

Nixon Asks Poverty War Be Shifted From OEO

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI) — President Nixon, continuing what he regarded as a badly needed repair job on the machinery of federal government, today shifted much of the operating responsibility for the war on poverty away from the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO).

Obviously the President was not attempting to downgrade OEO and its new director, Donald Rumsfeld, a former special statement, made it quite clear, however, that henceforth OEO was to be an "innovative agency" with most of its operating responsibilities transferred to other departments.

Rumsfeld was here today at the summer White House and planned his public comments to the Nixon statement during the day. No conflict between the two men was anticipated since Rumsfeld, a former Illinois Republican congressman, took the OEO job knowing of the President's intentions.

The President was expected to send Congress a special message detailing his program for sweeping reforms in the federal welfare program. He also scheduled a high-level foreign policy discussions here today.

Nixon's changes in the structure of OEO were laid out in a public statement instead of a congressional message since the alterations did not require House and Senate approval.

Specifically, the Chief Executive announced concerning OEO:

—Creation of a new office of program development.

—Revamping and strengthening the office of planning, research and evaluation.

—Strengthening and upgrading the office of health services and the office of legal services.

—Creation of a new office of program operations to improve the administration of activities in the field.

What this added-up-to was the Nixon determination OEO be more of a laboratory in the field of social sciences than an operating, administrative agency in the war against poverty.

Nixon envisioned the trimmed-down OEO as the vehicle for "social pioneering" by experimenting in the field of social sciences, then turning over proved and successful programs to established departments for establishment.

The President scheduled a late morning meeting at his new office complex adjoining his summer home with Secretary of State William P. Rogers. The secretary arrived here during the night after a fast trip to

Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Indonesia, Australia and New Zealand.

This was to be followed by a meeting between the President and Ambassador Henry A. Byrd who stopped off in California en route to his new post in Manila.

Such was the starting pattern of one of the busiest weeks for Nixon since he took office. In addition to today's welfare message and statement on reorganization of the Office of Economic Opportunity, the President planned within a few days to disclose his selection of a new Supreme Court associate justice to replace Abe Fortas, who left the bench May 15 under heavy critical fire.

The President's message to Congress Tuesday will spell out in some detail his plans for expanding manpower training. On Wednesday, if he followed the timetable announced earlier by his staff, a message would go to Capitol Hill asking for a start on a controversial system whereby federal tax revenues would be shared with states.

The week promised to be Wednesday night in Los Angeles when the President presides at a mammoth dinner honoring the State Apollo 11 astronauts and their families at the ultramodern Century Plaza Hotel.

Hughes Confirms Plans In Letter

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The board of directors of Air West have received a letter from the Hughes Tool Company saying that the company intends to honor its commitments to purchase the airline.

The letter also points out that Hughes expects Air West to abide by the original agreement and reminds the airline of the terms of that agreement. The net worth deficiency at June 29, 1969, was about \$16,000,000.

The board of directors of Air West met at a meeting last Friday, voted unanimously to take such steps as necessary to meet the new worth requirements of the agreement in order to fulfill its part of the contract and permit consummation of the sale.

The directors believe that arrangements can be made to cure the deficiency, but gave no assurance to that effect at this time.

The raising of the \$16,000,000 plus any additional monies required to offset any losses incurred between June 30 and the date of closing would reduce the monies to be distributed to the stockholders by approximately \$4.00 per share on the 4,300,000 shares estimated to be outstanding at the time of closing.

Spacemen Will Get Traditional Honors

SFACRE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Three modest men who braved the unknown of another world relaxed at home today before facing a tumultuous public acclaim they would rather not receive.

Astronauts—Neil Armstrong, Edwin E. "Buzz" Aldrin Jr. and Michael Collins—pronounced "perfectly healthy" after their exposure to moon dirt three weeks ago, had only one day of privacy with their families.

They were to receive a grand reunion on Apollo 11 and man's first lunar landing. Wednesday they go forth to accept traditional honours afforded the "Mercury" parades and banquet.

The astronauts were released from the Lunar Receiving Laboratory's anti-hepatitis-isolation units Sunday night after a government committee of medical specialists concluded they carried no extraterrestrial germs that would endanger Earth.

One of the first things they planned to do today was to get haircuts. They had not had their hair trimmed in nearly a month and there were no barbers in the quarantine quarters.

At 11 a.m. EDT Tuesday, the astronauts tell newsmen and television viewers across the nation—using pictures they shot—what it was like to explore the celestial sphere—orbital earth a quarter million miles away.

The spacemen will set out early Wednesday on an unprecedented national tour in Presi-

Approach Told

BUCHAREST (UPI)—A high-ranking Romanian Communist vowed today his nation would continue to develop an increasingly independent approach to Communism, despite Soviet opposition.

"We are abandoning all that is old, all that is degenerate," Dimitri Popescu told the 10th Romanian Communist party congress. "We are replacing it with a lucid, realistic spirit."

"All that Lenin calls Communism's childhood is being removed," he told the more than 3,000 delegates. "Living thought is penetrating, driving out all the old, cold abstract thinking."

Approach Told

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, a longtime champion of the poor and minorities, said Sunday more needs to be done for middleclass Americans with incomes from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

Humphrey, declining a definite answer whether he again would seek the presidency in 1972, applauded President Nixon's proposal last week to revamp the welfare system serving poor people, but he said the administration also should do more for middle-income Americans.

"The great body of Americans, earning between \$5,000 and \$15,000, is very unhappy," he said.

Police Widen Hunt In Killings, Meanwhile Another Pair Slain

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Authorities widened their search today for someone "involved in a personal way" with Sharon Tate and four other persons brutally murdered in the aftermath of a party at a rambling Bel Air estate.

Even as police pressed their search for one, two or possibly three killers, a couple in the Silverlake district 15 miles away were found slaying in a double murder strikingly similar in several respects to the slayings of Miss Tate and her friends Saturday.

In both cases "words" were scrawled in blood in the homes. In the Tate murder, the words "I was written in blood on the front door. In the Silverlake slayings, the words "death to pigs" were left in blood on the refrigerator door in the kitchen. The man at Silverlake had

the word "war" carved on his chest.

Police assigned to the Tate case were seeking a second suspect today for questioning, but said as many as three persons could be involved in the bizarre murders.

The name of the unidentified suspect came up during police questioning of William E. Garretson, 39, a caretaker at the house which lived in a guest house. He was the only person alive when detectives arrived at the scene Saturday.

Garretson underwent an hour-long polygraph test Sunday. Although police said they were not "entirely satisfied" with his answers, a spokesman said "if we can get some physical evidence checked out, we will probably release him today." He did not elaborate.

Police had not established a motive for the intruder or intruders who apparently cut the telephone lines into the home sometime after 10 p.m. Friday.

Steven Parent Jr., a friend of Garretson who left home in suburban El Monte Friday to visit him, died of multiple gunshot wounds of the chest.

Garretson's attorney Barry Tarlow, said Garretson was out reading until 4 a.m. Saturday but heard no unusual sounds from the main house, separated from the guest house by a swimming pool and shrubbery.

"There was a party at the house the night of the killings," Tarlow said. "From the investigation made by my office, our best guess is that whoever did

was involved in a personal way with these people who were killed."

Attention today turned to the second suspect sought by police.

Homicide Det. Lt. Robert Helms said, "We are looking for an individual. We don't have any definite information that he was involved. His name came up in conversation with Garretson."

Bodies Found In Wake Of Tornado

CINCINNATI (UPI)—The bodies of a young woman and two sons were found Sunday in the rubble left by a devastating tornado that hit homes and nine miles of suburbs Saturday night. Another woman died of injuries suffered when her car was blown over by high winds.

Some 25 other persons were injured by the storm that cut a narrow path through northern Cincinnati, and 100 homes were destroyed. Only 17 required hospitalization. Three were reported in serious condition.

The Red Cross said 615 homes and businesses were damaged or destroyed and an estimated 1,000 persons evicted from their homes.

Sylvester Delcorso, the Ohio adjutant general, estimated damages at \$7 million.

The dead were identified as Mrs. Carolyn Deborde, 21, of Cincinnati, her sons Delbert, 5, and Rodney, 3, and Mrs. Zolpha Taylor, 45, of Williamsport.

Mrs. Deborde and her children's bodies were found by firemen early Sunday. They were found in a pool of blood. Mrs. Taylor's body was converted to apartments in the community of Harwell, just within the city limits. The bodies were found in a pool of blood.

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Prices Freeze As Devaluation Of Franc Goes Into Effect

PARIS (UPI)—Devaluation of the franc went into effect today with a freeze on prices and profits to give the currency breathing space.

Traders were delighted with lower prices and Parisians jammed the Paris Bourse to buy stocks with the cheaper currency.

Bourse officials said it was the first time the stock market had ever had such hectic trading in the traditional holiday month of August. From 4,000 to 5,000 buyers jammed into the column building and pushed prices up anywhere from 7 to 20 per cent.

"The reaction was inevitable," said a Bourse spokesman. "It's basically a good reaction, but it doesn't prove devaluation has succeeded or failed. We won't know that for six or eight months."

France devalued the franc by

12.5 per cent Friday in a move no one expected and even its Common Market partners were informed in advance. Before devaluation a franc was worth 136 centimes, now it is worth 137 centimes.

On the gold market, in the Bourse basement, gold plummeted the same price it did on the stock market the first time that had occurred since France imposed foreign currency controls on its citizens last year. The price was \$41.51 per ounce, up slightly from Friday.

The devalued franc received a cool reception on money markets outside France. In London, the pound sterling would give up only the official 12.5 per cent.

The showing against the pound was not as closely watched since financial experts said it would demonstrate either a greater faith in the franc or a greater faith in the pound. British currency also was under pressure in Frankfurt where there was an early rush away from sterling and into marks.

French Finance Minister Valéry Giscard d'Estaing said the price and profit freezing would give the new franc "breathing space" and that if France had not devalued it would have run out of gold and foreign currency reserves by the end of the year.

Son Of JFK's Pilot Found Shot To Death

MELBOURNE, Fla. (UPI) — The son of a pilot-of-for-the late President John F. Kennedy was found shot to death in a garage Sunday night and the body of a young girl was floating in a nearby creek.

Police said George Perry Martin Jr., 19, was on the floor of a convertible parked in a lovers' lane on the Indian River. He had been shot through the head and his hands and feet were bound behind him in a manner similar to gangster executions.

The body of a girl, Connie Ruth Ballard, 17, was found about 40 yards away, floating down in Krummer Creek. Officers said she apparently had been dragged from the car into the creek. She had been shot in the chest.

Both bodies were fully clothed. Police ruled out robbery or sex as the murder motive.

"It looks like professional killings," a police spokesman said.

The couple last was seen around 11:30 a.m. EDT Sunday. Their bodies were discovered by three men, Clifton Patton, Gordon Hartley and Charles Stout, looking for empty bottles along the secluded creekbank and the river, which flows between the mainland and a dense strip of beachfront.

Martin's father is a retired Air Force colonel, George Perry Martin Sr., who piloted the presidential jet Air Force One during the Kennedy administration.

DALLAS (UPI)—If you have been bilked by your lawyer, you may be able to get your money back.

Thirty-one states and the District of Columbia now have client security funds to underwrite the integrity of every lawyer in private practice.

The monetary loss must have been suffered through misconduct in the attorney-client relationship and frequently the attorney must be disbarred or debarred.

The movement originated in New Zealand in 1929. Funds are appropriated by the state bar or made available through an increase in dues lawyers pay to their association.

Hospital Administrator Attends Utah Conference

A major accomplishment of the workshop was the development of an administrative manual for hospital administrators which deals with running a coronary care unit in a hospital.

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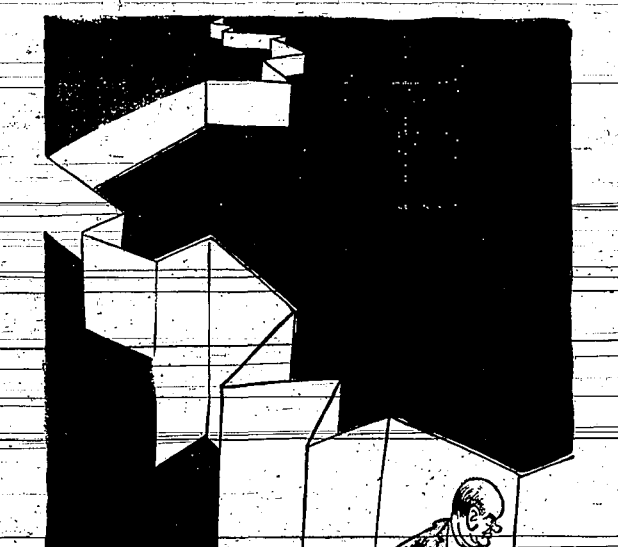

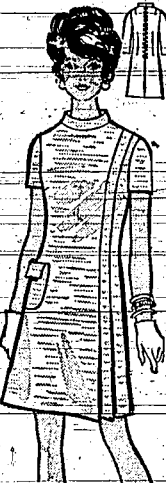

Import Meat Termed Threat To Cattlemen

(Editor's Note: Cecil Calhoun, Bull area farmer, and cattleman, were prominent in the statement of this section of the state to research the situation confronting the industry today. He is widely known throughout Idaho as a "restless" with a member of the Twin Falls County Fair board. The Times-News publishes the views of Mr. Calhoun as a public service to its readers.)

Man Linked With Another Of Slayings

YPSILANTI, Mich. (UPI)—John Norman Collins, under suspicion of slaying the seventh girl in a string of murders, reportedly has been linked to that another of the earlier killings.

A newspaper report published last week said the year-old Collins was a frequent visitor at an apartment building that housed the fourth murder victim.

Collins often appeared at an apartment across the hall from the one in which Marilyn Skelton lived in an apartment complex between the University towns of Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor, the Detroit Free Press said.

Collins, however, said they would not comment on the Free Press story. They also have refused comment on reports that Collins was linked with two other slayings.

Collins, a senior at Eastern Michigan University here was accused of first-degree murder in the slaying of a woman, Karen Sue Belenman, 18, as she can be living the price

"They fail to remember the statistics of last fall when figures were released showing cowherds down 750,000 under domestic needs. They ignore the fact that the output of agricultural free loaders over estimated hog numbers by 47 million head and had farmers out shooting dogs, deer, hair tonic, soft drinks, etc. Her food was packaged and some precooked. Mental Patient Goes Berserk In Detroit, Wounds Policemen

DETROIT (UPI)—A former mental patient went berserk Sunday, barricaded himself in his home and wounded five policemen and his neighbor before surrendering to police.

Edward Willis Blackwell, 32, threw down his shotgun and walked out when police assured him he would not be hurt. Police Commissioner John F. Spreen told a news conference.

None of those injured was critically hurt.

"Here again we see the vital importance of gun control laws," Spreen said. "It is legal in Detroit for a person with a history of mental illness to buy a gun."

Spreen said Blackwell apparently had been engaged in a dispute with his neighbor, Edward Favors, 46, who hailed a police car and said his windows had just been shot out.

The two officers approached

Favors, Spreen said, and a shot rang out. Favors was wounded on his lawn across the street from the northwest Detroit house from which the shots were fired. Favors had been up, but another shot struck him and he fell again.

The officers then radioed that they had a gunman in the house.

Several calls responded to the call and they were met by a hat of gunfire," Spreen said.

Police Commissioner John F. Spreen said that the gunman was wounded in the chest and was being taken to the hospital.


Blackwell had bought this gun just with the last week, Spreen said. He said the Detroit Common Council had ignored requests for gun control legislation in the past.

Blackwell apparently was alone in his home at the time of the shooting. His wife of 10 years had left with their six children on Wednesday, Spreen said, and his brother Eugene had been visiting him from North Carolina had left Sunday morning.

Blackwell was being examined by psychiatrists and Spreen said their reports would determine whether he was charged with assault with intent to commit murder.

Americans Draw Scolding For Lack Of Interest In Conservation Of Resources

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI)—The nation's largest conservation organization has surveyed the quality of America's natural environment and found it "poor."

In the first of what the National Wildlife Federation said would be annual surveys of U.S. environmental quality, it has reported that 60 million acres of soil and soil quality since 1960, and found that the nation is barely holding its own in forest management. "We are the enemy. And we are becoming dangerous to ourselves," the federation said.

The survey, published in the August-September issue of the federation's magazine, "National Wildlife," gave Americans a "fair" grade in wildlife conservation, although the U.S. registered a "D" grade in wildlife in the four-year period. The federation noted that 89 species of wildlife were still in danger of extinction.

Americans received a good grade in mineral management. But the federation noted that minerals were not replenishing. It called "urgent" the need for a new national policy on mineral exploitation in which all extraction would be done under leasing arrangements in order to preserve or restore the land surface for grading, tree farming, recreation or conservation use. It urged that all shale deposits in the West remain under public ownership.

The federation gave the U.S. its lowest ranking, "very bad," for air pollution.

"We are losing," Thomas I. Kinley, executive director of the federation, said. The survey found that 80 million tons of pollutants are dumped into the atmosphere annually by motor vehicles, which are responsible for more pollution than all other sources combined.
