Violence In Ireland

BELFAST (UPI)—Prime Minister James Callaghan, Clark cut short a vacation in Britain and returned to Belfast today in an effort to head off a new round of violence there.

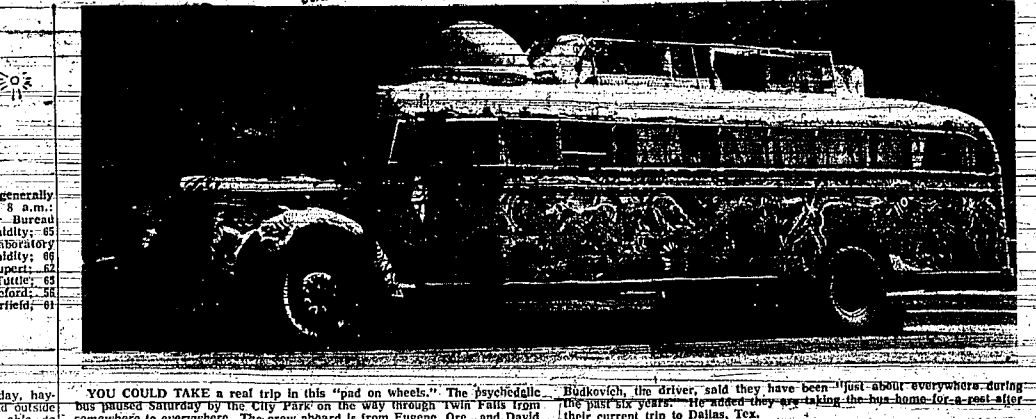

President Creates 'Staff'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon has created a "staff" to help guide the growth of the nation's 200th anniversary.

The staff will be under the direction of Leonard Garment, special consultant to the President, who will work in liaison with Daniel P. Moynihan, executive secretary of Nixon's Council for Urban Affairs, and a presidential advisor.

Nixon said the five functions for the unit would be: —Forecasting future developments and assessing the consequences of social trends. —Measuring the range of impact of alternative courses of action, including the degree to which change in one area might affect another. —Estimating the range of social indicators that can be attained. —Developing and monitoring government and private organizations called to action by the present and future quality of American life, and the direction and rate of its change. —Summarizing and correlating research activities, being conducted at all levels of government and by private organizations.

Pope Terms Seen 'Marvelous'

CAPTELL GANDOLFO, Italy (UPI)—Pope Paul VI said Sunday morning's forthcoming moon landing flight presages other scientific conquests "of which even the imagination cannot dream."

"Science fiction becomes reality," the Pope said as he gave his weekly blessing to pilgrims and tourists outside the papal summer residence in this hill town southeast of Rome.

"Science and technique manifest themselves in such an incomparable, audacious manner as to indicate the peak of their conquest and to press against the horizon of our imagination," he said.

"Man is at the center of this undertaking and reveals himself to us as a plant, reveals himself to us as divine, not in himself but in his origin and his destiny."

Rep. Hansen Asks Benefit For Reserves

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Orval Hansen, R-Idaho, said Saturday he plans to introduce an amendment to the G. I. Bill to extend the education benefits.

Under the legislation, members of the National Guard and Reserve called to active duty in Vietnam would receive the same benefits as other members of the armed forces.

Hansen said a provision in the present law discriminates against members of the Guard and reservists. Members of the regular armed forces qualify for certain educational benefits, while members of the National Guard and reserves called up for the same period of time do not.

In 1910 a wide-eyed and bushy-haired musician fresh from the plains of Iowa puckered up his lips and whipped out a tune on his now brass trumpet.

J. G. (Jack) Thorpe continued whipping them out for the Twin Falls Band right up to 1952 when he says his hip went bad.

"Lost my teeth—that's what," he said. "Didn't stop me though. I just switched to drums. Great fun," he said.

Mr. Thorpe was director of the band from 1922 through 1923. The band was active during the Civil War, fought their way through the hard days. "He told me the big circles were whole notes and I learned to play 'em that way."

Now at the age of 88, Mr. Thorpe will come back to the band for a 50th anniversary celebration. This special concert is being held in honor of all old-time members of the band. The concert is July 24 at the band shell in the city park.

"Nice place," Mr. Thorpe said. "Been playing there since 1911 and that's about our band stand there twice. Once in 1911 when we got tired of the old stand we were on and tore it down."

He said the floor in the present shell is made from wood of the band stand they built in 1911.

Mr. Thorpe retired from active service with the band in the late 1950s.

SAIGON (UPI)—Mme. Anna Chennault, widow of the world War II "Flying Tiger" chief and named by author Theodore White as influencing the 1968 presidential elections, said Saturday she had "nothing to say" of the report.

Nixon Finds White House 'Stifling,' Seeks Privacy

By MERRIMAN SMITH WASHINGTON (UPI)

Backstairs at the White House, President Nixon is demonstrating a curious aspect of the job: He is not before other chief executives before him.

Here is the chief executive matter: How big and luxurious the White House may be, it comes to have a certain stifling effect on the chief executive.

One president after another has complained that if it is known he will be working in his big oval office, he then has to see more visitors than he would prefer, take more telephone calls and literally get less work done.

One President Lyndon B. Johnson had a tiny room in the oval office to which he would retreat when he wanted to get away from the burdens and annoyances of sitting behind the President-Dwight D. Eisenhower big desk.

President John F. Kennedy had a similar setup into which he would duck and dial his own telephone calls.

Nixon now just started to use a three-room suite set up across the street from the Executive Office Building (EOB). He uses this suite primarily for smaller staff conferences and also, it places him periodically closer to a large part of his executive staff.

There is a little less activity here," he says of his new office suite. "It is almost like being at Camp David—it isn't that I cannot keep people out of the oval office if I have in, but they always feel they have to come in."

The so-called branch office is considerably more personalized than his formal office. Thanks largely to decor supervised by Mrs. Nixon, including a women's coffee table, easy chairs for more informal conversations plus a desk—once used by a number of sitting behind the President—Dwight D. Eisenhower or.

Tougher Law On Violence To Be Sought

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Appropriations Committee will be asked in the coming week to approve a tougher version of present law giving students to rioting college students. This will come when the panel takes up the 1970 education agency bill. The \$18 billion appropriations measure for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare includes funds for the bulk of the student and university aid programs.

The new proposal would eliminate the need for a conviction—simply requiring that a university must deny aid to students who engaged in campus violence. The full committee is expected to endorse the action on Thursday. The measure would teach the House floor by July 22. 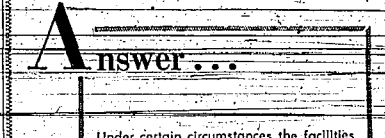

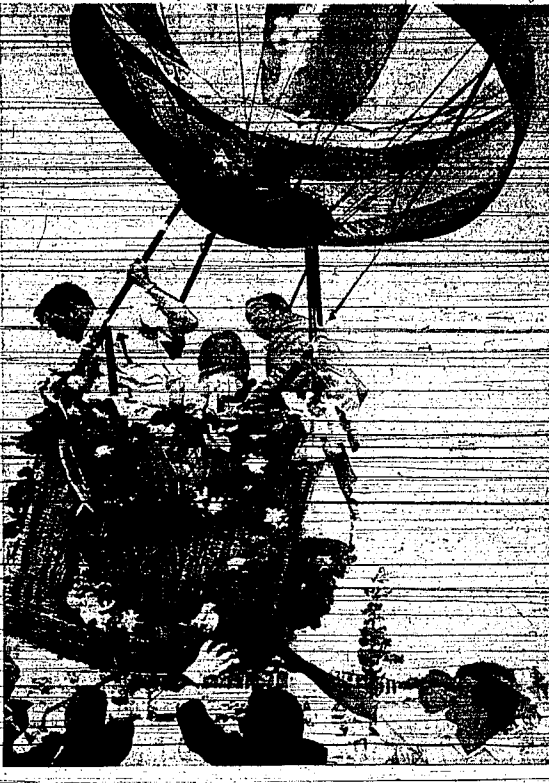

NEW YORK (UPI)—A group of angry young doctors interrupted an American Medical Association (AMA) meeting Sunday and amid catcalls from the audience accused the organization of "criminal" and "fraudulent" practices.

Soviet Craft Not Likely To Get Moon Soil

LONDON (UPI)—Russia's Luna 15 spacecraft probably won't bring back soil from the moon, according to Sir Bernard Lovell, director of the Jodrell Bank Observatory.

Lovell, whose observatory has picked up signals from the Soviet Luna 15, said Sunday he expected the Soviets eventually would recover some such unannounced spacecraft, but not before America's Apollo 11 lands next in the lunar orbit.

"It is unlikely the Russians can do this by the testing of systems in one exercise. It looks as if the Russians have had trouble and their program has fallen about a year behind schedule," Lovell said.

Lovell said it was "hard" to predict accurately Soviet space exploration because of insufficient information and "many rumors of all sorts and features" on the part of the Russians.

A critical piece of information which Lovell said could indicate whether they have been successful in using a new rocket which they are known to have been developing," he said.

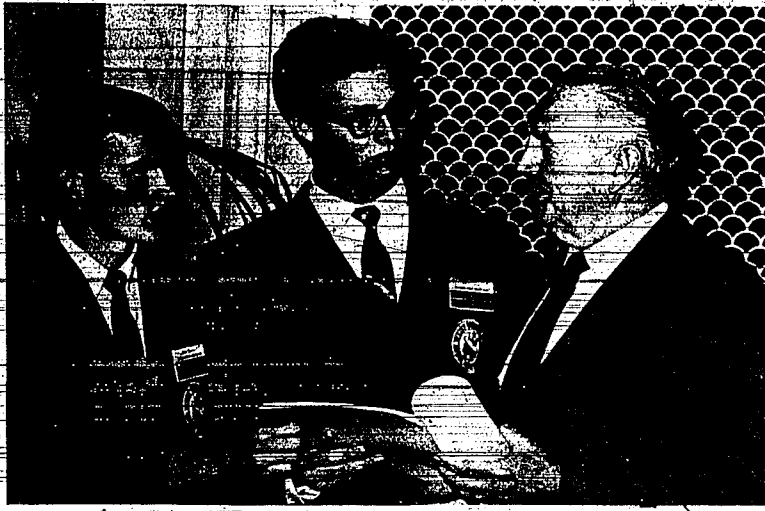

Treasury Department Urges Boost In Interest Rate For Savings Bonds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Treasury Department has proposed a \$300 million increase in annual earnings for the thousands of Americans who have invested \$52 billion in savings bonds.

The Treasury spelled out the details of its plan to ask Congress to increase from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent the interest rate on savings bonds. "A rate increase is necessary to be fair to a great number of savers who have faithfully bought bonds over a long period of time," said Paul A. Volcker, treasury undersecretary for monetary affairs.

Land Investors Cautioned Of Need For Rising Value

By JAMES L. SRODES
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The pressures of inflation have convinced many home builders they should buy a large block of land and hold it as a hedge against the inevitable increase in land costs.

At the same time, Treasury said, it will ask Congress to remove the 4 1/2 per cent ceiling on the interest that government must pay on long-term "marketable" bonds sold through commercial money markets.

Volcker said the Treasury wants the ceiling removed to provide added flexibility in management of the National Debt. But he said the government must have an immediate plan to sell long-term bonds at current inflated interest rates.

Wright Patman, D-Tex., who said the 4 1/2 per cent ceiling is tantamount to a surrender to a permanent state of high interest rates in the U.S. economy.

There are plenty of pressures on land developers and even the prospective home-buyer to get land now even though the start of construction may be a long time off, the survey conceded.

Finances National Debt—The government now finances the national debt with the sale of short-term "bills" at interest rates which fluctuate with the market.

A housing development of any size must be properly planned and this almost always requires the purchase of more land than is needed for actual construction.

So buy if you must, the survey cautions, but calculate the cost so you know what you are doing.

Apollo 11 Will Pay Off For Bettors

LONDON (UPI)—If Astronaut Neil A. Armstrong sets foot on the moon, major British bookmakers must ante up well over \$4,000 to those who bet on a manned landing before 1970 or 1971.

The payoff could hit six figures because the bookies will not say just how much has been wagered. The biggest winner is secret, however.

In 1964, David Threlfall, of Creston, England, bet 10 pounds (\$24) at 1,000-1 odds with the William Hill Organization on a manned U.S. landing before 1971.

Threlfall, 27, a personnel officer, will be in London July 21. The moment Armstrong sets foot on the lunar surface, William Hill will stuff a check worth \$24,000 in Threlfall's hands.

"We're ready to pay him off," a William Hill spokesman said this week. "In fact, we're about to draw up the check now."

"We are going to take a bad beating if we don't," the spokesman said.

The Apollo 11 mission comes too late to capture one road-sized plum. In November, 1967, the Fremont-based newspaper offered \$120,000 for the first man or men to either land on the moon or circle it and return to tell an exclusive story for the newspaper. The offer expired, unclaimed, in November, 1967.

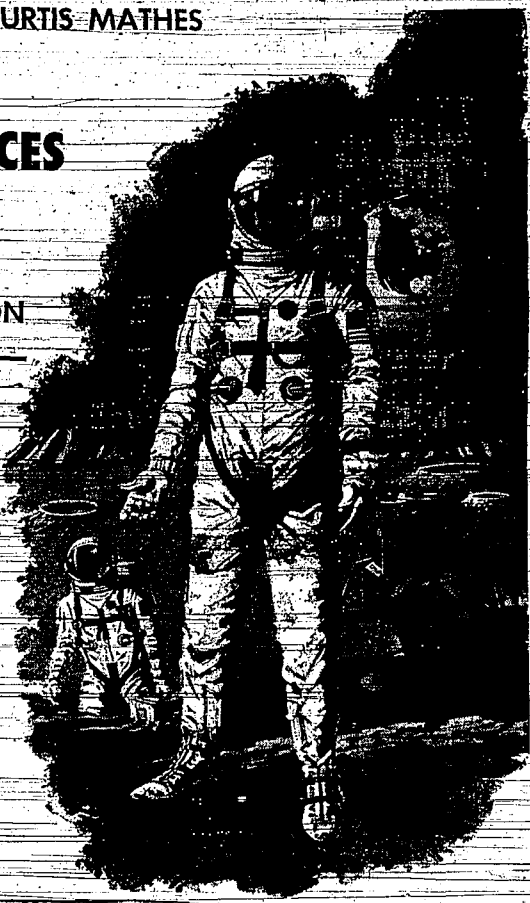
