Fuller quit playing in 1964 because, as he puts it, "I ran out of spit and wind at the same time." He started playing in 1914 and was director for two times between 1926 and 1951.

Since 1914 he has worn out three coronets, which is "tragic" according to Dr. Fuller, because they were his personal instruments.

"I started playing as a kid when I bought my first horn for \$2 and learned to play all the major keys."

He remembers his first band, a three-piece and three-member band which knew only one tune, "Moonlight Bay."

"We played that number for everything — ball games and what all. It's all we knew."

During his time with the Twin Falls Band, Dr. Fuller remembers on several occasions while marching a command would be given for members of the band to change their direction of march.

"Sure enough, two or three guys wouldn't hear the command and were last seen walking into the hills, tooting away and happy as larks."

Once, while directing a tune with an Indian bent, a member stole out behind the busy director and performed a war dance. Dr. Fuller, not aware of the performance going on behind his back, could hear the laughter in the crowd.

"I turned around and here was this nut wrapped in a blanket bouncing back and forth across the stage."

Like he wanted to scold someone.

City Expects State Turndown Of Plea To Lift Tax Ceiling

The City of Twin Falls' second petition to the Idaho State Tax Commission was accepted for consideration Monday, the deadline for those petitions asking permission to raise the ceiling imposed retroactively by the 40th legislature.

But a city councilman said Monday night that "indications are" the city's petition will not be acted on favorably by the tax commission.

The city is asking an emergency waiver of the tax ceiling established by House Bill 204,

which limits tax increases to four per cent of the previous year's level.

The controversial law was passed after the city had already approved its new budget retroactive to the first of the year.

Thus the city found itself with a fiscal-approved budget that had been declared null and void by the new law, and forced to choose between cutting the budget or seeking a waiver from the tax commission.

But the fate of the city's petition appeared to be in doubt Monday night.

City Councilman John Angerbaue expressed doubt at a Twin Falls School Trustees meeting that the city's tax petition would be approved by the Tax Commission.

In response to a question by a school board member concerning the rate of the city's petition, Mr. Angerbaue stated, "Indications at this point to my knowledge are negative."

Mr. Angerbaue expressed optimism that the controversial tax ceiling imposed on all local taxing units could be repealed, under mounting pressure from cities and other taxing units through the state.

The city's petition argues that "a change in circumstances that require additional services and property" is forcing the city to raise above the four per cent increase allowed by law.

The city is asking a tax levy that is 7.84 per cent above last year's level or a 7.84 per cent (29.50) above the tax ceiling.

In mills, the increase over last year will be from 44 mills to 47 mills.

Among the "changed circumstances" which warrant the increased city spending and taxing are:

- Twelve and one-half per cent pay raise granted city employees.
- Serious street damage from the winter.
- Participation in the urban renewal project.
- Safety improvement and repair costs resultant from annexation of the College of Southern Idaho campus.
- Required installation of 12-inch fire lines to the sites of the Kellwood plant and the Longview Fiber Company plant.
- Priority acquisition for a new police-fire department complex.
- Completion of Cascade Park.
- Additional improvement of the city airport.
- Need for purchase of a new road grader and a fire truck.
- Initial lease-purchase payments on Dickies Lake.
- An engineering study for a secondary sewage treatment plant.

City Gives Report On Traffic Safety

Twin Falls city officials briefed officials from the Idaho State Traffic Safety Division on improvements made in city traffic safety during the past two years.

According to City Engineer Gene Milar, the city has made a number of changes in its practices to comply with recommendations of a traffic safety study undertaken two years ago.

Mr. Milar reported that two major study recommendations are being accomplished at present. They are formation of a city traffic safety council and updating the city's traffic accident study.

According to the city engineer, the mayor and council are in the process of forming a safety council which will be closely linked with the City Highway Commission.

In addition, the city's accident map on which accidents are recorded to discover trouble spots is now being updated after several years of disuse.

According to Mr. Milar, "We are not making any really big major changes. Instead," he said, "the safety process calls for attention being paid to small problems."

Among other safety activities the city has pressed are:

- Marking all crosswalks.
- Replacing and rehabilitating traffic signs.
- Analysis of railroad grade crossings.
- Investigation of parking control restrictions.
- Safety program for city vehicle operators.

Mr. Milar said the city is considering seeking federal funding to pay for safety improvements, including new street lighting. He said U.S. funds would only be sought if investigation of traffic safety problems indicates that there is some major project that should be undertaken.

Smaller projects would best be handled from city funds, he said.

Hoffa Loses His Bid For New Trial

CHICAGO (UPI) — James R. Hoffa, president of the Teamsters Union, today lost his bid for a new trial based on allegations that the evidence used to convict him was obtained by illegal eavesdropping.

U.S. District Judge Richard Austin ruled that the evidence was untainted by the government's admitted electronic listening. Austin sentenced Hoffa to five years in prison, which was the same sentence Austin imposed on him Aug. 18, 1964.

As was originally ordered by Austin in the previous sentencing, Hoffa's one-year term is to run consecutively with an eight-year sentence handed down in Chattanooga, Tenn.

Hoffa, who had been brought here from Federal Prison in Lewisburg, Pa., in appear in behalf of his petition for a new trial, accepted the verdict calmly.

Trans Magic Airlines has added new flights, plans to offer flights in North Idaho in six weeks and has a third airplane nearly ready for use, it was announced today.

Boss Loy, president of the Twin Falls-based airline, said new flights out of Twin Falls have been added to the present schedule.

Presently there are two flights a day to Boise and two more to Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

The new flights include a 6 a.m. departure from Twin Falls with stops at Burley, Pocatello and Idaho Falls. Another will arrive in Twin Falls at 10:55 a.m. from Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Burley. Another will leave Boise at 8:20 a.m. and arrive at Twin Falls at 9 a.m. and another will leave Boise and arrive at Twin Falls at 10:55 a.m. from Idaho Falls.

The airline's fleet will be terminated in Burley.

The two aquanauts will bring oceanographic research, and a model of the underwater sea lab to the Jamboree, scout officials said.

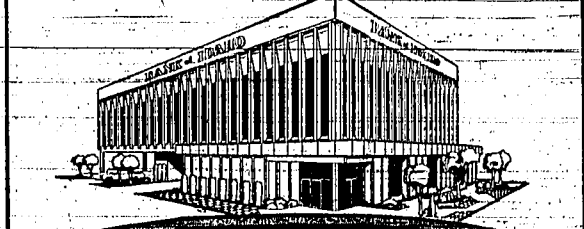

White Clouds

More is involved in the turmoil swirling around the lofty head of Castle Peak in the White Clouds area than meets the eye. Too many people concerned with the situation are making the mistake of over simplifying the problem and the solution.

The biggest fight in the history of the West and if it was ever settled — one way or another — the rest of the White Clouds and Sawtooth areas would have already gone down the drain and would be lost forever.

There is no easy way out of this one — in fact, no completely fool-proof way out has been offered by anyone. The legislation backed by Senators Church and Jordan and Congressman Hansen could be termed a compromise between the conservationists and the mining interests even if it was never intended to be that.

The three legislators say that the legislation "empowers the Forest Service to protect the area" and point out that "all mining claims located or leases issued after the effective date of this act shall be subject to the provisions of this act."

It is for this reason, and because we are concerned with saving as much of the White Clouds and the Sawtooth Mountain and Valley area for posterity as possibly can be saved, that we endorse the legislation passed by the U.S. Senate and now in committee in the House.

In a nutshell, that is the very heart of the legislation that concerns the mining activities in the White Clouds. Officials of the American Smelting and Refining Co. have given their word that they would cooperate even though, under law, they do not have to.

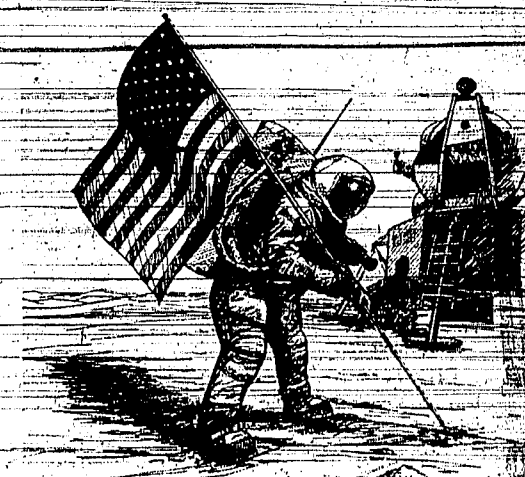
There are some who would keep the White Clouds area for the exclusive use of one segment of the population. We believe this approach is wrong. There are those who propose unlimited mining in the area. We believe this is wrong.

A prolonged legal battle would end the chance now presented to preserve just the way a great majority of the people want it to be preserved.

Like the proposed Sawtooth portion of the legislation, the White Clouds could well fit into the multiple use concept of the U.S. Forest Service, the organization which will manage it.

For the good of this section of the state, we hope that the proposed legislation is reported out of the House committee where it is now held, and successfully gets House approval through the guidance of Sen. Hansen.

Mitchell Says There Is Less Wiretapping

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. John F. Mitchell said Monday there is less wiretapping and bugging is being done now than during the Johnson administration.

At his first news conference since becoming head of the Justice Department last January, Mitchell said, "We are using wiretapping very sparingly and will continue to do so. There are fewer taps and bugging than when I came into office."

Mitchell said "quite a number" of electronic surveillances were in operation in the administration of President Lyndon B. Johnson. He said there now are fewer than 49, but did not say how many.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported April 17 there were then 49 but Mitchell said he ordered some halted after that because they were "not productive."

In the wide-ranging news conference, Mitchell also said a number of Congressional bills on government surveillance are the subject of any type of electronic surveillance by the Justice Department.

—Said his role was a limited one in the activity which preceded the resignation of Albert Fortas as a Supreme Court Justice.

—Promised a new associate justice of the court would be nominated soon by President Nixon.

—Defended the Nixon administration's new school desegregation policy announced July 3, insisting there would be no slackening of effort but saying individual school districts would be treated according to their varying needs.

—Contended that the administration's proposal to extend the 1963 Voting Rights Act's ban on literacy tests to all 50 states is needed because he said Negro voter registration is way down in such key areas as New York City and Los Angeles.

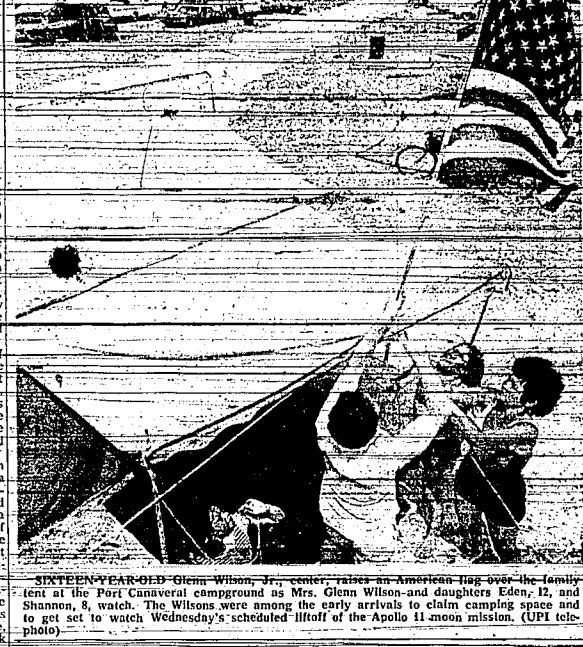

Nowadays I wonder how some of the new-cult even see their features with all that hair dripping over the eyes. What will their next generation of girls think about growing up to be dainty, feminine and hope to be pretty if all they see are the uglies and dirties who couldn't care less?

Or what of the small boys whose father image, to hold it doesn't include the word handsome. I catch a bus each morning in front of one of New York's specialty high schools and each morning I'm more appalled at the appearance of the boys than I am of the girls. Teen-agers who are so deliberately "doing their own thing" that they represent ugliness incarnate.

No one quarrels with what nature gave him or her. And inner beauty is of course more important than outer. But I do quarrel with those who don't do the best toward improving both.

What poet ever wrote a sonnet to ugliness? Millions of words, though, have been penned in praise of beauty, from the words of the ancients; to the Bible's song of Solomon, through the later centuries of literature.

It was Lord Byron whose words on beauty were mentioned at the start of this protest against the cult of the ugly. He wrote "She walks in beauty, like the night of cloudless, dim- and starry skies. And all that's best of dark and bright meets in her aspect and her eyes."

DISCARD BEFORE DRAWING TRUMPS

As bridge writers have pointed out since the play of the first dummy, the streets of London are filled with impassioned gentlemen who owe their plight to the failure to pull trumps. A somewhat different situation applies in the New York breed. Their members pulled trumps too soon.

South wins with dummy's ace of spades and is faced with a problem. Should he lead the right-attack-trumps-or-try-to-discard a club on the third round? He has to lose three aces. It is a toss-up between the two. South may lose two club tricks. The better alternative is to lead that spades will break 4-3 just

over 62 per cent of the time while West will hold the club ace just 50 per cent of the time.

There are complications in the play of clubs. For instance, if West holds all three missing aces (a 12 1/2 per cent chance), South can do after trumps with no fear that the club will be led through his king. East can never gain the lead.

This brings the trump play up to a 62 1/2 per cent chance. There also is a chance that if West holds the aces of hearts and clubs, he will continue spades or even play his ace of clubs after getting in with the ace of hearts. This also favors the immediate trump play.

If you take a good look at all four hands, you will see the winning play is to try the spades right away and that is the play we recommend. The first reason is that if spades do break 5-2 and West holds the two spades, South will overruff. The second, although a very far-fetched reason, is that maybe East or West stand with two spades and the singleton ace of hearts.

Instead of bidding three hearts, your partner bids three clubs over your two spades. What do you do now?

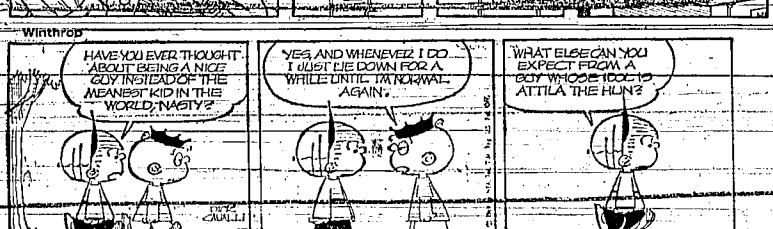
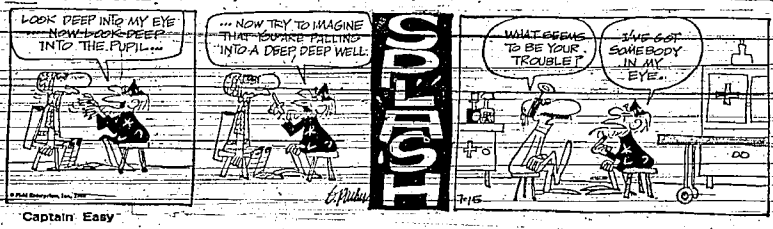

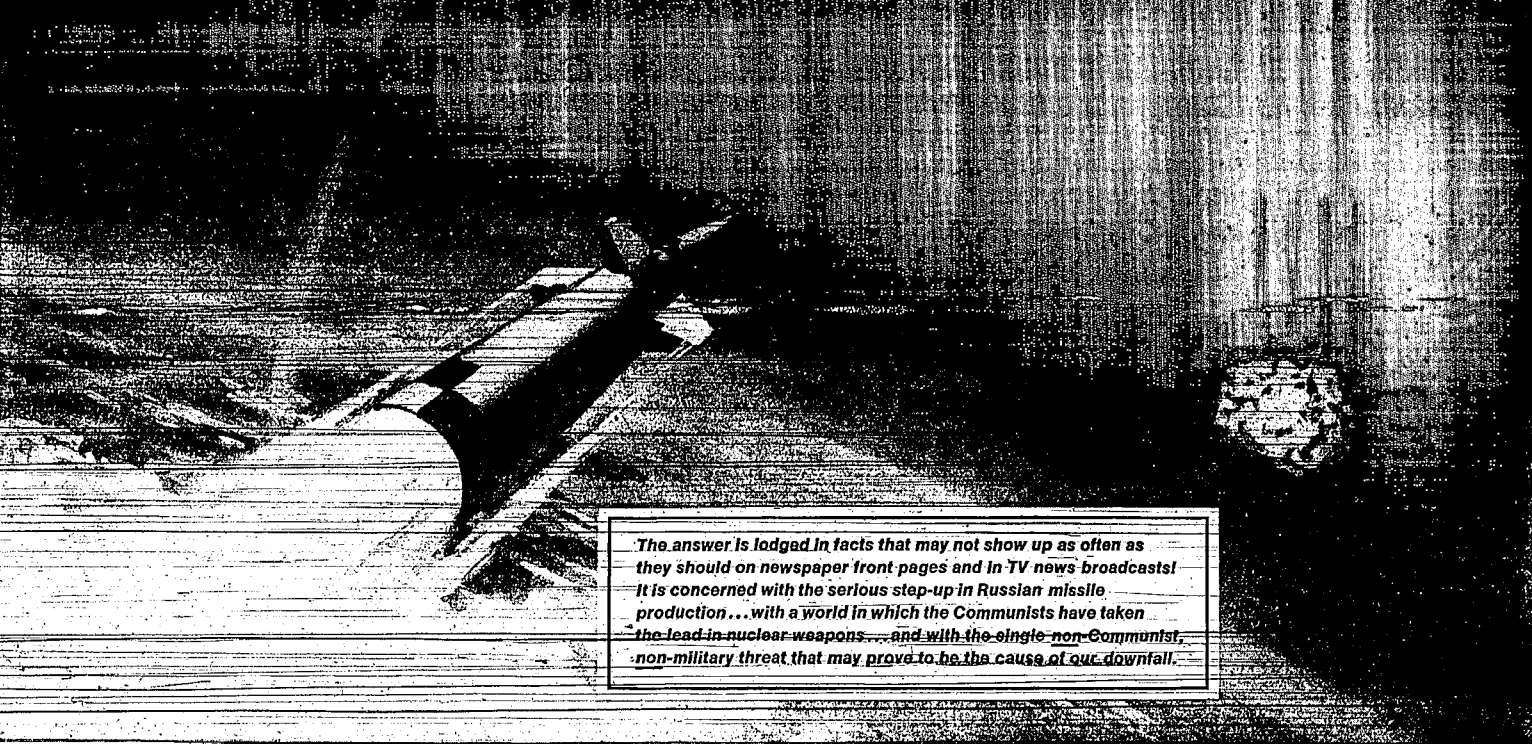

COMPARISON OF STRATEGIC MILITARY TRENDS

Although the American gross national product is almost twice that of the Soviet Union, the USSR has for years been spending up to 3 times more than we have in strategic military forces. The current trend warns us that the Russians will have spent up to \$100 billion more than us on strategic weapons between now and 1976.

At this moment the total of Soviet strategic missiles is estimated at 7,700 compared with our own 1,710 (including ICBMs, intermediate and medium range missiles and sub-manned missiles). We're not building any more missiles. They are! But that's not the whole story. By 1975 the Soviets will, at the present rate, have deployed close to 500 mammoth SS-9 nuclear rockets with 20 to 25 nuclear warheads. Each missile will be about 25 times more powerful than our present Minuteman missiles—each will be about 1,000 times more powerful than the Hiroshima bomb.

The Soviet Union has a missile defense. We do not!

THE SOVIET UNION'S MOTIVES

It is no longer necessary to "impose" that the Russians are aiming for strategic military superiority. We now know that their objective is clear strategic superiority because they have already possessed the business point-end-are-kill capability at a rate that suggests an all-out race competition. In both word and deed, the Russians have shown that they regard the world struggle as a fight to the finish—a fight that the Soviets intend to win at any cost. Not a single political or military authority has been able to offer any reasonable explanation for

the current Russian buildup of staggering destructive power, except in terms of deliberate, coldly calculated aggressive intentions...

...like the Soviet intentions and what followed in Czechoslovakia, Cuba, Vietnam... the Berlin Wall, Hungary, Poland.

The facts about this threat to our security have been carefully studied by a special Committee of distinguished Americans appointed by the American Security Council. Members of the Committee are outstanding experts in their respective fields. They include two Nobel-prize-winning scientists; the developer of the H-bomb; the developer of over-the-horizon radar; a former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; the general who headed the development of our own ICBM forces; the present head of the A.E.C.'s weapons division at Los Alamos; a former commander of the Strategic Air Command; a former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission; a former commander of the Polaris Submarine fleet; and 20 other distinguished military and scientific credentials clearly establish them as the most qualified independent group ever to study this complex problem. None of them are "armchair strategists." They know what they are talking about. We believe their collective voice should be heard by every American!

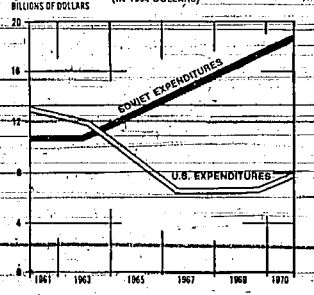

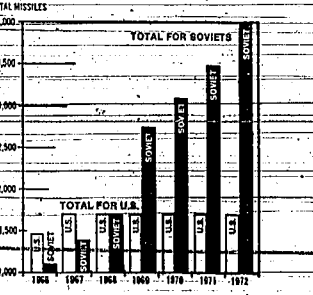
