41 Foreign Students Pause In T.F. For Taste Of Idaho Life

There were a variety of accents of the English language, but the cowboy hats and pants dresses were American. The girls giggled and the boys gathered in small groups to talk as 41 American Field Service students from 23 countries arrived in the lobby of Twin Falls High School Tuesday.

The students were introduced to their host families at the school by John Lawrence, principal, and Mrs. Vern Routh, local AFS tour chairman. They will be staying in Twin Falls until Thursday morning. It is their only stop in Idaho.

Wednesday morning the students were welcomed by Mayor Egon Kroll and Ray Rostrom, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce manager. They made a trip to the Snake River Trout Farm, Coca Cola Bottling Co. and toured the Robert Norris farm. A picnic was scheduled for 5:30 p.m. at Hermon Park. Highlighting the AFS group's visit will be a talent show at 8 p.m. tonight at the CSI fine Arts Center. The program will be presented by the students, along with some local high school students. Mrs. R. Ober Thompson, publicity director for the local AFS chapter, urged the public to attend this event. This busload of foreign students is one of 15 buses en route to Washington, D. C., where more than 3,040 AFS students will have a final meeting before returning to their own countries. Businessmen Discuss Holiday Closing

No significant agreement was reached Tuesday night by Twin Falls businessmen meeting to discuss a uniform holiday closing code favored by three local veterans organizations. Only about 15 businessmen attended the meeting. Ray Crandal, past commander of the Twin Falls Veterans of Foreign Wars, said 104 retail outlets in the city were contacted. He said about 70 had promised to attend the meeting at the Idaho Tower auditorium.

Mr. Crandal, on behalf of the VFW, the American Legion and the DAV, organized the meeting to put the question directly to the businessmen.

At the crux of the holiday closing problem, as far as the veterans organizations are concerned is the observance of some patriotic holidays.

Mr. Crandal said Veterans Day has long been a sore spot

between the organizations and the business community. The day is not now a recognized legal holiday, but a bill is being introduced to establish it as a national acceptance.

John Price, Twin Falls national deputy chief of staff of the VFW, said the veterans' organizations do not expect businesses to close on all patriotic holidays, but Veterans Day, Memorial Day and July 4 are being getting their guts shot out."

The closing problem, locally, he said, apparently stems from lack of communication between competitive businesses. As a consequence, he said, many businesses which want to close often don't, because of the un-

derstanding that competitors will remain open.

Attending were representatives of downtown Twin Falls, Lywood and Blue Lake shopping center businesses. Many of those attending were managers of chain stores, governed by chain policy.

Although the store operators did "communicate" at the meeting, none would totally commit himself to a blanket closure on dates suggested by the VFW.

Representatives from the Lywood Merchants Association said they were willing to cooperate with whatever conclusion was reached by the city or merchants.

The majority of the merchants favored closing on legal holidays, but pointed out they represent a small minority of the city's retail establishments, and an even smaller minority of the business community as a whole.

Israelis Attack Arabs

American-Owned Land Tracts In Peru Grabbed By Government To Help 'Poor'

LIMA (UPI)—Peru's president told the nation Tuesday night his military-backed government would take over all tracts—including those of such American investors as New York City's Grace Co. of New York, whose plantations produce 40 per cent of the Peruvian sugar crop.

"We've had it. We've just had it," said an official of one of the major U.S. investors in Lima. He asked his firm not to be identified.

The expropriation, if carried out as announced, threatened to worsen U.S.-Peruvian relations, already strained by Peru's takeover of an American-owned refinery and its seizure of four U.S. fishing boats in recent weeks for being within 200 miles of its Pacific shore.

No date was set for the takeover. Nor were details of the peasant cooperatives given

Two Israeli warplanes, machineguns blazing, raided Arab guerrilla positions just inside Jordan today in apparent retaliation for attacks on Israeli soldiers and a collective farm.

The planes encountered Jordanian anti-aircraft fire, a government spokesman in Amman said, but he reported neither damage to the planes nor Arab casualties on the ground.

The raid, in Al-Adasiyah, was the second Israeli aerial strike into Jordan in four days. Al-Adasiyah, some 10 miles inside Jordan and three miles south of the Sea of Galilee, was attacked Monday by Israeli commandos, who blew up a canal aqueduct.

Today's sorties followed a bus attack and machinegun battle in the same area.

Shortly after midnight an Arab unit quelled with an explosion a terrorist assault by She'an, an Israeli army spokesman said.

At least one Arab was reported killed in the ground battle and Israeli soldiers said they found a Soviet-made rifle beside the body.

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Vote Machine Issue Still Unresolved

Death Claims Space Expert Willy Ley

NEW YORK (UPI)—Rocket scientist Willy Ley, who almost 40 years ago predicted man would someday fly to the moon in liquid fueled rockets, died here Tuesday almost four weeks before American astronauts were scheduled to land on the lunar surface.

Ley's wife, Olga, who was with him when he died of a apparent heart attack, said her husband, 62, had been looking forward eagerly to the expected July 20 landing of man on the moon.

"It was the justification of all his dreams," Mrs. Ley said of the upcoming space shot.

In Germany, Ley was an associate of Dr. Werner von Braun, who he recruited into the German rocket society Ley helped found.

Insecticide Named As Rhine Poison

BONN (UPI)—Dutch health authorities said today the mysterious "nerve gas" poison which killed tens of millions of fish in the River Rhine was the insecticide Endosulfan which has been cleared by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for use in the United States.

German scientists said they were not so sure and that they were still checking. They described Endosulfan as an oil-based insecticide-pesticide that is sprayed on crops to kill such blighting and sucking insects as beet, hop, potato (Colorado) beetles, strawberry mites and blood lice.

The chemical's manufacturers said Endosulfan is a generic term and that it is marketed worldwide under the name Thiodan.

Because of the deadly effect the poison had on fish-paralyzing their gills and suffocating them to die within a few minutes—major cities in Holland along the lower reaches of the Rhine shut off water supplies from the river, and attached emergency reservoirs, but there were no reports of injuries to humans or other

Ironworkers Near Accord On Contract

Work remains at a standstill at the College of Southern Idaho's physical education building on Falls Avenue despite a tentative agreement with the striking Ironworkers Union.

The halt in work is in its fourth week now. Ironworkers and local merchants, however, reached a tentative agreement on a wage increase in Boise and, if that agreement is finalized work will resume at the college, it was learned.

The physical education plant was slated to be finished next spring. The plant is located on the northwest side of the modern campus complex.

Striking sheet metal workers reached an agreement last week and if ironworkers reach agreement—possibly sometime today—that will leave only roofers still out on strike.

At the college, the College of Southern Idaho, however, centers around the ironworkers, college officials have said. Ironworkers' about three of them were working at the plant when the strike was called.

Since the ironworkers walked off the job, other union personnel decided to honor the article and stay away from the job site.

Merger Of Hartford Insurance, ITT Triggers Federal Antitrust Lawsuit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department plans to file its second antitrust suit in as many months against International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. (ITT), this time to block what may be the biggest merger ever proposed—a union between ITT and the Hartford Fire Insurance Corp.

Both ITT, the nation's 11th largest industrial business in terms of sales, and Hartford, the sixth largest insurance firm—said they planned to go ahead with the merger. ITT is parent company of such firms as the Sheraton Hotel chain and Avis Rent-A-Car.

The announced plan is part of the Nixon administration's continuing crackdown on "conglomerates"—huge corporate amalgams which rapidly have been swallowing up smaller firms, often in unrelated fields.

Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell previously said the government could challenge any merger involving the nation's top 200 firms or leaders in individual industries.

ITT said it would "move forward" with its plans, depending on how Hartford stockholders voted on the proposal. The insurance firm said its directors would be asked to approve such a stockholders vote "as soon as practical."

In addition, ITT said the grounds for the suit "appear to be novel and untried, without legislative mandate from Congress and unannounced by previous court cases."

"The proposed litigation appears to be part of the announced effort of the Justice Department regardless of the

fact that there is no discernible adverse impact on competitors," ITT said. The department did not specify on which grounds the various firms buy each other's

services and products, a situation the government has contended could shut out competition.

Burger Rules To Remove TV Permit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, in one of his landmark decisions as a member of a lower court, ruled that a Jackson, Miss., television station accused of discriminating against Negroes in its programming should lose its license.

Burger joined two other judges on the U.S. Court of Appeals in the decision which was dated June 20. Burger was sworn in Monday as the 15th Chief Justice of the United States.

The judges said the Federal Communications Commission erred in renewing the license of Lamar Life Broadcasting Co. to operate WBLT-TV. They ordered the license vacated and sent the case back to the FCC for more hearings, but said the company could reapply for its license.

A group of Jackson citizens, arguing through the communications office of the United Church of Christ, had complained that the station would not carry programs or advertisements with Negroes in them and that two of its commentators used disparaging terms for Negroes.

CINCINNATI (UPI)—A 28-year-old man shot and killed his two-year-old daughter Tuesday after mistaking her for a burglar at their home in nearby Clives, Ohio.

Cleveland police said John Schmidt fired his 22-caliber rifle at what he thought was a burglar on the stairs leading to the second floor.

Schmidt told police he was aroused from his sleep when a door slammed. He said he took his gun and went to the stairwell and fired into the dark.

His daughter, Dorothy, struck in the back with a bullet, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Mary Hospital.

Dr. King Ignored

A noted journalist has attacked the argument that the "excesses" of black and white militants on the campuses were responsible for the success of Los Angeles Mayor Sam Yorty's re-election campaign against a Negro opponent.

This is sophistry, says New York Times commentator Tom Wicker. That is, it is superficially plausible but basically full of holes.

"It is as if to say that prejudice and bigotry and hysteria are understandable and maybe even justified when the tactics of protesting or disadvantaged parties become questionable, when they inconvenience or frighten people (although what student tactics have been so questionable, so inconvenient or so frightening as the mindless use of helicopters against demonstrators at Berkeley?)"

Wicker, however, then indulges in a little sophistry of his own when he proceeds to equate the courageous black students who sat in the southern lunch counters a few years ago with today's militants.

The sit-inners were told, "You're making things worse," he recalls. King was told the same thing. Yet, he reminds us, without their courage and militance, the limited progress that has been made would never have been made.

This is true, and what it proves is that there are causes and there are causes, there is militance and there is militance, and they are not necessarily the same.

We seem to have forgotten completely the basic premises of King's philosophy: Disobedience of the law is justified when the laws are unjust. And

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Black Panther Coloring Book Exhorts Children To Kill Policemen

By WILLIAM B. MEAD
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Black Panthers in San Francisco hand out a coloring book to Negro children that urges them to kill white policemen and merchants, a police official testified.

Inspector Ben Laskhoff of the San Francisco Police Department said the militant Negro organization passes out the books along with hot breakfast, through theft and shakedowns, for hungry Negro youngsters. Laskhoff gave copies to Sen. John L. McClellan's Permanent

Investigations Subcommittee, which is holding hearings on big city and campus violence. The coloring book portrayed policemen and other whites as bristly, tusked, crown-hooped pigs being shot and knifed by Negroes.

"The only good pig is a dead pig," read Sen. Karl E. Mundt's drawing of a Negro stabbing a policeman in the back. "This is a devilish thing," Mundt said. Laskhoff said there was no law against the coloring book which was passed out with the breakfasts at a Roman Catholic

Church and an elementary school. "At the school," he said, Panthers line up the children for "close order drill" after breakfast. Besides numerous pictures of Negro men, women and children killing policemen, the book showed a picture of a white

merchant being held by one Negro, with a bloody knife stabbed in the head by another Negro man and stabbed in the leg by a little boy. A Negro woman stood by with a pistol. Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., asked Laskhoff about testimony last week from two former Panthers that food for

the breakfast program is form "a coalition of the left wing activist oriented groups dedicated to total revolution."

The police officer said the Panthers themselves joined in their newspaper that a San Francisco meat company which recently burned down was set afire by Panthers for refusing to donate food.

Study Of Violence Warns Colleges May Be Guarded Camps

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A study of conflict at San Francisco State College concluded that the nation's college campuses may become closed, guarded camps unless faculty, students and administrators learn to work together.

The report, issued Tuesday, was prepared for the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence and other colleges into screened and guarded camps, institutions of learning in name only and isolated from the mainstream of American life.

The report also said the revolutionary banner carried by the students mirrors the turmoil and the economic and social imbalances which bitterly divided the American people today.

"It is misleading to attribute the causes of violence to outside agitators," the report continued. It said the turmoil and the real reasons for the disorders.

"That conclusion differed sharply with recent statements of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. The commission itself, headed by Dr. Milton Eisenhower, had no comment on the San Francisco State study.

The report, titled "Shut It Down—A College in Crisis," dealt specifically with turmoil at San Francisco State College last fall and winter but drew conclusions about the overall campus scene.

"The extent to which San

Francisco State and other colleges are able to meet decisively and swiftly needs for examination and steps must be taken to bring president, faculty and students truly together in critical periods," the report said.

"Unless this is done," it said, "an overriding public opinion may force the conversion of San Francisco State and other colleges into screened and guarded camps, institutions of learning in name only and isolated from the mainstream of American life."

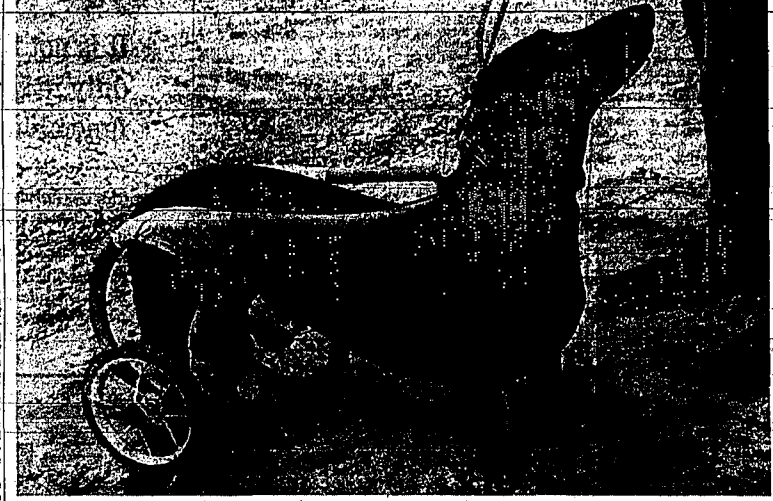

Coroner Says Judy Garland Took Pill Dose By Accident

LONDON (UPI)—Judy Garland died in her London home Sunday from an "accidental overdose of sleeping pills," a London coroner ruled today.

"There is no evidence at all of a deliberate action by Miss Garland and I want to make this absolutely clear," coroner

Gavin Thurston said at the brief inquest into the death of the 47-year-old singer.

"I shall consider the cause of death to be incautious self overdosage of the sleeping drug Seconal," he said.

"The habitual use of the sleeping pills reflected the

tortured life of the singer whose body was found in the locked bathroom of her home at 4 Cadogan Lane in London's elegant Belgravia section by her fifth husband, Mickey Deans, 35.

Both Deans and her London doctor testified she had habitually used Seconal "for many years."

Deans was the chief witness at the inquest which dispensed of two widely believed legends about the star—that she was a heavy drinker and as a result suffered from cirrhosis of the liver.

Thurston said an autopsy on her body showed that Miss Garland had been addicted to sleeping pills for years.

"She took more Seconal than her body could tolerate," Thurston told a courtroom packed with newsmen and fans of the dead singer in describing the cause of death.

Among the witnesses—was pathologist Dr. R. E. K. Peacock who testified he found 4.9 milligrams of Seconal in Miss Garland's blood, "an extremely high level" that would normally kill almost instantly if taken in that quantity at one time.

But Peacock emphasized he

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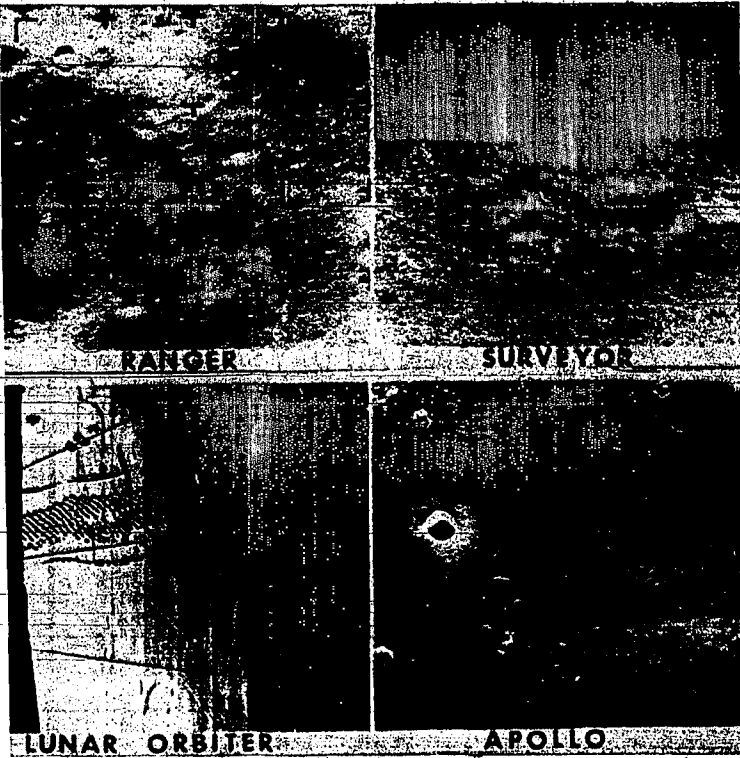

Launch Crews Fuel Rocket For Big Test

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Launch crews load the Saturn 5 booster rocket with 229,000 gallons of fuel Tuesday to prepare for its last big test for the Apollo 11 moon-landing mission. Fueling the first stage of the Saturn with high grade kerosene propellant should take all morning. The dress rehearsal countdown is scheduled to begin at midnight Thursday and will put the booster and its Apollo spacecraft payload through every launch day operation except engine burn.

Astronauts Neil A. Armstrong, Michael Collins and Edwin E. Aldrin are scheduled to ride the Saturn into space July 16 on a mission that includes a lunar landing July 20.

The job is one of the most hazardous in readying the spacecraft for flight. It involves filling tanks with chemicals so corrosive the men handling them wear bulky protective suits and masks.

The tedious spacecraft fueling ran almost a day behind and pushed back the start of the full countdown rehearsal from Wednesday to Thursday midnight.

The astronauts spent most of Monday practicing in spacecraft simulators and planned to keep this up for the rest of the week. Today they concentrated on the re-entry phase at the end of their eight-day flight.

Spokane Resident Shot To Death

SPOKANE, Wash. (UPI)—Sheriff's detectives here today investigated the death of Frank D. Hawley, 38, Spokane, whose body was found with two bullet wounds Sunday on a deserted drag strip near Mead north of here.

A spokesman said several persons had been questioned but that no suspect had emerged nor was any motive to the slaying evident.

Hawley's body was found by a "motorcyclist" near the old Mead race track. Detectives said he had been shot in the head and chest and his body dumped into a sand pit.

Senate Confirms Nomination Of Otepka Despite Protest

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Tuesday confirmed the nomination of Otto F. Otepka as a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board (SACB). Liberals called the appointment "blindly hypocritical" and "pure chicanery."

President Nixon's nomination of Otepka to the \$36,000-a-year SACB post was approved six years after he was fired as chief security officer at the State Department for slipping secret documents to the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee.

A motion by Sen. Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, to return the Otepka nomination to the

Senate Judiciary Committee, was defeated 56-35 before the confirmation vote. The announced vote for his confirmation was 61-28.

Many liberal senators from both parties opposed the nomination. The opposition was coupled with equally strong protests against the continued existence of the highly controversial board.

But Otepka, 54, who enjoyed strong congressional support in his long flight with the State Department, was warmly endorsed by the Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen and a number of GOP stalwarts, plus Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn.

Dirksen, who won a new life for the board in 1968 and then demanded that the Justice Department provide it with some business, blamed the

courts for its idleness. He charged that the board was "laboring under the difficulty of the Warren Court—that's where the difficulty was."

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who tangled briefly with Dirksen, said, "It doesn't make any sense to confirm a fifth member to an agency which doesn't have enough work to keep one member busy."

"The SACB doesn't need a fifth member and the nominee doesn't fit the qualifications of a member," Kennedy added.

But Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., said "a great injustice has been done to Mr. Otepka" and that Senate confirmation would partially remedy it. He charged that "some of our large newspapers" and some newspaper columnists unjustly smeared Otepka.

Sutton said when he told his dentist that Christopher had a toothache, he was told the dentist would accept the boy as a private patient, not under Medicaid. "This is like asking a man who is dying in the street for payment before treating him," Sutton said.

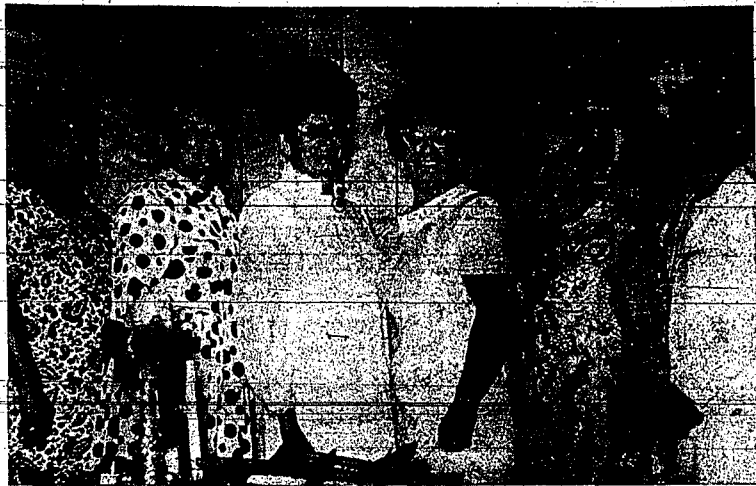

'Unconstitutional' Claim Filed In Wyoming Slay Case

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Attorneys for Russell Payne filed a writ in District Court Tuesday which contended the accused slayer was being held unconstitutionally.

Attorney Harry Reid filed the writ of habeas corpus which charged that Payne surrendered himself Friday but was not arraigned, shown a warrant of arrest and that no bail was set.

A hearing on the writ was scheduled before Dist. Judge Thomas O'Donnell later Tuesday. Meanwhile, Payne also was listed on the Justice Court calendar for arraignment later Tuesday.

Payne, 25, is the son of a missing Wyoming couple who authorities said were believed to have been murdered and dumped in the Snake River near Jackson, Wyo.

Emmalyn Payne, 53, and her husband, Dr. Martin Payne, 53, disappeared June 11. Blood stains were discovered in their expensive home at Wilson, Wyo., and their blood spattered car was found near Jackson, Wyo., which contained a Moody axe and shovel.

Searchers have been unable to locate the Paynes. Wyoming investigators said that blood was found on a bridge which spanned the Snake River, and theorized that the bodies were dumped in the river.

Payne was named in a Wyoming murder warrant Thursday charging him with the slaying of his wife. The warrant was issued on the promise of the woman's death because of her blood type was on record. Dr. Payne's blood type was immediately unknown and could not be compared with stains found in the couple's house.

The murder warrant was issued in Jackson, Wyo., about 45 minutes after Payne was released from the Teton County Jail on lesser charges.

The suspect originally was due to be arraigned in Las Vegas Justice Court Monday, but a spokesman in the Clark County district attorney's office said a log jam of paper work and late arrival of the warrant forced a postponement.

DUESSELDORF, West Germany (UPI)—The death of thousands of fish still unsolved, West German and Dutch authorities imposed stringent fish precautions Tuesday along the Rhine River.

Accord Cited In Walkout Of Teachers

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York City teachers whose union conducted strikes the past two years, reached tentative agreement Tuesday with the Board of Education on a contract that makes them the highest paid teachers in the United States.

Mayor John V. Lindsay, announcing the accord at a news conference, called it "a historic settlement." It was the first time, he said, that a teachers' contract had been agreed upon before the end of the school year. The last day of school is June 27.

Under the proposed three-year contract, the city's 57,000 teachers will earn, in the last year of the pact, from \$9,400 to a top of \$13,950. The teachers now make from \$8,780 to \$11,150. The top salary level will be reached after eight, rather than the present 14 years of experience.

The union membership is expected to vote on the contract by Friday. Albert Shanker, a president of the United Federation of Teachers, received noisy approval when he read the terms of the pact to the union's delegate assembly.

The contract would take effect on Sept. 9, the day after school begins.

He asked the House Foreign Affairs Committee to have instant military funds in the \$2.0 billion foreign aid authorization bill for fiscal 1970 starting July 1.

Nixon Voices Sympathy For Commuters In Aerial Survey

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon took a 45-minute helicopter ride over Washington's rush hour traffic Tuesday and expressed sympathy for the plight of the commuter.

"I'm glad we don't have to drive to work," the President said as Marine Corps 1, the presidential chopper, delivered him back to the White House.

Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe, who accompanied the President, told reporters after the flight that Nixon planned to present to Congress within the next two weeks a public transportation bill to increase substantially the money for rapid transit systems.

The funds would go for construction programs and to help finance bus systems and rapid transit systems, Volpe said. No operating subsidies would be involved, he added.

Sitting by a big window in the side of the presidential helicopter, Nixon viewed the traffic—mostly private cars—jamming highways that flow into the nation's capital from Maryland and Virginia.

"Sure not many buses," the President remarked at one point.

Volpe said virtually all of the nation's major cities faced traffic problems similar to those of Washington.

"We could see lines of traffic backed up a mile or more," Volpe said.

Volpe expressed hope Congress would appropriate \$19 million proposed as the District of Columbia's share of getting started on a subway system reaching from the city into the suburbs.

The House rejected the request but the Senate has passed it and a conference committee of the two houses was scheduled to meet today on the issue.

Even if the money were available, immediately, Volpe said it would be at least five years before the first segments of the system could be opened.

Resident youngsters under 14 years of age are exempted from carrying a permit card, but non-residents must get a salmon-steelhead permit card before fishing in Idaho for sea-run fish. In order to carry a permit card, vendors must write "under 14" across the tops of permit cards.

Nonresident boys and girls who have not reached their 14th birthdays are required to fish with licensed fishermen. Salmon and steelhead catches of juveniles must be recorded on permit cards and included in the bag limit of the licensed fishermen. Trout and steelhead catches are counted as part of the bag limit of the licensed fishermen.

Nixon, Warren Swap Words In Unique Confrontation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon's highly unusual appearance before the Supreme Court Monday gave Earl Warren a chance to say some things that probably had been on his mind for sometime.

The retiring chief justice's response to Nixon's eulogy contained thoughts which he perhaps would like to have voiced during the 1968 presidential campaign.

In these weeks Nixon was on the path of continuity and in saying recent Supreme Court change which is so essential for decisions had given "a green light" to people bent on a life of light. He was promising to fill court vacancies with "strict constructionists" of the Constitution.

But Monday the President's interest as we see it, guided Nixon's "dignity, ex-ample and fairness" and said down consciences," Warren said in a mild tone.

No one could think of a time when a president has addressed the Supreme Court. Normally the contact between the judicial and executive branches is confined to the law suits that come before the high tribunal and an annual reception for Supreme Court justices at the White House. Nixon himself told newsmen after appointing Warren E. Burger as Warren's successor that he believed a president and a justice should keep their distance.

Nixon did not explain why he chose to step over the barrier Monday. Furthermore, political enmity between him and Warren had dated back to 1952, when Nixon worked for Dwight D. Eisenhower in California's great office and that is that so many times it speaks the last word in great-governmental affairs.

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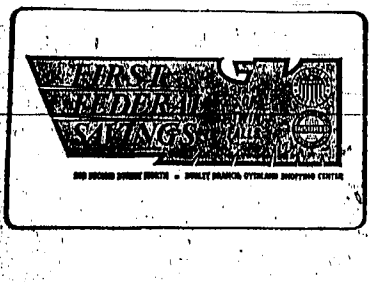
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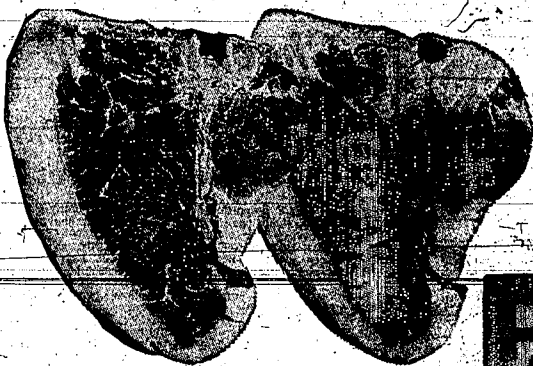
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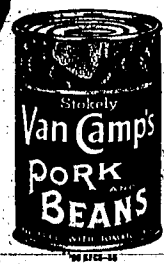

CAREFUL PLANNING ASSURES CONTRACT

If any reader thinks that North got a lot of mileage out of his queen and two jacks, we can't argue with him. The only thing we can say of the bid is that it worked. West opened the king of diamonds and shifted to a trump at trick two but it didn't come too late. Once that diamond had been led there was no way to keep South from taking 10 tricks. Of course, there were lots of ways for South to make only nine tricks. It was up to him to plan carefully before playing from dummy. He didn't have to be too careful, just careful enough to play one of his dummy's high spades so that he could hold the trick there.

He needed eight trump tricks to give him a total of 10 and the only way to collect 10 tricks would be to ruff dummy's last three diamonds in his own hand.

He did this by ruffing a diamond in his own hand, cashing his ace and king of clubs and then crossruffing clubs and diamonds for the next four tricks.

This series of plays left him with eight tricks in and two good trumps in dummy for tricks nine and 10.

Note that if South did not trump the play this way he would wind up in his own hand with no way to get to dummy to lead the last diamond. He would have to let the defenders in with a heart and a second spade lead that would hold him to nine tricks.
