

## T. F. Presents Case For Tax Limit Relief

Twin Falls case before the Idaho State Tax Commission was kept alive Wednesday by a delegation of city officials who went to Boise to present the city's appeal for increasing its tax rate to meet "emergency" needs in 1970.

The delegation of six city commissioners, city manager, city clerk and city attorney told members of the tax commission that Twin Falls needs \$25,000 more than permitted by recent state legislation.

City attorney William Langley, who argued the city's case in Boise, said in Twin Falls Wednesday night that tax commission members had given no hint whether or not the city would be permitted to levy taxes above the ceiling of 104 per cent of last year's tax receipts.

"We presented evidence that at least in our opinion showed a change of circumstances," Mr. Langley said.

Contrary to published reports, he said, the tax commission had not refused the city's appeal. Rather, he said, "all they said is they would require further evidence. Actually it wasn't a denial but a procedural thing."

"It's still open," he said.

## New Fighting Costs Reds 300 Casualties

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. infantrymen battled Communist troops in a series of clashes that have cost the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong more than 300 killed this week, military spokesmen said today.

In the strategic Cambodian border area, U.S. forces killed 32 Communist troops today in a four-hour battle near Tay Ninh City.

The latest fighting, in the northern coastal plains, cost units of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade eight dead and 33 wounded, the U.S. command said.

Far to the south in the Mekong Delta, Viet. Cong guerrillas killed eight, sleeping South Vietnamese troops in an attack on a sentry post camp.

The U.S. command said sharply increased fighting in the Communist so-called autumn campaign had doubled U.S. combat deaths over the week. A total of 244 Americans were killed compared with a two-year low of 98 the previous weeks.

More than 50 Viet. Cong guerrillas ran into the South Vietnamese encampment—65 miles southwest of Saigon, losing explosive charges at sleeping militiamen.

They fled, leaving the camp in flames and eight dead and eight missing.

UPI correspondent Daniel Hesterland reported the South Vietnamese troops had gone to sleep without posting security guards and "the Viet. Cong approached without detection."

## Burley Hearing Seeks Data On Proposed Constitution

Those attending, asked many questions concerning various aspects of the proposed new documents; but there was little outright criticism of the proposed constitution. Surprise was expressed by the 30 some persons attending at some of the extremely outmoded items in the present state constitution.

It was pointed out, according to the proposed constitution, written in 1900, that the county seat for Cassia county, some of the questions asked were about investment of public funds and election or appointment of state education officials.

## 32 Die In Virginia Floods

Disease Threatens Hurricane Survivors

Audrey claimed 430 lives in Texas and Louisiana in 1957. Camille's damage might exceed \$1 billion and officials feared the death toll may surpass 500.

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew toured the disaster area Wednesday and predicted federal relief funds would be the greatest on record for a disaster.

The misery along the Mississippi and Louisiana coasts was stark.

There was little power, drinking water, food and communications in the area. Sanitation problems posed health dangers. Silt trenches were dug for bathrooms. Mosquitoes and flies swarmed by the thousands. A stench rose from decomposed bodies—those not yet found and those "piled knee deep" awaiting removal.

Refugees scavenged for food, hunting for cans in the debris of stores. Starving dogs roamed in packs. Snakes and rats slithered about.

Looters and black marketers took advantage of the chaos.

State Atty. Gen. Walter G. Johnson, enforcing limited martial law and a 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. curfew, ordered his soldiers to bring in looters "dragging or standing."

"A looter is one of the vilest type people, as bad as a grave robber," he said. Liquor stores, groceries and homes have been looted, he said.

## Fish Biologists Of Northwest Meet Here

Large companies that dam the rivers and men who like to fish those rivers can live in peace together.

This was one of the messages delivered Wednesday night at a banquet meeting of biologists and conservationists representing several Northwest states. The meeting, to conclude Friday, is being held at the Holiday Inn.

Several speakers appeared and talked on problems surrounding the migration and raising of fish, with topics ranging from how to cool lakes to the view of fish planting in California.

About 25 men attended.

Robert Erkins, president of the Snake River Trout Co., at Burley, was one of the guest speakers at the banquet. He started raising fish in Magic Valley in the 1950s, and reviewed his progress in this area with those attending.

Speakers today included Ivan Domoloni of the Corps of Engineers, speaking on silt and salmon passage; Roy Hamilton of Pacific Power and Light Co., talking on the High Mountain Sheep Dam; Quentin Edson, Tacoma City Light Co., talking on Washington fish programs, and Mr. Smith giving a fish conservation movie.

The confab ends Friday with an 8 a.m. business session.

## Military Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird announced today he was yielding to congressional pressure and reluctantly reducing the nation's armed forces by 100,000 men and spending by \$3 billion.

He warned: "It is clear our defense readiness will be weakened."

Laird told a news conference he ordered the cuts after being informed by the chairman of the House Appropriations Committee that at least \$5 billion would be cut from defense appropriations requests.

## Gooding Withdraws Appeal To Tax Unit

GOODING—Gooding County commissioners Wednesday withdrew their petition before the Idaho State Tax Commission seeking additional tax revenue to replace the county courthouse which was destroyed by fire 18 months ago.

Commission chairman James Barlog said Wednesday the decision was made because the commissioners were afraid that the petition would be rejected by the tax commission.

"We were afraid they would turn us down," he said.

Commissioner Ben Glander said Wednesday the tax commission had asked the county commissioners to meet with them to discuss the petition. But he said, "We decided we didn't want to go to meet with them. We hope to raise the money on our own."

Commissioners explain the county has insurance money reserved and if the old hospital is sold, some money will be realized from that. There also are emergency funds and still some hope for federal funds.

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had asked for permission to increase its levy more than the 104 per cent increase prescribed by law.

According to the retroactive statute, taxing units in the state cannot tax at levels exceeding 104 per cent of those of the preceding year. The ceiling can be bypassed only if voters of the taxing unit approve the increased taxes, or if the State Tax Commission approves the increase.

Current plans call for a \$300,000 structure to be constructed at the corner of Elm Avenue and Main Street in Gooding. The Boise architect firm of Watson and Leuthen has been contracted to design the building. The county is now drawing up plans for the new structure. Working plans are scheduled for completion Sept. 18.

## Rainfall Deluges Region

LOVINGSTON, Va. (UPI)—Torrential rains from the remnants of Hurricane Camille sent rivers crashing out of their banks in Virginia and West Virginia today, killing at least 32 persons.

Thirty were known dead in Virginia and at least two were killed in West Virginia.

Virginia's historic James River roared toward the sea leaving shattered mountain towns, bridges and broken roads in its backwash.

Authorities said the toll probably would go higher when the waters recede.

West Virginia Gov Arch K. Moore asked President Nixon to declare Anjean and Richwood disaster areas.

A 91-year-old woman and her 66-year-old daughter drowned in their home north of White Sulphur Springs, Va., when they were trapped there by flood waters.

At least 100 Anjean residents evacuated their homes and took refuge in a high school.

The James, on whose banks was established England's first colonial colony at Jamestown in 1607, bore down on the capital city of Richmond with floodwaters expected to crest tonight at nearly 40 feet. Flood signs at Richmond were flashing away in the city's history.

The weather bureau said it was Virginia's worst flood since 1936 as the James and its tributaries flooded from the Allegheny Mountains almost to the Atlantic Ocean.

Entire mountain towns were underwater. Superhighways were blocked by landslides and snapping rivers. Railroads and bridges were washed away.

Authorities said it could be days before they could calculate exactly the death and destruction.

Off Virginia's capes, Camille whipped up seas so fierce that a 56-foot pleasure boat had its hull pierced and its 23 occupants were rescued only after a daring air-sea mission by the Navy and Coast Guard.

## Fire Caused By Careless Picnickers

Hot summer days are beckoning picnickers to the wooded forest areas of Magic Valley, and Wednesday afternoon someone had a picnic in the area of the Hollow vicinity of the South Hills.

Forest Service officials discovered the remains of a campfire that had spread in a wooded area because they were making a routine check of the area and discovered a few minutes after the fire broke out they were able to avoid what could have been a destructive timber fire.

Officials of the Sawtooth National Forest said the fire had not cleaned up the area; did not completely extinguish their campfire and if they had the required shovel, axe and bucket, did not use them.

Forest Service spokesman urged persons using forest areas during present fire hazard conditions to use more care and to make certain their campfire is out and dead — before they leave the area.

Another small fire, this one lightning caused, was extinguished in the south end of the hollow on the morning of the 20th. Two TBM bombers and a B-24 carried fire retardant to the blaze and it had under control after it covered about four acres.

## Drive-In Set To Be Built Here

Several lots at the corner of Blue Lakes Boulevard North and Shoup Avenue have been sold to the Red Steer Drive-In, Inc. and a drive-in restaurant will be built there in the near future.

The property belonged to M. L. (Lowell) Dick and Clinton Sept, according to records at the Twin Falls County Clerk's office. It was sold to Red Steer Inc. on July 31.

Earl B. Peck, a Twin Falls general contractor, has been awarded the bid to build the drive-in restaurant and he said he is ready to start immediately, as soon as he receives a contract from the architect.

A home belonging to Mr. Dick, formerly managing editor of the Times-News, will be removed before construction starts, Mr. Peck said.

Red Steer is a chain company with drive-in restaurants in Nampa, Boise and Caldwell. The design of the building is red and white.

Mr. Peck said he expects to finish construction about 100 days after he starts.

The purchase price of the property was not disclosed. Mr. Peck said final estimates on what it will cost to build the drive-in and black top parking area will be known soon, when he receives the contract and negotiations are completed with the architect.

He said the drive-in will offer no lounge facilities, with food prepared in the building and served to customers outside the building.

## Peace Negotiators Express Hope Of Progress At Paris

PARIS (UPI)—Allied negotiators may have found a long source of optimism in the Vietnam talks in a phrase the North Vietnamese recently used, a spokesman for the South Vietnamese delegation said.

The spokesman said the Allies had cautiously noted North Vietnamese chief negotiator Xuan Thuy's use of the words "independent state" in referring to the future status of South Vietnam.

Thuy used the words in Thursday's weekly session of the talks.

Many observers at the talks and some members of the American delegation have taken the reference as meaning North Vietnam might accept partition of Vietnam.

Asked if this terminology was hopeful to the Allied side in Paris, a South Vietnamese spokesman said, "I would not say hopeful because the Communists are capable of predicting themselves."

"But we took note of this statement because this is the first time he (Thuy) said so clearly that the two Vietnams are meant to be separated for a certain period until we could discuss reunification."

The South Vietnamese were quick to point out this idea was one they had been promoting more than a year.

"The spokesman said the South Vietnamese would be willing to wait for reunification of the two Vietnams only so long as there would be no interference from the side of the other side."

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# Czechs Call Silent Protest On Date Of Invasion By Soviets

PRAGUE (UPI)—The Czechoslovak government stationed troops in force throughout Prague today on the first anniversary of the Soviet invasion.

The people responded with a virtually unanimous silent, passive protest against the invasion. All over Prague people walked to work. Streets were nearly empty. Workers wore black, relieved only by a tiny black-trimmed emblem of the national tricolor.

The government announced two persons had been killed and 320 arrested Wednesday night in six hours of street fighting between hundreds of police and soldiers and 20,000 demonstrators.

The announcement said some of the demonstrators, whom it called "criminal elements," carried guns against the police. It did not say whether the dead were police or civilians.

The government announcement today was the first official acknowledgment of the fighting.

"Provocations took place in Prague last night, mostly by young people," it said. "They built barricades on some places and damaged cars. These elements did not hesitate to use fire weapons against the police in which action two persons were killed and several injured."

"Three hundred and twenty persons were detained among the many criminal elements. They attacked the police, hindered traffic, broke windows, hurled stones and tail fires, damaged public transit means and cars."

"There had been fears calls by resistance leaders for a boycott of public transportation would lead to a general strike. But workers appeared to be following the underground orders to keep their jobs."

With leaflets and whispers, resistance leaders had spread the word in recent weeks to mark the anniversary by walking to work, boycotting stores, wearing black and observing five minutes of silence at noon (7 a.m. EDT).

Government officials responded by alerting the army and police and by warning that any attempt to disrupt the nation would be met with severe measures.

But the quiet, dignified protest appeared almost completely unopposed, but the long lines common in front of stores on other mornings were gone. Public disciplinary workers walked to their offices, blue collar workers to their factories.

Molotists near the National Museum, who had turned on their headlights as a sign of protest, were stopped by police, who took away their driver's licenses.

It was one year ago today five of Czechoslovakia's Warsaw Pact allies swept across its borders and ended the seven-month experiment of Alexander Dubcek's "socialism with a human face."

Since then, liberals such as Dubcek and Josef Smrkovsky were demoted, others joined 40,000 other Czechoslovak refugees abroad, a student named Jan Palach became a national martyr by burning himself to death, and pro-Soviet Communists assumed nearly complete control of the nation.

# Governor Demands Gas Train Halt

DES MOINES, Iowa, (UPI)—Gov. Robert Ray has called upon the U.S. Department of Transportation to intervene and halt shipments of poison gas through Iowa.

The governor vowed Wednesday to call out Iowa National Guardsmen to patrol points along the routes, if Transportation Secretary John Volpe does not stop the shipments.

Ray asked Volpe to curtail two planned shipments of deadly phosgene gas through Iowa, and to deny permits for any future shipments in the state.

The Republican governor, who registered a complaint with President Nixon when a similar train passed through Iowa last week, pointed out that 17 train wrecks have occurred on the proposed route thus far this year.

## Pollution Of Land Stirs Alarm At Meet

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)—Land and soil pollution and its prevention is as important as the fight to prevent air and water pollution, a noted California pathologist told a meeting of the Pacific Division of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, meeting here through the week.

"Besides the pollution caused by houses, freeways, garbage, industrial waste, chemicals, crop refuse, and poor farming methods," Dr. William C. Snyder said, "land is being polluted by the introduction and buildup of plant pathogens (viruses) in soil."

Snyder, professor of plant pathology at the University of California at Berkeley, is Pacific Division president of the national group.

"Some pathogens are nematodes, a class of worms, which attack tomatoes and cause big vein diseases in lettuce," Snyder said. "Others are destructive bacterial pathogens, and fungi, of which one of the most dangerous is the fusarium."

Snyder said varieties of fusarium have attacked such major world crops as wheat, barley, banana and rice. "The virus is endowed with forms of functions to insure its existence in the rigorous conditions of natural field soil," Snyder said.

"In fact, if any earthborne organism ever survives on the moon, I believe it will be fusarium."

The pathologist faces problems—basically different from those posed by non-living forms of pollution—when tackling the task of preventing plant diseases, Snyder said. "Organisms such as pathogens can reproduce and vary their nature; the non-living pollutant cannot."

Mildew Spots Are Difficult To Remove

If you find mildew spots on clothing that you've hung for some time; what do you do about it?

Brush off the surface growth if the clothes are dry, suggests the county home economics agent. If a stain remains, launder washable garments at once with soap and water. Rinse well and dry in the sun. In case stains still persist after washing, dip white cotton, rayon or linen in a dilute solution of chlorine bleach. Again rinse and dry in the sun.

For colored fabric, first test the bleach on a sample of the cloth to be sure it will not change the color.

Send non-washable articles to the dry-cleaner promptly.

Grass stains are a common problem in summer. The first step in removing them from washable articles is to work soap or detergent into the stain, then rinse. If the dye is safe, you may sponge the stain with alcohol. Dilute alcohol with two parts of water for use on acetate. If stain remains, use a chlorine or peroxide bleach. For non-washable articles, use the same methods, but try alcohol first if it does not destroy the dye.

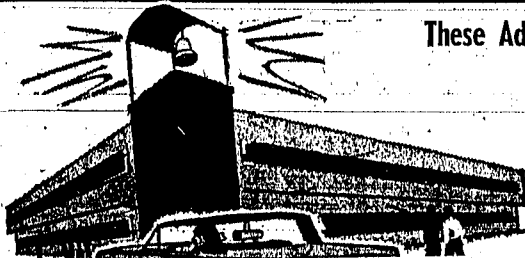

# Jurist Orders 'Spy' Data

CHATTANOOGA.—Tenn. (UPI)—A federal judge hearing James Hoffa's motion for a new trial ordered the government Wednesday to submit to him all transcripts of electronic surveillance of the Teamsters Union.

U.S. District Judge Frank Wilson said he would inspect the transcripts to determine if they could have affected the outcome of the 1964 jury tampering trial of the Teamsters president.

Wilson also ordered the government to produce the name of the FBI agent who installed a "bugging device" in the car of James Hoffa, a government informer and key government witness in the Hoffa trial. He reserved judgment on a defense motion that Hoffa be called to testify at the hearing.

Former Justice Department attorney James F. Neal testified Tuesday there was nothing illegal about the department recording a conversation between Hoffa and Ewing King, a co-defendant of Hoffa.

The recording was made from a device installed in Hoffa's automobile by the FBI about two weeks before Hoffa and others were indicted on jury tampering charges in 1963.

Neal, now in private practice at Nashville, said the transcript of the recorded conversation was never presented to the federal grand jury which returned the indictments and never used in the subsequent trial.

# Pesticide Study Develops Concept Of Harm To Man

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—A symposium on the biological impact of pesticides has provided a forum for two rather startling findings: Pesticides have not proved conclusively that they can eliminate pests, but they are proving to have definite deleterious effects on fish, animals and man.

Dr. Alvin M. Revzin told the 450 people attending the Oregon State University symposium that sufficient pesticide residue now in our bodies may be able to seriously affect our brain functions under certain conditions.

Revzin, a researcher for the Federal Aviation Agency, said he has talked with pilots who claim they have suffered blurred vision and other problems which might be attributed to the chemicals.

He said laboratory testing has revealed that low-dosage pesticides affect the brains of animals.

He added, however, that research has not discovered what the harmful levels of pesticides are for humans.

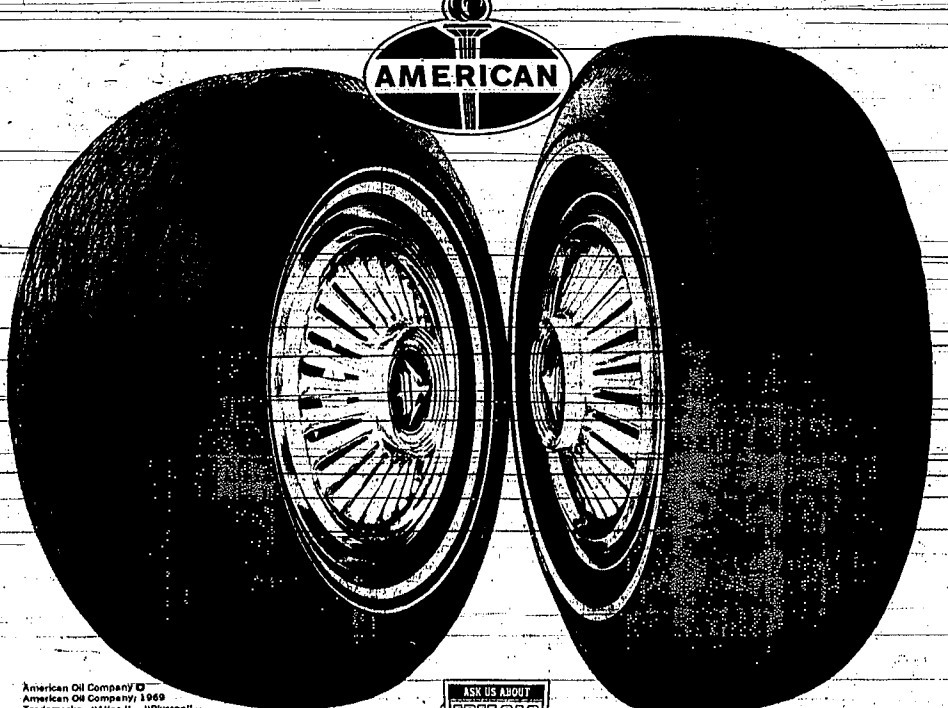

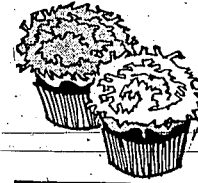
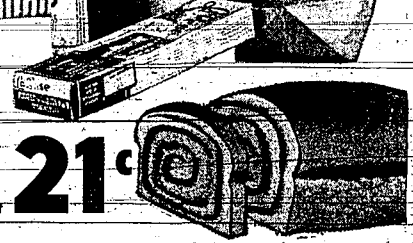
