Kidnaped Envoy Freed

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI) — Brazilian authorities knew all along where terrorist kidnapers were holding U.S. Ambassador Burke Elbrick but made no move to rescue the envoy for fear he would be killed, police officials said today. Shortly after Elbrick was freed unhurt from three days' captivity, intelligence agents Sunday raised the deserted mansion where they said terrorists had kept the ambassador hostage. The office said Elbrick's captors had fled, leaving behind Communist propaganda, weapons and ammunition. Elbrick was released Sunday by the man who had held him for 78 hours to obtain freedom for 15 political prisoners of the Brazilian military regime.

The 61-year-old career diplomat cut short by a blow on the forehead but otherwise in good condition, arrived in a white taxi at his official residence Sunday. Four hours earlier, a Brazilian air force C-130 transport had arrived in Mexico City with the captives, who were granted asylum there. "To coin the understatement of the year, I'm glad to be here," he said. "I have no intention of harming me at any time."

Gunfire Kills Man In Belfast Protestant District Sunday

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Gunfire from a speeding car killed a man in a Protestant district of Belfast today, sending a new shock wave of fear and anger through the city. Police and British army troops rushed in to try to avert new violence. Protestant underground radio broadsheets identified the victim as Protestant Jack Todd, 23, and urged Protestants vigilantes to move against the Roman Catholics whose Sunday night battles gave Belfast a warlike atmosphere with rioting, arson and looting. Posters throughout the city warned of an attempt by the roof of the building and broke open an unused air conditioning unit that had been covered by metal and roofing material. They were apparently frightened by the home, and a crowd of about 200 people gathered around the roof and another scrodder, along with a pair of the air conditioning unit. A camper used by the Monoco Gas Co., 169 Addison Ave. W., was broken into sometime Friday night and an estimated \$2,000 was taken from a cash box. The camper was used as an office for the gas company. Also, under investigation was the theft of a stereo, valued at \$125, from an automobile owned by Dave Sommers and parked at his home, 517 1/2 Lakes Blvd., and a burglary at Western Bearing. Officers had not completed the burglary investigation at Western Bearing early Monday. County officers reported investigation was being made at U.S. Highway 20 where a heavy was gained and an air compressor was taken. Bishop Pike Buried In Holy Land He Loved

BETHLEHEM (UPI) — Former Episcopal Bishop James A. Pike, 50, who died of exhaustion when he became lost in the Jordan wilderness, was buried today in the Holy Land he loved. The Israeli government Press Office in Jerusalem announced the burial at Saint Peter's Protestant Cemetery in Jaffa at 5 p.m. (11 a.m. EDT). Pike's body was discovered Sunday by Israeli border guards at the foot of a 20-foot cliff. The body was reported missing in the desert where Jesus spent 40 nights fasting. Israeli police at first thought he had fallen to his death but a autopsy today showed he died of exhaustion in the 100-degree heat of the desert soon after he became separated from his wife, Diana. Mrs. Pike said Sunday night she was in no hurry to leave Israel, but a travel agency said today she and her husband, Richard Scott Kennedy, had booked passage on an Olympic Airways flight for London on Monday. After Pike's body was found near the fortress of King Hezekiah the Great, Mrs. Pike recalled her 59-year-old husband's last words to her: "If I die here, I am at peace. I have no regrets." Pike's body was found 2.5 miles from where Mrs. Pike said he left last week in a state of collapse after their automobile struck a rock pile. Mrs. Pike said she had been alone at the time. Apparently, he had been trying

to scale the cliff. Mrs. Pike, the clergyman's wife, said her husband and she would have no word on their own plans until a decision was made on Pike's burial. Mrs. Pike said her husband died in quest of truth about Jesus, whom he loved and adored, and more of the more he learned about him, the more he loved him and his faith and hope and complete trust in God when he died. She said she and her husband had been writing together about the life of Jesus. She plans to finish the book on Monday. Pike was born in Oklahoma City Feb. 14, 1913. Reared a Roman Catholic, he abandoned the faith with his student days at Jesuit University of Saint

U.S. Cancels Bomb Raids During Ho Chi Minh Truce

SAIGON (UPI) — The United States has canceled planned night bomber strikes and cut back offensive sweeps during the Communist three-day cease-fire that began today. South Vietnam ignored the Ho Chi Minh truce and the Communists said they would punish them. Reliable sources disclosed the American cutback, but U.S. headquarters had no official comment. Officially, the United States was following the South Vietnam decision to ignore the Communist truce. In Paris, a South Vietnamese spokesman said the Saigon forces will continue to fight during the cease-fire. The Communist side's level of military and terrorist activity came today when a civilian bus struck a road mine near Tam Ky, about 40 miles below Da Nang. The explosion killed 10 passengers and wounded 13 others. The Saigon spokesman refused to say whether the statement meant the South Vietnamese would not initiate any offensive actions. But the Viet Cong clandestine radio said previous rejection of the cease-fire showed the "very cruel face" of the Communist government. "They will be deservedly punished by the Communist troops," the broadcast said. Military spokesmen reported nearly a dozen guerrilla violations of the cease-fire in the 14 hours after it began. They called them "insignificant, comparatively rare." Three South Vietnamese were killed and 21 others were wounded, field reports said. At least three Americans died and 15 were wounded in Communist cease-fire violations.

Charles W. Gwin, Lincoln Justice, Dies

SHOSHONE — Charles W. (Chick) Gwin, 72, Lincoln County Justice of the Peace, died at 7:10 a.m. Sunday in his home of a heart attack. He was born Oct. 6, 1896, in Shoshone, the youngest son of a pioneer Shoshone family. He was graduated from Shoshone High School where he was editor for the first school annual. He attended the Academy of Idaho, now Idaho State University. He married Elsie Schwaiger on June 20, 1920, in Twin Falls. He formed in the North Shoshone area and worked for the Bureau of Reclamation, Bureau of Public Roads and the Big Wood Canal Co. in 1938. He was an engineer for the Idaho Department of Highways, retiring in 1962. He accepted the justice of the peace appointment in July, 1967. He was a member of the Idaho Magistrates Association, Junction City Lodge No. 10, I.O.O.F., and the Shoshone Church-Episcopal. Surviving besides his wife are two daughters, Mrs. Frank (C) Gwin, and Mrs. Max H. (Becky) Roberts, Pocatello, and two grandchildren. Two brothers and four sisters preceded him. Funeral services will be conducted at 11 a.m. Wednesday at Shoshone Church Episcopal by Rev. W.D. Ellway. Hymns: "Praises will be at Shoshone Cemetery. Ho's Death Could Change Course Of War In Vietnam

PARIS (UPI)—The disappearance of Ho Chi Minh from the scene faces the North Vietnamese leaders with a series of new problems that could change the course of the Vietnam war and the peace negotiations, an authoritative source said Saturday.

The source, close to the South Vietnamese delegation at the summit-level peace conference, said the death of Ho posed a new set of problems for his heirs.

He saw them as problems of "moral leadership and balance" between Russia and China.

The impact of the Moscow Peking problem already has been underlined by the snub handed to Soviet Premier Alexey Kosygin by Chinese Premier Chou En-Lai, who left the funeral observances in Hanoi before Kosygin arrived.

But, as seen from Paris by this source, the top Hanoi leaders also face a period of difficulty internally—rallying their nation behind them, and struggling among themselves for the top spot to replace Ho.

For the time being, Allied negotiators expected the Hanoi and Viet Cong delegations to harden their stand at the conference and "on the battlefield."

But the officials did not feel this would last for too long, and eventually the situation would probably change because of the views of Allied officials, is the view of Chinese officials in North Vietnam.

On the morale front, Ho's death leaves Hanoi and its supporters in the South without a figurehead known to everybody.

Looming over all, in the views of Allied officials, is the question of who ultimately will establish dominance over Hanoi—Moscow or Peking.

Ho Chi Minh was able to keep a balance. But the big question now about his successors was, "whether they will have the same capabilities for their policies."

Labor, Civil Rights Leaders Plan To Oppose Haynsworth

WASHINGTON (UPI)—At least 13 witnesses that include prominent labor and civil rights leaders plan to testify against Judge Clement F. Haynsworth's nomination to the Supreme Court, the Senate Judiciary Committee announced Saturday.

The committee opens hearings Tuesday on President Nixon's nomination of the 57-year-old South Carolinian to the Supreme Court seat vacated by the resignation of Abe Fortas. Judiciary Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., released a roster of 21 witnesses, 13 who oppose Haynsworth, six who favor his nomination and two whose position was not known.

Haynsworth, chief judge of the U.S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond, Va., will appear first. It seemed likely that senators would question him about allegations that he had a conflict of interest in a case several years ago involving a textile firm and a labor union.

Witnesses opposed to Haynsworth's nomination include Roy Wilkins, NAACP president; Roy Harris, president of the National Conference of Black Lawyers; Joseph L. Rauh Jr., vice chairman of Americans for Democratic Action; Walter P. Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers Union; and at least two representatives of the AFL-CIO, perhaps including President George Meany.

Witnesses scheduled to testify for Haynsworth included law professors G.W. Foster Jr. of the University of Wisconsin, Charles Alan Wright of the University of Texas and William W. Alstyne of Duke University.

Most criticism of Haynsworth has centered on allegations involving his stand on civil rights cases and the alleged conflict of interest.

Kennedy joined a court majority ruling in favor of the textile firm. Opponents have pointed out that the textile firm's parent company did business with a vending firm in which Haynsworth held stock.

'Ground Rules' Of Inquest Trigger Multiple Protests

BOSTON (UPI)—Former U.S. Atty. Paul F. Markham is the only one of 12 persons who attended the Chappaquiddick Island coroner's inquest, Mrs. Jo Kopecnik died, who has not filed an appeal with the Massachusetts Supreme Court contesting the ground rules of an inquest into her death.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, in whose car the young woman died July 18, was the first to petition the high court. Last Tuesday, Kennedy's lawyers, from Justice Paul C. Reardon—a temporary restraining order postponing the inquest until the full court could rule on what Kennedy called "grave constitutional questions."

On Friday, nine of the 10 remaining persons known to have been in the car and a cook who appeals with the Supreme Court, contending their "constitutional right to privacy" would be violated under the ground rules which had been set for the inquest. Their claims were similar to Kennedy's.

Markham, who along with Joseph E. Gargan, the senator's cousin and closest friend, is represented by Joseph P. Donahue, a Lowell attorney, has not taken any legal action, a well informed source pointed out.

It was Gargan and Markham who, according to Kennedy, returned to the accident scene on Chappaquiddick Island off Martha's Vineyard to divorce again from Mrs. Kopecnik, who was trapped in the senator's car in a small pond. They were unsuccessful in reaching her, but did not report the accident to police.

Kennedy pleaded guilty to leaving the scene of an accident, and was sentenced to a two-month jail term which was suspended. He was placed on a year's probation. No charges were brought against Gargan or Markham.

The inquest, which many hoped would answer some of the nagging questions about the case, was delayed indefinitely by the high court's action. Dist. Atty. Edmund S. Dineen has remained silent about his plans for the investigation since Tuesday's ruling.

Officer Finds 'Old Friend' Is Bandit

DETROIT (UPI)—The reunion with an old classmate was a happy one for policeman Melvin Williams but not for his old high school friend, Robert W. Pentecost.

Detroit Patrolman Williams was catching his paycheck at a downtown bank Friday when he spotted his Millger High School classmate at another window.

When Williams sauntered toward Pentecost to bash over old times, Pentecost bolted out the door, nearly howling over a woman customer.

The officer, dressed in civilian clothes, suddenly realized Pentecost also seemed to look like a bandit in a photo snapped during a bank robbery Aug. 20. Williams took off after Pentecost pursuing something more than friendship.

"I thought the bunch—bunch of chumps—they chased down department store aisles and into an elevator."

"I want to talk to you," Williams said.

"All right, you got me," Pentecost replied, handing over a bag containing \$2,178 and throwing up his hands.

Pentecost was arraigned on federal bank robbery charges and ordered held for \$25,000 bond pending examination Sept. 10.

Hippies Lose Out In Spain

IBIZA, Spain (UPI)—Hippies of the world have lost two islands in the sun. No more the teenage nude hitchhikers. No more the moonlight orgies. Spain wants to be nice to tourists. It is very profitable. But the things on the Balearic Islands of Ibiza and Formentera drove the police to act.

The past week they rounded-up 82 hippies including 17 girls, and expelled them from the islands. The Madrid newspaper ABC had been calling for the cleanup.

The newspaper praised the police for following their orders to show "smiles and sympathy" to visitors. But it said the hippie happenings on Ibiza and Formentera included:

- Sex orgies in the caves of Formentera.
- A nudist sat in the nude around a human skull taken from a nearby cemetery when moonlight came, the orgy began.
- The hippies feeding on drug traffic between the Mediterranean islands and Algeria.
- ABC said tons of hashish, marijuana and other drugs came to the sunny isles.
- An American hippie setting up a plantation growing cannabis in the hands of a hump and hashish in a corner of Formentera.
- Drug use causing the two islands to lead all Spain in suicide statistics.
- Shops and boutiques becoming centers for drug distribution.
- Other reports told of the nude hitchhikers. They said young girls went dancing down the island roads in the altogether, the motorists to join them in "mass love-ins."
- The hippies expelled from the islands included 19 Americans, seven Britons, an Irishman, 15 Germans, four Dutch, two Norwegians, two Danes, a pair of Swedes, a Colombian and the rest all Spanish.

Child Labor Rules Are Pointed Out

BOISE (UPI)—Federal child labor laws forbid the hiring of young children outside of school hours. This reminder to Idaho employers came Saturday from Frank B. Reeder, director for the wage and hour and public contracts division of the U.S. Department of Labor.

Reeder said the reminder was written into child labor laws for the good of the children so that those under 16 would remain in school.

Reeder suggested employers protect themselves against violations by requiring youngsters to obtain certificates in proof of age.

At 14 and 15, youth may work in many non-manufacturing, non-hazardous jobs outside of school hours, such as selling, office work or a variety of clerical jobs.

At 16 they may not be employed in jobs covered by hazardous occupations, orders and jobs requiring an 18-year minimum age, such as driver of a motor vehicle, freight elevator operator, work and operating certain power machinery.

Under 16, however, work outside of school hours is limited to three hours a day, up to 18 hours a week, between seven a.m. and seven p.m.

Weather Delays AEC Explosion

GRAND VALLEY, Colo. (UPI)—The Atomic Energy Commission, stymied since late last week in its attempts to schedule a nuclear test blast in western Colorado, says unfavorable weather conditions would delay the test at least until Tuesday.

The underground Project Plutonium explosion, equal to 20,000 tons of TNT, was to have been delayed Thursday but adverse winds have forced day-to-day postponements.

Dirksen's Death May Start Bitter Fight For GOP Post

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The death of Everett M. Dirksen as it had already planned to go after Dirksen's cancer operation seems certain to touch off a bitter fight for the post of Senate Republican leader between the party's conservative and liberal wings. The winner may well be a compromise candidate who can draw support from both sides.

During the period of mourning, a quadricentennial will run Republican affairs in the Senate.

But an influx of young and more liberal Republicans in recent years—notably the 1968 elections—may force a change. In January, Sen. Roman L. Hruska of Nebraska, a close friend of Dirksen's and his personal choice, was defeated by Scott for the whip job 23-20.

It is quite possible that the conservative wing may rally again behind Hruska, a 55-year-old lawyer, sometimes referred to as Dirksen's chief legal adviser. In the Senate since 1954, Hruska is considered at least as conservative as Dirksen and much less pliable.

Homemade Plane

Dead were William Hutchison, La Mirada, and Jerry Filley, Huntington Beach.

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Evans' Captain Faces Investigation

SUBIC BAY NAVAL BASE, Philippines (UPI)—It is U.S. Navy tradition that the captain is responsible for the safety of his men and his ship—even when the hour is late and he is asleep.

This week, a Navy prosecutor will begin trying to prove Cmdr. Albert S. McLemore, 40, of Vallejo, Calif., should have been awake and on the bridge of the destroyer Frank E. Evans before dawn on June 3. Instead, McLemore, a crew-cut, graying professional sailor, was sleeping in his sea cabin just aft of the bridge. It almost cost him his life.

A tragic series of maneuvers followed. At 4:15 a.m., the Melbourne steel hull sliced through the Evans, sending the destroyer's carrier Melbourne ordered the Evans to take station 1,000 yards astern of her.
