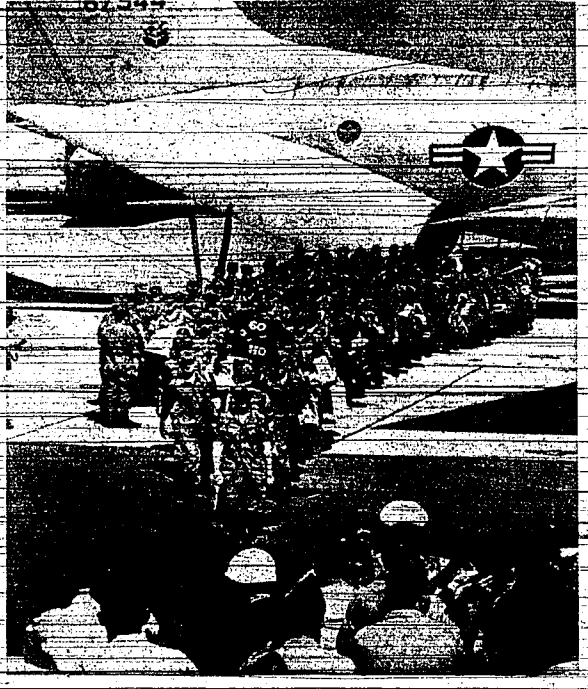

The department's letter, reporting on the results of a recent examination of Chicago school policies, says the board's policies "are discriminatory toward Negro students."

The rest were transferred in having served most of their scheduled 140 days in Vietnam. Of the total, 140 were returning for discharge.

Syrian Premier Seeks Russ Aid

MOSCOW (UPI) — While MIG fighter pilots from the Israeli Air Force fought Israeli jets over the Golan Heights, Syrian Premier Nourreddin Assad went shopping for Soviet aid today in a political statement. "There are plentiful indications that the Soviets will try to avoid another disastrous war like the one the Arabs fought last in six days of June 1967. There is every reason to believe the Soviets would prefer to settle the Arab-Israeli conflict by negotiation."

Mideast War Drives Arab Nations Closer To Soviet Alliance

By United-Press International Heavy fighting in the Middle East during the past two weeks appeared today to be driving the Arab nations closer to the Soviet bloc. Egypt prepared to establish diplomatic relations with East Germany and Syria renewed its appeal to the Kremlin for more military aid. Four Arab nations already have recognized the Communist East German regime — Iraq, Syria, the Sudan and Southern Yemen. An Arab diplomat in Cairo said the Arab nations are being driven closer to the Soviet bloc by the military situation in the Middle East. The diplomat said Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser was particularly angry about what he considered unreasoning and blind support by the United States for Israel and a total lack of sympathy with the Arab cause.

Reds Slow Rate Of Infiltration

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. military spokesmen reported today that the rate of North Vietnamese infiltration of South Vietnam dropped to its lowest point in the war last month, coinciding with the Communist pullback of some 100,000 troops from the battlefield. The report from military spokesmen said that North Vietnamese troops had slipped into South Vietnam in the fewest of any month since the start of the war in 1955.

Nixon Hints Women May Occupy Court

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican congressmen met with President Nixon at the White House today and some came away with the impression he was considering several women for appointment to the Supreme Court. The four, Reps. Florence P. Dunbar of New Jersey, Patricia Hecker of Massachusetts, Catherine May of Washington and Charlotte T. Reid of California, all written Nixon recently complaining that women were not getting responsible positions in his administration.

Russians, Chinese Swap Accusations

MOSCOW (UPI) — Russia and Communist China accused each other's troops today of starting the border incident along the 1,500-mile frontier from the conference table where the two Communist powers are trying to settle their "border" dispute. The Soviets, in a charge to the Chinese, said that Chinese pilots killed an unarmed Soviet plane on the island of Hainan and wounded three other civilians when they opened fire on the launch Tuesday with machine guns and hand grenades. 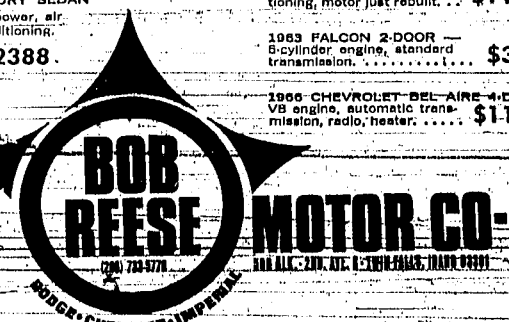

TV Code Review Board Advocates End To All Cigarette Commercials

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Washington, D.C., group of governmental regulators of cigarette advertising, the National Association of Broadcasters, today announced that the board will voluntarily recommend all cigarette ads be eliminated from television by Sept. 1, 1973.

NAB's Radio Code Review Board was expected to follow suit in some fashion today. The board also recommended prohibiting cigarette commercials in or adjacent to any program primarily directed to youth audiences. And it recommended a subcommittee study guidelines to further reduce the unique appeal of certain aspects of television cigarette advertising to youth.

The recommendations must be acted upon by NAB's television board of directors before they can go into effect. All three national networks and 64.4 percent of the nation's 523 commercial television stations subscribe to the code, the industry's apparatus for self-regulation.

Under the phase-out plan, which has a goal of a total elimination by Sept. 1, 1973, stations would measure the total amount of time sold for cigarette ads over the next year.

Sen. Stennis Advocates ABM Plan, Urges Reduction Of Overseas Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., Tuesday urged Senate approval of the Safeguard antiballistic missile system (ABM) and proposed renegotiation of the nation's treaty commitments overseas with an eye toward eventual reduction of the armed forces.

Stennis' opening declaration that the time had come to review and renegotiate America's defense treaty arrangements with 46 foreign countries appeared designed in part to mollify Senate critics of military spending who regard the ABM system as a costly and perhaps unworkable addition to the United States' already huge defense arsenal.

Stennis said the procurement bill, which authorizes purchases, research and development for the 12 months that began July 1, may represent the approach of a turning point in the U.S. defense program.

Services must be reduced by one million or more men. Noting that 60 percent of the military budget is spent on personnel and the day-to-day operation of the services, Stennis said: "It is here that substantial savings must come."

Old West Cliches Are At The Heart Of Theatre Troupe's "Sneaky Fitch"

H. Paul Kliss, Antique Theatre group is presenting this summer. They will play a p.p.a.r. Thursday through Saturday at the College of Southern Idaho Arts Center. Proceeds from the four performances will go to the Twin Falls YMCA swimming pool drive.

"There can be no subtlety or Stanislawski in this play," Mr. Kliss said. "The audience has to recognize the cliches in order to appreciate the humor."

Mr. Kliss says "Sneaky Fitch" is a sentimental recreation of

the mythical West of TV and movies and is a tragic farce because within its easy reference is the superficial sentimentality of man's recognition of his own identity as an individual in a conformist society.

"And in spite of its spoofing nature and its mock-balladism, the conclusion of the play never fails to grab the gullible," he said. "With the use of a narrator, in the form of a singer played by Richard Gardner, the continuity and cohesion of the play rely somewhat on music."

Alan Greene, who plays "Sneaky Fitch" in the play, says the character is "a repulsive old boat, whose existence serves as a constant reminder to the townfolk of their own shortcomings."

Mr. Greene is trying something different with his underplaying of the main character. "The supporting roles in this short play are extremely important because of the striking contrast they provide to Sucky Fitch Mervyn Vale, the town undertaker in the form of a cross between Lurch" of the Addams Family and Bela Lugosi," says the director, Marvin McIntyre, who plays Marv.

Bill Smith, who plays Rev. production.

Blackwood said. "The parson has to come off as a prototype of sanctimoniousness to underscore his two-faced personality."

"Rackham, the fast-draw cowboy, is the ideal, all-around and no-mind, robot gunslinger," according to Dennis Carter, who plays the part. "He only goes through the actions of his image and nothing else. He doesn't need to."

Mr. Kliss spent an entire evening choreographing a card game which takes only five minutes in its entirety. The stylized movement of this sort is extremely important in this type of representational play, Mr. Kliss said.

"The director said the whole thing is kind of reminiscent of 'Fugate Copland'—'Bully—the Kid' symphony. This type of drama is not very often attempted because of the long amount of rehearsal time required."

"This type of blocking procedure is a source of extreme confidence for the actor on stage, the type of confidence an actor feels when he knows the director has a solid production concept and control of the play," says Frigoris Gaskaloragakis, who plays Doc Burch in the production.

Water Is Key To Life On The Moon

By DR. I. M. LEVITT
Director, The Fels Planetarium

If water is discovered on the moon, the ability of lunar explorers to live "off the moon" will be greatly enhanced. Water is the key factor in extended survival, and all further life-support systems on the moon will depend on its presence.

After water and an atmosphere (both thought probably available) the next most important ingredient for survival on the moon is food. There appear no fundamental reasons why food cannot be grown on the moon. While different forms of food may be developed — some not even contemplated at this time — all foods must meet several essential criteria:

Food must provide bodily nourishment — all those elements necessary for the well-being of the individual. Doctors have a precise notion of what constitutes a balanced diet. Without such a diet, physical deterioration takes place with resultant physiological damage. The food must also have bulk. Doctors are pessimistic concerning the body's ability to exist on pills or food concentrates, no matter how complete they are in food value.

Research in the growing of a green, scumlike substance called algae has been under way for many years. In addition to providing food, algae can help regenerate the atmosphere of a closed environment. In photosynthesis, the key to algae growth, algae in mineral "spiked" water will absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and in the presence of light will increase in volume many times, emitting oxygen as a by-product.

Algae appears to be an ideal medium for providing food. Between 15 and 20 cubic feet of algae solution per man could probably produce the necessary food and oxygen to keep him alive.

The human body consumes about 1 1/2 tons of food, oxygen and water in a year. Normally, the body will not increase or decrease in weight during this period. Thus, body wastes at the end of the year must precisely equal the intake. What do we do with these body wastes? Algae or other greenest advantage, for it can process human wastes in growing. This is called the "closed cycle" and in extended planetary trips will become a logistic necessity.

The concept of a closed cycle is unpleasant to the average individual. However, it must be realized that we on the earth also live in a closed cycle. The only difference between the moon or space and the earth in this respect is one of size. On the earth there is an almost unlimited volume. Off the earth, volume is severely limited and, thus, we will be more acutely aware of it.

Once the green scum has been harvested, it cannot be just collected and eaten. We cannot go directly to "suy" algaeburgers. Many steps are required to make algae palatable food, but scientists are confident these present no insoluble problems.

A successful lunar settlement may require hydroponic farming. This science is about 70 years old and significant advances have been realized. In this most efficient growing system, the chemicals and nutrients needed by the plants are always available, for they are in solution and the plant roots are in intimate contact with the solution.

Human beings may require some animal proteins — though it is conceivable, if unlikely, that the animals could be vegetarian. Animal proteins could be provided in minimal quantities to lunar settlers by using algae as food for fast-growing animals like chickens, hogs and rabbits.

To complete the ecological cycle, how would the settlers acquire their "eyes, medicine, plastic, ceramics, etc. and so forth? These the chemist could synthesize from the basic elements: oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, carbon and silicon. A super-versatile chemical plant could be transported to the moon. Its assembly could be changed "on the spot" to manufacture soap, hydrochloric acid and so on.

In a book I wrote in 1959, "Target for Tomorrow" (Doubt & Co.), I showed how by using basic elements a tremendous volume of life-supporting materials could be manufactured. On the moon in an enclosed, air-tight shelter these chemical processes, so well known on the earth, could be utilized to provide the necessary materials to perpetuate life.

To build permanent structures on the moon will require metals. Many scientists believe metals are present on the lunar surface as sulfides. These sulfides could

be roasted in the presence of oxygen to form sulfur dioxide and the metals collected either on the moon, eliminating the dependence on earth supplies. However, starting the lunar colony on the road to self-sufficiency will involve a tremendous logistic problem, one that can and must be overcome.

Once a permanent colony is established on the moon, all our past space efforts will seem a more realistic aspect brought up from the earth at the exploration of the solar system from earth is an undertaking which could bankrupt even the richest nation. But with the moon and with the lack of an atmosphere permitting exotic launching methods, astronauts could be sent on journeys lasting years with costs comparatively negligible.
