El Salvador said today it has captured the Honduran provincial capital and drove an infantry spearhead 45 miles into Honduras after the opening hours of heavy fighting that erupted Monday between the Central American nations.

Israeli Attack Feared

Israel has planned a major blow against Egypt in retaliation for increasing Arab pressure on "Middle East" battle-fronts, the "Jerusalem" newspaper, the Al-Ahram said today.
The newspaper did not say when Israel might strike but said reports from New York, London and Bonn confirmed an attack was pending.
"They (reports) all indicate Israel is planning a major military operation as a retaliatory blow for escalation along the Egyptian front and for the increase of Palestinian resistance raids," Al-Ahram said.
"The attack probably will be delivered against the Egyptian Suez Canal front," because this is the most dangerous line of confrontation," Al-Ahram said.
"On that front, Egyptian and Israeli troops battled twice with the southern sector of the canal Tuesday. There were no reports of casualties."
"In Ahram in separate dispatch said Israel has hired 200 foreign pilots at \$2,400 a month each and given them extensive training in Israeli on Middle East warfare.

Apollo 11 Moonward Bound

Launch Goes Off On Time

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Apollo 11, carrying three astronauts and the dreams of humanity, blasted off for the moon today on a historic voyage to place the footprints of man in the dust of an alien world.
"We're looking good," called command pilot Neil A. Armstrong as he and his crewmen, Michael Collins and Edwin E. Aldrin, huddled in the space exactly on time at 9:32 a.m. EDT, the culmination of eight years of toil.
"This is the big one," said Launch Director Roger Ferraro after the perfect liftoff. "Our first step has been started right."
If all goes as planned, Armstrong and Aldrin before dawn Monday will become the first men ever to set foot on the moon.
The crew of Apollo 11, sticking to business and refraining from chit chat, hurtled into a 119-mile-high orbit around earth to check out their systems before blasting away, shortly after noon, and heading for the moon.
Astronauts were leaving orbit on the Saturn 5 third stage and gently pull the lunar-landing module but its housing atop the rocket stage. The lunar lander, named "Eagle," rides to moon orbit on the nose of the command ship Columbia.
Civil defense officials estimated that more than a million persons—the biggest crowd ever here—jammed the roads and beaches around Cape Kennedy, where the 3,222-ton space machine roared aloft. Television executives estimated that 25 million more persons watched the launch at home.
"Houston, be advised—the visual is go today," Armstrong radioed.
"They finally gave me a window to look out!" when an insulation shield was jettisoned from the cone-shaped spacecraft.
Hundreds of dignitaries, led by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and former President Lyndon B. Johnson, watched the liftoff from the cape. President Nixon, who Tuesday night told the astronauts by telephone that they were embarking on "the greatest adventure man has ever undertaken," watched on television in the White House.
"We should in my judgment put a man on Mars by the end of this century," said Agnew.
Johnson called it an "audacious" to bring peace to mankind.
The mission of Apollo 11 begins its climax Saturday, when the ungainly space rig drops into orbit around the

'Blacks' Invited To Site

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Rarely have members of the Poor People's Campaign been invited to a major event, but "VIP" seats today awaited 40 poor blacks near the launch site of Apollo 11.
The VIP permits for Abernathy and 10 Negro families were granted by Dr. Thomas O. Paine, administrator of the U.S. space agency, following a dramatic meeting between him and Abernathy in a field near the main entrance to the John F. Kennedy Space Center Tuesday.
Abernathy asked Paine for the permits, saying "We are proud of our nation's achievements in space and of the heroes who are embarking for the moon."
"This moonshot is possible because of our tax money as well as your tax money," Abernathy, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), said.
Paine, in turn, asked for Abernathy and the 10 Negroes from across the South wide thru to pray for the Apollo 11 astronauts immediately after blasting off his Negroes. "I hope this will be the first step toward an end to hunger and racism and for a successful flight for Apollo 11."
"I think the people in the space program know what the major problems are," said Walter E. Fauntroy, director of the SCLC's Washington bureau, after the meeting.
"I hope the rest of the nation can do the same thing in 10 years and billions of dollars to sending a man to the moon and feel the same kind of guilt that there hasn't been a similar effort against the internal problems of this nation," he said.

Mississippi Flood Crest Poses Disaster In Midwest

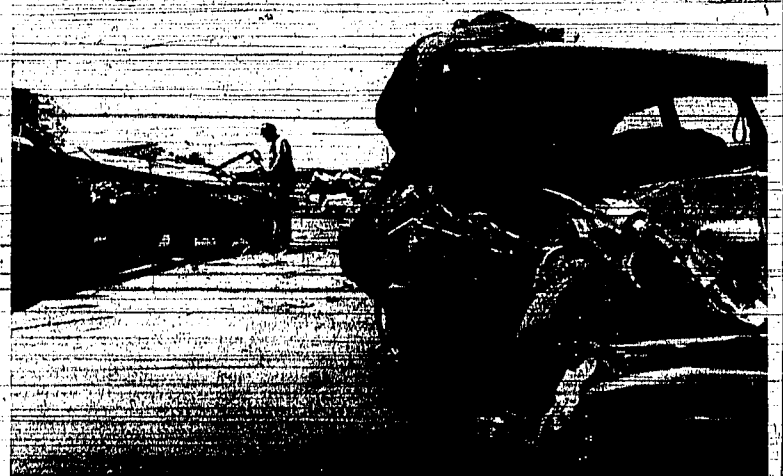

Portions of the Midwest faced agricultural disaster today as a 120-mile flood crest surged onto the Illinois and Missouri shores of the Mississippi River. A heat wave was in its 10th day in the South and tornadoes struck the Upper Midwest late Tuesday.
Crop damage estimates from flooding in Iowa and Missouri exceed \$154 million, most of it in Missouri. The loss is irrevocable, as the late date prevents the planting of replacement crops.
A large farm at Illinois' Menard State Penitentiary, which normally produces vegetables for other state institutions, has suffered a 100 per cent crop loss.
A dozen miles of dikes were protecting the Wapello-Oakville, Iowa, area as the Iowa River rose toward the highest crest in history.
Flooded areas upstream along the Iowa River were under water due to increased flow through the Coralville Dam. Despite open spillways, a record water level was surpassed in the reservoir.
The Mississippi Crest extended from St. Louis to Cape Girardeau, Mo.
By contrast, water restrictions were imposed on Houston, Tex., residents because of a drought.
Temperatures in the 100s extended across the Southwest again Tuesday, with 90s across the Southeast. Buckeye, Ariz., recorded a 112-degree reading and, Abilene, Calif., logged 111.
In Seabrook, Tex., a violent thunderstorm late Tuesday added to the tension of the day.

'Bobby' Baker To Answer Federal Damage Lawsuit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—When Robert G. "Bobby" Baker, Democratic secretary to Senate Minority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson in 1964, Baker was worth \$11,000. Seven years later he was a millionaire.
The government filed a civil suit Tuesday demanding Baker give a full accounting of his \$1.1 million net worth and that he be made to return at least part of it because it was allegedly obtained in a conflict of interest.
The suit was filed two days before a recently enacted six-year statute of limitations on government claims runs out. The Justice Department does not prosecute the statute unless the defendant is in protective custody.
The limitation dates from July 17, 1963, when Baker was accused of accepting \$7,500 for services rendered on behalf of the U.S. Freight Co. of New York in its dealings with the government.
The government cited three other specific occasions for a suit against Baker for receiving money from private parties. It also will demand recovery from Baker for other private parties who have not received "substantial" payment from private parties while serving as secretary to the minority leader of the United States Senate.
Baker resigned as secretary Oct. 7, 1963.
In January, 1966, Baker was indicted for income tax evasion, fraud and conspiracy. He was convicted last year, later sentenced to one to three years.
Now the operator of the plush Carousel Hotel at Ocean City, Md., Baker has yet to serve a day of his sentence. His case in an appeal before the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia is pending. Baker is appealing an appeal on appeal government with appeal.
The civil suit accusing Baker of accepting "fees, commissions, bribes and kickbacks" from private parties is in conflict with and in derogation of his duty of loyalty and trust as an appointee of a federal officer of the United States.
It said these were "manifested, at least in part, by the augmentation of (Baker's) net worth during his official tenure from approximately \$11,000 to approximately \$1.7 million."
It accused him of conducting government officials, making representations on behalf of private parties and obtaining "unlawful and improper influence and protection of his interests."

Continued From Page One... moon. On Sunday, Armstrong, 38-year-old civilian, and Aldrin, 39, an Air Force colonel, crawl into the lunar lander and break the lunar surface from the command ship leaving Collins, 38, an Air Force lieutenant colonel, to fly "Columbia" alone.

Armstrong and Collins then fly their landing ship to a gentle touchdown on the vast, airless lunar surface. Then, after a 36-hour quarantine period, Armstrong is scheduled to slip feet first through a small hatch, step down a rising ladder and become the first man on the moon. That is scheduled for 2:21 a.m. EDT Monday.

Aldrin will follow and the two men will spend up to two hours and 40 minutes exploring the lunar surface, anting up a pneumatic station and collecting 120 pounds of some of the most valuable rocks man will ever find.

After nearly 22 hours on the moon, the astronauts will use "Eagle's" lone ascent engine to blast away and fly to a rendezvous with Collins and "Columbia" in moon orbit.

They return to a splashdown in the Pacific Ocean at 12:51 p.m. Thursday, July 24. President Nixon will be aboard the carrier Hornet, the recovery ship to greet them. But the astronauts will have to sit out a three-week quarantine period before returning to the rest of the world.

Soviets Slow Moon Journey Of Luna 15

MOSCOW (UPI) - Its mission still shrouded in secrecy, the unmanned Soviet Luna 15 spacecraft hurtled towards the moon today for a landing that has been mysteriously delayed.

Sir Bernard Lovell, director of Britain's Jodrell Bank observatory, said the Soviet space vehicle would not reach the moon until Thursday, a day later than he had originally estimated.

Lovell said the slower pace may be an attempt to economize on fuel for a soft landing on the moon and a subsequent liftoff after scooping up samples of moon rocks.

Lovell said the present trajectory supports the theory that Luna 15 may be attempting to recover lunar rocks.

Lovell said the delay means Luna 15 will be heading towards the moon with Apollo 11 in pursuit.

Soviet authorities have given no official progress report on the Luna 15 since last Sunday morning, six hours after it was launched from their Central Astronautics and Technical Institute.

Newspapers here, after printing the original announcement, gave no hint Luna 15 was landing. It was expected or what its purpose was.

He also said he and Mrs. Nixon wanted to have dinner with them and their wives following the mission.

"What you are doing as well as the spirit of the American people as well as the world," the President was quoted as saying.

CALCUTTA (UPI) - Authorities reported Tuesday that 85 people were killed and 130 injured when a freight train rammed into a stationary passenger train crammed with Chinese pilgrims in Jalnur, 130 miles south of Calcutta, Monday night.

A number of the injured were reported to be in critical condition. It was feared the final death toll would continue to mount.

In 1917 Twin Falls was known as a "dry" area. By contrast, Wells, Nev. was "wet" and so it's no wonder the members of the Twin Falls Band consented to play at the three-day Fourth of July celebration in Wells that year.

Walter Priebe remembers it well.

"We left here in old cars and half the band got lost somewhere around Contact," he said.

"He remembers the other half of the band played around the clock for two days in Wells. 'Come the third day all that was left in town was one Indian and we were told to pack up and leave, the celebration was over."

Mr. Priebe started playing with the band in 1908 and quit when the First World War came around.

Apollo Duo Has Choice Of Moon Meals

SPACE CENTER — Houston (UPI) — Astronauts on the moon can be a little picky about their dinner, a breakfast or just snacks depending on the appetites and whims of astronauts Michael Smith and Edwin E. Aldrin.

The menu available: Bacon squares (3), peaches (dried), sugar cookie cakes (6), coffee and pineapple-grapefruit drink.

Or beef stew, cream of chicken soup, date fruit cake cubes (4), grape punch and orange drink.

Both these meals are aboard the moon lander, along with a snack pantry. The pantry contains eight extra packets of powdered beverage (two types), four packets of dried fruit, four candy bars, slices of bread, one pack of ham salad spread, one pack of turkey and two servings of turkey and gravy with two spoons to eat it with.

Space agency spokesman said he assumed there were two packages each of the bacon meal and the beef stew meal aboard. The astronauts have four eating periods—examined the lunar surface.

The first meal period comes about 6:30 p.m. (EDT) July 20, less than four hours after Armstrong and Aldrin set their LM on the surface of the alien world.

Another meal is scheduled for another short eating period about 11 p.m. that same day, three hours before they leave the lunar surface.

The third meal period comes about 5 a.m. the next morning just before they re-land from the lunar surface activities. The final moon meal is due about 12 noon shortly before they lift off from the surface.

The menu is primarily of the standard space-food variety that means most are freeze-dried food "in clear, flexible containers. The astronauts inject water from the spacecraft into the packages to soften the food, and then squeeze it into their mouths "like toothpaste from a tube."

During Apollo 8, astronauts had their first real earth-type meal when they ate turkey and dressing with spoons. The food was in a heavy gray which kept it from floating out of the containers and off the spoons in the zero-gravity. This will not be so much of a problem in the 1.6th earth gravity of the moon. The turkey meals in the snack pantry are of this type.

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Dr. Cooley Develops New Heart Device

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dr. Denton A. Cooley, who performed the world's first artificial heart transplant, said that he and an associate have developed a new heart which will be ready for testing in six weeks.

Cooley, whose operation last April created a furor because of the failure to obtain permission from his superiors, said the supply of human donors for transplant operations appears to have "temporarily dried up" and the need for the artificial heart was greater than ever.

"If you have a dead heart and you follow the Cooley method, you can see no moral objection to utilizing the artificial heart," an artificial heart which Cooley called the "Dole-Domingo" developed with private funds, was implanted into Haskell Karp, 47, last April.

The operation kept Karp alive for 63 hours before a human donor was found.

Karp died less than two days after the human heart trans-

Nixon To Head For Area Where Soviets Are Showing Interest

When President Nixon leaves Washington to try out his own brand of personal diplomacy in Southeast Asia—India, Pakistan and Romania—he will be heading directly into an area where the Soviet Union has been showing increasing interest.

In Southeast Asia, he will visit the Philippines, Indonesia and Thailand. Among each of these, plus Malaysia and Singapore, the Soviets are pursuing a two-fold objective.

One objective is to fashion a cordon around a hostile Red China.

The other, accounting for recent stoppages and delays, is to climax to years of patient maneuvering is to take advantage of Britain's withdrawal from east of Suez by 1971 and an anticipated lessening of U.S. interest in the area after Vietnam.

This will be an angle that Nixon will attempt to exploit.

There is evidence that Russian efforts are paying off. The Philippines, a country once so anti-Communist that in 1952 it banned a Yugoslav basketball team, has begun modest trading with East Europe and may follow it up with formal commercial and diplomatic relations.

In Jakarta, Indonesia, the Russians maintain one of their largest embassy staffs despite the anti-Red fever which swept the country after the abortive Red coup attempt of 1963.

Malaysia opened its first embassy to a Communist capital, Moscow, in April, 1968. Moscow is the biggest buyer of Malaysian rubber and buys large quantities of other raw materials such as tin.

The Russians established an embassy in Singapore in January and concluded an agreement with the government for landing rights for Aeroflot, the Soviet airline.

Anti-Communist Thailand's diplomat, the late Gen. Pibul, died back to 1966. The Russians use it as an important base from which to keep an eye on American military activities.

In recent months, Russian officials have conferred with the leaders of both India and Pakistan.

As the Russians attempt to strengthen their barrier against Red-Chinese expansion, even the presence of American troops in South Vietnam has not been wholly "bad" from their point of view. It has kept the U.S. there than Red China.

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Fire Money Given

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho received \$26,000 Tuesday to apply against outstanding fire bills from the disastrous 1967 fire season.

Gen. G. A. Lincoln, director of the Office of Emergency Preparedness, told Gov. Don Samuelson that in addition to the allocations, bills from the Sundance fire had been assigned to the Forest Service in accordance with an OEP directive.

Douglas Bean, Samuelson's administrative assistant, said the governor was extending his appreciation to Gov. Jack Murphy and Dick Hughes, federal-state coordinator. Murphy was assigned to head the fire bill negotiating team by the governor and the legislature.

Hughes said transfer of the \$1.2 million in fire bills from the Sundance fire called the question of financial responsibility for the fire there.

The state had maintained that it could not pay the Forest Service bills since the Forest Service was directed by the OEP to fight the fire after the disastrous season of 1967.

Hughes said the other problem connected with the fire bills was one of how much money the state had to receive and how the costs the state incurred would be paid.

He said the state had paid "well over" the \$26,000, and still had pending bills.

Hughes said the \$900,000 Trapper Creek fire bill was still tied up in disputes involving contracts between the Priest Lake Timber Protective Association and the U. S. Forest Service.

He said there were "still some procedures that have to be worked out" on the Eagle Creek-China Creek complex.

Hughes said there would be negotiation with the regional OEP office at Everett, Wash., to see where the \$276,000 should be spent.

Sky Divers Plan Show At Scout Affair

FARRAGUT STATE PARK, Idaho (UPI)—About 13,000 on Wednesday aren't above 18 knots, the Golden Knights Army Sky Diving Team will do its thing for the 35,000 scouts and leaders gathered for the seventh national Boy Scout jamboree.

The nine jumpers will perform various stunts, including one while in free fall from 13,500 feet down to a level of around 1,000 feet, where they will release their parachutes.

The team, which consists of eleven men led by Maj. Terrell V. Plummer, makes about 100 such demonstrations during its yearly, nine-month tour of the country.

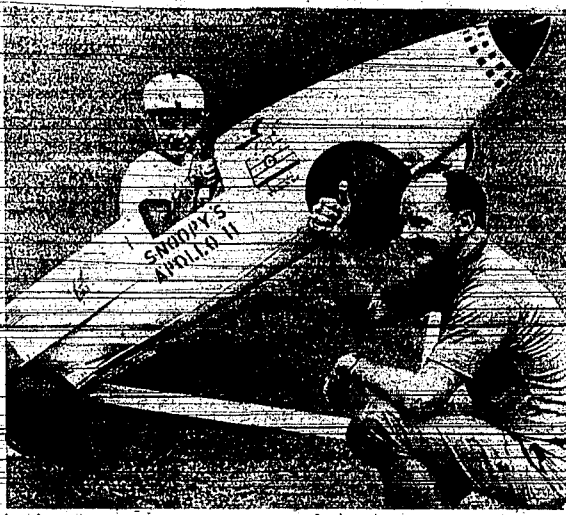
The two men not jumping are the narrator who explains to the audience what the rest of the team is doing, and the ground signalman, whose job is to show the divers where to land.

St. Orval Timmerman, Fairfield, Iowa, said the team, based at Ft. Bragg, N.C., averages 850 jumps per man. He said most of the men are Vietnam veterans, and this particular team—one of two—is primarily made up of veterans of the 1st and 101st Airborne Divisions. Timmerman said there are only three Special Forces veterans on the team.

He said the weather held here as it was Tuesday—almost clear skies and little wind—the team would come out of its C-119 flying boxcar in four groups, each performing a different maneuver.

However, Timmerman said, if there is an overcast that drives the jumpers to blow the 101st and 1st Airborne Divisions will be modified and there will only be three groups.

Scout officials said most of the participants are the "7000 here" will be present near the landing area to observe one of the world's finest jumping C-119 pilots—holder of 49 of the 128 world-recruity records.

FHA Home-Loan Program Reported Short Of Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The FHA home loan program is caught in the tightest money squeeze in almost three years with only 62 per cent of its officers reporting an adequate supply of funds, according to a government survey.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) also reported continuing increases in the cost of home mortgage money throughout the nation.

HUD said the number of Federal Housing Administration (FHA) regional offices reporting sufficient funds to fill qualified loan applications was 50 per cent June 1.

The 62 per cent figure on July 1 was the lowest since 42 per cent in January 1967, when the 1967 "credit crunch" was coming to a close.

HUD said the "nationwide average interest rate on conventional first mortgage home loans increased from 7.75 per cent in June to 8.1 per cent this month on new homes and from 7.50 to 8.05 per cent on used houses.

The survey also showed that secondary sales of 7 1/2 per cent mortgages were a good \$83.30 per \$100 face value this month for an effective interest yield to the secondary purchaser of 8.33 per cent. The effective yield in June was 8.00 per cent on similar sales.

The shortage of FHA money results from high interest rates in other sectors of the economy that have drained funds away from the mortgage market.

The FHA interest rate is fixed by regulation at 7 1/2 per cent, a full percentage point below the prime bank interest rate of 8 1/2 per cent. Banks extend the prime rate only to their biggest and best customers with the rates on other

loans scaled upward.

Lenders tend to make up for the difference between the FHA rate and the market rate by charging a "points" rate equal to 1 per cent of the loan for each point collected at the time the loan is closed.

FHA officials said, however, that even with several points added higher yields are available from other investments.

The report showed the June 1969 July increase in new home construction loans by region was—Northeast, 7.60 to 7.85; Southeast, 7.65 to 7.85; North Central, 7.40 to 7.55; Southwest, 7.85 to 8.30; and West, 8.25 to 8.60. The Middle-Atlantic Region was unchanged at 7.55.

'Clouds' Park Gains Backing

IDAHO FALLS (UPI)—Creation of a national park and recreation area in the White Clouds and Pioneer Mountains was proposed Monday by the Greater Sawtooth Preservation Council.

A bill which would create the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, including the controversial White Clouds Mountains where American Smelting & Refining Co. wants to mine molybdenum.

In a prepared statement, the preservation council said its proposal "combines the capability for orderly development and wide recreational opportunities in the national recreation area with the unique protection and national prestige of Idaho's first national park."

"Only park status can protect our wilderness from exploitation," the council said. "Only park status can prohibit on-site ore processing."

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Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—No "real market strength" is visible, to the Alexander Hamilton Institute until interest rates level off and stabilize. The analyst suggests that investors limit new commitments to "blue chips" adding that speculative issues in the current market are "only for the stout hearted."

The Dines Letter suggests that investors with "continuing increments of cash" should hold on to it to await a new "bull market signal." At the same time, the analyst says that those who "must remain fully invested" in stock because of margin-account regions should stay in those stocks which are "holding up extremely well."

The last time the Federal Reserve brought about "a super credit crunch" in 1966, the position and attempt to keep Dow Jones industrial average funds invested in good stocks

tumbled more than 200 points with the result that around Labor Day in that year means were taken to provide "easier money." Wall & Co. observes for the succeeding 12 months "a new bull market erupted." The company feels that the same sort of pattern should emerge this time when today's superflight money starts doing too much damage.

McDonnell & Co. has this advice for investors and traders: "Patience." The company suggests a buildup of cash reserves until fiscal and monetary conditions "at least begin to improve." It adds: "The market's current technical status puts too high a risk factor on too many stocks."

The current fiscal-monetary situation is "highly confusing and uncertain," and the stock market "never likes confusion and uncertainty," Spear & Staff notes. Therefore, the analyst adds, "all that investors can do is hold on to their positions and wait for a better time to invest."

McClure Supports NRA Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. James McClure, R-Idaho, believes the best approach for the Sawtooth area is a combination of national park in part and recreation in another.

But he says "time is of the essence" and a purely recreation area proposal will get better congressional support and still require mining. He is for that.

"This bill, however, should place the Sawtooth Primitive Area and the adjoining public lands on the east in a national park, protected and supplemented by a national recreation area covering the approach to the real eye floor. I believe this to be a superior proposal, but I am nevertheless prepared to, and do, support the proposed (recreation area) bill, my unqualified present support, because I believe that it is absolutely imperative to move now."

Demo Chief Leads Drive On Voting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Democratic National Chairman Fred Harris is leading another charge against barriers to voting.

Actually, the relatively low election day turnout in the United States seems more due to apathy than legal or administrative requirements for voters.

Harris has appointed a 20-member subcommittee, headed by former Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark, to promote greater participation in elections.

A fund-raiser on the 1968 presidential election shows that only 60.8 per cent of the voting

age population and only 80.8 per cent of the registered voters cast ballots. A Gallup Poll indicated that 15 million citizens who were registered failed to vote because they "were disinterested or didn't like the candidates."

"Because of restrictive state laws," Harris said, "some voters have to go to a certain place on a certain date and register each and every year in order to vote."

He said the Clark task force would take a look at state registration laws, make it seem we want to discourage voting rather than encourage it.

He said the Clark task force would take a look at state registration and residence requirements "in order to lower the voting age and 'controlling racial barriers' to voting."

Harris favors some kind of automatic registration to persons living in presidential election states for citizens who moved to meet state residence requirements.

The Nixon Administration's voting rights bill contains a similar provision. It would require states to permit voting in a presidential election for citizens who moved into a state by Sept. 1 before that election. Those who moved in the final two months would be allowed to vote in the state of their former residence.

Subject to some restrictions in federal law and the Constitution, voter eligibility is determined by the laws of the 50 states.

Fifteen states now permit a vote for president by new residents with no more than 30 days in the state. The residence requirement is 60 days or less in 28 states.

Louisiana Governor Joins Chase For Escaped Fugitives

BATON ROUGE, La. (UPI)—Gov. John J. McKeithen of Louisiana, who hopped in a small plane to join a chase for three escaped Texas prisoners armed with tommyguns, said Monday he did so to save lives and preserve the law and order.

"There's one thing we still hang people for in Louisiana," the governor said in an interview. "And that's botching off the law."

The convicts broke out of Gregg County Jail at Longview, Tex., Sunday morning by overpowering jailer M. Neely. They escaped in a police car, holding Neely and Deputy Sheriff William Brown as hostages.

Burley, their 16-hour flight across East Texas and through pine woods and cotton fields of western Louisiana, they held 13 persons as hostage at different times.

The convicts were captured before midnight in the isolated home of Leo Martin at Natchitoches, La., who had learned of the escape hours before on television, and had loaded all his six guns and put one in every room of the house.

Martin, his wife and teenage daughter were watching television when the three escapees burst through the front door, guns in hand.

Martin, a retired steelworker, later grabbed one of the sub-machine guns the fugitives carried, shot one convict and held the other two.

"I blasted him," Martin said. "Luther Pettie, 29, was listed in "guarded condition" Monday at Confederate Memorial Hospital in Shreveport, La.

"Doctors conducted repair surgery to close up some holes," a hospital spokesman said.

Charge was filed Monday with a U. S. commissioner at Tyler, Tex., accusing the three convicts of kidnaping Brown and Neely. The FBI said Williams and Sumner would get a hearing at Alexandria, La. Pettie would appear when he was released from the Shreveport hospital.

During their flight, the prisoners called McKeithen at the Governor's Mansion in Baton Rouge.

The governor said he talked with hostage Brown and two of the fugitives then flew after them in efforts to talk them into surrendering.

Neely was hospitalized Monday at Mansfield, La., for several broken ribs and a punctured lung received in a beating during the jailbreak. He said the convicts threatened several times to kill him.

Director Of Medicaid May Leave Post

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Dr. Francis Land, director of the troubled Medicaid program, may be on his way out, sources at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare said today.

"I have a feeling he wants to go but I haven't talked it over with him yet," said Dr. Roger O. Egeberg, new assistant HEW secretary for health and scientific affairs.

Land was attending the American Medical Association convention in New York and was not immediately available for comment.

The Medicaid program of medical care for the needy has come under increasing criticism within the Nixon Administration because of the sharply rising cost.

Last Thursday President Nixon said the nation faces "an impossible choice" between health care for the next two years as the White House issued an eight page report that included sharp criticism of Medicaid, a federal-state program for providing health care for the poor.

The President said a special task force on Medicaid "will be set up to recommend improvements in the program. Land, 49, is a native of Carlington, N.D. He was a general practitioner in Ft. Wayne, Ind., for 18 years before joining HEW where he has directed the Medicaid program since November, 1968.

Lions Convention In Tokyo Is Treat For District Governor

Don Zuck, Twin Falls, District 39W Lions International governor, recently returned from a trip to Tokyo where he attended the 62nd Lions International convention.

Mr. Zuck said he was especially impressed by the tremendous attendance at the convention. He said approximately 40,000 people attended the convention, making it the largest convention ever held in a foreign country.

As district governor-elect, Mr. Zuck attended special sessions June 29 to July 1 at the New Otani Hotel, Tokyo. He was given special schooling on his responsibilities and Lions International information.

The convention officially got under way July 2 with the Lions International Parade which lasted for three hours. Mr. Zuck said the efficiency of the Japanese police and Boy Scouts was noticeable in the conducting of the parade.

Upon the opening of the sessions, the group was addressed by Prince Hitachi, David A. Evans, Texas, president of Lions International, gave the response that evening. The emperor of Japan addressed the group.

The convention continued through July 5 with special presentations, banquets, and an election of officers. The incoming president is W. R. Bryn, Dayton, Ohio. Directors were elected from Washington, Kentucky, Florida, Minnesota, Nebraska, Missouri, Arkansas and Pennsylvania. The Ohio delegation gave a special evening of entertainment in honor of the new president. Mr. Zuck said he and his wife were especially impressed by the colorful entertainment and the variation.

The convention concluded with the final reports. The group was addressed by Ben Barnes, Lieutenant Governor, Texas, since the outgoing president was from Texas. Earen Ealer, Twin Falls, was also honored as the outgoing international director.

Prior to attending the convention, Mr. and Mrs. Zuck visited Kamakura, Nagoya, Mikimoto Pearl Island, Kyoto, Nara, Osaka, Taipei, Taiwan, the Philippines and Hong Kong. They returned home via Honolulu.

Mr. Zuck said they found the Japanese people to be very friendly and helpful. He said they would go completely out of their way to offer some assistance. He said they are hardworking, clean people and don't feel the government owes them anything. Mr. Zuck noted there are only remote cases where the government aids the elderly.

The Zucks witnessed some demonstrations in Tokyo. It was explained to them the college students were protesting legislation by the Diet against student riots. He said, however, the marches were orderly and without incident.

Sen. Jordan Sponsors Law On Reclamation

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UPI)—Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, has sponsored proposed legislation which would amend the Small Reclamation Act of 1938.

The purpose of the amendment, introduced Monday by Senator Frank Moss, D-Utah, is to allow small reclamation loans for projects that may eventually provide more water for municipal and industrial purposes than for irrigation during the actual period of the loan.

Jordan explained that the Interior Department interprets the present law to mean that irrigation use must exceed the sum of all other water purposes for such projects.

"The rapid growth of so many sections of our country, particularly in the west," Jordan said, "requires changes in many of the uses of these projects. The proposed amendment will facilitate such growth while still requiring that irrigation must be one of the purposes of small reclamation projects."

Overtime Pay Is Refused

BOISE (UPI) — Supervisory employees in state government are not entitled to overtime pay even though they may be under a merit system, an attorney general's opinion said Tuesday.

In an opinion written for the State Board of Examiners, Attorney Gen. James R. Hays said the appointing authority — with the concurrence of the Personnel Commission and the Director of Administration — may designate merit system jobs in his agency as supervisory.

If the State Board of Examiners approves such a designation of the classified position, the opinion said, then the supervisory employee would not be entitled to cash compensation for overtime work.

Employees holding these positions, even though by definition are classified employees, are not subject to the work-day or work-week provisions and shall not be eligible for cash compensation for work performed in excess of the hourly and weekly limitations. Hays said.

Nixon To Visit Britain On Trip

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon has added a stop in Britain Aug. 3 to his forthcoming round-the-world trip, the White House announced.

Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler said the Chief Executive, in flying from Romania, would have to stop for servicing his plane at some air base in Britain and would use the stopover to confer with Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

Total cost of the site would be \$60,000. Retirement Director T.F. Terrell wrote the board.

Harold Wilson, Ziegler said, Wilson had suggested that he and the President meet during the stop and Nixon agreed. The press secretary said the conference would involve only a matter of a few hours and would probably take place at the air base where Air Force 1 will be serviced.

The President is scheduled to leave Washington July 22, watch the schedule Apollo 11 splashdown in the Pacific two days later, then visit the Philippines, Indonesia, Thailand, India, Pakistan and Romania.

Ziegler said Nixon still plans to return to Washington late Aug. 3 and that the normal talks with Wilson on the way home would not alter the schedule appreciably.

Mail-Order Firm Teaches Computer Skills

NEW YORK (UPI) — The demand for computer programmers is accelerating so fast there presently is a shortage of about 50,000 programmers and half-a-million may be needed in the next five years.

Naturally, this has created a boom in programmer training courses by established business schools and new schools organized especially to teach computer-oriented skills. Such schools have sprung up all over the country. Some have proved extremely profitable, and the founders sold the schools after a few years at big profits. Several successful franchising ventures in computer schools have been established.

Now the correspondence course in computer programming has reached into the vacuum. LaSalle Extension University of Chicago, one of the oldest and biggest correspondence schools now owned by Crowell-Collier & MacMillan, Inc., launched a mail-order course in programming a year ago.

"The course has been successful and demand for it has increased steadily," a LaSalle spokesman said.

An ambitious new venture in teaching computer programming by mail has been launched by Leo Ratner of Miami Beach, Fla., a veteran marketer of real estate and consumer products.

Ratner's venture, Computer College of Technology, Inc., is selling a 50-step correspondence course so simplified, it is claimed a high school dropout, having long-distance telephone connections to keep students from losing their way in sequential operations.

"Since computer programmers can earn as much as \$700 a month to start and some of the experienced programmers earn \$1,200 a month, initial response to Ratner's advertising was heavy," he said, even though the course costs \$45.

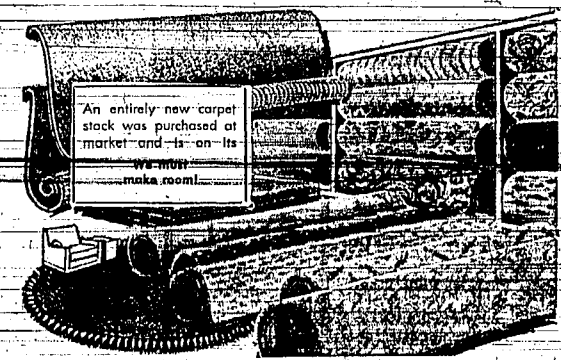

Local authorities rushed antivenom serum to Saffron Walden as police went door to door through the 200-family project warning them of the danger. The warnings were repeated by cruising loudspeakers.

Teachers at the 120-pupil Dame Bradbury Primary School in the area urged students to stop playing in grassy areas. They put a quick end to a "game" of "hunt the cobra" which some young boys had started.

"This snake is highly dangerous," said a reptile expert at the London Zoo. He said death could come in 10 minutes to 24 hours if a person bitten by the snake was untreated with the antivenom serum.

Marine Sought For Desertion Found Dead On Mountaintop

LANDER, Wyo. (UPI)—For more than a year, 22-year-old Gary Berg had hidden from the Marine Corps when he was declared a deserter. The Marines located him Tuesday—he was found dead on a lonely and rugged Wyoming mountaintop peak.

Monday night, two rescuers struggled against wind and rain to reach the body of a man they thought was John D. Hagen of Salem, Mass.

Hagen who was identified as Berg Tuesday by his mother in Salem, had fallen 60 feet down a slope on 12,982-foot Mitchell Peak last Saturday.

His climbing companions, Mrs. Mrs. Thomas Cook of Jamison, Pa., strapped Hagen or Berg to an overhanging ledge and made their way down the mountain for help.

When help came Monday night, it was too late. Berg had died.

Tuesday, Mrs. Virginia Berg disclosed her son's identity. Military Police were nearly certain the man was Berg, who disappeared from Camp Pendleton, Calif., Nov. 31, 1967, and was declared a deserter May 14, 1968, but sent his fingerprints to Washington for verification.

Until Mrs. Berg's disclosure, Wyoming authorities had thought the victim was her nephew.

Mrs. Berg said her son was home for Christmas in 1967, more than a month after his name was reported missing by the Marines.

She said he was injured in an

"he disappeared with only the clothes on his back." She didn't see him again although he called home last Christmas to say he was fine.

His mother said she decided not to report Berg, because "one of the Marines had approached me in two years so they obviously didn't care," still did. "I'm a mother first and citizen second."

Postal Survey Shows Vacancy High In T.F.

According to a survey made May 23 by Twin Falls mail carriers, 53 per cent of the residences and apartments in Twin Falls are vacant.

Pursuant to an agreement between the Federal Housing Administration and the Post Office Department the survey was made under the general supervision of Fred Sanger, participating postmaster.

The vacancies were made up of 450 units previously occupied and six new units that never had been occupied. In addition, 44 new units were reported in all stages of construction.

A total of 8,316 residences were surveyed, of which 324 dwelling units were vacant. The vacancy rate, 4 per cent, represents 44 units previously occupied and six newly completed units. A total of 12 dwellings were found to be under construction.

The Federal Housing Administration said the resultant vacancy data are not entirely comparable to those published by the Bureau of Census because of differences in definition, area delineations and methods of enumeration.

Nor do they reflect as high a degree of accuracy as the 1960 census data.

Mr. Sanger said the 15 city carriers have noticed an increase in the delivery territory in the last few years in the northeast part of the city, with an increase in correspondence.

The postmaster said he figured Twin Falls had its largest population in 1958, with approximately 22,500 people. He said at that time Twin Falls was a trucking division point and when this division point was shifted, the city lost a good number of people.

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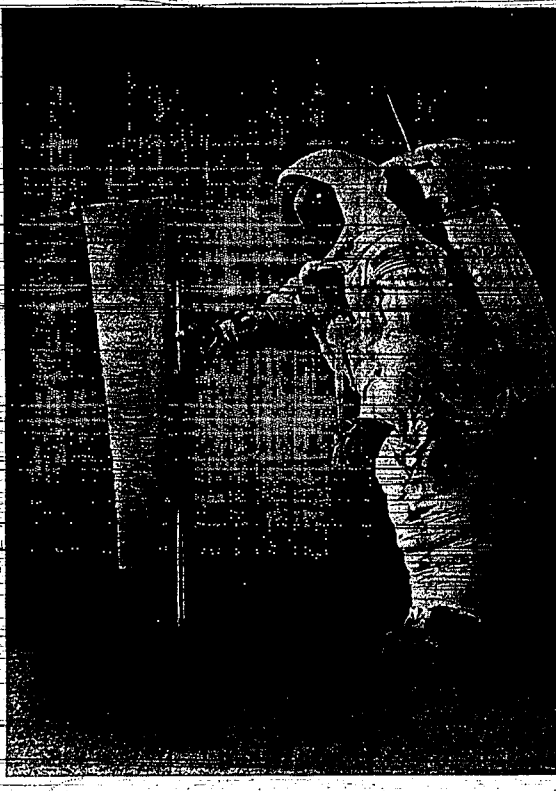

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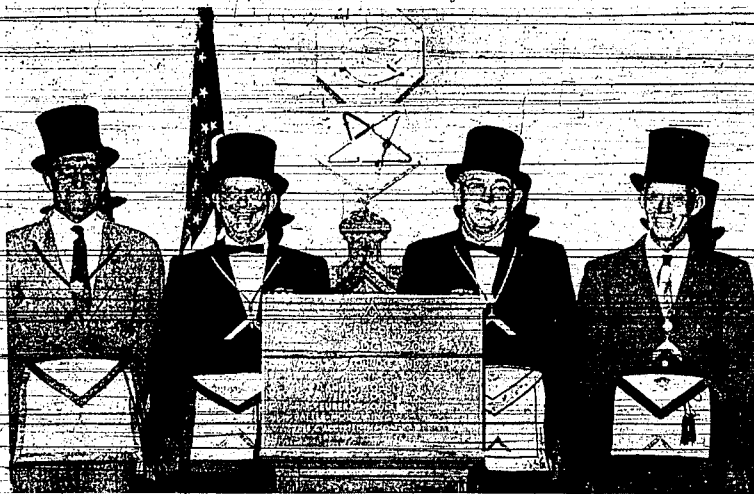

BAD LUCK MAY BE SELF-INFLICTED

There must be many more unlucky bridge players than a lucky one. At least, our experience has been that, for every person who concedes that he is lucky, we find 10 who complain about misdeeds by the gods of chance.

We sympathize with unlucky players. That is, when they are truly unlucky. When they bring on their own bad luck, we sympathize with their partners.

South wanted to go to three trump, after his partner said 4♥ to two but he couldn't count more than the bare 16 points he needed for his no-trump opening.

When he looked over dummy's cards and bid four hearts, he counted six trumps. All he needed to get to eight

was to set up dummy's diamond suit. He won the heart lead in his hand and went right after the diamonds.

East won and led a spade to West. West cleared the hearts and, although South did cash one extra diamond trick that still left him one short of his contract.

South gambled about his luck. Suit never broke for him. He was right that diamonds had been anything but his best friend this time but he had no right to blame luck for taking the contract. When East won the third diamond and led a second heart, South should have abandoned the suit and tried to double finesse in clubs. Unless both club honors were held by West, this would give South three club tricks and his contract.

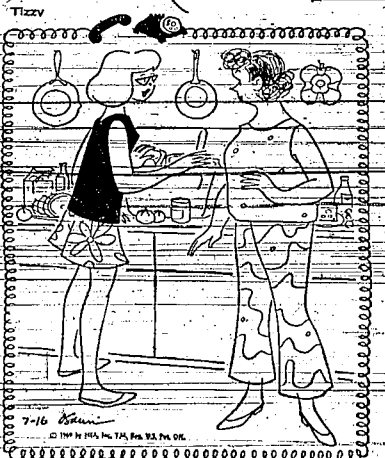

Laird Says U.S. May 'De-Escalate' Effort In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary Melvin Laird, predicting the corner has been turned toward peace in Vietnam, said today a change is being considered in U.S. combat tactics to reduce pressure on Communist forces.

"I fervently hope the day will come when peace will be restored in Vietnam," Laird told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. "I think we've certainly turned the corner."

Laird said he sent Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to Vietnam today on a quick trip to assess the battlefield situation and to determine among other things if conditions are ripe for a de-escalation of U.S. offensive actions.

Laird stressed that no de-escalation orders had yet been issued, but disclosed that Gen. Creighton Abrams, U.S. commander in Vietnam, had been ordered by President Nixon to make reduction of U.S. combat casualties one of his primary goals.

Laird said there "has been a communication to Gen. Abrams to keep casualties at the lowest possible rate."

However, he said there has not been any official change yet in the policy started under the Johnson Administration of maintaining maximum pressure on Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces.

Laird's assessment of the war was one of his most optimistic to date. He said there had been a decline in what he called hand-to-hand attacks by the Communists in the past 10 or 11 days that had reduced U.S. casualties to the lowest level this year.

Laird called this significant, although emphasizing there had been periods of lull in the war from 20 to 30 days in prior years.

"I cannot say with certainty there will not be new enemy initiatives," Laird testified but said it was "important to take a look at this matter, and if there don't miss the chance."

Wheeler is due to make a first trip to Saigon and to get back in Washington next Tuesday—the day President Nixon is scheduled to leave on his round-the-world trip which so far does not include a stop in Vietnam.

The Wheeler trip was not announced until after he had left Washington.
