Hurricane Toll Mounts; Rescuers Tally 237 Dead

MISSISSIPPI (UPI) — Hurricane Camille's death toll reached 237 today with many bodies still lying uncounted in the mud and devastation of Mississippi's Gulf Coast vacation land. Officials feared the toll would double or quadruple.

"It's a very conservative estimate of bodies found," said Pass Christian Police Chief Herbert Roberts.

"There are plenty of people still buried. You get up close and you can't see them but you can't get to them," said Pass Christian Police Chief Herbert Roberts.

All but a few of the recovered bodies were found in Harrison County, which includes Pass Christian, Gulfport and Biloxi. Life was grim for the survivors among them, an estimated 200,000 who were left homeless by Camille's 150-mile-an-hour winds.

Tired, hungry, thirsty, washed and without toilets since the storm hit, many grooped through the ruins of their homes salvaging remnants of their belongings.

Snakes, some of them poisonous, and rats were moving through the area looking for food. Rescue teams said they were out on a rescue yet.

Communications were nearly nonexistent and food and water were at a premium.

Red Cross and Army trucks dispensed free water, sandwiches and coffee as far as possible, but some foragers had to scavenge themselves with what they found in battered, unlabeled cans flung into the mud from home pantries and grocery shelves.

Search parties were out of touch with their headquarters for hours at a time and long lines of residents waited for word to relatives that they had survived.

Camille's death toll already was the highest from a hurricane in the nation since Texas and Louisiana in 1957. The nation's worst hurricane killed an estimated 6,000 persons at Galveston, Tex., in 1900.

Low-flying planes fogged the disaster area, but many quills and other insects swarming over the carnage. Dead deer, cattle and pigs littered the scene.

Wade Guice, Harrison County Civil Defense director, said "I wouldn't be surprised if we have a thousand casualties." In areas which includes Pass Christian, Gulfport and Biloxi—the hardest hit towns—"We are now finding them (bodies) in groups."

Mississippi Gov. John Bell Williams said "some estimate the death rate could go above 500 and possibly reach 1,000." More than 200,000 persons were homeless from Alabama to Louisiana. Some towns were virtually wiped out by Camille and the grant fides she brought. Williams said the damage could run in excess of \$500 million and, perhaps, go beyond \$1 billion.

Parade Kicks Off Fair At Jerome

JEROME—The Jerome county fair opened Wednesday with a parade scheduled for 4:30 p.m. today through the downtown streets, ending at the fairgrounds. Theme of this year's annual fair is "50 years—Jerome County."

The rodeo, produced by LaDell Hanson, Ovid, Idaho, will be staged Wednesday and Thursday nights at the fairgrounds arena. On Friday night a rodeo featuring stunts, and horse racing, which will continue for four nights, begins at the fairgrounds on Saturday night.

Fair officials said all fair exhibits will continue until Saturday except for the livestock which will have to be removed for the rodeo room for the horse racing.

Three horse shows are included in the fair schedule, at 10 a.m. Wednesday through Friday.

The queen's dinner was held Tuesday night at Woods Cafe for the rodeo queen contestants, their parents and fair board members.

The 411 style show also was held Wednesday night at the fairgrounds.

The rodeo and fair queen will be announced Thursday at the final night of the rodeo.

Denies Charge Is Appointed Buhl Justice

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) — Capt. John P. Stevenson, commander of the aircraft carrier Melbourne, today denied charges arising out of the collision between his ship and the U.S. destroyer Frank E. Evans.

Court-martial proceedings were initiated against Stevenson following a finding by a joint U.S.-Australian board of inquiry that he shared some responsibility for the collision although it was the Evans which was mainly at fault.

Appointment of John C. Pearce, Buhl, as justice of the peace in the west end of Twin Falls county was announced Tuesday by county commissioners.

Through a joint agreement with the city of Buhl, Mr. Pearce also will be appointed magistrate for the city and will be provided office space, telephone and electrical services by the city of Buhl. His salary will be paid jointly by the two taxing units. County salary will be \$150 per month and the city will pay \$115 per month in addition to furnishing facilities for the justice's use.

The appointment is effective Sept. 2, 1969, and will be for the peace and city judge. His hours are from 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

In the agreement signed by Buhl city officials and the county commissioners, a bank account in the Farmers National Bank in Buhl will be set up in the name of police magistrate and will be used to deposit receipts from court fines, costs and other magistrate or justice income.

Mr. Pearce succeeds Kerl (Jack) Lewis who left office earlier this year after a complaint was filed by the county charging him with having an insufficient funds check to cover his monthly court receipts to the county.

'Copter Kills Yanks

SALGON (UPI) — An American helicopter hit Communist ground fire today in a column of U.S. troops today, killing three of them in the second battle since the Vietnam war when a U.S. tank opened fire on them.

War communiques said today at least 32 Americans had been killed and 75 wounded in fighting across Vietnam in the past 24 hours.

A UH1 helicopter hit by ground fire crashed into a tree near an Army UH1 Division northeast of Saigon. Three U.S. troops were killed and six wounded although the three men in the helicopter escaped injury.

A U.S. tank accidentally opened fire on troops of the 1st Air Cavalry Division during a Communist attack Tuesday on an outpost 60 miles north of Saigon. Nine Americans were killed and five injured.

Eight Americans including a news photographer were killed in the crash Tuesday of an Army UH1 helicopter west of Tam Ky, near Da Nang.

The U.S. command said the helicopter carried four crew members, three Army pilots and one crew member. One of the pilots, a 29-year-old from Norwood, Mass., a photographer for the Associated Press, was killed.

Newsman was killed in the Vietnam War.

The U.S. American Division which killed 155 North Vietnamese soldiers in an all-day battle Monday near Da Nang halted two Communist assaults on an outpost west of Tam Ky Tuesday night.

Some Communist troops made it through the barbed wire surrounding the camp but the attacks killed one American and wounded 14 others, the U.S. command said. They killed 45 North Vietnamese.

An air strike, U.S. officials fighting broke out today in the area between Saigon and the Cambodian border. The action included a battle between U.S. Cavalry, Division troops and North Vietnamese forces 67 miles north of Saigon. The Americans killed 10 North Vietnamese and one American. A mile away, Communist troops fired five 122m rockets into another air base. U.S. officials were described as light.

Cassia Schools To Carry On Despite Levy Defeat

BURLEY — Cassia County school board members Wednesday said they will carry on as usual when school opens Monday, despite the defeat Tuesday by district voters of a 7.5 mill levy, which earlier had been rejected at a referendum in maintaining educational standards in the county.

The vote of 690 yes to \$26 no for the proposed mill levy was 53,285 per cent, while a two-thirds majority was required.

Board members, at a meeting Tuesday night said the election showed "the wishes of the people." They announced that all elementary students must attend the schools in their own designated areas.

In the past this has not been carried out, particularly in the Springdale schools, Supt. Dale Nelson said. "The board will be the highest of the district school is founded by one half mile west of Unity Road (257 E.) on both sides of the river and to the mountains.

The 7.5 mill levy would have been for five years.

Airport Beautification Project Planned

The initial step was taken Tuesday afternoon to turn the Twin Falls City - County Airport entrance area into an attractive section.

Members of the airport commission voted to utilize 20 shares of Twin Falls County water shares, owned by the airport as a source for water to be used in the project.

Under the proposed plan, the entrance area to the field, into this fall or early next spring, be planted to grass or some other form of "colorful vegetation. Trees and shrubs also will be planted.

The initial suggestion, which led to the resolution, by members came from Heber Lougimiller, chairman of the Twin Falls County Commission.

"As long as we are fixing up the airport, we might as well make it very attractive at the same time," he said.

Airport commission members concurred with the suggestion. At the present time the water shares in the name of the airport are sold to either individuals. Under the new plans, the water would be utilized for airport purposes.

This water, it was pointed out, would be pumped out of the high line canal at a point near the airport.

During the meeting a discussion was held between members and Don Cooper, Idaho district sales manager for Air West, and Hal Masauer, local area manager for the airline, relative to marketing possibilities in which the community and the airline would benefit.

In addition to the two airline officials, others attending the session were City Manager Herb Dierbeck, City Councilman Herb Warner, City Engineer Gene Miller, County Commissioner Chairman Heber Lougimiller, County Commissioners Carl Williams and Bill Martz, Twin Falls airport commissioners Warren Barry, Gary Blicke and Gus Kelly, Airport Manager Harry Merrick.

The newspaper said the next shipment of the World War I gas would be sent to industrial users in Geismar, La. The gas, which was sold by the Army last year, is used in the manufacture of plastics and dye.

British Army Takes Control In Ireland

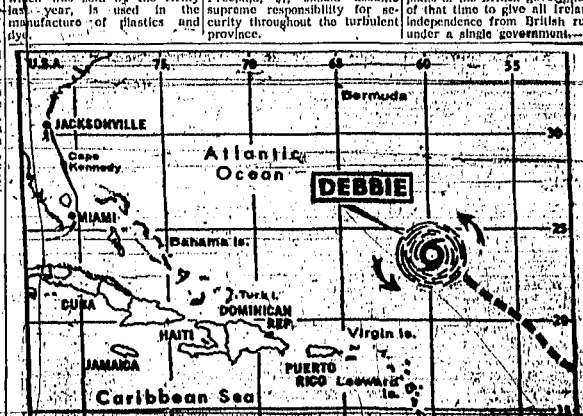
LONDON (UPI) — The British army today took over the job of peace-keeping in Northern Ireland, following the controversial "B specials" — an almost entirely Protestant force of special police, whose deployment to the province's 25 Irish ghettos has demanded.

Within hours after Chester Clark's return to Belfast, two British soldiers were shot by IRA government members, William Craig and Harry West demanded his resignation.

The Rev. Ian Paisley, leader of Protestant extremists, charged a "sellout" and "capitulation" to the Roman Catholic Church.

"Protestants must now join themselves together as their fathers did in 1912," he thundered.

"This is a reference to formation of a Protestant volunteer army in Ulster just before World War I to fight plans of the British government of that time to give all Ireland independence from British rule under a single government."

Ore-Ida Reports Output Crimped By Fire Damage

ONTARIO, Ore. (UPI) — Ore-Ida Foods have announced the company will probably be able to process only half of the corn and two-thirds of the potatoes contracted from Treasure Valley farmers.

Ore-Ida Field Manager John Catey said it now appears production from the fire-damaged plant at Ontario will be closer to 50 per cent than the hopes for 80 per cent of normal capacity.

Catey said the firm has been unable to dispose of any material amount of corn to other processors. He told growers in a letter that Ore-Ida will continue to move potatoes to the extent that it is economically feasible and to the extent that doing so does not conflict with deliveries already scheduled from potatoes contracted for Burley.

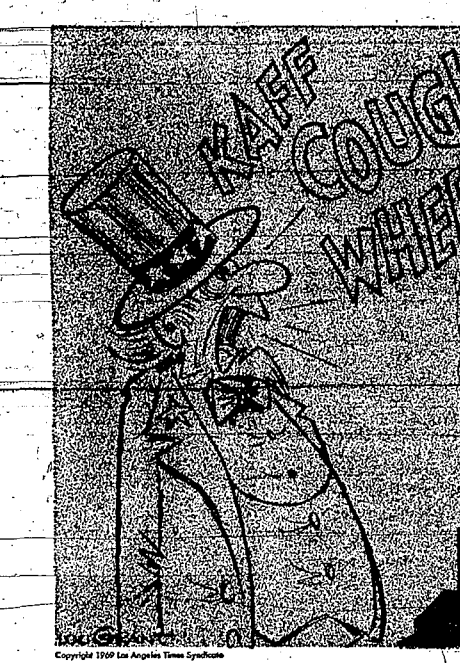

U of I President Asks Control Of 'Man's Excesses'

MOSCOW (UPI) — University of Idaho President Ernest W. Hartung stressed the importance of long-range planning and control of "man's chemical and physical excesses" in a speech to biologists and chemists from 18 foreign countries here this week.

The more than 80 international authorities are participating in an eight-day advanced study institute on the biological and international aspects of man's excesses in forests which opened Monday on this university campus.

Hartung said people are beginning to "become aware of, and worry about," some of the excesses to which we have gone in our attempts at chemical control of biological phenomena.

"I hope that in stressing biological and genetic control, this conference may assist in trying to bring us back to a balance on some other approaches to the control of man, animals and plants through natural and biological means," he said.

During the week-long institute, speakers and panels were expected to discuss breeding schemes for mass production of rust-resistant pines and methods of coordinating international efforts to reduce the damage caused by the timber disease.

Thief Falls

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) — A 29-year-old rope-climbing burglar apparently fell early today from the Widener library at Harvard University while attempting to carry away the \$1-million Gutenberg Bible.

Police said they found Vido K. Aras of the Dorchester section of Boston lying on the ground nearby unconscious in the library's interior courtyard. Above the young man was hanging a 40-foot rope attached to a mezzanine window.

Authorities said the famed Bible was in a knapsack beside Aras. He was taken to Cambridge hospital with lacerations and a possible skull fracture, apparently sustained in a fall from the roof.

Gem GI Survives By Hiding Behind Gravestones

CHU LAI, Vietnam (UPI) — Viet-Cong fortification along the Ly River some 350 miles west of Saigon, was hit recently and had to hide behind Viet Cong gravestones.

Heavy jungle foliage blocked out early-morning sun as the four men crawled toward the apparently abandoned camp.

The four soldiers had moved out ahead of the rest of their unit in search of a suspected Viet-Cong fortification.

The buildings will shake, Sept. 4 when the 40-kiloton nuclear device is exploded 8,430 feet under the earth's surface.

The explosion will, in less than a tenth of a second, melt and vaporize the shale and a sandstone formation until a cavern 180 feet across is formed.

Rullison like Gasbuggy, is designed to free natural gas reserves which can't be tapped under more conventional methods.

The Rullison field may have 8 to 10 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, according to Will Frank, vice president of Austral Oil Co. Inc., of Houston, the business partner in Rullison.

Frank says the project is costing Austral Oil about \$9 million; which is 80 per cent of the total cost of the project.

Rullison is located in the Plovershare Basin, one of six large basins in the Rocky Mountain area.

The Atomic Energy Commission is considering the future of underground nuclear explosions.

By using nuclear explosives, the Bureau of Mines estimates the nation could double its natural gas reserves.

Frank says the natural gas now trapped in the formations is non-commercial because the rock structure is very "tight" and won't let the gas escape easily.

Virginia Voters Nominate Ex-Envoy In Runoff Election

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI)—William C. Battle, the former U.S. ambassador to Australia, tapped by conservatives to unify Virginia's shattered Democratic party, was nominated Tuesday for a runoff election over held in the commonwealth.

Small-town attorney Andrew P. Miller of Abingdon, Spotsylvania County, was elected to the state Senate, having at least taken representation on the November general election ballot, however, by winning the Democratic nomination for attorney general over Guy O. Farley.

Battle, a Charlottesville attorney and Miller join state Sen. J. Sargeant Reynolds of Richmond, the Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, in shaping the fall ticket, which faces the Republicans' most ambitious bid to win Virginia's Statehouse since the turn of the century.

Reynolds, 33-year-old heir to the Reynolds aluminum fortune, was nominated overwhelmingly in a bitter July 15 primary. His election produced a defeat for the political heirs of the late Sen. Harry F. Byrd Sr., D-Va., with 90 per cent of the returns counted in the governor's race, Battle had 228,887 votes to 206,838 for his flamboyant opponent, state Sen. Reynolds.

Battle had promised to "keep the big boys honest" if elected. Battle had 52.5 per cent of the vote to 47.5 per cent for Howell.

Miller had 244,924 votes to 146,369 for Farley, a member of the Virginia House of Delegates, with 94.5 per cent of the returns. In Miller's percentage was 62.5, Farley's 37.4.

Both Battle, 48, and Miller, 36, were the front-runners in the first primary in which Farley emerged as the only successful "Byrd Machine" candidate to run on the same ticket with Lt. Gov. Fred Pollard for governor and state Sen. Carlington Thompson for lieutenant governor.

In November, the Battle-Reynolds-Miller ticket faces a Republican slate headed by GOP gubernatorial nominee Lt. Gov. Holton, a Roanoke attorney who narrowly lost to Godwin in 1965 and who successfully delivered Virginia to the Democrats in the last November's presidential election.

Battle, son of former Virginia Gov. John C. Battle, organized Virginia in the late President John F. Kennedy's behalf in 1960, even though the elder Byrd maintained his compelling "golden silence" that election. Kennedy later named Battle ambassador to Australia, a post the new Democratic nominee resigned in 1964.

Baptists Snare Communist Youth

MOSCOW (UPI)—A young Communist of great promise faltered and fell by the wayside recently. Not drugs. Not drink. Not a double dealer.

Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, has admitted the "defection" of a young gas-truck driver named Anatoly Miranov, a member of the Young Communist League, an army veteran and loyal Soviet citizen.

It said he was lured into the Baptist sect in his home village of Mordok, near Moscow, when he went to a Moscow meeting out of curiosity and fell in love with a Baptist girl named Valya.

When he proposed to her, Pravda said, she insisted he be baptized first.

"Are you crazy?" he replied. "I'm a Komsomol member." Nevertheless, he continued to attend prayer meetings with soon-to-be a Baptist.

"I knew I was being a double dealer," he said, and then I was told by Komsomol leaders to choose for yourself, but do it without your Komsomol card.

After his expulsion, Pravda said, Valya accepted his proposal and he was baptized.

But soon his training as a young Communist came through and he could no longer accept Baptist teachings.

"The Baptists speak about love to everybody, but is it possible to love everybody? Is it possible to love enemies?" he was quoted as saying. "It is a real hypocrisy."

"They don't like the red color of the pioneer (Communist children's organization) necktie," he said.

"They punish their children if they know they went to the movies or joined the Komsomol," he said.

Pravda recounted a case in which a Baptist woman was taken to court and accused of forcing 12 children to remain in doors, praying all day long.

"They (the children) looked like old people," the newspaper said. "They never smiled, and they didn't know about the gaiety of children. All day they prayed."

Young Anatoly, by this time the father of one child, finally renounced his new religion and at a party meeting in his factory, announced, "my friends, I am again with you."

"Everybody cheered," Pravda said, "and the local party leader, comrade Yerin, was especially glad."

However, when he returned to the party his wife left him and took their child with her and "the Baptists did their best to not let her go back to him," Pravda said, presenting the moral to the story:

"It is now very difficult for Anatoly. He is very glad he could correct his error, but now he feels a responsibility for Valya and other such people who are deceived and in the dark. "People must help them."

Church Plans Vote On Missile System

SEATTLE (UPI)—The general assembly of the Christian Church in the Northwest voted at today's closing session on a resolution asking the President and Congress to consider postponement of anti-ballistic missile (ABM) system.

The church's general board proposed the motion pending negotiations with the Soviet Union on nuclear control.

Opponents of the Department of Peace resolution asked why the government needed what it already had—the state of other nations, should be keeping the peace.

Supporters argued the department should have equal status in the government with other executive departments and agencies, to put more emphasis on peace.

The convention also approved a resolution urging the church to urge the state of other nations to consider themselves conscientious objectors on the military draft.

Polanski Denies Party Set On Night Of Wife's Murder

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Roman Polanski telephoned his wife Sharon Tate from London Aug. 8 and she had no premonition that a few hours later she would die with her four guests in a macabre mass murder.

Polanski, the brilliant Polish film director who made "Rosemary's Baby," said Miss Tate called "a few hours before the tragedy occurred."

"She wanted to know if I would just as soon be governed by the Viet Cong as by the current Saigon regime. He said the Thieu administration does not represent the people of South Vietnam, but he conceded that there are no leaders in sight at the present time that could satisfy the majority of Vietnamese."

Polanski said he was trying to feed it with her food, "Polanski said."

"There was no indication of a party that evening. There wasn't any party that evening," Polanski related.

Polanski recounted his last talk with his wife at a news conference Tuesday called because of the circumstances and horrible things "said about her. Blinding back tears and sometimes breaking into sobs, Polanski related the circumstances of the deaths at the secluded Benedict Canyon estate leased by him and his wife.

Miss Tate did not use drugs, he said, although two of the victims, Voytek Frokowsky and Jay Sebring, were known to use drugs. "Sharon didn't use drugs, she didn't touch alcohol, she didn't even smoke cigarettes," Polanski said.

Frokowsky once brought a man to a party at the home who became so objectionable he had to be thrown out. Polanski gave the name to the police but not to newsmen.

"There was a lot of talk about parties in our home," he said. "They are true. There was a constant party. There wasn't an evening without friends."

He said marijuana was smoked at the home by guests but he didn't think it was out of the ordinary among their circle of Hollywood friends.

"All of you know how beautiful she was. She was one of the most beautiful women—if not the most beautiful woman—in the world."

"But few of you know how good she was. She was vulnerable—she couldn't refuse any friendship."

Prospects

MONTEPELLIER (UPI)—Rep. Orval Hansen, R-Idaho, who recently returned from Vietnam, told a Montpelier Chamber of Commerce group he believed prospects are improving for a political settlement in Vietnam.

Hansen said, "The growing military capability of the South Vietnamese will permit the continued withdrawal of American forces without any sacrifices in overall strength."

Hansen returned to Idaho last week after visiting the men of the 11th Engineer Bn of the Idaho National Guard in Vietnam. The 800-man unit is scheduled to begin withdrawing from Vietnam Aug. 28 or 29.

State Agency On Job Aid Begins Parley

BOISE (UPI)—The Idaho Department of Employment began its first day of its annual three-day managers and tax consultants' meeting Tuesday in Boise.

Executive Director C. L. Worsley said in his opening remarks that the continued emphasis on serving the hard-core disadvantaged and the rural manpower program will not necessarily change efforts in Idaho but may give rise to concern on "how we will get about doing the job."

Worsley cited a computerized "job bank" system as one of the topics mentioned by the national administration's recent proposals in social welfare.

Worsley said the significant aspect of the "job bank" is a dramatic rise in the number of hard-core unemployed that have been placed on jobs in areas where the system is operating.

He added that it is conceivable that Idaho may some time in the future be able to participate in an area or regional "job bank" system, "but not for some time."

Speaking on "services to veterans," Lou Hibbs, department adjutant and finance officer, said, "You are here to develop methods of improving employment for everyone in Idaho."

Nixon Plays Golf With Enthusiasm On West Vacation

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)—President Nixon may turn out to be one of the more recreationally oriented chief executives since Teddy Roosevelt. When Nixon first arrived at the western White House nine days ago, he began working at a furious pace that his staff and the White House press found hard to match. In the last four days, however, the President has played golf, starting in the late afternoon and usually playing with his son-in-law David Eisenhower. David's wife, Julie, recently began golf lessons and plays a slow, deliberate game. When she is alone, the foursome moves at a glacial pace. The President, however, does not seem to be disturbed by his daughters' slow movement around the course and will stand patiently, leaning on his putter, while Julie approaches a green. Nixon declared Mississippi a major disaster area Monday because of devastation from Hurricane Camille and allocated the state \$2 million in relief funds. The White House indicated that additional money would be authorized when the extent of damage to public property is determined. Complete information was not available immediately because of communications difficulties.

Also arrested was Carl W. Brooks, 45, Columbia, Md., identified as a plainclothes detective of the Metropolitan Washington Police Narcotics Squad. The warrant charged Brooks with passing secret police information to Jackson.

Court papers said the operation was "one of the major narcotics trafficking operations" in the nation. The other persons arrested were from the District of Columbia.

Small 'Skytels' Prove Able To Serve Pilots With Ease

NEW YORK (UPI)—Skytel is a new York cropping up around the country and in a few years may be almost as widely known as "mail."

A skytel is a special kind of airport hotel. Instead of being located on the fringes of a large airport to serve as a stopover for airline passengers, it is on the edge of a small flying field and has a clubby atmosphere.

It caters to people who fly their own planes or travel a lot by air taxi or charter planes. Its patrons have a community of interest in their love of flying.

Like the motel, the skytel appears to have originated in California and is slowly spreading eastward, according to the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association of Washington. So far, there are very few in the eastern States.

But Luna Industries, Inc., of White Plains, N.Y., has just bought Robert Airport at Westkill, N.Y., and says it will build the first unit of a national chain of skytels there.

Luna is run by Luca A. Cappell Jr. who has made a modest fortune in the electrical contracting business and is a flying enthusiast.

Cappell has his own twin-engine business plane.

It is a busy little resort airport with a flying school, a maintenance depot and a large restaurant. Cappell intends to add a swimming pool, a golf course and a riding stable for folks who like to mix horses and flying.

In his plan to establish a national chain of skytels, Cappell intends to do virtually everything himself. "My contracting business has grown from the

You remove the roast from the package and wrap it in heavy foil, shiny side in. Place it on the hottest part of the grill, four to six inches from the heat. Turn about every 30 minutes. After about two hours remove the foil and put the roast on a cooler spot on the grill for browning. While the roast is browning, put foil-wrapped potatoes on grill.

Continuing to cook the roast about an hour occasionally turning. When fork tender, the roast is done. If you are a barbecue sauce fan, brush the roast with sauce during the final 15 minutes to add flavor, glaze and glamour.

Slice the corned beef thin or thick according to preference. It's all a taste treat.

TO RIPEN BANANAS.

If you want to ripen green bananas quickly, place them in a brown bag and close it tightly. Ripen bananas in a warm, dark place for a day or two.

Machines Save Laundry Money

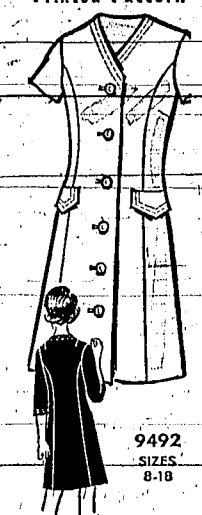
If your household washes less than five loads of laundry a week, it will probably save you money by using automatic-operated machines. That's a tip from home management specialists.

Greater efficiency in construction and in a general, laundering costs in coin-operated are generally less today than 10 years ago, says a county home economist.

In a good many cases the cost compares favorably or is actually less than washing at home. There is also a possibility of saving on self-service by cleaning, national reports show. This is particularly true of establishments where attendants prepare, clean and hang garments, freeing customers for other activities.

Specialists noted that a large percent of all stains on garments can be removed in self-service cleaners if recommended procedures are followed. Use of spotting spray assists in the removal of spots that are soluble in water, but some conditions may require chemical treatment by a professional.

2ND HAND HIGH IN CLASSIC PLAY

Today's hand is just about as simple as possible. There are no "profits" with the "bidding." South has 4-4-3-2 distribution, 16 high-card points and stoppers in all four suits. About as standard an opening no-trump bid as you can find.

Of course, those iconoclasts who use the so-called weak no-trump have to dig up a minor-suit opening but these weak no-

might try some other suit but with this type of hand against this bidding, anyone would just lead the standard fourth best of the longest suit.

The first play from dummy is even more standard. It is up to South to forget all about the rule of second hand low and play dummy's queen of spades.

The reason South should play the queen is that this is a classic example of the play of second hand high. That queen of spades is useless unless it is played right then and there. It has a 50-percent chance to take a trick if played and no chance to take a trick if held back for later use.

This time it does hold the first trick. South smiles happily, runs off four club tricks and leads the queen of diamonds for a finesse. The finesse loses but it doesn't hurt South. The best East can do is to lead a second spade and hold South to his contract with no overtricks.
