City Gets Tax Levy OK

Approval of a petition from the City of Twin Falls for relief from the new legislative tax levy restrictions has been granted by the Idaho State Tax Commission.

Findings of the commission on the city's petition were received in the Wednesday morning mail, showing the commission has approved the Twin Falls request to levy beyond the 104 per cent of the 1968 income allowed by new tax legislation.

In their findings, the tax commission granted an additional 3.84 per cent, which will bring in the exact amount budgeted by the city of Twin Falls for 1969.

The city had hoped to raise \$346,019 through tax revenue, including an estimated \$48,589 in phase-out funds made up by the sales tax revenue. Excluding this, the tax commission granted the city and valorem tax revenue of \$768,827.

Figuring 107.84 per cent of the revenue budget in by the 1968 levy, the city will receive this amount plus phase out funds now non budgeted amount approved in public hearings, and with the tax commission's ruling can now be certified to the county by the September deadline. City Manager Herb Derrick said.

City Clerk Constance Jester said the tax commission's ruling stated that because of recent industrial development and growth of the city it was needed to meet demands on city government.

With the anticipated growth from Kellwood Manufacturing and Longview Fibre Co. here and the growing College of Southern Idaho, the tax commission agreed the city will need increased income to provide additional streets, water street equipment, another fire truck and additional city personnel.

Former Bishop James Pike Disappears In Judean Desert; Searchers Find Car

JERUSALEM (UPI)—Searchers have found the automobile abandoned by James A. Pike, former episcopal bishop of California, who vanished Tuesday in the Judean desert, police said today. There was no trace of Pike.

A map belonging to the controversial 60-year-old churchman was "discovered" near the car in which he and his third wife, Diane, 31, were riding on a drive from Bethlehem to the Dead Sea in Israeli-occupied Jordan.

Arab tribesmen joined hundreds of Israeli troops and police in the search for Pike. Helicopters whirled over the area, homebombed with caves and dried stream beds which make detection from the air very difficult.

Police said the car broke down and the couple began walking until Pike became exhausted and collapsed. Mrs. Pike continued on alone until she reached Bethlehem. The search for her husband was started immediately.

Mrs. Pike was brought to Jerusalem later and was reported under sedation today in a hotel.

A U.S. spokesman in Jerusalem said there was hope Pike might be "found alive" and speculated the churchman could have crawled into one of the caves to find shelter from the sun.

"The couple was spending a month in Israel to study origins of Christianity."

Local residents said it was unlikely Pike could survive in the desert more than 24 hours without water. They said the area is homebombed with caves and that if Pike had crawled into one of them to escape the sun it might be days before searchers found him.

Temperatures in the area were reported around 105 degrees.

He resigned as Episcopal bishop of California in September, 1960, and joined the staff of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions in Salt Lake City, Utah, where he resided. He left that post earlier this summer.

Policeman, Woman Die In New Outbreak Of Violence

A young policeman and a woman were shot and killed Tuesday night during violence in Camden, N.J. Spontaneous disorders broke out for the third consecutive night in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., despite the presence of National Guardsmen, and state troopers helped quell outbreaks in Hartford, Conn.

Camden authorities said a second policeman was shot and wounded as a sporadic gunfire was reported on four streets in the city and one in South Camden. Rocks and bottles were hurled at police cars and small fires were set.

Falling rioters were scattering a snipe but refused to connect the search with the death of Patrolman Ronald J. Chandler, 27, during the disturbance. The identity of the dead woman was not immediately revealed.

An contingent of some 100 Connecticut state troopers helped Hartford officials enforce a 7 p.m. curfew and two battalions of National Guardsmen were on standby alert. Sporadic fires flared in the North End section as late as 8 p.m. Tuesday, the second day of violence.

At least six policemen and 14 civilians were injured and another 10 persons were reported injured during the two days. Over 200 arrests were made. B. Kinslow, a 70-year-old woman, was shot and killed, and a branch library and scores of businesses were burned.

In Fort Lauderdale, Fla., police arrested six persons Tuesday after a series of rock-throwing incidents in a predominantly Negro neighborhood. Troops were called to duty and another 100 were on standby alert in Fort Lauderdale as violence flared there for the third consecutive night.

Police officials said one sniping incident and two firebombings had been reported by 11 p.m. and 10 persons had been arrested, seven for violation of a curfew imposed Monday.

Parkburg, Pa., also was under a curfew Tuesday night in the wake of scattered violence touched off by the shooting death of a Negro civil rights leader. Five members of the Pagans motorcycle gang have been charged with murder in the death.

At the same time, six waves of 152 bombers unloaded 640 tons of bombs on possible guerrilla escape routes in the Binh Tri Province, southeast of the city.

The heavy fighting was interrupted Sunday. The raids began late Tuesday and continued into this afternoon.

Pay Raises For City Councilmen Proposed

Should a city councilman in Twin Falls get more money for his efforts?

If so, should the mayor get more than his fellow councilmen?

These questions were tossed around about half an hour Tuesday night at the Twin Falls City Council meeting and in the end there was only one decision.

The city attorney is to draw up an ordinance granting city councilmen a pay raise. The increase is to be left blank and the matter will be discussed in depth at another council session this afternoon at 4:40 p.m. in city hall.

Councilmen will also discuss an ordinance providing for a tax levy for the fiscal year ending this coming December 31.

Councilman John Angerboeck brought up the issue for discussion in the Tuesday meeting.

He said he feels a mayor should get \$300 a month and each councilman should get \$150 a month.

Presently, Mayor Robert W. Karl, gets \$100 a month and the remaining six councilmen get \$75 a month.

"We don't see the figures mentioned are too high, but I feel a pay raise is in order," he said.

Councilman Frank Clark said he feels the mayor should get \$300 a month and the councilmen should be left at their present salary level.

Councilman George Bennett said raise the mayor \$250 and leave the councilmen's salaries where they are.

Mr. Angerboeck, Mr. Karl and Councilman Robert W. Karl have announced they will not run for reelection this fall.

Councilman Eugene Stacey said he feels a mayor should not get too much more than a councilman receives.

In the end, Mr. Angerboeck said he will bring the matter up at his meeting Wednesday.

The city attorney will prepare the ordinance and bring it to the meeting today. The council said it would probably approve a pay increase for its members, but the amount for mayor and each councilman is still in doubt, it was reported.

In other business, the council approved a resolution for the reconstruction of Five Points North in the Idaho Highway system.

This annual northbound traffic, coming into Twin Falls at Five Points East, would travel down Second Avenue East to Shoshone, then turn north to Five Points North.

The council's action is only an approval of the state plan. The state will hold public hearings on the plan in October and if the public approves the plan, construction may begin next year, it was reported.

The council voted to join the Twin Falls Regional Planning Agency.

Nov. 4 was approved as the date for the municipal election of three councilmen. Registration for the election is Oct. 14.

Think Sahara's Dry? Try Twin Falls

So you think the Sahara Desert is dry?

So far during 1969, Magic Valley has had less precipitation than the northern reaches of the Sahara, the heart of the Sahara Desert.

And, according to predictions by the weatherman, it may be sometime before Magic Valley receives any moisture.

Since Jan. 1, 1969, Magic Valley has had 2.57 inches of measurable precipitation. The average annual rainfall in the Sahara is four inches.

About the moisture, 1.30 inches fell in Magic Valley prior to May when weather became unusually hot and dry.

Officials at the weather bureau at Kimberly said no comparisons are available, but it is believed this summer is a record dry one at least in the west.

At the Castelford measuring station, 48 inches was recorded in July when the area experienced a cloudburst and flash-flood. Weather Bureau spokesmen said the amount of rainfall at the Balanced-Rock area at that time was undoubtedly more, but was not measured.

June was the high rainfall summer month in Magic Valley when it was reported at Kimberly. In May there was 24.6 of an inch measured at Kimberly, while only traces were reported during July and August.

Weathermen said August has been the extreme dry month of the summer. The Fairfield and Troy areas usually experience some rain during August, received no precipitation at all.

While 1969 has been a record dry year, the total year of 1968 was an exceptionally wet year with 47.11 inches recorded, compared to a normal of 47.4.

No exact comparisons on the amount of water used in Twin Falls during 1968 and 1969 are available because all water sources were not metered during 1968.

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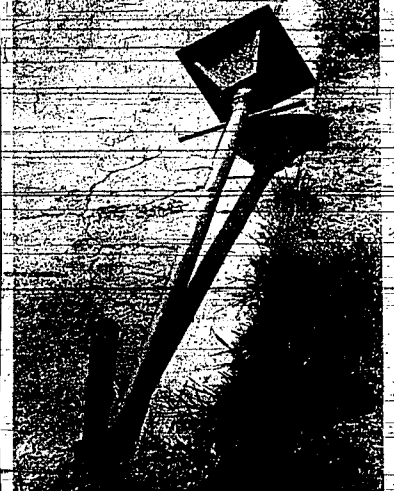

Bears Maul Five People In Yukon Territory Incidents

The also denied he had even discussed with Paul the possibility of \$5,000 being hidden in the Navarro home. The prosecution contends the brothers beat the actor to make him disclose the hiding place of the money they thought was hidden there.

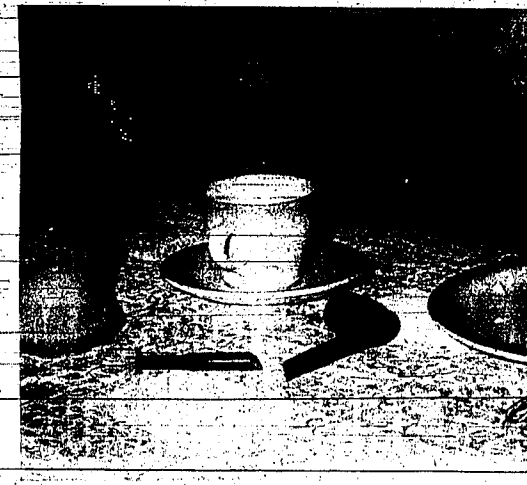

War Foes Ask Aid Of Church

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI)—Two AWOL servicemen, flown secretly from a Honolulu sanctuary for antiwar GI's, have a special general convention of the Episcopal Church for its support.

Louis Parry, 21, AWOL from the Air Force, and Louis Jones, 23, an AWOL Marine corporal, said they came to the convention to dramatize their stands to save the church's position, and to provide support for other servicemen opposed to the war in Vietnam.

Parry, a Mountain View, Calif., and Jones of Charleston, S. C., are members of a group of 19 AWOL servicemen who have taken sanctuary in Honolulu's Church of the Crossroads and the Unitarian Church of Honolulu.

"I have come to the point where I can no longer take part in this inhumane and unjust war. Nor can I belong to any group or organization that does," Jones told the delegates. The two religious were escorted into the convention by about 30 young people and Episcopal priests.

Parry, who was the first Serviceman to enter the Hawaiian sanctuary, said he was "reluctantly" willing to go to jail.

At the conclusion of their remarks, the two men asked members of the convention for food and support. About 550 of the 1,100 delegates stepped to the front of the auditorium on the University of Notre Dame campus.

Tribunal Will Hear Debate On Vote Law

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's Supreme Court will hear oral arguments Sept. 11 on whether the state law requiring two-thirds voter approval for passage of bond issues is constitutional.

One of 15 cases scheduled for hearing by the high court at Pocatello, the case was brought by E. O. Borer and John Rogers against Pocatello's city clerk and commissioners.

Borer and Rogers challenged results of an Oct. 29, 1968 bond election in which two issues were certified as lost because they failed to receive two-thirds approval of the voters.

They petitioned for a writ of mandamus to force the commissioners to certify passage of the bond issues on grounds the two-thirds majority requirement violates the 14th amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Sixth District Judge Gus Carr Anderson held the requirement to be unconstitutional and the commissioners appealed to the Supreme Court. The commissioners contend the District Court was without jurisdiction in this matter—claiming a mandamus action cannot be used to determine constitutionality of a law.

Icebreaking Tanker Hits Solid Ice

NEW YORK (UPI)—The huge icebreaking tanker Manhattan nosed into the three-foot ice pack in Canada's Baffin Bay Tuesday on its historic voyage to the Arctic coast slopes of northern Alaska.

It was the 1,002-foot-long American flag ship's first contact with solid ice since the last Delaware Bay Aug. 24 on a three-month round-trip voyage to Alaska via the Northwest Passage. The approach to the pack was along a course strewn with towering icebergs, some as big as a house.

Vulture Vexes British Folks

TAUNTON, England (UPI)—A vulture has been perched on a tree since Sunday and no one knows where it came from. "No one knows how to get it down," the vulture keeper said. "I don't know if it will die or if it will move it from its post."

Order Holds Up State In Turner Case

BOISE (UPI)—Fourth district Court Judge E. B. Smith has continued a temporary restraining order against the state in the case of Oliver B. Turner against the State Tax Commission.

A hearing will be held Sept. 10 on the restraining order. Turner, former chief highway auditor, is accused in connection with \$16,000 missing from state highway funds. He has been held in the Ada County Jail since last April. The state has attempted to seize all of Turner's holdings and has tried to dispose of them.

Turner is represented by Atty. Alan Jones and Maxine Kibbel, former Ada County prosecutor, who is representing Turner's wife Betty, and the defendant's attorney, Pat Lords.

A trial date will be set for Turner on the 19 counts, he is charged with in connection with the missing money sometime next week.

Ex-Convicts Fight 'Wall Of Silence' To Give Ghetto Negroes Chance At Life

SEATTLE, Wash. (NEA)—The district, dismal and dilapidated, is known as the Central Area. It's four miles square and some 50,000 blacks live there.

The summit of their hill overlooks Skid Road. At the turn of the century, loggers sloshed through mud to skid logs of now-fallen timber to the waiting mill below.

"It's still a fast trip downhill, as the Central Area's record of crime and violence testifies. The population includes at least 400 ex-convicts, still on parole. An untold number of others in the area have records but have "done their time."

In this atmosphere, five convicted felons, all black and three still on parole, are engaged as state parole officers in a project called "New Careers." They divide their time between classroom work and job training in a pilot program of the U.S. Department of Labor that could be applied nationally if their efforts meet with success.

"Bill Wiegke, immediate supervisor of the five, says: "They're good. They can get through walls of silence that others can't." Each of the five has been assigned 15 to 20 parole cases and they maintain close touch with them in personal interviews to review their progress. They also do pre-parole and job placement investigations.

"Expected to attend the conference are governors Stan Hathaway, Wyo.; John A. Love, Colo.; Calvin L. Rammpton, Utah; Don Samuelson, Idaho; and Dan P. Cargo, New Mexico.

Nation's Governors Ask Costly Federal Spending

 COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI)—The nation's governors, putting aside warnings of tight money from both President Nixon and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, say their approval Tuesday to a series of costly federal spending programs.

Among the 50 governors approved at the annual National Governors' Conference was one asking the federal government to take over the full cost of welfare payments.

Agnew, speaking at a news conference, said he personally endorsed the proposal as "a final objective" but said the money was not now available to pay for it. He refused to give the administration's blessing to Agnew's reinforced Nixon's warning of Monday night that there would be billions of dollars to spend to solve state financial problems, even after the Vietnam war ended and spending for the fighting stopped.

The governors brushed aside those warnings Tuesday in approving in quick order a series of bills and amendments to programs sponsored by Gov. Rockefeller of New York.

The 11st was the demand for the federal government to pay for the full cost of caring for the "needy," even

those now on local relief rolls, and a system of compulsory national health insurance.

The vice president did not support the idea of a national health insurance system, which was first proposed by former President Harry S. Truman.

"It doesn't excite me to have the drums for it," Agnew said. He disagreed with estimates by Rockefeller that the growth of the economy would provide the federal government with more than enough money to finance growing needs of the states.

"No man," Agnew said, "could see that far in advance. It's certainly understandable that the government would come up with those kind of figures. He's got formidable problems in his state. But we do have some state funds to help some of this money."

In addition to the federalization of welfare and national health insurance, the governors voted to:

- Pour a lot more federal money into the states for education.
- Have the federal government finance out completely the financing of early Medicaid in some states.
- Run them into bankruptcy.
- Un, the Social Security benefits to the old, the blind and the disabled to a minimum of \$100 a month.

No price tags were set on the proposals. However, Rockefeller told the governors:

"If you have an order of priorities, the nation can meet its enormous human problems without added burdens on the taxpayers."

Rockefeller insisted the money for the new programs and much more could come from the growth of federal taxes.

He said Nixon's administration's present plans were for the states to share in about \$12 billion of that amount and labeled them "completely inadequate for the problems we face."

The New York governor said a reasonable amount for Washington to share with the states would be \$4.8 billion by 1976.

Rockefeller's forecasts of the amount of money that would be available to the states on that ground made the President sound like a dollar-store nickel.

Nixon, in a speech to the conference Monday night, said the governors were dreaming. If they figured there would be billions around after the war in Vietnam, they should be some money but that the claims against it were enormous.

Non-Voting Citizens Are Asked To Help Campaigners

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—Unless he maintains a legal residence elsewhere, there is no way that a non-voting citizen of the District of Columbia can vote in a congressional election.

Yet fund-raising dinners for members of Congress are a buzz held in this voiceless enclave. And some of them even maintain campaign committees here.

In recent days insinuations have been published that having a D.C. campaign committee is the next best thing to having a numbered States bank account.

It was pointed out that because the committees are not required to make public reports, they can be used to hide contributions that might be embarrassing to a senator or representative back home.

It was not exactly flattering when I saw these insinuations in print. (I am pretty easily flattered—but it takes a lot to get me excited.) I was, however, mildly dismayed.

I could not believe that a member of Congress would be so unscrupulous. I am sure that if any congressman received a campaign contribution that might embarrass him back home, he would immediately return it to the donor.

"There must be some other reason for having congressional campaign committees in the District of Columbia," I said to myself.

So I approached a lawyer I know and begged him for an explanation. He can be used to his name, put my trusted head and calmly reassured me.

"Some of us have campaign committees here because we feel sorry for the people who live here," he said. "But just because they can't vote for a congressman is no

reason to deprive them of the privilege of making campaign contributions. I'm not getting better in particular democracy," he said. "If a man wants to make a campaign contribution, he should be allowed to do so."

"By setting up committees in the district, we give the people here a feeling that they are participating in the campaign. If they can't vote, what can they do?"

"They can make contributions right in their own home town without having to send money to Ohio, New Mexico or some such place. It enhances their sense of belonging."

"Operating a D.C. congressional campaign committee is a lot of trouble, of course, but I think it's worth it. We can do that for those poor voteless citizens."
