

# Student Pilot, Airliner Collide; 83 Die In Mid-Air Disaster

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—A small plane invisible on airport radar scanners tore the tail from an Allegheny jetliner Tuesday, sending both craft plummeting into a soybean field. The crash killed 83 persons, some flying to their death through the gaping tail hole.

The private plane was flown by a student 10 hours flying time short of his pilot's license. It was Indiana's worst airline tragedy.

Authorities said the small plane was not visible on radar because of "ground clutter." A spokesman said smaller craft frequently were not seen by radar at lower altitudes.

The pilot of the smaller craft was Robert Carey, 34, who was in the Air Force during the Korean war, but not as a pilot. Carey, trying for his private pilot's license, was carrying his wife and six children flying, climbed into a Piper Cherokee and began a solo flight.

As he climbed eastward, the control tower at Indianapolis Weir-Cook Municipal Airport instructed the Allegheny DC3 airliner to descend from 6,000 feet to 2,500 feet on the landing approach from the east.

The collision with Carey's plane struck, or was struck by, the tail of the larger airplane. The jetliner's tail came off and bodies tumbled out the rear.

The tragedy could have been worse. The pilot of the jetliner apparently forgot his plummeting, 55.2 million-pound craft away from a trailer camp and into an open field about 15 miles southeast of Indianapolis.

## Israelis Renew Attack On Egypt With Air Raid

Israeli planes returned today to the scene of Tuesday's raid on Egypt and bombed and strafed Egyptian army vehicles and troops. A spokesman in Tel Aviv said the air raid was in answer to a further Egyptian cease-fire violations along the Suez Canal this morning.

The swift retaliation was in line with Defense Minister Moshe Dayan's warning to Egypt that it could expect even heavier Israeli strikes if the cease-fire violations continue, and Premier Golda Meir's statement such raids would continue if no peace settlement were reached.

BURLEY — Cassia school trustees have certified tax levies and requested emergency authority for the levy.

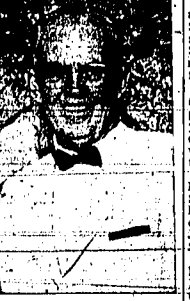

# Nixon To Assemble Leaders For Parley On War Strategy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon today scheduled a high-level conference Friday on Vietnam strategy, with the U.S. commander in chief, Gen. Creighton Abrams, flying to Washington to participate.

Top diplomatic, military and intelligence officials involved in formulating Vietnam policy from determination of possible further troop withdrawals to assessment of the Hanoi leadership in the aftermath of Ho Chi Minh's death were summoned to the meeting.

In addition to Abrams, also sitting in will be Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird, Secretary of State William P. Rogers, Adm. John McCain, commander in chief in the Pacific, Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Nixon's national security adviser, Henry A. Kissinger, Elsworth Bunker, U.S. ambassador to Saigon, and CIA Director Richard C. Helms.

White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler said the meeting would be a "general and overall review of the Vietnam situation."

The review also will include a discussion of the effects of Ho's death on the future of the Vietnam situation.

Bunker returned to the United States several days ago for consultations. He was scheduled to meet with Nixon today for preliminary discussions in advance of the high level meeting.

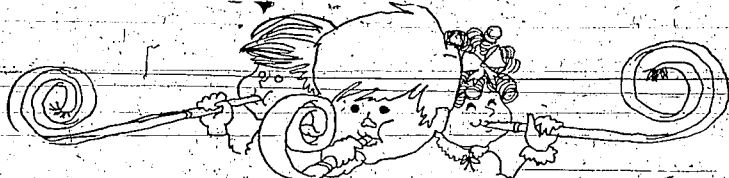
"The only person I feel sorry for," said George "Big" Young, "is the wife of the black man I killed."

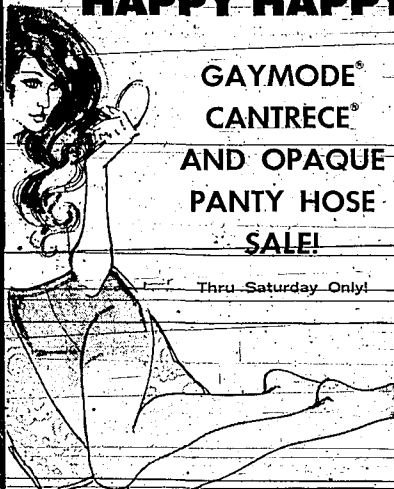
He telephoned the state prison, the parole commission and the state attorney's office to make sure that you would never be considered for parole on my recommendation," said the judge.

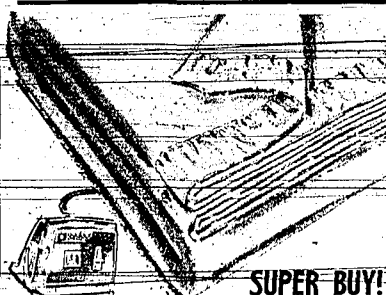

Most families know how easy it is to get ahead over heels in debt and how difficult it is to get out, especially when prices are rising. That is just about where the country stands now.

WASHINGTON — The widening split between President Nixon's political and economic advisers over whether to stop inflation soon or let it slide a bit longer was dramatically revealed in the White House handling of the President's cutback in spending.

Unhappily for the critics and attackers, this version of what America's society is just too neat and comfortable. It leaves totally out of account the American individual who is fighting both the economic and things that he has never seen before.

# Sexy Agents Win Nevada Drug Case

**CARSON CITY, Nev. (UPI)** — The Nevada Supreme Court ruled Tuesday that female undercover police agents may search "sexual wiles" to combat traffic in narcotics.

Policemen dealing in the vast, vague underworld of narcotics are not held to the polite manners of a "decent society," the court said in an unanimous opinion.

Jack Melvin Crown was arrested in Reno in a hotel room for possession of marijuana. He claimed the police tactics were unfair.

Two police special agents, one of whom is a female, went to the hotel room with Robert Vance. Crown was in the room. Vance pulled out a "joint" of marijuana and all had a puff of it.

Justice David Zenoff, who wrote the unanimous opinion, said: "These female inspectors (the narcotics agents) used her sexual wiles to get into the room with the men and she thereafter by participating in the marijuana experience and later joining with the police in forcing their way into the room without a search warrant by the totality of the conduct was unfair."

This court has already approved the use of police informers in the prosecution of narcotics traffic," Zenoff wrote. The opinion said it was not clear as to what tactics used by the law enforcement people Crown claims amounted to dirty pool.

LONDON (UPI) — Israel's raid on Egypt Tuesday made it clear Cairo is far from ready for war, let alone offensive war, Western defense sources said today.

Moscow's army paper Red Star said the Arab armies are stronger now than they were two years ago.

The United Arab Republic, in particular, is greatly strengthened its armed forces which are dealing ever stronger retaliatory blows at Israeli aggressors, Red Star said.

The report on designing education for the future in Idaho states that by 1980 there will be a sharp demand for people in engineering, science, the health services, education, the social services, recreational fields, accounting and administration and all of these fields require a high level of communication.

Deficiencies in reading, writing, speaking and listening must be relentlessly tracked down and "radicated" before the students reach the age of 16.

The Eight State Project states that the mathematics program of 1980 should continue toward the goals of the "new math" revolution of the 1960s.

At the secondary level, more emphasis must be placed on statistics and computer science.

In a touchy area in the report, it is stated that much of sex education "belongs to the social studies program" rather than being shunted off to the physical education instructors.

"Treating it merely as a psychological matter rather than

as the ethical, social and even economic matter that it is, is possibly worse than Idaho's former approach of leaving the subject strictly to the parents."

The report states that by 1980 "there will be even cheaper and more effective contraceptive devices than we have now."

"Couple that with the rise in independence of our youngsters and the number of three-car families and the need for sex education on a more than physiological basis becomes self-evident."

The shortage of scientists and engineers has been "increasing at a rapid rate" and in the 1980s the science program will undoubtedly make great use of outdoor education camps.

In planning for the 1980s, it is likely that there will be an emphasis on education that will have to be counteracted.

"The schools must keep in mind that we are producing men and not manpower — that our ultimate goal is the production of good people," the report states.

Physical education and environmental education are also stressed.

Better communications are vital to schools. The school-community relations study group on the task force communique on education came up with the conclusion that the public has strong reservations about any effort that presents only the favorable things about conditions in education.

It was brought out that superintendents are "critical" of the handling of educational material by the news media.

The report states that the image of the PTA should be changed and "educators should go out into the community at every opportunity as speakers and participants in public affairs."

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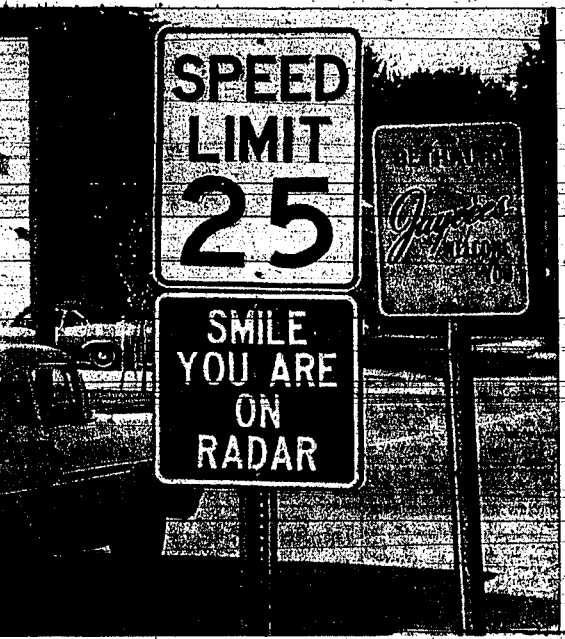

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## Is Hair-Growing Addictive? Congressional Study Asked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Claude Pepper, chairman of the House Crime Committee, has proposed that the Public Health Service undertake an intensive and extensive study of marijuana smoking in America.

His purpose, the Florida Democrat explained, would be to answer the question of whether marijuana is addictive and necessarily leads to the use of stronger drugs.

He said the study should be comparable to the earlier one the surgeon general made to determine whether cigarette smoking was harmful.

He heartily endorsed Pepper's proposal, and when that study is completed I would like to see the report. I think it is important for someone to conduct yet another study of yet another social problem.

His purpose would be to ascertain whether growing hair

is addictive.

"The theory that people may become addicted to hair growing was advanced the other day by Dr. Hans Von Polleke, an eminent sociologist and tensor who lectures at the barber shop I patronize."

"I've seen it happen often for there to be no other explanation," Von Polleke was saying when I dropped in for my fortnightly trim.

"A kid will get in his hair, and I will notice he is wearing his sideburns a bit longer than the last time. I say to myself, 'Sure, he's growing clean-cut hair, but I'll give odds that he is already hooked.'"

"Sure enough, the next time he comes in the shop he is wearing a full head of hair. 'When that happens, you can bet it won't be long before he starts fooling around with mustaches.'"

I said, "Well, I don't think

there is any doubt that growing hair is habituating. When you get into the habit of growing hair, you find it difficult to stop. But it has never been conclusively proven that hair growing is addictive in the way it is with opium and aated penuria are."

"Don't kid yourself," Von Polleke said. "You may think you can stop with a little Chamberlain's or a Tom Dewey's mustard—but case histories of hair addicts show a definite tendency to go on to something stronger."

"Essentially they wind up growing handlebars, walruses, vandykes, Franz Josephs, Dunderberges, Py Menchus, Napoleonic Imperialns and Pickedilly weepers."

I said, "All right, I can't answer a full head of hair is addictive. What should he do then? Try to taper off? Keep trimming his sideburns, beard and hair until they finally disappear?"

# Trained Crews Will Reopen Mine Closed By Gas Explosion

MANNINGTON, W.Va. (UPI)—On Nov. 20, 1968, Mannington No. 9 began its death throes. For nine days 18 major explosions rocked the sprawling, 50-foot deep coal mine in northern West Virginia. Seventy-eight miners were trapped and their tomb. Twenty-one others escaped.

When the crews reach the mine's run shaft, about a thousand tons of limestone, used to seal off the shaft, will have to be removed.

After the limestone removal has been completed, the task of digging in the ruins for the entombed bodies will proceed.

"All the work will be done manually. No equipment of any kind capable of producing a spark will be employed to prevent the chance of other explosions.

Tragedy is no stranger to Mannington where 18 miners were killed by an explosion Nov. 13, 1954.

What the recovery crews will find inside Mannington—how and when to begin the task of reopening the mine. The location of the miners at the time of the disaster was never determined. Nor does anyone yet know the extent and fury of the blasts and fires.

Dr. J. E. Buff, chairman of the Physicians Committee for Miners' Health and Safety, was asked what he expected recovery crews to find.

"Nothing but ashes," he replied.

## Eight Sought In Kidnaping Of U.S. Envoy

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—The army spread a net across Brazil Tuesday for eight suspected kidnapers of U.S. Ambassador C. Burke Elbrick, including a woman. The government at the same time was reported planning to impose modified martial law on the country.

Sketched descriptions of the seven men and a woman included in the kidnaping were distributed throughout Brazil and army and navy intelligence agents were directed to cooperate with police in the nationwide search for the kidnapers.

Elbrick was kidnaped on a Sunday night in exchange for government release of 15 leftist political prisoners.

## Acting President Of North Viet Spent 15 Years In Prison For 'Revolution'

Ton Duc Thang, the new acting president of North Vietnam, has spent 15 of his 81 years in prison.

Immediately upon his release in 1948 from a French jail, Thang joined the Viet Minh to fight the French who had imprisoned him.

Thang, who had sought membership in the Indo-China Communist party while still in prison, was elected to the national assembly in 1960 and was named a state minister the following year.

Thang was awarded the Lenin Peace Prize in 1955, the year he attended the World Peace Congress in Helsinki, Finland.

His most recent title was vice president of the Communist party of North Vietnam.

His biography released in Hanoi claims he belongs neither to pro-Peking nor pro-Moscow groups in the Communist hierarchy of North Vietnam.

Thang was born to a middle-class farm family in 1888 in Long Xuyen Province in what is now South Vietnam. He was graduated from an engineering school in Saigon in 1910 and plunged immediately into revolutionary activity.

He is said to have led a strike

at a factory while still a student. After finishing school, Thang went to work in a machinery manufacturing firm in Saigon and was active in labor groups.

In 1911 Thang quit his factory job and became a teacher in Saigon. The following year he boarded a ship for France where he studied Communism.

## Knifed Victim Seeks Help

### 20 Turn Away

NEW YORK (UPI)—Not one of 20 spectators of the stabbing of a 70-year-old grandmother by a teenage boy came to the woman's rescue or tried to apprehend the youth, police reported Tuesday.

The victim, Mrs. Eva Bresciano of Brooklyn, was in critical condition at Beekman Downtown Hospital where she was taken Monday after being wounded in a ladies room of Family Court in Manhattan.

The youth, identified as Nathaniel Burton, 13, of Brooklyn, was apprehended at the scene by patrolman Samuel Kwansana and charged with juvenile delinquency.

Police said Mrs. Bresciano told them she had never seen the boy before. He was reported to have followed her into the ladies room with an open switchblade knife and stabbed her repeatedly. She staggered into the courthouse corridor bleeding profusely to seek help.

Authorities said there were 20 people in the corridor. They watched silently as Mrs. Bresciano collapsed on the floor and the youth, emerged from the ladies room with the bloody knife to stand over her menacingly. Some fled at the sight while others remained motionless, witnesses said.

An unidentified caller alerted the Elizabeth Street police station. When Kwansana arrived at the court, Burton was still standing over the woman while at least 10 of the witnesses looked on. The youth surrendered without a struggle. Police said he refused to say who he attacked, an elderly stranger. They said robbery did not appear to be the motive.

Mrs. Bresciano's daughter, Mrs. Ann Bertoglio, said the woman was at the courthouse to resolve a family dispute.

"You're not even safe in the courthouse," Mrs. Bertoglio commented.

## Officers May Seek Change In Trials

SUBIC BAY NAVAL BASE, Philippines (UPI)—The captain and the senior deck officer of the destroyer Frank E. Evans are expected to seek separate trials Wednesday during preliminary proceedings of their court-martial.

The court martial proper of the skipper of the ill-fated destroyer Evans, Cmdr. Albert S. McLemore, 46, of Vallejo, Calif., and Lt. J. A. Ramo, 34, of Ramsey, 24, of Long Beach, Calif., is expected to begin Friday before a military court inside a quonset hut at the naval base 20 miles northwest of Manila.

One key point to be settled Wednesday during a meeting between the two sides will be whether the two men will be tried in a common court martial or separately.

Legal sources said they believed the men would seek separate courts because they stood to gain nothing by being charged together.

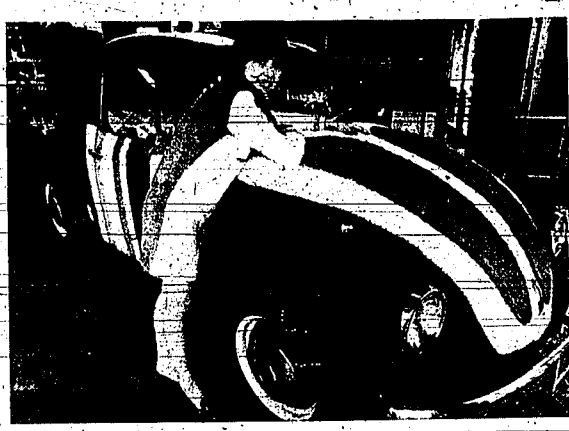

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# Pope Turns 72, Ponders Retirement Possibility

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI turns 72 this month and like many an elderly man he has been confounded with the question of whether he should retire some day.

It is not a question that a Pope normally must face. Only one has ever relinquished the job short of death.

He was Celestine V, a hermit monk who was drafted for the papacy in 1294 when cardinals could not agree on a candidate. He retired five months later.

The Roman Catholic Church canonized him but Dante placed him among the cowards in Hell in his epic "Divine Comedy" because he "refused the great commis-

sion which had been paid upon him."

Paul VI whose birthday is Sept. 26, is so preoccupied with maintaining papal authority in the church that it is difficult to imagine him taking a step such as retirement which might further undermine that authority.

But he has been criticized as no Pope in modern history, and some observers think he may decide eventually to retire in the conviction that only a new Pope could quiet the storm in the church.

So far as is known, the Pope has not expressed his views on the question of retirement to any of his close associates.

But there has been speculation of his possible retirement for several years. Some of this may be merely wishful thinking on the part of his critics. But some of it has been inspired by the Pope's own actions.

At his 69th birthday, Paul asked local bishops throughout the world to offer their resignations at age 75, leaving to him to decide whether to accept them.

Only a month after setting the age limit for bishops, the Pope paid a visit to the grave of Celestine V. His reason for doing so has never been explained, but some have seen it as a symbolic gesture indicating his own intention to retire as Celestine did.

# Nixon's Welfare Program Criticized By Sen. McGovern

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., said today President Nixon's welfare program would make "nearly 10 million Americans who are both old and poor."

McGovern, testifying at a Senate hearing on the nutrition of America's elderly poor, criticized Nixon's plan to phase out food stamps to the elderly while not raising cash old age benefits to any of them.

"President Nixon has proposed \$65 a month—the minimum old age assistance benefit, a level which 21 states already exceed."

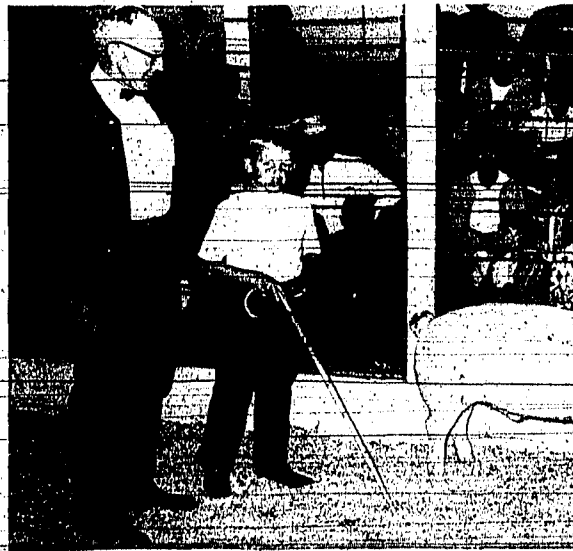
