Senate OK's Sawtooth Recreation Area, White Clouds Included

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special) — The U. S. Senate Wednesday unanimously passed legislation to create an expanded Sawtooth National Recreation Area which would include the White Cloud area.

Idaho Sen. Frank Church and Len Jordan succeeded in amending the original proposal to include 157,000 acres of the White Cloud country within the recreation area.

The White Cloud National Recreation Area would include a total of 508,000 acres, including the White Clouds, the Sawtooth Mountains and Sawtooth Valley.

The White Cloud amendment provides for the first time Forest Service control over prospecting and mining activities in the recreation area.

The legislation would give the Forest Service new authority to:

- Prevent mining pollutants from entering streams.
- Prevent erosion caused by mining operations.

essential access roads for aluminum adverse impacts on the area.

Provide for restoration of disturbed areas where feasible.

Provide appropriate disposal of waste.

Provide removal of mine and mill buildings after operations ceased.

The legislation next goes to the House Interior Committee.

Deputy Regional Forester G. Watts told the committee after the Senate action that the bill would provide for a substantial increase in the ability of the Forest Service to regulate mining activities within the Sawtooth area including the White Cloud Peaks area.

Mr. Watts said he certainly hopes to see speedy action leading to enactment of the legislation because of the urgent need to protect legislation in the Sawtooth area.

Sen. Jordan said he has been assured that the American Smelting and Refining Co. will cooperate with the Forest Service in the development of its operating plans to shut mining and all operations in this great multiple-use area.

Clouds are enjoyed by many who seek unspoiled country and the opportunity for solitude. This area is the habitat of big horn sheep, mountain goats, elk and mule deer.

"But," he said, "recent developments threaten to change all this. Major prospecting of polybutene deposits is taking place east and north of Castle Peak, the highest of the White Clouds.

"A prospecting rush is commencing which threatens to despoil the area and to require the use of tractors to tear off the topsoil—a threat which could cause serious erosion and siltation and could leave these beautiful mountains permanently scarred."

2 Tots Die In Burley Fire

Oldest Child Escapes From Flaming Home

BURLEY — Investigation was continuing today into the fire which claimed the lives of two small children of Mr. and Mrs. Ray L. Bronson Wednesday afternoon. The fire destroyed their four-room frame home, on a farm southeast of town.

The victims were Laurie Rae, 2, and Cal Ray, 3. The oldest of the couple's three children, Jamie, escaped the flaming house, with only singed hair. Mrs. Bronson was taken to Mountain Memorial Hospital suffering from shock by asphyxiation.

Sheriff Ray Mitchell said Mrs. Bronson had put all three children down for their nap and was painting a boat in the farm shop just a short distance from the house. She was with Toby Stray, 10, nephew of Mr. Bronson, who is visiting the family. She sent Toby back to the house to get another brush and when the boy opened the back door the smoke and flames caught him.

He called to the children and Jamie came out the back door. The two boys then ran to Mrs. Bronson's suffering from shock.

It was impossible to enter the house the fire was so intense.

The Burley fire department received a call at 10:15 p.m. Wednesday. Both rural trucks were sent to the scene and firefighters fought the blaze for an hour.

The cause of the fire was not known.

Officers said the body of the 3-year-old boy was found in the hickory about 10 feet from the back door, and the little girl was still in her bed.

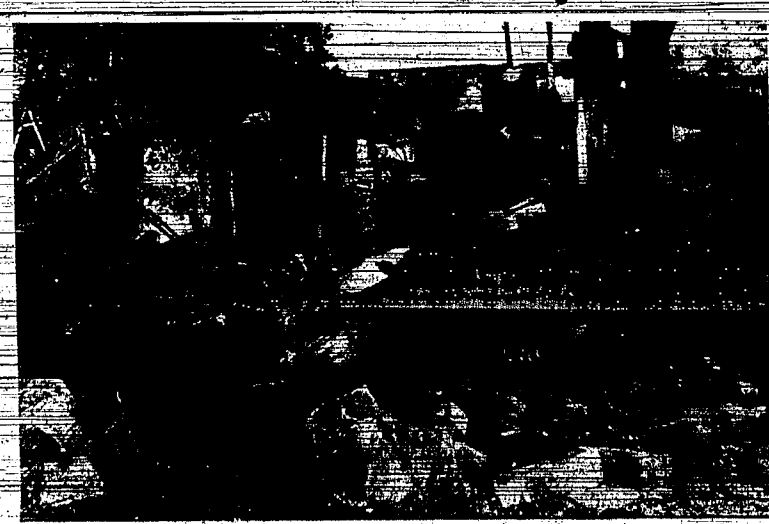
Lois Young, Cassia County Coroner, is conferring with officials Thursday morning to determine the cause of the fire.

The charred remains of the Bronson house still were smoldering Thursday, with wet newspapers and other ruined household items the only things left.

The fire started in a barn parked near the house also were reported destroyed in the fire.

Mr. Bronson was at work in a processing plant at the time of the fire. The farm is located at 500 east and 5th south, in the View community.

The bodies of the two children are at McCullough Funeral Home.

Erb Brothers Store Gutted By Buhl Fire

BUHL — Extensive damage was done early Thursday morning in a fire at Erb Brothers Market in Buhl, which gutted portions of the locally-owned supermarket.

Fire Chief Lee Monroe estimated inventory damage at \$50,000 and structural damage at about \$20,000.

The fire was discovered at 7:05 a.m. from the residence of Bob McManama, next to the store. Firemen left the scene about 7:30 a.m. Thursday, Chief Monroe said.

When volunteer firemen and two Buhl city trucks arrived at the scene, the building, situated on a quarter lot corner, a block off of Buhl's main street, was already burning fiercely.

The fire chief said it is believed the fire started in the bakery section of the store's south side. Cause of the fire is not known.

Camas Youth Is Killed In Vietnam

FAIRFIELD — Pvt. 1st Lt. Robert Hurlanek, 21, U.S. Marine Corps, son of John L. Hurlanek, Fairfield, has been reported killed in action June 27 in Vietnam.

News of the death was told the family he was killed by a sniper blast.

Mr. Hurlanek was born June 2, 1947, at Ketchikan, Alaska. His mother, Mrs. Luella Corp, Middleton. He attended high school in Middleton, and Boise State College for two years and college in Ontario, Ore., for one year.

In June, 1968, he joined the Marines and was stationed at Camp Pendleton before being sent to Vietnam in February, 1969.

Survivors include his father and stepmother, both Fairfield.

Funeral services are pending the day, at 3:30 p.m., but will be held at Middleton.

Nationalist China Stages Raid On Reds

TAIPEI (UPI)—A fleet of Nationalist Chinese gunboats blitzed into a coastal Communist naval base on the mainland Wednesday night and escaped today reporting two supply ships and a Peking gunboat sunk, the government said.

It was the first sea battle between the two Chinas since 1949, 1949. The returning raiders said they damaged a second Communist gunboat.

A government announcement described the target as the Ming River, about 100 miles west of the northern tip of Nationalist China and near the mainland city of Tsucheng.

The battles spilled out into the Formosa Strait separating the two nations, with a rear guard of Nationalist gunboats holding off Communist counterattacks until the raiders finished.

Analysts along the strait have seen between the two Chinas in recent months and this battle is believed to bring reinforcements from Peking and other units for invading the mainland by the Nationalist regime.

Hanoi Plans Release Of 3 Captives

PARIS (UPI)—U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge today thanked North Vietnamese negotiators for Hanoi's announcement that three captured American fliers would be released soon and expressed hope it would lead to further and more general prisoner releases.

Lodge spoke today at the 24th session of the Vietnam peace negotiations which heard both South Vietnamese and North Vietnamese negotiators accuse each other of escalating the war and of refusing to make meaningful concessions.

"We have just seen press reports that North Vietnam has announced the release of three American prisoners of war and that it will allow other American prisoners of war to receive gifts from their families to mark the July 4th independence day," Lodge said.

Pigeons Spreading Strychnine Poison

Pigeons dying of strychnine poisoning have been found in an area northwest of Twin Falls and County Sheriff Paul Corder said today he is concerned the birds might be used in the population of the city.

"If this happens and a young water polo club of one of our clubs, there could be real trouble," he said.

He was alerted to this situation Wednesday night when a woman living northwest of the city called to say she had found several dead pigeons, cats, dogs and other small farm animals.

Sheriff Corder said it was determined after a search that the birds were spreading strychnine poison.

"Anyone coming into contact with a dead animal is urged to call the local health department for instructions," especially if strychnine poisoning is in question," he said.

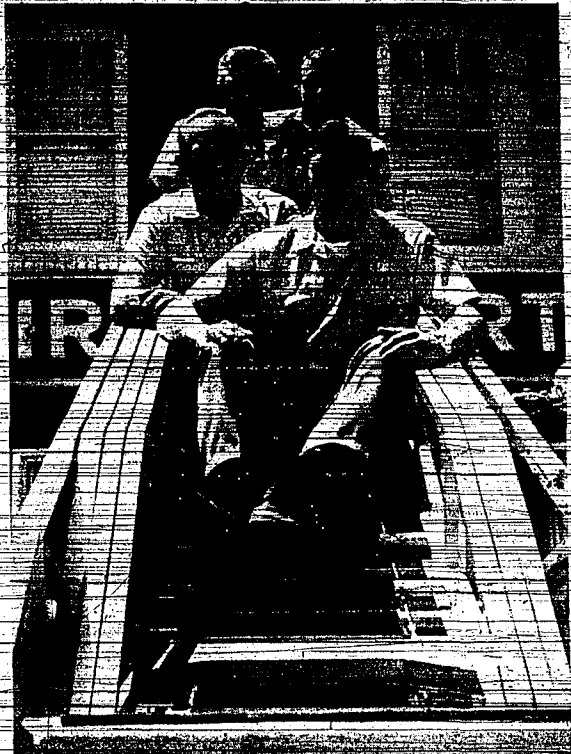

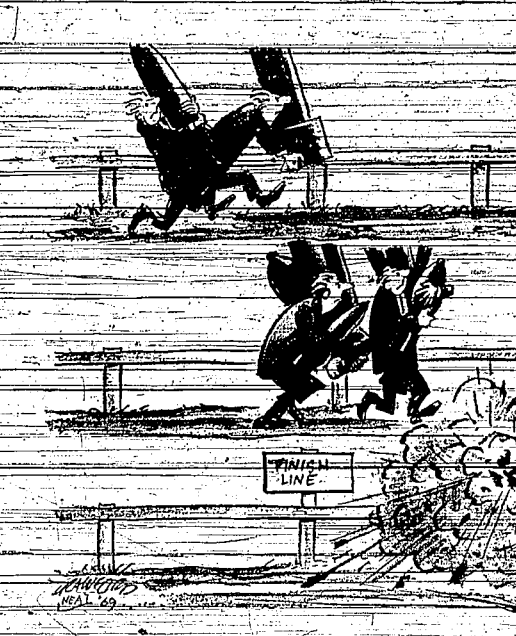

Senate Panel Endorses Food Stamps

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Agriculture Committee has approved a broad new federal food stamp program calling for expanded production and an increase in stamp allotments to insure poor families an adequate diet.

The bill was a compromise, worked out by farm state conservatives and liberal "hunger hunters" who conducted widely publicized hearings and field trips this year.

It would give the Agriculture Department authority to set eligibility standards so that no state could impose standards so strict that poor families are stranded on the streets.

The measure now goes to the Senate floor. Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., has said he will push for amendments to provide free stamps to the poorest families. The committee rejected such a proposal Monday.

The bill would raise the present minimum price for the stamps, which are used by poor families like money in grocery stores to buy food.

The lowest income families of five persons or less would pay 30 cents per person per month for the stamps, and larger families would pay a flat \$3.

Under the bill, parents of every family participating must get enough stamps to buy a nutritious diet. The Agriculture Department has set \$100 as the minimum needed to decently feed a family of four.

Under the present plan, poor families paying the minimum price can get no more than \$80 worth of stamps for four people.

The Senate has voted to boost food stamp spending to \$4.8 billion a year to \$50 million in the fiscal year which started today. The bill approved today would double that to \$13.5 billion in fiscal 1971 and 1972.

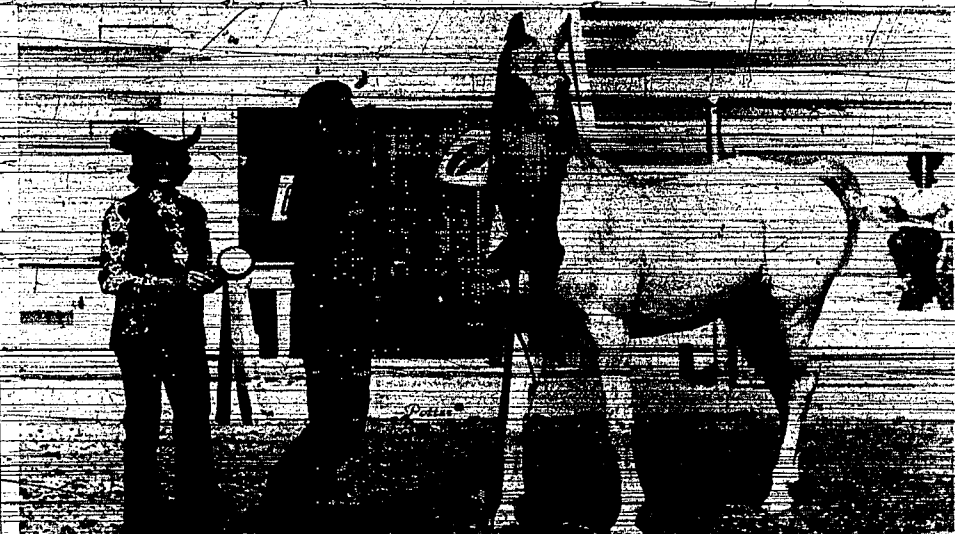

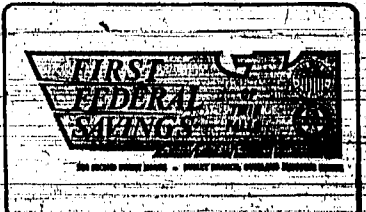

Roofers Agree To Conference With U.S. Mediation Service

BOISE (UPI)—The South west Idaho Roofing Contractors will meet with union representatives under auspices of the Federal Mediation Service on July 8, 1969, it was announced Wednesday by the Idaho Employers Council.

The new meeting represents another attempt to reach settlement in a dispute which has stalled roofing work in this area since June 1.

The wage package and fringe benefits offered by the contractors in order to secure a new contract includes increases totaling \$1.01 in wages and fringe benefits plus an increase in assistance and a provision giving firmness 50 cents an hour more than journeymen. The fringe benefits include a pension fund, group health insurance plan with \$10,000 major medical coverage.

The offer by the contractors represents an increase of more than 35 per cent and would bring the roofers' wages to \$3.01 in a three-year contract. The cost of living increased last year at a rate of 4.8 per cent and national productivity increases average just under three per cent.

Industrial wage settlements nationally have averaged 6.1 per cent in the last year, and settlements in the construction trades have run from 25 to 30 per cent, Fred Smith, manager of the Idaho Employers Council said Wednesday. The current offer represents a significant gain for roofers as compared to other trades and industry.

Work-Incentive Program Takes Effect In Gem State

BOISE (UPI)—Gov. Don Samuelson said Wednesday a work-incentive program to train 400 women in Idaho had gone into effect.

Samuelson said the U.S. Department of Labor awarded a contract to the Idaho Department of Employment to conduct the State Work-Incentive (WIN) program.

"The women, who are receiving payments under aid to families with dependent children, will be referred to the Department of Employment by the State Department of Public Assistance."

Samuelson said he also appeared that some young people 18 years of age and not in school full-time might also be referred for WIN program training.

A total of \$672,000 has been earmarked for the project, which will be funded on the basis of 80 per cent federal money and 20 per cent state money.

Samuelson said maximum effort will be made in the WIN program to train women in a variety of individuals and, at the same time, coordinate training needs with jobs available in Idaho.

During training or work experience, those in the program will receive a \$10 incentive payment each month, which may be in addition to their welfare grant. As wages increase, welfare payments decrease until they become self-supporting.

FTC Members Argue Over Cigarette Ads

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A bitter division among members of the Federal Trade Commission over a ruling on cigarette advertising should Congress act—broke into the open Wednesday in an angry exchange between two commissioners.

FTC Chairman Paul Rand Dixon and FTC member Paul Einton lashed out at each other.

Dixon had opposed conducting hearings on the issue and disposed of a bill which would continue the now expired prohibition against action by federal regulatory agencies on cigarette advertising. Einton favored immediate hearings and carried the majority with him.

The hearing came at the close of a session of a two-day

hearing on the FTC's proposed rule that cigarette ads must carry a warning that "smoking can kill."

Chairman Paul Rand Dixon said that even the FTC's "anti-smoking crusader" who lashed out at him Wednesday, "was on the witness stand. He had just asked the FTC of failing to use its powers to halt deceptive cigarette advertising."

Einton contended, and Dixon agreed, that the FTC's Cigarette Labeling Act did not prevent the FTC of failing to use its powers to halt deceptive cigarette advertising.

"I don't agree with you," Dixon interrupted angrily. "We don't have the right to draw away from Einton's chair, so he faced away from Einton and the white-haired Tennessee chairman pointed to Einton. 'Do you carry, I'm not in your right'."

California Solons End Fund Deadlock

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—A budget deadlock was broken Wednesday when Assembly Democrats agreed to accept an offer from Gov. Ronald Reagan and Republicans to use surplus state money for new school aid.

The settlement paved the way for passage of the fiscal year 1969-70 budget for the current fiscal year, thus resolving a growing financial crisis.

"We're ready to move," said Assemblyman Bob Barrett of Van Nuys, after a hurried conference with Reagan in his office.

The settlement provides that surplus funds found from the fiscal year which ended Monday midnight will be used for new school aid.

Reagan informed Democrats that the amount to be set aside would amount to "at least" \$15 million. Legislative leaders said it actually could be anywhere from \$20 million to \$100 million above the \$105-million Reagan originally offered in the budget.

Reagan and frustrated legislators had been meeting privately with political strategists and money experts all day in an effort to resolve the crisis. A saga Monday midnight when the state embargo on the new fiscal year without a budget.

Democrats had demanded a substantial boost in state school aid. The Legislature's proposed budget had offered \$188 million. But Reagan had insisted the state couldn't afford that much. He had offered \$105 million.

T.E. Building Permits Lower For Month

Two permits were issued for additions and structural alterations at an estimated cost of \$12,500 and 18 permits were issued for repairs and improvements for \$27,500.

The total estimated cost of building permits to date is \$2,028,363 which compares with \$1,136,967 for June, 1968.

It is a well-known principle that any time you give a player a chance to make a mistake he may do so. It is equally well known that if you don't have to make a mistake just because he has been given a chance to do so.

When **East** was played in a match-point game, the contract at all tables was three-trumps. When **North** became declarer, as was generally the case, a club was opened. West's 10 would force North's king and when East got in with the ace of spades he would lead a second club and hold declarer's ace. South became declarer at three tables. In each instance, East was hit. In the first South made the routine play of letting

the lead run around to his jack. **Alains** (that declarer) East promptly cashed his ace of clubs when he got in with the ace of spades.

The second declarer went up with dummy's king of hearts and dropped the jack from his own hand. This false-card play might have worked. Unfortunately for him, East was able to do something of his own and could see no reason why a declarer would play dummy king when he held the jack in his own hand except as an effort to get a heart contract. So the East also took his ace of clubs and held declarer to five.

The other South also went up with dummy's king of hearts but just dropped the three-spot from his hand. This time the East player who gained the lead with this suit (he should also have realized South wanted a heart return) but he didn't lead back a heart and this last South ran off the last of declarer's top score.
