## Plans Eyed To Ease Pressure At Five Points

Twin Falls city councilmen today unofficially expressed approval of one of two alternatives for some congestion where traffic on the highway must now enter Main Avenue during a special meeting Tuesday.

The council, which will make official recommendations to the State Highway Department during its Sept. 2 meeting, appeared to favor the alternative also recommended by the city highway commission. This plan calls for re-routing Blue Lakes Boulevard traffic at North Five Points down Shoshone Street, across Main Avenue to Second Avenue and out to Kimberly Road.

The other plan would dog-legged Blue Lakes traffic down Shoshone Street to Ninth Avenue and back onto Blue Lakes. Both plans have been designed to eliminate the "Five Points" at the intersection of Main Avenue and out to Kimberly Road.

The councilmen also appeared to favor another plan to eliminate West Five Points, but official recommendation on this proposal also must wait until the next council meeting.

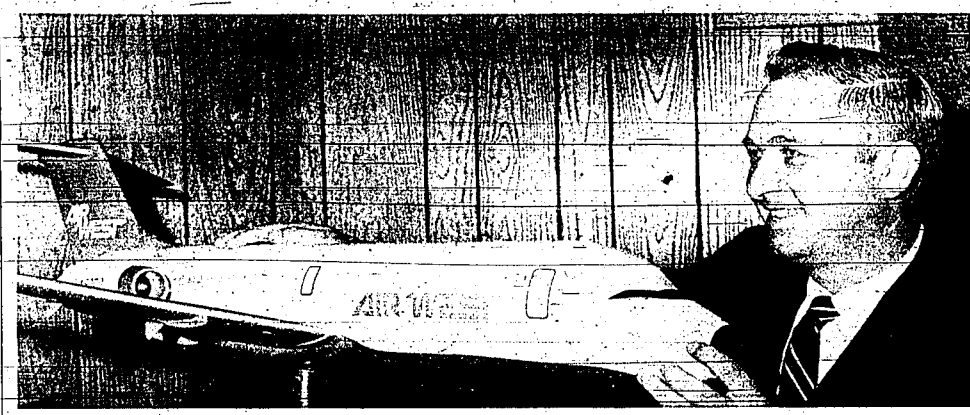
At the intersection, Main Avenue would again become a two-way street, with traffic able to enter Main Avenue at what is now the intersection of Main Avenue, but not, however, be able to leave through the five points, eliminating some congestion in that area.

Washington Street at the five points also would be returned to a public hearing in October. Councilmen pointed out that with increased traffic lanes at North Five Points under the alternative favored, an overhead crossing may be necessary because of the location of Washington Elementary School.

It also was pointed out by city engineer Jean Milar that if the Second Avenue all are made into one-way streets, some on-street parking must be eliminated.

The proposals will be discussed at a public hearing in October. Councilmen pointed out that with increased traffic lanes at North Five Points under the alternative favored, an overhead crossing may be necessary because of the location of Washington Elementary School.

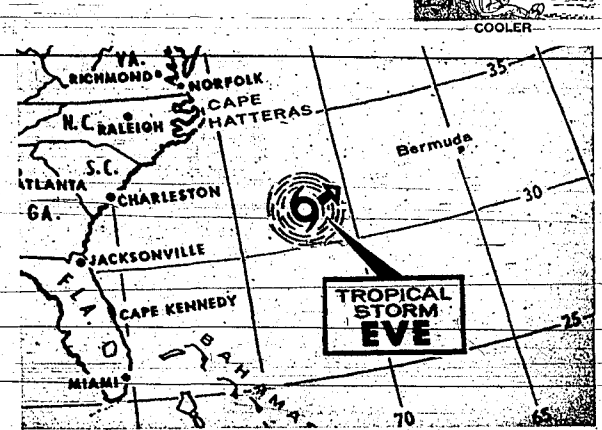

## School Bell Calls Twin Falls Students To Start Studying Beginning Sept. 8

All Twin Falls district No. 411 elementary (including first grade), junior and senior high school students will report to classes at 9 a.m. Sept. 8.

A general faculty meeting will be held in the O'Leary Junior High School auditorium at 8:30 a.m., Sept. 5.

Seniors in the high school will enroll on Friday, juniors on Sept. 2, and sophomores on Sept. 3. Registration hours will be 8:30-8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. High school offices will remain open East End Fair Day, Sept. 4, until noon.

All elementary and junior high school students who did not register during the spring registration may do so on Thursday between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The fee, including tax, for students in the elementary schools is \$5.80, for students in grades seven and eight \$11.25, and for those in grades 10, 11 and 12 \$23.80 plus \$1 for physical education classes.

There will be additional fees for those who take agriculture and shop. Senior high school fees will be paid at the time of enrollment. The day for payment of fees for the elementary and junior high schools will be announced later.

All senior high school students will meet in the gymnasium at 9 a.m., Sept. 8. Junior high and elementary school students will report to their home rooms. Home room lists will be posted on the bulletin boards near the principal's offices.

All first grade students must bring birth certificates showing they are 6 years of age, by Oct. 15. School will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. Sept. 8.

School lunch will be served on Monday in all schools except the senior high school and O'Leary Junior High School. Cost will be the same as last year.

Bus routes are expected to be run as they were when school closed in the spring.

# Eyesight Woes Threaten Astronaut

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Scientist Astronaut Dr. William E. Thornton is fighting to stay in Air Force jet pilot school, which he must complete to remain a pilot, it was learned Monday.

An Air Force review board met with Thornton and a civilian attorney representing the astronaut, Godfrey Isaac of Los Angeles, in San Antonio, Tex., Monday to decide whether Thornton is physically able to continue flight training because of an eye problem.

A Space Agency spokesman said if the Air Force refuses to let Thornton finish pilot school, he will be forced to drop out of the astronaut corps.

Thornton, one of the second group of scientist-astronauts named to the space program two years ago, is a medical doctor. Neither he nor any of the other 10 scientists in that group was a jet pilot at the time of their selection as astronauts.

The Space Agency said all 11 men would have to learn to fly the supersonic T38 jet the astronauts routinely use to travel around the country.

Two members of the group, Brian T. O'Leary and J. Anthony Lewellyn, dropped out of pilot training and the Astronaut Corps because of flying school difficulties. All others except Thornton have earned their jet pilot wings and are now in jungle survival training in Panama.

This spring Thornton, 40, was grounded from jet pilot training at Randolph Air Force Base in San Antonio for six weeks while he adjusted to special glasses designed to counteract an eye problem which reduced his depth perception.

The Air Force said Thornton has been having difficulty making landings because of the problem.

"Since he's gotten his glasses, he still has a problem telling how high above the runway he is," said 1st Lt. Richard Toubaker, an Air Force spokesman at Randolph.

Thornton, born in Goldsboro, N.C., has specialized in physics as well as medicine. He served as an Air Force flight surgeon in San Antonio, developing a device for weighing objects in the weightlessness of space, and then left the Air Force for private industry before joining the astronaut corps.

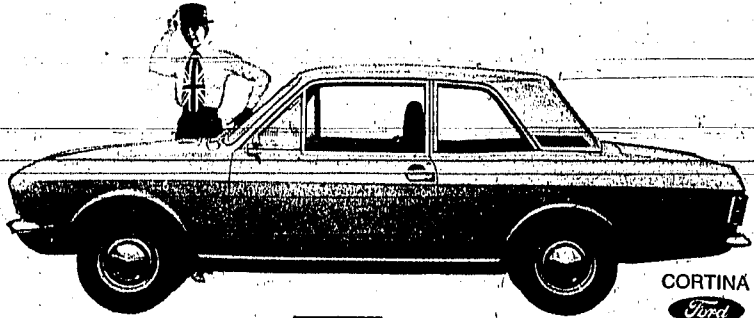

# Sen. Jordan Asks 'Rule Of Reason' In Mining Dispute

By RICHARD CHARNOCK

BOISE (UPI)—Sen. Len Jordan called Tuesday for a "rule of reason" in natural resource development that recognizes the commitment of the past and the needs of the future.

Declining to be identified in the White Clouds mining development controversy either with Gov. Don Samuelson or Sen. Frank Church, he put forth a "Jordan position" to the Idaho Press Club.

"You can't turn the calendar back... you can't penalize people who come in under the invitation of the geologic survey," he said, referring to the mining action of 1972.

But he told a headliner luncheon that "some definite restrictions can be put down" whereby the total resources of Idaho and other states are considered in development.

He said he will introduce the Church-Jordan bill to include the scenic White Clouds in the proposed Sawtooth recreation area and said he had a "mediating" American Smelting & Refining

Co. could live with its terms. American Smelting is located near the White Clouds and is embroiled in controversy over its proposal to put in a road to develop the mine.

Jordan said American Smelting has "shown a willingness" to restore the area to its natural state as much as possible after the proposed mining venture.

He also noted that under existing mining law it has the rights of ingress and egress—presumably by a road. He suggested the Forest Service look into possibilities of a tramway to the claims when he first heard of the idea but since then he is not at all sure this would "serve their purpose."

"I'm not at all sure that a road in those claims would be disastrous," Jordan added, noting that a road opened up a scenic portion of the Canadian Rockies to more tourists.

# Costs Of Homebuilding Continue Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A government agency reported Tuesday that the cost of borrowing money to finance the purchase of a home rose in July, as it has every month this year, and the supply of money available for mortgages shrank even further.

These two factors—mortgage money that is both scarce and expensive—have contributed to a slump in home building.

According to Tom B. Scott Jr., president of the United States Savings and Loan League, the slump is going to get worse before it gets better.

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board (FHLBB), the government agency which regulates savings and loan associations—the chief suppliers of mortgage money—reported that the average interest costs for both new and existing homes rose to 1969 highs last month.

For new homes, the cost, including initial fees and charges, reached 7.9 per cent. In June, they averaged 7.16 per cent and in July of 1968 they averaged 7.17 per cent.

For a mortgage for an existing home, the average interest rate rose from 7.39 per cent in June to 7.85 per cent in July. A year ago, the July rate was 7.23 per cent.

July is a traditional month for withdrawals to exceed deposits, but the July rate this year was three-quarters greater than the July rate of 1968. This year, savings and loan associations lost \$1.07 billion in funds on deposit compared to \$398 million in July, 1968.

This year's July losses amounted to eight-tenths of 1 per cent of all funds on deposit in the institutions.

Frederic Martin, chairman of the FHLBB, said the "very high competitive return" possible through investing in securities accentuated the increase in withdrawals from savings institutions.

# Major Reform In Taxation Advocated

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former Internal Revenue Commissioner Mortimer M. Caplin called Tuesday for tax reforms far broader than those passed by the House and awaiting Senate consideration.

He said all tax rates could be cut by about one-seventh if Congress eliminated "the preferential provisions which enable some people with very large real incomes to pay little or no tax and some industries to pay tax at far lower rates than others."

But his own proposal is short of what he said should be the "overall objective" of Congress to treat all forms of income alike in the nation's taxing policies.

Some of the reforms advocated by Caplin are contained in the House-passed bill on which the Senate Finance Committee will open hearings Sept. 4. But the bill only makes restrictive provisions which Caplin would eliminate.

For example, the House bill would make a stockholder keep his stock one year instead of only six months as the law now provides—in order to take advantage of the capital gains tax. The tax exempts half of the profit from stock sales from taxation and taxes the other half at no more than 25 per cent.

Caplin would eliminate the capital gains tax and treat profits from stock and property sales as ordinary income.

Caplin, who served as IRS commissioner from 1961 to July, 1964, outlined his proposals in an article in the September Reader's Digest.

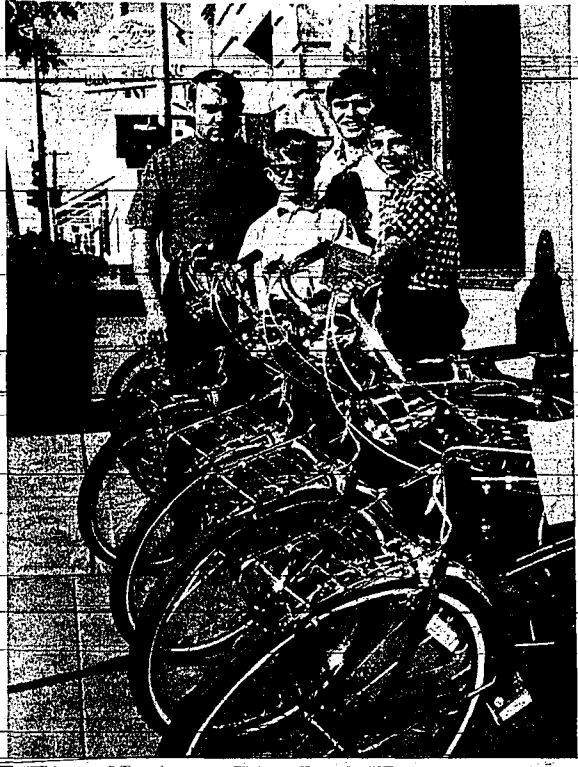

# Laird Assails 'Critics'

ATLANTA (UPI) — Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird said today some of his critics were urging "a very dangerous course" in the wake of his announced plan to trim \$2 billion from military spending.

"Even these cuts do not satisfy some critics who impatiently demand additional major reductions," Laird said in a prepared speech to the national convention of the American Legion. "These critics are urging a very dangerous course."

The defense secretary's economy plan, which he said he accepted reluctantly, in response to congressional pressure, would reduce by 10 percent over-all troop strength by more than 100,000 and eliminate 50,000 civilian jobs by next July 1.

"The effect of these cuts is to increase the risks to which the American people are exposed," Laird said. "Any further major cuts for the present fiscal year would involve even greater risks and further disruptions."

He continued: "Time and again in our past history our nation has paid a frightful price for allowing its armed forces to dwindle to levels that proved to be too low to discourage or counter aggression."

"Too little and too late" has been the epitaph of more than one great nation, Laird determined that it will not be ours.

# Foam-Filled Tires Prove Nail-Proof

NEW YORK (UPI) — Would you believe an "airless" tire, one not even a bullet can puncture?

Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. and Firestone scientists are in the advance testing stage with an "airless" foam-filled tire which may be ready for industrial and Army vehicle use within the next two years.

Both companies admit such a tire still isn't practical for the average car which travels at expressway speeds, because of overheating and weight problems. The foaming material, pre-mixed with special chemicals, is placed inside the tire casing. Then under heat treatment, the chemicals cause the material to expand into a dense, spongy substance, completely filling the casing.

The Army and the Air Force are studying the "bullet proof" tires for vehicles used in landing airplanes in combat zones. Companies using mining, heavy construction and agricultural vehicles, whose durability, not speed, is essential, also are interested. In one test, a car equipped with the foam-filled tire was driven 70 m. p. h. on a freeway with a one-inch chunk out of one tire. It stood up perfectly. It also has resisted spikes, glass and jagged rocks.

Dow Corning Corp. of Midland, Mich., which developed the foam, said other tire companies are interested. General Tire & Rubber Co. confirms that it has discussed the tire with Dow Corning. B. F. Goodrich says it is not interested. Uniroyal doesn't think the "airless" tire is feasible for passenger cars.

One reason is the cost factor. Goodyear estimates that such a tire would cost substantially more than the tire casing itself but believes it would prove economical where puncture problems are prevalent. Any place where the land is rough and speed not essential might provide a market for the "airless" tire on farms, oil exploration and mining sites, in areas of heavy construction and at land fill and dump sites.

Police officials also are interested. On patrol within city limits, speeds seldom exceed 40 m. p. h. — long enough to harm such a tire. Puncture-proof tires would have obvious value in riot situations.

It's apparent that "airless" tires for the average motorist still are in the "maybe" stage. But the fact that two large tire companies are spending thousands of research hours on it indicates they think it possible.

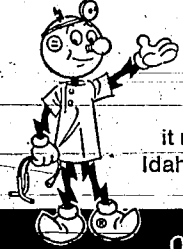

# Nixon Plans To Confer With Mexican Chief At Dam Rites

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)—President Nixon plans to confer with President Diaz Ordaz of Mexico Sept. 8 at the dedication of the new Amistad Dam across the Rio Grande near Del Rio, Tex., the Western White House announced Tuesday.

The announcement was made as Nixon prepared to devote most of Wednesday to entertaining one of his long-standing political foes—former President Lyndon B. Johnson—Johnson and his wife, Lady Bird, were coming to California for dedication of the "Lady Bird Johnson Grove" in the Redwood National Forest in Northern California near the town of Arcata.

The Nixon meeting with the Mexican president on the order between the two countries will come at the end of Nixon's long, late-summer stay at the Western White House. The President will stop at the dam enroute back to Washington.

In addition to dedicating the massive flood control and irrigation complex across the Rio Grande, 12 miles downstream from Del Rio, the two presidents also will have a brief period for private discussions of matters of interest to both countries.

Other developments Tuesday at the Western White House: The President met for more than two hours with his Environmental Quality Commission, discussing national problems of air and water pollution. The commission then toured the smog-plagued Los Angeles area by helicopter.

In a special statement for Labor Day, the Chief Executive assured American workers that his administration was making the battle against inflation "a matter of highest priority."

The President and his wife Pat followed by telephone the illness of their 23-year-old daughter Tricia. She was admitted to Walter Reed Army

Medical Center in Washington early Tuesday morning after complaining during the night of abdominal pains. The White House said preliminary diagnostic reports from the hospital gave no indications of a serious condition.

## Scientist Believes Sex Can Help Lure Rats Into Traps

By ARTHUR FREDERICK AMHERST, Mass. (UPI)—If love is really in the air, as some people say it is, a University of Massachusetts biochemist hopes to use it to kill rats.

Dr. Anthony Gawienowski has been working under a U.S. Army grant since December to find a way of curbing the rat population. The Army is interested because rats cause trouble in the field by raiding supply areas and doing other mischief.

The scientist is working with pheromones, an airborne chemical that acts as a sexual attractant. If the substance that turns on the rats—sex-baited, it can be used to lure love-struck rodents to poison.

The laboratory rats are placed in a glass cage from which air is drawn. The chemicals in the air are analyzed and isolated, and when the attractants are found, it is hoped they can be produced synthetically.

# Heavy Rain Pelts Plains; Heat Remains

 Heavy rain fell on the Southern Plains for the third successive day today and the heat wave continued in the eastern half of the nation.  
 Winds of tropical storm Eve lessened to 50 miles an hour, but the storm, centered 300 miles southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C., was expected to gain strength in the next 24 hours. However, it was headed north-east away from the U.S. mainland.  
 Abilene, Tex., collected 1.32 inches of rain during a thunderstorm late Tuesday night. Earlier, Coullia, Tex., had an inch of rain.  
 A waterspout and two funnel clouds were seen south of Sabine Pass on the Texas Gulf Coast. A waterspout was seen Tuesday afternoon near Key West, Fla.  
 Homestead, Fla., had 1.37 inches of rain late Tuesday. New York's Kennedy Airport got 1.39 inches and half-inch fell in New York City.  
 New England was an exception to the hot weather pattern and temperatures dipped into the 30s there early today.  
 A major low ended today along the Mississippi Gulf Coast, ravaged by Hurricane Camille, the worst storm ever to hit the U.S. mainland. Camille claimed at least 138 lives along the Gulf Coast and 83 more in Virginia with more than 100 persons still missing.

**Rep. Ford Notes Disagreement On Economic Status**  
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republican leader Gerald R. Ford disagreed Tuesday with a White House forecast that there would be "little excess" in the economy.  
 The Michigan congressman said at the end of the war coupled with normal growth of the economy would make available additional funds for current and new domestic programs and also might make possible tax reductions and a start on revenue sharing with the states.  
 Ford acknowledged that this put him at odds with White House economic experts whose report was outlined in Sen. Clemente's bill introduced by Daniel Patrick Moynihan, assistant to the President... for Urban Affairs. Moynihan said the experts concluded that the Johnson administration's forecast of a substantial peace dividend with the end of the war "was simply not realistic."

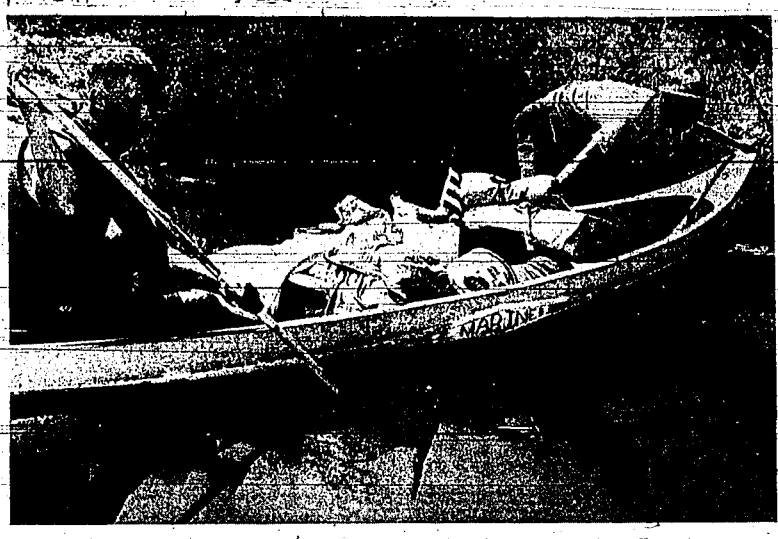

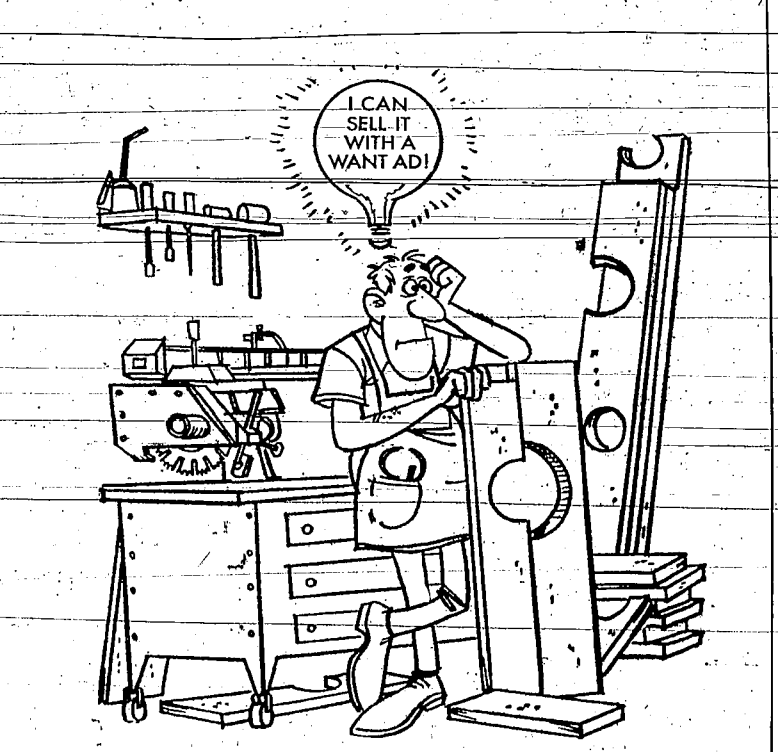

**Air Fare Increases Discussed**

**SPOKANE, Wash. (UPI)**—National Aviation Association directors from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana met Tuesday at the Spokane International Airport to discuss requests by airlines for an increase in air fare.

Washington State Director Ron Pretti, who serves as the northwest region vice president for NAA, said the four men decided to support the requests to raise the airfare price.

The airlines have been asking for the increase in the cost of airline tickets in view of the rising costs in the nation and the airlines' profit picture.

Pretti said, however, that the four directors have urged that the Civil Aeronautics Board, which supports the air-fare increases, do not take any action on the requests by the airlines until Congress has acted upon pending legislation.

The legislation calls for a 3 per cent increase in the excise tax on air fare. The current excise tax of 5 per cent would be raised to 8 per cent.

Pretti also said that the legislation calls for the establishment of a 5-per-cent federal fuel tax on air freight weight bills and a "very high" 9-cent fuel tax on military fuel tax. He said the fuel tax would be placed on general aviation, excluding scheduled airline flights and military flights.

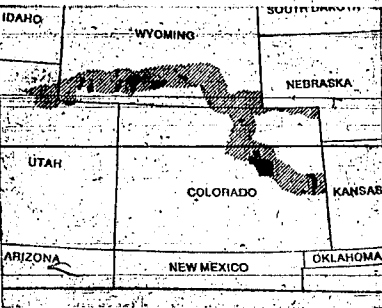

**Plan Aired To Stabilize Italy's Toppling Tower**

**NEWCASTLE, Wyo. (UPI)**—One man suggested tying balloons to the top, another suggested hooking cables to a locomotive and letting it run full speed to a place. Now a New Castle, Wyo., man is suggesting pouring 4,500 yards of concrete by helicopter.

These are only a few of the suggestions made to save Italy's leaning tower of Pisa, but Newcastle contractor L.W. Carlson feels his plan has every chance of success.

Carlson is planning to fly to Italy Aug. 30 to present his plan to government officials. The plan is just recently approved and provides the funds for stabilization of the tower.

"When I first learned of the tower problem, I became quite concerned with the shift of a ton of marble weighing 45,000 tons," Carlson said. "My engineers and I have been working on a solution since 1927."

Carlson's plan calls for putting pilons down to bedrock and pouring a high concrete slab to act as a semi-floating footing. He has used a scale model in his planning and calculations. Helicopters would have to be used to move motorized equipment, as it is not allowed to operate near the tower, Carlson said.

"It would take at least six months to get the special machinery we would need," Carlson said. "And from the time we began work at the site, it would be a minimum of one year before we could begin pouring concrete."

"It would be a multi-million dollar job," Carlson said. He said his plan would not distract from the scenic interest of the tower. "When I am through there will be no evidence of any work or correction," he said.

He said he intends to spend ten days to two weeks on his initial, and maybe only, trip to Italy.

"I'm not sure the Italian government is even interested in a plan of this type," Carlson said. "But even if it is not, I hope they do something soon—because in a couple of years it will be too late."

**26 Marines Charged In Racial Brawl**

**CAMP LEJUNE, N.C. (UPI)**—Camp Lejeune authorities Tuesday charged 26 Marines and one sailor with rioting as the result of a July 20 racial brawl in which a white Marine corporal was killed.

Five Negro and Puerto Rican enlisted men already face murder charges in the disturbance, which has come under congressional investigation. All but one of the suspects charged Tuesday were Negroes. The other, Marine PFC Michael R. Wong, 20, of Washington, D.C., is a Chinese American, Marine officials said.

The sailor charged was Hospitalman Donald J. Essex, 20, of Hot Springs, Va. Marine authorities said eight other Marines are still being held for questioning in the case.

Those charged Tuesday were brought back from duty in the Mediterranean on Aug. 10 for questioning. They were members of the 1st Battalion, 6th Regiment which shipped out of Camp Lejeune shortly after the brawl.

Cpl. Edward Bankston, 20, of Picayune, Miss., died of a fracture skull eight days after the fight. Authorities said approximately 30 Negroes and Puerto Ricans ganged up on 14 whites. The riot apparently was precipitated by an incident in the service club—scene of a farewell party for the 6th Regiment when a Negro Marine tried to break in on a white man dancing with a Negro woman.

Marine spokesmen said Tuesday the investigation in the case is almost complete. The defendants face courts martial on the rioting charge. Some of the defendants were confined to the base brig; others were confined to the base. Marine officials said past records of fighters who went to the brig.

Rep. William Randall, D-Mo., headed a special congressional panel that investigated the incident and called for further probes.

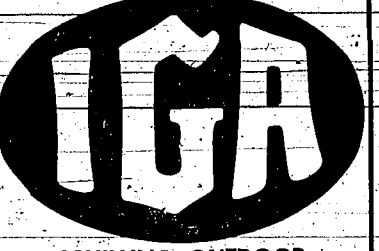

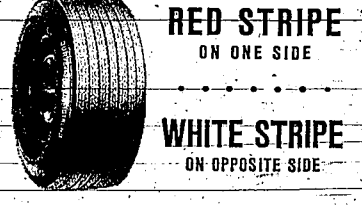

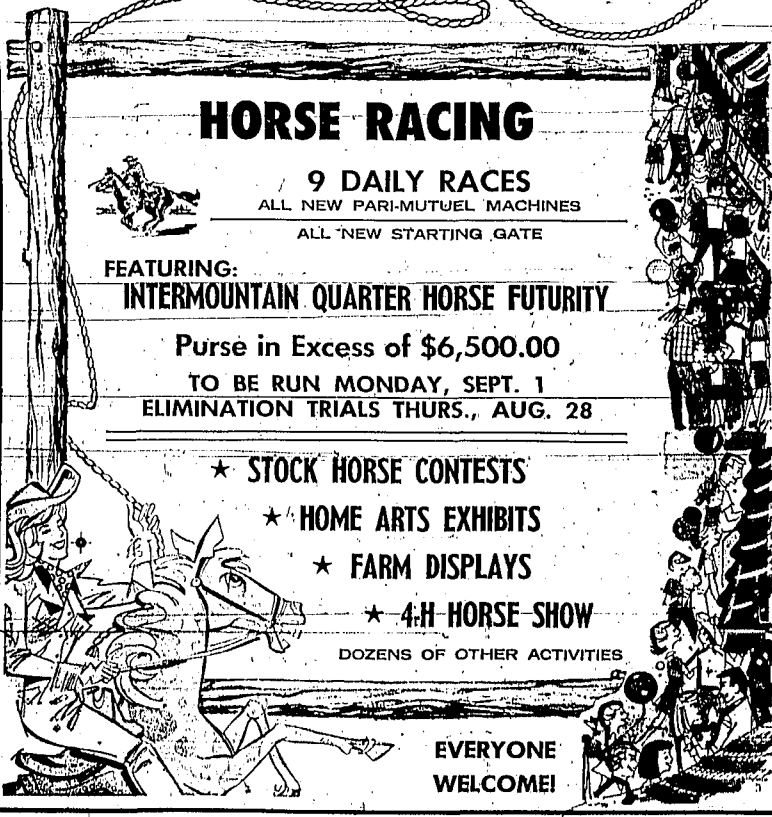

# \$22.9 Billion 'Windfall' Evaporates

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)—The Nixon administration has discovered that a \$22.9 billion windfall expected to be available for federal domestic programs when the Vietnam War ends has evaporated.  
Dr. Daniel P. Moynihan, President Nixon's assistant for urban affairs, said an economic forecast released last January is "not realistic" and "studies show the money 'just won't be there.'"  
Moynihan apparently referred to a report prepared by former

President Lyndon B. Johnson's administration, but issued by the Nixon administration in early January.  
The \$22.9 billion figure was given as a "peace dividend" on Jan. 23, 1969, by the Cabinet Coordinating Committee on Economic Planning for the end of Vietnam hostilities.  
Nixon met Monday with the Urban Affairs Council where he received the bad news: After an unusually lengthy meeting of the council, Moynihan told newsmen at the western White House:  
"The so-called 'peace' and

growth dividends that have been anticipated and forecast in the economic report of the President that was issued in January of this year simply were not realistic."  
"There is not likely to be anything like the free resources that we have all hoped for," Moynihan said. "It is simply not there in the system. We are not going to have an easy time of making national priorities in the 1970s."  
Moynihan, reporting on the council meeting, painted a stark picture of the national economy in the next few years. "It was sort of hard news to

take, but the growth, and this is the growth of Medicare, revenue sharing and so forth—this money is not going to purposes you would not want to see it go to, but it is committed, and if the growth continues, it will be used up."  
Moynihan's remarks to the newsman at the western White House were based on a long-standing study conducted by the Council of Economic Advisers and the Office of Economic Opportunity, plus expert economic advisers from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the Labor Department.

## Scribe Combines 'National Priorities'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Ever since the Apollo-11 moon landing, there has been a great deal of hailing and calling thumping over setting national priorities for the coming decade.  
"Variations on the theme abound, but in general the priority-setters are divided into three categories:  
(1) those who want to follow Vice President Agnew on 10 years and along the expenses; (2) those who favor an all-out war on poverty, and hang the expense, and (3) those who feel first consideration should be given to solving environmental problems, and hang the expense.  
Branching out from them is a subspecies of optimists who

insist America's resources are sufficient to pursue all three of these goals simultaneously with equal vigor—that is, to explore the heavens while creating a sort of heaven on earth. To my knowledge, however, no one has yet proposed combining the three goals. So, I shall do so now.  
I got the idea for this approach from recent congressional hearings on business "conglomerates" that have been formed in the past few years.  
The beauty of a three-priority merger is that it avoids a bitter struggle for funds among the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) and the various agencies

concerned with environmental pollution.  
What we do instead is lump them all together in a new agency to be called the National Antipoverty Space and Antipollution Administration (NAPSAPA).  
At first glance, this might seem a rather incongruous arrangement. Upon closer examination, however, you will see that the pieces fit quite nicely.  
One of the main environmental problems, for example, is the disposal of garbage and other waste materials that are presently befouling our air, water and landscape. That lies right in with the space program.  
NAPSAPA's prime missions would be to try to find some place in space to dump the junk

we are discarding on earth. If trash removal, rather than the satisfaction of scientific curiosity, were the chief aim of our space flights, you can bet a lot of the grumbling about the expense would cease.  
Nor should we overlook the economic opportunities that would be created by the merger. The poor could benefit greatly from the joint space-anti-pollution program.  
It would, for instance, put garbage collectors who are now in the low income bracket, on the same pay level with space technicians.  
With a branch of the Manned Space Center in every ghetto, poverty would disappear overnight.

Saltonstall was challenged in the GOP balloting by state Rep. Francis W. Hatch, 44. On the Democratic side, state Rep. Michael J. Harrington, 32, was considered the favorite in a three-way contest with Essex County Commissioner Daniel J. Burke, 30 and Lynn Mayor Irving E. Kane, 39.  
The winner in each party will oppose each other in a special election Sept. 30.

### FTC Charges Automakers With Fraud

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Trade Commission said today an investigation by its staff showed that some automotive manufacturers had falsified the model year of certain trucks and other motor vehicles and trailers.  
The investigation, described as limited, primarily concerned vehicles whose body styles normally change little over the years. It covered five domestic and two subsidiaries of foreign manufacturers of motor vehicles. None was identified.  
The commission said "in some instances a vehicle was sold as new even though it had been manufactured two or more years prior to its sale."  
The investigation turned up no evidence that any passenger cars made in this country had the year of manufacture falsified, the commission reported.

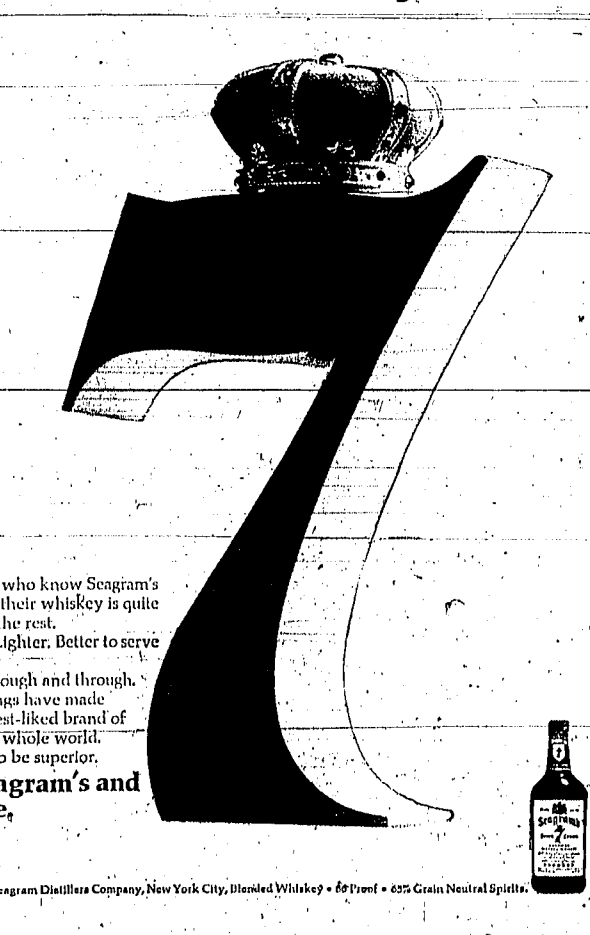

But the "Y" and its affiliate, Center for International Management Studies (CIMS), also conduct international management seminars that attract top level business and government personnel.

CIMS is scheduled to stage such a conference at Bucharest, Romania, Sept. 3-13. In recent years it has sponsored international managerial conferences in India, Turkey, Brazil, Peru, Ecuador, Guatemala, Colombia, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Canada—that includes two countries in the Commun-

ist bloc.

In addition to the federal government, representatives of such American business enterprises and American Telephone, Arthur D. Little, Inc., and Dun & Bradstreet Inc., will go to Bucharest, in view of Russia's sensitivity over satellite unrest it should be an interesting session.

CIMS will hold smaller seminars in Athens in October and in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in November.

Topics at Bucharest will include input-output economics, econometric model construction and forecasting international re-

lationships between private enterprise and socialist economic and social systems.

George H. Blackett, President of the Institute for Interindustry Data, Inc., will head the U.S. delegation.

The seminar is part of the Communist country's central planning committee.

Although CIMS was formed only 10 years ago, it is an outgrowth of similar activities group. The Romanian team will of the Institute for Interindustry Data, Inc., will head the U.S. delegation.

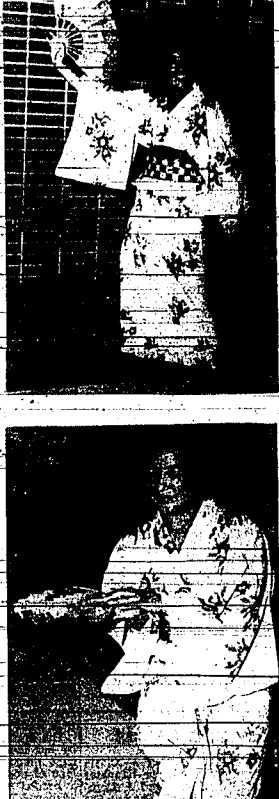

## Chevrolet To Offer 'Minicar' Gets Degree

DETROIT (UPI)—Chevrolet's new minicar, due to be introduced in mid-1970, will be powered by an aluminum overhead cam shaft four-cylinder engine, and will be available in a variety of models, the company's top official said.

John Z. DeLoorean, General Motors vice president and general manager of Chevrolet Division, said present plans are to start production of the mini-car, now labeled the XP 887, in June, which could mean a July date for sale in dealer showrooms. However, he emphasized that the exact introduction date is still flexible.
