

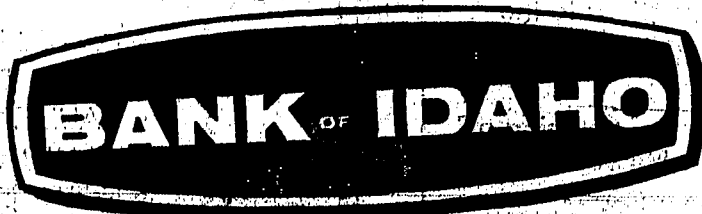

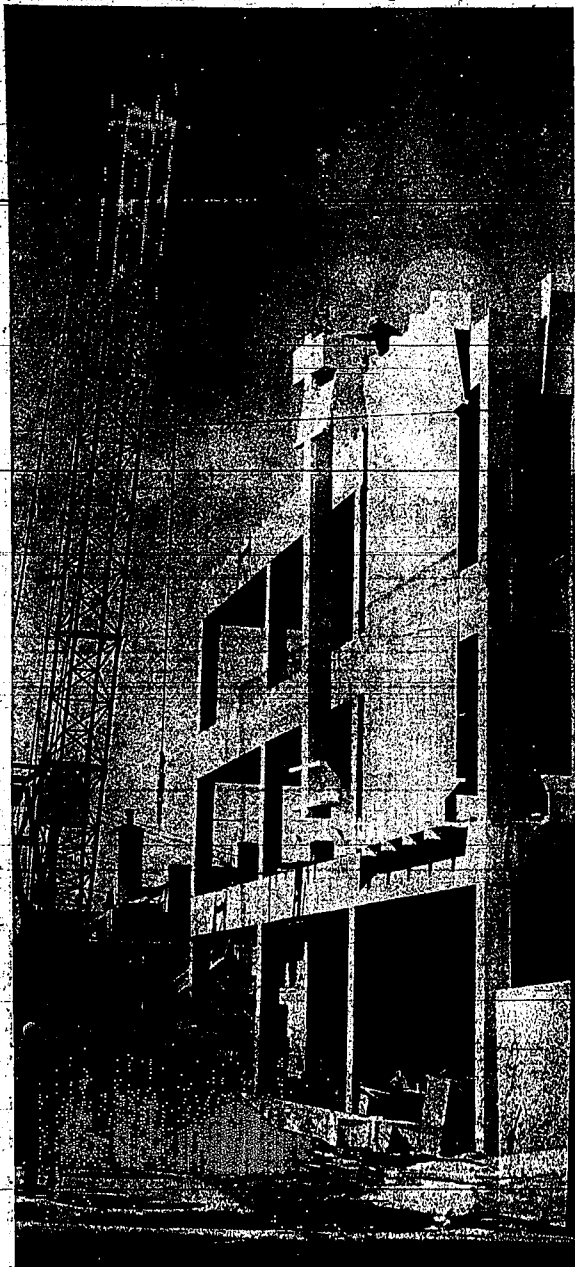

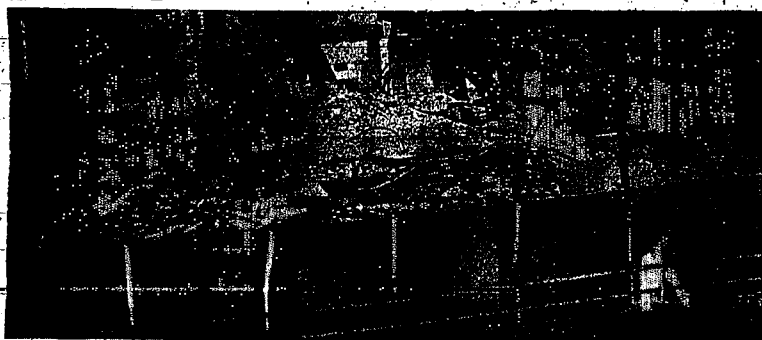

## Bank Offers New "Check-Credit"

A relatively new service is available to you at your branch new Bank of Idaho office. It's Check-Credit.

Check-Credit is available to Bank of Idaho customers through their checking account, either regular or budget. It provides additional funds when needed.

It is a confidential matter and only the Bank of Idaho knows that the funds are borrowed. There are no special checks or credit cards involved.

The maximum amount available under Check-Credit is \$300. As with any unsecured loan, the customer's income, fixed monthly obligations and credit needs determine the amount of credit available.

When the maximum line of credit is established, one may use the funds as he desires. As he writes checks in excess of his checking account balance, money is deposited to cover these checks from his personal revolving line of credit automatically up to the agreed upon maximum line.

This money deposited — or loaned to the customer — may be repaid either in monthly installments or in a lump sum, as the customer prefers.

In anticipation of writing checks in excess of his checking account balance, the customer may also sign a transfer order for an amount within his maximum line of credit, which will automatically be credited to his checking account balance.

Transfers or deposits to a customer's account are made in multiples of \$50 so that his checking account balance will never be zero. Repayments are based on the amount of Check-Credit owing on the customer's payment date, plus charges through this date.

# The Event Was Carefully Planned . . .

## Design Stresses Solidity

Extensive landscaping is very much a part of the overall character presented by the new Bank of Idaho building. The structure itself was designed to present an appearance of substantiality and solidity — this is accentuated by the liberal use of stucco and black Italian granite on the first floor exterior, and by the formidable concrete panels which curtain the second and third floors. To integrate with the surrounding landscape and the overall theme of the redevelopment area, a large degree of glass and open space were incorporated into the design. Complementing this notion of natural spaciousness, numerous trees, shrubs and blooming plants adorn the open-air mall-like brick paving which surrounds the building. Evergreen and flowering plants are also featured throughout the interior of the Bank of Idaho structure.



**NEIL SMULL**, designed the new Bank of Idaho building in Twin Falls. He is a principal in the architectural firm of Cline, Smull, Hamill, Shaw and Associates. Smull joined the firm in 1961. He received his degree in architecture from Kansas State University.

## New Bank Was Integrated Into Urban Renewal Plan

Although downtown improvement in Twin Falls was a working dream, the real physical change didn't come until last fall when Bank of Idaho officials announced they would put up a new building right in the center of the city.

"That was a catalyst," Joe Citek, chairman of the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency, said. "When the bank project started, the confidence in the downtown project zoomed."

He said the Bank of Idaho project was helpful in getting the total project moving. "But it wasn't the only factor. Businessmen — something had to be done. With the cooperation of everyone, the project came off the drawing boards into reality."

He said the bank project changed the overall downtown plan very little. "It fit in nicely with what we had planned," Mr. Citek went on to say architects on the downtown project conferred with Bank of Idaho officials on a building that would blend with the dream of a new downtown Twin Falls.

"The end result, through cooperation from everyone concerned, is this modern building we have at the corner of Main Avenue and Shoshone Street."

Downtown improvement was a dream nearly seven years ago. Five years ago several working plans were in the mill. Two years ago, with the formation of an Urban Renewal Agency, serious planning started. Last year financing was arranged.

Urban renewal funds are being used in part of the project area; a Local Improvement District has been formed to finance work in another part of the building. The entire building's area is 20,040 square feet — LID and urban renewal plans are working jointly.

"These plans had been well mapped before the Bank of Idaho announced it would build on the old Perrine Hotel property," Mr. Citek said. "But when it

was announced the bank would build there, the confidence in downtown improvement surged."

Mr. Citek said downtown improvement has not come about "simply through the Bank of Idaho project. But he added, "It was the first physical construction done in the downtown area during this period and

there is no doubt the Bank of Idaho helped the downtown project."

Now, with the Bank finished and ready for business, history is about to be made. Because, in future years people will remember the Bank of Idaho and how it was the first project started during the downtown area improvement push.

## Architects Planned To Complement New, Old

The new Bank of Idaho building, with its contemporary design featuring the extensive use of stone, glass, outdoor lighting and landscaping, beautifully complements the redevelopment program now under way in downtown Twin Falls. And, it presents quite a contrast to the historic Perrine Hotel which occupied the same site for so many years.

Wayland, Cline and Smull, Boise architects, designed the bank building and Jacobsen Construction Company was the main contractor. The new building is the largest of Bank of Idaho's 21 branches, except for the head office building in Boise.

The property on which the new Bank of Idaho building is located is bordered on the north by Main Avenue West, and on the east by Shoshone Street West. Adequate customer parking is provided in the area adjacent to the building.

The building itself is rectangular in shape, with the main entrance on the east corner. The two drive-in tellers' booths and the night depository are located on the southwest side of the building. The entire building's area is 20,040 square feet — the first floor covering 5,700 square feet, and the second and third covering 7,170 square feet each. All of the first floor will be used for banking purposes; the second floor will be rental area; and the third floor will

be rental and mechanical areas. The footings, foundation and structural system are constructed of reinforced concrete. The exterior walls feature pre-cast concrete, cut stone and granite.

Interior partitions are of steel stud, covered by walnut paneling or painted sheetrock. The ceilings are of acoustic tile; the floors are carpeted. Heating and air conditioning are provided through a duct duct, high-pressure air system with gas-fired heating and refrigerated cooling.

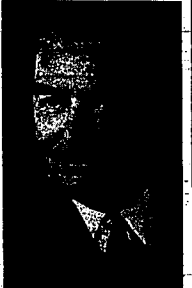
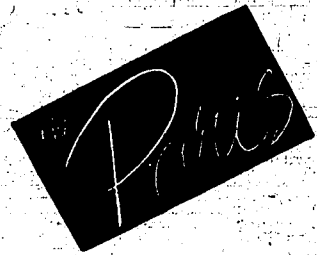

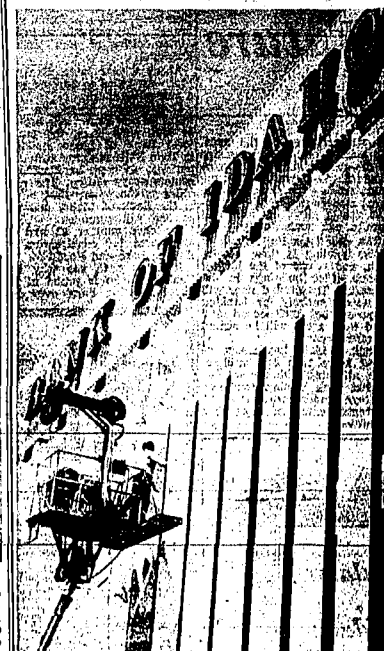

BANK OF IDAHO expansion will continue after the opening of the Twin Falls branch. Offices are set to open soon in Pocatello and Hayden Lake. The Hayden Lake branch, right, will be a 3,500 square foot one-story brick and wood structure. It is scheduled to open this fall. Due to open in late 1969 or early 1970 is the Pocatello branch, left. Located at Main and Booneville, the Pocatello structure will feature white concrete contrasted with dark solar glass and dark marble or black granite.



DOMINATING BOISE SKYLINE, Bank of Idaho's head office and main branch building stands 17 stories high. Reaching upward 175 feet, the building is the tallest in Idaho. Construction began in 1962, and the building was opened in January, 1964.

## 101 Years Of Growth In Idaho . . .

With the opening of the new Twin Falls branch office, the Bank of Idaho is embarking upon its second century of operation. It all began with the First National Bank of Caldwell, which was chartered and opened for business in 1868 — 101 years ago today — the Stook-Growers and Traders Bank. The Caldwell bank is the oldest of three banks which combined to form the present Bank of Idaho in 1938. The other two banks were known as the Continental State Bank of Boise and the Bank of Eastern Idaho, both chartered in 1940. The three banks, which were later to combine, added branches throughout the 1940's and early 1950's. The First National Bank of Caldwell opened a branch at Wilder in 1940. The Continental State Bank of Boise opened its Whiskey Bench branch in 1949 —

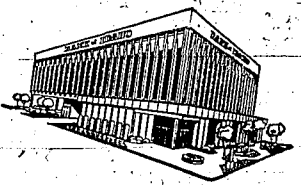
this was later to become the Vista Avenue Branch of the Bank of Idaho. In 1951, the State Bank of Richfield and the New Plymouth State Bank, which was granted a charter in 1927, both became branch offices of the Continental Bank. In 1956, Transamerica Corporation purchased the outstanding stock of the three banks — Continental State of Boise, First National of Caldwell, and Bank of Eastern Idaho — and their four branches. The three were then merged into the Bank of Idaho, with combined assets of more than \$4 million. Two years after the merger, in 1958, the new Bank of Idaho opened a new branch in Lewiston Orchard; in 1961, another branch office was opened in the Collier shopping center in Boise, and the following year another was established at Fair-

view Avenue and Cole Road in Boise's Westgate shopping area. That same year, the First National Bank at Bonners Ferry became Bank of Idaho's Bonners Ferry branch. Also in 1962, new branches were opened at Post Falls and Sandpoint. The Panhandle State Bank of Coeur d'Alene was acquired by merger in the spring of 1963 and became a branch of the Bank of Idaho. In 1964, after two years of construction, the new main office building was opened in downtown Boise. At 13 stories, it is the highest building in Idaho. 1964 also saw the opening of the Nampa and Downtown Lewiston branch offices. To say the least, these were productive years for the Bank of Idaho. And, it did not stop in 1964. The following year new office buildings were opened at Moscow and at Coeur d'Alene. In December, 1966, a beautiful new branch office was opened in the Alpine setting of Sun Valley-Ketchum. About a year later, Bank of Idaho expanded to Jerome with a new office there. Construction began on the beautiful new Twin Falls branch in 1968. Now open, the multi-level Bank of Idaho Building in Twin Falls features customer parking, drive-up banking, and contemporary design. The new office is the twenty-first office of the Bank of Idaho, and expansion will continue. Branches, number 22 and 23 are slated for construction at Hayden Lake and Pocatello. It is easy to see why the Bank of Idaho is proud of its history, dating back over 100 years of continuous operation by that organization and its predecessors. In 1956 when Transamerica Corporation merged the three constituent banks, their combined assets were \$45 million. Today, in 1969, Bank of Idaho assets total over \$151 million; Western Bancorporation, which has emerged as the bank holding company for Transamerica Corporation, is now the largest such company in the world — its assets . . . over \$9 billion. Truly, the Bank of Idaho has undergone amazing growth; the progress will continue, too, and it is proud that Twin Falls will be part of that progress.

## And The Future Looks Good

Joseph Blanco, president of the Bank of Idaho, foresees a prosperous period ahead for the Magic Valley. In discussing the construction of the new Bank of Idaho in Twin Falls, Mr. Blanco said that "studies and projections indicate that the next decade will be an exciting and dramatic period in the growth and development of Twin Falls and the entire Magic Valley area." As a part of the growing area, Mr. Blanco said, Bank personnel "are delighted to be a part of this forward movement, and we plan to do everything we can to assist in its acceleration." Mr. Blanco also praised the Twin Falls downtown redevelopment program and said that the program would surely strengthen the economy of the area. He pointed out that the design of the new building would complement the overall redevelopment area — the structure features modern design with extensive use of glass, cut rock and granite, and landscaping. The new Twin Falls Bank of Idaho building is three stories high, and is one of the largest branch office buildings in the operation. The ground floor will be used entirely for banking purposes, but the second and third floor areas will be rented as office space. Bank of Idaho has assets totaling more than \$151 million. 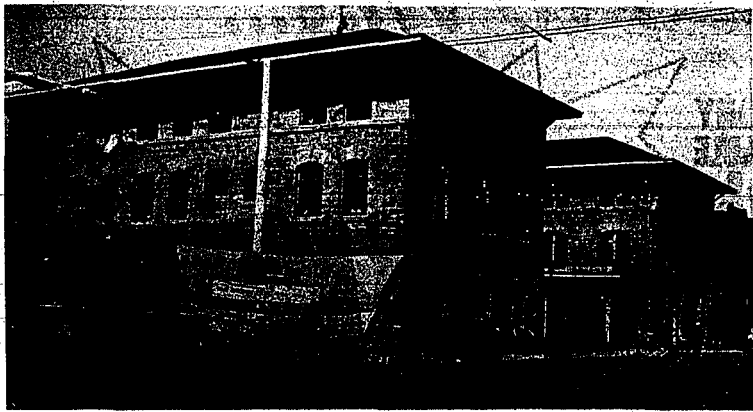

## Memories Linger At Site

Gleaming stone and glass of the new Bank of Idaho Building at the intersection of Main Avenue and Shoshone Street in Twin Falls attract many admiring glances, but to long-time residents, the site will always be the Ferris Hotel corner.

Before downtown Twin Falls was anything but a few wooden shacks, the massive three-story Perrine Hotel took shape and in 1906, when the building was finished by the Twin Falls Investment Co., it must have stood out in the sagebrush desert like the proverbial sore thumb.

At that time it was hailed as one of the leading hotels in the west and the most luxurious between Denver and the northwest metropolitan areas of Seattle and Portland.

Named in honor of the late J. B. Perrine, known as the father of the Twin Falls track, the hotel was well known by travelers of a wide area.


George P. Sprague was the builder of the hotel and because there were no railroads to Twin Falls at that time and no local sources of building supplies in the infant community, heavy building material was brought by team and wagon from the railroad terminal at Shoshone across the desert and up the Snake River Canyon grade north of Twin Falls.

Water for the luxurious hotel was pumped from Rock Creek and piped 2,000 feet to the building.

So badly did Twin Falls need center of activities, the hotel was pressed into service before it was actually completed. The city's first major celebration, Fairland Day, July 7, 1906, was held at the hotel although only the first floor had been built and facilities on the second floor consisted of unfinished floor and walls.

The building did not officially open until Christmas Day, 1905. Banking is not new to the site. While under construction the building was called "The Kimberly" although the name was changed at time of completion. An early newspaper story about "The Kimberly" noted the first floor contained a bank, dining room, offices of the owners, firm, public bath, a drug store, barber shop and other facilities.

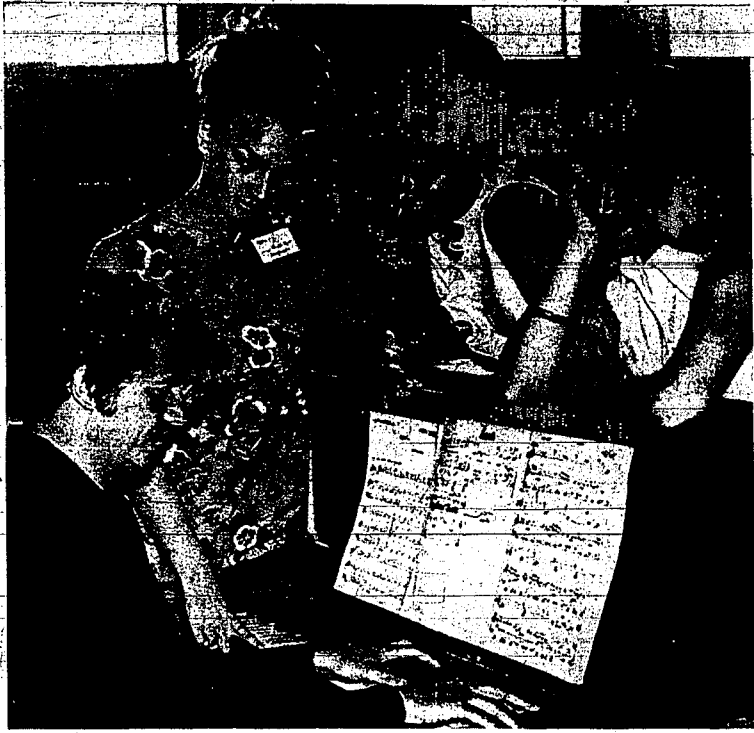

### Defendant Is Convicted Of Conspiracy

VERINGTON, Nev. (UPI)—David Goldsmith, 45, of Jackson, Wyo., was judged guilty Wednesday of conspiracy to commit murder in the death of his two business partners whose bodies were found in the Nevada desert in 1967.

Goldsmith appeared before District Judge Frank Gregory and entered a plea of nolo contendere (no contest). Judge Gregory then judged him guilty and set sentencing for July 9th.

Maximum sentence for the gross misdemeanor but it is not in the county jail and a \$1,000 fine. Goldsmith has been held without bail here for more than one year on a felony murder charge.

Dist. Atty. George Franklin of Las Vegas, who was hired as a special prosecutor in the case, said the conspiracy charge was the proper one instead of the more serious murder charge.

"We could get a conviction of a higher degree but it is not in good taste when Lindblad and Lucas are free," Franklin said.

Goldsmith, Robert Lindblad, 35 of Salt Lake City, Glen Lucas, 47 of Reno and Ted Linn, 35 of Jackson, Wyo., were all originally charged with murder in the fatal shooting of Robert Stucker, 30 and Larry Dlinger, 33, both of Jackson, Wyo., Goldsmith and the two victims were partners in a motel-restaurant complex in Jackson and the state contended he helped set up their death, to collect \$200,000 in insurance which he never received.

Linn was convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. Lucas was acquitted of the murder charge and Lindblad was granted immunity from prosecution when he agreed to testify for the state.

## Top-Ranking Negro Asks Role For 'Head Start' In Homes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Asst. HEW Secretary James Farmer wants to extend the Head Start program into the home—to work with children 3 years and younger and their parents.

"Some say that is too early to learn," Farmer, highest ranking Negro in the Nixon administration, said in an interview. "I don't think so."

Head-Start was begun during the Johnson administration as part of the war on poverty. It is an attempt to give preschool children from poor families some basic skills and health care so they will have a "head start" when they begin school.

The program traditionally has been carried out in classroom-type settings for 4 and 5-year-old children.

He said the parents of the poor need to be taught how to teach their children better.

"The Westinghouse report indicated a greater need for developing learning skills in children," he said.

The controversial Westinghouse Learning Corp., Ohio University study found that Head Start children were not significantly better off in school than other deprived children who did not participate in the program.

"Many Head Start programs have not emphasized learning skills," Farmer said. "They have emphasized social skills."

With expansion to the homes, Farmer would develop new ways to help parents teach their young children better.

"I would suggest we use nonprofessionals and make it a non-careers program," he said. "They would be trained by specialists in health, early childhood learning and social work."

He cited government-financed pilot projects in Florida and New York City in which paid nonprofessional workers were used to stimulate poor parents to teach their children better.

Frank Riessman, director of the New Careers Development Center operated by New York University, said the children of parents trained in the projects

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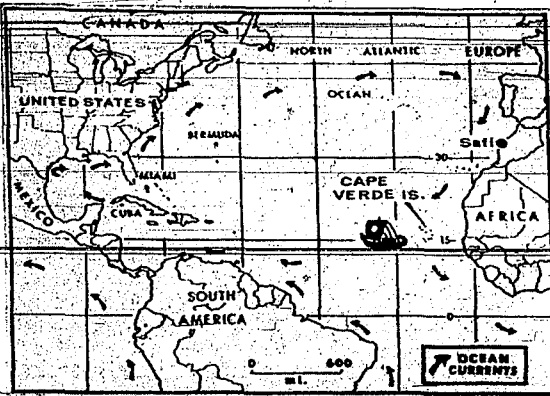

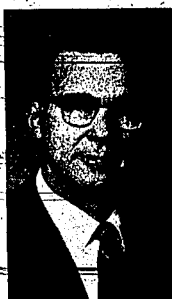

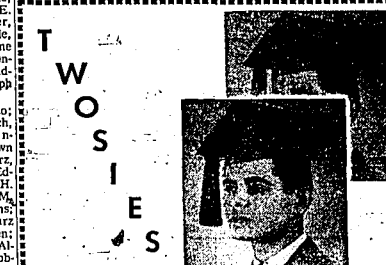

# Judy Comes Home

NEW YORK (UPI)—Judy Garland came home today for the final act in a tormented life.

Six fans were on hand to pay silent tribute to their idol as the casket-bearing Miss Garland's body was taken into Madison Avenue funeral home in the early morning hours after being flown from London.

Her body, in a glass covered casket, was to be on view today and Friday the morning before funeral services Friday afternoon. She died Sunday in London of an accidental self-administered overdose of barbiturates.

Mrs. Gertrude Harris, at 47 the same age as Miss Garland, stood with five other persons at the funeral home as the casket, covered with a brown mat, was lifted from the hearse and taken inside.

She and her companions, who included a young boy, said they would wait for the 11 a.m. opening of the funeral home so they could be the first to file past the coffin.

Police already had set up barricades they said would handle as many of Judy's fans as turned out.

Miss Garland's fifth husband, Mickey Deans, 35, accompanied her body back to the United States from London. They had been married only three months.

There were no fans at the airport when the plane arrived early today. The coffin was unloaded and placed on the hearse that took it to the funeral home. Actress Liza Minnelli, one of Miss Garland's three children, was there but said she did not want to discuss her mother's death.

Coroner Gavyn Thurston, in reporting the cause of death in London said the star had such a high level of barbiturates already in her bloodstream that her body could tolerate no more. Miss Garland had been taking pills almost all her life and blamed it on a sleeping pill-pip routine that started during the filming of "The Wizard of Oz."

Deans, who married Miss Garland in London, said he rejected a Hollywood funeral because Hollywood "didn't care."

To the city that made her a star, he said, "She was just a pretty girl."

His voice choked with emotion, Deans said "We don't want people walking over her grave today. I'm pointing. Judy wanted to be with me wherever I was and New York is my home, if they are her friends, they will come from California."

# Army Ponders Alternatives To Rail Shipping Of Gas

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Academy of Sciences has advised the Army its plan to haul 25,000 tons of poison gas across-country by rail for burial at sea is unsafe. Now the Army must decide what to do.

"My hope is that the Defense Department will follow my recommendations," said Rep. Richard D. McCarthy, D-N.Y., who disclosed the Army plans several weeks ago. "It would be unthinkable not to."

The academy, a nongovernmental body of eminent scientists, warned there would be a small but real risk of "catastrophic explosion" if something went wrong while the surplus gas, most of it stored near Denver, Colo., was shipped to the East Coast.

The academy also warned of unknown but possible serious effects on ocean life when the gas containers were buried in the Atlantic.

The scientists recommended transfer of the gas to a more secure location.

that most of the gas be either buried or chemically deactivated and that only a small portion be dumped at sea if no other way can be found to dispose of it.

The scientists said the Army should minimize the risks even if this made the job more complicated and costly.

The academy said a sniper's bullet, a collision with a gasoline truck on a grade crossing or other mishaps could cause an explosion "far beyond the capacity" of the medical staff the army planned to have accompany the gas.

"We cannot exclude the remote possibility of a catastrophic explosion," the academy said.

It also said there was remote possibility of a collision at sea as the gas was towed out in old Liberty ships. Some of the nerve gas could escape from the sunken ships, it said, and effects on ocean life "could be very serious."

The gas is stored at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal, Blue Grass, Lexington, Ky.; Edgewood, Md.; and Anniston, Ala., arsenals.

## Not So Easy

GLASGOW, Scotland. (UPI) — British Postmaster General John Stonehouse tried to deliver the mail this week—with mixed results.

Accompanying Postman Willie McBride and carrying a 25-pound bag of mail, Stonehouse managed to drop a pile of letters in the street, deliver one letter to the wrong address, and in losing a parcel to a sorting bin, misled by yards.

"Let me tell you, it is not as simple as it looks," he said.

## SABOTAGE DISCOVERED

EVERETT, Wash. (UPI) — The Boeing Co. has ordered tighter security at its 747 production line here after sabotage on two of the giant jets was disclosed Tuesday. Electrical wires on flight decks of two 747s on the production line at Everett were found to have been severed, a company spokesman said.

# Wreck Survivor Describes Horror Of Small-Plane Crash South Of Salt Lake

CEDAR CITY, Utah (UPI) — "He never stopped screaming and he never passed out. He just kept yelling."

That's how David L. Watson, 40, of Los Angeles described the first night at the wreckage of a light plane in which three television crew members of the Death Valley Days show lay dead. Watson and two other crew members were seriously injured.

Their single-engine Piper Cherokee crashed Sunday when it overshot a clearing in an attempt to make an emergency landing in rugged mountains near Cedar Breaks National Monument about 300 miles southwest of Salt Lake City.

The wreckage was found Wednesday by Civil Air Patrol pilots who had been searching a two-state area since the plane failed to return from a pleasure flight from St. George, Utah, where filming was under way, to the Grand Canyon area in Arizona.

Watson and his two injured companions, Robert L. McCormick, 35, and Donald Simon, 38, both of Los Angeles, were evacuated to Valley View medical center in Cedar City where their conditions were described as "serious but satisfactory."

"At first I thought I was the only survivor," Watson said after his rescue. "I was thrown clear of the plane. I heard this cracking sound and the plane started to burn. I looked over and the only ones I could see were the three guys in the front. I knew they were dead."

Killed were the pilot, John Bury, about 42, of North Hollywood, Calif.; Clarence McLean, Straumer, 35, both of Los Angeles.

Watson said McCord, who lay in severe pain in a rear seat of the plane, screamed all night and kept yelling "do something, do something."

He said Simon "seemed to get around, got some sand and got the fire out." Simon then started a camp fire for warmth during the cold, damp night "and he kept it going until he passed out and then I kept the fire going the entire night."

Watson, the only one able to walk, started for help about 4 a.m. Monday but became lost and started back. He was sighted some six miles from the wreckage early Wednesday.

While seeking help, Watson said he trudged through snow and ate it for his only nourishment.

"I've always been a big eater," he said, "but I found out that food isn't very important. All I could think of was having someone with me and having a fire to keep warm."

The medical center said Watson had head lacerations and possible internal injuries. The bodies of the three dead men were to be brought out by horseback on Thursday.

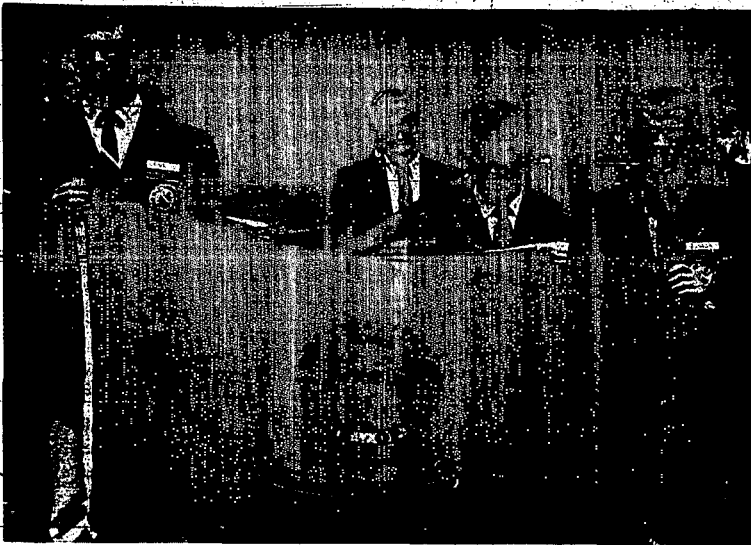

## U.S. Gives South Vietnam

### 64 Armed River Patrol Boats

By WALTER WHITEHEAD SAIGON (UPI)—The United States gave South Vietnam 64 armed river patrol boats worth a total of \$18.2 million today—the biggest turnover of military hardware to date in the process of de-Americanizing the war.

In ceremonies at Saigon's docks, Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, said he was confident of the ability of South

Vietnamese troops in using the boats to patrol the Mekong Delta's waterways.

It (the turnover) is all the more significant in view of the recent announcement that increased Vietnamese armed forces capabilities have made possible the replacement of 25,000 U.S. forces, Abrams said.

On the fighting front, B52 bombers dropped 150 tons of bombs onto North Vietnamese positions surrounding the Green Beret camp at Don Het as the Communist siege entered its 50th day with no ground fighting reported.

The turnover ceremony at Saigon's docks saw the 800 U.S. crewmen of the river patrol boats haul down their American flags and leave the boats, replaced by South Vietnamese troops with their own flag.

A U.S. spokesman said the 64 American crewmen were not part of the withdrawal of 25,000 GIs from Vietnam but rather would move into other jobs and be replaced when their tours are up.

The turnover brought to 167 the number of American boats or ships given the South Vietnamese in the past 12 months. Twenty more river patrol boats are en route from the United States.

Abrams and Gen. Cao Van Vien, his South Vietnamese counterpart, signed the transfer papers and in a short speech, Vien said his men would do their best to do what is expected of them. # Dear Abby

**TO MY READERS:** Bill Gargan, a handsome, veteran Irish actor, was saved from fatal cancer of the larynx by surgery. To warn and possibly save others from a similar fate, he has written a book, "WHY MEN?" published by Doubleday.

Bill is a friend of mine, and has given me permission to quote from his eloquent testi-

mony against smoking. And I think him.

"That so many people smoke to me is incredible. That so many children smoke is sickening. By the 12th grade, fully half of our children smoke. Yet it ought not surprise us. We older people like to think we just didn't know what we were doing when we began to smoke in our youth.

My doctor (who is a personal friend of mine) told me yesterday that if I didn't quit smoking he did not want me to show my face in his office again. And he meant it, too.

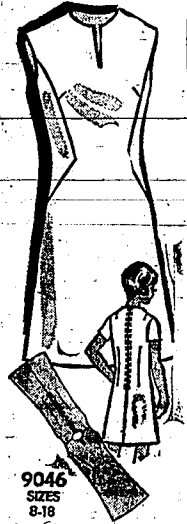

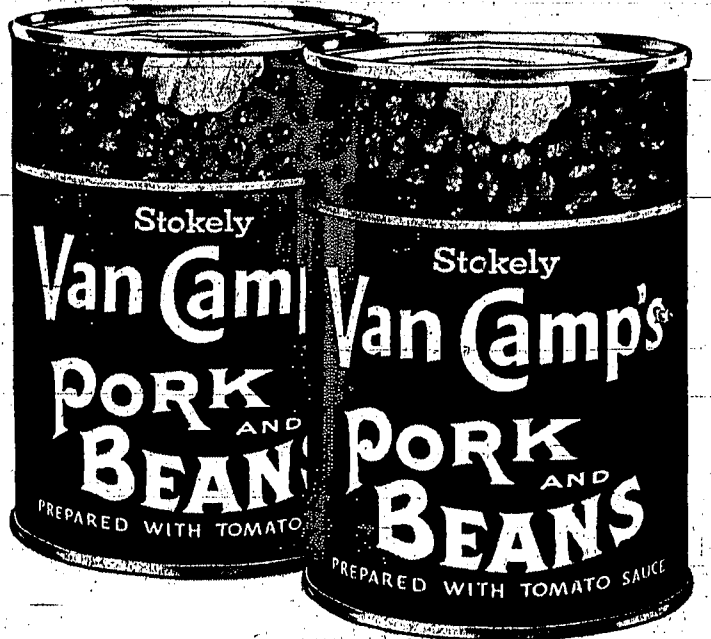

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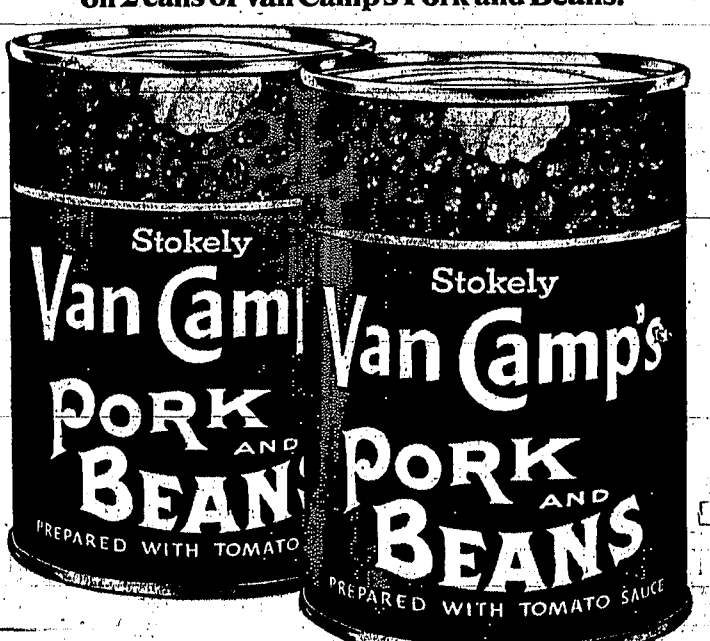

# Survey Reveals Needs Of Small Police Departments In South Idaho

A study of law enforcement agencies in Southern and Eastern Idaho has revealed a need for better training, more men and improved communications—mainly in smaller law enforcement agencies.

The details were spelled out in a report issued today by the Idaho Law Enforcement Planning Commission.

Twin Falls Police Chief Frank Barnett, a member of that commission, said Wednesday the report basically concerns smaller police departments and sheriff's offices in Southern and Eastern Idaho.

"We have sufficient manpower in Twin Falls, but some small cities in Magic Valley lack enough men to provide effective 24-hour police service of even a routine nature," Mr. Barnett said.

He said this was the finding of the planning commission, headed by John Perkins, police chief at Pocatello.

The commission made a study in its area, Region III, which takes in 24 counties. The region includes all of Magic Valley and Eastern Idaho.

In addition to Mr. Perkins and Mr. Barnett, are Sheriff William Baker of Lemhi County; Homer Evans of the Blackfoot Police Department; Vernon D. Jensen, an FBI agent in Pocatello; Sheriff Arlando Larsen of Franklin County; Richard Lous, police chief at Rigby; Gary Nelson, police chief at Preston; Sheriff H. E. Parker of Bannock County; Robert Pollock, police chief of Idaho Falls; and Sheriff Ed Ramshaw of Butte County.

Chief Barnett said it is often difficult for the Twin Falls Department to get in contact with Ketchum, Salmon, Hays and other communities in the area.

Members of the Task Force, in their report, stated, "While the personnel of these agencies perform their duties with commendable zeal, determination and devotion, they are with few exceptions underpaid and lack the prerequisite educational or vocational training to help them carry out their jobs with the competency needed to promote public support and gain the respect they need and desire."

The report by the officers said a number of cities in the region do not have adequate jail facilities and many law headquarters are inconveniently located or poorly arranged.

Most of the agencies lack up-to-date equipment, such as radar, cameras, public address systems, firearms and riot control equipment.

Chief Barnett said it is often difficult for the Twin Falls Department to get in contact with Ketchum, Salmon, Hays and other communities in the area.

Financial reach of smaller departments, it was reported. Mr. Barnett said this is where a state law enforcement training academy will be of benefit to police officers in Idaho.

Such an academy will be established in the near future. The report also said police communications is also a problem in the area.

Often several agencies are on the same radio frequency. This means a large number of the small agencies are cut out by transmissions from other agencies.

Mr. Barnett said the larger cities, such as Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Blackfoot and Burley, are not faced with the problems of the smaller cities.

He said the Task Force is making its study so that recommendations can be made to improve conditions in the smaller law enforcement agencies in the region.

"Walkie-talkie" units are used when an officer is away from his patrol vehicle, or when directing traffic during an emergency.

The report indicated even the costs of these units is often beyond the financial capabilities of the smaller departments.

# 'Car-Chomper' Turns 1,400 Cars Daily Into Scrap

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — At last count 40 million derelict automobiles were rusting away on and spoiling the U.S. landscape. Seven million "clunkers" are being added each year.

A Los Angeles scrap metal firm has come up with a partial answer to how America can keep from being buried in abandoned cars. It has a car-eater which gobbles up 1,400 automobiles each day. It chews one in a few seconds into hand-sized metal chunks which can be converted into usable steel.

This giant auto garbage disposal, owned by the Hugo Neuer Proter Co., is located at Terminal Island and it also eats washing machines, stoves and water heaters. The firm deals in other types of metal debris, ranging from machine shop turnings to beer kegs, but its main business is in munching autos.

The problem of disposing of unwanted cars became acute in the late 1950's when the price of autos began to decline sharply, according to Richard New, vice president of the

firm. When that happened most wreckers could no longer profitably compress cars into bales and sell them to steel mills. As a result, car owners could not sell their derelicts to junkyards. Instead, they had to pay to have them towed away. It started then. Cars were abandoned on streets and parking lots all over the country.

In 1958, the Houston-based Proter-Steel Corp. developed its grinder. It joined with Hugo Neuer, a scrap metal firm based in New York, to sell the auto-eater's product abroad

since U.S. steel firms preferred the cheaper baled scrap metal.

Then the Proter process, which provides nearly pure steel chunks, hit it big because of a technological advance. Oxygen furnaces became the big thing in steel mills. They needed virtually pure steel. So Proter could command \$33 per ton compared to the \$18 a ton for baled material.

Its auto-eater's food comes from throughout California by train and truck. Minus engine, seats and tires, cars are

dropped by a crane onto a conveyor belt carrying them into the grinder's maw. Cutting tools, chemicals, and powerful magnets reduce the car and sort out impurities, 25 to 30 percent of which is dirt.

"We are probably the largest producer of dirt in the area besides the city," said Neuer. But even the dirt is utilized. Two-hundred-fifty to 400 tons are sold daily as landfill.

Since there is no organized system to bring autos to the grinder, Neuer's firm works hard to keep the supply coming.

To supplement the irregular supply from small dealers and normal pickups, the company has set up five car-flattening centers in the Los Angeles area. They buy and truck cars to Terminal Island. Before getting there, they are flattened to about one-quarter size for economical transportation.

The terminal island operation, along with two other Hugo Neuer plants in Boston and New York, export about one million tons of well-digested automobiles annually to Japan and Europe.

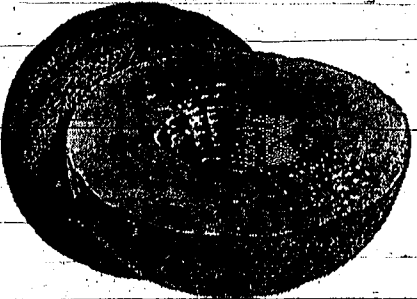



### BAD HAND KEY TO CONTRACT SET

We don't think much of South's seven no-trump bid. His partner had shown one ace and one king but if that king turned out to be in spades instead of hearts, the chances are that a heart lead would hold South to 11 tricks.

On the other hand, most players overbid their good hands and South certainly held a good hand.

We think even less of West's double. West could be sure that South's bidding was based on a long diamond suit. Give South eight diamonds and West's high cards in the other suits would be useless.

Anyway, West doubled and opened the king of spades. South won and rattled off his diamonds as fast as he could play

them. East followed to the first four and started his discarding, with the three of hearts. He had nothing but low cards and they all looked alike to him.

He couldn't have been more mistaken. The one thing of value in his hand was the eight of hearts and that would only be of value if he kept it protected.

Once East threw away the three of hearts, West's goose was cooked. South kept on with diamonds and on the last diamond West had to come down to five cards. He had to hold a spade and three clubs. He couldn't guard hearts also.

South chalked up 2,470 for game, rubber and doubled grand slam merely because East couldn't be bothered to think with his bad hand.

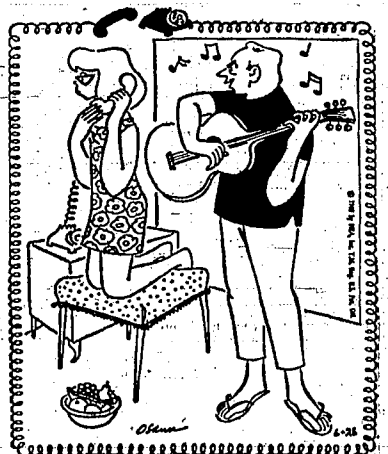



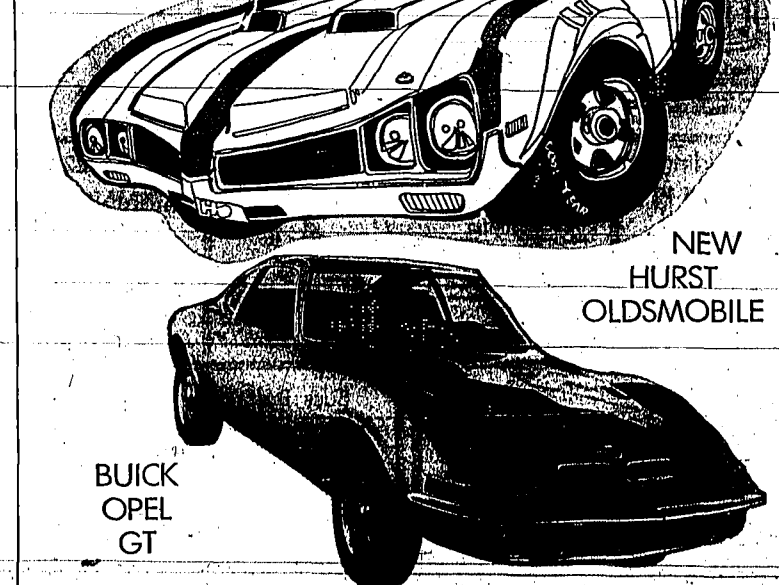

### 'Sulphur-Loving' Bacteria Threatens Snake River Dam

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI) — because of deposits picked up as it flows through Hells Canyon.

As long as the bacteria live on the bottom of a free-flowing river and are picked up to die in the oxygenated water, the sulfides are not allowed to multiply and the ecology remains in balance.

However, Drake said, the proposed dam, which would open Lewis and Clark National Park, to ocean-going traffic along the Snake, would create a slackwater pool for 30 miles behind the dam.

Drake said the sulfides would quickly multiply as the water warmed and the oxygen supply diminished.

"Cold, water-loving fish like steelhead and salmon would swim down to the depths in search of a comfortable temperature, and when they did, they would pick up a gift of sulfides," Drake said. "That would be all for them."

Drake said dams on the lower Snake River have not been in existence long enough to allow sulfides to become a hazard to the ecological balance.

He urged studies of the problem and means to eliminate it, or else he probably won't know about it until it's too late.
