health, Education and Welfare Department.

"I challenge the minority leader to allow the Senate to work its will," the 43-year-old freshman Senator said of the 73-year-old Dirksen, a 19-year veteran of the Senate.

Goodell said opposition to the appointment by Dirksen and the American Medical Association held it up for 153 days since Knowles was offered and accepted the post.

"Dirksen's conduct that Knowles, 42, director of Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, is too liberal," Dirksen

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Apollo 11 astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin successfully rehearsed man's first walk on the moon in a step-by-step simulation Wednesday and jokingly reported finding diamonds and rubies there.

The two moon explorers set for launch with Michael Collins, July 16, spent two and one-half hours tramping around in a moonport building performing their final full-scale simulation of lunar surface activities.

The pilots wore space suits pressurized with backpacks, climbed around a lunar module mockup and operated test duplicates of the three lunar surface experiments they will set up on the moon. The Mission Control Center in Houston monitored the exercise as though the astronauts were on the moon.

The test ended five minutes early because the astronauts were running out of oxygen in their practice backpacks. That cut short a rehearsal of picking up carefully documented rock samples.

When the pilots were told their oxygen supply was running low, Armstrong told Aldrin, "Pick the diamond, pick the diamond, give me the diamond." Aldrin replied, "I'm running out of time, I'll settle for the rubies."

The two pilots are scheduled to touch down on the moon July 20, but they will have to wait until early the next morning before beginning their moon walk. They are scheduled to spend a total of two hours and 40 minutes outside their spacecraft.

One of the first things Armstrong and Aldrin will do when they step out on the moon's surface will be to inspect their four-legged lunar lander. When they practiced that Wednesday, they reported seeing "one cigarette butt" on one of the craft's footpads.

"Does it have a Russian brand name on it?" asked communicator Bruce McCandless at the Houston Control Center where the conversation was monitored by newsmen.

"Would you believe Lower Slobovia?" answered Aldrin.

Besides collecting rock samples, the astronauts will set up a seismometer, a laser reflector and a solar wind experiment on the lunar surface. They practiced those operations in the simulation.

# Garrison Aide Will Oppose Lawyer

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Angered by the loss of a state judgeship, the chief assistant who refused to help Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison in the Kennedy assassination probe vowed to run against his ex-boss, when Garrison seeks re-election.

Siavie, gray-haired Charles R. Ward said he was resigning as Garrison's chief aide and that he would run for district attorney in November.

Ward said he disagreed with Garrison on the assassination investigation, as well as on other matters — notably smut and student dissent.

"I have run the office for the past six years while Garrison has investigated and tried only one case — Clay Shaw — which no one," Ward said, "can better qualify to be district attorney than Jim Garrison or any other person in this city."

Ward said he stayed in the district attorney's office with Garrison's assurance that he would be recommended for one of two original district court judgeships.

However, Garrison withdrew his support of Ward, saying Ward was accused by an officer of a ball-bonding company of accepting bribes.

# Rescue Effort Fails In Evans Collision

SUBIC BAY, Philippines (UPI)—Three of the 74 U.S. Navy men who went down with the bow of the Frank E. Evans could have been saved had rescuers gotten to them in time, it was reported here.

Royal Australian navy Capt. John P. Stevenson made the disclosure today in his final testimony before a six-man board investigating the collision June 3 of his aircraft carrier, the Melbourne, and the Evans.

Two of the Americans were seen standing on the severed bow section of the Evans before it sank, Stevenson said. They "went down with the section" and were not seen again.

In another instance, Stevenson said, men in a Melbourne lifeboat were able to pick up one survivor from the Evans but his buddy, drowned before they could pull him from the South China Sea.

The captain said the Australian sailors in the lifeboat were so upset over losing the American that they needed sedation when they returned to the carrier.

The board of U.S. and Australian officers gave Stevenson a final chance to report on the rescue phase of the tragedy before allowing him to leave for Singapore, Wednesday. Stevenson is undergoing repairs to his bow.

Stevenson said he had turned down a request from the destroyer's captain, Cmdr. Albert S. McLemore of Vallejo, Calif., to return to the aft section of the Evans because he was injured and in shock.

The Australian captain said many of his men risked their lives to save the Evans' survivors, including two who jumped from the carrier's flight deck to the deck of the Evans moments after the impact.

He said the search for survivors continued until "there was no possibility that anyone was missed."

# Lindsay To Form New Political Arm

NEW YORK (UPI)—Defeat of GOP primary candidate Mayor John L. Lindsay stamped the streets of New York Wednesday seeking support for re-election in November as a candidate of the Liberal party and of a newly proposed coalition party of progressive-minded voters.

Lindsay's announcement of the formation of the party, tentatively named the Urban party, at a press conference during which he criticized the Republican Party and its "majority" party winners as having "appealed to the most base instincts" of the voters.

Both State Sen. John J. Marchese and Assembly Speaker Raymond J. DiGirolamo in the close GOP primary race, and City Controller Mario Procaccino, the Democratic Party's vice president, denied Lindsay's accusations.

"It was a highly emotional outburst not consistent with an appreciation of the Democratic process, an insult to the 111,000 Republicans who voted for me," said Marchese, who also is the candidate of the Conservative party.

Procaccino, who defeated four other Democrats, including former Mayor John Lindsay, Robert F. Wagner, denied his program would be anything but a Republican one in the middle of the political spectrum.

"If you think of my record as that of a bigot then you must be out of your cotton pickin' mind," he said.

Marchese's campaign received a boost Tuesday with an endorsement by Vice President Spiro Agnew, and by Agnew's prediction President Nixon would soon announce for the GOP mayoral candidate.

Marchese also had the prediction endorsement of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, who had endorsed him in the GOP primary winner.

Supporters of Lindsay said Wednesday the mayor had a good chance to win in November because of his invective vote would be split between Marchese and Procaccino and liberal Republicans would have a chance to vote for Lindsay on the Urban party line.

# Police Hold 10 In Idaho Falls

IDAHO FALLS (UPI)—Law enforcement officers announced Wednesday that 10 persons have been arrested following a drug crackdown in Idaho Falls.

The Bonneville County sheriff's office said those arrested ranged in age from 18 to 21. Sheriff L. G. Hopkins said the arrests were made Tuesday night following a two-month investigation by his office, Idaho Falls City Police and the investigative division of the State Department of Law Enforcement.

The charges ranged from unlawful possession of drugs to illegal sale of drugs.

Hopkins said that more arrests were expected and the investigation is continuing.

# Snake River Probed For Lost Couple

JACKSON, Wyo. (UPI)—Sheriff Lawrence Cheney of Blaine County said Wednesday that a search would be concentrated on lower sections of the Snake River south of Jackson Thursday for a missing Wilson, Wyo., doctor and his wife.

Efforts to find Dr. Martin W. Payne, 53, and his wife, Emma, have centered on the river since bloodstains were spotted on a bridge over the river earlier this week.

Cheney has said he is convinced the Paynes were murdered and their bodies probably thrown into the river.

The sheriff said about 85 volunteers searched along the river Wednesday and near where the Paynes' blood-spattered car was found, but without finding any.

"It was something they would uncover certain today," Cheney said. "We didn't have any luck, but we are going to keep right on. We will be covering the lower section of the river Thursday."

The doctor and his wife have been missing since June 11. Their car was found Sunday seven miles south of Jackson and a search of their home revealed bloodstains in a bedroom.

The Paynes' son, Russell, 25, was being held in Teton County Jail after being charged with possession of a handgun, illegal sale and transportation of unregistered firearms by federal authorities.

The son has pleaded innocent to the drunk driving charge and bond was set at \$100. A preliminary hearing has been set for July 2 on the federal charges, with bond at \$10,000.

The federal charge alleges that Russell Payne had in his possession a .20mm militank gun and two 50-cal. machineguns.

# Musician's Wife Seeks Divorce

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Band-leader Stan Kenton, 37, was sued for divorce Tuesday by his 28-year-old wife. The complaint alleged she was "kenton for her life."

Mrs. Kenton filed her husband's address as Synanon House in Santa Monica, Calif., a private rehabilitation center for drug addicts.

Mrs. Kenton asked the court to enjoin Kenton from molesting and harassing her and from disposing of community property. She asked that the property, which she estimated at \$250,000, be awarded to herself.

Mrs. Kenton also sought to have Kenton barred from the family home in the Tel-Air section of West Los Angeles.

The couple was married July 6, 1967, in Las Vegas, Nev., and separated May 23. They have no children.

This is the first time Independent Meat Co. has sold bacon in two pound cartons. "The people at Independent should be given most of the credit for trying out this venture — they go out of their way to do business with local people whenever they can," Mr. McGinnis remarked.
