

# Cong Hurl Explosives At Wounded Yanks In Vietnam Hospital

SAIGON, (UPI)—Viet Cong commandos invaded a hospital compound today and bombed wards filled with wounded GIs in the "Vietnam War's" first attack on the U.S. base at Cam Ranh Bay. Terrorists also blew up a Saigon school in the worst such incident since the 1968 Communist Tet offensive.

President Lyndon B. Johnson visited it twice. Terrorists set off a series of explosions in Cholon, Saigon's Chinatown, during the evening rush hour. Eight persons were killed and perhaps 80 injured, authorities said, in a blast that wrecked an English language school for the South Vietnamese military. The injured included 23 American servicemen teaching at the school, U.S. Military Police said.

U.S. spokesmen said perhaps as many as 20 Viet Cong wearing only sandals and trousers with explosives strapped to their bodies silently cut through barbed wire surrounding the 6th Evacuation Hospital at Cam-Ranh Bay and ran through the compound hurling explosive charges.

The attack lasted 30 minutes, then the Viet Cong fled with other guerrillas standing on sand dunes overlooking the hospital and firing AK47 machineguns to cover the withdrawal.

The explosions set off fires that lit up the pre-dawn sky at the huge base, which overlooks the South China Sea. The blasts destroyed nine of the 30 one-story wards which housed 732 patients. Two of four bachelor officer-quarters also were destroyed.

The hospital is "marked with the standard Red Cross insignia" and lighted at night, military spokesmen said. The hospital handles mainly cases of wounded men, malaria and hepatitis.

One of the Viet Cong threw a bar containing explosives at a trailer occupied by Red Cross nurses. It failed to go off.

Spokesman said U.S. troops were involved in four battles that killed 52 Communist soldiers. Helicopter gunships supporting troops of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division killed 21 Communist troops near An Khe, 280 miles northeast of Saigon. There were no U.S. casualties.

Another 300 U.S. troops flew from the war zone today. President Nixon's plan to withdraw 25,000 soldiers by the end of this month. They were from a field hospital unit and an ordnance battalion headquarters company.

## ABM Plan Is Approved In Senate By One Vote

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate today approved a plan to build an anti-ballistic missile system by one vote.

ABM opponents acknowledged today their cause created at the "big water mark" in a dramatic legislative battle that gave President Nixon the biggest legislative triumph of his administration.

By votes of 50 to 49, the Senate Wednesday defeated attempts to stop the Pentagon from erecting defensive missiles.

ABM foes vowed to fight on by opposing another bill, not yet ready for floor action, which appropriates ABM money. Many of them also planned to battle other Pentagon projects, including civilian ABM research.

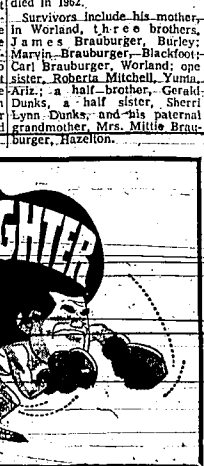

## Tax Reform Gains Offset High Cost

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The increase in the anti-inflationary Nixon administration is worried federal budget surplus. He said the tax reform bill about to be passed by the House will retard efforts to control inflation because it would cost the Treasury \$2 billion more than it would bring in.

But a high official told UPI the administration has not yet decided if it will risk the political consequences of asking the Senate to bring the measure into balance either by increasing the revenue or reducing the proposed tax relief.


The tax bill, when fully effective, would produce \$7 billion in new revenue by closing some loopholes and reducing some preferences. But this would be more than offset by tax relief to the poor, a reduced ceiling on high-bracket earned income, a general reduction in income tax rates and other cuts. These provisions would cost the Treasury \$9 billion.

The administration likes the bill in general—including most of the tax relief—but thinks the battle against inflation could go either way and a few billion dollars could be decisive. This official, one of the President's top economic advisers, voiced confidence that the economy will cool noticeably by fall—despite the fact that current economic indicators point to further price increases.

He said the stock market decline has wiped out some of its purchasing power of investors, retail sales have declined slightly, unemployment is up a bit and the "real" rate of growth of the Gross National Product has slowed.

If the slowdown does not materialize, he said the administration will attempt deep "new" cuts in federal spending in an effort to

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

### German Chief Seeks Unity With Russ Aid

UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—West German Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger said today it was not in his country's interests to have "crises" in East Europe because reunification of Germany can ultimately be achieved only in agreement with the Soviet Union.

Kiesinger told U.N. correspondents after a 45-minute talk with Secretary General Thant.

"We don't think that critical developments in East Europe will help the German situation. We are interested in evolutionary developments there without crises because the reunification of Germany can ultimately only be achieved in agreement with the Soviet Union."

At the same time, the chancellor expressed regret that despite approaches by Bonn to improve relations with Moscow, the Soviet Union "sticks to its rigid position regarding the German question."

Kiesinger drove from U.N. headquarters directly to the airport for a short flight to Washington where he will have talks with President Nixon.

Kiesinger indicated Berlin would be one of the foremost topics discussed in Washington.

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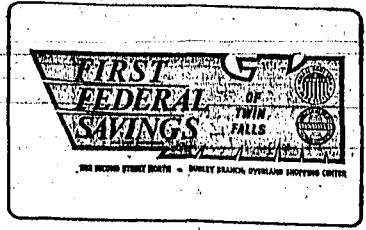

## ISU Expedition Unearthing Artifacts Of Early Idaho

POCATELLO (ISU) — Seven students, one of them a Jerome man, are attending a six-week archaeological field school sponsored by Idaho State University and have unearthed artifacts which are helping unveil the identity of early Idaho inhabitants.

Joan Griffith, University of Missouri-Kansas City, Mo., and Vickie Platts, ISU, Pocatello, are among the students.

Mr. Butler hopes results from this dig will tie in with other ISU archaeology projects and establish a continuous span of Idaho history.

In an attempt to uncover artifacts older than those found at Weston, ISU faculty members and representatives of the Upper Snake River Prehistoric Society recently packed into Owyhee Canyon in southeastern Idaho. They found points 7,000 to 8,000 years old and braided cord 5,000 to 6,000 years old.

The discovery of a few points similar to those found on the Great Plains may mean, says Mr. Butler, that early hunters from east of the Rocky Mountains migrated through the natural corridor of the Snake River Valley to settle among the desert people in the West.

Before this association can be definitely determined, much older sites than either Weston or Owyhee Canyon must be studied and excavated, he said.

A cave in Weston Canyon, 65 miles south of Pocatello, has yielded projectile points approximately 5,000 years old which may link the people of the Snake River Plain with the big game hunters of the Great Plains, according to B. Robert Butler, curator of archaeology at ISU.

Marlo Deliso, Boise, a graduate student in archaeology at ISU who supervised the dig, will analyze the date in his master's degree thesis.

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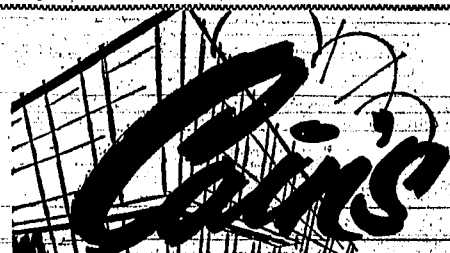

# NEA Says Youths Seek Civic Role

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Adults of the goldfish-swallowing and penny-raiding generation hereby put on notice that young people are made of sterner stuff. Current campus fads run to political action.

While youth is disparaged in terms of seizing buildings and the like, the vast majority are serious, concerned and politically active according to the National Education Association's Project 18.

Not the least of the causes these young people are promoting is their own right to vote.

According to Project 18, only four states now have voting ages below 21. But a survey indicates that 20 states have legislation reducing the voting age to 18 either pending or passed and awaiting voter approval.

Strong gubernatorial support or the closeness of the vote were noteworthy even in states where proposals to lower the voting age were defeated. Project 18 declared, "The group advocating the franchise for 18-year-olds said the support among governors and congressional leaders is largely a result of the political clout wielded by the young people themselves."

"The young men and women who campaigned so vigorously during the last election proved their interest, concern and judgment," said Les Francis, Project 18 director. He said youth now are aggressively writing letters and making speeches in support of gaining the right to vote.

The potential number of voters now between 18 and 20 years of age is 10 to 12 million.

# Senior Citizens Due To Get Tax Relief

Tax relief is in sight for some additional Idaho senior citizens living on social security or pensions, as a result of new tax exemption law which becomes effective for 1970. Twin Falls County Assessor Clifford Thompson said Wednesday.

Mr. Thompson said persons who feel they can qualify under the new law should call at his office on the third floor of the Twin Falls County Courthouse and make application as soon as possible.

They are asked to bring a legal description of their property at the time of application. This can be obtained from previous tax notices, he said.

Mr. Thompson said the law is meant to assist the person 65 years of age or older who is living on a small pension or social security payments.

The law stipulates the taxpayer must have lived in the state the past 15 years without interruption. Absence from the state for 12 months or more would constitute a break in residency.

OMURA, Japan (UPI)—A 36-year-old Japanese barber has claimed a record for non-stop hair snipping after clipping the hair of 24 customers in 48 straight hours. He said the previous record was held by a 32-year-old St. Louis barber who had 180 customers in 46 hours and 30 minutes.

He or she must not have an income beyond pension, social security and retirement payments—that is, more than the combined amount they receive in pensions, retirement pay or social security.

The property they own must not have a total market value of more than \$15,000 and the taxpayer must be retired.

Persons must make application before Nov. 1 of the year prior to the exemption and must file exemption applications each year.

Mr. Thompson said that with the heavy load of tax work in county assessor offices, persons wishing to qualify should make application as soon as possible so their requests can be processed in time for the exemption.

# Merger Of Two Labor Camps Slated At Paul

PAUL — Directors for the Hynes and Paul labor camps have tentatively agreed to merge the two facilities for the coming year.

The decision is pending the opinion of area farmers who will help finance the merger and the construction of the new facilities at the site.

The camp problem arose when new federal and state regula-

tions were handed down concerning the standards to be met by migrant housing facilities. Under the new regulations, none of the existing labor camp facilities would qualify and all would be condemned, not to be used for another year unless new or improved facilities are available.

Earlier, the boards of directors for the camps had voted to rebuild all three camps in Minidoka Court at an estimated cost of \$120,000 to \$130,000 each.

However, to qualify for matching federal funds for improvements, the camp must be located within five miles of a city. The Hynes camp is about six miles from Paul. The Paul camp and the Wilson camp would qualify for the funds.

Therefore, the boards for Paul and Hynes decided it would be feasible to merge the two to provide a better opportunity to utilize the camps during the winter when there is no beet work, to help defray the initial cost of construction.

The Hynes camp had considered constructing a \$20,000 camp with a loan repayable over 40 years. However, it is estimated camp usage could be sharply reduced in ten years because of the changes in the beet industry.

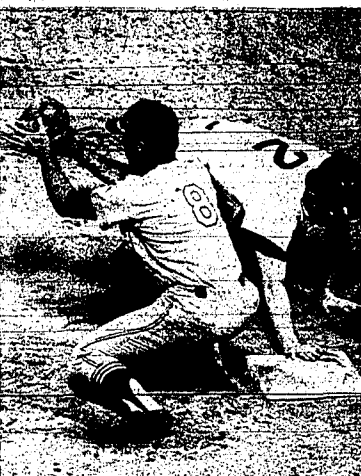

Q — We own Wham-O Manufacturing, fraded over the counter. Any advice or information you give us would be appreciated. D.P.

A — Earnings of this California-based toy company were sharply in the year ended last September. Discontinuance of unprofitable subsidiaries resulted in losses, which were written off against fiscal 1968 earnings. In the first six months costs of a newly developed toy, Slink Machines, were written off. Sales for the period, however, were up 20 per cent, reflecting in large part market acceptance of this toy.

Several of the company's products have been highly successful, the Hula-Hoop and Frisbee particularly, but in this kind of business, novelty wears off rather quickly and new products must be continually developed. Two new toys being test-marketed may, if successful, be promoted nationally.

Earnings for the full year are expected to at least break even, in this kind of situation with shares listed only 76¢ 100 and over half closely held.

Q — I am of retirement age and have thought of convertible bonds for an income investment. Which ones do you recommend?

A — While larger yields can be obtained in other types of investments, a convertible bond does have appeal in this type of market. Downside protection is afforded by the basic value of the bond as an income investment. Good quality convertibles are quoted well below par, offering a nice margin for opportunity. Castle, a Ford Cooke 5 1/2's of 1994 sell 100 to yield 5.5 per cent; Maryland Cap 5 1/2's of 1984, sell 98 1/2 to yield 6 1/2's; 1994, sell both to yield about 6 per cent. In each case the common shares have investment buying power, but an important consideration in selecting a convertible bond.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks were mixed Thursday after plunging on early gains. Trading was light.

Analysts pointed out that early strength was "simply a continuation of the rally which began last week." The general assumption is that the market has yet to bottom out. Economic uncertainties and the bleak outlook for corporate earnings later this year are cited as factors working against the list.

The trading swung into the final hour, the Dow Jones wide indicator was up 0.66 per cent on 1,494 issues crossing the tape. Of these, advances outnumbered declines by 626.

The Dow Jones average of blue chip industrials showed a loss of 0.26 at 826.02 near 1:30 p.m.

A volume of some 7,000,000 shares was about 1 1/2 million shares below the comparable period Wednesday.

Then he knocked out East's ace of clubs. The defense took two more heart tricks but South wound up with two spades, one heart, one diamond, five clubs and his contract.

"I'm glad I didn't try the heart finesse," said South. "West would have taken the trick with his queen and, if he shifted to a diamond, I would have been out of luck."

The professor, who had been watching, remarked, "It certainly was a fine decision. On the other hand, my pupil had a chance to beat you by executing a coup at trick two. He could have led his king of diamonds and knocked out dummy's ace. Later on, he would have held off twice in clubs. South would make three diamond tricks in this situation but only two club tricks instead of five for an eight-trick total.

"I always miss these plays," remarked the student. "Does that type of play have a name?"

"It has three names," replied the Professor. "Some people call it a Deschepelles Coup, after the great French Whist player of that name. Others feel this is a false Deschepelles Coup and that the real Deschepelles consists of sacrificing an honor to make an entry to partner's hand. Some others have gone step further and given it the name of the Merrimac Coup, for my pupil... I like to call it Deschepelles. In any event, it is a play that should be at the beck and call of every good player."
